Contracts Are Renewed For Cisco Junior College Faculty

The contracts of administrators and faculty members of Cisco Junior College were renewed for the 1987-88 school year by the board of regents at their regular monthly meeting Monday night. The contracts were approved as recommended.

The annual professional contract for instructors and administrators was discussed by the board with representatives of the Faculty Association. Gary Hill, president of the faculty organization, was spokesman for his group and recommended minor changes in a new contract form.

The board took the recommendations under advisement and a new contract form will be presented and discussed at the April meet.

Dr. Henry E. McCullough, president of the college, reported on meetings with legislative officials in Austin. He said both senate and house committees are recommending college budgets be the same as approved in 1985 with the addi-

tion of a 2 1/2-per cent hike to cover inflation. Dr. McCullough has attended several Austin meetings of college officials in the past month.

Dr. McCullough gave the board a report on various school activities. Ralph Glenn, vice president for finance, submitted a financial statement for February.

The board approved a recommendation that a 1954 flexible bus that is no longer

in use by the college be advertised for sale to the highest bidder. The time for regular meetings was changed from 6:30 to 7 p.m. by vote of the board.

Area residents were cautioned Tuesday to be alert when strangers approach them at their homes for donations after a local man reported losing his billfold and \$185 in money to two solicitors Monday.

Police Chief Billy Rains reported that Burl Spink of 208 West 14 1/2 Street admitted two young men to his home at 3:30 p.m. Monday.

They told him they were collecting funds to help pay for a friend's liver transplant. Mr. Spink took out his billfold and gave them some money. He laid the billfold down and talked to the men for a time. After they departed, his billfold was gone.

Mr. Rains said the two men were white and in the mid-20s, between 5-10 and 6 feet tall and weighed around 160 pounds.

"We can't be too cautious in dealing with people we don't know," Mr. Rains said. "Give the police department a call if you have reasons to be suspicious of strangers."

Danny Schaefer Is Candidate For Place 5 In School Board Election

(Editor's Note: This article is being reprinted because part of it was omitted from the Sunday edition of The Press.)

Danny R. Schaefer, long resident of Eastland County, is a candidate for Place 5 on the Cisco Independent School Board with excellence as his platform. Election slated April 4.

"I think our schools are good. I have no axe to grind. No special group backs me for the promotion of any vested interest or the ouster of any one individual. I am running because I have three sons who will keep my wife and me closely associated with the Cisco schools for the next 15 years. I want to help in providing those children of ours and those of all other parents with the best physical plants in which to study, and a core of teachers to divest those studies, so that they will be conducive to the highest moral atmosphere possible. I dream of the time when each student in every classroom will be challenged to EXCEL. Along with the classroom excellence, I want us to be TOP NOTCH in all extra curricula activities; STARS in the band; in all University Interscholastic League; in literary and sports contests; and outstanding in the Lobo realm of football, basketball, baseball, and track and field events.

Schaefer does not endorse the "No Pass No Play" edict. "That is not new," he said. "That rule has been in effect for years, except the student was penalized for one week of participation and ineligible until he made up his work. I believe that penalizing a student for 6 weeks is too harsh for the student and the team. A six-week period of inactivity virtually removes him from every extra-curricula event for the semester. He can rarely catch up if he loses that much training in the athletic world, and that much practice in band rehearsal or any other event. I hope that Governor Clements sees fit to relax that rule.

"I also think that the career ladder program should be modified to improve morale among our teachers. The ladder leads to animosity among teachers. I hardly think an evaluating team can correctly appraise teachers with only one or two listings. I think the administrators, especially the principals who work with the teachers daily, are, or should be the ones who decide whether a teacher is doing his job and the degree of excellence in which he performs it. Give the administrators some power. Restore some authority to the classroom teacher. Use the money for the evaluation

committees, the success ladder, and the Tecat tests for teachers who want to study beyond their first degree. When they attain a prescribed amount of additional training, award them monetarily. In so doing, the less ambitious ones will gradually weed themselves out. I think this type of winnowing will produce a stronger faculty and enable any ambitious teacher to higher standards.

Danny graduated from Rising Star High School in 1967 and from Cisco Junior College in 1969. He paid his way in college by working as a disc jockey for radio station KSTB in Breckenridge.

After finishing CJC, Schaefer enlisted in the USAF in the summer of '69. Military testing showed his strongest aptitude in the field of electronics. Assigned to a special school in Mississippi for a year of intensive training, he earned his A.S. degree in electronics. The B52's on which he served as an airborne radar specialist, were stationed in countries adjoining Viet Nam. He flew on combat missions and still maintains his private pilot's license for a single engine plane.

