of the year. All area musicians are invited to attend. There will be a concession stand.

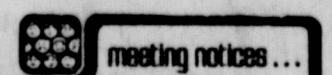
## March 6 Is Deadline For Reduced Mammograms

# First Confirmed Case Of Rabies Reported In Cisco

Dr. Vergil Patrick, local veterinarian, called the Press Monday to report the first case of confirmed rabies in Cisco. A woman who lives in Cisco noticed that her pet cat was acting stiff and sore when she tried to pick it up. The next day the cat would slap at people when they walked by so she took it in to the vet.

Dr. Patrick said that the woman handled the cat with the respect that people should give an animal that is acting strange. He also said that none of the family members will have to take rabies shots.

Dr. Patrick said that skunks are the main carrier of rabies in this area and this year there is an over abundance of skunks both in town and in the rural areas.

The Cisco Press received the following information from the Texas Department of Health. It reported that some 10,500 animal specimens, from armadillos to zebras, were tested at the Texas Department of Health (TDH) for rabies last year. Of these, 470 were found to carry the disease.

Although no human cases of rabies were reported in Texas during 1986, Dr. Foy V. McCasland, chief of the TDH Bureau of Veterinary Public Health, said the disease is a continuing threat to people. He warned that anyone with pets, or who frequently works with domestic animals, should see that the animals are vaccinated annually, as the law prescribes.

He also warned against

adopting wild animals as pets. Wild animals are the most frequent carriers of rabies, and there are no approved rabies vaccines for them, Dr. McCasland explained. He said that although a wild animal may be vaccinated with the same shots used for dogs and cats, the vaccine may or may not be effective. "A wild animal, sooner or later, is likely to bite or scratch its owner," he added.

Wild animals, chiefly skunks and bats, constitute about 90 percent of all rabies cases confirmed by TDH. Dr. McCasland said that

most cases of domestic animal infection can be traced to contact with rabid animals.

Testing for rabies in Texas

is conducted exclusively in health department laboratories in Austin, Houston, San Antonio, and El Paso. In 1986, these

laboratories confirmed rabies in 275 skunks, 132 bats, 14 dogs, 14 cows, 13

Cisco and South Plains JC were scheduled to play at 3 p.m. Tuesday in the first round. The tournament's opening game had Grayson Junior College playing Odessa JC at 1 p.m. The winners of the two Tuesday games were scheduled to play Wednesday at 9 p.m.

The tournament championship game was scheduled for 7 p.m. Thursday at the McLennan gym. In the lower bracket, McLennan was scheduled to play Howard County, and Western Texas of Snyder was to meet Weatherford JC. The two bracket winners will meet

Wednesday to determine a team for the championship game Thursday night.

Coach Hearne's Lady Wranglers went through a spirited workout late Sunday at CJC Gym to begin preparations for the tournament. They had been given Friday and Saturday off after defeating McLennan here last Thursday night in the season's finale.

The Friday game gave the Lady Wranglers a perfect 12-0 conference record as compared with South Plains' 7-5 in conference. Cisco was 23-5 for the year and won 36 consecutive home games over three years.

The Lady Wranglers were scheduled to spend 30 minutes "shooting goals and exercising" Tuesday morning at the Waco gym before their first game that afternoon. Misses Jeannie Nix, Tina Walker and Michelle Henry are serving as team captains this year.

The winner at Waco will go to the national junior college

The 1986-87 basketball season came to an abrupt and disappointing end Friday for the Cisco Junior College Wranglers as the Cooke County Lions came to Wrangler Gym and defeated the Wranglers 99-88.

It was a must win situation for the Wranglers in order to make the Region V Tournament in Waco this weekend. The loss enabled TSTI to tie Cisco for fourth place in the North Texas JUCO Conference and enter the playoffs by virtue of beating the Wranglers twice in conference play. Both teams finished with 9-7 records in conference play. The Wranglers finished the season with 13 wins and 15 losses.

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**Mother Writes Letter To Son In 1912**

(Editor's Note: This letter was written in the year 1912 by Mrs. Edwin Fenley, the late Omar Fenley's mother to him. He was visiting in Springfield, Mo., where he had gone on a train with an uncle's family that was moving back there from Cisco. Omar Fenley and a young friend, Buster Williams, rode in a train boxcar with his uncle's livestock, equipment and household goods and took care of the stock on the trip. The letter was made available to The Press by Bill Qualls Howell, daughter of the late Omar Fenley. The letter follows:)

Cisco, Texas Oct. 27, 1912

Mr. Omar Fenley: My dear boy:

I will try to write to you this evening. How are you. We are all well but papa. Diner-(horse) kicked him on the hip, it is a little better, but he didn't sleep much last night it pained him so much. Roy (Fenley) and Irvin (Fenley) were picking cotton and he was here by himself.

