## Fifth Person Arraigned In Garcia Case

Barbara Williams of Austin was formally arraigned as the fifth person accused in the 91st District Court indictments of complicity in the 1981 Garcia murder case at a hearing last Friday in the Eastland court. She formerly lived in Cisco.

Mrs. Williams, ex-wife of one defendant and the mother of another, was arraigned on charges of organized crime, murder and conspiracy to commit murder. She was released after the approval of a \$20,000 bond made after her

Joe Thomas Perry, also under indictment in the case and ex-husband of Barbara Williams, was freed Friday after Judge Jim Wright approved a reduction of his bond from \$150,000 to \$30,000. He had been in the county jail since being returned to Texas from Boston, Mass., several months ago.

Mrs. Williams entered a plea of not guilty in the case and requested the court to provide her with an attorney. Judge Wright took the matter under advise-

Others under indictment in the case are Richard Edward Hinton, Perry, Pat Dwayne Starr and Brenda Gail Perry Andrews. All are free under bond. Beth Peacock, also mentioned in the case from time to time, was released after it was determined that she was under age 14 at the time of the Garcia slaving.

Judge Wright was expected to rule this week on motions to release Brenda Andrews who was given a suspended sentence in the case after pleading guilty several years ago. Her attorney submitted that to try her again would be double

The judge was also expected to rule on Special Prosecutor Bill Hart's request that the five persons be tried together.

Mrs. Garcia, a Cisco convenience store clerk, disappeared from her job on Nov. 29, 1981. Her body was found in a culvert, her eyeglasses

in place and her face freshly and skillfully made up, with a single bullet in her head two days later.

Charles and Thomas LeFlore, brothers, were sentenced to prison for 65 and 50 years, respectively,

## **Texas Historical Commission** Generates Savings For State

The Texas Historical Commission, in spite of budget cuts and lay-offs, managed to generate more than \$400 million for the state in 1986.

This number, based on figures compiled by agency staff, indicates that preservation pays in Texas. Following is a list of some THC programs and their economic impact in Texas; the information appeared in the January special issue of The Medallion, the THC's newsletter.

Historical Markers: One of the THC's most visible and well-known programs, the Marker Department can be credited with aiding Texas' tourism industry. A 1970's survey conducted by the Texas Highway Department and the THC determined that each marker along Texas highways earned an average of \$17.55 per day in tourism benefits. While this figure may vary in the 1980's, it is estimated that markers contributed more than \$53 million to Texas' \$16 billion tourist industry in

Main Street: This department, which has been instrumental in initiating programs to rejuvenate small downtowns across the state, has generated more than \$12 million in sales tax revenues and \$35 million in downtown reinvestment.

Architecture: Investors doled out \$158 million in 1986 to rehabilitate historic properties and garnered a tax savings of \$40 million, thanks to a federal tax savings programs administered by this department.

Archeology: The Office of the State Archeologist has acquired collections and sites through donation, an effort worth almost three million dollars. When considering the tourism value

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associated with archeology (public visitation to state parks, for example), the economic impact totals approximately \$51 million an-

National Register Programs: Departmental work has cleared some eight billion dollars in federal money involving such projects as dams, lignite mines, and reservoirs. Also the federal survey grant program has stimulated economic activity for Texas.

Museums: One of this state's prime tourists attractions, history and other types of museums spurred approximately \$87 million for the state in 1986.

In the special Wedallion issue, THC Exective Director Curtis Tunnell said, "Beyond the direct dollar benefits of preservation is the more important goal of protecting the pride, spirit, independence, and quality of life that makes Texas unique. From the piney woods to the desert mountains, and from the seashore to the high plains, Texas has a very special history and a heritage worth preserving at any cost."

The Medallion, published September through May, is a valuable resource for Texans interested in historic preservation. 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## Fishing Outdoors

Area lakes are on the upswing folks. Even after our recent snows, some areas on most lakes are warming into the 50 degree water temperature.

Normally during these early warming trends anglers can find some good fishing in northern coves. Preferably a cove over a creek depending on whether fresh water is warm or cold). These northern coves and creeks are protected from the gusty north winds we have; plus the north-east banks receive the most hours of sunlight.