Schaefer and his wife, Elaine, and their three sons, Sean, Matt and David, live in the Pleasant Hill community

I've Been Wrong Before

March 1987 marks the 100 year existence of Agriculture Experiment Stations in the U.S. Though the emphasis is on agriculture each advance by research has brought corresponding benefits of industry and to city dwellers. If a product such as soy beans is utilized to produce a better plastic or paint those who manufacture and users of the products benefit. However, if a synthetic is produced from gas or petroleum more economically then one vital part of the community is hurt while another benefits. The chief difference is that agriculture deals in renewable resources and while petroleum may last our lifetime, nature certainly will not keep up with depletion.

It is becoming as much a problem in agriculture experimentation as in other fields that somewhere between the laboratory and the public a great gap exists. Development is ordered more toward a cash market than toward the grass roots. Thus we hear of one seemingly terrific discovery after another but we fail to SEE a change in our situation.

Abundant production seldom reflects in a happier human race. Too often the result reminds me of a long ago movie in which a son of British aristocracy who goofed up repeatedly was palmed off on a company producing coffee in Brazil. There he met and greatly admired an agricultural scientist who caused three coffee beans to grow where only one had. The young aristocrat was greatly disturbed when depression resulted in the company terminating the scientist while keeping his own worthless self on the payroll. He was more than slightly incensed when an executive at staff meeting told of how much the average Englishman had increased his consumption of tea and asked, "Now what does that suggest to us?" The drunk young aristocrat volunteered, "We're in the wrong business." The next scene was the too familiar taxi with his baggage pulling up at home.

For some reason it seems that discoverers of benefits to humanity and hard working producers too often fail to receive the greater reward. Money seems more attracted to the fingers of manipulators. I don't know whether it is true or apocryphal crediting Omar Kayyam with saying, "Give me the cash and you can have the credit." If you got neither that would be the worst. Anyhow, I think Kayyam, the author of The Rubiad, wrote in Sanscrit and I'll be darned if I would learn that language so as to quote him right or wrong.

I have seen harvest pictures on TV with the commentator saying that American farmers are cursed with over production. That may seem strange with people starving in other parts of the world but would those who think we should feed the World do it for nothing? A few may recall the depression when coal miners were hungry but people needing coal couldn't afford it while farmers in Kansas burned wheat to keep the house warm because nobody would pay enough for wheat as to get the farmer enough to buy coal.

No it seems to me that there is no sense in handing out foreign aid just so people can buy our products because that only increases government debt. The simple minded notion that we only owe that money to ourselves may soon bear fruit in a national bankruptcy. Then the people enjoying that dream which must have been born in an opium pipe will expect those who disagreed to have a quick fix answer. At the same time the proponents of the failed system will think the cure is

more of the same. Sort of like the old superstition that to escape the consequences of a rabid dog bite was to ingest a hair of the dog that bit you.

We can hope that science will come up with a product in great demand which will require vast amounts of agricultural product and thus eat up the surpluses. Of course that would bring on anguished cries from some that it is sin to use food as in producing alcohol fuel while people in Africa and Asia starve. Let me submit that it is supposedly also sinful to expect another to work without pay and those who bleed for the worlds hungry gladly agitate, cry, and sing uplifting songs about it but have they ever gotten blisters from a hoe handle? The poor have you with you always. At least I have heard it quoted, THE Great Societys War on Poverty notwithstanding.

Agriculture Experiment Stations are authorized to make economic studies as well as the more publicised work. The trouble with studies is that it is hard to see whether a man is thinking of sleeping with his eyes open and if ever they open a perfect system of distribution it will be called pashism and revelation.

Annual Earnings Report Due April 15

Annual reports of 1986 earnings must be filed by April 15 by people receiving Social Security benefits who earned more than the annual exempt amount in 1986, Glyn Hammons, Social Security manager in Abilene, said recently.

The 1986 annual exempt amounts were \$5,760 for people under 65 all of the 1986 \$7,800 for people 65 through 69.

People who received some benefits in 1986 and earned more than the exempt amount are required to file a report of those earnings by April 15. Those who received no benefits in 1986 are not required to file a report, but Hammons said, those people should file a report to make sure that any benefits that might be due for the year are paid.

A person who earned less than anticipated, for example, may be due some benefits. The only way these benefits can be paid is if the person files an annual report.

