

by Terry Simmons The Eastland County Sheriff's Department has uncovered an organized theft ring that is reportedly responsible for over 50 burglaries in a 5 county area, according to Deputy

H.T. Fillingim.

The Sheriff's Department and Eastland Police Department Investigator Adrian Huddleston have recovered an undetermined dollar amount of evidence and stolen merchandise that includes liquor, auto t-tops, car stereos, tools, clothing, household items, appliances, cassette tapes, speakers, amplifiers, gasoline, fishing equipment and much more.

According to Fillingim and Huddleston more stolen merchandise will be recovered within the next few hours. They also report that this investigation will solve crimes in Eastland, Stephens, Palo Pinto, Erath and Comanche counties and possibly others before it is finished.

Fillingim reported that at this time 8 to 10 vehicle

burlgaries in Stephenville, 3 in Breckenridge, 1 vehicle and 1 commercial burlgary in Gorman, 3 commercials in DeLeon, 5 commercials in Ranger, 7 commercials in Eastland and 4 in Strawn, along with several theft and burglary cases at Lake Leon and 15 other cases of theft have been linked to the investigation.

The Jail was inspected Thursday, March 12 by Supervising Inspector Bob Dearing of the State Commission. A letter from Dearing reported that the Jail failed to comply on six items:

"1. The Intercom is not

working properly.

"2. Lighting throughout the facility has been vandalized and live naked wires are within the reach of in-

"3. Inmate activity areas do not provide 20 ft. candles 4. Plumbing throughout

the facility is in need of repair.
"5. The ice machine drains directly onto the floor.

"6. The drain in the detox

cell is stopped up."
Inspector Dearing added a note to these statements: "Recommend that Commission close this jail at the next meeting if item 2 is not cor-rected by that time. None of the deficiencies

Dearing listed included the jail population or proper

segregation, which were some of the major factors that kept the Jail from passing inspection in February, 1986. These items are cur-


"The wiring is back in shape - the wires up out of sight of the prisoners," the Commissioner said. "Part of the Intercoms are back at work."



WTU Requests Lower **Rates For Customers**

West Texas Utilities Co. has filed a request with the Public Utility Commission of Texas to lower the amount it charges its customers for

The petition, filed Wednesday, March 18, asks that the fixed fuel cost factors for the months of May through October be reduced by 35 per cent. The fixed factors are based on the expected cost of fuel as forecast at the time the factors are set, and specify the amount to be charged per kilowatt-hour for power plant fuel and purchased energy used to supply the customer.

Company officials listed three reasons for the request for lower factors. One is the softer market for natural gas, which is the principal fuel at eight of WTU's generating stations. Related to this is the recent renegotiation of a contract with the company's major supplier of natural gas. The third reason is the completion of the company's first coal-fired generating unit, the Oklaunion Power Station near Vernon.

If the new fuel rate is approved, WTU expects the costs being charged to its customers to more clearly reflect the actual price of fuel, thereby eliminating the need for refunds during the six-month period.

Since the fixed fuel factor method was established in 1983, WTU has made five refunds to retail customers of over-collections occurring while fuel costs were declining. The most recent refund was credited to customer bills in February.

EASTLAND COUNTY HISTORY CENTENNIAL MEMORIAL

LIBRARY ARCHIVES The County of Eastland, considered in the action of the Thirteenth Representative District in 1870, included: "Johnson, Hood, Parker, Palo Pinto and Jack counties, with the unorganized counties of Stephens, Eastland, Throckmorton, Shakelford, Callahan, Taylor, Jones, Young, and Haskell attached."

Hardy pioneers pushed westward and Eastland was no longer a frontier. The 12th Legislature had met in 1872 and passed into history, but the prominent citizens of Eastland, all of whom devoutly hoped and wishes for organization, had done nothing toward its accomplishment. This inactivity on the part of the older men stirred to action Silas C. Buck, a young lawyer living on the Davidson Ranch. He got himself appointed District Clerk of Palo Pinto

County and went to work. In Section 26 of Chapter 75 of the General Laws of the 7th Legislature, which met in 1858, an act enabled the creation of counties. It reads: "The County may be forganized as follows: Whenever the bonafide free white male inhabitants thereof, including all such recognized as Citizens by the Constitution of the State, over 21 years of age, to the number of at least 75, may petition the Presiding Justice of an adjoining County, there a footnote states that from 1869 to 1876 there were no County Judges in Texas) or the nearest organized county, asking such organization, and the person presenting the petition (being a creditable citizen of the county from which the petition

emanates) shall testify, under oath and in writing, before such Presiding Judge that the names subscribed to the petition are those of bonafide inhabitants of such county, possessing the qualifications aforesaid, and were affixed to said petition by each of said persons himself; then it shall be the duty of the Presiding Justice forthwith to order an election in said county for county officers, observing the provisions, as far as applicable, of the general election laws."

