Judge Claude Williams Grants Delay

Garcia Murder Case Is Postponed

An indefinite delay in the trial of four persons on charges of organized crime in connection with the Debra Jo Garcia murder case was

granted by visiting Judge Claude Williams of Dallas in 91st District Court at Eastland after a seven-hour hearing Monday.

The case had been called for trial and selection of a jury was on Monday's schedule. The attorneys for the four defendants - Keith Woodley of Comanche, George Gray of Georgetown and Leslie Vance and Saul Pullman of Eastland - argued that publicity, including a front page story Sunday in the Fort Worth Star-Telegram, was "devastating and slanted toward the state."

About 290 persons were called up as prospective jury members in the case. They arrived at the courtroom at 9 a.m. Monday, and were recessed at 10 a.m. until 2 p.m. All in the courtroom were dismissed around 4 p.m.

The defendants are Brenda Andrews, 24; Joe Perry, 47; Richard Hinton, 57; and Pat Starr, 24. A fifth defendant, Barbara Williams, will be tried separately.

They are charged with capital murder in the Nov., 1981, slaying of Mrs. Garcia, after she was kidnapped from her job at Quickway Grocery in Cisco. Thomas LeFlore, 42, and Charles LeFlore, 25, are serving sentences of 50 and 65 years, respectively, after their conviction in the case.

Judge Williams, assigned to hear the case after Judge Jim Wright disqualified himself, noted that "It's clear there's a lot more work to be done" after hearing about the Star-Telegram article in which it was said that Thomas LeFlore recanted his confession. A Star-Telegram reporter interviewed him in prison.

Bill Hart, special prosecutor in the case, told this newspaper that "I'm disappointed. We have a good case and are ready for trial." He said he would continue pressing for an early trial.

The Star-Telegram article said that Thomas LeFlore had implicated the defendants in a confession after his conviction. Kathy Sanders and Tim Madigan wrote the Star-Telegram article that was accompanied by numerous pictures, including a three-column color photo of the murdered woman and her mother and son.

The videotaped LeFlore statement made in 1983 implicated Perry, Starr, Hinton and Andrews. In the recent interview, he denied any involvement in the case. Defense attorneys argued that they knew nothing of the confession recanting and needed time to examine the matter.

The Star-Telegram article also said a statement made

by Andrews in 1982 was missing from files at the county jail. And the defense attorneys said they knew nothing of this.

Agreeing with the defense attorneys, Judge Williams said the Star-Telegram article could be significant to the case and "I don't blame them for feeling the way they do about this. On that basis, I am granting the motion for continuance." No new trial date was set.

The four defendants will remain free under bond, it

was reported. Observers believed that another judge likely will be assigned to hear the case when a new

trial date is set by the 91st Court.

Criminal District Attorney Emory Walton Tuesday morning stated that "no deals had been made with any of the parties who were first tried in the Debra Garcia case."

Area newspapers are carrying stories indicating that Thomas LeFlore has stated that assurances were given him at the time if he would make a complete statement about the circumstances.

"Those statements are incorrect," D.A. Walton said when asked if deals had been made earlier.

Those who desire to give blood must meet the following criteria, said Mrs. Dickinson.

1. Donors must be 18 years or older. Those ages 66 to 71 years must have written permission from their doctors on a yearly basis. Those 71 and older must have written permission each time they give.

2. Donors may eat before giving blood and in fact, are encouraged to do so.

3. Donors must not have taken antibiotics for two days previous to giving blood.

4. Donors must show no sign of colds, flu or other similar illnesses.

5. Those taking blood

pressure medicine may donate blood.

6. Those who have had ears pierced, acupuncture or tattoos done by questionable techniques in questionable surroundings within the last six months should not give blood.

7. Those who have been in Southeast Asia in the past three years should not donate blood.

8. Those with heart, lung, kidney or liver disease are ineligible to give blood.

9. Eligible donors may give blood every eight weeks.

Six Inmates From Eastland County Considered For Early Prison Release

Emory Walton, Criminal District Attorney of Eastland County, has received notification from the Board of Pardons and Paroles of the impending release of inmates from the Texas Department of Corrections as the result of recently passed legislation authorizing early release of inmates who are not charged with violent crimes.

Among those being considered for early release are:

CHARLES WILLIAM GILMORE, who has 2 convictions for Burglary and one for Passing a Forged Instrument with sentences for 10 years in each case beginning in August, 1986.

WAYNE BENTON WEEKS, convicted for Engaging in Organized Crime with a sentence of 8 years beginning in July, 1985.

BILLY JOE HIBBLER, convicted for Unauthorized Use of a Motor Vehicle, with a 3 year sentence beginning September, 1986.

ELBERT ROSS FRANKLIN, convicted for 3 felony DWI's for the maximum sentence of 5 years each and felony theft with a sentence of 7 years, the last DWI sentence of 5 years starting in February of 1986.

BRYAN DAVID FREY, convicted for burglary and sentenced to 3 years beginning in February, 1986.

KEVIN WAYNE GARMON, convicted in Eastland County for Theft By Check, Over \$200.00 and Theft, Over \$200.00 with sentences in each case for 8 years beginning in May, 1982.

