Four Contracts Renewed For 87-88 School Year At Meeting

The contracts of Principals Jack Martin, Jim Puryear and Bob Lindsey and Business Manager Mar-

tha Davis were renewed for the 1987-88 school year at the monthly business meeting of the board of trustees of the

Cisco Independent School District last Monday night. Mr. Martin is in his first year as high school prin-

cipal, coming here last fall from Houston. Mr. Puryear is completing his 17th year in the Cisco schools, and Mr. Lindsey joined the faculty 11 years ago. Mrs. Davis is in her 21st year with the local school system.

In other action, the board discussed the old primary school building but reached no decision on its disposition. It has been surplus since the first three primary grades were moved to the new school last fall. The building has been advertised for sale.

The board decided to hold their next meeting on March 5th instead of March 9th due to the latter date falling in the period of annual spring break. Supt. Ray Saunders gave trustees a report on various routine school activities.



Food Precautions

COLLEGE STATION-- What should you do when the hamburger doesn't look quite right?

You can take a chance on it and risk the uncomfortable symptoms of a food borne illness. Or you can throw it out and wonder if you've just wasted good food - and money.

"Almost everyone knows that when meat isn't refrigerated and handled properly it can become contaminated by bacteria, but many people don't know how to tell a safe from a risky practice in preparing meat at home," says Mary Kinney Sweeten, a nutritionist with the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service.

Sweeten gives the following answers to some common questions that consumers ask about meat safety:

Can I use raw ground beef that turned brown after a day or two in the refrigerator?

The color of meat is determined by the amount of oxygen with which it has come into contact. So brown hamburger may be as safe as pink hamburger. However, it's a good idea to keep raw ground beef in the refrigerator no longer than two days. Don't use the meat if it has an off odor or was left unrefrigerated for a time.

Since has already been preserved by smoking and salting, can I thaw a frozen ham on the counter?

As with any type of meat, the safest way to thaw ham is in the refrigerator. The

smoking and salting processes don't make the meat immune to bacteria. A number of manufacturers are lowering the salt content of cured meat which may also make them more likely to become contaminated under these circumstances.

I have an unopened package of hot dogs that has been in the refrigerator for a week. Will the hot dogs be o.k. to eat?

Because hot dogs come in vacuum-sealed packages they can be kept in the refrigerator for up to two weeks. After opening, the hot dogs should be used within seven days.

I had a steak thawing in the refrigerator and then decided to go out to eat so I put it back in the freezer. Is the steak still good?

The steak is safe to eat if there were still some ice crystals in the meat when you put it back in the freezer. Be sure to thaw the frozen meat in the refrigerator and to cook it well. The refreezing may have caused the flavor and texture to deteriorate somewhat.

If you can safely eat a steak that's pink in the middle, why not a meatloaf?

Because ground meat undergoes a great deal of handling, it's more likely to be exposed to bacteria than other forms of beef. So meat loaf should be cooked until it is brown or pinkish brown in the center to insure that bacteria have been destroyed. By using a meat thermometer and cooking the meatloaf to an internal temperature of 170 degrees Fahrenheit, you can also be sure it's safe.

Fishing Outdoors

"Lake Brownwood Record Broken"

Lone Star Bass Association Inc. has opened up a new path for anglers in the West Texas area. 1987 is the first year a quality fishing circuit has been set up for the anglers in our area in a long time.

The rest of the field was left out in the cold so to speak. Next stop on the 1987 Lone Star tour will be O.C. Fisher, March 7 and 8. at Lake Fairfield Thursday, and his catch now is the third entry in the state's new "Share a Lone Star Lunger" program.

David Campbell, superintendent of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department's Tyler Fish Hatchery, said he took a tank truck to the lake Thursday night to pick up the female fish which was kept in excellent condition after capture.

The big fish hit a jig/worm combination similar to the lure used for the two previous Lone Star Lunger entries, one of which is the current state record 17-pound, 11-ounce bass caught from Lake Ford during November.

Campbell said Gadberry and two partners also caught two bass heavier than eight pounds and another six-pounder on the same outing. The big fish was 24 1/4 inches long and a hefty 21 1/4 inches in girth.

Anglers who participate in the lunger program by donating 13-pound-plus largemouths receive considerable statewide publicity and also are offered the option of having the fish mounted free by corporate sponsors of the program or receiving a fiberglass replica and releasing the fish back into the wild.

Meanwhile, the department uses the fish for hatchery propagation of fingerling bass to be stocked in the state's public reservoirs. Biologists hope the big fishes' genetic potential for growth will be passed along to the offspring.

Corporate sponsors are Lone Star Brewery, Cajun Boats and Jungle Labs, Inc. Persons catching bass that might qualify may call toll-free 1-800-792-1112 from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. weekdays. After hours, call (512) 389-4848, or the Tyler Hatchery at (214) 592-7570.

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1987 Exemption Forms Available For Eastland County Property Owners

Eastland County property owners wishing to sign up for 1987 property tax exemptions and/or special land valuations may obtain the necessary application forms at the office of the Eastland County Appraisal District in the Eastland County Courthouse.

