PANAMA, R.P.--Friday the 13th was a religious holiday for Panama citizens (Good Friday) and we observed the event in a very novel way—going through the Panama Canal as a member of the crew of the Yacht Tell Tale.

The Tell Tale is a 40-foot sailing vessel with a 40-hp diesel engine. It is owned by Dr. and Mrs. Norris Hoyt of Newport, Rhode Island. A retired college professor, Dr. Hoyt was in Panama on a vacation trip that had taken them by yacht from Newport through the

canal to California. And they were returning home when they stopped here a couple of days earlier.

The canal requires yachts to have a minimum crew of five—helmsman at the wheel plus somebody on each side, fore and aft, to handle the lines used in the locks. It was our pleasure to join the crew for the trip.

The day began at 7 a.m. when a pilot (one of 300 men employed by the canal as pilots of all ships and boats going through the canal) came aboard the yacht. A few minutes

later, we crewmen were ferried out in a launch from the yacht club pier. Since our yacht was small, we were assigned to go through the canal locks with a sister ship—a medium size freighter.

On the Pacific side, the Tell Tale's motor was started and we moved into the first lock. It was flooded after the gate closed, raising us some 30 feet. This was done again as we moved forward in the higher water into another lock. Soon, we were able to go to a third lock some three or four miles along the way. Through this lock, our boat went into a big fresh water lake. Water from the lake is used to flood the locks. The lake also provides city water for Panama City and Colon and other towns. It is beautiful, clean water.

Once in the lake, we crewmen relaxed as the boat cruised some 35 miles at six knots per hour. We enjoyed sandwiches and sun bathing as we moved through the canal's lake country. After ten miles or so, the lake began to widen out. Soon, we were seeing cabins on miniature islands and occasionally on the shore. An occasional motor boat whizzed past, often with a water skier behind. And we passed a couple of dozen large ships that were going through the canal in the opposite direction. These included ocean liners, tankers, reefers, freighters and the like from a good many nations.

After some five hours and at about 4 p.m., our boat pulled into the Colon area where three locks take

you down from the lake to the Atlantic Ocean. We were given a 6 p.m. time to go through the locks, so the Tell Tale tied up to a buoy and everybody went swimming—swimming in the Panama Canal!—in cool, clean water.

Arriving around 7 p.m. in Colon, we extra crewmen found that it would be 10 p.m. before a train would take us the 50 or so miles back to Panama City. We enjoyed supper at the canal company cafeteria, which stays open 24 hours a day seven days a week. And it was about midnight before we got back to our living quarters.

Seeing the canal from a small boat was something that we will always remember. We made a bunch of pictures to show family and friends. Aboard the boat, they told us that enough dirt was moved from the canal to equal that in a 10-foot square hole completely through the earth.

As you know, the French started the canal in 1900 and gave up a few years later with the USA taking over. The canal was completed in time for use during WWI as the world's greatest engineering feat. The canal is kept in excellent shape. Some 50 ships (25 in each direction) go through the canal each day.

Saturday, April 14th, was a no-work day so we enjoyed another outing. This time, we visited a cattle ranch near Chepo, which is the end of the paved road south out of Panama City. The swampy lowlands of the Darien country stretch between Chepo and the Columbia border some 250 miles south. The jungles and swamps are such that road building through there will take many, many years.

The ranch has been in the same family for over 100 years and there's a lovely old home on the banks of a river. The ranch of some 2000 acres is stocked with Brahman cattle (some 1200 mother cows). They irrigate with river water and are growing feed and rice. Cashew trees grow wild. And we

His parents, Willie and Etoil Franklin, preceded him in death.

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



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Water Rights Hearing To Be Held July 23

Hearings to determine the rights of users of state water in the Upper Leon River Segment of the Brazos River Watershed are scheduled to begin at 2:00 p.m., July 23, at the City Hall Auditorium, 105 South Texas, in De Leon. The hearings will be held by the Texas Water

Commission, the judicial arm of the Texas Department of Water Resources. Adjudicative hearings are conducted pursuant to the Water Rights Adjudication Act and concern all persons who use surface water for other than domestic and livestock purposes in the

watershed and who are holders of permit, certified filing or water right claim. Persons in the watershed holding such rights or claims thereof must complete additional forms sent to them by the Department of Water Resources and are required to file these forms with the Department by July 16, of this year.

