The attorneys for the four defendants - Keith Woodley of Comanche, George Gray of Georgetown and Leslie Vance and Saul Pullman of Eastland -argued that publicity, including a front page story Sunday in the Fort Worth Star-Telegram, "devastating and slanted toward the state."

Garcia Murder Case Is Postponed

The case had been called

About 290 persons were called up as prospective jury members in the case. They arrived at the courtroom at 9 a.m. Monday, and were recessed at 10 a.m. until 2 p.m. All in the courtroom were dismissed around 4 p.m.

The defendants are Brenda Andrews, 24; Joe Perry, 47; Richard Hinton, 57; and Pat Starr, 24. A fifth defendant, Barbara Williams, will

be tried separately. They are charged with capital murder in the Nov., 1981, slaying of Mrs. Garcia, after she was kidnapped from her job at Quickway Grocery in Cisco. Thomas LeFlore, 42, and Charles LeFlore, 25, are serving sentences of 50 and 65 years, respectively, after their con-

viction in the case. Judge Williams, assigned to hear the case after Judge Jim Wright disqualified himself, noted that "It's clear there's a lot more work to be done" after hearing about the Star-Telegram article in which it was said that Thomas LeFlore recanted his confession. A Star-Telegram reporter inter-

viewed him in prison. Bill Hart, special prosecutor in the case, told this newspaper that "I'm disappointed. We have a good case and are ready for trial." He said he would continue

pressing for an early trial. The Star-Telegram article said that Thomas LeFlore had implicated the defendants in a confession after his conviction. Kathy Sanders and Tim Madigan wrote the Star-Telegram article that was accompanied by numerous pictures, including a three-column color photo of the murdered woman and her mother and

The videotaped LeFlore statement made in 1983 implicated Perry, Starr, Hinton and Andrews. In the recent interview, he denied any involvement in the case. Defense attorneys argued that they knew nothing of the confession recanting and needed time to examine the

The Star-Telegram article also said a statement made

by Andrews in 1982 was missing from files at the county jail. And the defense attorneys said they knew nothing of this.

Agreeing with the defense attorneys, Judge Williams said the Star-Telegram article could be significant to the case and "I don't blame them for feeling the way they do about this. On that basis, I am granting the motion for continuance." No new trail date was set.

The four defendants will remain free under bond, it

was reported. Observers believed that another judge likely will be assigned to hear the case when a new

trial date is set by the 91st Court.

Criminal District Attorney Emory Walton Tuesday morning stated that "no deals had been made with any of the parties who were first tried in the Debra Garcia case."

Area newspapers are car-rying stories indicating that Thomas LeFlore has stated that assurances were given him at the time if he would make a complete statement about the circumstances.

"Those statements are incorrect," D.A. Walton said when asked if deals had been made earlier.

Six Inmates From Eastland County Considered For Early Prison Release

Emory Walton, Criminal District Attorney of Eastland County, has received notification from the Board of Pardons and Paroles of the impending release of inmates from the Texas Department of Corrections as the result of recently passed legislation authorizing early release of inmates who are not charged with violent crimes.

Among those being considered for early release

CHARLES WILLIAM GILMORE, who has 2 convictions for Burglary and one for Passing A Forged Instrument with sentences for 10 years in each case beginning in August, 1986.

WAYNE BENTON WEEKS, convicted for Engaging In Organized Crime with a sentence of 8 years beginning in July,

BILLY JOE HIBBLER, convicted for Unauthorized Use of a Motor Vehicle, with a 3 year sentence beginning September, 1986.

ELBERT FRANKLIN, convicted for 3 felony DWI's for the maximum sentence of 5 years each and felony theft with a sentence of 7 years, the last DWI sentence of 5 years starting in February of 1986.

BRYAN DAVID FREY, convicted for burglary and sentenced to 3 years beginning in February, 1986.

KEVIN WAYNE GAR-MON, convicted in Eastland County for Theft By Check, Over \$200.00 and Theft, Over \$200.00 with sentences in each ase for 8 years beginning in May, 1982.

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

April 15 is the last day to apply for Crop Insurance for Corn, Cotton, Grain Sorghum, and Peanuts in Eastland County, Texas, according to Ardell Kalmbach, a representative of the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation (FCIC).

Crop Insurance covers unavoidable loss of production resulting from adverse weather conditions, wildlife, earthquake or fire.

'Three coverage levels (50, 65, or 75 percent) are available for insurance protection. Additionally, FCIC offers three optional price elections for valuing production lost or damaged," says Kalmbach.

A new Crop Insurance plan, called Actual Production History (APH), is available this year to producers of corn, grain sorghum, peanuts, cotton, and rice. Producers of these crops may now qualify for higher yield guarantees by

proving their yield history. Rates have been developed to offer reduced premium for producers with aboveaverage yields. "This change could sharply reduce the cost of carrying Crop Insurance," says Kalmbach.

To find out more about the APH plan, producers should contact a local, authorized agent. To select an agent, producers may check the list of agents at their local ASCS office. April 15 is the final deadline for applications.

by the Chinese Government at the end of WWII, and Circular No. 166, U.S. Forces, China Theater, dated September 29, 1945, was prepared for distribution to provide for issuance of the award. The demobilization of our armed forces and the general confusion then existing in China resulted in the documentation being misplaced. It was noted on some discharge documents and service records, but no one ever saw the decoration or received it.

But one persistent individual, Graham K. Kidd of Florida, who had served in the 14th Air Force Headquarters in Kunming, China, kept on investigating. After 29-years he succeeded in locating a copy of Circular

Decorations on the medal include the Lu Ku Bridge near Peiping, China, in the center of the medal. This is where the war broke out. Behind the bridge, and Generalissimo Chiang Kaishek, there are factories with smoke stacks indicating the victory and the prosperous future of China. The Hump Pilot Associa-

tion is composed of over 5,000 air crew members and support personnel who were engaged in the China-Burma-India Theater of operation during WWII. A major portion of the flying provided the entire supplies for the American and Chinese Armies and Air Forces in China-the first time such a massive airlift was ever attempted. The November 19, 1945, issue of Time magazine reported on page 26: "Unofficial estimates were that 3,000 Allied transport and tactical

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
