at 7 p.m. at the Cisco Junior College Agriculture Building. Guest speaker for this year's event will be Dr. Don

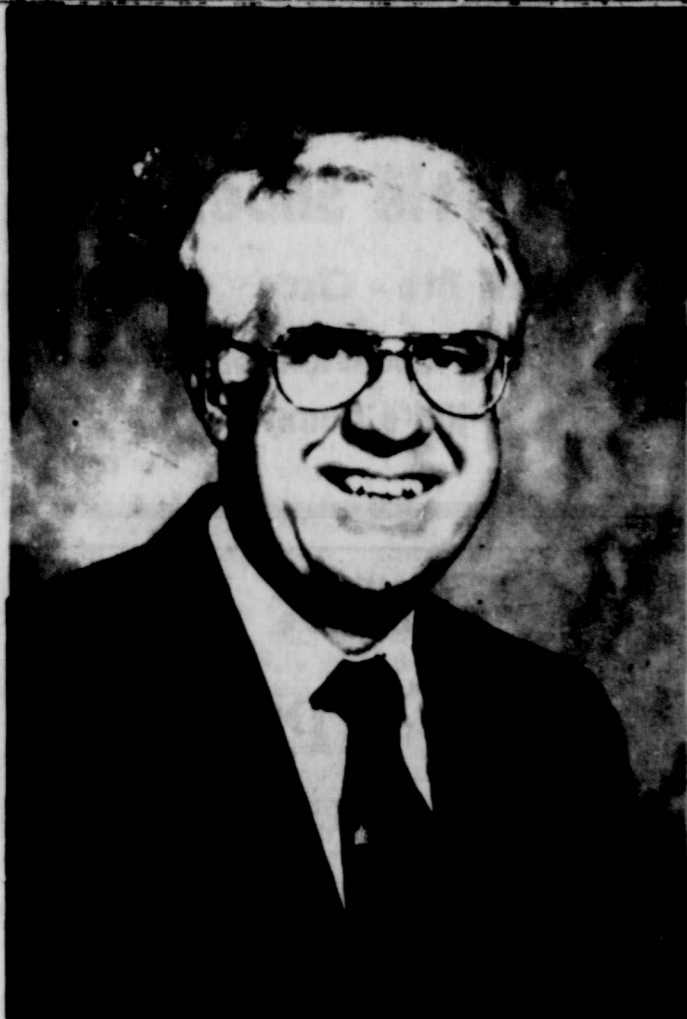
Newbury, president of Howard Payne University, Brownwood. Newbury graduated from Early High School, earned

After hearing a report from the Council's water committee, it was decided to launch an effort to locate underground water in the Nimrod area south of Cisco. City Manager Mike Moore was authorized to meet with land owners and obtain water rights and to begin

making plans for one or more test wells. The Council was given details of state requirements for municipal well water and

on other matters pertaining to test drilling. Mr. Moore said the committee determined that the Nimrod area offered the best potential for

well water in significant amounts.

Deer Harvest Questionnaires Needed

The Texas Parks & Wildlife Department reminds landowners in Eastland County who were issued antlerless deer permits or antlerless deer tags for the 1986-87 hunting season that now is the time to return their deer harvest questionnaires.

The questionnaires, which are attached to the front of the permits or tags, should be completely filled out. The number of antlered bucks, antlerless deer, and turkey harvested for each tract of land for which permits were obtained should be recorded. If none were killed, "0" should be marked in the appropriate blank.

All cards should be returned as soon as possible following the close of deer season. Questionnaires should be returned by the end of January 1987.

Each postcard questionnaire is self-addressed on the back and should be mailed to the Waco Regional Office. Information obtained from these harvest questionnaires will be used to help estimate total deer and turkey harvest for the 1986-87 hunting season and to evaluate existing harvest regulations. The Texas Parks & Wildlife Department will appreciate your prompt reply.

Large Drug Bust In Eastland County

Cecil Ray Bryant, 30, of Abilene, was charged in Eastland Wednesday with possessing and manufacturing amphetamines and with possessing a chemical used to make amphetamines. He was also charged with illegally carrying a weapon, a misdemeanor.

