CJC To Offer Eleven Community Service Courses

Cisco Junior College will offer eleven different **Community Service Courses** to people in the general area of Cisco during the current Spring semester. Community service courses are open to everyone, have no admission requirements, and are usually taken by people interested in the subject for pleasure of learning about it or how to do it. The courses are designed primarily for adults, but some are open to children. Each course will carry a small tuition fee to cover the basic costs of offering it.

Beginning the week of February 26, 1979, the Monday afternoon and evening classes are as follows: Art for Children-beginning and intermediate art for children ages 5-14; Adult Oil Painting--basic techniques f for beginning adults; and Photography --introduction to technical and creative camera and darkroom techniques.

Tuesday night offerings are Sculpture with Clayintroduction to threedimensional sculpture with clay; Basic Welding--Oxyacetylene and electrical

welding for adults; and Beginning Guitar--basic skills of guitar rhythms, chords, and music reading. Wednesday night classes include Exercise-Volleyball for women--fun and exercise for women age 20 and over; Intermediate Conversational Spanish--continuation of beginning Spanish class; and Spring Yard Care-what to do and what not to do during spring yard care.



Few In Such Total Control As Lewi two-story southern mansion,

Most people have some influence over their environment, but few are in such total control as 89 Yr. old Lewis Starr of Cisco. Meeting him causes a person to believe a bit stronger in heredity, and the power of the human mind. An artisan and lover of beauty, he surrounds himself with the things most important to him: flowers, good music, photographs of his lovely daughter, Hope, his grandaughters, paintings, and various things he

has created. While he does routine work in his home, or works at crafts, he likes to saturate the atmosphere with FM radio or recorded music-semiclassical, soft, classical singing melodies. Sometimes he drives out on errands, over to visit friends in Nursing Homes, or to the Presbyterian Church. He is noticed everywhere he goesa tall, striking man, with level brown eyes and a shock of white hair. He is using a cane now due to a recent touch of arthritis, but has excellent health otherwise. "I don't have a care in the world," He declares.

In 1920, in the middle of the Oil Boom, Lewis moved to Cisco to be in charge of the dealership for the Herrick Hardware Company. His sales territory included eight or ten surrounding counties. Each Monday morning he would start out in a Model T Ford, carrying a 35 lb. catalogue to area Hardware Stores. He traveled the bonejarring roads in all kinds of weather, returning on late Friday to his room in the Mobley Hotel.

"My room was on the west side of the building, right where I could look out on Main Street. There was nothing fancy about the Mobley in those days, just plain rooms with an iron bedstead, cheap quilts, and a gas heater. I don't remember even a fan in my room. We just hoped the weather wouldn't get too hot! The town was swarming with people. Sometimes men would be sleeping on cots out in the hall. A Mr. and Mrs. Drown managed the hotel, but owner Conrad Hilton came by occasionally, and I got acquainted with him. No matter how crowded things got, my room was always vacant and waiting for me." Mr. Starr remembers the

strangest thing that ever happened while he stayed at the Mobley. One morning "A cyclone hit town, and I looked out my room. I saw a bunch of billboards flattened out and a man being swept along by the wind, right to the back door. It seems he had started for the front door, but the wind turned him around!" Lewis became involved in

activities around Cisco, and married an attractive local girl in 1925. His wife, Lucille Bedford, was the daughter of Chief of Police Bedford, who was killed in the Santa Claus Bank Robbery in Dec. 1927. Lewis and Lucille's daughter Hope, was born in Cisco in 1927. She graduated from Cisco High School and Cisco Junior College, After World War II she married a farmer Airforce Pilot, Jack Higgins, who operated the Cisco Airport and a Flying school. The Higgins now live in Ft. Worth, where Jack owns a business. The couple have two daughters, Julia and Joy.

Lewis left the Hardware business to work for Cogdell Auto Supply in Cisco, and gave a lot of time to Civic projects. He was especially interested in seeing people enjoy life, and worked on various entertainments. In 1941 he decorated a downtown room called the "Teen Canteen"-a place where young people could meet and enjoy themselves with music, games, and snacks. Unfortunately the business building which housed the room was sold, and the young people lost a place for good recreation.

In 1947, for the Fourth of July celebration, Starr produced a Bathing Beauty Contest at "The World's largest Swimming Pool" at Lake Cisco. As a backgroud for the pageant, he created a







EOLIAN . . Honed By The Wind

Aeolus was the Latin God of wind. Eolian, the adjective, means born of; deposited by; produced by; or, managed by the wind.

Eolian, Texas, is a community between Breckenridge and Moran. It is somewhat northeast of Eureka. The church is still there. A Methodist church, anyway. Not the original church building and not exactly on the site of the tabernacle in the trees which housed many denominations, shaded many summer revivals and kept errant showers off the picnic tables in times gone by.