The completed applications must be on file with the Appraisal District by May 1, 1987, if they are to be allowed for the 1987 tax year.

A list of several of the exemptions available appears at the end of this article. If a property owner has any questions as to his or her eligibility, they should contact the Appraisal District for assistance.

It is emphasized that a Residential Homestead exemption does not have to be applied for every year. If the residential homestead owner still resides in the same house for 1987 that he or she lived in for 1986; they do not have to file again if they received the exemption on the property in 1986. An exception to this would be the residential homeowner who turned 65 years of age before January 1, 1987; they need to sign up for the Over-65 exemption that is available for Over-65 homeowners.

If you have any doubts as to whether you are receiving

a Homestead exemption or as to your eligibility, please contact the Appraisal District. The Appraisal District office is located on the second floor of the Eastland County Courthouse

and the telephone number is 629-6597.

Business Renditions Are Due By April 1

Section 22.01 of the State Property Tax Code requires that business personal property be rendered each year. The rendition period began on January 1 and continues through April 1, 1987. Renditions filed after that date cannot be considered timely filed.

Rendition forms are in the process of being mailed out to those business owners who have not already filed for the 1987 year. If you do not receive a rendition form, you may pick one up in the office of the Eastland County Appraisal District. If it is in-

convenient to stop by, the request for the rendition can be handled by telephone at 629-6597.

If you receive a rendition for a business that you no longer own or has ceased to be in operation, you should still note the situation on the rendition form and return it to the Appraisal District.

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Handicap Can't Keep A Good Man Down

Pecos' Starky Warren can play the guitar, and he also enjoys water skiing.

But just as important to the 29-year-old who for more than a year could not even feed himself are simple maneuvers like picking up a dime between his thumb and forefinger or holding a glass of ice tea with his fingertips.

Warren's thumbs are actually two toes from his right foot.

After an electrical accident two years ago, Warren thought himself lucky to be alive. While repairing a motor control box at a gravel plant, 480 volts of electricity - four times that which is needed to light a residential

home - jolted through his body from one hand to the other.

"As soon as it hit me, I knew what happened," Warren recalled.

"When I woke up, I was on the floor. I was in an upstairs control room, and I had to walk downstairs and about 200 feet before anyone saw me. It was an act of God that I could do that," he said.

"I remember looking at my hands. The skin just looked melted."

Both hands and forearms were severely burned, and his fingers were crippled. His thumbs were virtually lifeless.

A doctor in Odessa referred Warren to Dr. Harry Buncke at Davies Medical Center in San Francisco. Buncke pioneered toe-to-thumb transplants in America, and since his first in 1972, his surgical team has successfully performed 60 such operations.

"I figure there's not one in ten, though, that had both hands worked on," Warren noted.

He's not bragging - he's simply still amazed by the process.

First, doctors attempted to save Warren's left thumb by grafting it to his hip. When that didn't work, they took his big toe and put it on his

hand.

The second toe on his foot took the place of his right thumb. The top knuckle of his middle finger on that same hand was also useless, so it was removed and rehabilitated with therapy was Warren's left forefinger, which some doctors said would never straighten out and might as well be amputated.

Warren now works full time at a local furniture store. He repairs and installs all types of furniture and appliances.

"Really, I haven't found anything I can't do now that I couldn't do before," Warren said. "I may be a little slower on some things..."

Warren can find some humor out of the past three years, though he refers to them as the "roughest" in his life.

Laughing, he recalled hav-

ing to ask a stranger at an airport restroom to buckle his pants. Then his tone grew serious.

"Really, it was those little things that made it so hard," he said.

"It's been the pits," Warren added. "If it hadn't been for my wife, Jackie, I never would have made it through."

Warren also has four children: Troy, 12, Trever, 6,

Dana, 5 and Donna, 2.

"They used to always ask me, and still they ask me, 'Is that really your toe, Daddy?' And I say, 'Yeah,' and I try to explain it to them."

"To me, it's a thumb," he said. "I call it a thumb."

Starky is the grandson of Berniece Tankersley of Eastland, and the son of Doug and Brenda Warren of Pecos.

