Louisiana Crude Oil & Gas Co. Inc. of New Orleans will drill No. 2 Raymond Beck in the Pat Kahan (Mississippian) Field in Eastland County.

The planned 4,100-foot venture is located on a 114-acre lease five miles north of Eastland.

It spots 2,230 feet from the south and 2,107 feet from the east lines of Section 21, Block 4, H&TC Survey.

Sers Oil & Gas Co., Brownwood, will drill No. 1 Clausen in the regular field two miles northeast of Williams.

The planned 3,200-foot venture is located on a 100-acre lease.

It spots 6,000 feet from the north and 6,800 feet from the east lines of H.P. Brewster Survey 790.

F.J. Saddle, Abilene, will drill two regular field projects in the county.

No. 15 E.P. Kilgore is a planned 1,250-foot venture for the area four miles northeast of Cross Cut.

Drillsite is 450 feet from the north and 660 feet from the west lines of N.B. Mitchell Survey 153.

The lease is composed of 75 acres.

Other venture is No. 1 Reba L. Keeler, located on a 200-acre lease two miles east of Cross Cut.

Site is 4,027 feet from the north and 150 feet from the west lines of Patrick Curlong Survey 151.

Permit depth applied for is 1,350 feet.

New Hope Exploration & Development of Abilene completed No. 1 Monroe Walker in the Pat Kahan (Mississippian) Field five miles northwest of Eastland in Eastland County.

Location is 467 feet from the south and 547 feet from the east lines of Section 34, Block 4, H&TC Survey.

Daily potential was 13 barrels of 42 gravity oil, plus one barrel of water.

Flow was through a 16-64 inch choke with 480 pounds casing and 142 pounds tubing pressures.

Production is from perforations at 3,753-61 feet, treated with 2,500 gallons of acid. The pay was fractured with 18,000 gallons of gel and 160 sacks of sand.

Operator set the 4 1/2 inch casing at 4,005 feet, and the hole is bottomed at 4,012 feet.

Gas-oil ratio was 13,558-1.

Completed in the same field was Textel Petroleum Corp. No. 1-4-21-B Fee.

Location is 2,371 feet from the south and 853 feet from the west lines of Section 21, Block 4, H&TC Survey.

Daily potential was 10 barrels of 44 gravity oil, flowing through a 16-64 inch choke with packer set on the casing and 250 pounds tubing pressure.

Production is from perforations at 3,807-18 feet, treated with 1,500 gallons of acid.

Operator set the 4 1/2 inch casing at 3,900 feet, two feet off bottom.

Gas-oil ratio was 18,900-1.

A project was recompleted in the Bluff Branch (Ellenburger) Field four miles northeast of Putnam.

It is Safari Drilling Corp. of Abilene No. 1 Mitcham-Agnew Unit, spitting 1,500 feet from the north and 330 feet from the west lines of Section 3175, TE&L Survey.

Daily potential was 186 barrels of 48 gravity oil. Flow was through a 13-64 inch choke with packer set on the casing and 875 pounds tubing pressure.

It is producing from perforations at 4,025-44 feet. The 4 1/2 inch casing is set at 4,047 feet, three feet off bottom.

Gas-oil ratio was 1,612-1.

Operator had plugged off the Ellenburger in 1973 to produce the Conglomerate.

The plug was removed to again produce the Ellenburger.

Santex Oil Co. of Arlington No. 6 Rogers is a planned 800-foot wildcat for Eastland County.

It will be drilled three miles west of Gorman on a 700 acre lease.

Drillsite is 515 feet from the south and 1,649 feet from the east lines of George Miller Survey, A-379.

Same firm will drill No. 1 Self as a proposed 3,400 foot wildcat in the Carbon (Caddo) Field three miles west of Gorman.

Site is 660 feet from the south and 1,850 feet from the west lines of Section 26, Block 1, H&TC Survey.

The lease is composed of 80 acres.

Capital Equity Transfer Co. of Abilene will drill No. 1 Irene Landreth et al, in the regular field three miles east of Rising Star.

