CISD School Board Accepts Resignations At Meeting Thurs.

Doyle Walker, athletic director and head football coach at Cisco High School for the past two years, submitted his resignation to the board of trustees of the Cisco Independent School District at their meeting Thursday night.

Supt. Ray Saunders reported that a search would begin immediately for a new head coach and athletic director. Interested applicants will be interviewed by Mr. Saunders and others and that the board will be asked to take part in final interviews before the employment of a new coach.

Mr. Walker, who was not available, was understood to have employment as a coach in prospect for next year. He served as an assistant coach here two years before being promoted to the top post. A native of Abilene, Mr. Walker, 32, is a graduate of ACU and coached at Hale Center and Rotan before coming to Cisco.

"Mr. Walker is a fine young man and his contributions to our program have been substantial and appreciated," Mr. Saunders said.

The board accepted a bid of \$4,000 from Kenneth McGough for the old primary school building on Avenue A. Two other bids - for \$1,000 and \$2,500 - were received. Mr. McGough told the board that he would

make the building available to the Assembly of God Church which has property in that area.

The board adopted a policy for probationary teacher's contracts and approved an honors plan for the high school. The honors program will include advanced study opportunities in English III and IV, Algebra 1 and 2, Biology 1 and 2 and in economics. Other courses

may be added later, Mr. Saunders said.

The board decided to hold the April meeting on the first Monday night instead of the second in order that returns of the April 4th school trustee election can be canvassed and new members sworn in for the meeting.

Routine business, including monthly bills, was transacted by the board.

The program is set for 7 p.m. Tuesday, March 17, in the elementary school cafeteria.

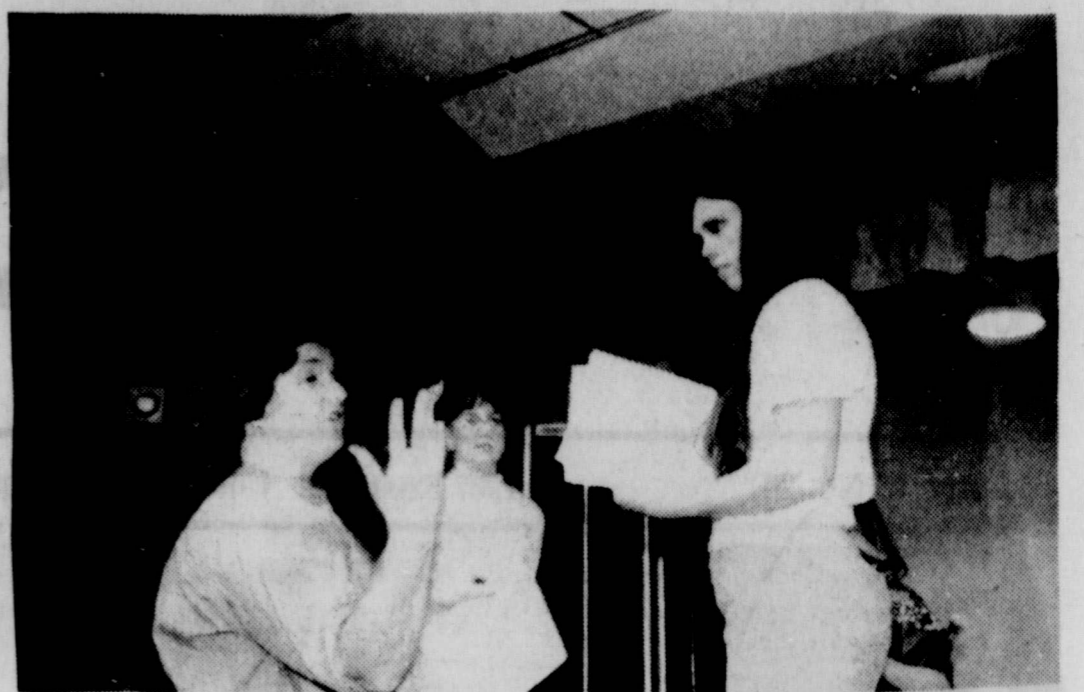
Three troops will present various aspects of Girl Scout life such as camp, cookie selling and renovating the Scout Hut. The program will include skits and some of the girls' favorite songs.