Bryant's arrest occurred Tuesday around 3:50 p.m. during a routine roadblock on Highway 6 south of Eastland. His pickup was headed south when he was stopped by Trooper Richard Treece, one of three Department of Safety officers at the roadblock.

As Treece approached Bryant's vehicle to check his insurance and driver's license he became suspicious of an odor coming from the pickup. He then saw what appeared to be amphetamines and drug lab equipment in the back of the truck. Troopers Steve Tone and Larry Melson stepped over and verified this, and the subject was placed in custody.

The officers notified the DPS Narcotics office in Abilene, then brought Bryant to the DPS office in Eastland. Upon their arrival the narcotics officers confirmed what was suspected, and Bryant was booked into the Eastland County Jail. The officers seized about 60 lbs. of phenylacetone, which is used to make amphetamine.

R.G. Lyerla, Justice of the

Peace, set Bryants bonds at \$40,000 on each of the drug charges and at \$1,000 for the weapons charge, reports Emory Walton, Eastland County district attorney.

The value of the drugs, which could be produced from the material seized is around \$2.5 million wholesale, stated Trooper Richard Treece. The street value of these drugs would be two to three times that amount, the officer said.

That makes this drug bust one of the largest ever in this area.

A change order in Wardrop and Associates' contract for the wastewater treatment facility was approved with a net increase of \$5,946 in the construction cost. The order covered the installation of larger pipe as recommended by the engineers.

Engineers reported to the Council that the contractor will probably request an extension of time for completion of the plant due to some 20 days of rainy weather during December that delayed work on the project. In any event, the Council was told, the project will be completed by the end of February.

The Council approved a resolution supporting strong anti-crime legislation to be presented to the 70th session of the Texas Legislature. Similar action was being considered by cities and counties throughout the state in a combined effort to combat the rising crime rate, the Council was told. Copies of

the resolution will be sent to the district's senator and representative.

A resolution asking the State Highway Department to install street lighting equipment on I-20 at the ramps of interchanges of U.S. Highway 183 and State Highway 206 was approved. The resolution pointed out that the on and off ramps at the west edge of town and at Hilton Avenue "are extremely dark and dangerous in their existing unlighted condition." Copies of the resolution were sent to the county, district and state offices of the highway department and to Senator Glasgow and Representative Parker.

City Judge Douglas Fry submitted a quarterly report for October, November and December, 1986, which showed the collection of a total of \$3,955 in fines. Of this amount, \$3,278 went to the city and \$677 to the state. A total of 86 fines were paid.

The report showed that police issued 122 tickets for traffic violations and handled 22 other complaints during the quarter.

Mayor Joe Wheatley presided over the meeting.

The months of May and June are a period of high anxiety for thousands of parents who have invested time and money and personal sacrifice in the life of a child who is becoming an adult. They know about the beer parties, the camps, the rented motel rooms and apartments that will be crammed with drunken kids, their kids, with car keys in their pockets.

This year, parents and school administrators in a number of Texas communities who are tired of feeling powerless and able to do nothing more than pray and watch the clock on graduation night are determined to do something different. They decided to offer

their child, and every child, an alternative to alcohol at graduation time. They are committing themselves to a program that will show kids they don't need booze to have a good time. Maybe they'll save a life in the bargain.

In Cisco, Senior Class parents are planning to provide an alternative to graduating seniors of the area on graduation night. Already, great plans are being made for Project Graduation for a memorable night. With the consent of Cisco Junior College, area seniors have been offered the use of the College Student Center. How lucky we are to have this facility, with a generous administration, in our town.

The program deserves the support and participation of young men and women who

will be graduating--especially the student leaders in the school. If there is ever a time that visibility, popularity and leadership mean anything, it is at graduation time.

But if this program is going to have the appeal it must have to attract these students, its organizers need the support of this community. They need funds from donations, they need chaperones, fund solicitors, people who will donate food, baked goods, and drinks for the receptions and parties--the whole gamut, from the open wallet to the helping hand.