Well, I will tell you about my company. Alice and Flora (Bacon), Mrs. Word and Willie, Meda and Pauline (Spoon) have been here all day and just left. Eugene (Strain) was here last night. He and Roy went to a party at Dunlaps, got home about midnight. Eugene will leave Friday week.

Meda Spoon (Strawn) has been at Mrs. words making Minnie's wedding ring. Minnie went home yesterday. She is to get married today a week. Her and Redge Burnam and Pauline (Spoon-Taylor) came to let the doctor see her toe that has been sore so long. They cut a hunk of her toe off. The doctor says she will have to stay 10 or 15 days longer. They are afraid it will be cancer. (The Spoons lived on Colony between Moran and Putnam.)

Well, we think we will get through picking tomorrow if Joe (Clements) (married to Amelia Fenley) helps us. It is scattering. We won't have a bale of our patch. It will turn off a little one 400 lbs. We only got 420 lbs. of our 600.

They have the feed stuff cut and in the shock. Papa cut the maize, with Mrs. Words machine, is going to have it baled. Got all the coffee corn cut, but didn't get it hauled in. They don't know what to do first. John (Fenley) is starting to gather pecans and we are wanting to get the cotton in. They are cracking some. Lots of people are gathering them green.

Laws Bedford is going to turn in 40 head of cattle tomorrow so they have to fix fence tomorrow. Cap's stock stay in on us all time. He has never come back that we know of.

Lizzie (Stancill) Fenley John's wife has just come to help me. We have 35 head of cows in the pasture tonight. I guess they have played smash with our feed stuff! Today Roy and Irvin went down there to see if there was any more but it was

dark. Jimmie (Stancill) told Papa that Laws turned them in today.

Ethel (Fenley) and Robert Gresham spent today at Uncle Pleas (Robinets) They are getting along fine.

How do you like up there and what are you doing. We have looked for a letter all week. Omar, we can't hardly live here without you.

Have you had any more boils? Write and tell me everything. We were teasing Flora (Bacon) about Eugene (Strain) she said that was the last thing you said to her (teasing about Eugene). She has been in bed all week with flu.

She brought us a sack of sweet potatoes, a bushel of ripe tomatoes and some apples. Mrs. Bacon and Dick went to Scranton and got 4 bushes of apples. Ted (Bacon) Ed Thurman and Al Coats and a lot of the hill boys went to the fair last Saturday and came back Monday morning.

I guess your bucket of grub didn't last all the way. If we had known you were going to be in Cisco that next day we sure would have been there. Papa was in bed all day but I could have come.

Joe (Clements) brought Florence (horse) the day you left. Her and the colt are doing fine. She whipped

everything in the lot. We are afraid we will lose the old sow, have had to put her in another pen. Wish Papa would have turned her out long ago. We have your pigs in with the other hog.

We are milking 3 cows now. I have 7 or 8 lbs of butter a week to sell now. What do you think? I have me a new iron bedstead. I sold a dozen frying sized chickens and half dozen old hens. Give \$4.25 for bedstead and had 65 cents left.

Tell Cora (Fenley) I have a switch to make for Mrs. Shelton.

I haven't had a line from Aunt Tom (Grannie's sister) since she left.

Be sure and write Claud (Spoon). Altho he said yesterday he had a card from you. Claud phoned (Medc Strawn) this evening that Hattie has twin girls, born yesterday (one of the twin girls lives here in Cisco now, Louise Petty Bassett).

Kent (Word) is still at the gin. They have out 10 bales and will get 3 or 4 more.

You left your W.O.W. pen on the dresser. Must I give it to Joe (Clements) or Rob (Word).

Fannie Lamb is going with Albert and Eugene. He sold old Beck for \$15 and traded the wagon for a watch.

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## History Sample...

### JOHN EDWIN LITTLETON JAMES

John Edwin Littleton James was born 11 Aug. 1858, Barbour County, Alabama, the son of William Henry and Mary Ann (Albritton) James. William Henry James and his family removed to Rapides Parish, Louisiana, in the year 1877.

The earliest record of John E.L. James in Eastland County and in the Bullock Community was February 1892, when he purchased 43 acres of land for one hundred fifty dollars from C.B. and Lena Rodgers. He was unmarried at this time and did not remain on the land. The reason for purchase of this land may have been the fact that he had two sisters already located in the community. They were Martha Jane James, wife of Francis M. Nolen and Mary Frances James, wife of Lilly M. Cook.