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Man Who Shot Wife Treated At Graham

A 21-year old Dallas man who faced charges in connection with the shooting of his wife at Abilene Christian University Wednesday was given emergency treatment at E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital in Cisco after his arrest on I-20 west of Cisco an hour after the Abilene incident.

Michael Warren Scott, the young man, was arrested when his speeding car was stopped by DPS Trooper Robert Ralls of the Eastland office about 1:45 p.m. - nearly an hour after the Abilene shooting of Kimberly Walker, 19, member of the ACU track team and wife of Scott.

The young husband was given emergency treatment at the local hospital after Trooper Ralls noted that he had been injured. After treatment here, Scott was taken by Patterson ambulance to Hendrick Medical Center in Abilene where his condition was described as stable. He had a gunshot wound in the abdomen, authorities said.

Miss Walker was reported in "guarded condition" in the critical unit at Hendricks Thursday.

Abilene police authorities reported that Scott could face charges of attempted murder. A bond of \$50,000 was set by an Abilene justice of the peace for Scott.

Trooper Ralls reported that he recovered a small pistol from the Scott car after stopping and arresting the man.

Friends of the wounded

woman told authorities that Scott had attempted to force his wife into his car. When she ran, they said, he fired two shots. He fled when she fell to the paved parking lot.

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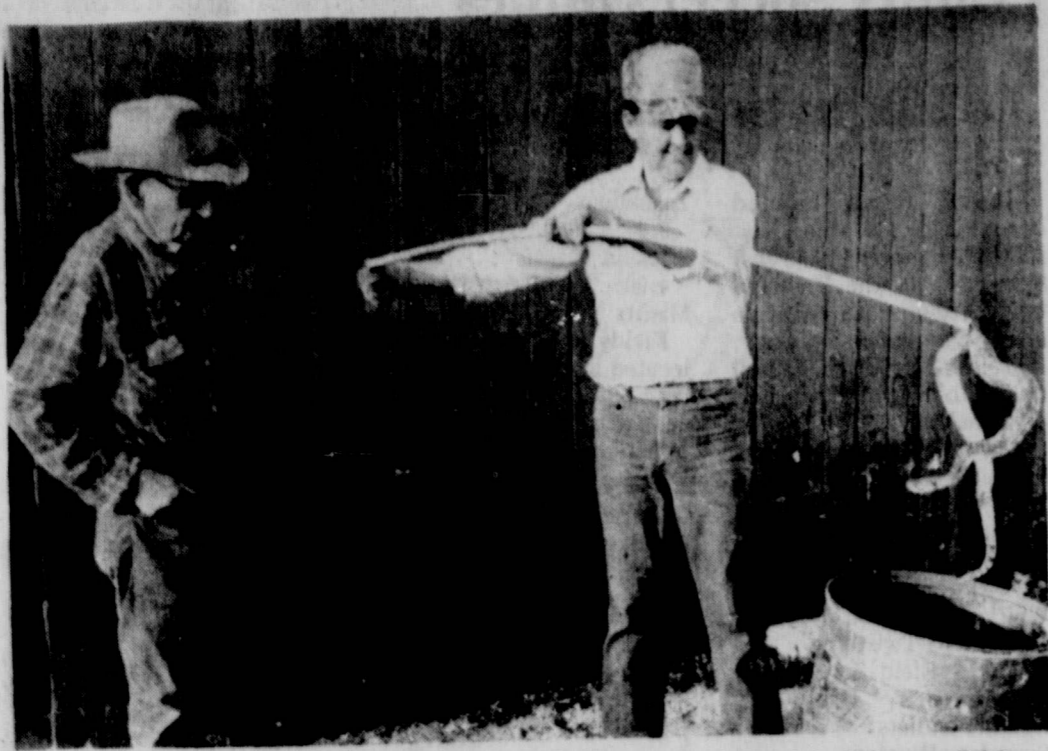

Reports of rattlesnakes being caught and kept in barrels or tow sacks seems to be the topic of conversation in nearby Stephens County these days as residents prepare for Breckenridge's First Annual Rattlesnake Classic March 21 and 22 at the Stephens County Agriculture and Community Center.

