Eastland County Art Show Outstanding

Judges of former Eastland County Art Association shows have always commented that we have one of the outstanding shows in this area and Eastland people will surely agree that it gets bigger and better each year.

February, 1974 24 charter members and the first show was held at the annex of the First Christian Church in May of that year with a total of 85 entries. The struggling group made the props from second hand lumber and chicken wire and Mrs. Artie Liles received a concussion when a piece of lumber fell on her head. First place winners

in the limited number of divisions were Mrs. Jo Hubbard of Rising Star, Mrs. Frank Sayre, Eastland; Mrs. Nell McConnell, Stephenville; and Lesa Thomas won in the children's division.

The second show was held in the Lodge Bldg. on North Lamar St. and then moved to the basement of the First United Methodist Church where it has been held the last four years. There were 200 entries in 1976 and last year there were 289. Many were entered by very well known area artists from as far away as Midland, Snyder, Fort Worth, Mineral Wells, Weatherford, Comanche, Brownwood, and many other nearby towns.

This year the show will have more adequate space and props. This has been made possible through the continued support of the merchants through the years - beginning with the very first show when they paid all of the expenses, including \$100.00 for three judges.

This year, as in previous years, the Chamber of Commerce will furnish ribbon awards; Texas Electric Service Company will present the People's Choice Award; \$50.00 Eastland National Bank the Best-of-Show Award; \$50.00 H&R Lumber the First Place Award of \$20.00. For the first time Morren's Gift & Crafts Shop will present the second Place Award of \$15.00 and Liles Frame Shop the Third Place Award of \$10.00.

The public is invited to view the show at the Siebert Elementary School auditorium Friday and Saturday, March 23, 24 from 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. and to be present for the presentation of awards at 5:00 p.m. on Friday. Every visitor will be asked to vote for "People's Choice" on Friday.

All entries in the show must be registered Thursday, March 22 from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Fees will be \$1.00 for adults and .50 for children (for each painting).

Red Gap Western Wear Robbed Mid-Day Friday

Local police officers were looking Friday afternoon for a white male responsible for a mid-day robbery of Red Gap Western Wear located along Interstate 20 East in Cisco. Somewhere in the neighborhood of 5500 was reported taken in the hold-up.

Cisco Police Chief C.H. (Cats) Ingram reported that one person entered the store around 12:30 p.m. and proceeded to tie-up store owner, Mrs. Tommie

(Barbara) Pope, with a rope from the store. He left Mrs. Pope, unharmed, in a back room of the store. The robber shut the door and went back into the main part of the building.

Chief Ingram said Mrs. Pope then heard two people talking, but does not know whether there were two people involved in the robbery, or if a customer came into the store. He stated Mrs. Pope was "pretty shaken up" about

the robbery, but believes she heard the robber asking someone else if they found a hat they wanted.

Police believe someone may have possibly come into the store and surprised the robber who then pretended to be employed there and tried to sell them a hat.

Police request that if anyone entered Red Gap Western Wear between 12:30 and 12:45 p.m., Friday, March 16, and believe they may have talked to the robber, please get in contact with the local police department. He was described as a white male, about 6 feet tall, slender, in his early 20's, with a handlebar mustache, shoulder-length dirty hair and gold rimmed glasses.

The blue-jean clad man, who was armed with a 22-caliber revolver, is believed to have possibly made his get-away in a white or silver van.

Mrs. Pope managed to free herself, after the man left, and called the police.

Residential Homestead Exemptions To Be Available Until April First

The Cisco Independent School District would like to remind local property owners that they will have until April 1st to file for their homestead

exemptions. If you rendered your property before January 8, 1979, you should check with the tax office to see if you were granted the homestead exemption as they had just gone into effect at that time. There is no age qualification for this exemption, if you lived in a residence located within the Cisco Independent School District on January 1st, 1979, you are eligible and could save as much as \$46.54 on your 1979 taxes.

The tax office would like to remind all property owners that April 1st, 1979 is the deadline for rendering your property. The law requires that all property be rendered each year by April 1st. If property is not rendered by that time, it is placed on the unrendered tax roll, and has a value assessed by the tax assessor. If you have any questions about the homestead exemption or the rendition of your property, please contact the tax office before April 1st, 1979. The tax office is located at 610 Ave. D.

