## Wisteria Beginning To Bloom

An annual event guaranteed to lift the winter-dampened spirits of anyone has just begun to happen—the blooming of wisteria. Few flowering plants are as beautiful, fragrant, and indigic to spring fever as the wisteria, a woody climbing vine that bears long purple, blue, or white pealike flowers resembling branches of grapes.

When wisteria blooms, it is almost a solid mass of delicate color, since not many leaves are in evidence yet. In this area, it always blooms in late March or early April for several weeks.

In Cisco there are several large wisteria vines in bloom. At 1212 Park Drive, one covers the top of a large wooden fence-trellis surrounding the front yard. Two tree-like vines are grown near each other and join overhead at 508 W. 7th Street. And at 122 Ave. D., one climbs into a nearby tree. Two others that need admiring are at 707 Bullard and 808 Front.

Of Chinese origin, the most common varieties are w. flouribunda, which bears long flower clusters of white, purple, or bluish-purple, and w. sinensis, bearing mauve or white blossoms sometimes reaching a foot in length.

A hardy, long-living plant, wisteria can be used to cover large areas, as it grows in

quite a rampant manner. It can also be kept tree-like by regular pinching back.

Many wisteria vines bloom yearly without any attention, but to most, pruning plays an important role in the blooming process. The best blooms are produced if the plant is trimmed to develop one or two main stems. Each main stem will have many side shoots, which should be spaced about a foot apart. The side shoots should be pruned during early summer to about seven leaves. In late winter, these shortened shoots should be trimmed back to length of two to four inches. In early spring, flower clusters will grow from near the bases of the cut-back shoots.

If this pruning fails to produce blooms, and indeed, some wisteria sits for years refusing to bloom, a last-ditch effort is root pruning. In late summer, a circular trench should be dug three feet from the base of the plant, two feet deep. Cut any roots that extend into the trench, and then fill in the trench, packing the soil well. Blooms should appear the next year.

# Congressional Comment

WASHINGTON, D.C.—Congressman Charles W. Stenholm announced today that there is a shortage of diesel fuel that is developing into a major crisis for all businesses dependent of diesel fuel. This has come to my attention in the past week as a result of calls from fuel distributors, marketers, truckers and farmers. The investigation of my staff in trying to assist in the severe shortage has shown that the northern and western parts of the nation are experiencing almost complete loss of diesel fuel. This comes at a time when farmers are attempting to prepare their land for the 1979 crop; therefore, any delay in securing supplies will be particularly critical to the economy of our nation. Con-

gressman Stenholm's office has received numerous calls from distributors who have been unable to secure diesel to meet present needs. We have attempted to secure additional supplies, but have had limited success. In all cases, new supplies that are incoming are going to be more costly, but even more money may not be sufficient to guarantee delivery. One dealer indicated he had not received diesel in over three weeks, and his wholesaler could not promise a future delivery to him or the other 2300 customers that the services in the farm communities. Also, our inquiries have revealed that suppliers holding 50,000 gallons of diesel only three days ago have now sold these supplies to speculators. Thus, these supplies have been

withdrawn from the available market.

The Congressman attributes the crisis to several factors. 1) We have the highest demand and declining supply rate in the history of our nation. One year ago we had 152 million gallons of diesel available. Today, we have only 119 million gallons, (5 million less than a week ago). 2) There is more refinery down time than normal due to recent fires and other physical problems. 3) We have experienced a lengthy cold winter which has caused large amounts of diesel stocks to be shipped to the Northeast region of the country. It will take 20 to 25 days to reverse this process. 4) The Iranian shortfall hurt the independent refiners who are unable to replace the missing Iranian crude with high-priced crude from other sources found on the nervous spot market. 5) Brokers are purchasing large amounts of diesel fuel and transporting to storage in anticipation of reselling at 60-70 cents per gallon after April 1.

The Congressman attributes much of the crisis to the overregulation of the petroleum industry by the Department of Energy and other agencies as is evidenced by the stopping of the Sohio pipeline last week.

These agencies fail to take into account thru lack of knowledge the special timeliness of diesel usage during peak farming periods. Stenholm further notes that proliferation of a multitude of regulations from the Department of Energy are continually being revised and changed to the point that the refiners and distributors can scarcely know what is proper procedure. It has caused the oil industry to spend millions of dollars in trying to comply with the regulations; monies that could have been used to build refineries.