Armed with a six-shooter and a Bowie knife, for in 1873 there was still danger from Indians, Mr. Buck rode over the county hunting all the bonafide citizens.

acres, centrally located, and had conceived the idea of moving the county town from Merriman to locate it on their own land.

On their way to Mansker Lake to have District Clerk A.J. Stuart record their deed, the young men met J.H. Ellison, to whom they disclosed their purpose. "It can never be done," he said. The adverse opinion of the old frontiersman did not daunt them. They located the southwest corner of the C.S. Betts Survey, selected a slightly elevated spot of ground between the North and South Forks of the Leon River, made a rough sketch, and staked out the public square of Eastland (the name the Legislature had provided for the County Town.) It was January 15,

After having employed a Mr. Allen to cut logs for the cabin to be rerected in May, the young men, Jack Daugherty and C.U. Connellee, returned to Dallas.

In May, Mr. Connellee returned, accompanied by J.B. Ammerman, who had become a member of the firm. The survey of the town was completed, the log house put up where the La Roe Hotel (Mr. Greensfield, Prop.) now stands, and a frame storehouse build on the lot now occupied by the Eastland County Bank in which was put a stock of merchandise.

The goods and lumber for the store were hauled in wagons from Dallas, the nearest railroad point, by way of Granbury and Stephenville, thence on the Fort Griffin Road by way of Desdemona and Merriman. It was a military road.

From a point where Uncle George Moss now lives, and where the Texas and Pacific Railroad crosses Colony Creek, a road was blazed to the new town, and the wagons proceeded. The drivers were Heath Hale and George Martin. The founders encouraged settlement by offering a deed fee simple of any lot to any person who would put up either a residence or a business

Six miles west of Eastland lived John T. Townsend, R.S. Drake, and Ira Townsend. Tip Saunders, William Mann, and a few others lived on the South Fork of the Leon River; lower down the



PROPERTY TAX RENDITIONS



PROTECT YOUR RIGHTS AS A TAXPAYER

A rendition is a report to the appraisal district that lists all the taxable property you own or control on January 1, 1987. You may also give your opinion of the property's value, if you wish.

You must file a rendition if you own tangible personal property used to produce income-such as the machinery and equipment used by a business.

The appraisal district may require any taxpayer to file a rendition by sending the taxpayer a written notice and a rendition

You may want to file a rendition, even if you aren't required to file, to preserve some of your rights as a taxpayer:

 You put your correct mailing address on record so your tax bills will go to the right address. If your bill is mailed to the wrong address, the law still holds you responsible for paying your taxes on time or paying extra charges for late payments.

 You can put your own opinion of your property's value on

record. If the appraisal district then places a higher value on your property, it must notify you in writing of the higher value and explain how you can protest that value to the appraisal review board.

 By filing a special type of rendition called a report of decreased value, you can notify the appraisal district of significant damage to your property that occurred in 1986. The district will send someone to verify the damage and take it into account when assigning a 1987 value to your property.

File renditions with your local appraisal district at the address shown below. Forms are available there.

The deadline for 1987 renditions is March 31. You can get an extra 30 days if you ask for it in writing before the March 31 deadline.

Leo Williams, a dairy farmer from five miles northwest of Desdemona (Zone 5) was presented his Conservation Farmer Award for his careful and intense management of two tracts of land totaling 240 acres. Mr. and Mrs. Williams live on the larger of the places where he keeps a herd of 65 cows and 40 replacement heifers. He has managed to keep up land fertility while building up high milk production.

The other tract of land, his grandfather's place, consists of 90 acres along Hog Creek. Williams has restored this eroded and brush-covered place to an area of native grasses and clear, running

The outstanding Conservation Award for Zone 4 was presented to Charles Murphee. Charles and his wife Barbara and son Joshua live on their farm in the Romney community. Charles' main cash crop is peanuts. He owns 200 acres of land and leases another place on which he farms the peanut

Murphee fights wind and water erosion in a number of ways. One is to always leave a cover crop on the land. He has established a part of his farmland into Coastal Bermudagrass, and has more than one Coastal field so cattle can be rotated. He also sprigged in Coastal along a large gully across a field.