Do It Now

Apply for an educational assistance grant
Do you need financial assistance to attend or continue attending an educational institution?

The U.S. Office of Education supports two grant programs. Money received by students under these programs are gifts and are not to be repaid.

Eligibility for these grants include being enrolled or accepted for enrollment in an approved postsecondary educational institution, college, university, technical school, or hospital school of nursing, and being a citizen or permanent resident of the United States.

The **BASIC EDUCATIONAL OPPORTUNITY GRANT PROGRAM** makes funds available to eligible students attending approved colleges, community junior colleges, vocational school, technical institutes, hospital schools of nursing, and other post-high school institutions.

To apply for a basic grant, a form called "Application for determination of basic grant eligibility" must be completed.

Students may obtain copies of the application from post-secondary educational institutions, high schools, and public libraries, or by writing to P.O. Box 84, Washington, D.C. 20044.

The **SUPPLEMENTAL EDUCATIONAL OPPORTUNITY GRANT [SEOG] PROGRAM** is for students of

exceptional financial need who without the grant would be unable to continue their education.

One is eligible to apply if he is enrolled at least half-time as an undergraduate or vocational student in an educational institution participating in the program. Graduate students are not eligible.

If a student receives an SEOG, it cannot be less than \$200 or more than \$1,500 a year. Normally, an SEOG may be received for up to four years. However, the grant may be received for five years when the course of study requires the extra time. The total that may be awarded is \$4,000 for a four year course of study or \$5,000 for a five year course.

The educational institution must provide the selected students with additional financial assistance at least equal to the amount of the grant.

Apply through the financial aid officer of any participating institution. He is responsible for determining who will receive an SEOG and the amount.

There are many more sources of aid for students. Some are sponsored by the federal government, others by states, localities, businesses, organization, individuals, associations, and other private sources. To find out what they are, get in touch with the financial aid officer at your school.