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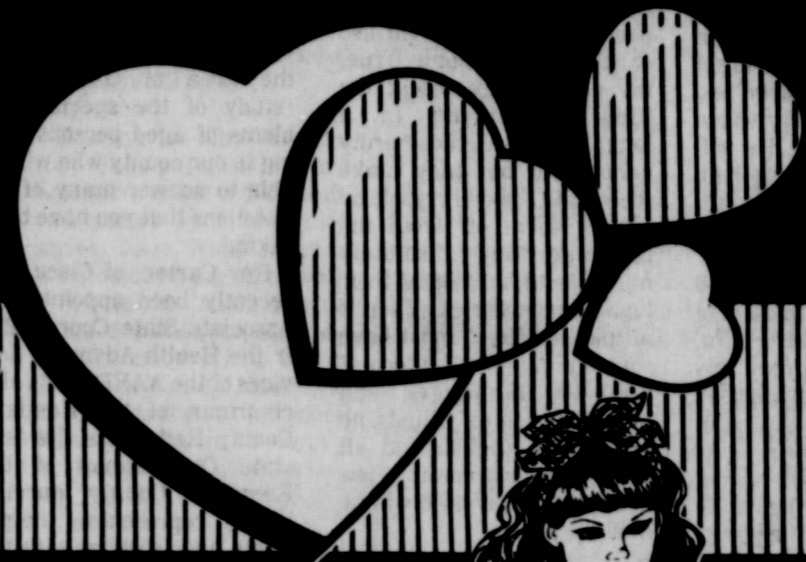
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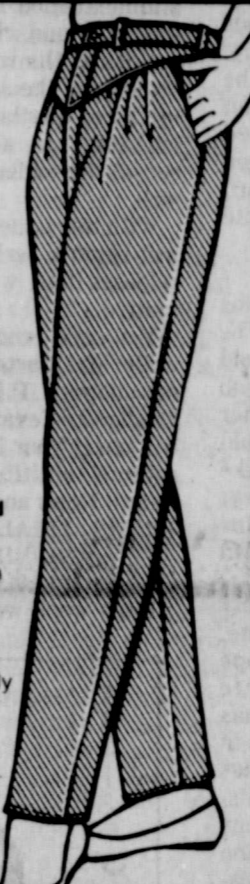
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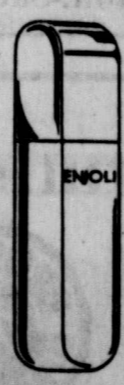

I certainly never would have guessed that the number of illiterate adults in the country was as high as one in five. Twenty percent is just fantastically high. Still, it has been too long since I heard the percentage of draftees rejected because they were illiterate. It was high.

Probably someone thinking he is sharp plead illiteracy to avoid service in the future. The shock will set in when a war starts and they again take every warm body they can find. He will learn that even in our high tech services somebody still has to collect garbage and guess who that will be.

In WW II we sure had them. My brother told me of a hillbilly who said to him, "Sargint, Ah caint read this here requisition. Ah kin read printin writin but Ah caint read no writin writin."

Then in my outfit in boot camp there was Albert. He was a fine strong young man from Alabama who shocked me when he took me aside and asked me to read him a letter from his girlfriend. He told me he hoped I wouldn't laugh nor tell the others he couldn't read nor write. What made me blush was not only what she wrote him but the really mushy stuff he had me write her in reply. He had me tell her who I was and wanted his praise of me written exactly as he told it. I tried to cut that down a little closer to size. The next thing I knew she was picking me out some sweet prospects in Alabama. I tried to beg off by telling them both that I had to go to accompany him home. We got our first leave. That was not, I repeat was NOT why I was so mad when they cheated our outfit at all before shipping us to Guadalcanal. Anyhow they broke the outfit up as we finished basic and I never saw Albert again.

There was notice in the paper about this learn to read program and the sign on the door of the library gives a number to call. The puzzle is as to how an illiterate can read either. Obviously a friend will have to tell them. But if they are so embarrassed by their inability as to only seek help as filling out forms away from home then only a minimum number will be reached.

It might be hoped that family or friends who now help the illiterate might not want them dependent longer or consider how lost that person might be if anything happened to them. That person could tactfully inform them about the program or better still obtain the teaching aids provided free and with the advantage of already close contact enlighten the individual. I glanced over some of it and it struck me as quite good (read that EASY).

I consider the children of foreign born people particularly unfortunate if the parents discourage their use of English in the home. True, the parent may resent the kids conversing in a language themselves hardly understand but they make their child a social cripple by cutting them off from the language they absolutely must use to function at their highest in America. Even if all public offices must have someone able to interpret minority languages and though notices must be printed in English and all other tongues in common use in the area, the child will be missing a lot.

It may be that some of our illiterates fall in this group. Yet another group are the dislectics. Some can not read, some struggled through school not even knowing why it was so hard but getting part of it in spite of.

A niece in California was afflicted with dislexia. The counselor in high school told her she should get a job where she only used her hands because she could never cut it in anything like business. Unless that counselor has gone into a far more profitable line than most schools, that little girl has her bested financially many times over. True, Delora's mother had to tape record the real estate manual for her but she has her broker's license, lives in a house worth many times over my own net worth, raised and sent to college four boys and a girl, manages the business ends of her husband's garage, does public service work, owns several choice pieces of real estate and has agents working for her.

So what is a handicap?

Some overcome and some are overcome by handicaps. The right kind of help at the right time just might make the difference too.

He is a state Ombudsman of the Eastland County nursing homes, representing the patients and working with the administration in regard to the care and rights of the residents. QUESTION: I am on Medicare and I understand I must pay to enter the hospital. Is this true?

ANSWER: If you expect medicare to pay your hospital bill you must pay the first \$50. This is deductible on Part A (the hospital part) of your Medicare claim.

QUESTION: I have been told I can be refused entry to the hospital even if I have Medicare. Why is this?

ANSWER: You will not be refused entry to the hospital just because you have Medicare. You may have to pay the expenses if the provider (hospital) determines the cause for entering the hospital is not covered by Medicare.