During these early days of spring a two or three degree difference in water temperature can be vital. Two recent trips have showed this to be very important. On Lake Possum Kingdom the average main lake temperature was 35 degrees. Moving to a northern cove and fishing the east bank we found the water temperature to be 37-38 degrees. And within minutes 2 nice fish were boated. Same song second verse during an outing on Lake Granbury. Water temperatures differed 56-58 on the main lake. Moving to the northern creeks and

northern coves. And there are fish present. One problem that arises often during this early period is the fish are very spooky. Just coming up from their deep water haunts and moving into as

shallow of 1 foot. What bait will they take. Sometimes a spinner bait worked slowly will produce, if the entry into the water doesn't spook them. An excellent choice would be a stick or pencil shaped bait. These are normally very light, float, and don't make as a large splash. Throw the bait as shallow as possible, sometimes it even becomes necessary to piace

into the water. Now your catching some fish there in 1' - 4' of water. But they are all small fish. At this time of year you are probably catching small male fish. On these banks preparing the nest for spawning and the big female bass to come in. Be sure to place these fish back if under

the bait on bank, then work it

And set up another trip back to these areas within 2 or three weeks. Doing this in hopes of catching those egg heavy females up shallow. Please folks during this time of year don't try to clean the lake out. Leave some of these fish, after all theose eggs are the future of fishing, for us and generations to come.

As always these are only suggestion. Methods we have found to work, but may not be the best methods. Be versatile at all times.

Area lake reports: Lake Leon: Black bass fair to 31/2 pounds on spinnerbaits and jig and pig. Crappie good numbers up but size is small on jigs and min-

Lake Hubbard Creek: Black bass slow to 4 pounds on Rapala stick baits in 2 feet of water most in the 10 to 13 inch range. Crappie real good up Sandy Creek on minnows. Hybrid stripers slow to 3 pounds.

Lake Granbury: Black bass fair to 5¼ pounds on jig and pig most fish in the 11" to 14" range some on spinner

Lake Fork: Black bass good to 6 pounds on Rat-L-Traps in 24 feet of water, lots of non keeper fish. Crap-



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## From Cabins To Skyscrapers: The History Of Architecture

The history of architecture in the land that is now Texas spans the range from primitive lean-to's to colonial mansions, from handhewn log cabins to soaring, glass and steel skyscrapers.

But throughout the decades, the constant in Texas construction has been that whatever man built and wherever he built it, the structure was designed and built to meet a very specific

"In the days when Texas was occupied by native In-dians and claimed by the Spanish, architecture took its most basic form: shelter from the elements. Lean-to's constructed from tree branches and shrubbery gave the Indians a rudimentary roof over their heads," Nia Dorian-Becnel says. She is an assistant professor in the University of Houston's College of Architecture.

Centuries later, the sophistication of the construction improved but the basic reliance on natural elements remained. Log cabins became a staple of the Texas range land. As settlers cleared the land, they shaped the felled trees into nomes. Using little more than an ax to cut the tree and an aze to shape it, the pioneers raised the familiar four-sided cabins. The structures rarely contained nails; precise woodworking interlocked the logs sufficiently to support the structure.

The simplest cabins had only dirt floors. Eventually more trees were turned into planks and flooring laid. Only rarely did the cabin feature a glass-pane win-

builders incorporated native limestone and/or adobe into their structures. Many endure today in the form of missions and aging but stillused churches.

In other areas of the state,

With the advent of saw mills and improved tools, housing features became more refined. The designs became somewhat more

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complex, as illustrated by the "dog run" houses. These were basically two room connected by one roof with a breezeway passage between

Europeans brought many Old World notions about architecture with them to Texas. In the mid- to late-1800s, Roman, Gothic, Greek and Romantic Classicism styles could be seen in houses and public buildings. Architects seemed to borrow freely from such styles, even if their manifestations did not always follow the forms with precision in scale or detail. No matter the style, the construction of towns usually took place at river crossings, on fertile lands and in

resource-rich pine forests.

Architecture in Texas turned a corner in 1845. With statehood came a wave of construction and intensive designing, some of it funded by \$10 million the U.S. government paid Texas over lands the two had disputed. Since the state constitution established public schools, colleges sprang up rather quickly. The first in 1840 was Rutersville, the selfproclaimed "Athens of the South", located near Georgetown. This institution was followed by Baylor, Texas A&M and The University of Texas at Austin.

"The original main building at UT was the first really elaborate institutional building built with state funds in Texas," Becnel says. "It was a beautiful Victorian Gothic building, built in 1883 and torn down in

Construction was not limited to public facilities. Companies began erecting places of business at a furious pace and speculative towns popped up like mushrooms. Most of them followed the "town square" format, which was present in Texas from at least 1841. As the businesses along the squares (and elsewhere) prospered, their owners built

elaborate house themselves.

The construction boom was particularly evident in the proliferation of county courthouses, federal buildings and churches. Many of the churches were built to serve the ethnic constituents within the Catholic church, although most religious groups were part of the boom.

This boom was to last into the 1920s.

From the 1930s and through the 50s, the population began to grow as people came to the cities to work in industry. Construction slowed somewhat during World War II, but not for long.

