# CJC Lady Wranglers Are One Of Eight Teams In Championship Tournament

The Lady Wranglers of Cisco Junior College will be in Waco on Wednesday, March 3, as one of eight women's basketball teams in the Region V championship tournament.

The CJC team, which had already clinched their district bracket, ended the 1987 regular season with an impressive 93-to-67 victory over McLennan Community College of Waco here Thursday night. The win gave the Lady Wranglers of Coach Ronnie Hearne a perfect 12-0 conference season.

The victory, the 23rd of the year against five setbacks for the Lady Wranglers, was the 35th consecutive win for Cisco on the home court.

Stacie Scott, freshman from Vernon, hit 11 baskets and added three free throws to score 25 points for high honors. Jeannie Nix, Lisa Schoemer and Michelle Henry also scored in double figures. Tia Rosser was Cisco's re-bound leader with 13.

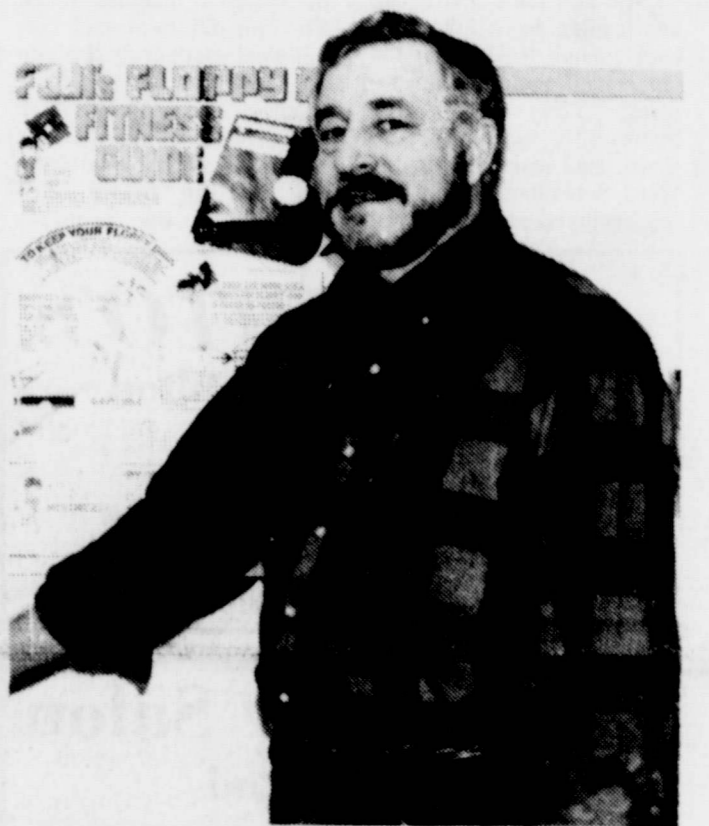

# Festival Means Different Things To Local Actors

For Craig Warren, Clint Cottom and Kerry Huddleston of Cisco Junior College, the upcoming Texas Junior College Speech and Theatre Association Festival means several different things. The festival, held annually, is an opportunity for drama students to be seen in performance and for those students who are sophomores, it also is a chance to audition for senior college representatives for available scholarships. The three students, with Larry Phipps, also a student at CJC, will audition for scholarships at Temple Junior College on Friday, March 6. They must have prepared two short monologues which show the range of their talents and be prepared for a 15 minute interview with the representatives.

Preparations for these auditions have been almost as rigorous as rehearsals for their production, "Bag of Dreams."

"First, we had to find our own material, since Mrs. Brown feels that it has to capture our interest," says Cottom, a sophomore student from Abilene. "Then we spent hours cutting them down to fit the time frame and memorizing them."

"And, just when we thought the worst part was over," laughs Huddleston, she put us through a lot of work on the character and our voices, and, for me, the speed at which I speak. My two minute monologue only lasted 45 seconds."

Phipps adds, "The worst part of me was finding out that in the interview, the representatives might ask us if we sang or danced. I wanted to say 'no' but Mrs. Brown said that not only would we say 'yes' but we'd be prepared to do both. Have you ever heard me sing?"

That's real scary." For Warren, who admits he hates the intense pressure of the audition situation, the experience will be a familiar one. "I want to act professionally and so every opportunity I have to audition, is just one more opportunity to be seen... and one more opportunity to feel like I'm going to be sick."

