





# Hints for the Handicapped

DEAR PAT--We brought our son home from a rehabilitation center in the spring of

Our home is convenient for him to get his wheelchair around now but we had to build another bathroom. This addition was to his bedroom because it was not possible to enlarge our existing bathroom.

I have been reading your column since my son's accident and remember you have stated that one could receive tax deductions on some types of home improvements for those who are disabled. Does adding a full bath qualify for a tax deduction and should we count a number of other things we did to the house to make it more accessible?

they are made for the benefit
of a handicapped person they

may be deducted to the extent that their cost exceeds the amount of the property value would be increased. Thus, if a room cost \$1,000 to build and the property value would be increased \$700. then the deduction is \$300. If no increase in property value is realized, all of the expenditure is deductible; for example, if the doors in your home were widened to accommodate a wheelchair. and it did not change the property value, all of the cost

would be deductible.

Any other changes that you find necessary to accommodate your disability and/or allow you to move about freely is deductible.

Necessary changes in other areas of your home, and the expense incurred to provide safety and/or access to its facilities are deductible.

DEAR PAT--My doctor has put me on a diet. I receive a small monthly income and some of this special food is much higher than regular food. Because I have to have it, can it be taken off my income tax?

foods strictly prescribed by a
doctor for a person with
diabetes or other ailments
would be deductible (even if

a doctor prescribes one ounce of whiskey per day, it is a legitimate deduction.

DEAR PAT-I have installed special driving controls in my van along with an automatic lift. I love my new freedom this allows. I work at home so I wonder if the government will let me take this expense off of my income tax. Can I consider this a "necessary" expense?

DEAR MR. A.-The cost of any kind of special equipment or self-help devices required for your well-being are deductible. This includes such items as hand controls or other optional equipment that would allow safe operation of a vehicle; automatic transmission, power steering, and even the air conditioner if it is prescribed by a doctor.

Likewise, air conditioning or humidifiers installed in your home are deductibe is prescribed by your doctor and the utilities to operate these and other special medical devices are deductible.







# **Keeping Well**

Hypertension Hypertension (high blood pressure) is a very common disease that is very dangerous, because it is often not diagnosed until a serious complication develops. About five to eighteen percent of adults have hypertension. There are no definite symptoms of early high blood pressure. As the pressure elevation becomes more severe, symptoms of headache, dizziness, nosebleed may be

However, the symptoms usually develop after the hypertension becomes severe and are actually the symptoms of the complications of the disease. The complications of hypertension are strokes (cerebral hemorrhage or thrombosis). heart failure (due to enlargement of the heart), visual disturbances and occasionally blindness in one eye (due to hemorrhage or edema inside the eye), heart attacks (coronary occlusion), kidney

failure (uremia), and a condition called hypertensive encephalopathy.

This last complication is a rather dramatic attack consisting of sudden severe headache, mental confusion, vomiting, and sometimes convulsions. The blood pressure will be extremely high and the symptoms are caused by sudden swelling of the brain.

Since the complications of hypertension are so serious and since no early symptoms warn the patient of the condition, it must be diagnosed by routine blood examination. pressure Everyone should have a blood pressure test, because

treatment will usually control the elevation of blood pressure and postpone if not completely prevent the complications. Many patients refuse to get or continue treatment for hypertension, because they "feel so good". However, if treatment is delayed until symptoms are present, much damage will have already been done. Treatment must be started early in the course of the disease, and the blood pressure maintained at a satisfactory level to prevent



# Kent's Death Stuns ACU

Services Today for Star Fullback



ACU RUNNING BACK KELLY KENT ...dies of heart attack

Executive Sports Editor Shock of Kelly Kent's death settles into grim realization Thursday as funeral services are held for the Abilene Christian star running back.

He died Wednesday morning after an apparent heart attack and announcement of the bad news left ACU stunned with grief. He was one of the hest-liked scholar-athletes on campus, and teammates and classmates alike were left in tears.

I just don't think it has sunk in vet." said teammate James McCoy. 'You don't just up and lose somebody

After Athletic Director Wally Bullington informed the student body at morning chapel, Head Football Coach Ted Sitton called a squad meeting. Afterwards, as the Wildcats filed siently out of the locker room, there were few dry eyes. They had lost a teammate and a friend.

