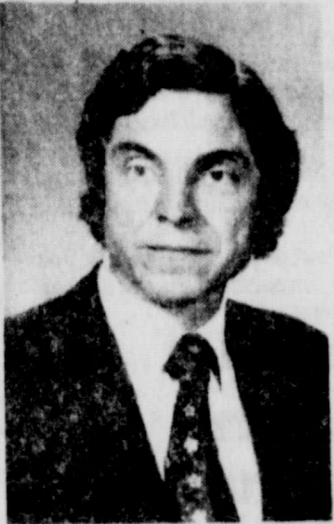

Four Persons Killed In Head On Collision Mon.

Four persons were killed in a head on collision at 5:30 p.m. Monday about five miles north of Cisco on U.S. Highway 183. The wreck scattered parts of the cars for 100 feet.

N.A. (Jack) Everett, 59, and his wife, Mary, 54, of Breckenridge, were killed instantly. Their five year old granddaughter, Mary Elaine Heidelberg, a passenger in their car, was rushed to E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital and was dead on arrival. George Timothy Brasher, 36, of Eastland, the driver of the other car, also was killed instantly. He was thrown about 20 feet from the car by the impact.

Brasher was southbound on Highway 183 while the Everetts were northbound. Brasher was apparently on his way to pick up his mother at Eastland Memorial Hospital where she worked, when the collision occurred. A witness, Michael Wayne Reed of Eastland, told investigating DPS officers that just before the wreck Brasher's car passed him traveling at a high rate of speed. Reed said when it

came to a curve in the road Brasher apparently could not control the car. Everett swerved to avoid the oncoming car, but failed, Reed said.

Both cars were demolished in the wreck. Witnesses said the crash sounded like an explosion, but no fire erupted. The Cisco Fire Department hosed down the highway to prevent a blaze.

Department of Public Safety officers Steve Foster, Leroy Polnick, Kenneth Rose and Gary Rudd investigated the accident.

Diane Heidelberg, the Everetts daughter and mother of the five year old girl, was driving to a night art class at Cisco Junior College with two other women when they came upon the wreck and discovered that her parents were dead and her daughter had been rushed to the hospital.

Funeral services for N.A. (Jack) Everett, 59, of Route 1, Breckenridge, were 3 p.m. Wednesday at the First Baptist Church in Cisco. Burial was in Putnam Cemetery, directed by Cisco Funeral Home.

He was born July 16, 1919, in Callahan County. He was a sales representative for McCullough Tool Company in Breckenridge. He was a football coach at Cisco Junior College 1946-47, and a former football coach at Cisco High School. He married Mary Alice Burnam of February 11, 1944, in Putnam. He was a Marine veteran of World War II and a member of the Baptist Church.

Survivors include his step-mother, Mrs. W.A. Everett of Putnam; two daughters, Elaine Richters of Forney and Diane Heidelberg of Breckenridge; three

brothers, Loren Everett of Putnam, Buel Everett of Big Spring and Bill Everett of Ackerly; four sisters, Angie Sandlin of Corpus Christi, Onie Harris of Brenham, Era Sutton of Cisco, and Veld Lee of Portales, N.M. and four grandchildren.

Funeral services for George Timothy Brasher, 36, of Eastland, were at 3 p.m. Wednesday at Arrington Funeral Home Chapel in Eastland. The Rev. Art Anderson of First United Methodist Church officiated. Burial was in Spring Cemetery.

He was born October 20, 1943, in Gorman. He was a barber in Breckenridge. He was a member of First United Methodist Church. He married Jane Lollar on July 23, 1972, in Abilene.

Cheese Fondue
Cheese is a nutritional food as it contains protein, fat and vitamins necessary to body requirements. Eggs and cheese have proven to be good for us so we're doing ourselves a favor to combine the two for a filling dish without the costly pieces of meat.

1 pound grated cheddar cheese
1 tablespoon flour
1 small bottle club soda
-yes - club soda
1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
Dash of tabasco
1 tablespoon butter
1/4 teaspoon dry mustard
1 egg yolk, beaten lightly
Cut French bread in hunks so that each will have some crust.