Cottom, who plans to be a secondary theatre arts teacher, has been surprised at all the different facets necessary to instruct students in theatre. "Mrs. Brown has made me aware that you have to be prepared to do it all. You have to be able to design, direct, act and audition if you expect to teach theatre well."

For Phipps, theatre was not always a first choice. "I was in plays in high school in Brazoria but that was in addition to playing football. Getting injured in the fall made me see that the coaches are right... you need to be able to do something else, too. So, I'm

going to major in business and hopefully become a theatre manager."

## Recipes

The following recipe is a favorite of Mrs. Jane Smith of West Covina, California. She is the mother of Lynn Chisolm of Cisco.

**SWEET SOUR SAUCE**  
 1/3 Package of brown sugar.  
 3 Tablespoons cornstarch.  
 1 #20 Can crushed pineapple chunks- drain and save juice.  
 3 Teaspoons vinegar.  
 2 Tablespoons catsup.  
 2 Tablespoons Soy sauce.  
 1 Bell pepper, cut into inch pieces.  
 1 Small onion, chopped.  
 Mix brown sugar and cornstarch. Add enough water to juice of pineapple to make 2+ cups liquid. Stir in skillet, syrup, water mix and vinegar, catsup, soy sauce- Cook over medium heat. Stir constantly until mixture thickens and boils. Stir in pineapple, pepper and onion. Reduce heat, cover and simmer 5 minutes. Good with ham, chicken or any meat.

Thirteen members of the Cisco Historical Society were present for the monthly meeting conducted in the Community room of the First National Bank on Tuesday, February 24.

In addition to the ongoing reports and discussions related to the development of the proposed historical village and park, the group heard plans to receive fourteen school desks from the old school building in Putnam. The desks are historically compatible to those used originally in the Word Schoolhouse and will be displayed and preserved

in that building in the village.

Mr. Dan Wester presented to the Society a unique, handcrafted receptacle for donations to the Society by visitors to the museum at the Mobley Hotel. Mr. Wester explained that the floor of the structure was the top panel of the door to room #21 in Hilton's original hotel. The four pillars at each corner were made from the handrail of the stairway of the Mobley. The base on which the receptacle stands was made out of redwood from the cooling tower once located on the property

which will be developed as the historical park.

The members of the society voted to operate a hot dog booth at the Folklife Festival as a money-raising project. Mr. Wes Valek was voted chairman of the project. He is urging members of the Society to volunteer to staff the booth on that weekend.

The next meeting of the Historical Society will be conducted on Tuesday, March 24, at 7:30 p.m. in the bank's Community Room.

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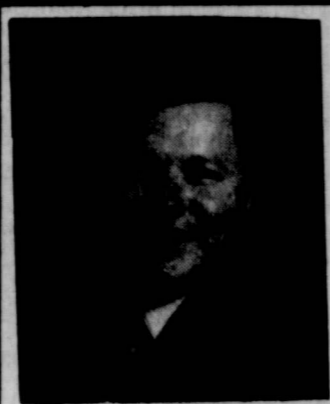

President Vera London was responsible for decorations of the refreshment table that was laid with a mauve-tinted cloth accented with hearts and flowers, and centered with a beautiful fresh flower arrangement.

For special interest, the Senior Citizens Ceramics Class contributed a display of ceramic heart-shaped plates, vases, birds and other attractive items. Barbara Tollett, who is preparing an exhibit of her canvas-craft needlework for the Folklife Festival, loaned colorful match-boxes, tissue holders, coasters, and a collection of boots, ice skate and roller skate shoes for Cabbage Patch dolls.