The planned 1,350 foot venture is located on a 180 acre lease.

It spots 305 feet from the south and 1,323 feet from the west lines of Section 8, Block 2, ETRR Survey.

Dallas Production Inc. No. 1 Smith was completed six miles northwest of Cisco in the Tee Jay (3,750) Field.

Location is 1,830 feet from the south and 467 feet from the east lines of Section 2055, TE&L Survey A-1095.

Absolute, open flow was 800,000 cubic feet of gas daily. It had a gas liquid hydrocarbon ratio of 165,597-1 of 60 gravity.

Production is from perforations at 3,673 to 3,710 feet, treated with 1,000 gallons of acid.

The 4 1/2 inch casing is set at 4,199 feet, one foot off bottom.

Enre Corp. of San Antonio completed No. 3 Roy Adams in the regular field 12 miles west of Cisco.

Location is 2,100 feet from the north and 2,100 feet from the west lines of Section 3169, TE&L Survey.

Daily potential was 12 barrels of 43 gravity oil, plus five barrels of water.

It is pumping from perforations at 3,142,82 feet, treated with 16,000 gallons of acid.

The 4 1/2 inch casing is set at 3,979 feet, one foot off bottom.

Southeastern Resources Corp. of Rising Star will reenter to 3,000 feet, the old total depth at a wildcat one-half mile southwest of Grosvenor.

It is No. 1 Junell, located on a 73 acre lease.

Bob Lindsey Makes Appraisal Of Right-To-Read Program

With the first half of the 1978-79 school year for Cisco Public Schools being completed and the second half of the year three weeks on its way, coordinator Bob Lindsey of the Texas Right-To-Read Program in the Cisco Public Schools has made a timely appraisal of what is being accomplished in that area in grades three through six.

Classes for student participation in the Right-To-Read Program began September 25th of the current school year. However, it should be recalled that preparation for these classes begun during last school year. Each child who was scheduled to be in Intermediate School was given a Prescriptive company for computer grading which tabulated the level of each child's reading ability and the skills each had or had not mastered. With this information each of the 272 students in grades three through six plus three from Primary School has been placed in reading levels of his ability and in various skills classes that he needs to master.

Since September 25th seventy-five skill classes on four levels have been completed with the testing program showing the following results:

Grade three-83 percent mastery; Grade four-84.5 percent mastery; Grade five-80 percent mastery; Grade six-82 percent mastery; and Overall-82.375 percent mastery.

In addition to the skills classes, enrichment participation is provided for the students who have mastered all the prescribed skills. An example of an enrichment project is one done under the direction of Mrs. Joyce Schaefer in which each pupil wrote and illustrated a book on pre-school level. These books were permanently bound. Bill Pardue, Council Commissioner, said that each Scoutmaster will receive a copy of the new

book, which was released in conjunction with Scouting's 69th anniversary, at a Scoutmaster's meeting, at Adams Street Community Center, in Brownwood, at 6:15 p.m. on February 17th.

The new Boy Scout Handbook is being presented through the generosity of the Brownwood Elks Lodge.

The Scoutmasters will then give leadership to their troops in preparing for the

council's See 'N Do, to be held on April 28, in each community in the council area, which will use the new handbook as the basis for troop demonstrations of Scouting's outdoor skills.

"The See 'N Do is planned to make the pages of the new handbook come alive—both for boys who are already Scouts and for all those who come to see the event," Pardue said.

The new handbook, 576 pages of reference material for Scouts, outdoorsmen, camping families, hunters hikers, and others, was written by William "Green Bar Bill" Hillcourt, well-known Scouting author, as a one-year voluntary contribution to the Boy Scouts of America. Over the years, Pardue said, there have been more than 29 million copies printed of the handbook; the first printing of the ninth edition is 600,000 copies.