QUESTION: My aunt is 70 years old and must be put in a nursing home. Will Medicare pay for the services?

ANSWER: Medicare will only pay for a period of time if the provider (the nursing home) is classified as a Skilled Nursing Home. Ask your Nursing Home Administrator if they are classified as a Skilled Nursing Facility and eligible for Medicare payment.

An Open Letter To The Microplex

On Sunday, January 11th, I was passing by Cisco, on my way to California. My car died, a very sudden death (I was to learn later).

I am a resident of Marshall, Texas a widow, 55 years old. I am a nurse, employed at a local hospital. An average middleclass granny, not much different, than most of you reading this letter.

That Sunday as I was traveling toward California to conclude some legal matters, I found myself in a terrifying dilemma. Stretched on I-20 just past the truck stop with cars and trucks

passing by within inches of me, trying desperately to get someone's attention. I suddenly became invisible! No one stopped, all eyes carefully avoided me. There was no acknowledgement that I even existed!

Panic, cold terror, flooded my mind with images of stories I had heard about women stranded and alone. The fear inside me was screaming, this is not really happening, this is a nightmare!!!

All I could say was God please help me! As the panic subsided I looked around me. There was a house back toward Cisco on the same side of the road. The young man that came to the door, did not hesitate to offer his assistance. Thank you Guy (I don't remember your last name). Unable to restart my VW he then transported me to David and Patsy Sims house. All of them towed my car to their garage. The verdict was, "only Joe Barton in Ranger could help."

The first night I stayed at the motel but at over \$30.00 a day I knew I would be unable to stay there again due to the quote for "repairs".

Thank you David and Patsy and Guy - you picked me up and did all that you could do freely and unselfishly. Then you referred me to the other people that helped me on my way.

Joe Barton towed my car to Ranger and Yvonne McFadin drove me to the Eastland Community Christian Outreach at 412 No. Bassett 76448. Thank you Yvonne.

They call it a "Mission", its an old dilapidated (damaged by flood waters, a train wreck and time) church building. It's pitiful, and gloomy and depressing. The plumbing was inadequate, the floor is swollen and buckled, it is cold and drafty no matter how long the little grates burn. It is heaven and sanctuary when there is no place else for you. The light and love of welcome transform it's shabbiness; there is peace, a short space to regroup and decide how to continue. There is good news that God really does care about individual people and their calamities great or small.

Squeezed into 3 tiny rooms at the back of this disaster

are Don and Sharon Hutchison, with their 3 sons, Daniel, Robert and Joshua. Don and Sharon both work outside jobs to pay their own expenses and also help with the food and occasional medical expenses for those who come to "Rock House" in such desperate need. This must be remedied! The work of the mission is 24 hrs. a day 7 days a week.

Don and Sharon believe that God has called them to be missionaries right here. This outreach is under the covering of a small local congregation that support it faithfully. Their vision has kept "Rock House" alive for over 2 yrs. and they are continuing to give and believe that this vision will be seen by all who name the name of Christ and includes every caring citizen of the Microplex. This vision can become fully born, if each person reading this letter would purpose in their heart to do something no matter how small it appears. A flood is made by each little drop of water. A couple of dollars a week, every week, some plumbing, some repairs, some carpet. There is a desperate need for a decent, running van. Any good usable item of clothing, especially baby clothes and childrens clothes, coats, jackets, shoes. Buy a dozen pair of socks, or underwear.

Sharon is a licensed nurse and works with the functionally impaired at a home in Eastland. I asked her what the most difficult thing they had to deal with was and her immediate reply was, "the children; the often sick and frightened children, of desperate, out of work parents, locally and also passing thru, looking for jobs in Florida or California."

She went on to say we, "never turn anyone away," but the need is so very great and we can do so little sometimes." (Doctors, they need doctors to volunteer). "I know folks here would help, if they only knew about the children." She said, "when I am alone I cry for the children."

Don and Sharon give highest praise to police and sheriffs departments in the Microplex. They really help out especially the day a man pulled five hand grenades out of his back-pack - after they had fed him and threatened to blow the place up.

It is apparent that the "missionaries" and their children face many situations that are just as hazardous as any missionary in Africa or Timbuctoo - this is commitment. They have no phone.

On this past Thanksgiving and Christmas approximately 80 people were fed, clothed and toys furnished.

Thank you Goodfellows and Kiwanis. Thank you Eastland First Christian Church Pastor Shirley and the good ladies that served

their fellow man. Don and Sharon express their gratitude to every person that has helped with food, clothes and money. Please continue!!! Because it all adds up to blessings, for everyone concerned he that gives and he that receives.

When I was a little girl, I remember singing a song that said, Brighten the corner where you are; it still works.

This little grandma thanks you; for what began as a calamity has turned into an inspiration, an idea, a model of what any community can do to reach out to this broken and bleeding generation. All of us can do something because sometime, some place, that person in trouble could be you.

Small Business Survey Sets Agenda

AUSTIN - The greatest concern of small business today is how the Legislature is going to deal with a \$5.8 billion deficit, according to a spokesman for the National Federation of Independent Business.