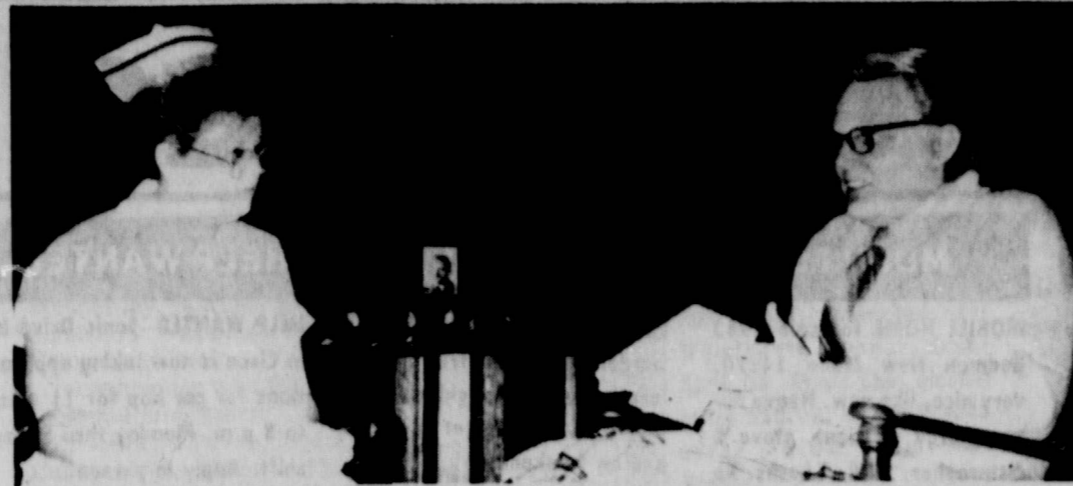

## KTXS-TV To Air Cancer Series

KTXS-TV and medical facilities in Abilene, Brownwood and Eastland will be cooperating in a joint effort to alert women to the value of early detection of breast cancer during the American Cancer Society's 1987 TX Breast Screening Project.

The project is a state and nationwide effort to help save lives from breast cancer by offering reduced-price (\$50) mammograms for a limited time this spring.

On March 2-6, KTXS-TV (Sweetwater-Abilene) will be airing a special series of reports on the project and breast cancer. American Cancer Society volunteers will be staffing a phone bank at the Mall of Abilene from 6 p.m. to 11 p.m. each night to assist eligible women in receiving information and setting up appointments for reduced-price mammograms during this project. The project is primarily for non-symptomatic women 35 years or older.

The telephone number, 698-5000, will be open from 6 p.m. to 11 p.m. Monday-Friday, March 2-6. Women wishing to participate in the project should call during these times to receive information and be screened for eligibility.

Medical facilities participating in the project are Radiology Associates, an

Abilene physicians' group; Humana Hospital-Abilene; Brownwood Regional Hospital; and Eastland Memorial Hospital.

Breast Cancer is a leading cancer killer among women in the U.S. This year the ACS predicts an increase in incidence - affecting one out of 10 American women sometime during her lifetime, rather than one out of 11 as has been reported in past years. Since the cause of breast cancer remains unknown, early detection offers the best defense. Chances of cure are excellent when breast cancer is detected and treated early while a tumor is still small.

Mammography is one of the best available techniques for detecting cancer too small to be felt by even the most experienced examiner. With an accuracy rate of about 90 percent, mammography can detect breast tumor while they are still microscopic in size.

Screening mammography, or mamography in women who have symptoms, can provide a "baseline" by which a woman's future mammograms can be compared to detect microscopic changes and possible tumors.

While extremely useful, and in some cases life saving, screening mammograms are not covered by most medical insurance

plans. The ACS recommends a screening baseline mammogram for women between ages of 35 and 40 and then annual or biannual mammograms between 40 and 50. After age 50 women are encouraged to have a mammogram every year. Women with a personal or family history of breast cancer should consult their physicians about how often they should be examined and have mammography before age 40.

Mammography, together with monthly breast self-examination by the woman and an annual physical examination by a physician, provides the best means of early detection of breast cancer. Mammography scored especially high in the Breast Cancer Detection and Demonstration Project, a major study funded jointly by the ACS and the National Cancer Institute. Yet a recent Gallup survey indicated that only 15 percent of women over age 50 have a mammogram every year. The poll also showed that 75 percent of all U.S. women are aware that mammography exists.

Major deterrents for getting a mammogram include fear of radiation, high cost, and lack of information. These areas of concern will be a major focus of the local

# City Approves Tax Increase

The city tax on motel room rentals was raised from two to four percent and six pieces of property were ordered sold to the highest bidders to satisfy delinquent tax accounts at the semi-monthly meeting of the City Council last Tuesday night.

The hotel tax will provide about \$5,000 per year for the Hilton Community Center, which serves as the city's convention headquarters, as the result of the tax hike. Two per cent has been collected for several years to raise funds for the Chamber of Commerce to use in promoting conventions and travel. The new money will help pay monthly expenses for the upkeep of the restored Mabley Hotel.

The city was approved by the Council on first reading. The tax will become effective after the second reading next month.