Combine shredded cheese with flour. Combine soda butter and seasonings in saucepan and simmer. Add cheese and flour mixture slowly while stirring constantly. Cook until all cheese melts and continue stirring until mixture thickens. Remove from heat and add a little cheese mixture to beaten egg yolk. Simmer for just a few seconds - not boil and stir constantly. Serve with the bread chunks by dipping them into your super cheese Fondue.

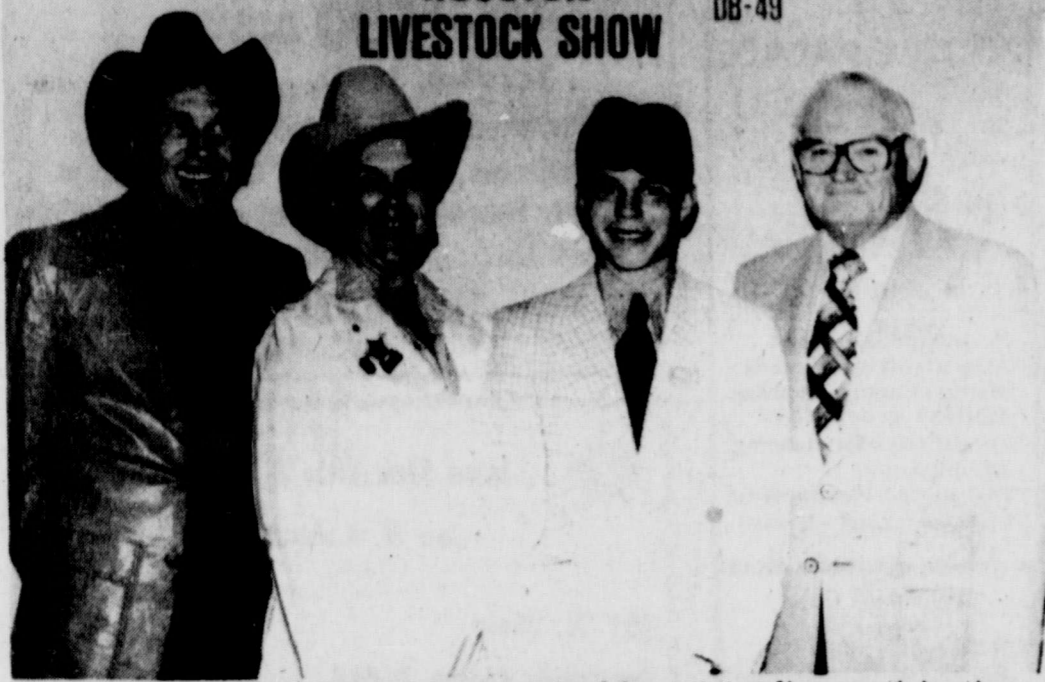

Cisco I.S.D. May Receive \$61,000 In New State Aid

AUSTIN-The Cisco Independent School District would receive \$61,000 in new state aid under the Foundation School Program if a bill sponsored by the Texas State Teachers Association is enacted in the current legislature.

Included in this new state aid would be a \$15,500 increase in equalization aid for the Cisco ISD. Generally, this aid is provided by the state to school districts whose wealth per student

is less than the statewide average.

In addition, the TSTA bill would allow the Cisco ISD to reduce its local fund assignment—the district's share of Foundation School Program costs—by \$14,400.

Sen. W.E. Snelson of Midland, author of the TSTA-sponsored bill (S.B. 525) has been granted a hearing on the measure at 5 p.m. Wednesday, March 7, before the Senate Education Committee. The public hearing will be held on the Senate floor.

Cost of the Snelson bill in new state spending would average an estimated \$722.5 million per year for each year of the next biennium, or some \$1.445 billion for the two-year period.

TSTA Exec. Secy. Callie W. Smith said the bill would provide a 25 percent increase for school maintenance and operation, 25 percent increase for school bus transportation, and a 40 percent increase for equalization aid.

Also included is a revised pay schedule which would raise the salaries of all Foundation Program personnel. The beginning pay for a bachelor's degree teacher would be increased from the present \$8,540 per year to \$10,000, and for a master's degree teacher from \$9,110 per year to \$10,630.

Smith cited the fact that Texas now ranks 33rd among the 50 states in estimated average teacher pay and said: "We feel that the salaries of all Texas school personnel should be increased to meet the rising cost of living and to encourage good teachers to enter and remain in the profession."