"Small-business owners will be watching closely any increases or changes in the tax structure," said Robert Stuka Jr., director of governmental relations for NFIB/Texas. "We expect legislators to make a concerted effort to deal with the deficit by cutting budgets rather than increasing taxes," Stuka added.

On a 1986 survey, seven out of ten NFIB/Texas small-business owners favored increasing the state sales tax from 4.1 percent to 5 percent to increase state coffers and offset the deficit. "But we only support such a measure, if it's absolutely necessary to raise revenues," Stuka said.

"Small business will support lawmakers as long as they show good faith by continuing to reduce spending before approaching business for help," he added.

In addition, liability insurance, workers' compensation and unemployment insurance are targets of reform for NFIB/Texas members. Eighty-one percent of those polled on the 1987 survey favor legislation that would allow competitive pricing of workers' comp. rates. Three out of four members favor a proposal that would allow small businesses to set up group self-insurance plans for workers' comp. coverage.

And almost nine out of ten members (87 percent) favor amending the Employment

Security Act so a claimant's qualification for unemployment benefits is determined by the reason he left his last covered job, instead of his last employment.

Two other issues NFIB will be spearheading, include government competition, and stiffer penalties for bad-check writers.

On a 1986 survey, 64 percent of those surveyed favor legislation that would curtail state and county agencies competing in the private marketplace. According to Stuka, small-business owners want not-for-profit

groups and government agencies to stop operation commercial sidelines with untaxed resources.

Small-business owners believe that not-for-profit groups have an unfair advantage. These groups and government agencies use taxpayer provided equipment and personnel to reduce the cost of their not-for-profit activities.

Seventy-five percent of the members polled support legislation requiring bad-check writers to pay up to three times the amount of the check if the check is not made good within 30 days.

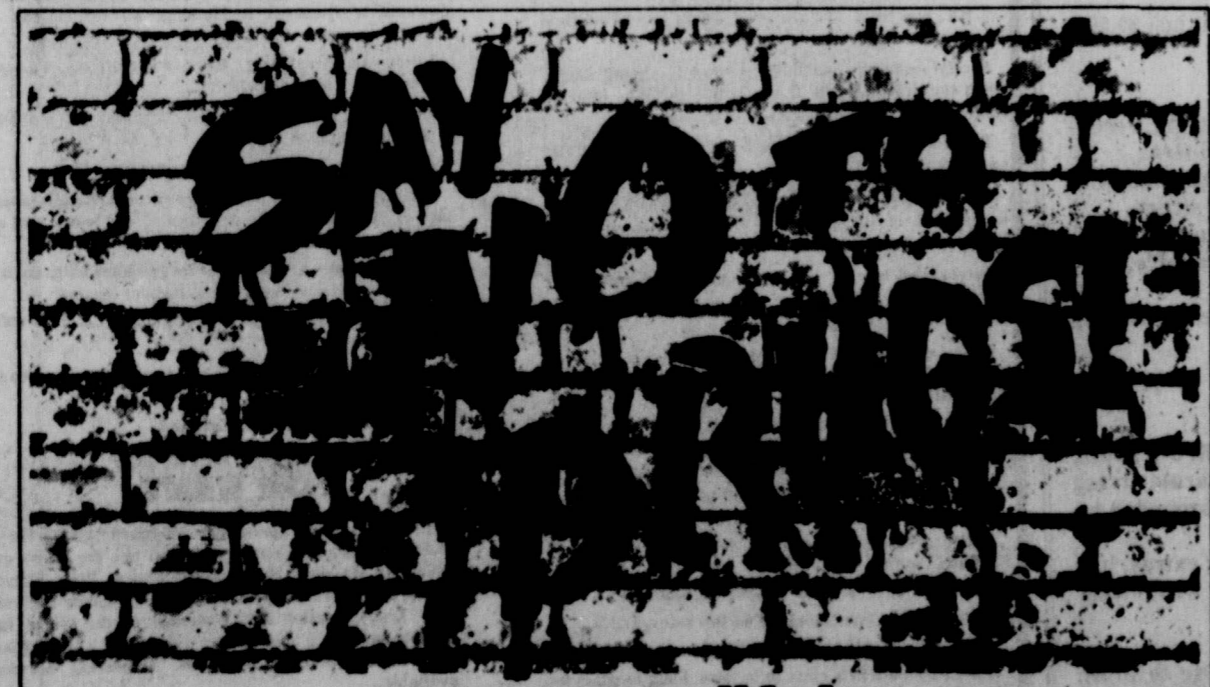

Lengthy Meeting For County Commissioners

Eastland County Commissioners spent most of Monday at the Courthouse working on a lengthy agenda. All Commissioners were present except Billy Bacon, who was ill.

Two petitions were received, one requesting that Spur 490 off I-20 become a Farm-To-Market Road and be paved 8 miles to joint FM 2526 west of Carbon. The other petition requested that the rural road on the north side of Lake Cisco be declared a county road and maintained by the county.

Supervisors from the Texas State Highway Department also met with the Commissioners to discuss bridge repair and roads.

During the morning bids were opened for deposit of county funds, and other bids were considered for repairs to the Courthouse.

