THE YARD OF THE WEEK will not be chosen due to the hail early this week. A spokesperson for the Cisco Garden Club made the announcement, but stated the club had been considering three yards for this time. The yards being considered were those of Mrs. Rose Randolph, 409 East 8th, who was reported to have a "beautiful yard"; Clyde Brymer, 1207 East 16th; and Gordon Davis, 1409 Avenue P, who had "gorgeous Blue Bonnets".

MARTHA GRAVES of Cisco reported that she recently returned from a trip to Houston where she toured the M.D. Anderson Hospital, which specializes in the treatment of cancer. Miss Graves stated the tour was one of the most interesting which she has gone on, and she received an autographed copy of a book about the hospital.

The hospital is associated with the University of Texas at Houston and Miss Graves said the Texas Federation Women's Clubs had a hand in the beginning of the hospital. Miss Graves is a local member of the club.

A NEWSLETTER from the West Texas State University dated Friday, April 20, 1979, carried an obituary for Dr. Maria D. Tarrab, 62, who had taught for two years at Cisco Junior College and for a semester at Amarillo College before joining the WTSU faculty. Funeral services for Dr. Tarrab were held on April 20, at Memory Gardens, located north of Canyon.

Dr. Tarrab, a native of Cuba, had been a member of the WTSU faculty since 1972, but had previously been a temporary instructor in 1968-69.

Dr. Tarrab died about 2 p.m., Wednesday, April 18, at the Emergency Receiving Center at Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo. She suffered a heart attack at the dentist's office, where she and her husband, Dr. Miguel Tarrab, had just completed a check-up.

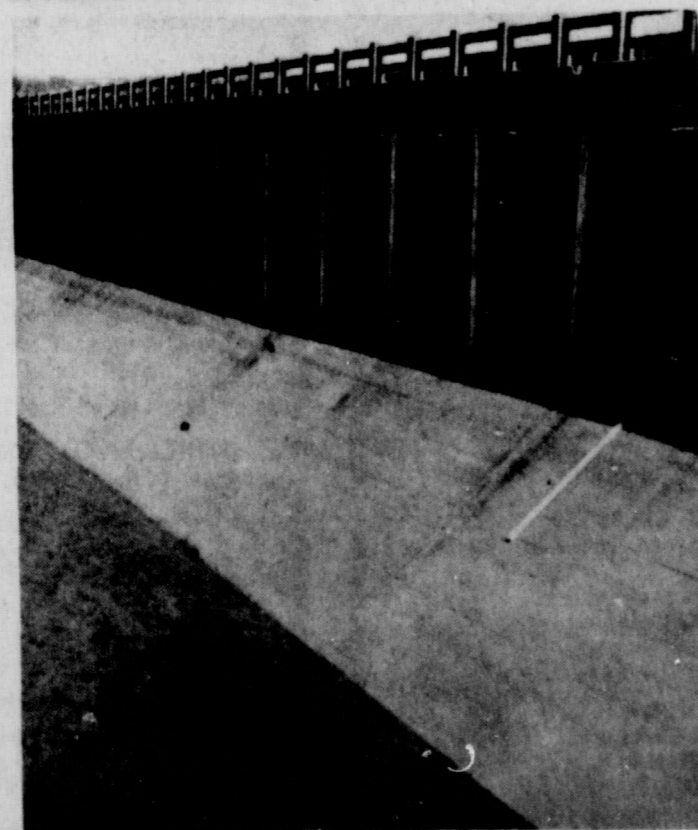

Beef producers in Eastland County could get some good information by attending the Heart of Texas Cow-Calf

Clinic in Brownwood Thursday, May 10. The clinic will be at the Brownwood Cattle Auction and will begin at

9:00 a.m. with registration. Morning programs will include "Proposed Brucellosis Program" and "What's The Industry Looking For?" This will be a live animal demonstration evaluating the different types of calves produced in this area. A panel of cattle buyers will discuss this topic.

After lunch Dr. Ernie Davis will give "Outlook for the Cattle Industry." Other topics of interest will be "Nutritional Aids for Beef Cattle" and "Producing Quality Hay and Pasture". The program will end about 3:15.

The Texas Agricultural Extension Service and Texas Power and Light Company are Co-sponsoring the clinic. There will be a \$5.00 registration fee.

