Nurses Give Therapy In Home Of Lela Latch Lloyd

Nurses Fill Needs In

Last week R. N. Jackie Tucker, Supervisor of the Home Health Services of Eastland County, joined with her Assistant, L.V.N. Nova Geroge of Cisco, in presenting a film and program at a Senior Citizen's luncheon in Cisco.

At the same time another Home Health Medical Worker, L.V.N. Evelyn Fox, was visiting patients in their homes on the east side of the County

Duties for these nurses can very any day from diabetic care to monitoring a heart patient or giving physical therapy-while managing to fit in educational and informational services.

The information is needed, for the program is com- paratively new in Eastland All. County.

The plan has a beautiful simplicity-it is based on the idea that nurses can go into homes and give part-time care to patients instead of individuals staying in a hospital for extended periods of time. The program filled a terrific need from the first, and now the nurses care for an average of twenty different patients each weekwith some of these requiring frequent visits. The nurses are also on call 24 hrs. per day to answer questions and help in emergencies. And this type of service is for private pay.

There is the South Plains Homemaker Service, where quailified women go into homes for meal preparation, personal care, escore service, home management, and other needs. Memorial Nursing Homes are provided where patients can live when it is no longer possible for them to

stay in a home of their own. The Memorial Homes and Homemaker Service are not available in Eastland County. "There is a great need for the Homemaker Service in Eastland County," states Nurse Jackie Tucker. "We hope to be able to carry that program forward in the future, when we can recruit and train enough people. It takes a special kind of person to give the dedicated personal service we want. and his environment.' The M B F A Foundation began with one man-Land D. Wall of Lubbock. He dreamed of a breakthrough in medical service-where the old, practical ideas of home and family care could be incorporated into modern medicine. The organization was set up as The Missionary Baptist Foundation of America, Inc. The Home Health Agencies were begun as primary functions of the organization. In 1975 the organization expanded into the Nursing Home field. Other involvement are the administration of rural hospitals, community nutritional programs, family counseling, and furnishing transportation for persons to

essential services The work of the MBFA is supported by contributions and memorials by clients, families, and interested persons-by grands from government or private foundations, or by Medicare, Medicade, V. A. benefits, insurance, or private payments. Individuals who are not covered by these are asked to pay only according to their ability.



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

Equality

The passage of the proposed Equal Rights Amendment has remained in question for three years. If ratified the ERA will become the Constitution's 27th amendment. The ERA state "Equality of rights under the law shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any state on account on sex." (section 1)

"No one has sufficient prophetic power to predict with accuracy what interpretation the Supreme Court will place upon the E.R.A." Sentor Sam I. Ervin (D.N.C.) has said. What effect will this amendment have on family life, military service, and employment?

Those against the ERA argue that it will cause chaos in the family by altering traditional husband and wife roles. However, Martha Griffiths (D. Mich.) contends that the amendment is aimed at government and has nothing to do with family life. She claims that the ERA only guarantees that women's rights a are protected; how she uses these rights in the choice of her own and her husbands.

become liable for military service is one of the most controversial question regarding the Equal Rights Amendment. It is most likely that under the ERA women would serve in conbat, voluntarily, or if the craft were reinstated, be drafted right along with the men. Also the rule that only those who physically meet the demands of warfare should be sent to right is not invalidated by the ERA, and it

will then apply to both sexes. ERA would have little effect on employment because discrimination in hiring or promotion on the basis of sex has already been banned by the Civil Rights Act in 1964. ERA's impace would r rest mostly on socalled protective legislation. "Laws protecting woman's health actually deny them good pay, promotion, and positions of power," claims Shirley Chisolm (D. N. Y.)

Equal Rights movements for women first began with winning the right to vote. The suffrage movement laid the floorplan for women's movements for years to

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

We have considered vinal flooring but it really looks to cheap to install throughout the home. Hardwood floors is not practical because it would be to hard to keep looking nice with wheelchairs rolling on it constantly.