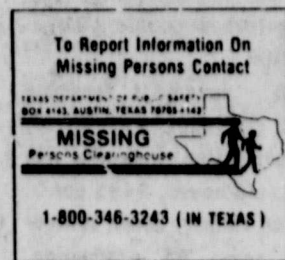
The general rule is that \$1 in benefits is withheld for each \$2 of earnings above the exempt amount. A person can have substantial yearly earnings before all benefits are withheld. For example, a 65 year old person whose monthly benefit rate is \$500 could earn \$19,800 before all benefits for 1986 were withheld.

Those who are required to file an annual report should have received a copy in the mail. If they have not, they should contact the Abilene Social Security office to get a copy. Those not required to file, but who wish to do so, can also get a copy at the office.

The 1987 annual exempt amounts are \$6,000 for people under 65 all of 1987 and \$8,160 for people 65 through 69. The earnings test does

not apply once a person reaches 70.

ORDINANCE NO. 0-87-1 AN AMENDMENT TO THE HOTEL OCCUPANCY TAX ORDINANCE, ARTICLE II OF THE CODE OF ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF CISCO, TEXAS AMENDING SECTION 19-17 INCREASING SAID OCCUPANCY TAX TO FOUR PERCENT (4%) OF THE COST OF OCCUPANCY OF ANY ROOM OR SPACE IN ANY HOTEL/MOTEL WITH CERTAIN EXCEPTIONS; AND ESTABLISHING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, the Texas Legislature amended Article 1269; 4-1, Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes, authorizing cities to levy a hotel occupancy tax not to exceed seven percent (7%); and WHEREAS, the revenue derived from said tax can be used to promote tourism and operate convention center facilities for the benefit of the City of Cisco, and other appropriate activities as allowed by state law; and WHEREAS, the citizens of Cisco would benefit from such programs and facilities; now, therefore, BE IT ORDAINED BY

THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CISCO, TEXAS THAT ARTICLE II, HOTEL OCCUPANCY TAX ORDINANCE BE AMENDED AS FOLLOWS:

A. Section 19-17 shall read: There is hereby levied a tax upon the cost of occupancy of any sleeping room or space furnished by any hotel or motel within the city, where such cost of occupancy is at the rate of Two Dollars (\$2.00) or more per day. Such tax shall be equal to four percent (4%) of the consideration paid by the occupant of such room to such hotel/motel.

B. This amendment shall be effective from and after April 1, 1987.

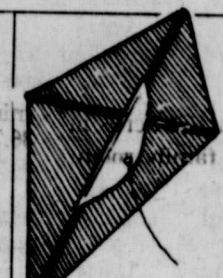

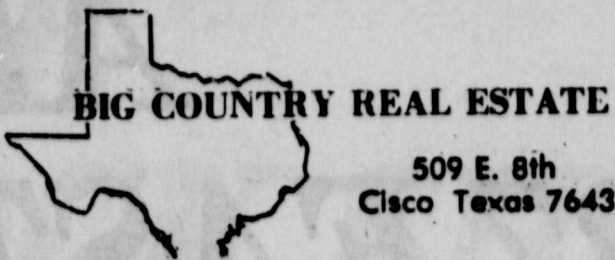

Albert Henry Skinner was born April 15, 1889 in Dallas Co. Tex. to Rom and Melissa Sprows Skinner. By 1900 the family was in Dublin.

She asked Albert to go with her to Hills Business College and he did. He took penmanship and had a beautiful handwriting. His mother passed away in 1913 and he returned to Carbon where he met the Taylor girls. Pauline and Clorene were born in Miss. to Daniel Newton and Ada Thurman

Hughes Taylor. Pauline was born Sept. 19, 1895. The Taylor family had a farm also.
The entertainment of the day was family meetings and socials and musicals. These were reached by horse and buggy or wagons. Albert and Pauline began to date but the Taylor girls left to go to their uncle's cotton farm to pick cotton for the summer. Albert and his family went to Dickens City to find work and there Pauline Taylor's uncle Will Blair lived. When the Skinner family returned to Carbon, Albert stayed behind. Mr. Skinner had wagon trouble and had to return to Dickens and found Albert and Pauline

had gone to town to get married.