John E.L. James returned to the Bullock Community in the Fall of 1902 from Navarro County, Texas. He had married Henrietta Rogers, 3 Dec. 1893, in Navarro County. Henrietta was born 9 Nov. 1879, Falls County, Texas, daughter of Henry J. and Sarah J. (Cardwell) Rogers.

John E.L. and Henrietta were the parents of ten children. All were reared in the Bullock Community and attended that school. They were David Maston, mar Olga Holmquist; Mamie Lou, mar Daniel Frank Brashears; Mason Delone, mar Ada Bell Brown; Mina Ann, mar Tom R. Bailey; Mabel Lena, mar Curt E. 2. Do not ASSUME that someone else is writing your family's story. Check with your other relatives to make sure someone is writing your parents, grandparents, etc., story.

3. You are not obligated to buy a book if you submit a story. It will be in the book whether you purchase one or not.

### THE STORY

4. Limit your story to about 500 words per generation (two typewritten pages, double-spaced). Your immediate family is a story; your parents, a story; and your grandparents is a separate story, etc.

5. The person writing the story should place their name and address at the top of the page. The Family name should be at the beginning of the story.

6. Type your history on standard typing paper (8 1/2 x 11 inches). Leave at least 1 inch margins. If you cannot type your story, we want it anyway. Take it to the Chamber of Commerce and

the local committees will see that it gets typed.

7. Please submit TWO copies. One copy will be sent to the publisher and the other copy will be retained by the local committees.

### PHOTOS

8. A family photo will enhance your history so please submit one if available. Photos of early, as well as present family members add much to your family history.

9. Old heirloom photographs are wanted. However, take your old photographs to a local photographer and get a copy made. Submit the copy to us because your old photograph might get lost.

10. On a separate sheet of paper, please identify the persons in the photograph from left to right. If known, please give the date the photo was taken.

### INDEX

11. On a separate sheet of paper, please record the full names of all persons mentioned in the story. This will help the local committees when the index of the book is compiled.

### SUMMARY

12. The local Eastland County committees want this history to be the best book ever published on a Texas County. If you do not submit your history the book will be incomplete, so please begin now.

13. We want a history on every family, both past and present, that ever resided in Eastland County. Length of residence in the county makes no difference. You may have been in the county for only two or three years but your children attend school here. This will always be their home, so you owe it to them and your later generations to submit your story.

14. Meetings will be held throughout the county next month. The meeting dates will be publicized in the newspaper and on radio. Feel free to attend these meetings and become involved. Well, I do LIKE one of that stations weathermen better than most but TRUST? Come on now, I only like their weathermen but I have had sad experience with some of their people in question of honesty.

At this point I might explain that the people involved were at another station when the problems with hoesty arose but have those people changed that much? Trust, like a good reputation, is built over a long stretch and by many acts but it can be wiped out in one.

In Abilene they acted exactly like the national media on vital and political questions. On the national network we heard that the question of marijuana was to be presented from both sides. So it began with a high priest of post spewing forth the usual, "It is no worse than liquor" (as if we needed another as bad as that) and, "there is absolutely no proof that it leads to addiction to other drugs." Tomorrow was to be the anti-pot day. Bewildered I watched and listened while an "expert" explained a lot of technical trash about what chemicals the cannabis plant contained. He exclusively used the scientific names lest at any time the man or boy in the street make a close connection with pot. Deliberate or ignorance? I can not tell but I kept up hope that he might eventually mention that in Arab countries where liquor is strictly prohibited but pot is not the "skid rows" hold not "winoes" but old pot-heads and they are every bit as pitiful. Maybe he would mention that we got the word

assassin from from the Arabic "hashasin" deriving from the time of Crusades when Moslem zelots would get wild on pot or hashish and go out to cut throats. ## Texas Treasury Has \$80 Million In Unclaimed Money

The Texas Treasury has about \$80 million in unclaimed money, safe deposit boxes, oil royalties and stocks and bonds that it wants to return to about 100,000 Texans.

Persons who find their name on the list may reclaim their property by calling the State Treasury, toll free at 1-800-321-2274 or by writing to the State Treasury at P.O. Box 12608, Capitol Station, Austin, Texas 78711.

The State Treasury published a similar list and about \$50 million was reunited with owners.

Under state law, checking and savings accounts, mineral royalties, insurance payments, safe deposit boxes, utility deposits and the like are turned over to the state if accounts are inactive for at least three years.

The state may use the funds for general state services and for education, but the owners or their heirs may file a claim at any time in the future for the money held by the state.