'It's going to take awhile for this to really hit us." said tackle Greg Feasel. Kent's roommate until Kelly mar-ried last summer. "He was a simple guy, just a country boy who never really got used to the city. He just enjoyed life as it came.

We're going to miss him more as a friend than as a teammate." Feasel said the grief expressed was

You know, when somebody dies everybody always says nice things about him, but in this case it's all true," he said. "I don't know anybody that didn't like Kelly Kent.

His coaches were numb, too. Somebody called Sitton in his office for a public statement. Struggling for control, the red-eyed coach said, "I don't think I'm in any shape to make one right now.

Bullington said, "This is a bad one. this is a bad one. Kent's hometown of Cisco felt the

mpact, too.

This is quite a blow to the whole school and community," said Cisco High Principal Jim Puryear, who coached the running back as a schoolboy standout. "This is the worst tragedy to hit our young people in fund.

Puryear wonders why it happened. Kent had no history of health trouble 'He never had any physical problems when he was in high school," he said. "Oh, Kelly would go all out, all right, but he never had any breathing

"I coached for 24 years and Kelly had the finest attitude of any athlete I ever had. He never gave less than full effort in anything - best athlete, stu-dent leader, valedictorian - you

Kent had what Sitton called "a good workout" Wednesday in ACU's offseason program and that night, played in an intramural basketball game. After the game, he complained of a rapidly-

Sitton said Kent's wife, Kerri, gave the athlete a ruhdown and he soon relaxed. She was later awakened, however, by his labored breathing. The 21-year-old running back apparently died shortly thereafter. He was rushed to Hendrick Medical Center where hour-long efforts to revive him were unsuccessful.

Kent made second-team academic all-America last season with a 3.42 average (4.0 scale) in accounting. He was twice academic all-Lone Star Conference.

On the field, he was three times named to the Reporter-News all-area team and his sophomore year year, he made second-team all-state. At ACU, he helped the Wildcats to the 1977 NAIA national title with a lateseason surge and last season earned second-team all-Lone Star Conference

Services will be at 2 p.m. Thursday in the Highland Church of Christ, officiated by Lynn Anderson, minister of Highland, and Bullington. Burial will be in Rising Star, directed by Elliott-Hamil Funeral Home, 542 Hickory.

Survivors include his wife, Kerri; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Hershel Kent of Cisco; and two brothers. Danny and Craig, both of Cisco.

e came up at the conclusion of Wilbert Montgomery's career when Abilene Christian fans were wondering what they would do in the absence of No. 28, who had rewritten the school record book.

Kent didn't let them wonder for long.

He wasn't

as fast as Wilbert, and he didn't have the spectacular moves, but when the results were counted at the conclusion of his first year as a starter, Kelly had broken Wilbert's single season school rushing record the one he set while scoring 37 touchdowns as a "knock your eyes" out freshman in 1973. No. Kelly

didn't score a touchdown the first time he touched the ball, as had Wilbert, and those who picked the all-star

...named game's Most Valuable Player teams didn't bother to take notice of his accomplishments. In-

deed, the coaches of the Lone Star Conference saw fit to leave Maybe he didn't deserve it. All Kelly did that year was rush for 1,184 yards, win the Most Valuable Player award in both the NAIA semifinal and ampionship game, and gain 643 yards while scoring six schooms in a memorable stretch drive to the NAIA national

mpionship. But then, maybe Kelly lacked flair.
He never did learn to do the watusi in the end zone to celebrate his touchdowns. Not once did you see him beat on his chest or shake his fist at an opponent.

He smiled a lot and always remembered to say "Yes sir," and "He sis," but it didn't seem to buy him many votes.
Mostly, Kelly just grabbed the football and ran north in a very aggressive manner. His moves were much more subtle than Wilbert's, but the longer he played, the more you realized what outstanding balance he had.

This past season he was hurt much of the year, enough to miss sectoral games. Only Kelly Kent didn't miss any.



## **New Food Stamp** Law Goes Into Effect March 1

A new Food Stamp law goes into effect March 1. 1979, that changes the way lost food stamp benefits can be restored. Households which have been wrongfully denied food stamp benefits or which have lost benefits because of Department of Human Resources' error, are entitled to be repaid for these benefits. Under the new law,

households no longer must be currently eligible or participating in the Food Stamp Program in order to receive these back beneifts. Households who have been unable to receive restored benefits under the old program because they are currently ineligible, from now through November 1, 1979, may request that these benefits be restored to them.