Kory Wallace Wins At Houston Calf Scramble

Kory Wallace, son of Dr. and Mrs. Norman Wallace, wrestled a calf over the finish line at the February 24 performance of the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo to earn a \$275 calf purchase certificate.

The certificate, donated by Navosota Livestock Auction Co., will enable him to purchase a beef or dairy heifer which he will feed and groom during the coming year under the direction of Gilbert Copeland, Cisco High School Ag teacher. At next year's Livestock Show he will return with his calf to compete in special show ring competition.

The rough and tumble calf scramble takes place at each of the 15 rodeo performances. Twelve calves and 24 youngsters are turned loose. Each contestant who manages to halt a calf and drag it across the finish line receives a purchase certificate donated by Houston area businesses and individuals.

While the viewing public sees only the scramble and judging events, the heart of the Calf Scramble program is the knowledge the scramble winner gain in the intervening year. Closely supervised by a Vocational Agricultural Teacher of County Extension Agent, each youth keeps accurate records and performs other obligations designed to underscore the responsibilities involved in raising a calf.

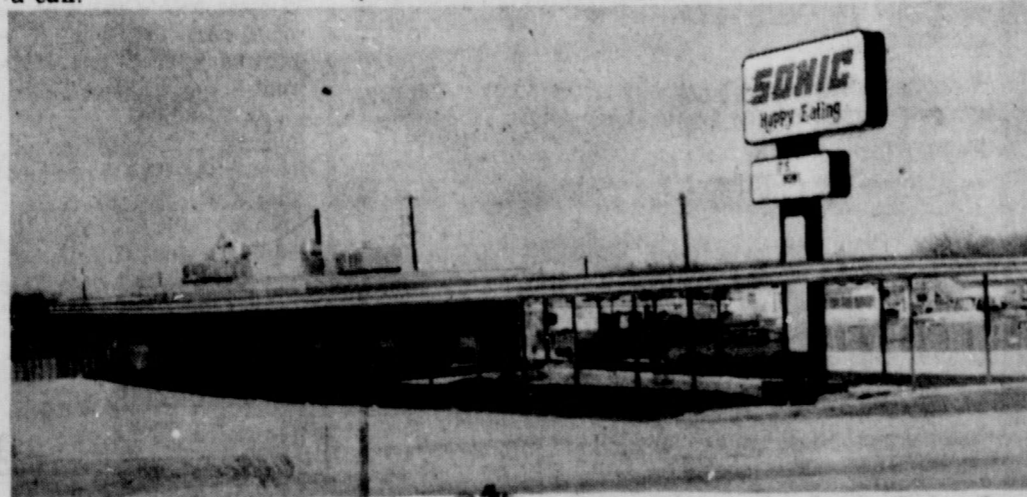

then habitual, then confirmed. Then the sinner is unclean, impenitent, and obstinate.