The Courthouse repair bids were rejected, partly due to lack of specifications in a number of the proposals. Six offices are to be repaired, and bidding will be resumed at a later date.

In other business, Sheriff Don Underwood outlined what he described as "several problems" at the jail. He requested line-item changes in his budget to allow for the correction of these matters.

The phone system in the jail was worn out, he said, and the Intercom system was also worn out. The phone system is leased from AT&T, and costs around \$89 per month. He suggested replacing the system with other phones under a purchase agreement.

Commissioner Norman Christian remarked that the AT&T system was "Good, reliable equipment when it was installed," and that he felt certain it could be repaired. But he agreed that it might be cheaper to purchase a System than to lease one.

The Commissioners approved a budget amendment to allow Sheriff Underwood to provide adequate phone service for the jail.

The Sheriff also said that the amount of office work and record keeping at the jail made it necessary to hire a part-time worker to assist in the office. He spoke of the difficulties of having to combine the qualifications of that of a jail matron with that of a computer operator. The Commissioners voted approval of a line-item change to hire a worker in the office.

The Sheriff offered another suggestion for the

Commissioners - that of a lease plan to provide new cars for his Department rather than purchasing older cars and having to repair them. The Commissioners stated they would study the matter.

In a decision of compliance of the County Jail with the State Jail Standards Commission, County Judge Bailey stated his understanding of a need to have a definite plan for jail enlargement when he and the Commissioners meet with the Commission in Austin on March 25. One estimate he had was for 12 additional cells for \$350,000.

Commissioners Vote On Funds Deposit

County Commissioners voted Monday to deposit County General and Trust Funds in the same facilities which have held them for the past two years.

The First National Bank of Cisco will serve as Depository for the General Funds, and Eastland National Bank will hold the District Clerk's Trust Fund. Olney Savings will handle the County Clerk's Trust Fund.

The two banks and Olney Savings each bid for the deposit of all three funds, with the bids being very similar. Most interest-bearing accounts were quoted as around 5.25 percent interest. A number of services were offered at no charge to the county.

Grover Hallmark, President of the Eastland National Bank, spoke on behalf of his bank. Dick Wooley, President, spoke for the First National Bank of Cisco. Ron Butler, Area Manager, spoke for Olney Savings.

Citizens Request

Paving On Road From I-20

A number of citizens appeared before the Commis-

sioners Court Monday with a petition requesting the paving of a road from Spur 490 south of I-20 to FM 2526 west of Carbon.

Landowners from along the road who were present in the Courtroom were Fred Brown, David Kerr, Frank Pounds, and Mrs. Harry Holt. Pct. 1 Commissioner Richard Robinson, who lives along the route, also spoke in favor of the project.

Fred Brown presented the petition, which he said had 115 signatures. All these people did not live along the road, he explained, but all travel the road. There are 14 permanent residents on the road.

Brown spoke in favor of the project, and said that property owners had indicated they would donate the FM right-of-way. This would be 20 ft. more on each side than the present road.

Richard Robinson said there are several commercial businesses along the route, and the road would provide easier access for travel to them and all who use the road. The requested paving would be 8 miles long, and cross the South Fork of the Leon River in the Pleasant Valley area.

The Petition will be filed with the State Highway Department for consideration.

Residents Request

Road Assistance

"We feel like a group of people in the water between two ships, one called 'County' and the other 'City'," stated John McGuire of Lake Cisco to the Commissioners Court Monday, speaking of the rural road difficulties on the north side of the Lake.

"We've been under twice and are headed down again, while persons in the ships discuss the technicalities of how to throw out a life-raft," he continued.

McGuire, who headed a delegation of residents and

property owners at the Lake, presented a Petition to the Court signed by a number of citizens. The Petition requested that the 4-5 miles of roadway along the north shore of the Lake be declared a County road, and that the County repair and maintain it.

Some of those who signed were in the Courtroom, and they took turns in a sometimes heated discussion of the road situation in that part of Pct. 4. Members of the delegation appeared disappointed at the absence of Billy Bacon, Commissioner of the Precinct, who was reported to be ill. "He's the main one we wanted to see," several people remarked.

McGuire described the situation on the lake road as "dangerous", and passed around photographs showing bad culverts, holes in the road, jagged rocks and mud. He stated that around 35 persons live year-round at the lake, with more than 200 city-owned lots in the area. Home owners pay a lease to the City of Cisco for use of the property, but also pay county taxes on their homes.

"Some say it is a county road, some a city road," McGuire explained. He said that C.B. Dill former Commissioner of Pct. 4, had assisted in maintaining the road during most of his term of office.

But about six months ago maintenance of the road slackened off, McGuire continued. He said that since the term of Billy Bacon began on Jan. 1, 1987 there had been no work on the road at all.

Mr. Bacon was reported as refusing to grade the road, saying that "he wouldn't do anything until the city did".

Some of the delegation also quote Bacon as saying that he "needed a go-ahead from the Commissioner's Court" and that the Lake area was not included in his Precinct budget.