"Although the handbook is written for boys," Pardue said, "people interested in the outdoors who want to learn the skills that are part of the educational program of Boy Scouting will find it useful too." There are more than 1,000 full-color drawings in its seven sections, which include "What Scouting Is," "What Scouts Do," "Where Scouts Roam," "You and Other People," "You—American Citizen," "Upward to Eagle," and "From Boy to Man."

163 Professional Firefighters Lost Lives In Accidents

A total of 163 professional firefighters lost their lives in on-the-job accidents or from occupational diseases in 1977, according to figures compiled by the International Association of Fire Fighters.

Seventy-nine professional firefighters died in the line of duty last year. When averaged to job deaths per 100,000 firefighters, this constitutes an 11 percent increase over 1976. The firefighter death rate remains far ahead of all other occupational death rates, again making firefighting the most hazardous occupation in North America.

Information computed from the Public Safety Officers' Benefits Program -- Law Enforcement Assistance Administration, and firefighters statistics as reported to the IAFF by fire administrators, show that over the last 10 years firefighters have suffered an average of 86 deaths per 100,000, compared to 56 deaths per 100,000 for policemen.

This type of comparison clearly shows that, contrary to public opinion, the life hazard attached to firefighting is greater than that attached to police work.

Lights From The Christian World

I first met Farzah Safadel when he came to the United States, September 25, 1978. I couldn't miss noticing this young man as he stands out distinctly from the crowd with his slight build, black hair and soft, but sparkling brown eyes.

His home is in Shirez, Iran, located in the southwestern part of Iran, near the Persian Gulf.

Farzah is the fifth child in a family of eight children. His father works in a rice factory and a brick factory to support his family.

"Why did you come to the States and especially to Cisco, Texas?" I inquired of Farzah. He shared with me that he enrolled as a Senior student at Cisco High School because his brother had attended Cisco Junior College five years previously. Later his brother earned an Engineering degree at a higher school of learning and returned to Iran. His brother urged him to study in the States. He

overcame his first hurdle when Winston Heidenheimer of Cisco was willing to sponsor him as a student in our country.

Frazah could not speak or write English when he arrived. With a great deal of perseverance and discipline he mastered both speaking and writing English in the four months he has lived in Cisco.

Iran was ruled by Reza Shah Pahlavi, the father of the present Shah, from 1925 to 1941. Reza Shah was educated in the military and became a military officer. At that time Iran was an old-fashioned monarchy. Riza Shah rose to power and began to force a policy of nationalism. He organized the troops so well that he soon had the entire country under his control. The Iranians deposed the last Kajar Shah and Riza Shah began the Pahlavi dynasty. The other Shah, Kajarieei was forced to flee from the country. Riza Shah took steps to modernize the country.

There were extreme nationalist groups, including the Communists which provoked hostilities against the Western powers. They

committed various acts of violence, and even threatened the life of Riza Shah. In 1941 the present Shah, Reza's son became the Iranian leader. He continued to modernize the country. This aroused the ire of the Moslems and other groups each having their own reasons for being in discord with the Shah Mohammed Reza Pahlavi's policies.

Questions came quickly to my mind. "Farzah, what is your opinion of the revolution in your country? Did you favor the Shah Mohammad leaving Iran and possibly the Moslem's religious leader, Islam Khomeini becoming the guiding leader of Iran?"

Farzah thoughtfully commented, "As a Jewish Iranian boy, I can say that the Shah Mohammed was not exactly good for the people of Iran. Maybe you would ask why? The Shah took a great deal of money from the people and used it for his own pleasure. He was not an effective leader of my country because he seldom stayed in Iran. Every few months he left the country to visit in outer countries and visited much of the time in the United States. He left the government affairs in the hands of his ministers.

Farzah continued, "The oil of Iran should have been very cheap for the Iranian people. Instead the price was higher for them than it was

for those in foreign markets. Then Farzah's expression became more serious and the tone of his voice reflected more concern as he said, "But you have to know that as a Jewish boy, I can say that nobody can be like the Shah Mohammad because he gave the Iranians religious freedom."