Sealed bids for the purchase of six pieces of vacant property in the city limits will be opened on March 24th, the Council decided. The Council reserved the right to reject any and all bids.

The property to be offered for sale includes Lot 8, Block C, S/D, O.T., 602 East 10th Street; Lot 7, Block 6, O.T., 503 East 9th Street; Lot 8, Block 6, O.T., 505 East 9th Street; Lots 6 and 7, Block C, 3rd and 4th Addition, 506 Riddle Street; and, Lots 6, 7 and 8, Block 2, Mexico Addition, 111-115 Bedford Street.

A map showing the location of the properties is on display at City Hall, City Manager Mike Moore reported.

A financial report for January, 1987, was submitted to the Council by Maryann Perry, city bookkeeper. The report showed a valorem tax collection of \$1,329 during January to bring the total for the fiscal year to \$244,199 or 90 per cent of the budget anticipation.

Other income during January included \$7,649 in sales tax, \$13,965 in franchise taxes, \$1,855 from the city court, \$9,284 in sanitation charges, \$1,093 for interest earned on city accounts, \$950 for property leases and \$1,264 in oil and gas royalties for a total of \$88,940 in January and a total of \$400,278 for the fiscal year - 42 per cent of the budget anticipation.

General fund expenditures for January totaled \$69,852, administrative and legislative department outgo amounted to \$19,916 and the police and court department had \$19,266 in expenses. The street department expenses totalled \$14,880, and sanitation department \$6,786.

The utility fund had income of \$50,642 and expenses of \$44,513.

The city manager told the Council that rainy weather in recent weeks has caused considerable delay in pro-

gress on the new waste water disposal plant. Mayor Joe Wheatley presided over the meeting. Present were Councilmen

Allen Masters, Arlie K. Whitley, Roy Dennis and Bural Chambers, along with the city manager and City Secretary Ginger Johnson.

The 4-H Showmanship and Grooming Clinic was a big success last Saturday. There were over 60 4-H and F.F.A. members and parents attending these informative sessions.

The day got off to a good start with Mr. Bill Coalson of Abilene presenting a training on rabbits. He covered how to select rabbits for show and the process to go through in getting them ready for show. He then gave the students an opportunity to show their rabbits and critiqued them during a "hands-on" learning session. A short showmanship class was held with Jessica Keith of Eastland 4-H Club winning the Best Showman Award.

Mr. Coalson also covered selection, feeding and showing market poultry. He was very informative and very encouraging to all who attended these sessions. Mr. Coalson will judge the Eastland County Rabbit and Poultry Show this year. We were very fortunate to have him here last week to tell us what we need to be doing in preparation for our show.

Robert Hill, of Eastland, demonstrated how to fit a beef steer for show. He went through the process of training the hair and stressed the importance of working the hair daily for maximum benefit. He demonstrated how to dress a calf for show and covered the entire process of making the hair stand up, boning up the legs, and putting up the tail. He also stressed the importance of bathing the steer after the show and getting all the soap off the animal. Robert stated, "If anyone in Eastland county wants help with their beef projects, let me know and I'll do whatever I can to help." Robert did a wonderful job Saturday, and all I have to say is, "Watch out Rob, lots of people will be wanting your help!" Garrett Gerhardt, of the Cisco County Kids 4-H Club was the recipient of the Best Showmanship Award in the Beef Division.

The lamb and swine workshop sessions were presented by Mr. Ken Hill, of Albany. Mr. Hill's claim to fame includes breeder of the 1986 Reserve Champion Market Hog and his daughter won Champion Market Lamb at the San Antonio Livestock Show. He did an excellent job in demonstrating to the participants how to exhibit their animals to their best advantage. ## Fishing Outdoors

By Terry Wilson

**Lake Proctor's Progress**  
Recent fisheries surveys on Lake Proctor indicate the 4,600-acre reservoir is producing good populations of largemouth bass and crappie.

State biologist David Terre of Abilene said fish habitat conditions were exceptional during 1986, with high water levels during the spring providing cover for spawned game and bait fish species.

"Electroshocking surveys during spring and fall of 1986 turned up the highest number of bass any survey on the lake," Terre said. About 10 percent of the estimated bass population are longer than the 14-inch minimum length limit, he said. The bag limit is five largemouth bass per day.

Good numbers of small bass also were collected, and the strong 1985 year-class of largemouth will reach harvestable size by this summer.