In fact, there is not even a consensus of opinion within the Department of Energy regarding the interpretation of their own regulations, concluded Stenholm.

# The Lobo Howl

## From Red Gap to Cisco

### FROM RED GAP TO CISCO

The history of the creation of Red Gap, Texas and its transition into Cisco because of the railroad is an interesting and intriguing topic. In 1879, when there were not more than six families in this locality, Reverend Cornelius Gigger Stevens, a Baptist preacher, established a postoffice at a passway in the hills, one mile west of the present city limits of Cisco, and called it Red Gap. The building was of logs, and it had two stories which contained the space for three rooms. Several weeks later a floorless log schoolhouse, with one small window, was built. For several days after the completion of the schoolhouse, no classes were held in the building because no teacher could be found. Finally Mrs. Colistie Green, one of the few pioneers who had settled there, voluntarily agreed to teach the school, at a wage of one dollar for each student who enrolled. Not long after this, W.T. Caldwell built a one-half mile west of the Red Gap postoffice. This was a store handling general merchandise.

As Red Gap grew and prospered it became known as the "home of the Longhorns." There were no fences and no restrictions. Ranchers with 160 acres of land turned their cattle out to graze thousands of acres of rich grassy lands. Water was scarce and was hauled in from an old water hole and sold from a barrel at twenty-five cents a gallon. Castor

oil was sold by the barrel. As the population of Red Gap increased, many new businesses were established almost overnight. During this time, Red Gap had six saloons, a dance hall, a general store, a postoffice, and a school house, and the wheels of fortune spun continually. Cattle rustling was common and a few killings occurred, but as a whole, cow punchers and ranchers were law abiding, peace loving citizens of Eastland County, a county of about 1,500 people.

The rapport that seemed to be present among Red Gap's citizens remained unchanged until the railroad made its way into Eastland County. Texas and Pacific Railway construction crews reached present-day Cisco on about November 1, 1880. The tracks bypassed Red Gap and located a depot at Delmar, now known as the little village of Dothan. It was expected, however, that when the Houston and Texas Central Railway reached the Texas and Pacific Railway a town would be located at the crossing of the roads.

Each day, as the iron rails led nearer and nearer to this point of crossing, saw new faces in the rapidly growing town of Red Gap. With the Houston and Texas Central within one mile of the junction and the Texas and Pacific only a short distance west, many laborers and their families helped to swell the number of inhabitants, which now reached six hundred. Accommodating themselves to the only

expression where it was supposed the new town would be located, which was a wagon road running East and West, the people had squatted on either side of this thoroughfare. In this white town were two or more stores of general merchandise, two or three grocery stores, and a number of restaurants and doctors' offices. The Houston and Texas Central Railway finally reached the Texas and Pacific Railway, and the crossing occurred about one mile east of Red Gap. Once it was decided that a permanent town would be established at the crossing, the inhabitants of Red Gap hurriedly arranged their belongings and moved their businesses one mile eastward where possible fame and fortune awaited. The resulting town was laid out and lots of land were sold for \$175.00 each. This town got its name when Major W. H. Abrams, the land and tax commissioner of the Texas and Pacific Railway, suggested it be named for a millionaire from New York, John W. Cisco, who had financed the Houston and Texas Central Railway. The birth of the railroad town, Cisco spelled inevitable doom for Red Gap, and on May 16, 1881, its population became so small that its postoffice was transferred to Cisco. This action signaled the end of the once prospering western town, Red Gap. Although almost all of the old buildings in Red Gap have been obliterated, this town's effect on the

## William Burr Starr Cisco Pioneer



WILLIAM BURR STARR  
Pioneer Farmer, Rancher,  
Civic Leader  
Cisco, Texas

My great grandfather, W.B. Starr, pioneer farmer, rancher, and civic leader made perpetual contributions to his family and community. He was born April 17, 1878 in Richmond, Indiana, and spent his childhood there. After finishing ninth grade in the public schools, he went to New York City and finished his formal education. After leaving New York, he went to Nebraska seeking employment.

Grandfather was working as a traveling salesman taking orders for calendars, but he really wanted to raise hogs because the hog raisers in Nebraska seemed to be very successful. He met another traveling salesman who told him if he wanted to raise hogs, to go South to Texas. He told Grandfather to raise peanuts and instead of harvesting peanuts turn the hogs into the peanut patches and the hogs would raise themselves. The salesman told Grandfather it would be "easy, fast money", and Grandfather believed him so to Texas he



returned to the farm to stay.