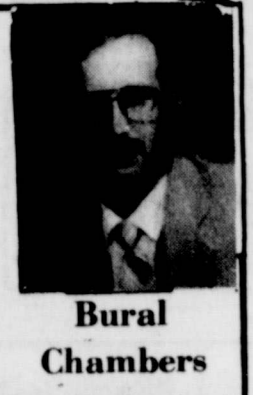

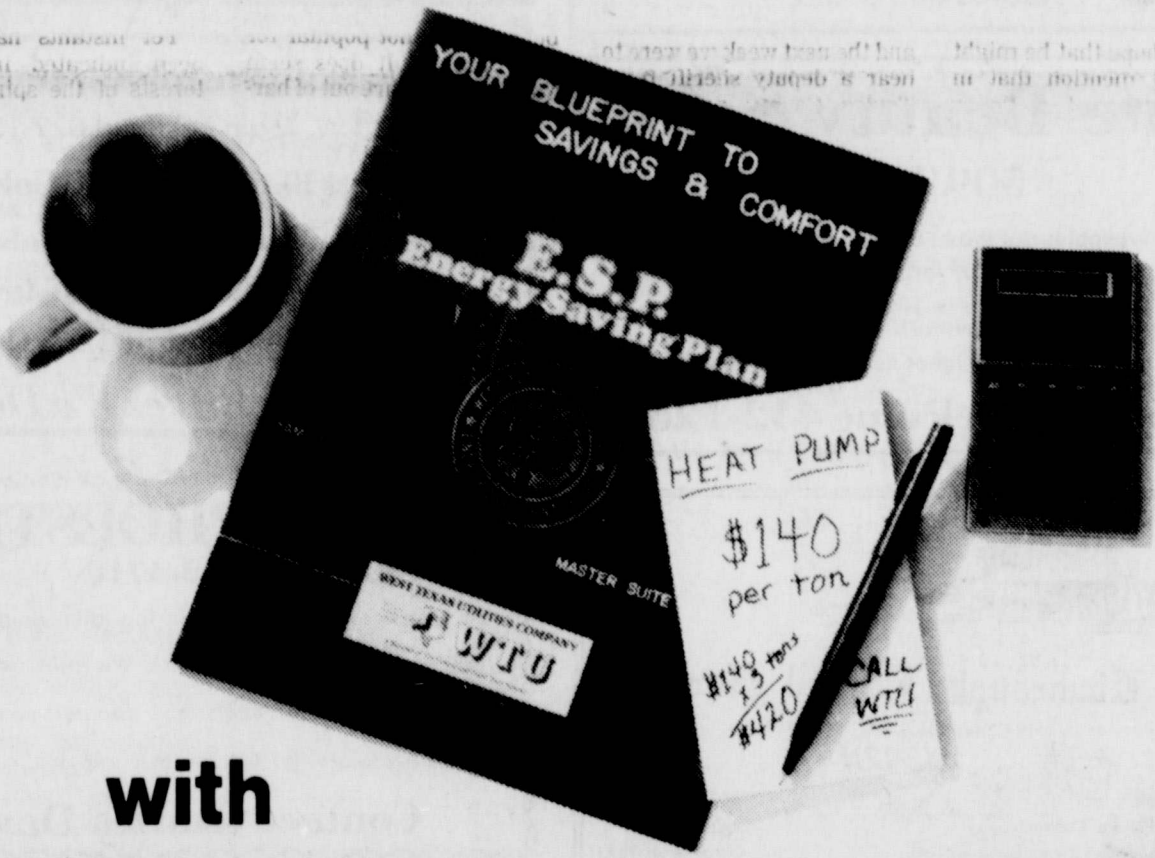

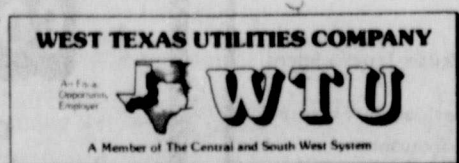

Cats, 11 foxes, three bobcats, three horses, two coyotes, a raccoon, a goat, and a sheep.

Rabbits, squirrels, and some other rodents are not considered to be rabies threats to humans because of their characteristics. "Although they may not bite, they may carry the disease, and it is remotely possible for a person to be exposed to rabies by handling them," Dr. McCasland explained.

Most areas of Texas have effective animal control units to enforce vaccination laws for domestic animals. These units also care for or remove sick and dangerous wild animals. But some rural counties and those bordering Mexico where vaccination laws are less stringent, are the most frequent areas for rabies outbreaks. In these areas, Dr. McCasland cautions all pet owners to keep vaccinations up-to-date and all persons to avoid any animals unlikely to have had shots.