Trap net samples during the fall revealed good numbers and size distribution of crappie, with an estimated 30 percent of the adult population comprised of fish equal or greater than 10 inches in length. Growth and condition of the white crappie also were good.

"Ethel," the state record 17 pound 11 ounce largemouth bass, may be the largest bass ever caught in Texas, but she came out second best in some recent skirmishes with a smaller fish.

Ethel's tank mate, a 13-pounder, had repeatedly attacked the larger fish and had to be transferred to another tank, according to David Campbell, superintendent of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department's Tyler Fish Hatchery.

"Ethel now has the 3,500-gallon tank to herself, due to fear of injury."

That's the description given of Eastland County by Ron Bailey, head of the Soil Conservation office, as the newspapers go to press this weekend.

Bailey, who collects weather data each day, says that it's not that we are so far above the average rainfall this year to date, but it's the way it has fallen. The humidity has been very high, too, so nothing dries out.

During the past week 1.55 inches fell in general rains around the county, with slightly heavier amounts in the Gorman area. Jan., Feb. and March of each year are usually "dry" months, with average rainfalls of around 1.5 inches each month.

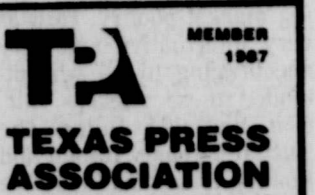
April, May and June are supposed to be the wet months, with September and the early part of October also wet.

The current heavier-than-

usual rainfall pattern actually began in November of 1986, when we got 1.6 inches, the Soil Conservationist says. Then in December we got 3.01 inches, about twice what we usually get during that month. There has been more snow than usual this winter, too.

Gardeners, farmers, and even the ranchers have been heard to say that they hoped the current rains would let up for awhile. Next July they may wish they hadn't said that!

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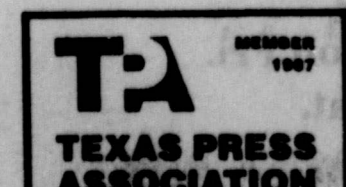

## I've Been Wrong Before

I never was strong on tradition. Still, some traditions have merit even when they verge on superstition. I only get angry when some promoter tries to sell the public on some garbage as "tradition" where there is nothing more behind it than trying to sell greeting cards or equally nonvital schlock (Yiddish meaning low quality merchandise).  
We certainly are critical of some traditions and supposed superstitions which may have had solid reason for their existence though not clearly evident to us nor maybe even to those with whom they originated.  
The reason neither the troops of Alexander the Great nor Ghengis Kahn were able to take all of India was that the climate and environment in general were very unhealthy. Chepe Noyan, one of the Khan's generals conquered South China with boiling water. No, he didn't boil anyone alive that we know of but he did order strong penalties against any of his warriors who drank water which had not been boiled. South China water was contaminated with such things as cholera, typhoid, dysentery etc. Those wild mountain men had no resistance to such things.  
Long before Alexander or Ghengis Kahn the mountain people from the Iranian Plateau invaded India and conquered Druvidians and others found there. They set up the Hindu religion and became the casts of rulers and priests.  
My brother who spent some time there said it was part of religious observance that if even the shadow of an outcast or sweeper passed over food one of the "Twice Born" was about to eat it must be thrown out. While some might be upset at such a "racist" or segregationist practice it might well have had basis in ancient health practices. For, if an ignorant Mongol like Chepe Noyan could have discovered that boiled water was safer long before the microscope and bacteriology then the practice of keeping a distance from the original people might well have originated from observing virus infections as well. Fear of contagion may not have been as scientific as today but failure was more deadly.  
Another Hindu custom my brother reported was that men and women of the house ate in separate rooms. I don't know why those people did so but in the U.S. there would be less stomach ulcers if people didn't ingest discourt with food. A meal to the accompaniment of violent argument is pure poison. If you think I am wrong on that one then why does the Bible say "Better a crust in peace than a feast in contention," or again "Better living in peace in the corner of the eaves of a house than to live in broad halls with a nagging woman." You bet I know that men can be nags too.  
The chances are that you can't agree on eating separate but I guarantee that you would enjoy better health if you stuck to a rule of religiously outlawing discussion at the table of one subject above all, MONEY. It's a killer.  
That may never become tradition nor superstition but it may be good sense.

