## **Disaster Loan Deadline Extended**

WASHINGTON, D.C ... Congressman Charles W. Stenholm announces that the Small Business Administration has extended the deadline for submitting applications under the Disaster Loan Program. April 5, 1979, is the new deadline for Physical Disaster Loan applications. Farmers and ranchers who suffered financial hardship due to drought losses on 1978 crops may now file by the April 5 deadline. July 6 1979, has been set as the new deadline for Economic Disaster loans.

Congressman Stenholm has been working with the Administrator of the Small Business Administration on a daily basis in an effort to seek these extensions. Many farmers and ranchers in the area have faced difficulty in filing applications because of the fact that it has been impossible in many instances to harvest crops and obtain the necessary ASCS certification which must accompany an SBA application. The Congressman indicated his hope that this extension will prove helpful to individuals who have experienced losses and thereby qualify for this program.

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
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

# Congressional Comment

December 15, President scarter announced that he had decided to establish diplomatic relations with the People's P Republic of China and break our mutual defense treaty with Taiwan. In negotiatins with the communitsts the United States did not get a guarantee fromthem that they would not seek the reunification of China by military force. Despite this fact the State Department has tried to convince the American people and our allies that this new policy will not endanger the security of Taiwan.

Certainly is is very dif-

ficult to analyze the current intentions of the Chinese government, but we can learn fromhistory. In 1950, the then Secretary of State, Dean Acheson, made a speech before the National Press Club in Washington delineating the U.S. defense perimter for Asia leaving out South Korea. Several weeks later So8th Korea was invaded by communist forces aided by China. In that same year the Chinese ruhlessly put down a revolt in Tibet. In q954 the Reds invaded and captured several islands held by Taiwan. In 1958 the communists shelled the. islands of Quemoy and Natsu, which were ery close to Taiwan. They withdrew after the U.S. government threatened armed intervention. From 1959 to 1962 there were repeated border wars with India. During the Vietnam conflict the Chinese supplied North Vietnam with military supplies and some troops. Recently they have repeated border disputes with the Soviet Union and have set out on an invasion of Vietnam. While trying analyze the reasoning behind current Sino-American relations one questin repeatedly comes to

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naive? Certainly there are some well founded justifications for the recognition of China. Trade between our two contries would be of great benefit. China desires to buy agriculturalproducts an high technological equipment. They have great quantities of oil to cultural products and high technological equipment. They have great quantities of oil to sell. Also, improved Sino-American relations could further enhance the split in the communist world. The Chinese have been facing heavy Soviet military pressure since the Sino-Soviet border clashes of 1969. By the 70's they viewed the Soviet Union as China's major adversary and saw the United States as a source of useful leverage against the Soviet "threat" Thus it is the Chinese that most desperately need improved

relations, not the U.S.

Despite the positive reasons for the recognition of China, the long term repercussions of this policy could be disastrous. Our failure to get a guarantee that the communitsts will not invade Taiwan cold endanger the secruity of this long standing friend. Also. the credibility of the U.S. is damaged by our unilaterally withdrawing from the mutual defense treaty. How good are our promises if we do not honour our commitments? This perception endanger relationship with Western Europe, Israel, and other friedly nations. A former Congressman once said that American foreign policy seemed designed to make friends out of our enemies and enemies out of our friends. Clearly this is the case in our relations with communist China and

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
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# **Lone Star Supports** State Regulation

Lone Star Gas Co. has announced its support of pending legilsation before the Texas House and Senate to eliminate dual regulation of gas utilities within the state. The bill was introduced in the Senate by Sen. Bill Moore of Bryan (SB 243), and in the House by Rep. Jim Browder of Coldspring (HB 1290). It would shift regulation of gas utility rates for residentialcommercial customers from the incorporated cities to the three-member Texas Railroad Commission (TRC).

Lone Star President Carol Neaves said the company believes that streamlining the current regulatory process will reduce the rate case expenses which by law the customers ultimately pay for their monthly bills. Lone Star now serves 417 incorporated cities in Texas. Presently each of the 417 separate governments hears testimony on the utility's rate filings and in some cases hires private consultants to help in reaching a final decision. The hiring of experts also is a cost passed on to utility customers.