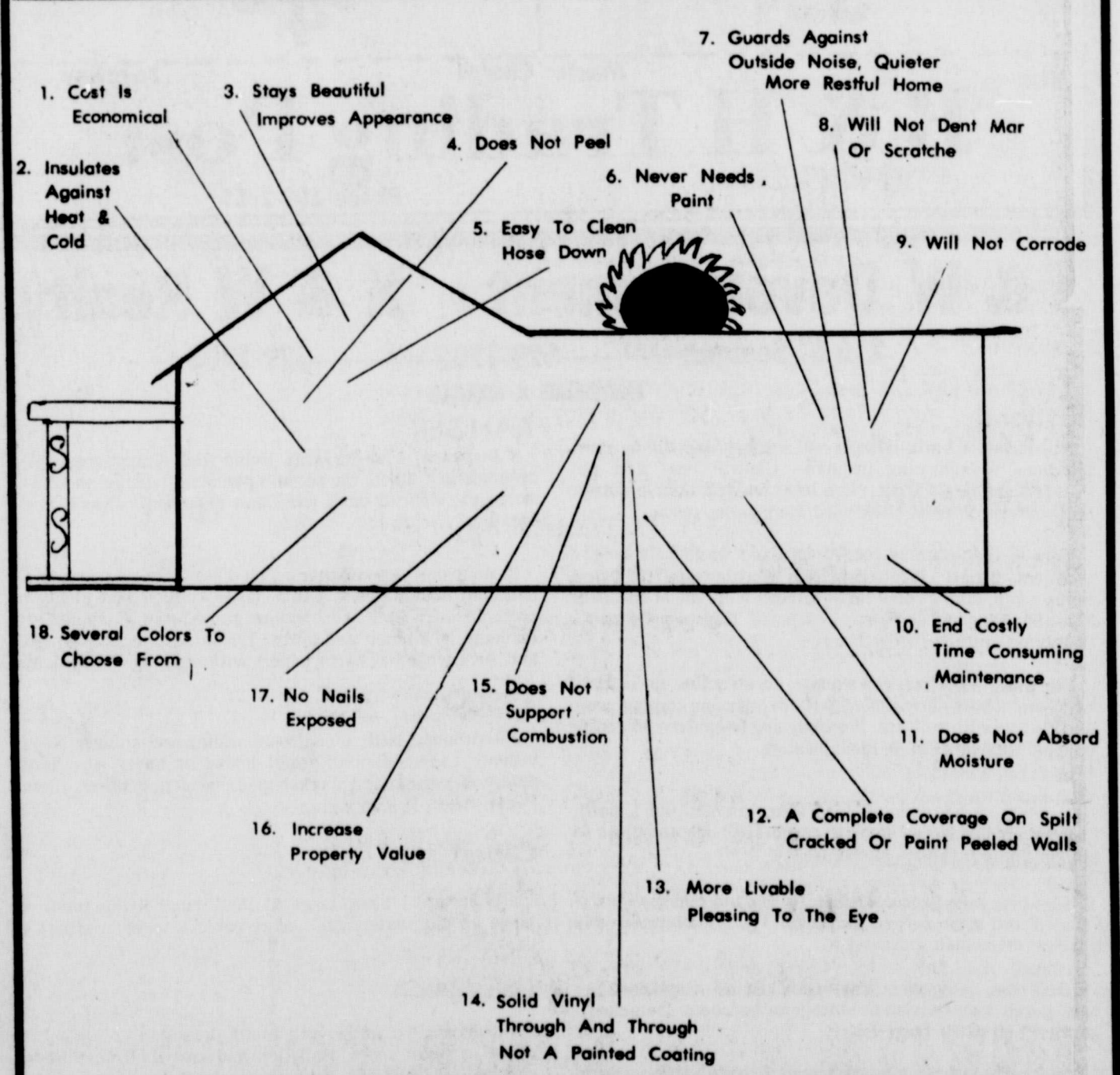

GORDON SPOT

by DeMarquis Gordon

The warm spring weather has many of the fruit trees blooming. We have had many calls requesting infor-

mation on the control of the little white worms that get in fruit.

It will soon be time to start spraying for this insect, the plum culicid as well as brown rot disease, the culicid is the little white worm sometimes found around the seed when peaches and plums are harvested.

When 75 percent of the petals have fallen spray with 50 percent Malathion plus a fungicide. The fungicide Captan, Benomyl (Benlate), or wettable sulfur should be added for disease control. Mix six tablespoons of 50 percent Malathion in three gallons of water. You may add seven tablespoons of wettable sulfur in the same solution. In place of sulfur you may use 1 1/2 (one and one half) tablespoons of Benomyl or four tablespoons of Captan.

Repeat this spray every 10 to 14 days until you have sprayed five times. Do not apply insecticides with three days of harvesting peaches.

herbicide must be used at specific rates and at a critical time to be effective for killing weeds.

While fertilizer should be applied at the recommended rate, there is usually little harm if the homeowner fails to calibrate his distributor correctly and makes a slightly heavier application. If herbicides are contained in the mixture, this error can be very damaging to the desirable vegetation. Another difficulty which frequently arises is the part of a sack of the mixture left over after the lawn has been fertilized. Frequently this is left in the garage or tool shed until fertilizer is needed for a flower garden or rose bed. The fact that the fertilizer contains a herbicide is forgotten, and irreparable damage is done to a favorite beauty spot in the garden.

Many of the more popular landscape trees including oaks, mulberry, sycamore, and others are highly susceptible to weed killers. When contemplating the use of a herbicide or herbicide and fertilizer mixture, always read all of the precautions given on the label. The information contained on the label was developed through expensive research and the manufacturer provides this information for your protection.

Remember weeds in a lawn are usually an indication of

poor management practices. Through proper fertilization, correct mowing practices, adequate moisture, and good soil drainage, the grass will be vigorous enough to crowd out the weeds.

Gorman Wins At County Livestock Show

No one seemed to mind the rain at the annual Eastland County Livestock Show -- and the show is better than dust.

There were eight champion and reserve champion market hogs at the Eastland County Livestock Show Friday among 144 top-quality hogs shown from Ranger, Cisco, Eastland, Nimrod, Carbon, Rising Star, and Gorman areas...all eight were either Gorman 4-H or Gorman FFA hogs.

And, among all eight champions or reserve champions from Gorman, 10 year-old Glenn Burgess walked away with the banner for overall grand champion market hog.

Burgess, a Gorman 4-H'er, showed a heavyweight Duroc, a gilt which pressed the scales at 255 pounds, yet was lean and clean throughout.