McGuire, along with Judge Scott Bailey, Cisco City Manager Mike Moore and Lake resident Sutton Crofts filled in some of the history of the north shore development and its road.

Judge Bailey said there had been some type of agreement years ago between Cisco and the County regarding the maintenance of the road. The city was to keep up culverts and bridges, and the county grade the road. This worked fairly well, he said.

Mike Moore stated that he could find no record of any such agreement in Cisco City Council minutes. He also

Citing improperly addressed circulars as one of the reasons for regularly discarding tons of direct-mailed pieces, an official of the U.S. Postal Service has revealed:

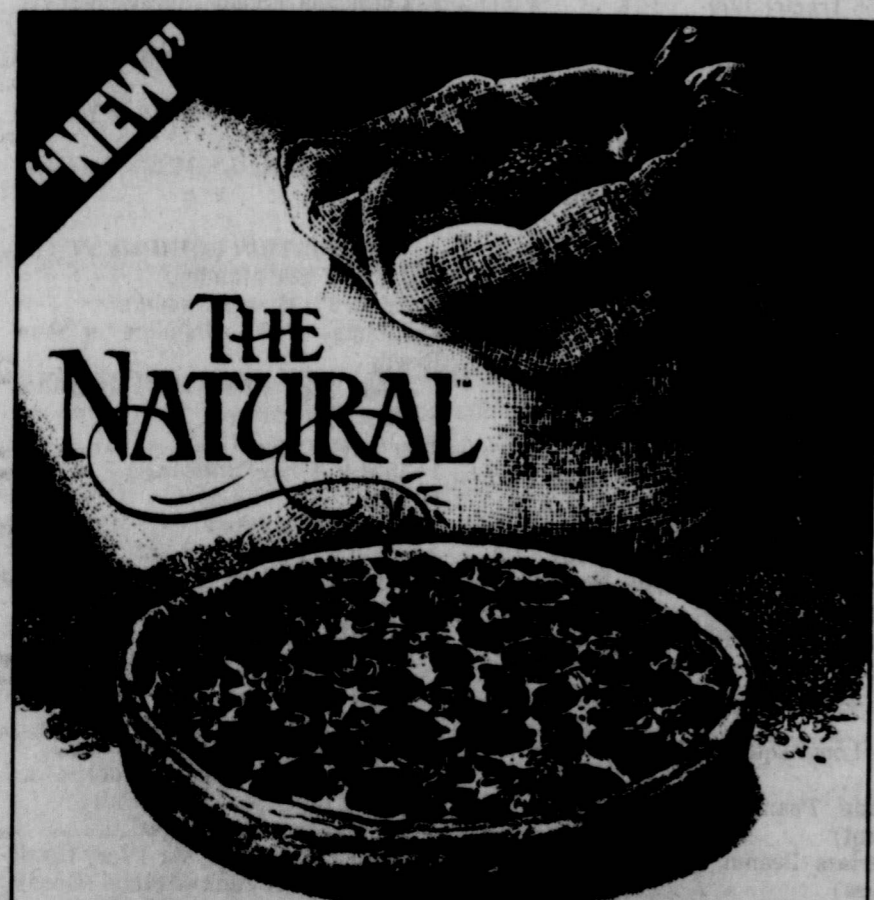
"An audit of more than 85 post offices around the country showed an average of about 14 percent of all direct mailings are dumped into the trash cans rather than being delivered to households.

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Senator Glasgow To Begin Weekly Legislature Reports

Senator Bob Glasgow (D-Stephenville) stated that he will begin reporting major issues addressed by the Regular Session of the 70th Legislature on a weekly basis.

The current Session is expected to take up such issues as prison reform, tort reform, education and home equity lending. With such controversial concerns coming before the Legislature, the Senator stated that he is currently reviewing the recommendations presented by various House and Senate Committee reports along with the ideas submitted by his constituents.

In a speech delivered in Austin by the Senator on January 28, 1987, to the Governmental Affairs Conference of the Credit Union League of Texas, Senator Glasgow presented what he labeled as a "progressive" plan to alleviate part of the State's economic crisis caused by the instability of the oil and gas industry. Senator Glasgow came out in favor of changing the current Texas law to allow individual homeowners to borrow against the equity in their homes.

He stated that if the Texas laws were changed, Texas would potentially have an additional \$4.4 billion annually channeled back into the Texas economy, with an increase of over 34,000 new Texas jobs. Senator Glasgow also cited the benefits taxpayers could receive if such Legislation were enacted. The Senator stated that he

is currently preparing legislation to allow homeowners to borrow against their equity and at the same time providing safeguards for the more vulnerable segments of the population. When questioned

further about the adequacy of the safeguards, he stated that he would not support any amended version of the bill that would erode the sanctity and integrity of the rights of the elderly to be secure in their later years.

West Texas Utilities Company is expected to make application for a rate increase in the various cities the electric firm serves during the current year. Director Sherwyn McNair of the Communications Department told the Cisco Lions Club in a talk at their weekly luncheon last Wednesday noon.

The company has not had a rate increase in more than two year, he said, and expenses have continued to mount. For many years, the company was able to meet growing costs through expansion and even cut rates a dozen times over the years, he added.