Some people live in the area. Some like the Comptons have lived there quite a spell. Charlie Compton is the son of the original Charley Compton who, along with his brother Henry, now dead, made cattle and farming pay a living under extreme weather conditions for many years. Uncertain weather! And capable, responsible Don Compton still lives in the area where he is now retired from his county commissioner's post to give his full attention to farming and ranching.

Some people are missing, moved away, died, and many family names are missing via the marriage route. Some of the original lands are yet in original family names: The Comptons, of course, and then there is the Chalker place north of the old townsite. John Chalker, a high scoring auto salesman when he was at it, looks after the old place, runs some good cows on it, but lives in Breckenridge. His family came to this area in 1886 and settled in Eolian shortly thereafter.


Gone is the Phillips family, forefathers of Jay Phillips, Breckenridge banker. The original Phillips nourished strong feelings about the causes behind the Civil war. He named his sons for Confederate generals until he sort of ran out of proper names, so that a grandson had to get along with the name "General."

It would take volumes to record the names of all who either lived in Eolian, or still live around these parts and have a fierce loyalty to the doughty little place. 
Prowling about north of the new county commissioner's place, Button Sikes', I came on the remains of a stone building. Quite an imposing remains at that: Well preserved foundation and partial walls that reflect sturdy construction and more than one room. A wooden shed at the back is typical, but then there is this stone furnace with a tapered chimney for holding in the heat. Certainly no ordinary smokehouse.

complex was once a furniture factory. Would you believe a Mequite-wood furniture factory!

According to Delbert Moore on North Breckenridge, and he was born a mile or so south of the old town, or lived there with his grandfather, then drove a school bus for quite some time in the district. a man named Loving, an ex-school teacher, undertook the business of using mesquite to build furniture. And why not? You ever notice the lovely grain in mesquite wood?

Later on, I called the Chalker household and was privileged to speak with Mrs. John Chalker—Leah McKelvain Chalker. She surprised me by telling me that her husband, John, worked in the subject factory. In fact, helped build it. (Also, Mrs. Chalker was kind enough to correct me about her family name. It is McKelvain, and I have woefully misspelled it in times past. The family belongs in the Eureka area where one lives across the road from Ola Mae Whitfield, and the other on that dirt road west of the pavement, and I believe, on Battle Creek.)

According to John Chalker the stone slabs used in building the Loving factory are in truth the concrete piers from the now defunct Parks Camp warehouse and office buildings. Well-cured these sixty years.

Chalker will tell you the construction methods used by him and Mr. Loving were anything but modern by today's standards: Three-part "Block & Tackle" rigging was used with improvised hooks similar to ice hooks, for raising the ponderous concrete blocks. John should know: One slipped from the hook and mashed his foot. Broke a bone in it, too.

The kiln? It was used to dry the mesquite wood which had to be cut green. It wanted drying to keep it from shrinking, so slabs in a tabletop would not open into wide cracks. Rocking chairs and other every-day items were the order of the day. Sad to relate, the dream failed because the furniture was just too heavy. Moore and Chalker both agree on this point.


Where is the furniture now? The Orbie Tomlins who live just beyond the Eolian church, once owned some chairs made by the Loving Furniture firm. "Seems to me they were rather heavy and came to pieces as time passed," said Mister Tomlin.

The late "Shorty" Thompson who owned and operated the Burch hotel for many years, is said to have bought some pieces of mesquite-wood furniture for the high-rise hostelry. As this goes to press, we have no knowledge of its whereabouts.

The original store which not only housed the post office but was the depot for collecting pure cream in five-gallon cans for shipping and processing to butter makers is no more. As one small boy used to go there with an uncle named Bob Presley, to deliver cream, that store was a virtual "John Wannamaker," a "Neiman-Marcus," was at least a mile long.

Meanwhile it is gone. Gone are the Phillips Walker Hounds and other like critters, but 'tis said if you listen with your heart you can still hear the sound of church bells in the throats of hounds, the music of clarion-like cowbells swinging at the throats of small, bluish Jerseys, their breaths sweet with the good smells of wild rye and other succulent grasses that ever abound along Big Sandy, Deep Creek, and the tail-end of Battle creek.


Next time you are out on that paved road past the Hart cemetery, keep going to Eolian. Drive up to the little church, on past Mr. Loving's dream. Listen with your heart. Maybe you will hear the handiwork of the batin God, Aeolus. Maybe you will come to be the batin of the batin the spirit of Eolian: Honed by the wind. stands along the road to the Eolian Methodist Church. Stop and take a look, next time you are out that way. [American Staff Photo]