Show judge Garth Priddy of De Leon, a high-recognized swine judge, said the hog had not only the stretch and length for which he was looking, but also had "adequate cover over the back" which Priddy says he considers a must.

The fourth grader said he fed his pig a Hi-Pro pig starter, and then followed through with Hi-Pro pig finisher.

Don Richburg of Roscoe was the breeder of the grand champion market hog.

Glenn is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Durwood Burgess of Gorman. His grand champion had also earlier been named the champion of the Duroc and predominantly Red hog classes.

Clara Little, 11, a Gorman 4-H'er, showed a crossbred heavyweight with a Chester White-Hampshire hog for reserve overall grand champion market hog. It was a 245-pound gilt. Charla, a 6th grader, is in her second year to show hogs and is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Little of Gorman.

Her hog had also been the champion of the predominantly White hog classes. Andy Kinser, a Gorman FFA'er, showed the reserve champion hog of those classes with a heavyweight.

Steve Watson, a Gorman FFA'er, showed the reserve champion of the Durocs and predominantly red class judging. It was a heavyweight which stood second in the tough class which yielded this year's overall grand champion shown by Burgess.

Jeff Ripley, Gorman 4-H'er, showed a heavyweight Hampshire as the champion of the Hampshire and predominantly Black hog classes. Danny Burgess, a Gorman FFA'er and Glenn's big brother, showed the reserve champion of those classes, also a heavyweight.

Caye Little, 15, a Gorman 4-H'er, had a big day in both the goat and market lamb competition.

Caye showed the champion Angora doe with a 9-year-old doe. Despite its age, sheep, goat, and market lamb judge A.R. Whisenhunt, superintendent of schools at Mullin, said the doe was smooth-mouthed, and had the best mohair cover of the does. Eastland 4-H'er Cody Wells showed the reserve Angora doe.

Wells, 10, also showed the reserve grand champion Angora buck.

The grand champion Angora buck was shown by Scott Anderson, a Nimrod

4-H'er.

Caye came back in the late night market lamb judging before a capacity crowd of more than 1,000 Eastland County folks to exhibit the champion fine wool lamb.

The youth supporters paid no attention to the rain and cold and hundreds of hamburgers were cooked every hour.

In breeding sheep judging, Tommy Donham, 15, a Cisco FFA'er, showed the champion fine wool ewe with a Columbia-Corriedale cross-bred. The son of Mr. and Mrs. W.T. Donham of Cisco, also showed the reserve champion fine wool ewe.

Scott Carson, a fellow Cisco FFA'er, showed the champion fine wool ram.

Bryan Flemming, a Nimrod 4-H'er, had both the champion medium wool ewe and reserve champion medium wool ewe with four-tooth and two-tooth ewes, respectively.

Carl Ford of Abilene judged the rabbits.

DEAR PAT--Not too long ago I was told that I am a diabetic. I have not felt bad during this last year and had no idea that I could be a diabetic.
 If I do have diabetes, I would like to know more about it. Can you tell me where I can get information and some facts.
 I thought people who have diabetes had to have daily shots of insulin. My doctor

said this would not be necessary so this is why I question his diagnosis.
 --Mrs. J.C.B., Louisiana
 DEAR MRS. B.--It is not unusual for you to be unaware of having diabetes. Many times diabetes is found during routine examinations or while being treated for another illness.
 Most people are also unaware of the seriousness of the disease, its warning

signs and the dramatic increase in new cases.
 Diabetes is a major health problem for millions of people around the world and at least 10 million live in the United States.
 There are two forms of diabetes: Insulin-Dependent Diabetes (juvenile-onset) is characterized by the sudden appearance of Constant urination, abnormal thirst, unusual hunger, rapid loss of weight, irritability, weakness or fatigue, nausea.
 Non Insulin-dependent diabetes (maturity-onset) may include any of the signs of insulin-dependent diabetes or: drowsiness, itching, family history of diabetes, blurred vision, excessive weight, tingling, numbness or pain in the extremities, skin infections and slow healing of cuts (especially on the feet).
 For more information on diabetes, check your telephone book for local listings on Diabetes. They can acquaint you with monthly education meetings, in-hospital orientation programs, office consultation, seminars and 24-hour "hot-lines". A variety of informative materials, including a basic question-and-answer factbook, exchange lists for meal planning, and pamphlets, are made available to diabetics through local