## TEXAS HEALTH NEWS AND VIEWS

Question: My doctor says I need help at home because I am unable to care for myself. He said something about "Home Health Care." What is that? Will Medicare pay for it?

Answer: An individual is eligible for Home Health Care if ALL of the following conditions are met. (1) The care needed is part time skilled nursing care, or physical therapy, or speech therapy. (2) You must be confined to the home, but not necessarily bed-ridden. (3) The doctor determines the need and sets up a plan. (4) The Home Health agency must be a medicare provider. Ask your doctor for the nearest Home Health Care provider.

Question: How many days are covered for Home Health

Care in a benefit period?

Answer: The beneficiary is usually entitled to an unlimited number of Home Health Care visits.

Question: What services are NOT covered by Home Health Care?

Answer: (1) Full time nursing care. (2) Drug and biological treatment. (3) Delivery of meals to the beneficiary's home. (4) Homemaker service. (5) Custodial care--bathing, walking, dressing, items provided by unskilled personnel. (6) Transportation for the homebound.

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The response to the "appeal letter" which ran in this publication in the last issue has been tremendous—from all over the county from people who want to help. And the newspaper has had contact with the family in question.

The letter from a concerned friend was basically correct although there were some confusing statements. The basic facts are these: the young girl who has the serious back problem, and her husband and their three children live in the mobile home in Eastland. The husband is employed and provides for his family, but his company insurance apparently will not cover an operation for the wife because her condition was pre-existing.

The wife's parents and her two grown brothers in effect live with them, and do in fact, sleep in vehicles at night. The father was injured in an oil field accident but is now able to work.

These are the needs as it is understood: a job for the father who is willing and able to do all except heavy lifting work; a job for one of the brothers who is an able-bodied worker; some kind of housing facilities for the parents and the two sons; and of course, whatever help could be provided to the young mother who desperately needs the special back surgery. Her children range in age from one to four a half years old.

## Working Couples' Tax Break

Working couples will still be allowed to deduct up to \$3,000 on their 1986 tax returns, the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) says.

The tax agency explained that if you and your spouse file a joint return, you show your total combined gross income on your tax return. From that total you may

either deduct 10 percent of the earned income of the spouse with the lower income or \$3,000, whichever is less. There are some rules about the kinds of income that qualify, so the IRS advises you to read the instructions carefully.

The deductions may be claimed by both 1040 and 1040A filers.

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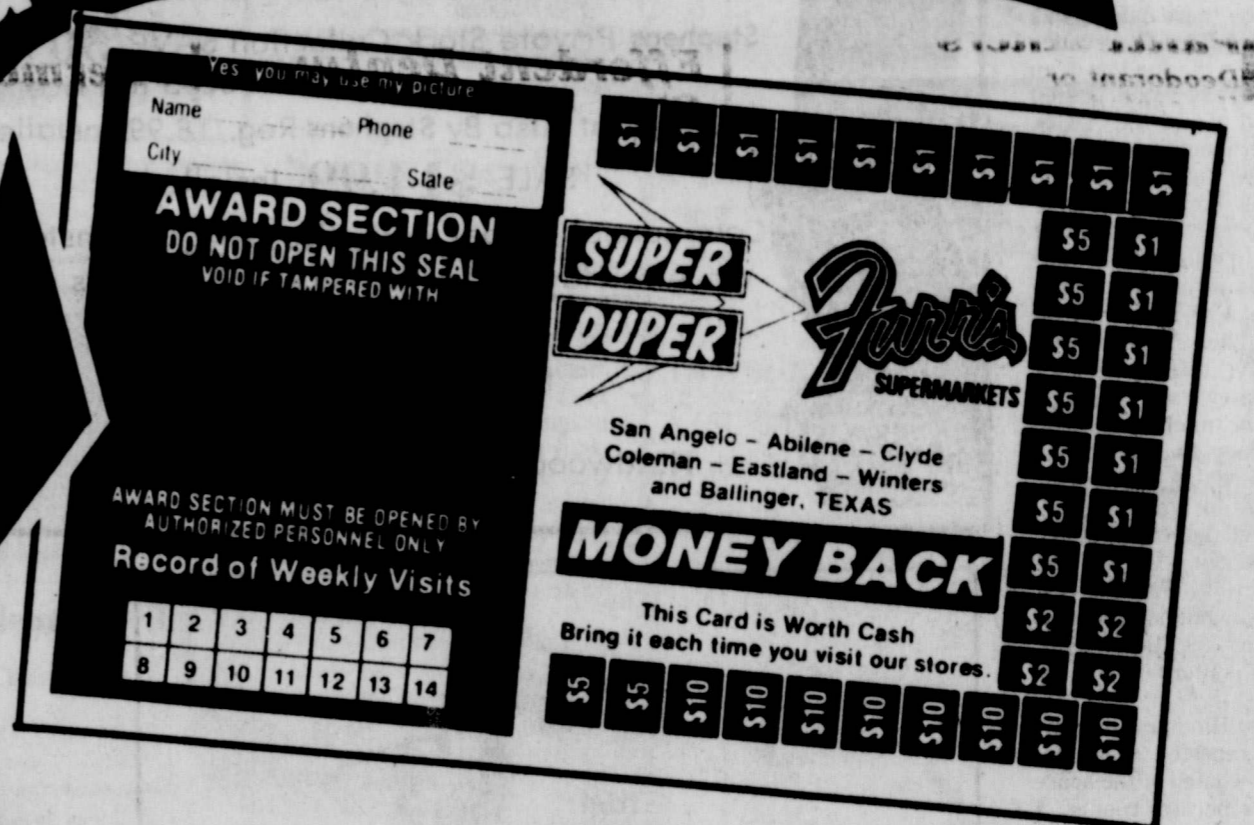