Zinc is utilized by pecan foliage for the manufacture of a growth hormone called indole-acetic-acid. Without zinc and indole-acetic-acid pecan growth is greatly reduced. The leaves will be small and the shoots will be short and in clusters forming what is commonly called "zinc rosette". Zinc is not readily translocated from shoot; consequently, frequent zinc sprays are needed if new growth is to receive zinc. This is also why good coverage is important. Since aerial application does not give complete tree coverage, commercial growers have to depend on ground sprayers for zinc applications.

There are over 600,000 acres of native pecan trees in Texas. Yet strange as it may seem pecans are one of the few plants that cannot absorb zinc from the soil. Texas soils frequently contain very high levels of zinc but because of the high pH nature of alkaline soils a high percentage of the soil zinc is not soluble in the soil water and is thus unavailable to the pecan. Applications of zinc to the soil are of no significant value to pecan trees in Texas.

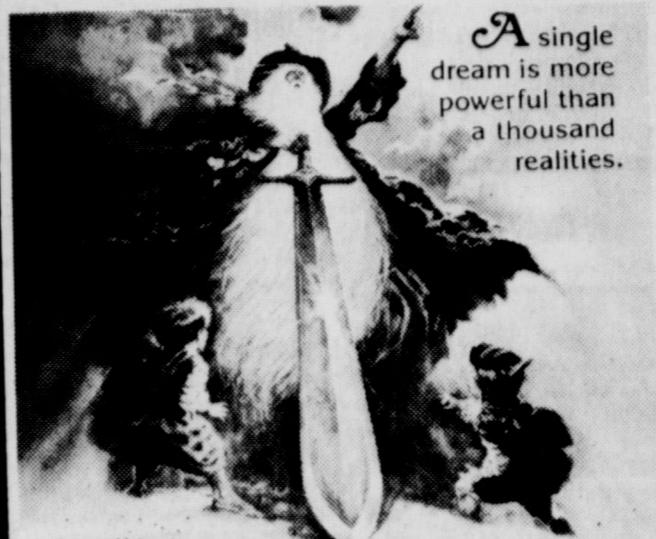
A pecan grower can determine if his zinc sprays are effective by observing the amount of terminal growth the trees make during the year. Mature trees should make 5 to 10 inches of shoot growth annually. Nonbearing trees should make 24 inches of shoot growth each year. Zinc alone is not the answer to perfect pecans. It is however a very important cultural requirement. With good zinc management other cultural practices such as fertilization and irrigation will be more effective. However, fertilization or irrigation without zinc sprays is of little value. So, zinc sprays are one of the pecan growers most important first steps to success each year.

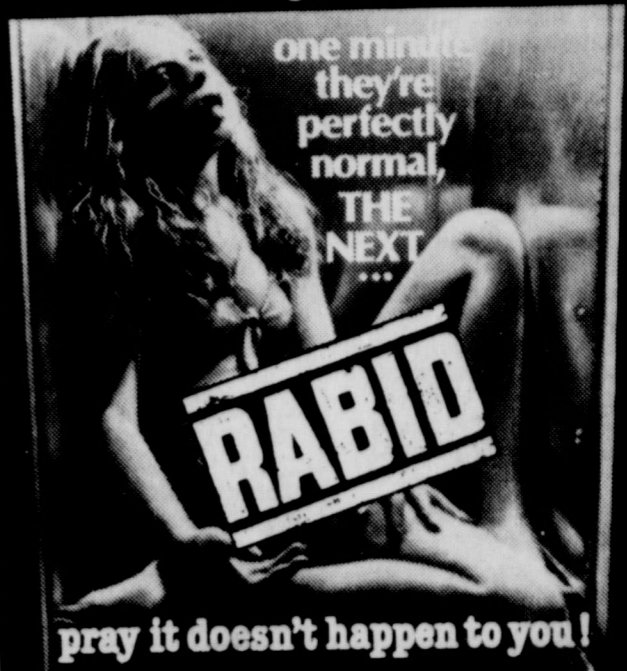

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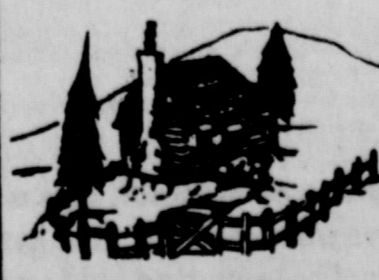