WTUC has some 178,000 customers in the territory it serves - from Shamrock in the Texas Panhandle to Abilene and south of Junction and west to Presidio. The firm has some 5,000 miles of transmission lines connected with nine generating stations.

The company's new Oklahoma generating station is due to go on line this year. It has been under construction since 1982 and will reach peak production in 1987. It is presently undergoing assorted tests at the plant site near Vernon in the Lake Kemp area.

The new coal-fired station uses fuel mined in Wyoming and brought to them in 110-car Burlington trains, Mr. McNair said. The plant will enable WTU to stabilize fuel costs, which have fluctuated considerably during the past few years as gas rates have been coming down. Three of the Central and South West System's plants, including WTU, own the new plant.

Mr. McNair said WTU's history began in this region in 1912 when the old American Public Service Co. bought the Cisco Gas & Electric Co. In the early days, each town served by the company had its own generator and it was not until a few years later that the towns were connected together in an electricity transmission system.

The company has endeavored to keep a step with progress over the years, Mr. McNair said.

Lion Jack Kennedy served as program chairman and introduced Mr. McNair whose offices are at WTU's headquarters in Abilene.

President Olin Odum told the club that the board of directors, meeting last Tuesday morning, began studying plans for the annual July 4th program at City Park. Bob Hurst of Irving was a guest.

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Senior Class Parents Help

For any parent, it is a terrible thing to contemplate and an awful, impossible thing to live with—the tragedies that seem, inevitably, to accompany the excitement and pride of high school graduation week.

Parents try their best to explain the facts of life, and booze, to kids. Forbidding alcoholic beverages, preaching temperance, warning of the consequences of drinking and driving—all of it works, a little, but not if it can completely overcome the irresistible social pressures, the coercive peers, the temptation unleashed on any high school student, especially this time of year.

Some kids listen, some of them don't; but every parent knows that it only takes one time, one party, one concession to the crowd and a drunken trip behind the wheel to snuff out a life that was given so much love and held so much promise.

The months of May and June are a period of high anxiety for thousands of parents who have invested time and money and personal sacrifice in the life a child who is becoming an adult. They know about the beer parties, the camps, the rented motel rooms and apartments that will be crammed with drunken kids, their kids, with car keys in their pockets.

This year, parents and school administrators in a number of Texas communities who are tired of feeling powerless and able to do nothing more than pray and watch the clock on graduation night are determined to do something different. They decided to offer their child, and every child, an alternative to alcohol at graduation time. They are committing themselves to a

program that will show kids they don't need booze to have a good time. Maybe they'll save a life in the bargain.

In Cisco, Senior Class parents are planning to provide an alternative to graduating seniors of the area on graduation night. Already, great plans are being made for Project Graduation for a memorable night. With the consent of Cisco Junior College, area seniors have been offered the use of the College Student Center. How lucky we are to have this facility, with a generous administration, in our town.

The program deserves the support and participation of young men and women who will be graduating—especially the student leaders in the school. If there is ever a time that visibility, popularity and leadership mean anything, it is at graduation time.

But if this program is going to have the appeal it must have to attract these students, its organizers need the support of this community. They need funds from donations, they need chaperones, fund solicitors, people who will donate food, baked goods, and drinks for the receptions and parties—the whole gamut, from the open wallet to the helping hand.

It is an opportunity for parents and grandparents to do more than feel helpless. All they need to do is contact the high school or a senior parent, volunteering their contribution of time, or money, to a very important cause.

Sure, there will be other parties. Certainly, this is a small step. But someone has to take it if there is ever to be a reduction in the awful human cost of high school graduation festivities.

Farmers Need To Enter Program

Temple—Farmers who want to bid to enter their highly erodible cropland into USDA's 10-year Conservation Reserve Program may do so during the program's fourth sign-up period from February 9 through 27.

The criteria for determining highly erodible land, however, will not be available until the Final Rules are published, hopefully before February 9.

USDA has also announced a one-time, one-year "bonus" for the 1987 crop to be paid in the form of an increased annual payment. The bonus will be equal to \$2.00 times the farm program payment yield for corn times the number of acres of corn base designated for enrollment in the Reserve.

The bonus will be payable in the form of generic commodity certificates when a 1987 CRP contract is accepted. During the sign-up period, producers will be given the option to enter into a CRP contract beginning with either the 1987 or 1988 crop year.

Under provisions of a recent amendment to the legislation authorizing CRP, alfalfa and other multiyear grasses and legumes in rotation during the year 1981-1985, as approved by the Secretary of Agriculture, will be considered to be "agricultural commodities" for the purpose of determining eligibility of land to be placed in CRP.

Annual payments for 10 years will compensate farmers for retiring highly erodible land from crop production. The amount of the payment is determined by

the accepted bid per acre and the number of accepted acres.

Participants will also receive cost-share assistance for establishing grass, tree, or wildlife plants on the acreage placed in the reserve. Hunting is allowed on the land but no crops can be harvested while it is in the reserve.

For information about the reserve, contact any local office of the USDA Soil Conservation Service, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, or the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.