The show will open Saturday, March 21, at 9 a.m. for a special presentation to senior citizens and area scouts who would like to see the snake shows. The shows will be open to the general public beginning at 10 a.m. each day. There will be an admission charge to view the snake-handling shows, although there will be no

charge to get inside the building and see snakes inside a holding pit.

The event is being sponsored by the Breckenridge Kiwanis Club and there will be live snake handling demonstrations performed every hour throughout both days by professional snake

handlers, headed by Steve Raines of Granbury. Raines will also do a special show, called "Cobra Snake Kiss of Death," using cobras.

Persons wishing to sell rattlesnakes to the show may begin taking their snakes to the ag center, located along

Hwy. 180 East, Friday, March 20, at 5 p.m. where a weigh-in will be conducted until 9 p.m. Snakes will also be accepted for weigh-in throughout the day Saturday and Sunday.

All snake entrants to be judged for contests must be turned in by 3 p.m. Sunday and prizes will be awarded at 4:30. Trophies and cash prizes will be awarded for the longest snake, shortest snake and most pounds of snakes turned in during the weekend. Three places will be awarded in each of the three divisions.

Richard Byars, member of the Breckenridge Kiwanis, is coordinating the snake show for the club. He said, "Top dollar will be paid per pound for snakes brought into the show during the weekend." A price of \$2.85 will be paid per pound for live snakes un-

til 12 noon Sunday. After that time, a reduced price of \$2.50 will be paid per pound for live rattlesnakes. Heads from dead snakes will be bought at 25 cents a head.