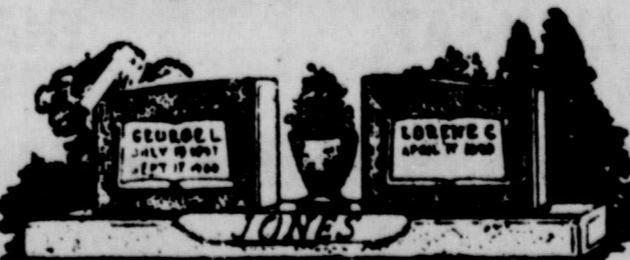

Peanut Prices For 1979 Looking Good

Based on recent comment from several reliable sources the outlook for a favorable price level on 1979 crop contract additional peanuts appears good. A key factor in brightening the contract price picture is the estimate by USDA that nationally only one half to two thirds as many "additional" peanuts may be available for contracting this year.

Last year U.S. peanut farmers could have sold, by law, a total of 1,680,000 tons of quota peanuts, but instead marketed only about 1,520,000 tons. With the current provisions in the law allowing farmers to carry forward unused poundage quota, U.S. peanut growers will have a predicted 160,000 tons of quota peanuts to carry forward and plant this year. This extra poundage will be almost double the five percent (84,000 tons) reduction in this year's national poundage quota.

Upon examination of the 1979 crop "additional" peanut supply situation the grower leadership in the southeastern peanut producing states of Georgia, Alabama and Florida believe that the competition among shellers to obtain their share of "additional" peanuts for export will bring the contract price level to about 96 percent of the quota price—the same level received by southeastern growers

last year. It is reported that most southeastern shellers also appear to share this view.

Ross Wilson, manager, Southwestern Peanut Growers' Association, said that Southwestern shellers have traditionally indicated that pricing patterns established in the Southeast are instrumental in prices paid for the same types of peanuts in the Southwest. We therefore expect Southwestern shellers to offer contract prices to growers at not less than last year's level of just over 95 percent of the quota support level once USDA regulations are firmed up for 1979, he said. He also pointed to the very favorable market outlook for 1979 crop contract peanuts projected in the April 13, 1979 edition of Doane's Agricultural Report.

Probably the most encouraging development was the recent announcement by the Indian Government regarding that country's export quota for 1979. USDA's Foreign Agricultural Service in the latest edition of "Foreign Agriculture Circular" says in part, "The Indian Government recently announced a 25,000-ton HPS export quota for 1979, a volume too small to affect U.S. peanut exports. The private trade in India had been looking forward to a 100,000 ton export quota, but considering the inflationary impact of such

exports on the Indian domestic vegetable oil market, it is unlikely the Government will permit this level." That information should slow speculation by the U.S. peanut trade that India's peanut exports will seriously damage the U.S. peanut export outlook in 1979, Wilson said.

Wilson added that farmers are advised not to hastily enter into contracts with shellers at prices below the 1978 levels. He concluded that there is every indication that the current supply-demand outlook on additional peanuts will result in export market reaction favorable to growers.

A 1976 Fiat was reported stolen from the E&E Auto Sales Lot on West Main St. in Eastland, and through the Central Dispatch, put on the nation-wide alert (NCIC and TICIC) networks at 3:45 a.m. Tuesday, and at 10 a.m. the vehicle and its occupants were discovered in Artesia, N.M. at 10 a.m.

Eastland Police Sgt. Ben Sancillio and Municipal Judge David Weise left for Artesia Tuesday at 3:30 p.m. and returned the two suspects.

Charged with auto theft are a 17-year-old Ranger youth and a 17-year-old Bay City, Michigan youth. Bond was set at \$5,000 each, and the two were in Eastland County Jail Friday.

in the county was more than just a tornado, but since the county had a rail line and I-20 completely across the county potential trouble existed constantly from these areas. Also, disasters could develop from feed mills to butane storage areas.

Each city was en-

couraged to up-to-date their disaster plan and a future meeting will be held explaining in detail the county plan and how the master plan will function with each city.

The county will be divided into square miles and then districts for quick identification of the troubled area. The 6 districts will rely heavily upon the city plans to assist.