The International movement hit the east coast in the 1930s, spurred by exhibit brought by architects Philip Johnson and Russell Hitchcock. By 1950 and through the 70s, the Modern movement worked its way into the state. This started the construction of the "glass boxes" which are so prevalent Meanwhile the facades of old, delicate buildings were covered up with metal to make them look modern,' Becnel notes.

In the 70s, the gleam on the glass boxes in Texas began to fade. "They don't suit our climate and people here began to dislike 'generic' architecture which can be seen in many other states," Becnel says. "Texans have begun to turn homeward; they're uncovering the past and incorporating that into the present.

"We're seeing a return to regionalism, of trying to fit the architecture to the uniqueness of the state," Becnel continues. "Texans have always prided themselves on being different, and that's the trend: vernacular, regional architecture is in, the glass box is out. No longer do we have to compete with the cities of the North; it's clear Texas has something significant to offer the architectural community of the U.S."

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#### Possible Hazardous Waste Site To Be Tested In Near Future

**Texas Water Commission** representatives visited Ranger and held a Public Meeting Tuesday night. The subject of the meeting was a possible hazardous waste site located 3 miles west of Ranger on Hwy. 101.
Ranger residents and TWC

representatives discussed the problems the well site had caused and could possibly still be causing. The wells is question are Well No. 116 and Well No. 137. Both wells are former injection wells and were permit-ted by the state in the late 1970's. Well No. 137 is the well which reportedly was involved in a series of blowouts in 1979. Sonics International, the company which owned the wells, is now a bankrupt company and has either been purchased by or has become part of

According to the Texas Commission Water representatives, the main concern at the site deals with contamination of the soil with hazardous chemicals including hydrocarbons. Soil samples have been taken and the site does qualify as a hazardous waste site. Although the chance of the waste spreading to Lake

the Ozite Corp.

Leon is remote, there is concern about water wells in the immediate area around the well site and the possibility that the contamination could get to Colony Creek and into Lake Proctor.

Members of the Texas Water Commission came to Ranger to speak to local citizens in an attempt to gather more information on the well sites.

John (Buzzy) Rutledge and others had tried to do something about the well site as far back as 1978. Trips were made to Austin, as well as many other contacts, in an effort to get the site cleaned up, but to no avail. Rutledge told the commission that part of the waste chemicals were taken to the Eastland County landfill (water shed) and part of it was taken to a Houston location. He also said some of the waste was dumped in "other tanks down the road". Rutledge was also able to give much need information about the site to the commis-

Joe Housson of Eastland, has a place on Colony Creek. He uses Colony Creek to water his cattle and he said children swim in the creek. He asked what he should do

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


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about this problem. The commission told Housson that he would be kept well informed of each development in the investigation because of the question that the con-tamination may have spread Into Colony Creek. . Jamle Gibson, represen-tative of Senator Bob

Glasgow's office attended the meeting. She said that Senator Glasgow was in-terested in the waste site. She asked the commission when they would be starting testing the soil in regards to time elements. The commission said they hope to start an extensive investigation of the soil and the elements in 2-3 months.

The commission also ex-

plained that the reason that it had taken so long to take care of this problem was that the current program for this specific problem was just started in 1985. Robert I. Chapin, Assistant Section Chief of the Superfund Sec-tion said that the State Superfund Program began last summer. It was established through amendments to the Solid Waste Disposal Act in 1985 through House Bills 2356 and 2359. House Bill 2356 set up the program of the State Superfund and 2359 provided the funding mechanism for the program. He said the purpose of the State Superfund program is to identify and assess haverdone master. assess hazardous waste facilities which may consititute an epidemic substantial endangerment to public health and/or the environ-

Christy Smith, Unit Head, State Superfund Unit, said that responsible parties have been notified, such as landowners and other parties involved at the time the waste was destroyed of im-

properly. William Newchurch, Asistant Director, Hazardous and Solid Waste Division, and Solid Waste Division, who also serves as legal counsel, explained that the statute allows an order for clean-up by responsible parties to be issued as an executive act without prior hearing by the water commission and it makes the following people subject to the order: the owner of the property, the operator of the site, the owner or operator at the time that the processing, storage or disposal took place at the site, any person arranging for the storage, processing and disposal at the site, and the person/per-sons who transported the waste to the site for disposal waste to the site for disposal. Any one of the parties can be held responsible for the clean-up of the site.

According to Chapin, the law requires to first look to private parties to clean the site up. If these parties can't or won't clean it up, then the commission will look to federal funds. If federal federal funds. If federal funds are not available, then state funds will be sought.

based firm constructed the present Jail about seven

In January Wheeler had been asked by the Commissioners to take a look at the facilities and see what it would take to bring the Jail up to current State Standards on segregation and overcrowding.