He added that veterinarians usually take rabies immunizations every two years because of the likelihood of their exposure to the disease, and TDH further urges trappers, who may skin a variety of wild animals, and spelunkers, who may encounter bats in caves, to be immunized, also.

## Arson Fires Increase In Texas

The crime of arson apparently is becoming more profitable in Texas. The number of set fires increased 31.5 percent in the first six months of 1986, compared with the same period in 1985, according to statistics recently compiled through the Texas Fire Incident Reporting System (TEXFIRS).

TEXFIRS is an automated systems operated by The State Board of Insurance, State Fire Marshal's Office, to document the number, nature and causes of fires in

Texas. Three hundred and ten fire departments protecting 71 percent of the state population report fires to the system.

During the first six months of 1986, fire departments reported a total of 9,045 incendiary or suspicious fires which resulted in at least 11 fatalities, 53 injuries and an estimated \$39.2 million in property loss.

The amount of property loss decreased 12 percent from the same period for 1985, but injuries increased 17.8 percent and fatalities increased 22.2 percent. The dollar loss from these fires amounted to 22 percent of the total dollar from all fires.

"Incendiary" or "suspicious" were among the top five fire causes in every major building category. Residential properties were hit the hardest by arsonist during the first six months of 1986. More than 1,400 incendiary/suspicious residential fires resulted in 39 injuries, 10 fatalities and \$19.7 million in property damage.

Fires caused by children playing with the fire increased 44.8 percent in the first half of 1986, to more than 1,800. They resulted in 49 injuries, six fatalities and \$3.7 million in property loss.

Statistics from the TEXFIRS are made available to the public in an effort to

decrease the number and severity of fires through increased public awareness of fire problems, said State Board of Insurance Chairman Lyndon L. Olson, Jr.

# Fishing Outdoors

Seven hearty anglers met on Lake Leon, during some of the most difficult fishing conditions you could put together. A wind shift to the west with gust up to 40 miles per hour is bad on Leon folks, but add to this 3 weeks of constant fresh water entering the lake and most of it very cold. Not tough enough yet; well lets throw in a rapid 2 foot rise and a steady increase at this level. All in all folks it was just plain miserable for these dedicated crappie heads.

At the close of the day, Herman Mims came to the scales with a limit of 10 crappie weighing 5.27 pounds to capture first place honors. Second place Chuck Burgess 10 fish 4.04 pounds. Third place Kevin Weeks 2.47 pounds. And the fourth and final angler bringing in some fish during this terrible weather was Gilbert Rodgers with 2.21 pounds of papermouths. These gentlemen are to be praised along with the other contestants if for no other reason, just simply showing up.

The famous big tooth maple trees at Lost Maples State Natural Area draw thousands of visitors during the fall but apparently too few Texans are aware of the park's springtime charms.

Park Superintendent Roy Heideman said the 1,280-acre park is beautiful during the spring. "The maples begin leafing out around April, and the mountains laurel's purple blossoms make for some outstanding scenery," said Heideman.

Spring is a good time to take advantage of the park's 10 miles of hiking trails before the weather gets too hot, he added. "Also, Lost Maples is one of the few parks offering primitive camping in addition to regular campsites," he said.

The park already is known by spring birders, who come to the area from across the nation to observe endangered golden-cheeked warblers which nest in the park. Black-capped vireos, which have been proposed by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service for possible listing as an endangered species, also nest there.

The park is located in Bandera County northwest of San Antonio, five miles north of Vanderpool on State Highway 187.

How can you know what colors a bass likes in different water and light conditions. Until recently this was the problem facing all anglers. But now thanks to Dr. Loren Hill, chairman of the Zoology Dept. at the University of Oklahoma this problem has been made easier. Dr. Hill established a broad range of 26 colors for the purpose of conducting test. He then ran a series of test under different sky and water clarity conditions. Taking note of the responses of the fish and their ability to see and discern different colors under these conditions. After nine years of research Dr. Hill has devised the Color-C-Lectors, made by Lake Systems Division.

The Color-C-Lector is systemed much the same as a photographer's light meter. Equipped with a probe and a 50 foot cable lowered into the water a needle on the unit registers on three color bands. One for clear, stained and muddy water.

This device has proven itself time and time again by pros and the weekend anglers. But just remember the Color-C-Lector only shows which color the bass can best see. The angler must still choose the proper style of bait needed to best reach the fish.

Next time out we will look at a complete line of Color-C-Lector colors in one line of popular bait. The fish catching system 10 Rat-L-Trap by Bill Lewis Lures.