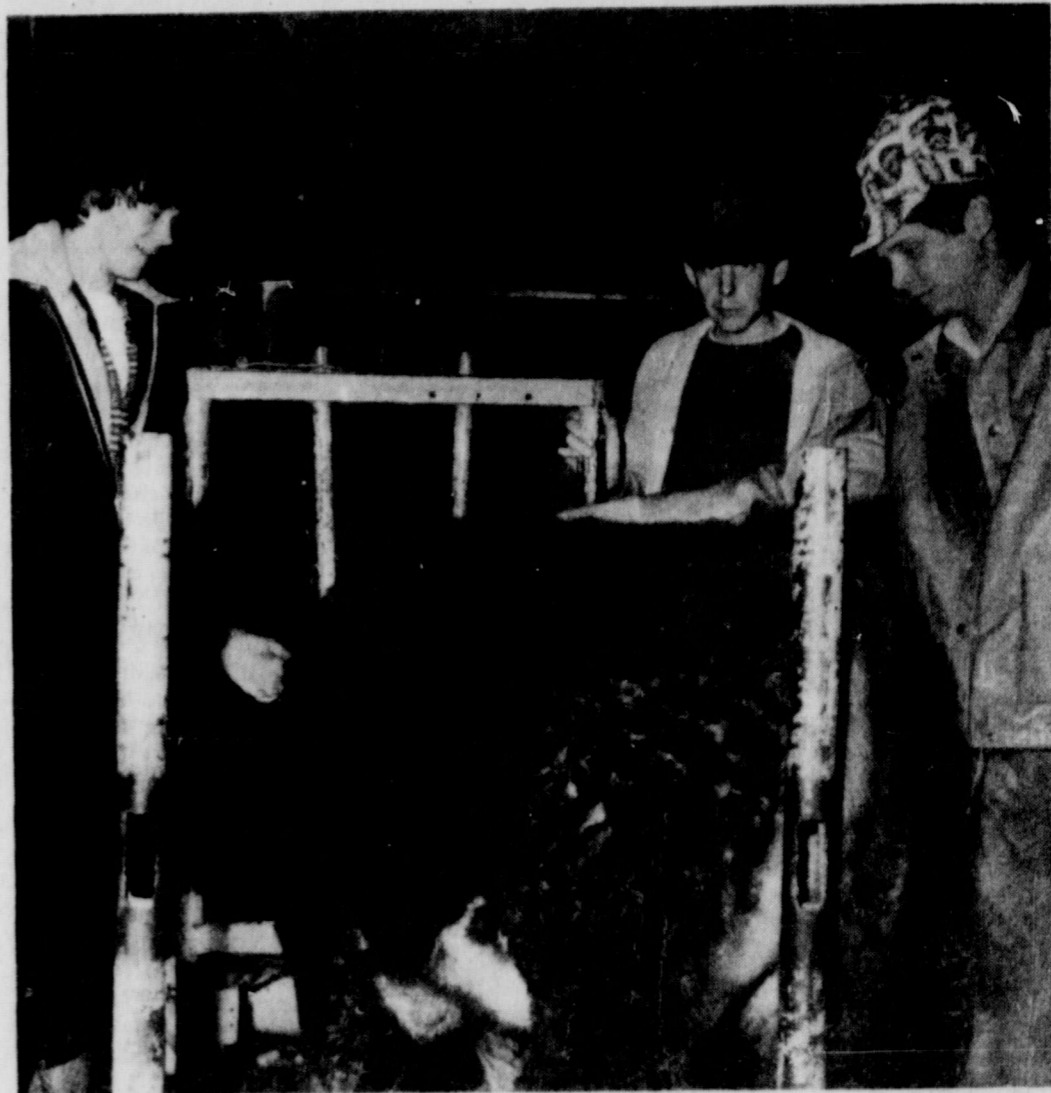
No person is compelled to sin. Only your consent makes it yours. It is no sin to be tempted. It is to yield and to become defiled and defeated.