The family moved wherever they could find carpenter work. This took them to Texas, Colo. and New Mex. during the war years as Mr. Skinner helped build army camps. The family often returned to Carbon and most of the children were born there. Edith Irue was born in Carbon, Nov. 25, 1916 and married Charles Hendon in Desdemona and Homer Long in 1959. Wilma Clorene was born Dec. 10, 1917 in Carbon and married R.D. Cate. Albert Henry Skinner, Jr. was born Aug. 8, 1922 in Carbon and married Anna May Lee in Sundown. Nellie Jack was born Feb. 8, 1925 in Carbon and died April 8, 1926. Daniel Paul was born May 3, 1926 in Carbon and died May 10, 1927 in McCamey, Tx. Benny Powell was born Aug. 8, 1930 in Carbon and married Wanda Beck April 2, 1953.

PROPERTY TAX RENDITIONS
31 Tuesday March 1987
file tax rendition!
HELP YOU PROTECT YOUR RIGHTS AS A TAXPAYER
A rendition is a report to the appraisal district that lists all the taxable property you own or control on January 1, 1987. You may also give your opinion of the property's value, if you wish.
You must file a rendition if you own tangible personal property used to produce income—such as the machinery and equipment used by a business.
The appraisal district may require any taxpayer to file a rendition by sending the taxpayer a written notice and a rendition form.
You may want to file a rendition, even if you aren't required to file, to preserve some of your rights as a taxpayer:
● You put your correct mailing address on record so your tax bills will go to the right address. If your bill is mailed to the wrong address, the law still holds you responsible for paying your taxes on time or paying extra charges for late payments.
● You can put your own opinion of your property's value on record. If the appraisal district then places a higher value on your property, it must notify you in writing of the higher value and explain how you can protest that value to the appraisal review board.
● By filing a special type of rendition called a *report of decreased value*, you can notify the appraisal district of significant damage to your property that occurred in 1986. The district will send someone to verify the damage and take it into account when assigning a 1987 value to your property.
File renditions with your local appraisal district at the address shown below. Forms are available there.
The deadline for 1987 renditions is March 31. You can get an extra 30 days if you ask for it in writing before the March 31 deadline.
For more information, get a free copy of the pamphlet, *Taxpayers' Rights, Remedies, Responsibilities*, at your appraisal district office or from the State Property Tax Board in Austin.

County Gross Sales Slightly Higher

The most recent report by the State Comptroller's Office indicates that gross sales increased only slightly in Erath County between the third quarter of 1985 and the same period last year. Cumulative sales for the first nine months of 1986 were almost identical to the value established for the January - September period the previous year. Sales reported by other area counties failed to exhibit a definite pattern as one reported an increase, another indicated a decline, and two were essentially unchanged.

Erath County reported a gross sales total of \$16.1 million for the third quarter of 1986. This was a 1.8 percent above the figure for the same three months the previous year. The cumulative sales total for the first nine months of last year was \$174.1 million. This was 0.1 percent higher than the figure for the same span in 1985.

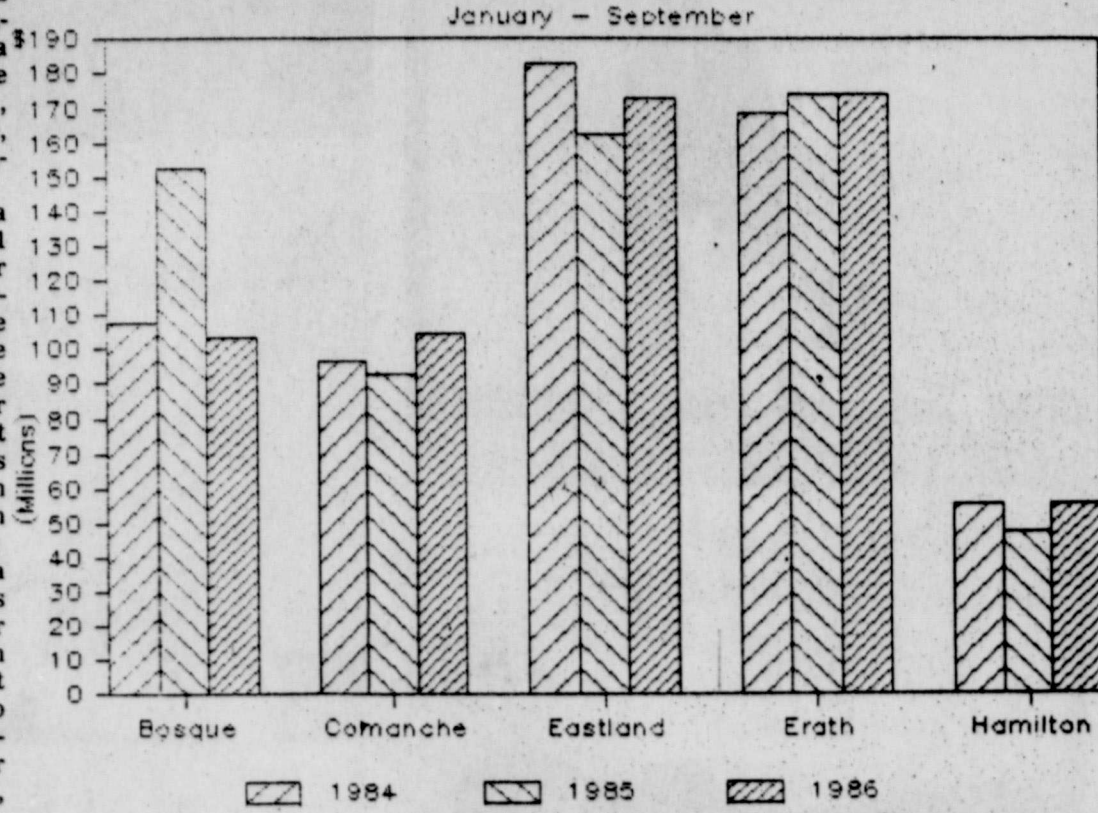
Bosque County reported a 43.7 percent gross sales decline as the third quarter figure fell from \$65. million in 1985 to \$36.6 million last year. Cumulative sales also staged a sizeable 32.1 percent drop to \$103.6 million for the January - September, 1986 span.