Can you tell us what other handicapped persons use in their homes? -- Mrs. T.P., Georgia

DEAR MRS. P .-- If carpet is to be used it should be wall to wall and of low pile. Much more strength is required to roll over carpet that is deep. plush, or of loose pile. If at all possible, you should eliminate the padding under the carpet.

The flat, smooth-surfaced, commercial carpet is the most suitable for home floor covering. It is not only easier to move around on, but is long lasting and easy to care



After receiving the agriculture award at the Eastland Chamber of Commerce banquet January 29. Leo Williams made an appropirate statement. The dairyman said everyone appreciates a word of encouragement, a pat on the back, and after milking 65 head of cows twice a day during the very disagreeable weather of January, this award could not have come at a more opportune time.

There are certain jobs that must go on even in cold winter days. And then there are some jobs that should only be done during winter months. One of these jobs is pruning of dormant shade trees. However, before you start whacking away at your favorite tree or shrub, make sure you have ajustifiable reason for pruning.

There are a number of reasons for pruning. First and f foremost is to maintain a strong framework for the futue development of the tree. Other reasons are to reduce the size or to keep the tree within specific bounds and to remove dead, diseased or weak growth as well as broken limbs and rubbing branches. Another reason for pruning is to improve the size and quality of flowers and fruit. A final reason is to balance the top growth with the root system at transplanting time.

Unless pruning can be justified for one of these reasons, it is better to place the shears and saw in the shed and obtain the desired exercise by spading the garden.

Some of the general principles that will apply when pruning shade trees include the removal of all dead or diseased wood, broken limbs and weak growth. Also, long unsightly branches should be shortened or removed as they offer t too much resistance to the wind and are frequently from legal process.

Recent research indicates that the use of tree wound paint on wounds is not essential. Woody plants have the ability to wall of the wounded area and will heal over just as effectively without the dressing. However, there is no harm in using a wound paint.

Use a saw or chisel to smooth broken stubs and torn bark to promote

While the homeowner can handle most pruning operations, it may be best to hire a professional arborist or tree surgeon if trees are large or need extensive

If the tree or shrub being pruned is diseased, it is important to dip pruning equipment in a disinfectant after cut to kill disease organisms so as to prevent their spread to other portions of the tree or even to other trees. A 10 percent household bleach s solution makes a satisfactory disinfectant. This can be prepared by mixing one part of bleach to nine parts of water.

The ethical conduct of our public officials has always been an issue of concern to the people whom they serve and rightfully so. An eighteenth century philosopher stated the issue well when he said that those who treat politics and ethics apart will never understand either one. Recent policitical scandals have proved this maxim true. Watergate, Koregate, and recently the troubles of several of my lolleagues, give evidence to the fact that it is not in the institutional interest of Congress for our legislators to make our laws and then, at the same time, violate them. Political corruption degrades the public perception of Congress and contributes greatly to government inefficiency and

The issue of remaining in a position of power in the House of Representatives, while at the same time beging implicated in unethical or illegal practices, has been a key item in the House Democratic Caucus, which has been meeting recently. The very fact that we are required to "legislate" ethics is a sad commentary, and particularly in a body such as the Congress, where it should be expected that our elected officials would maintain the highest possible integrity. While in the Caucus I have consistently supported proposed rules changes, within Constitutional limits, which would prohibit those convicted of crimes from serving in positions of leadership in the House. Stehnolm Selected To Serve On Subcommittee

Congressman Charles W. Stenholm was today selected to serve on the Investigations Subcommittee of the Post Office and Civil Service Committee in the House of Representatives. This Subcommittee has the responsibility for oversight of the civilian agencies of government.

One of Congressman Stenholm's primary interest is to assure greater productivity on the part of the Federal Government. In this connection, he plans to gear his work on this Subcommittee towards proposals designed to streamline Federal Departments and to make them more receptive to the citizens they are intended to

In line with this philisophy of greater Government efficiency, Stenholm has also introduced legislation, referred to as "sunset" legislation. This proposal would require, among other things, that most Federal programs be reviewed and reauthorized once every ten years. Those programs not receiving reauthroization,