The Cisco Intermediate School Library (The Betty Cheshire Memorial Library) has come a long way since 1977. Everyone in the community has been so helpful in making it what it is now. The librarian, Mrs. Cleveland, has been a great asset to the library. Two senior high school girls, Carla Hargrove and Pam Cockrell, spend two hours a week in the library helping Mrs. Cleveland. The students, grades third through six, have the opportunity to come to the library four days a week. Mrs. Strawn, Mrs. Leveridge and Mrs. Schaefer assist in checking out the books.

The townspeople donated many books which laid the foundation of the library collection. Different clubs in the community also donated useful equipment. The Cisco Service Club donated a card catalog file cabinet. The First Industrial Arts Club donated a paperback rack.

All of the books in the library have been fully processed. For each book, four cards were typed and filed in the card catalog file. The library now has a total of 2255 books.

Three weeks ago, the library received 125 new books. Some of the titles include: *Look at Seeds and Weeds*; *Hitting, Pitching, and Running-Maybe*; and *Maria Sanford-Pioneer Professor*. They are now fully processed and ready to be checked out. They are on display on tables in the library.

The Cisco Intermediate School Library has become a well-used resource center.

Librarian assistants and the librarian have prepared bibliographies of books housed in our Cisco Junior-Senior High School Library in different subject areas. This should be helpful to the instructors in their teaching and in assisting the students in an effective use of our library. Also, it will aid in encouraging the students to utilize to the greatest extent our library facilities. We are proud of our library and our aim is to continue to improve the collection; to keep materials current as new knowledge is published. Hints For The Aged & Handicapped

By PATRICIA GALBREATH

DEAR PAT--Disabled adults often have difficulty in training a new attendant to help them. Having to explain one's needs on a day to day basis to new attendants is not an easy job when one has speech, sight, hearing, or co-ordination problems. It is also a problem for the aged. A new manual for attendants who assist disabled individuals in the personal needs of daily living has recently been published

by the Rehabilitation Service at Southwest State University. "Aid in Attendant Care for Handicapped Persons" by Larson and Snobl, discusses disabilities (cerebral palsy, muscular dystrophy, polio, spinal cord, etc.) and contains information on various health related routines such as catheter care, ostomy, and preventive medicine. Special emphasis is placed on spinal cord injury.

Discussion includes such areas as pressure sores, how to take pulse and temperature, bathing procedures, oral hygiene, bowel evacuation, and other maintenance areas. A chapter is devoted to first aid (restoring breathing, control of bleeding, drug overdoses, burns, epilepsy, emergency evacuation). By having this book available to let a prospective new attendant read saves a lot of frayed nerves, hurt feelings and depression. The turnover rate in attendants is very high as many who take the position seem to think it is simply a baby-sitting job. For more information, or to order the book, write to

Mary Carey 'Fireweed Philosophy'

In the summer of 1978 Mary Carey of Alaska - remembered around Cisco - had her second book published: "Fireweed Philosophy". This book consists of a narrative poem spoken by an old prospector, and two shorter poems. Mary's sentiments echo through her characters:
"I'm not sure it's gold that we're after... It's a feeling

that's free and wild." And later:
"Mt. McKinley wretched in fireweed like an iceberg in the sea."
And later, speaking of death:
"Don't know about wings and extravagant things I'd like to stay here, for I love it."
The tender, moving illustrations of Alaskan artist Doug Lindstrand depict a prospector, his dog, wild animals, and Alaskan fireweed. The publication of this volume brought Lindstrand to a wide audience, and the demand for his paintings is growing rapidly.
Although this book is quite different from Mary's first volume: "Alaska, Not For A Woman!" Published in 1976, the same theme permeates both - love of that magnificent chunk of land called Alaska.
In Alaska Mary Carey is called "Runnin' Mary", and known as a legendary photo-journalist who has written for leading newspapers and magazine. Her award-winning stories have covered the

exploits of Bush Pilot Don Sheldon, mountain climbing expeditions on Mt. McKinley, a polar bear hunt, and the adventures of North-slope oil exploration. Mary's McKinley View Lodge, near Denali State Park, has hosted leading political, religious, and intellectual figures from Alaska and the United States.