It is an opportunity for parents and grandparents to do more than feel helpless. All they need to do is contact the high school or a senior parent, volunteering their contribution of time, or money, to a very important cause.

Sure, there will be other parties. Certainly, this is a small step. But someone has to take it if there is ever to be a reduction in the awful human cost of high school graduation festivities.

Senior Students And Parents Want Project Graduation To Help Seniors

"Project Graduation" is a chemical-free celebration concept developed by and for high school students in the state of Maine. The project began at one high school in 1980 after having lost seven seniors in alcohol-related fatal crashes the preceding year. As of the end of the 1984 school year, 103 of 130 high schools in Maine held project graduation activities. The fact that there were no alcohol-related fatal crashes involving students at these schools during the months of May and June for the past three years is testimony enough of the worth of such a project.

The concept has subsequently spread to other states during the past several years, and as a result of a national conference in Springfield, Ill., in March, 1984, introduced a few representatives from the State of Texas. Even though the time remaining to graduation was short, two high schools initiated projects at the end of the school year. Both were highly successful and received statewide attention.

The projects are organized by students, the high school administration, teachers or parents with the support of churches and the local community. Although the project graduations taking place are designed primarily for the graduating class, the development, organization and participation is not necessarily exclusive of other high school students or parents. It would be to the advantage of any underclassman and his parent to help with establishing "Project Graduation." After all, the underclassman will eventually become a graduating senior.

Although graduation is yet months away, the Senior Class parents involved in the organization of "Project Graduation" feel that a well organized activity takes much planning. Smart parents, they feel, do indeed think ahead.

Because of the great undertaking of Project Graduation and its expense, the project must indeed have the support of the community. When you are called upon as a church, community leader, business, or an in-

dividual, please say yes to lend a helping hand, a senior parent said. After all, she ad-

ded, our young people are our tomorrow.

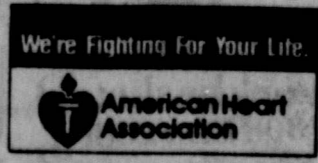

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Attorney Gen. Says Dispatch Logs Are Public Record

According to a letter from the Attorney General's office in Austin, The Eastland County Co-operative Dispatch's daily logs are indeed public record and access should be made to the public.

In August of last year, KVMX owner Buddy Mosier and other media members were denied access to the logs by on-duty dispatchers and the dispatch board.

Dispatch board members and law enforcement representatives from the county agencies informed the media that the dispatch office is a secured area. It was told that the area contained sensitive material, equipment and information.

The dispatch building, located on Highway 6, is two miles south of Eastland. The building has had bars securing the windows and an intercom system installed in the last year for security.

The dispatch board and Eastland Police Chief Lyndall Underwood requested an opinion from the Attorney General's office in the matter of the logs.

The reply from the Attorney General's office read: Mr. G.R. Mercer Chief Dispatcher Eastland County Cooperative Dispatch Mr. Lyndall Underwood Chief of Police, Eastland Eastland, Texas 76448 Dear Mr. Mercer and Mr. Underwood:

You received a request under the Texas Open Records Act, article 6252-17a, V.T.C.S., for a copy of the daily radio log of the Eastland County Cooperative Dispatch. The radio log contains information from six different law enforcement agencies in Eastland County. You indicate that the different law enforcement agencies participating in the cooperative dispatch keep individual daily activity logs which contain the same information.

The law enforcement agencies have offered to release the information in their individual logs. You assert that section 3(a) (8) of the Open Records Act authorizes the cooperative dispatch to withhold the information contained in the cooperative radio log.

Under the Open Records Act, information is open unless it falls within one of the act's specific exceptions to disclosure. Section 3(a)

(8) excepts from disclosure records of law enforcement agencies and prosecutors that deal with the detection, investigation, and prosecution of crime and the internal records and notations of such law enforcement agencies and prosecutors which are maintained for internal use in matters relating to law enforcement and prosecution.