### PICKING COTTON

Picking cotton was a family job but sometimes it looked like the whole community was working in our field. We had lots of fun, especially when we had pickers helping.

Papa was a good picker. He picked clean cotton, clear out of the burr. Everything was clean in his sack - and I tried to do as he did. I guess I did pretty well, at least he always said I was a clean picker. I appreciated those words, and any other words of praise from my father.

Mama and Thurman goose-picked their cotton. When their sacks were emptied the burrs rattled. That

was bad.

We were always delighted when we went to weigh in. It was customary to guess how much the other fellow had picked. Sometimes we were teased and accused of putting rocks in our sacks.

It was a special event - and a very happy family - when we weighed out our last pound to complete the bale. It takes lots of work and lots of cotton (about 1600 pounds) to make a ginned bale of 500 pounds. It took a whole week to pick that much!

As the day wore on, Thurman and I got slower and slower. We got 'way behind everyone else, seeing every bird that flew over, every lizard in the cotton row, and when the big geese slowly flew over forming a perfect "V". Papa would say, "A norther is coming and we'll be caught in the field!" We watched those geese fly out of sight and this pepped us up a little. Sometimes we played with our little black dog, Toby, giving him rides on our sacks. Or we'd look up and watch Papa, who wore knee pads, rocking from the row on his left to the one on his right as he picked two rows at a time. He

sometimes sang little songs or rhymes to entertain us.

One I remember was:

A Jaybird sitting on a hickory limb

He winked at me and I winked at him

I picked up a rock and hit him on the chin

And he said, "Oh mister, don't ever do that again!"

We thought this was funny. Such diversions lifted our spirits and helped us bet-

ter work.

Finally, we were glad when Papa announced it was time to call it a day. We weighed our cotton, emptied our sacks, and went in home.

"Let's go to the house," everybody said.

This was each day's routine until the cotton was all out of the field and the cows were turned in to graze.

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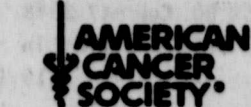
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# Area News Briefs

## CISCO

A hard rain last Friday night, with the soaking rains of the past two weeks, brought up the water level at Lake Cisco. Mike Moore, City Manager, reports that Lake Bernie, which is connected by a creek to Lake Cisco, has been full for some time and continues to spill over. Battle Creek, where the city has a pump station, has been running intermittently and the city pumps are busy much of the time there, Moore said. Local rains gauges measured 5 inches of rain for the month of February.

The Cisco City Council has approved a 2 percent raise in the city tax on motel room rentals. This brings the tax up to 4 percent, much less than was requested at a City Council meeting last month. The hike of 2 percent in the tax will provide about \$5,000 per year for the Hilton Community Center, which will serve as the city's convention headquarters. Two percent has been collected for several years to raise funds for the Chamber of Commerce to use in promoting conventions and tourism. The tax raise will become effective after the second reading next month.

The Cisco Historical Society is continuing to work on plans for a historical village and park near the Hilton Community Center. At a recent meeting the group heard plans to receive fourteen school desks from the old school building at Putnam. The desks are historically compatible to those used in the Word schoolhouse, south of Cisco, and will be displayed and preserved in that building in the village.

Eleven places are still available to anyone who wishes to travel with the Cisco Junior College Band and Belles to Villahermosa, Mexico April 26-May 1. The Band and Belles will participate in the Festival de Tabasco, which is similar to a state fair. There will be numerous excursions to places besides the Festival and one day of free time has been scheduled. The cost is \$595 per person, and this includes air fare, hotel, and most meals. For more information contact CJC Band Director Tim Jones at the College.

The Parents For Teens group has a number of events scheduled for the spring months. A Country and Western Dance will be held on Saturday night, March 14. A Sadie Hawkins Dance, which will be "Ladies choice", is arranged for April 18. Dances will be held after the May 8 FFA banquet and after the Ali-Sports banquet on May 22. 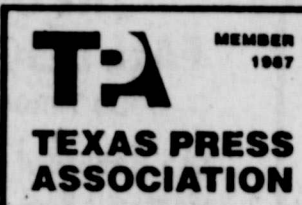

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## Water Board Authorizes Sale Of Up To \$15,000 In Water Bonds

AUSTIN—At their monthly meeting in Austin, the Texas Water Development Board authorized the sale of up to \$15 million of Texas Water Development Bonds. Charles Nemir, Board Executive Administrator, Reg Arnold, Development Fund Manager, will begin taking the steps necessary to sell the bonds.