The Murphees recently planted a windbreak of 360

Afghanistan Pine seedlings for wind erosion protection. The seedlings are spaced

seven feet apart and the windbreak is one-half mile long. You have to be serious about conservation to put out that much work! Christy Hughes of Rising Star was presented her award plaque for winning First in the annual Conservation Poster Contest. She

competed with about 500 other entries from schools of the Upper Leon District, which includes Eastland and Comanche Counties and part of Erath County.

Around 200 people from

across this area filled the Country Club for the awards presentation to the Eastland County winners and others from the district. The visitors were also treated to a bountiful dinner and a slide show depicting the accomplishments of the outstanding farmers.

End Of An Era At Okra

This weathered old school building, the last remnant of the town of Okra, is being torn down. It sits on the east side of a road about eight miles south of Carbon, where a thriving community once stood. The land on which the building is situated is owned by Franklin Cox, who had used it as a hay barn. The lumber in the structure is reported to be in such bad shape that it cannot be sav-

Okra, located near Elm

Creek on the south side of Eastland County, was founded near the turn of the century. Farmers broke out the good soil in the valley and raised excellent crops of cotton, feed, and produce. There was once a collection of buildings in the town - two churches, the school, stores, and a cotton gin. A railroad ran nearby.

Many changes gradually

wiped out Okra as a town. The boll weevil ruined cotton crops, a revolution took place in farming methods, the school consolidated with Rising Star, and people moved away. The old school building was used as a Bap-tist Church for a number of years after consolidation.


Okra Community is now a quiet and attractive stockfarming area, a place people drive to when they want to get away from the rush of cities. But the old school will be missed by those who peas down the road.

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



Stewart Studies At Workshop

Dale Stewart of Cisco has completed a week of intensive study at the CA-6 Workshop, one of the largest gatherings of sculptors ever assembled, and which was sponsored by the Cowboy Artists of America Museum in

Kerrville. Five members of the CAA conducted the workshop March 9-13 for 80 carefully selected professional artists. The workshop was held on the idyllic grounds of the nearby Lions Camp for Crippled Children.

The CA-6 Workshop attracted participants from 14 states and Alberta, Canada. The states represented were Alabama, Arizona, California, Colorado, Montana, Missouri, New Mexico, New York, Nebraska, Oklahoma, Oregon, Texas, Wisconsin, and Washington.

The CAA is the most prestigous group of western artists painting and sculpting today, according to Griffiths Carnes, Museum director, and the museum in Kerrville is the only one of its kind in the country.

Led by Grant Speed, the CAA members who con ducted the worksnop were Pat Haptonstall, Mehl Lawson, Herb Mignery, and

The Cowboy Artists of America Association consists of 27 active members and 6 emeritus members. It was founded in 1965 and is

now regarded as the leading group of western painters and sculptors.

The Cowboy Artists of America Museum opened in Kerrville in April, 1983, and is the only museum in the country devoted to the works of a single group of American artists. It is supported entirely by admissions, memberships, print sales, and donations. It received no public funds. The museum hours at 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Tuesday through Saturday and 1 to 5 p.m. on Sunday from September through May. It is closed Monday (and

Cisco Police Officers Receive Certificates



The well-publicized overcrowded state prison system, which at times is refusing to accept new inmates and releasing inmates early, has not affected Eastland County at this time, County Sheriff Don

Underwood reports. His department has only transferred one prisoner to Huntsville since the first of this year, he said. This was a prisoner who had been convicted of an armed robbery in Rising Star back in the early 1970s, and who had been doing time in a federal prison on California. The sheriff's department here arranged for his transfer from California to Hunt-

During 1986, the county sheriff's department took about 20 prisoners to Hunt-

Faced with the prospect of fines totalling over \$24 million a month for noncompliance with the Ruiz federal court order, the 70th Texas Legislature enacted Senate Bill 215 which: * amends the Texas Prison

Management Act to permit release of nonviolent inmates when the prison population exceeds 95% of capacity;

provides \$7.8 million to the Board of Pardons and Paroles to contract for 1,400 additional halfway house beds for the increased number of released felons,

Beautiful Scenry.

* allocates \$12.6 million to the Texas Department of Corrections to implement court-ordered provements in the prisons' health services.

Funding for the emergency release program and prison health services was appropriated from the State Highway Fund 006.