Changes need to be made in our country. However, if the religious leader of Islam, Ayatullah Ruhollah Khomeini, leads our country I do not think that our country will progress and develop as the western nations have. Iran needs one man chosen by the people like Reza Shaz who ruled the country well and was not influenced by the United States or the Soviet Union."

What effect has the revolution had upon your family, I asked.

"I received word that my

parents can no longer worship in their Synagogue. They have been told that they, along with other Jews, must leave the country."

"Where will they go, Farzah?" I questioned, "and will they be able to take money and some of their possessions?"

"No, they must leave everything. Somewhere they will find a way in some other country," he replied. Then with a gleam born of hope and faith, he said, "My parents are preparing to go to the Holy Land and build a new life for themselves there."

Our visit ended. Thoughts lingered with me—I recalled that many centuries ago another family, the family of Abraham, left his homeland and journeyed with faith and hope to a far country not knowing what awaited them.

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Bankers To Discuss New AG Marketing

Keeping abreast of changing marketing alternatives is important to any banker who deals with producers of food and fiber products. Texas bankers will learn more about some new concepts in marketing agricultural products at the 27th Texas Farm and Ranch Credit School for Commercial Bankers Feb. 12-13 at Texas A&M University.

A special panel discussion on marketing to improve producer profitability will be chaired by Dr. Bob Branson, coordinator of Texas A&M's Agricultural Market Research and Development Center. Panel members include Ralph Newman, executive vice president, American Rice, Inc., Houston; Ed Miller, Texas-sweet Citrus Advertising, Inc., Mission; and Don Anderson, Agricultural Investments Consultants, Inc., Lubbock.

Leading off the school will be Ernest Baughman, president, Federal Reserve Bank of Dallas, who will discuss the economic and monetary outlook.

Other sessions will cover outlook information for various agricultural commodities, sources of funds for small agricultural banks, correspondent banking, and current policy issues in agriculture. points out Dr. Dick Trimble, economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and program chairman of the school.

Immediately following the school will be an Agricultural Credit Analysis Workshop which will begin the morning of Feb. 14 and end the morning of Feb. 16. This workshop will provide an in-depth treatment of preparing and analyzing financial statements, reconciling farm records, and preparing cash flow projections. Case problems will be solved to provide realistic experience for attending bankers.

An old swindle that is often tried, and frequently succeed begins when a "fly by night" business mails second rate and over-priced merchandise C.O.D. to an individual who did not order it. Many times such material is accepted and paid for by someone who believes that another member of the family ordered it.

Another form of this same fraud is perpetrated by the con man who dons a delivery uniform and comes to the door asking the occupant to accept and pay for a package for a neighbor who is not home. In fact, the package contains nothing of value and was not ordered by the neighbor or anyone else.

A third common scheme is the home repair racket. After a free home inspection, the repairman advises the homeowner that the chimney is about to crumble or that the furnace could explode the next time it is turned on. The "repairman" insists that repairs must be made at once, and offers to make them for a bargain price. After pretending to do some work, he insists on being paid in cash. In reality, the repairs were not really needed and work was not actually done.

To avoid falling victim to such schemes, be certain that your family, friends and neighbors are aware of how the schemes work. Don't hesitate to call the police if you think you are being swindled. Check with the Chamber of Commerce, or other business organizations or reputable companies dealing in the same product or service and ask about the people at your door. Remember, too, to be guided by some very simple advice: Do not be hurried into paying for anything until you are certain of what you are receiving in return.

Fishing is a year-round activity for those Texans who adapt to the changing weather conditions of winter.

according to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

In freshwater lakes, the ever-popular largemouth bass head for the deeper areas and may not be tricked by fishing methods that worked earlier in the year.

But bass fishing experts have found that artificial worms or jig-and-eel combinations fished deeply and slowly will work at times through the winter.

Bass tournament statistics compiled by the department indicate that a high percentage of trophy-sized bass are caught during February and March -- months which most fishermen would consider more winter than spring, weatherwise.