The Texas Water Commission emphasizes that all persons with water rights and/or claims should attend the evidentiary hearings. Those persons who do not appear in person to present evidence supporting their claims may lose any water right to which they may otherwise be entitled.

A docket notifying each claimant of the time and place of his hearing will be sent at a later date. The 2:00 p.m. session July 23, is for the purpose of assuming jurisdiction and to explain the adjudication process. On July 24, the assumed jurisdiction and to explain the adjudication process. On July 24, the scheduled evidentiary hearings will begin at 9:00 a.m. All claimants in the watershed are encouraged to be present on July 23, and then appear on the date specified for each claimant in the docket notice. The segment to be adjudicated consists of the Leon River and its tributaries from the headwaters in Eastland County downstream to its confluence with, and including, the South Leon River and includes portions of Eastland, Comanche, Erath, Stephens and Mills Counties.

Persons using surface water for domestic and livestock purposes only are exempted by state law from the adjudication proceedings. Claimants using water for irrigation or other non-exempt purposes should note that the mere filing of claims does not constitute a water right. Evidence of actual, legal use of water in the past must be presented at each individual claimant's adjudication hearing. Claimants who are not basing their claims on a permit or certified filing must be able to show the water use which occurred during the years 1963-1967, inclusive, or for those claimants who filed for

County Receives Needed Water

Spring thunderstorms continued to dump moisture on Eastland County as April ended and May began.

About two inches of rain was reported from most points with higher amounts reported particularly from the south part of the county, early Tuesday morning. The cool front moved through slowly, prompting thunderstorms and accompanying rain, with hail reported in some areas stripping trees between Carbon and Eastland and other areas.

A severe thunderstorm alert was issued about 12:30 a.m. in the area generally from Rising Star and Carbon, where the heaviest rain was reported, covering FM 1027. Eastland County Dispatch Chief Bob Mercer reported the flash-flood warning expired about mid-morning and that logs showed that Constable George Hicks of Rising Star had reported high water east of that city about midnight when State Highway Department crews were notified.

A Highway Dept. spokesman said Tuesday morning that high water was evident on the access roads near the Leon River. Roads south of Carbon was over-run with high water in many areas. Gorman reported had two inches of rain, and Olden recorded 1.8 inches.

At mid-morning Tuesday, water still had not gone over the spillway at Lake Leon, but water was running briskly in all the north and south forks of the Leon, so with the continued runoff from what was a generally wide-spread heavy rain, the water should go over, it was believed.



Rest Helps Grassland

Research and experience on grass management over the past fifty years has yielded two basic findings. First, the amount of forage produced by grasses depends on how close and how often plants are grazed. Second, the more often a plant is grazed during its normal growth cycle, the more limited its total production will be. With this in mind, it's not hard to determine the adverse effects of the recent drought.

Wayne Parker, range conservationist with the local Soil Conservation Service, says now that cattle numbers are reduced and rainfall is good, ranchers should make a commitment to start a planned grazing system to improve their grasslands. By definition a planned grazing system is one in which two or more pastures are rested from grazing in a planned sequence throughout the year. Improved pasture and rangeland can be used in this combination.

According to Parker, too often cattlemen are scared of

the term "planned grazing system". The idea that they will be restricted in their operation is false. A good grazing system is tailored to meet the operator's needs and the needs of the land. If used wisely, added flexibility is achieved through more efficient use of pastures and a build up of reserve forage in rested pastures.

The important question to be answered is "How will the cattlemen benefit from a planned grazing system?" The main advantages are: (1) increased forage production; (2) improved range conditions; and (3) improved plant cover which is turn improves moisture infiltration and reduces runoff and soil erosion. Grazing systems can be developed at anytime; however, April and May are the best months to start. Anyone interested in learning more about planned grazing systems should contact the local SCS office in Room 311 of the Eastland National Bank Bldg. The phone number is 629-1480.