In 1985, new laws passed by the Texas Legislature and the subsequent approval of constitutional amendments by Texas voters authorized the Board to issue up to \$980 million in bonds to fund water development, sewage collection and treatment, and flood protection programs. However, bond sales have been delayed until now due to uncertainties associated with Federal tax reform legislation as well as the potential effects of Texas economic conditions on the ratings of State of Texas bonds by the New York rating agencies.

According to Board Chairman Thomas M. Dunning of Dallas, a majority of the money to be realized from the bond sale is or shortly will be committed to water-related projects across the state.

In addition to authorizing the bond sale, the Board also approved a request by the

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Brazosport Water Authority for financial assistance in the amount of \$18,680,000, one of the largest loan commitments ever made by the Board. This request is additionally significant because the political subdivision is receiving the funds under new guidelines which eliminate the need for certain applicants to qualify as a "hardship" case. Formerly, applicants had to show that they could not market their bonds through commercial channels at reasonable interest rates.

The "hardship" requirements is waived by statute in the Brazosport Water Authority application for two reasons. First, the financial assistance is to be used for the construction of a regional water supply system—a concept that both the legislature and the Board are encouraging as a more effective and cost-efficient method for supplying water. Second, the new supply system will make it possible for the Brazosport Water Authority to shift the area's water supply source from ground water to surface water, a step that is necessary to alleviate problems associated with poor quality of ground water and land subsidence problems in that area. The new supply system will improve the quality of drinking water for all the cities involved in the regional supply system. In other business, the

Board authorizes the Executive Administrator to negotiate a \$316,000 contact with Abilene Christian University to fund a cooperative study to develop and apply borehole geophysical techniques to determine the quantities and qualities of freshwater and saline water in Texas aquifers. Schlumberger, Gearhart Industries, J.L. Myers Company, Layne Texas Company, and Res Tech will participate in this research project by supplying approximately \$615,000 worth of services. Assistant Professor Hughbert Collier and Robert P. Alger, a well known expert on borehole geophysical logs and logging techniques, will be working on the project.

The results of this 30-month study will allow state, city, and private industry ground water hydrologists to more ac-

curately determine the volume and chemical quality of water in aquifers of Texas through more standardized techniques in the use of electronic sensing equipment. The results will be made available to the public.

The Board also adopted a resolution supporting the Sabine River Authority of Texas' opposition to the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service's acquiring a perpetual, non-development easement from the Little Sandy Hunting and Fishing Club without full consideration of the possible impacts on future statewide water needs and without adequate coordination with state and local entities. The easement includes approximately 3,800 acres of land lying within the Sabine River Authority's proposed Waters Bluff Reservoir project in the Upper Sabine River Basin.

## Leon Dam Has Small "Skin" Slippage

The dam at Lake Leon has suffered a recent "skin slippage" according to Eastland County Water Supply District board member M.H. Perry of Eastland.

Mr. Perry stated that the damage "looks worse than it really is". He also said that the dam is as safe as they (the board) can get it for the time being.

"The board is anxious to get the repairs done but we will just have to wait until the area dries out and crews

can get in there and fix it," Perry said.

Apparently the damage was caused by moisture from the recent rains in this area the past few weeks. Between the rains, runoff and the lake action, the section began slipping and continued into a small landslide.

Mr. Perry remembered this same thing happening about 11 years ago. He also said that slippage was in the same spot as this one. Engineers had just two

weeks ago released a report to the board that showed the dam was in good shape with no slippage. This survey was taken in the past 18 months and the recent slippage had most likely not begun at the time.

There was no apparent damage to the rip-rap (rocks at base of dam) according to Perry, who also said that the board had already approved the raising of the rip-rap 5-6 feet across the dam and that this would be done at the

same time as the slippage repair. The rip-rap is used to stop the wave action before it reaches the dirt base of the dam. This prevents any major washout at the base.

"There is no danger of any failure of the dam", Perry stated, "this damage is no more unusual than a landslide on a highway embankment."

Highway engineers and maintenance personnel are to meet with the board on Thursday to discuss the repairs to the highway, guardrail and other highway department areas, according to Ted Kirby of the highway maintenance office in Eastland.

Mr. Kirby stated also that the lane was still closed over the damaged section of the dam and would remain that way until the board and highway personnel could reach a decision on the repairs. "We can't do anything without the board's o.k. since we only have an easement on their property," Kirby stated.

Engineers are currently studying the situation to see if improvements could be made that were not made 11 years ago during slippage repairs.