But Cisco people remember a Mary from the past, a flying figure with short blonde hair and big brown eyes. Her two sisters, Lela Latch Lloyd and Annie Rendall, still live in Cisco. There are stories about how Mary always wanted to go hunting with her brothers instead of helping her mother with housework. And there was one disastrous Christmas when she wanted a Catcher's mitt more than anything in the world, and her parents - A.Z. and Amanda Latch - gave her a beautiful doll instead!

Mary survived school with her spirits undented, leading out in sports and journalism. She graduated from Randolph College in Cisco (now C.J.C.), and hit McMurry with her own brand of kinetic energy. Her journalism teacher there said: "Of all the pupils I have taught, I believe you have the potential to go the farthest."
Mary went on to Texas Tech and received a Degree in

Journalism. She wrote, taught in Colleges and High Schools, married - and had a daughter, Jean. Most of these years were spent in Ft. Worth, Dallas, Wichita and Houston, where her husband Richard (Dick) Carey, worked for Texas Instruments. Eventually her daughter married Frank Richardson of Houston.

Mary's husband shared her love of adventure and unusual experiences. They camped on weekends, and belonged to a Gem and Mineral Society. By the early 1960's Mary and Dick had a dream of building a boat and sailing it to Alaska. The sudden death of her husband, in 1962, left Mary stunned, but she decided to go to Alaska alone.

Mary raced up the Alcan Highway like a person trying to outrun sorrow. But her car had to be stored before she reached her destination, a small town in the interior named Talkeetna, accessible only by train or air. Mary had a job there teaching school. She soon found she had traded City lights for Northern Lights. And, as she said: "I traded golden slippers for mukluks, and roast goose for moose." But it was a challenging country, beautiful and dangerous, where no one could afford the luxury of weeping.

Talkeetna was the Headquarters of famed Bush Pilot Don Sheldon, who landed on a strip near the school. He regularly flew the area around 23,000 ft. Mt. McKinley, which brooded over the territory like a guardian spirit. Mary felt a mystical fascination for the mountain, and longed to watch some of the famous climbing expeditions.

When Don Sheldon agreed to let her fly these trips with him, and write stories about them, it opened a new world of tremendous excitement. Unfortunately Don Sheldon died in 1975, before he could carry out his plans of writing the foreword to Mary's first book.

Some of Mary's exploits have few equals anywhere. She is the only woman to be on Mt. McKinley in the winter time. The location of her Homestead - on the southern flank of Mt. McKinley - was probably the most inaccessible area ever homesteaded by a woman in Alaska. And when she declared war on the Governor of Alaska to get the Anchorage-Fairbanks Highway finished - and won - this had to be a first for any woman. Her daring treks into the Anchorage earthquake area produced outstanding stories and photographs. And her first book: "Alaska, Not For A Woman!" is now in its fifth printing.

Some people never seem to find a place where they fell a true kinship of spirit with the earth. But Mary found this end of her journey in a magnificent area which is now part of Denali State Park. Although there were no roads near her Homestead when she chose it, she envisioned a Lodge on the site, with a glassed-in porch where visitors could experience special views of McKinley. After many hard-

ships, the Lodge was completed, a two-story, wooden structure with a picture-window dining room. And, with a new Highway nearby, many visitors sample Mary's famous pies and Fiddlehead Fern dinners. They can also drink deeply of the scenery, but few of them can describe Mt. McKinley as well as Mary. She calls it - "God's Handiwork... a massive white monument decked in ermine... a beautiful bell on top of the world, tilted to ring." Of the incandescent play of light and color across the mountain, she says: "It's

the greatest pageant known to man."
So Mary Carey has put a lot of time and experiences between her and that day in 1962 when she used the Alcan Highway for an escape valve. She has new perspectives and goals, including the sharing of unspoiled tranquility with fugitives from the industrialized part of the world. Just like the Alaskan wilderness shared its secrets with her, such as that of fireweed covering its burned-out ground with beauty.

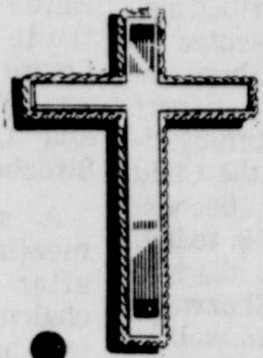