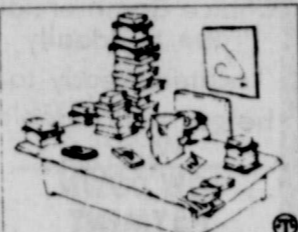

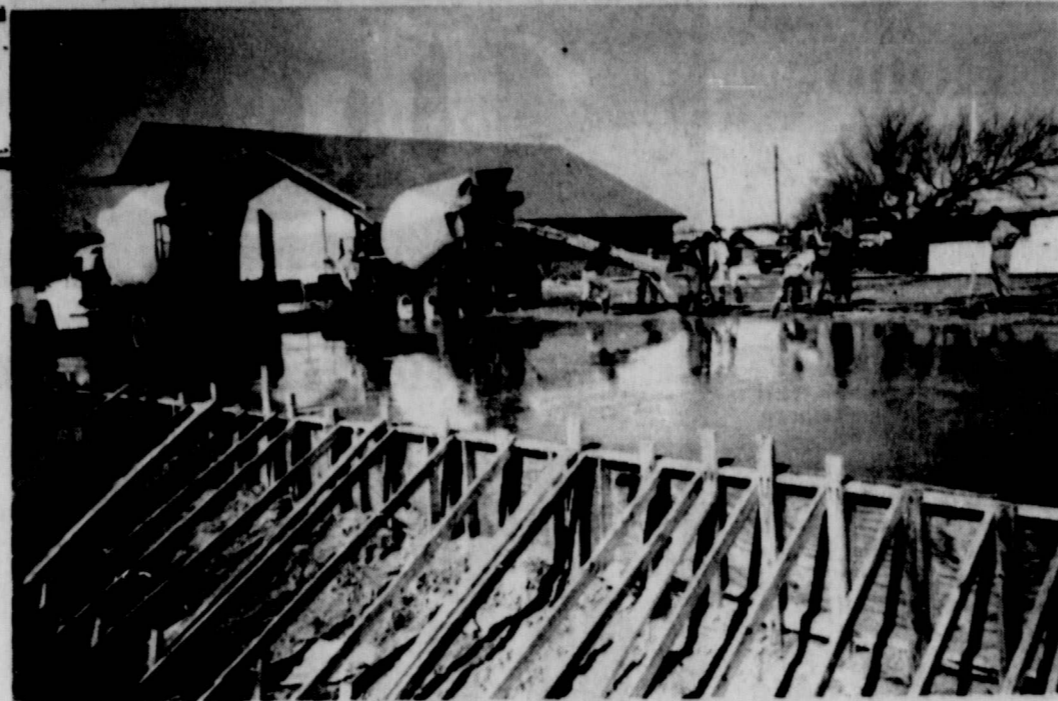
Meet March 2

CofC Discuss Possible Reviving Of Industrial Foundation

The possibility of reviving the dormant Cisco Industrial Foundation as a means of encouraging new business and industrial development in the area was studied by the board of directors of the Chamber of Commerce at their monthly meeting last Tuesday.

President L.D. Woolley of the First National Bank and head of the industrial foundation that has been inactive for several years appeared at the meeting to give the board a briefing on the organization that was formed some 25 years ago.

Mr. Woolley told the board that the foundation has assets of some \$50,000 in the form of time deposits and that these assets are available under terms of the foundation charter for use in community development activities. The CofC's executive committee of President Roy Dennis and Vice Presidents Emma Watts, Dan Dixon and Bural Chambers, which serves as a CofC industrial committee, will begin work on plans for reviving the foundation, it was decided.

During its several years of work, the foundation was instrumental in helping several businesses in their plans to locate in Cisco. It was the agreement of board members present that any help that could be realized through the foundation should be explored and used.

Plans for the current membership drive were outlined for the board by Chairman Charlotte Speegle's committee. The group has held three meetings and plans one other in kicking off the campaign.

The board approved a budget of \$39,700 for the coming year as outlined by Chairman Dixon. This was approximately \$1,000 more than budgeted funds expended last year, Mr. Dixon told the board.

The Gene Abbott Memorial Project, which was started in 1983 and has been in a "hold" status while location details were being worked out, was discussed and the board asked Mr. Dennis and Mr. Dixon to assist the community affairs committee under Mrs. Watts in reactivating the program. It was explained that the Cisco Lions Club was ready to assist with the project, which is to take the form of a jogging trail at the City Park. After the committee completes reviewing the status of the project, details will be announced, it was decided.

Manager Don Shepard told the board that the farmers' market committee has held

meetings and will be ready to reopen the market center at Hilton and 13th Street in May or as soon as crops begin maturing and produce is available. Plans call for the market to be open two days a week at the beginning. If needed, a larger center will be arranged, Mr. Shepard said.

The Christmas in May committee has selected four projects for the annual program in May, the board was told. Some \$600 has been contributed to help defray expenses and additional dona-

tions are expected, it was reported. Deadlines for project applications was Feb. 27th. Details will be announced from time to time.

President Roy Dennis presided over the meeting. Attending were Bural Chambers, Emma Watts, Bill Austin Jr., Dr. Ayres Cermin, Brad Kimbrough, Ronnie Ledbetter, Jerry Morgan, Bill Wright, and Manager Shepard.

The meeting was held in the board room at the Hilton Community Center.

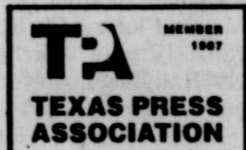

Anton White Tells Rotary Club Cemetery Association History

Anton White gave a talk about the history of the Cisco Cemetery Association for the program at last Thursday's Rotary Club meeting, held in Henson's Restaurant.

Mr. White said that he volunteered to be president of the Cemetery Association for one year, when it first started, but this is the eleventh year for him to be president. He also said that he really appreciates the Association's first group of officers. They were Steve Clary, vice president, Trixie Whately, who he said is never behind and always caught up with everything, Louise Karkalis, who did a wonderful job until she had to resign after an injury and Herschell Penn.