He said he had met with Sheriff Underwood and his staff, and had also talked with two members of the Jails Standards Commission. He explained that the plan he had was short term, for a long-term plan would involve acquiring more land somewhere else. (And the implied building of a march larger facility).

Wheeler reported that the best short-term plan was to build a 12 bed addition to the present jail on the west side of the building. This would take in 2566 Sq. Ft., with an additional 575 Sq. Ft. built for storage on the north side of the last. of the Jail. These additions, with renovation inside the present Jail; also site development, equipment and furnishings, professional fees, contingencies and administrative costs would total \$548,110.00.

"How long is that going to be good for?" Asked L.T. Owen, Comm. of Pct. 3.

"I wish we could sit like we are until 1990," said Billy Bacon, Comm. of Pct. 4, "And then see what we need.

He had reference to the final pay-off on the current County Jail, which is supposed to take place in 1990.

Later Judge Bailey said that the County still owes about \$400,000 on the present building. This building is not obsolete, the Judge said, it is just inadequate.

The Commissioners decided to study Wheeler's plan further, and possibly take it with them to Austin when they meet with the Jail Standards Commission.

Sheriff Don Underwood summed up his feelings about possible jail enlargement by saying: "We don't have a choice about doing it. The only choice we got is how to go about it."

In other matters, the Commissioners approved the purchase of a Com-Dial Phone System for the Extension Service offices. DeMarquis Gordon, County Agent, reported that the equipment had gone up to approx. \$1744.

Billy Bacon, who had discussed the purchase of this service since the last meeting, reported: "I hate to say it, for I spent a lot of time with AT&T and Bell Telephone Co. But AT&T don't want our service."

Besides the discussion on phone service. DeMarquis Gordon reported that Joanna Maynard, Secretary to the Extension Service, had resigned her position. Thirty applicants have applied for this work, Gordon said, and a decision would be made next week

Richard Robinson, Comm. of Pct. 1, asked Gordon about another matter. He said there would be a County Commissioners and County Judge's Conference at Texas A&M (Bryan) in early March, and he wished there was some way to make handicapped persons aware that facilities in the hotels there were poor for them.

'You rent a room," the Commissioner said, "And nearly every one of them has a 24 in. door to the bathroom. No way you can get in there with a wheel chair." He also

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mentioned that steps had no alternate ramps on some of the main floors of the hotels.

Judge Bailey said that there should be other ways to get in and out various meeting places. "But I do not think elected officials ought to have to go in where they bring the garbage in and out," the Judge remark-

In other agenda items, the Commissioners approved a Lease-Option plan for a Ford F-150 pickup for Pct. 1. This will cost \$379.18 monthly with unlimited maintenance. They also decided to approve a Lease-option plan for a new Ford Car for the Sheriff's Department. This car will cost \$429.79 with a maintenance agreement.

The Commissioners opened eight bids for Courthouse repairs, and these offers ranged from \$13,423 for renovation to \$28,978. After considerable discussion it was decided to award the work to David Wilson of Wilson Construction Co. of Eastland, low bidder on the project. Wilson, who was in the Courtroom, assured the Commissioners that he would use all due care in completing the work to specifications.

L.T. Owen, Comm. of Pct. 3, mentioned that the State Highway Department may close down one or two of the roads on the south side of the county, due to bridges they consider defective, and to what they consider light travel on the roads.

"The people use that road south of Gorman to come out of Comanche County, Owen said. "I'm not going to be the one to shut them out. If it (the order) comes it will have to come from the

During the morning and afternoon several pipeline road crossings were approved. One was for Ensearch Processing Partners to lay an 8 in. Poly line across Rd.

438 in Pct. 2, N. and west of Olden. Another was for Sneed Construction Co. to cross Rd. 432 in Pct. 2 with a gas line. This is in the Chaney Community. Still another was for R&N Corp. to cross Rd. 408 in Pct. 3.

Mike Tennyson of Piper Energy Co. addressed the Court about a Company acquired by Piper Energy which had crossed a road south of Carbon without a permit, and also laid a Poly line in a bar ditch. L.T. Owen had called the new owners and asked them to correct the matter.

Piper Energy Co. was given permission to cross the road, provided it be done in a proper manner. They were also requested to move the line from the bar ditch as soon as the soil dried up enough.

The session concluded with the payment of bills, claims and accounts.

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

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

The next chapter meeting will be held Thursday. March 19.




The kitchen has been reequipped with stainless steel facilities, including a huge cold storage area.