Grandfather never lost the "dream" of raising peanuts, and when he came back to the farm he began raising peanuts for market. He was instrumental in the organization of the Southwestern Peanut Growers Association. He served as the first president of the organization. He was appointed to the USDA peanut control board by President Franklin D. Roosevelt in 1934, and he spent a year serving the territory west of the Mississippi River.

Several years later the Texas Agriculture Experiment Station at Stephenville developed a special type of peanut seed for this region, and the new variety was named the "Spanish Starr" in honor of Grandfather. This particular variety of peanut is still one of the most popular in this area of Texas.

For many years, in addition to his peanut crops, Grandfather planted about a 100 acres of sweet potatoes each year to market. He developed his own "Red Starr" and "Highland Beauty" variety of sweet potatoes. He hired neighbors and high school students to plant and harvest the crops. The potatoes were manually picked up, sorted, graded, and placed in a "potato kiln" to cure for market. The potato kiln was a huge barn with an underground basement. There were two huge box heaters in the basement, and during potato harvest the Starr boys slept in the potato house and kept a fire burning all night to cure the potatoes. One cold winter night in 1946, the potato house caught fire and over 2,000 bushels of sweet potatoes was lost. He never rebuilt the potato business—thus ended an important era of Grandfather's life.

Grandfather was also active in various civic organizations. He helped organize the Comanche County REA and served as a director for two years. He was farmer director of the Stephenville Production Credit Association. Several years ago he established a \$500 fund at Cisco Junior College as an emergency student loan fund. Students are allowed to borrow from this fund for small emergencies with almost no restrictions and no interest.

Grandfather was an early advocate of good farming practices including crop rotation and winter legumes. The first carload of commercial fertilizer used in Eastland County arrived in Cisco consigned to W.B. Starr. He formed a pool for area farmers to purchase Irish potato seed by the carload at a minimal price. This plan has been used annually since that time.

Soon after his 80th birthday, Grandfather Starr, one of the few Quakers of this area wrote a statement to be attached to the abstract of title covering the land he owned. The Statement read: "The true wisdom we acquire during our lifetime comes from our Almighty Father... His voice if we seek it, will guide our steps as we journey through life. Many good farmers soon come to realize that the proper care of their soil constitutes part of God's wisdom—true title to all land is the hands of God."

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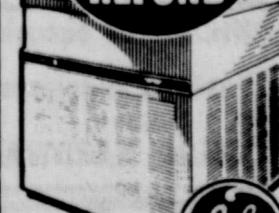

## 45 Years Of Service

Since 1918 thousands of persons have come and gone from Ranger, dislocated by the changing fortunes of oil, cotton, and cattle. But at least some home-town boys stayed-using their education and training to benefit the community. One of these was J. Floyd Killingsworth, Funeral Home Director, whose business assisted people over a wide area for forty-five years. And the people of Ranger say that the services given by he and his wife, Evelyn, went far

beyond professional duties - helping people through the difficult experience of the death of a loved one. J. Floyd Killingsworth's life has been divided into several segments, and one of them was his boyhood during the oil-boom days in Ranger. He was born in Haskell in 1908, but his family came to Ranger in 1918. There his father, J.T. Killingsworth, established a Hardware and Furniture store and Funeral Home.

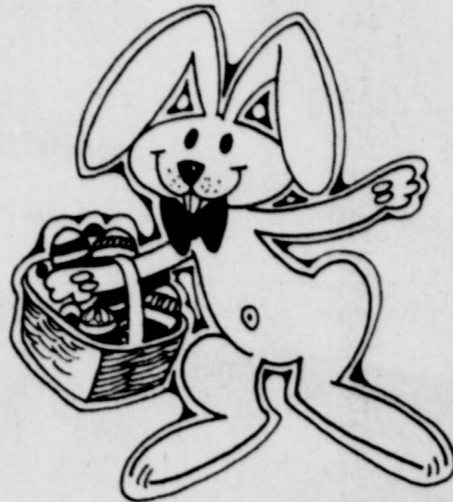
Floyd remarks. "In the Hardware part of the business, we carried wagons, harness, horse collars, and many other supplies. We had a small Chapel with the Funeral Home, but most funerals were held in Churches then. We used a horse-drawn hearse during the funerals. Rev. Casey Edmunds, a close friend, did the work of a mortician. He also officiated at many funeral services." J. Floyd joined the Methodist Church after coming to Ranger, and has been