He said it all started in 1975 when a group from Stephenville went to several cemeteries and copied all the names and dates on the tombstones. Mr. White said that the report that they wrote was very derogatory on the Cisco Oakwood Cemetery and it said in one part, "This one was the most difficult to copy."

The Twentieth Century Club and the Dalphene Club called a public meeting early in 1976 to organize the Cisco Cemetery Association and about 50 people attended. They decided that it was every essential to the community of Cisco to take care of the cemetery because it does make a lasting impression to visitors, especially since it is located in the city limits.

Oakwood Cemetery covers about 40 acres and has enough spaces to bury 11,000 people. Mr. White said that should be enough for the next 50 years without having to expand. There are 350 blocks in the cemetery and each block has 32 burial spaces. In the beginning Mrs. Anton White went up and down each block of the cemetery and wrote down the names and dates on index cards. Now the Cemetery Association has maps of each name and date of every grave in the cemetery and there are six sets of these maps here in

Cisco. When the Association first began cleaning up the cemetery they had to cut down 416 dead trees on the property. Mr. White said it also took two years to get rid of the piled up dirt that was left over from burials. He said there were lots that were curbed but not filled in and they used the dirt to fill them in.

There is not any solicitation to raise money for the finances of the Association. About 60 percent of the funds come in from out of town donations he said. There is about \$123,000 now set up in trust funds for the Cemetery Association. At the ending of the fiscal year for 1986, the Association had spent \$24,900. They had bought two new lawn mowers and have

done many other things to help keep the cemetery beautiful. There is now 25,000 feet of water line in the cemetery.

Mr. White bragged on the workers of the Cemetery Association and said that Mr. Herschell Penn has fixed a lot of broken tombstones. And he said that Mrs. Louise Cooper, who took over for Mrs. Karkalis has also done a fine job.

Rotarian Eris Ritchie commented that he can't say enough for the directors of the Cisco Cemetery Association.

Billy Wright has the program for next week and Rotarian Bill Reynolds said that the attendance was about 80 percent for this week.

Gordon Spot

By DeMarquis Gordon, County Agent—

The fruit trees are in full bloom now or soon will be. It's time to get the spray ready if you want fruit free of worms and rot. Peach, plum and apricot trees should be sprayed when 75% of the petals have fallen.

The spray should contain an insecticide to control insects and a fungicide to control diseases. Diseases such as Brown Rot and Scab can be prevented by spraying with a fungicide. Some of the recommended fungicides include Benomyl, Captan, Topsin M, and Wettable sulfur. The number one insect of this is the plum curculio. This is the little white worms we find in the fruit. Other insects that cause damage are cafting insects such as thrips, stink bugs and lygus bugs. Recommended insecticides include Zolone, Sevin and Malathion. Some fruit trees sprays have a mixture of insecticide and fungicide.

Repeat this spray at 10 to 14 days after petal fall and again 10 to 14 days after the second spray. It will be necessary to apply as many as 5 or 6 applications at 10 to 14 day intervals except on early maturing varieties. Do not apply insecticides within three days of harvesting plums or within seven days of harvesting peaches. Be sure to read and follow directions on the labels.

We have Homeowners Fruit and Nut Spray schedules as well as spray guides for commercial growers in the Extension office to give you more information on fruit tree spraying.

If you have called the Extension office recently and got no answer or came by and found no one in the office, I hope you will be understanding. We are without a secretary for a few days. JoAnna Maynard, our efficient secretary for the

last five years, has resigned to devote more time to domestic responsibilities. It is necessary for the agents to be out of the office much of the time as we are conducting meetings, attending stockshows, establishing demonstrations, and making requested farm or home visits, etc.

Several people have asked me for the temperature for best seed germination of various vegetables. Soil temperatures at which vegetable seed will grow are classified into three categories—the minimum temperature required for seed growth, an optimum temperature and a "realistic" soil temperature. The realistic soil temperature is that temperature somewhere between optimum and minimum at which gardeners should plant to insure maximum success. For instance, if you plant at the optimum temperature it will be too late in the season and if you plant at the minimum soil temperature at which carrots, parsley, lettuce and spinach should be planted is 45 degrees F. Other vegetables and their realistic soil temperature are — beans (72), beets (45), cabbage (54), chard (54), eggplant (75), pepper (64), radish (45), tomato (51), turnip (50), corn (55), cucumber (64), cantaloupe (68), okra (73), pumpkin (75), squash (70), and watermelon (72).