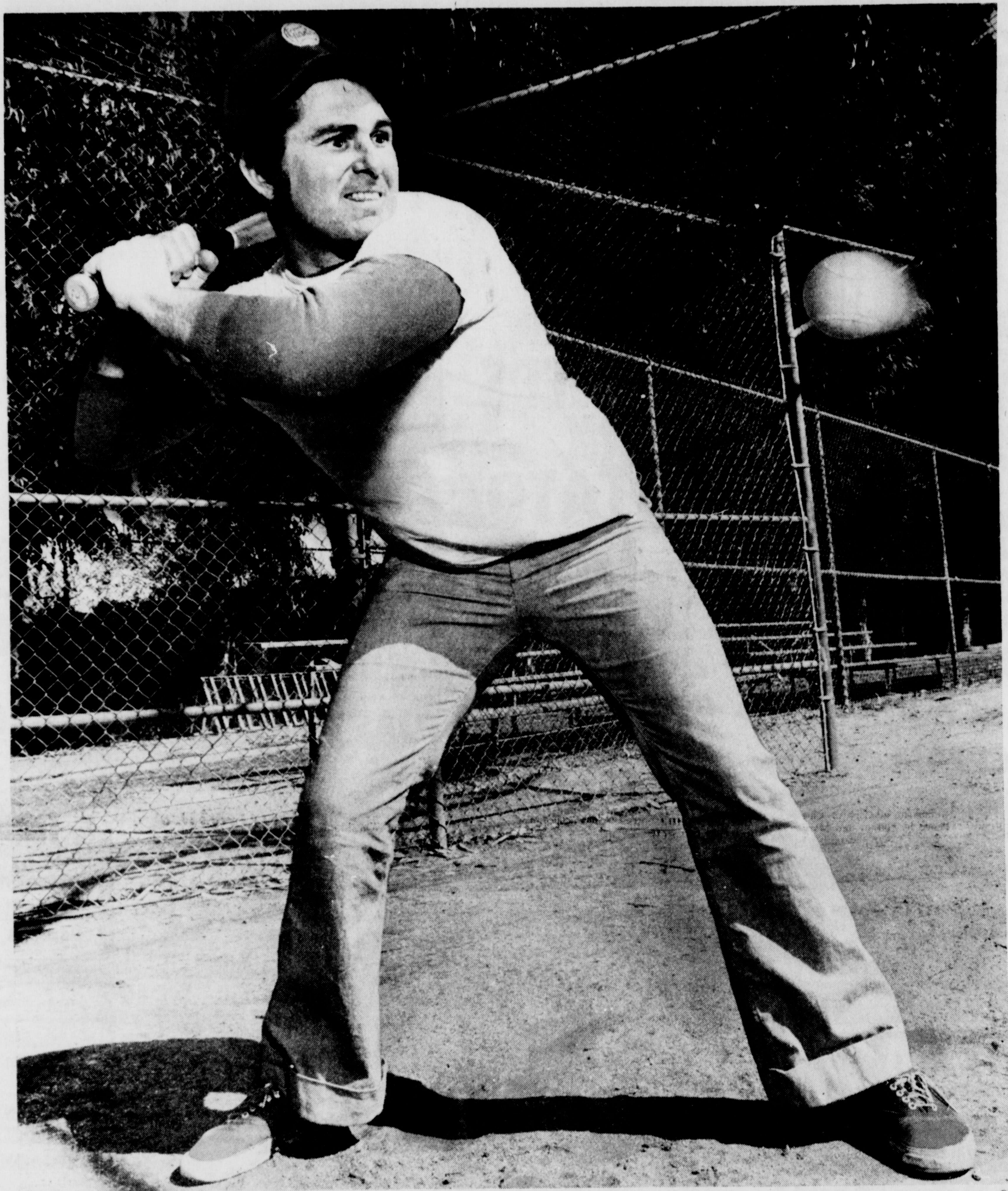

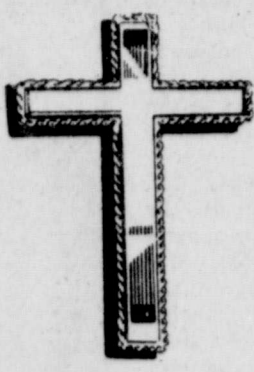