a member of the same Church for sixty-one years. And Ranger - in the middle of an oil boom - was an exciting place for a boy to live. There was a constant stir of people, and oil-drilling nearby. At night the gas flares outlined a sprawling assortment of wooden buildings and tents, which housed around 30,000 people. Fires were commonplace in the town, and once the entire block of Pine Street was destroyed. During the rainy season mud was four feet deep in the streets, and people crossed on "Ranger's First Street Cars" - horse drawn sleds. Many tragedies took place

in this setting. A "flu" epidemic in 1920 added a number of graves to Pioneer Cemetery. A Miss Ethel Adams, who died only a few years ago, nursed the Killingsworth family through this illness.

J. Floyd attended the local schools, and worked part time as a paper boy for the Ranger Daily Times. He also worked as a Western Union Messenger Boy, and had other jobs with a produce company and a pipe line. When Ranger Junior College was established, in 1926, he was a member of the first class. He continued his education with the University of Texas at Austin, where

he received a Degree in Business Administration. Some time later he graduated from the Dallas Institute of Mortuary Science.

In 1931 J. Floyd's father, although still a young man, died. J. Floyd decided to continue the family business, and took over the management in 1932.

J. Floyd's marriage to Evelyn Hearn, an attractive Eastland girl, in June, 1939, brought more artistic talent into his business and home. Evelyn had attended McMurry College, and graduated from the College of Industrial Arts at Denton, Texas Women's University.

She was particularly adept at decorating, advertising and window displays, with organ and piano playing as a hobby.

She remarked as a bride: "I will help in the Hardware part of this business, but not the Funeral Home!"

But it wasn't long before she was creating beautiful flower arrangements for funerals, and assisting in other ways. Her decorations for Club and Church functions were just as notable. She decorated floats for parades, and planned program for Church and social occasions. She had a special touch on buffet meals. Usually these parties would

include her marvelous "Apricot Ice Box Cake", and "Chicken Mousse".

Mrs. Killingsworth has worked with a number of Clubs over the years. She has been a member of the 1920 Study Club for thirty nine years, and served as President. She is a member of the Eastland Music Club. She belonged to the Ranger Garden Club, and helped organize the Ranger Civic League. During the 1940's she was involved in a County-wide beautification program, with Mrs. James Horton of Eastland as Chairperson. Evelyn was in charge of tree-planting in

Ranger, and many of the trees growing in the town were set out during this time.

Yankees". He has been President of the Ranger Chamber of Commerce, and served on the Boards of the Ranger Independent Schools and Ranger Junior College. He has been Director of the Ranger General Hospital, President of the Retail Merchant's Association, Director of First Federal Savings and Loan Association, and Vice Pres. of Ranger Oil Belt Association of Texas Exes.

slow down, and take care of himself, if he intended to stay around. J. Floyd elected to do just that! He followed the Doctor's advice, and sold the Hardware and Furniture part of his business in 1966. With his recovery complete, he continued to operate the Funeral Home and an Insurance Company.

In July, 1971, he was singled out for a special honor by his own profession. He was elected President of the Texas State Funeral Directors at a Convention in Houston. A photograph from that meeting shows tall, striking J. Floyd, dressed in a light suit with dark lapels, accepting the gavel. In his acceptance speech, he pledged to keep the association true to democratic principles and high ideals of service.

A few years later, in 1977, J. Floyd and Evelyn decided it was time to "Slow down a bit, count some of our blessings, and enjoy some of our hobbies." They sold the Funeral Home to Mr. and Mrs. Jerry T. Edwards and son, Terry, who assumed management of the establishment.

Since then the Killingsworths have been spending more time with their pleasant home on Cherry street, and assisting with more Church work. Evelyn is head of the Christian Social Involvement program at the First Methodist Church, and J. Floyd is Church Lay Leader.

During the years he managed the Funeral Home, J. Floyd never denied services to anyone, regardless of their financial situation. He felt that every person who desired it was entitled to a Christian burial. He worked closely with Ministers of all faiths, to see that the most comfort possible was brought to families.

The Killingsworths found that arranging funerals for children, young people, and the victims of accidents was particularly traumatic.

"But we were personally affected by all the funerals we handled," Mrs. Killingsworth adds.