State officials hope the bill demonstrates a "good faith effort" to comply with the federal court order, staving off the impending fines. However, Senate Bill 215 authorizes and funds measures that provide only temporary relief to the latest prison overcrowding crisis. The Bill amends the Texas

Prison Management Act to increase control over the types of felons released in an emergency prison overcrowding situation and strengthens probation and parole supervision. Under the new provisions the govenor may authorize the TDC director to grant additional good-time to two categories of pre-parole releasees - parole-eligible inmates and intensive supervision parolees.

Parole-eleigible Inmates -Under the emergency release program, paroleeligible inmates are trustys serving a sentence of 10 years or less for a nonviolent offense (excluding aggravated possession and delivery of a controlled

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categories of sexual offenses). Initially, good time credit may be granted in 30 day increments - depending on the number of releasees necessary to bring the prison population below 95% of capacity - but not to exceed 90 days. For the inmate awaiting parole, each 30 day good-time credit equals a 12-day reduction in required prison time. If overcrowding persists, the governor may authorize the director to grant eligible inmates additional good-time, not to exceed 120 days and/or authorize the Board of Pardons and Paroles to advance the parole eligibility and review date of certain inmates.

Intensive Supervision Parolees - Should the crisis situation continue, the governor may authorize the parole board to consider for early release to intensive supervision parole all trustys eligible for the program, but not yet eligible for parole. The parole board will prepare a list of scheduled releasees for the governor's review. The governor may only veto the release of intensive supervision

All inmates granted additional good-time will be transferred "to the extent practicable" to a halfway house until their parole date. The average length of stay will be around 100 days. Though the BPP ucrrently has 1,281 halfway house beds under contract, an addi-

tional 1,000 beds are slated for emergency program transferees. The parole board is currently taking bids to establish ten 100 bed facilities in or near major urban areas. Due to the exigency of the situation, a 36 days implementation timetable has been established for the pre-narale facilities.

The Code of Criminal Procedure, presently excludes certain eligible inmates from consideration for early release under SB 215. HB 51. passed by the House. eliminates the restriction and if enacted should increase the pool of programeligible inmates from 3,000 to approximately 10,000.

Funding for SB 215 is an emergency appropriation that expires August 31, 1987. However, the Corrections Subcommittee on Budget and Oversight, as well as the governor's office, recommended funding the preparole transfer program for the 1988-1989 biennium.

SB 215 provides local district courts with additional and strictor community-based probation options for defendants. However, emergency funding for the programs was inexplicably deleted during the legislative process.

Finally, by all accounts, the Ruiz federal court order was the primary catalyst for developing the pre-parole transfer program. State corrections officials now expect a motion from the inmates' attorneys to apply Ruiz standards to the halfway houses in the pre-parole transfer program.

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Home Child Care Has Study-At-Home Course

An Extension Service pilot program has shown that Texas women in the business of caring for children in their homes can improve their knowledge and skills through a study-at-home

Five hundred home day care providers participated in the study conducted by the Texas A&M University Agricultral Extension Service (TAEX) home economics program and funded in part by the Texas Department of Human Services (TDHS) and Corporate Child Development Fund for

Concern over the quality of child care is a statewide issue that prompted development of an Extension program to reach these family day care providers with education and training," said Diane Welch, Extension family life specialist and

Tests before and after the four week study period determined providers' knowledge improved in all the child care subject areas.

Welch says that 67% of the participants achieved a final score that qualified them for three continuing education units from Texas A&M University and 72% made one or more changes in child care practices. In addition, day care providers in 11 of the counties are planning network organizations among themselves after participating in the program.

According to Welch, TAEX is now in the process of implementing the program throughout the state. with more than 100 counties scheduled to participate in

"We expect to reach a minimum of 300 day care providers with education and training this year," she remarked.

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Texas Agricultural Prices Rise In February

Tarleton State University The good news on prices generally outweighed the bad for Texas farmers in February as the price index for all farm products rose to 132 percent in the 1977 average from 129 percent in January.

This preliminary estimate, which comes from the Texas Agricultural Statistics Service, indicates that the price gain was not universally shared as price decline for most crops partly offset a healthy increase for most livestock and products.

The index of prices for all crops fell from 91 percent of the 1977 average in January to 88 percent last month. This marked the third consecutive decline in this statistics. Prices of corn. cotton, cottonseed and oats decreased while prices of hay, grain sorghum, soy-

beans and wheat rose. The livestock and products index rose from a level of 160 in January to 168 in February. This reflects increases in prices of beef cat-