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

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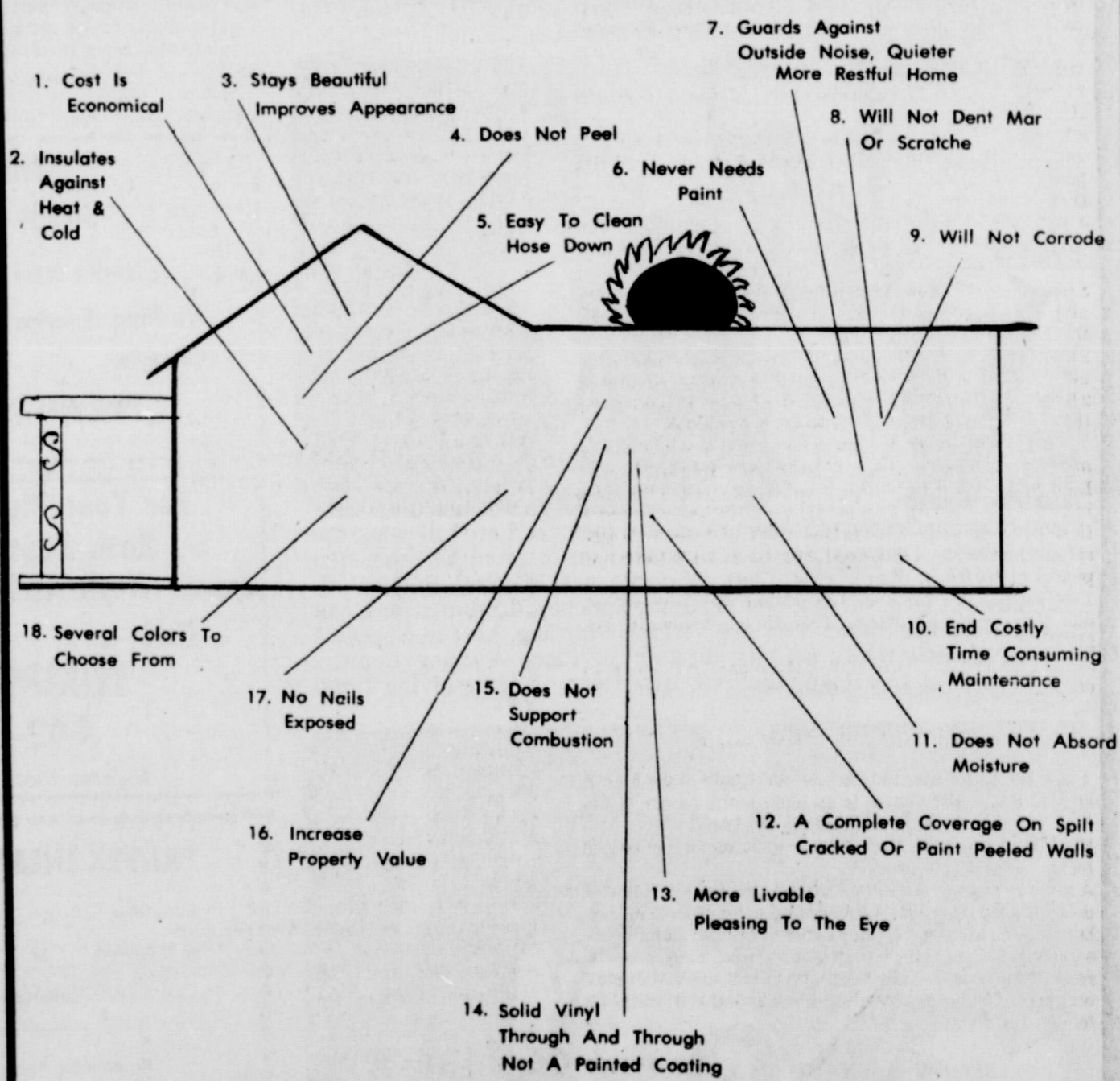


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Christian Festival

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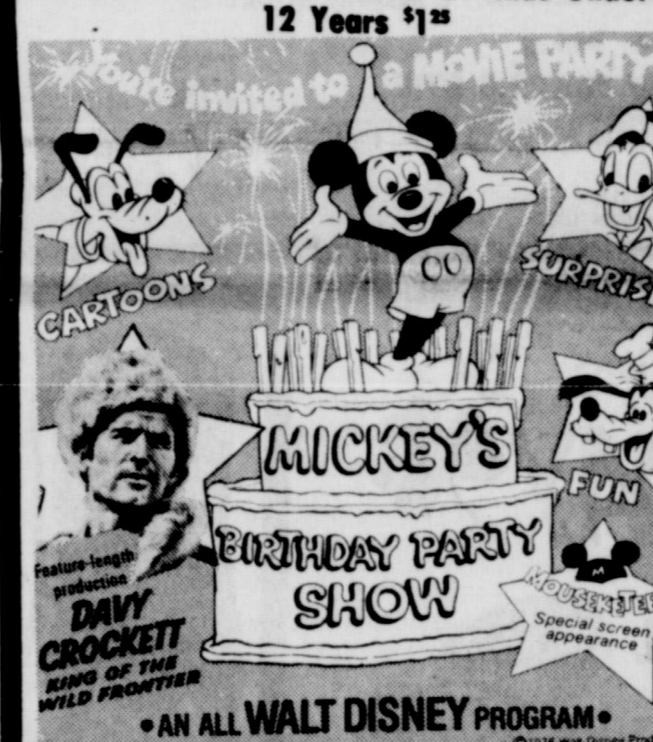
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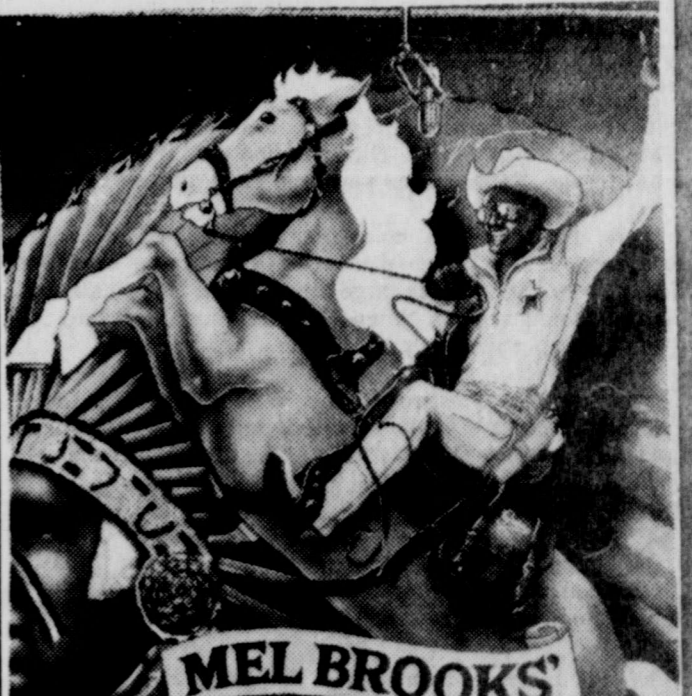
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Dee Brune To Be Guest Speaker At LBRC Directors Annual Meeting