"To be able to deal with death on a regular basis, yet maintain a basically pleasant frame of mind, required a great deal of faith and maturity."

"I have had people say to me," J. Floyd remarks - "I wouldn't be in your kind of business for anything!"

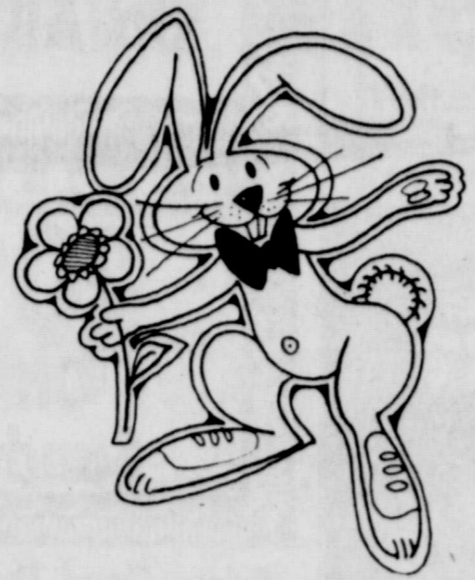
"But I never did think of it in a disagreeable way. As I grew up my father was involved in this kind of business, with my family expressing sympathy for other people. To me it was a service - a public trust. I agree with William Gladstone, the English Statesman, who said:

"Show me the manner in which a Nation or Community cares for its dead, and I will measure with mathematical exactness the character of its people, their respect for the laws of the land, and their loyalty to high ideals."

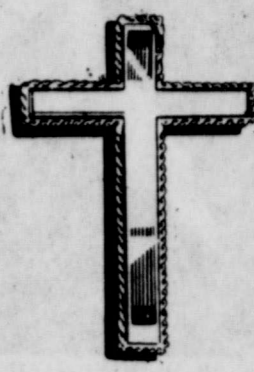

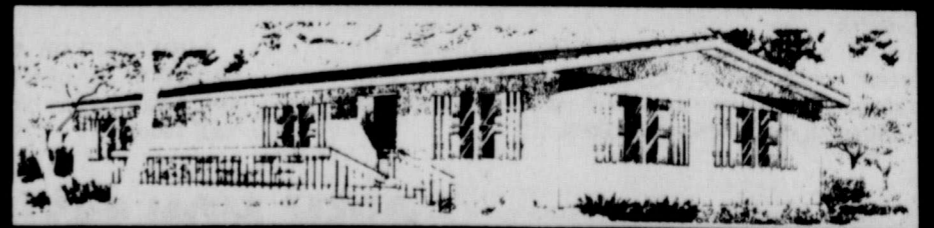

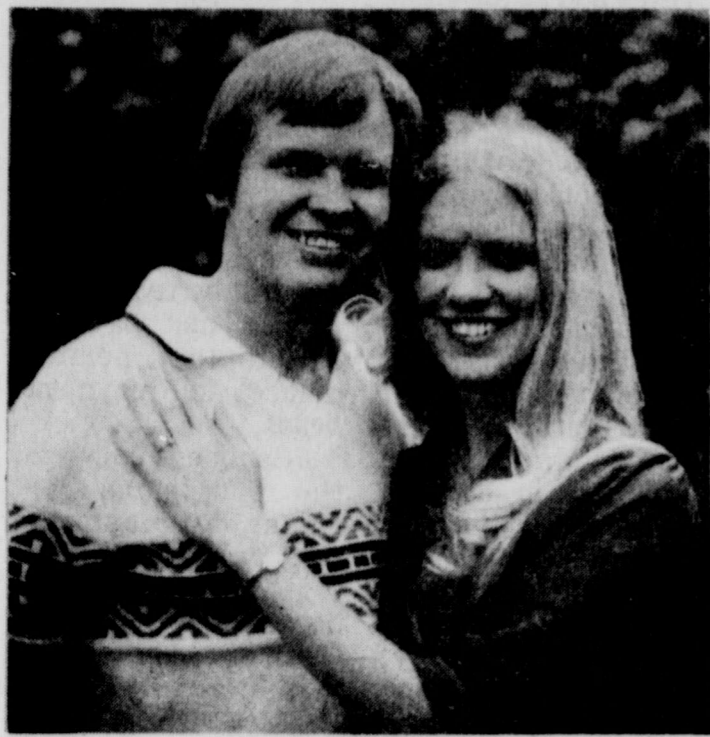