Information is excepted from disclosure by section 3(a) (8) if release of the information will "unduly interfere with law enforcement and crime prevention." Open Records Decision No. 434 (1986) quoting Ex parte Pruitt, supra, at 710.

In Open Records Decision No. 394 (1983), this office determined that information in police department radio logs is ordinarily not excepted from public disclosure. The decision relied on the fact that the radio log contains information which is similar to the information contained in a police blotter. It is well established that the type of information recorded in a police "blotter" must be disclosed. See Houston Chronicle Publishing Company v. City of Houston, 531 S.W.2d 177 (Tex. Civ. App. - Houston (14th Dist.) 1975), writ ref'd n.r.e. per curiam, 536 S.W.2d 559 (Tex. 1976); Open Records Decision Nos. 408 (1984), 394 (1983), 127 (1976). You must therefore release information of the type described in Open Records Decision No. 408 (copy enclosed).

Law enforcement agencies are in best position to know whether the release of particular information will unduly interfere with law enforcement activities. Open Records Decision No. 287 (1981). For this reason, law enforcement agencies must explain why section 3(a) (8) protects particular information unless it is obvious. None of the information you submitted with your request is, on its face, protected by section 3(a) (8).

Moreover, you indicate that the different law enforcement agencies participating in the cooperative dispatch maintain the same information contained in the dispatch's radio log in their individual daily activity logs and that they have offered to release this information on an individual basis. It is dif-

ficult to imagine how release of this information would unduly interfere with law enforcement activities when the information is released by the dispatch but not interfere with law enforcement agencies themselves. Information may be transferred from one governmental agency to another without destroying its confidential character. Attorney General Opinion H-917 (1976). Information which is available to the public from one governmental source, however, cannot ordinarily be closed to the public while it is in the possession of another governmental body. Open Records Decision No. 164 (1977).

Consequently, unless you can show, within 10 days of receipt of this letter, why the release of specific information contained in the radio log will unduly interfere with law enforcement activities, you must release it. Further, even if certain items in the radio log may be protected by section 3(a) (8) or 3(a) (1) (information deemed confidential by law) you must release the remaining information. See Open Records Decision No. 127 (1976). Copies of several opinions of this office are enclosed to provide you with general guidance in determining if any specific items of information in the radio log may be withheld. If we

can be of further assistance, please do not hesitate to contact us.

After reading the letter openly the dispatch board discussed the reply, before agreeing the logs would be

made available to the public from 9 a.m. until 12 noon each day at the dispatch building.

Appointments to review the log must be made in advance before going to the building. Members of the media must also telephone in advance and furnish identification before entering the secured area.

Open Records Opinions

During the past month, Attorney General Jim Mattox issued five opinions involving the Texas Open Meetings and Open Records Acts.

Following are summaries of those opinions:

Opinion No. JM-438: The identities of persons who receive bid packets on a sale of land is subject to disclosure under the Open Records Act.

Opinion No. JM-584: In the absence of specific legislation authorization, a governmental body that meets by telephone conference call will not comply with the Texas Open Meetings Act.

Opinion No. JM-590: Information received by the Comptroller of Public Accounts from a taxpayer in support of a request for a refund of sales taxes paid is excepted from disclosure under the

Open Records Act.

Opinion No. JM-595: The Dallas Rapid Transit Authority is a governmental agency subject to the Open Meetings Act. It is not authorized to discuss in executive session written evaluations and recommendations about the selection of professional consultants and competitive bidders. Nor does the Authority possess constitutionally based "executive privilege" to discuss such subjects in executive session.

Opinion No. JM-596: A nonprofit water supply corporation organized under Section 15.006, and 16.002, and 17.002 of the Water Code is required to comply with the Texas Open Records Act and the Texas Open Meetings Act, if it receives state financial assistance.

Steel rods will be placed on each side of Ms. Letney's spine during the surgeries, which are expected to last about eight hours each.



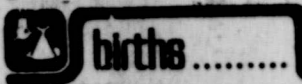