After a cold spell, a couple of warm, sunny days also can put bass in a feeding mood, and they will cruise shallower vegetated areas as the water warms a few degrees.

Keeping an eye on cold fronts is important to the winter angler, according to Bob Bounds, inland fisheries management coordinator. "Just after a front passes usually is a bad time to go fishing because the pressure changes causes fish to slow down on their feeding activities," he said. "An east wind also is another discouraging factor in Texas for some reason."

Bounds said there are other freshwater fish species which can be caught in the winter, but they also may be in the deeper water. "Sunfish are easily caught in the winter although they are usually not as concentrated as they are in the spring and summer around spawning areas," he noted. "Once located, they can be caught on warm days even with surface baits as well as on the usual methods as live bait or sinking flies."

"Catfish also will bite in surprisingly cold weather, but you have to have patience and fish near the bottom in deeper areas."

"Another great wintertime fish is the striped bass, which is a genuine cold-water fish," Bounds continued. "Stripers behave opposite to most native fish in Texas in that they stay deep in the summer and come to the surface in schools during the winter, especially at night."

The wintertime fisherman also should try the warm-water discharge areas at powerplant lakes. Bait fish often will congregate in the warmer water, especially if there are artificial lights in the area, and white bass, catfish and stripers often can be caught under these conditions even during the nastiest winter weather.

Coastal fishing also can be great in wintertime, according to Ernest Simmons, the department inland fisheries director who spent many years on the coast as coastal fisheries regional director. "Even the windy days are good if you want to catch some large black drum off the piers and jetties in wintertime," Simmons said. "You also can catch trout and reds in the surf during the winter, both on live bait and lures."

Simmons added that croakers also can provide good winter sport, although most fishermen consider croaker "runs" to be mainly an autumn phenomenon. "Croaker fishing is often good in channels, and bank fishing along a channel can be more comfortable than being out on the bay in a

Year Of The Hog May Have Finally Arrived

The year of the hog may have finally arrive! In the September hog report, many were wondering why there had been no response to the favorable hog prices producers were receiving. That is, why hadn't the pork producers expanded production in the face of continuing profits? Now it appears there will be expansion of pork suppliers, if producers intentions are carried out. The December Hog and Pigs report indicated the breeding hog inventory was up 15 percent from a year ago and the market hog inventory up 5 percent from last year. Possibly more important, producers indicated they intend to increase the numbers of sows farrowing during the December-May period by 15 percent above the previous year.

The question is, in light of the reported increase, will hog producers reevaluate and cut back from their original plan? It's happened before. In fact, the situation was much the same as year ago. The December 1977 report indicated show farrowing would be 13 percent higher for the December-February period last year but were actually 1 percent less. Of course, the seven winter weather and disease and gestation problems curtailed much of the expected expansion. Just how much of the cutback was planned would be pure speculation, but producers can still adjust their production plans for 1979.

With beef suppliers dwindling, some expansion of pork production would be in order without a severe price reduction.

boat," he said. Fisherman may overlook flounders in the winter, figuring that they have left the bays. "Flounders can be found in the deeper areas of bays throughout the winter months, and they can be caught on worm jigs, squid or dead shrimp bounced along the bottom," Simmons advised.

"The fact is that if you fish the right areas you stand a chance of catching larger fish in wintertime than in hot weather, and you aren't bothered as much by smaller fish like pinfish and hard-heads stealing your bait."

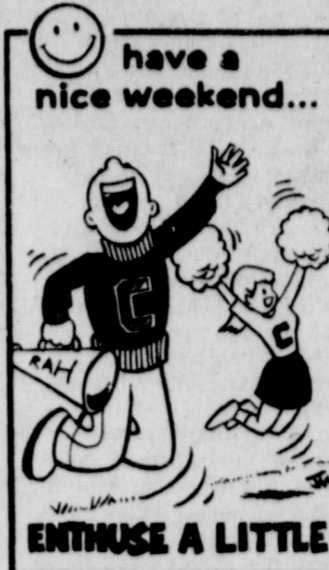