Keeping Up
Did you know that a female child born today can expect to live to age 76 and a male to 68? However, increased longevity is more a matter of infant survival rates than of anything else. The fact is, we don't live much longer — once we reach maturity — than our ancestors did. On the average, a woman who becomes widowed at age 65 will live another 16 years. As a method of reflecting differing survival rates, it was found in 1976 that 11 per cent of whites were 65 or older (that figure is now closer to 13 per cent), while only eight per cent of blacks and four per cent of Spanish-Americans were that old. After age 75, blacks have a higher survival rate than whites. Across the wide United States, only five per cent of this country's older citizens live in institutions. Of older men, 83 per cent reside in family settings, while 58 per cent of older women do the same. Most of the others live alone — a few with non-relatives.

4H CLUB

4-H families in Eastland County have a very special opportunity this summer. They can apply to host a youth from Japan for 29 days. These youth are part of the LABO - Texas 4-H Exchange.

The Texas 4-H Program has established this exchange program with the LABO Foundation of Japan as a cultural and language development activity for both Japanese and American youth.

LABO originated in Japan in 1966 as an English teaching program, developing into a language laboratory, hence the name LABO.

Japanese children enroll in this program to learn English. Language is taught through stories and drama in group situations. In 1972, LABO and the 4-H Clubs of America joined to foster friendship and cultural exchange by sponsoring one month home-stay programs.

In 1978, 1,650 Japanese students and tutor-chaperones lived with American host families in 18 states. Three hundred and one American young people and accompanying adults stayed in LABO homes in Japan - all arranged and conducted through each state's 4-H program.

Seventy-five Japanese students, aged 12 - 18, and adult chaperones were hosted by Texas 4-H families, July 24 - August 23, 1978.

Host families were selected by application to the State 4-H LABO Coordinator and ranged from the Texas Panhandle to the Rio Grande Valley.

Entire families met their new son or daughter at the airport upon their arrival in Texas, July 25. From that point the Japanese student became a member of the 4-H family with the same responsibilities and privileges as their 4-H brother or sister as they gradually built cultural confidence and language ability.

Knowing the stress placed on both the exchangee and the host family to adapt to new cultures and languages, a Jamboree was held at the mid-exchange point. This was done to provide a relaxing, breather time for Japanese youth to enable them to speak their own language, compare experiences, and have group fun. For the host families, it provided a change to relax with other hosts and share experiences. It also provided a time at which the LABO youth could share with their 4-H families an example story drama by which they study English.

The last part of August saw host families and exchangees trying to re-pack suddenly inadequately small suitcases. So with 2, 3, and even four carry-on packages, exchangees returned to Tokyo on August 23.

The Texas 4-H LABO Exchange Program contributed to the people of Texas in many respects - another cultural awareness, language, though different is similar, and a better appreciation of their own state and country. Simultaneously, Japanese youngsters learned more about American, its customs, its language, and its people.

Success of this first Texas 4-H-LABO Exchange can be inferred by the fact that approximately half of the host families have indicated an interest in hosting again next summer. An equal number of families have also expressed the desire to send one of their 4-H'ers to Tokyo next summer on the reciprocal exchange.

Host families summarized: "We enjoyed every moment. It was truly a rewarding experience and he was so precious." "Yes, we enjoyed having our exchangee in our home. It was a learning experience for all concerned." "We developed a very sincere interest and concern for these lovely people. Teenager in family related very well and made interesting comparisons and many similarities."

"The exchange program has made memories for our family we will treasure always. He was special and his family is to be thanked for allowing their son to

become our Japanese son." Here in Eastland County we have already had 1 4-H family apply to be a host family. It would be nice if several more would apply. The Japanese youth will arrive around the end of July and stay for 29 days. If your family is interested in applying to be a host family please

County 7th Peach Production

Eastland County produced 25,500 bushels of peaches in 1978, making the number seven peach-growing county in the state.

Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown said the total peach crop was estimated at 833,000 bushels, 17 percent below the 1 million bushels harvested in 1977 but the second largest crop since 1953.

Brown said Texas was eighth in peach production nationwide. The top 10 counties were Gillespie, Atascosa, Smith, Parker, Duval, Montague, Eastland, Frio, Gaines and Comanche.


Peach production is scattered around the state with heavy concentrations in south, central, north and northeast Texas. Harvest remains active in parts of the state through late August or early September.

Figures on the 1978 peach harvest were compiled by the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

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Sabanna River Watershed Flood Control Plan On Schedule

Heavy flooding in the south part of Eastland County Monday night prompted many counties to wonder: "Whatever happened to the Sabanna River Watershed Flood Control Plan?"

A check with Ronald Bailey of the Soil Conservation Office shows that the plan is "on schedule" and moving forward -- and that the

flooding of this spring is another strong indication of the need for this program, which over an eight-year period, would see the construction of 15 structures to prevent flooding.

The Sabanna Plan (initiated as far back as 1960, and officially kicked-off with a giant rally in Gorman in September of 1966) has been

reviewed and approved by the SCS, and the U.S. Department of Agriculture. The plan has also been approved by the Environmental Protection Agency. Its next stop, Bailey says, is a review by the Water Resources Council in Washington. If it clears that, it would then go to the Office of Management and Budget. There's good indication that

the program could be funded this year, and if so, the work could begin with 18 months. The plan for an eight-year installation, and easements are already being accepted. Others wishing to let easements in connection with the plan, may do so through the County Judge's Office. The County Commissioners Court is a joint sponsor for the project.

Congressional Comment

WASHINGTON, D.C.—Will Rogers once commented that the United States has never lost a war or won a conference. American generosity at the diplomatic table has caused us to rely on unrealistic idealism in the international arena instead of

thoughtful pragmatism.

During the 1920's and 30's it was thought that if we could get Japan to sign enough treaties they would not dare resort to war. In 1921 Japan signed a treaty with the U.S. limiting the amount of battleships. In 1922 several nations, including Japan, signed the Nine-Power Treaty which affirmed the Open Door Policy in China. In 1928 both Germany and Japan signed the Kellogg-Briand Pact which outlawed war as "an in-

strument of national policy." In 1931 Japan repudiated all of these treaties and then promptly invaded China. The lesson of history is clear: that treaties are made at the convenience of nations and broken at the convenience of nations.

Before long the Senate will be asked to approve a Strategic Arms Limitation Treaty (SALT II) with the Soviet Union. This treaty limits launchers, not ballistic missiles; allows high Soviet force levels; and permits the Soviets to amass many multiple independent reentry (MIRV's) which can hit several targets with a single missile. It also includes inactive U.S. aircraft, but excludes Soviet Backfire bombers; and above all it does not adequately address the problem of verification.

The Soviets continue to adequately fund a vigorous defense program and to date

have not allowed any treaty to adversely affect their military and production programs. In technology, they lead us in high energy lasers and high yield nuclear weapons. In conventional fighting capability, the Soviets have seven times as many tanks, over six times the number of artillery pieces, and fifty times the number of trained and active chemical warfare personnel. By 1980-82 they will have a commanding lead in strategic nuclear capability. During this period the number of their warheads will increase to between 6,500 and 9,200 and the number of SLBM's will probably increase to 950. In the meantime the U.S. has closed the Minuteman III production line; delayed development of the new MX missile and cancelled the

production of the B-1 Bomber.

We have come from a position of U.S. nuclear monopoly in the 1950's to one of strategic superiority in the 1960's to rough equivalence in the early 1970's and the forecast is that we will shortly be a clear second to the Soviets in strategic capability.

I am of the firm belief that the world would benefit from a treaty that would reduce the number of nuclear weapons. But we must always remember that armaments are an instrument of national policy, and any attempt to regulate them without regard for the factors that bring them into existence is doomed to failure. The Soviet Union is determined to pursue world domination. Until this policy is dealt with, arms control will only limit--U.S. arms.