By initially placing the jurisdiction for rate-making in the hands of the TRC at

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elected body with a trained staff of utility rate analysts, the rising costs and regulatory lag time associated with the present dual system of regulation would be reduced. At the same time, it would strengthen consumer representation by brining all issues to focus on one case rather than scores of

separate cases. This process also would reduce the current disparity of rates among the communities served by Lone Star. Systemwide rate-making by one regulatory body would permit uniform cost of service among all customers

of a given class. Quality of service already is under the control of the TRC. If a gas utility is not meeting standards, any city may request TRC action.

Local regulation has long been an issue which some elected officials see as a burden, both in terms of time and political pressure. State regulation would assure their continuing voice in rate-setting through the public hearing process while transferring to the TRC and its staff the timely and equitable setting of residential. commercial customer rates.

# STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS

By Lyndell Williams TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

AUSTIN - After six weeks of complicated and exhausting deliberations over one of the most difficult tasks facing the 66th session of the Texas Legislature-implementation of the voter-mandated tax relief amendment-the 13 members of the committee voted unanimously to send their omnibus bill to the House floor for debate beginning next week.

The committee also sent along their recommendation that the bill be acted on favorably

Everyone appeared to get what they were looking for. Urban interests got intangibles-stocks, bonds, and bank accounts-knocked off the tax rolls, and corporations managed to convince the committee that their land, as well as the land of family farmers, needed to be taxed on its productivity, not its market value

Rep. Wayne Peveto of Orange said giving corporate-owned land "agricultural use" write-offs might destroy the tax base of 11 Texas counties.

Since the revenues of local school districts will be effected by any legislation implementing the tax relief amendment, approval of the bill is central to the pending arguments over how Texas will finance its public

The measure also exempts two automobiles or light trucks per family from the property tax rolls beginning in 1980. Homeowners will get a \$5,000 exemption and the elderly (over 65) and the disabled will get an added \$10,000 homestead exemption along with a "freeze" on their taxes.

Understandably, the measure also provides \$420.7 million for reimbursing school districts for revenues

that will be lost. Under the terms of the bill, a school district would be repaid "dollar-for-dollar" in 1979-80 for revenue lost but in 1980-81 a district would be penalized by 10-15 percent if its appraisal rates of property are below the state average.

### Globetrotter

When Gov. Bill Clements said earlier this week that Texans "didn't elect me to keep quiet," he should have also added. "or sit still."

Clements has already hopped to Mexico, skipped to Washington (twice) and now says he plans a trip to Russia as the head of a delegation to study food production. The trip will come later this year, whenever the governor finds time on his cramped schedule. Clements announced his

Russia trip on the heels of rumors that he might be going to China. "That trip has always been on the backburner," said one Clements' aide. But stories persisted. And confirmed reports that Clements' world-wide oil drilling firm, SEDCO, was negotiating along with Hunt Oil Co. for exploration rights off the coast of China, didn't help cool the headlines. Clements, seemingly irritated with all the talk about a China trip and possible conflicts of interest, finally told reporters: "I'm not going to China. I never said I

But reporters weren't the only ones howling at the governor this week. June L. Karp, president of the Texas Federation of Teachers, AFL-CIO, accused the governor of having a "plantation mentality" when it came to teachers and other educators in the public school system.

The harsh criticism came after a microscopic examination by Karp and associates of the governor's budget proposals by the Legislative Budget Board for education. The governor's budget eliminates the 5.1 percent pay increase for teachers suggested by the LBB. Those salary hikes amount to \$314 million. Clements got the rest of \$548 million reduction by increasing local school districts share of the Foundation School Program by \$189 million. The FSP provides basic educational needs such as salaries, maintenance and operations.

"We believe the governor's proposals are a slap in the face of our profession," Karp said, "and we wonder if the public education system of Texas is not being sacrificed.

The slap Karp refers to is of a political nature more than a calculated attempt on Clements part to undermine the educational system of the state. Teachers, for the most part, enthusiastically supported former Attor-

ney General John Hill in his unsuccessful gubernatorial race against Clements.