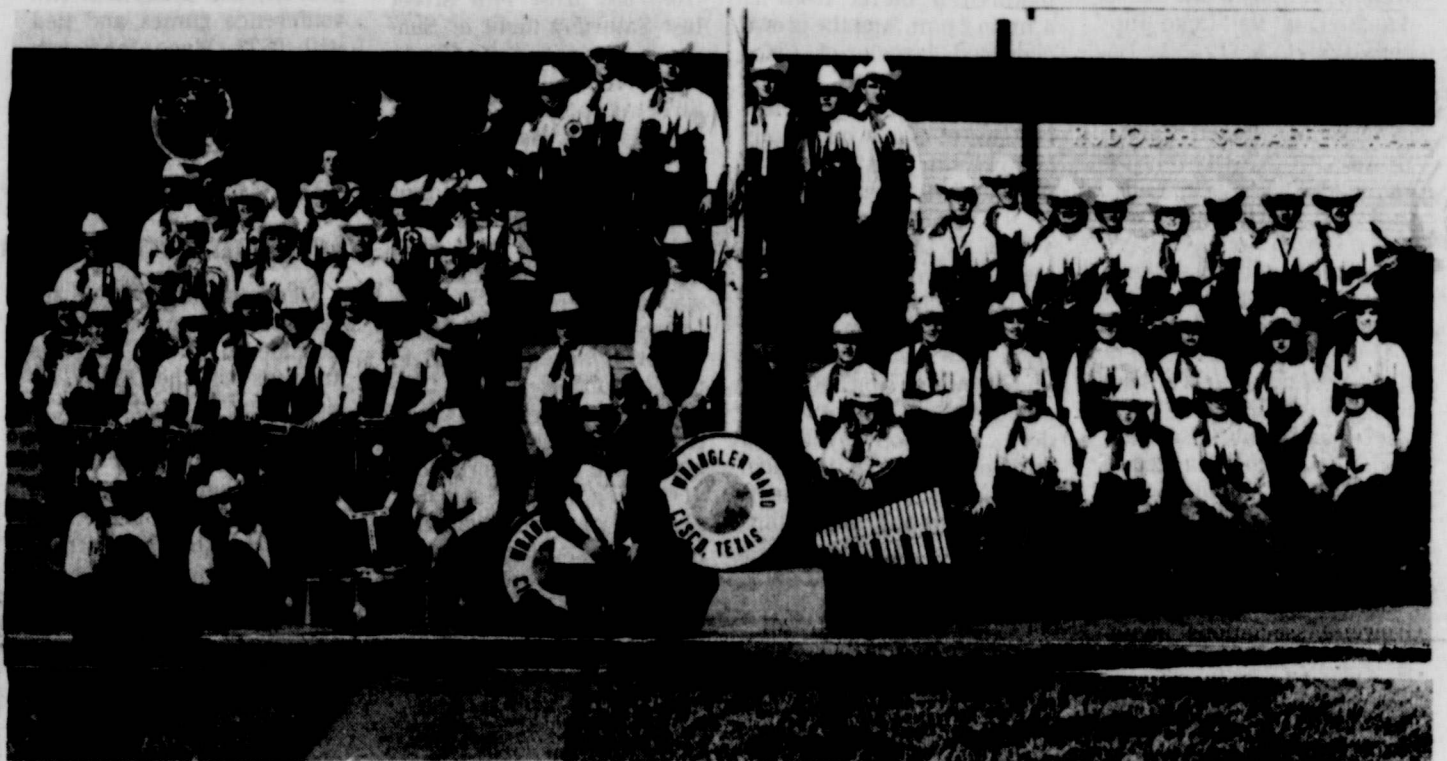

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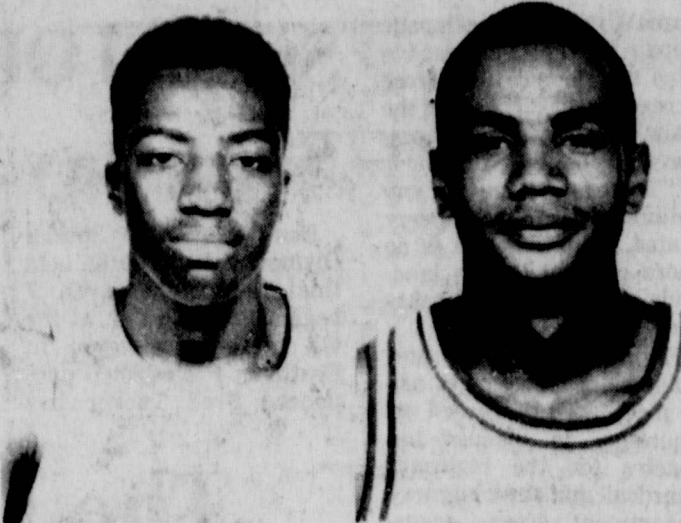