The soil temperature should be taken about 8:00 a.m. and at the depth seed are to be planted.

The state program receives funding from two sources, the Federal Aid in Sport Fish Restoration Act (Dingell-Johnson program) and the State Game, Fish and Water Safety Fund.

Funds for the federal program are derived from a federal excise tax on sales of fishing tackle, trolling motors, motor boat fuels, and the like. A total of 10 percent of the state's annual apportionment from this federal program must be used to provide public access for boating facilities Hogsett said.

last 10 years or more. This time limit does not apply to a divorced spouse caring for an eligible child under 16 or who is disabled.

In addition, there is a \$255 lump-sum death payment that can be made to an eligible widow or widower, or if none, to an entitled surviving child.

When applying, it is helpful for the person to have certain proofs available including the worker's Social Security card or a record of the number, proof of age for applicants, proof of marriage for widows and widowers, children's birth certificates; proof of the worker's death; Form's W-2 for the previous 2 years or self-employment tax returns; and proof of support for dependent parents.

Do not delay applying if all these proofs are not available. People at the Social Security office may be able to suggest substitutes. For more information about Social Security survivor benefits, call the Abilene Social Security office, located at 142 S. Pioneer. The telephone number is 915-688-1360.

Whenever a family member dies, one of the survivors should inquire to see if Social Security benefits may be payable on that person's record, Glyn Hammons, Social Security manager in Abilene, said recently.

It is important to apply promptly because, in some cases, benefits cannot be paid for months before the month of application. This pertains to widows and widowers who wish to start benefits before they reach 65.

If the worker has enough credit for work covered by Social Security, benefits can be paid to:

- Unmarried children under 18; 18-19 if full-time secondary students; over 18 if disabled before 22.
- A mother or father caring for a child under 16 or disabled.
- A widow or widower 60 or older.
- A disabled widow or widower 50-60.
- A dependent parent 62 or older.
- A surviving divorced spouse can also receive benefits as an aged or disabled survivor if the marriage

Daniel Newton Taylor was born Feb. 27, 1870 in Cairo, Ill. to Issac and GeorgiaAnn Ballard Taylor. Issac died and GeorgiaAnn made her way down the Mississippi river with two small boys. She stopped in Lafayette Co. where Issac's family were. On Dec. 27, 1894 Daniel married Ada Thurman Hughes, the daughter of Simeon and Ellen Coffman Hughes. Mr. Hughes was a blacksmith and also lined coffins.

Daniel and Ada had six children. Pauline Taylor was born Sept. 19, 1895 in Lafayette Co. Miss. and married Albert Henry Skinner. Clorene Taylor was born in Miss. Feb. 12, 1897 and married Rex Foster. Emmitt Powel Taylor was born Jan. 12, 1901. Eunice Taylor was born Aug. 12, 1903 and died in 1906 at Carbon, Tx. Thurman Hughes Taylor was born April 23, 1905 and married Ethel Hicks. Thelma and Zelma were born Dec. 19, 1906 in Carbon, Tx. and died 1907 of pneumonia. Maurice Taylor was born in Carbon July 5, 1918 and married Jewel Justice.

The Taylor family lived in Mississippi and both taught school. In 1904, Mr. Taylor's step brother, Will Blair was living in Dublin and wrote Daniel that teachers were getting double what they were in Miss. Daniel and family got on a train to come to Texas but the job was taken by the time they arrived. The family settled in Carbon and Daniel taught at

Long Branch for one year. Then he bought a farm and the family sold vegetables for a living.