### **Primary Question**

What the 66th Legislature will do about a presidential primary bill becomes more interesting every day. The Senate State Affairs Committee approved by a narrow vote of 7-6 SB 602 by Sen. Jack Ogg of Houston that would split the presidential primary from regular party primaries. The bill was sent to the Senate floor

for debate where, surprisingly, 13 senators have already gone on record saying they oppose the bill. At this point, those 13 senators have enough votes to keep the bill from ever being considered, but after the first 60 days of the session it takes only a two-thirds vote to bring up bill. Now, it takes fourfifths. Numbers aside, two men who are used to getting their way support this bill. They are Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby (the presiding officer in the senate) and House Speaker Clayton.

COLLEGE STATION--Successful home peach plantings begin with selecting the right

'The right rootstock is one that is resistant to root knot nematodes and compatible

with the variety to be grown." points our Dr. Jerral Johnson, plant pathologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "This is just as important to the life of a peach tree as selecting the right insurance for your family needs. Root knot nematodes are a serious problem for homeowners raising either peaches or plums.

Root knot nematodes are microscopic "worm like" animals that live in the soil. However, once they begin to feed on plant roots, plant tissue forms a gall or swelling around the nematode. This gass is clearly visible to

normal uptake of nutrients from the soil to plant foliage which is essential to the continued health and development of the tree, explains

Texas homeowners should insist on a nematoderesistant peach rootstock such as Nemaguard for their home orchard. emphasizes the plant pathologist. "Such

a rootstock can be grown in an area infested with root knot nematodes, yet remains free from infestation."

Nemaguard gives excellent resistance to nematodes. says Johnson. Most Texas nurseries are currently budding their trees on Nemaguard rootstock, thus making them available to homeowners throughout Texas.

Recent rulings by the Environmental Protection

Agency have severely limited the use of chemicals previously recommended to control nematodes on peaches. Therefore, homeowners must depend on plant resistance for nematode con-

The alternative to using a nematode resistant rootstock such as Nemaguard would be to use a susceptible rootstock such as Elberta. When placed in nematode infested soils, it will soon become stunted and in many cases will die in two or three years.

"Most peach varieties are now available on Nemaguard rootstock, and this should be a major consideration for homeowners selecting trees." contends Johnson.

# Circus Costumes Beautiful But Complicated

A dazzling array of colors, textures, beads, spangles, sequins, and plumes adorn the 400 costumes used by the company of the great Carson & Barnes Five-Ring Wild Animal Circus which comes to Eastland County for performances at 5 and 8 p.m. on March 27, Tuesday, under sponsorship of Eastland Jay-

Carson & Barnes is the only tent show maintaining the tradition of a giant production number featuring all of the animals and personnel of the circus, this year saluting our neighbors to the south and entitled "The Glory of Old Mexico." Ten ladies of the circus wardrobe department spent all winter, including many weekends, completing the gorgeous costumes and animal robes which are used in the glittering spectacle, as well as in other circus displays.

Mrs. Isla Miller, wife of the circus owner, and their daughter, Barbara Byrd, designed each creation, then turned over production to the seamstresses. Mrs. Miller and Barbara step in

occasionally to handle delicate-looking metallic gold cloth or brilliant ostrich feather boas and headdresses which require years of experience for proper managing. The measurements of the

performers had been secured in advance in most cases, so that tailoring and sewing could proceed immediately. The procedure is the same in each case. A pattern derived from the original sketch is draped and cut in muslin, then laid flat and traced onto paper. A special electric sewing needle is used to perforate holes through the paper, then a chemical solution is wiped across, leaving dots on the fabric for the cutters to follow. The colorful embroidery designs are first done in pencil on tracing paper, then transferred to the fabric using magic markers. Each area is colorcoded so the embroiderers and beadworkers will know just what goes where -- like painting with numbers.

'It takes quality fabrics and sewing, because the costumes must stand up to

more than eight months of extraordinary use." says Mrs. Miller. "They all have to be durable and allow for complete flexibility of body movement while withstanding all the packing and unpacking that goes on.

'Actually, animals are easier to dress than people. The only problem is that camels love to chew the tassels on their blankets, and elephants have an inquiring mind which leads them to tug at their covers with their trunks.

"Adjustments and repairs must be made during the circus tours. People and animals both grow and shrink, and there is occasional tailoring required because of personnel changes.

The owner's wife has other duties to perform in the office, ticket wagon, or wherever needed, including baby-sitting with her two young granddaughters who still think the whole circus was created just for their personal entertainment.