**RANGER**  
At this week's City Council meeting Commissioner Buddy Vinson stated that the city has some extra funds for the first time in a year-and-a-half "that's not owed to somebody". Vinson made a motion that \$15,000 be taken from the Water Department fund and \$15,000 from the General Fund to be used in paying back part of a \$60,000 bank note which will come due again April 1. ### LEAF HATS AND DAISY CHAINS

Mama taught us to make beautiful leaf hats, aprons and daisy chains for ourselves and our dolls. We pinned big green leaves together with briar thorns. We measured the string of leaves to the "Lady" or child's head, pinned the ends together for a perfect fit. This formed the brim of the hat. Three or four big, choice leaves pinned together made the crown. Then, the important part of the whole business was the decoration. We made garlands of wild flowers, usually daisies, around the crown. Sometimes we put a high stick-up of berries, or maybe a feather some saucy blue-jay had lost. We made dye from stretch berries (briar berries) in a beautiful shade of light red, or fuchsia. When completed we had some beautiful millinery, equal to any in Higginbotham's store.

The John and Francis Briley Beck family made their way to Texas by way of Ala. and Ga. about 1840. They lived in Harrison county in 1850. Andrew Jackson Beck was born Nov. 1, 1838. He married Tobitha Elizabeth Taylor in Bell County, Texas on July 19, 1866. Tobitha was the daughter of Josiah and Catherine Elizabeth Koger Taylor. Josiah had gotten ill and died on the trip to Texas in 1857. This family settled in Denton County, Texas.

Andrew and Tobitha came to Eastland County and bought 160 acres in 1881. They had four children at the time. Their other children were born in Eastland County. Mary Catherine Beck was born Dec. 8, 1867 and married William R. Middleton. Ellie Lillian Beck was born Nov. 19, 1870 and married Charles Simons and ran a boarding house in Ranger during the oil boom. Clabe Beck was born July 14, 1872 and died of meningitis in March of 1899. We think he may have married Avery Finley in Eastland, Dec. 31, 1893. Matilda Jane Beck was born March 28, 1875 and married T.J. Jackson. Andrew Jackson Beck, Jr. was born Feb. 18, 1880 and married Sallie Newham in Ranger. Tobe Jacob Beck was born July 14, 1882 and died of meningitis Feb. 23, 1899. George Franklin was born March 9, 1883 at New Hope and married Katie Dupree. Thomas Andrew Beck was born March 17, 1884 and married Maude Griffin. Birdie and Bertie Beck were born May 6, 1886 and Birdie died. Bertie married Willie B. Williams. Ollie May Beck was born May 13, 1889 and never married. Emma Caroline Beck was born June 2, 1892 and married Nelson Waggoner. Allie Beck was born Oct. 2, 1890 and married Bill Langford. Charles Ely Beck was born Aug. 19, 1894 and married

Lera Nix.

In 1899 two of the Beck boys and the father were very ill with meningitis and the two boys died. The father was never healthy again. The children all lived in the cellar and the mother cared for the ill and sent meals to the children to avoid any of them getting meningitis.