The children who grew up in those days had to make their own entertainment. Maurice and four of his neices and nephews always found things to do. While their mothers visited and canned garden vegetables, the children went into the woods. They built two under ground caves for playhouses even to fireplaces. They sneaked food from the house and cooked in the caves. One day one of the caves caved in with three children inside and the other three had to dig them out.

Maurice was afraid of trains and his parents had to hold him when they went into town or he would run and hide.

Legislature Report

Senator Bob Glasgow (D-Stephenville) reported that the Senate has taken action on numerous bills this past week and passed on to the House of Representatives several bills introduced by him.

S.B. 152 was introduced to allow county, city, and State law enforcement agencies a means of disposing unclaimed stolen property. Various law enforcement agencies accumulate property believed to be stolen. Current law, however, does not provide for a disposition hearing when an interested party does not petition on the court for the return of the property. S.B. 152 sets up the procedures to allow the county, city or State to petition the court for a disposition hearing on the stolen property.

S.B. 186 would facilitate the process whereby qualified bailiffs are provided to assist the judicial system.

S.B. 185 was introduced because a county treasurer is presently not authorized to deduct costs from a criminal bond returned to a bondsman. Further, a trial court is not authorized to tax costs against a bondsman when the bondsman is absolved from liability. S.B. 185 would allow a court to deduct from the remitter of a bond the costs caused by the defendant's failure to appear and directs that the surety on the bond is not absolved of liability until the costs are paid and the defendant is in custody.

S.B. 111 sets forth the procedures for the inspection of aquatic products by employees of the Parks and Wildlife Department at specifically defined places. "This bill assists the proper authorities to insure the quality of seafood and aquatic products purchased by Texans," said Glasgow.

In other action, the Senate approved and sent to the House bills that would:

(1) Allow a joint holder of a safety deposit box access if a joint holder dies, provided that an inventory is maintained by the bank for two years.

(2) Limit the eligibility for release on parole of a prisoner serving cumulative sentences.

(3) Notify certain county and district officers prior to an order of parole for certain convicted persons.

(4) Remove subject matter testing of public school teachers.

(5) Increase the capital and surplus requirements for new insurance companies.

For an initial one-time cost of \$30 per couple, members are permitted to attend the Saturday and Sunday events which also include a buffet meal, at the Metro-Central Hotel in downtown Fort Worth. (Hotel cost extra.)

The Saturday session, which begins at 12:45 p.m., is devoted to explaining the program, and the Sunday session which begins at 8:30 a.m., is devoted to explaining the marketing concepts of the program, the local resident explained.

The local stated that they had invested in the program and were happy with their investment at this time. Participants apparently are rewarded for bringing others into the program.

It was stated that there are, to their knowledge, some two or three couples in Carbon, four or five in Eastland, and as many as ten in Ranger, where an Opportunity Meeting was held last month. The company

began in 1980 and is in 26 states, but only in Texas for about a year, with regular seminars now operating in Odessa, Fort Worth and San Antonio, the local explained. The locals were invited by a friend in Mineral Wells where there are apparently a great number of participants. The locals stated that they

had attended about six weekend sessions.

The plan does not advertise and apparently offers a great number of investment opportunities through its marketing program.

One apparently has to attend the seminars to learn specifics.

FURTHER, WE'VE also talked to others who apparently are not happy with their invitation to participate, their participation and/or investments.

QUESTION: I am receiving medicaid and SSI. I have sold my house but I have been told this could be thought of as income in decreasing my SSI and affecting the medicaid. Is this true?

ANSWER: It could possibly be classed as income, at least a portion of the selling price. You need to see the social security representative when he visits your town, and by all means talk with your human resources representative.

QUESTION: What does it mean when the doctor says he will not accept medicaid assignment?

ANSWER: It means the doctor is participating in the medicare program, but makes the patient liable for the full amount of the bill. Let us give an example: The doctor bill is \$100 but medicare will only approve \$80.00. Now, medicare will only pay 80% of the approved, or \$64.00. The patient is liable for \$36.00.

QUESTION: Will medicare pay for eye glasses?

ANSWER: No. Medicare does not pay for eye glasses, hearing aids, etc.