Comanche County's gross sales staged an impressive 34.4 percent advance to total \$41.8 million in the July - September period of 1986. Sales for the first nine months of last year totaled \$104.4 million. This was 12.7 percent above the tally for the same span the year before.

In Eastland County gross sales declined during a slight 0.4 percent to \$52 million in the third quarter of 1986. This was more than offset by a strong sales performance in the first quarter, however, and cumulative sales of \$173 million were 6.5 percent higher than the 1985 level.

Third quarter, 1986 sales in Hamilton County of \$17.4 million were virtually identical to those of the previous year. Sales for the first nine months of the year total \$55.8 million. This was 17 percent above the tally for the same span in 1985.

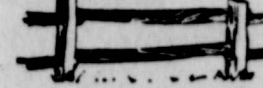

Graduation parties became killers until these rural communities started a kid-saving movement that is sweeping the country

A national awakening that started in rural-area schools can save scores of lives on graduation night, 1987. The method is simple: Provide so much fun for seniors that they shun keg parties and other "more-traditional" activities—and live to tell about it.

How nice, but everyone knows that graduation and alcohol are inseparable as bacon and eggs—with "toast" from joints, crack, pills or whatever. Who could be nerdy enough to imagine that hip, in, modern-day kids would ever give that up for...

Over and over, the reason given by school officials and parents for launching this new kind of graduation party is an especially tragic car accident, usually with intoxicated or freaked-out kids. "It got to the point where every spring around graduation there was at least one teen killed from drinking and driving," wrote Martha Sahnow, Washington County, Ore., urging FARM JOURNAL to tell about the new way to save seniors. "Then came the topper: A load of teens ran smack into a train."

Across the nation in Maine there were 12 teen deaths due to driving under the influence of alcohol during the "commencement" period of May 15 to June 30, 1979. In the Oxford Hills school district a carload of kids crashed into a shallow pond and drowned.

There were empty chairs and black streamers at the Oxford Hills High School commencement that year. Parents and educators vowed "never again." Before the next commencement, Project Graduation began there, its birthplace, as part of a Maine program to combat alcohol and drugs.

The community set up the Drug and Alcohol Team of Oxford Hills (DATOH), made up of educators, school-board, students, parents, law enforcement officers, clergy and drug-treatment practitioners. DATOH brought the chemical-free Project Graduation into being.

The idea rapidly spread across Maine, says Margaret Thayer in Maine's Department of Education. And since then alcohol-related traffic deaths of teens have dropped to near zero during graduation month. "There are lots of positive ripples," says Thayer. "Kids choose to have a chemical-free party. They make the commitment and still have fun."

It has been such a success in Maine—where 98% of the high schools and 80% of all graduates participate in Project Graduation—that the National Highway Traffic and Safety Administration for the past two years has promoted the idea nationwide. It has now spread to at least one school in all 50 states and three Canadian provinces.