Farmers & Ranchers Urged To Contact Legislators To Support H.B. 759

The president of the Eastland County Farm Bureau is urging local farmers and ranchers to contact their legislators in support of H.B. 759 in the Texas Legislature. Roy Johnson, President of the Eastland County Farm Bureau said the bill, introduced by Reps. Tim Von Dohlen of Goliad and Stan Schluter of Salado, would implement property tax relief for agricultural landowners. Johnson said that the local county Farm Bureau has contacted both Rep. Joe Hanna of Breckenridge and Senator Tom Creighton of Mineral Wells in support of the bill.

H.B. 759 has the support of the Texas Farm Bureau which was active in the Nov. 7 general election in which the Tax Relief Amendment was passed. The bill, which is enabling legislation for the amendment, would limit the property tax value of agricultural land. There are a number of versions of bills introduced to implement agricultural and tax relief; however, the local farm leader said H.B. 759 is "by far the most favorable" for farmers and ranchers.

Only H.B. 759 contains a provision which states that it is not the intention of the bill to increase the ad valorem tax value on open-space agricultural land. H.B. 759 provides that the taxing limit apply to all agricultural land; one version denies this type of limit on agricultural land in city limits. The local farm leader said that cities generally provide no services to farm land, and the expenses for police and fire protection, streets, etc., are not increased by farm land inside city limits.

H.B. 759 also provides for a capitalization rate of approximately 15 percent in computing tax value. The higher this rate, the lower the value. The income capitalization method is a mathematical formula whereby value is based on a set percent return applied to the annual net

income from the land. Only return from agricultural use of the land is considered, subtracting any expense for labor, including the owner's labor.

The capitalized value of the farm is found by applying an appropriate percent of return to this net income. The capitalization rate is selected to represent a fair return, considering the risk involved.

Since farming and ranching is an extremely risky business, Farm Bureau believes that a high capitalization rate is appropriate, the local Farm Bureau leader said. This is the reason Farm Bureau is back the 15 percent capitalization rate, he said.