Here's how to run a life-saving Project Graduation, right from the people who have done it.

It must involve parents, teachers, students and area businesses. Overlook one of those groups and the project is almost doomed to failure. It requires much work and considerable money to make a night so fun that it draws seniors away from beer bashes.

The party should start within an hour of graduation, and seniors who come must stay until their parents pick them up the following morning or give permission for them to leave. There can be no alcohol or drug use before or during the all-night festivities.

"We check them in at the door and allow no one in late," says John Parsons, assistant principal at Oxford Hills, who was involved in Project Graduation from the beginning. "Their vehicles are not allowed at the party; we bus them to the racquetball club from the school parking lot."

Rules are rigid at Oxford Hills. There have been arrests of party crashers and kids with beer in their car. Some schools use the honor system, but most station parents or teachers at the doors to prevent seniors coming and going during the night.

Says Parsons, "When the core of students believe in a chemical-free activity, they sell the concept to the others. There is a lot of peer pressure; they don't want a kid messing it up for them. Kids help plan the activities, so it's their party. They tell us what they want to do, and we try to make it possible."

"The secret is to make it so exciting and interesting that they want to come, that anyone not there feels left out," says Marva Webb, the teacher who headed Hillsboro High School's "Disneyland Northwest" party in Washington County, Ore., last year.

There was a duplicate of the Sleeping Beauty Castle from Disneyland in the gym (photo). A grass-carpet walk with lampposts resembled a scene from Disneyland. There were rooms decorated

in Disney decor, like Frontierland (seniors had been to Disneyland on their class trip).

One classroom became a "loud music" room, with balloons and rotating lights. There was dancing, a video room, game room, arcade, bingo—and a Honda scooter raffled after breakfast the next morning. Other prizes ranged from a Sony Walkman to haircuts, all contributed by Hillsboro business establishments. Each senior also received a "Graduation Night, Disneyland Northwest '86" T-shirt.

Shuttlebus service ferried seniors between the high school, bowling alley and swimming pool, with a punch bowl at each. In the school gym was a catered all-night buffet with turkey, ham, beef, salads, and a 5'x5' cake donated by a local bakery. "There was so much food that the kids didn't get through it all," says Webb.

But it doesn't all just happen. "Recruit, recruit, recruit to get parental help," is how Webb explains her early work. "You just explain to parents that it's for their kids, if they want them to be safe. Getting volunteers was really no problem. We had 20 meetings to put it all together."

To raise money they charged each senior \$5, but all were allowed in with or without a ticket—293 attended out of a class of 350. They also raised money at concession stands run by the seniors' parents at football and basketball games, and through bake sales.

In Maine, parties are on cruise ships, at health clubs, lodges, country clubs, resorts. At the Oxford Hills party there is an elaborate array of food, beverages, and hot-air balloon rides at sunrise.

They raise the money from a fund-raising campaign, contributions from local service clubs, "and unbelievable support from the business community," says Parsons. A pizza business donates all the pizza kids can eat; same for a doughnut baker and soft-drink establishment. Parents also bring food.

All that wouldn't mean much if the seniors stayed away, but they don't. "Over 90% of our seniors attend," says Parsons. "It has become the thing to do. It is not easy to go off and celebrate alone when your class is at the party."

Brian Crane (photo), now a student at the University of Oregon, was a senior at Hillsboro High School last year. "There was some skepticism because it sounded like the party would be lame," he says. "But it turned out to be more fun than I expected. I enjoyed it more and more as the evening progressed."

Was there too much control? "The only thing I questioned was to get home your parents had to get you or someone

had to follow you home. That was kind of tough. But no one expressed regrets, even those I expected to complain."

Debbi Atwater (photo), also a University of Oregon student and former Hillsboro senior, says all her close friends were at the graduation party last year. "If you left you couldn't get back in, and this was the last time we could be together as a class. I expected a lot of drinkers to stop in, but only a few came who had been drinking. There wasn't time. It started an hour after graduation. Besides, how can you swim when you're drunk?"

Debbi says she was a little worried that she would become bored, but "I had the best time. I wanted it to last forever. The next morning everyone wanted to go home and sleep."

"We really appreciated how hard the adults worked on a night just for us," Debbi concludes.

Most parents believe the hours spent on Project Graduation are some of the most important a parent can spend. "The challenge is to keep Project Graduation fresh and attractive to kids," says Parsons. "One failure, one foul-up and they'll go back to keg parties. If it saves just one life it's worth it."