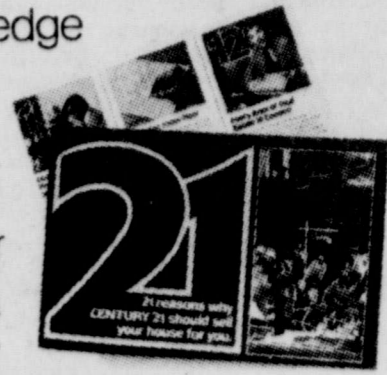

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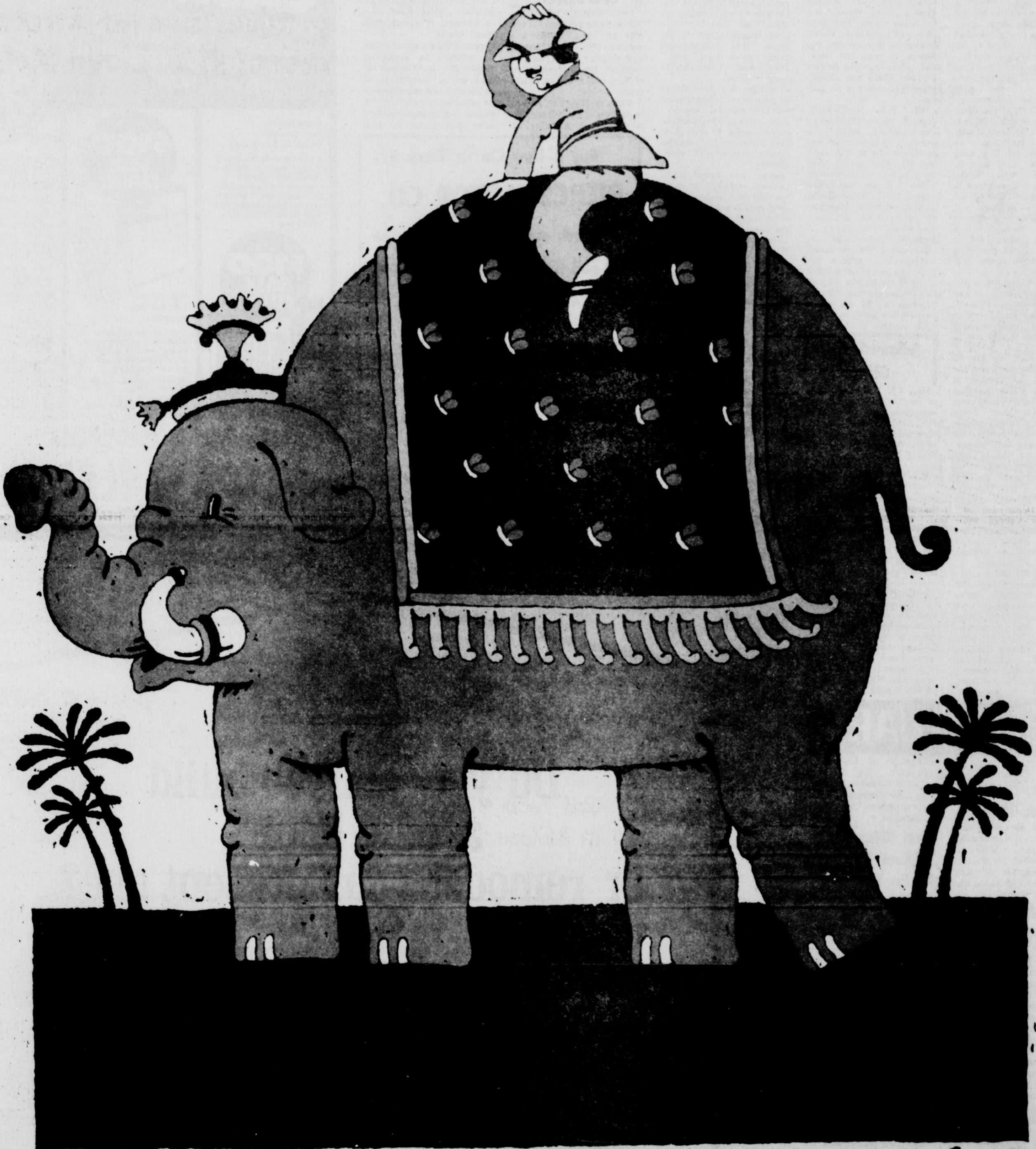
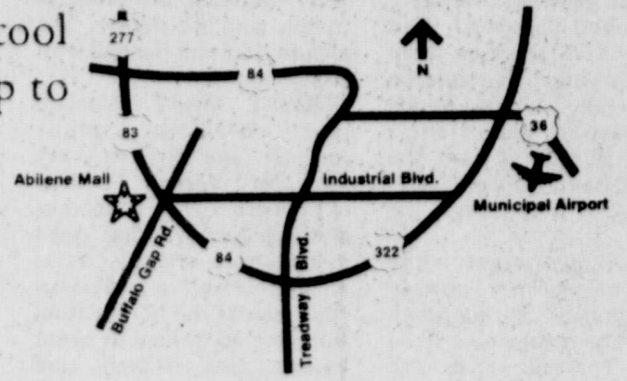

Frank Langston Buried in Dallas Services Monday