Walton explained that some of the above named persons had been on parole and had their parole revoked and now appears they will be

given credit for time they were on parole. He added that he was shocked at the early release of Gilmore who is facing three 10 year sentences after having served only 8 months.

Touching on many of his famous trials, including the significant Monkey Trial and the sensational Leopold/Loeb Trial, Darrow reviews much of America's legal history with salty

While studying for his master's degree, Garza received the American College Theatre Award of Excellence for the play "The Time Of Your Life," which was performed in association with the John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts at the historical Ford's Theatre in Washington, D.C. He has performed Clarence Darrow in several theatres in Texas, including the Abilene Repertory Theatre in Abilene and the Harbor Playhouse in Corpus Christi.

April 15 Last Day For Crop Insurance

April 15 is the last day to apply for Crop Insurance for Corn, Cotton, Grain Sorghum, and Peanuts in Eastland County, Texas, according to Ardell Kalmbach, a representative of the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation (FCIC).

Crop Insurance covers unavoidable loss of production resulting from adverse weather conditions, wildlife, earthquake or fire.

"Three coverage levels (50, 65, or 75 percent) are available for insurance protection. Additionally, FCIC offers three optional price elections for valuing production lost or damaged," says Kalmbach.

A new Crop Insurance plan, called Actual Production History (APH), is available this year to producers of corn, grain sorghum, peanuts, cotton, and rice. Producers of these crops may now qualify for higher yield guarantees by

proving their yield history. Rates have been developed to offer reduced premium for producers with above-average yields. "This change could sharply reduce the cost of carrying Crop Insurance," says Kalmbach.

To find out more about the APH plan, producers should contact a local, authorized agent. To select an agent, producers may check the list of agents at their local ASCS office. April 15 is the final deadline for applications.



I've Been Wrong Before

It seems to me that people fall into two main classes after you eliminate those who are too confused to understand. They are those who care and those who feel like Rhet Butler of Gone With the Wind in reply to Scarlet O'Hara's question as to what would become of her. Those, "Frankly, my dear, I don't give a —" ones probably never will until it is too late. The rest at least try.

However, as many seem to run up against a stone wall only a few persevere. If they write a letter to a major paper it may not get printed and they give up. Their letter may have been very old but space shortage or some event of seemingly greater local interest may be given all the open space at that date. Still, not understanding the reason, they give up. Some write letters to Congressmen and Senators and because those offices get vast numbers of letters the reply is a form letter. Their opinion (if honestly reported by staff to legislator) is listed on a tally sheet for each major issue. A single

tally may seem like little recognition for a letter into which one poured his or her best efforts. The form letter in reply may fit both sides of an argument or may be tailored as a separate reply to each side.

At times one can receive a form letter which could fit any or all views and subjects. It might surprise you how many are satisfied with such "Mother Hubbard" replies which seem to cover all and touch nothing.

I was once infuriated by a letter from the office of Senator Bentsen which thanked me for supporting a view I was violently opposed to. Then again a man in Brownwood was telling me how he really told the senator and how his reply took note. To his dismay I later showed him copies of replies on that question dated at five different times the oldest being over three years before. Each was word for word identical except for date and whom to. I must admit that it was a good letter if it served so long and fooled so many. The senator's views were SOS (same old stuff) set in concrete and though it had produced no good was not about to be reconsidered. The philosophy of the senator has often been clearly stated. He says that people elected him

because he is wiser than the average and even when his mail runs three to one against his view he votes his own way. That is hardly what I consider "representative government". I do not advocate government by public opinion poll but there must be a middle ground.

The problem for many doesn't seem to be lack of sense but lack of time. It takes so much out of the average couple just to make a living that they have little left for keeping abreast of politics. Of course that would suit dishonest manipulators just fine. Some believe both working was planned for that reason.

Those who are so unfortunate as to be turned off by the dishonest of politics cause me to think of some who in Amos 5:19 "—did flee from a lion and a bear met him.—". They will flee from the lying and meet a Russian bear. At times I feel like I have heard all the lying I

Given the scant rate of convictions here it was not strange that the D.A. accepted. That much I heard. My informant did not tell me whether others also committed themselves to that deal. At any rate the LeFlore boys went to prison.

This did not however satisfy those who felt that others who had taken part in

the awful deed should likewise pay for their part in the crime. The part played by one Charles was willing to sacrifice his chances to protect was said to be greater than that of others. Obviously it would seem odd if not downright unjust if she went free while the others faced trial. At that point the law, not in possession of a strong case but convinced that those with whom the crime originated, one being the actual executioner were in prison ceased to press hard.

Thereupon money was spent by individuals to hire further and independent investigation. The result is the present group of trials.

Though some may criticize the D.A. for the deal (of which I certainly have no proof) I feel that he did the thing he felt best at a very difficult time. That others do not feel bound by his deal is

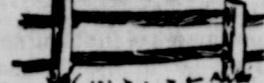

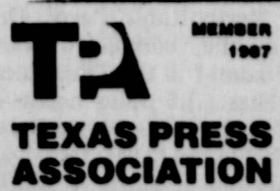

Eight cows bearing Hudnall's brand were sold at the Eastland Livestock Auction on Aug. 11 and five more were sold Aug. 25, Thompson said.

Information gathered during an investigation of the sale suggested that Martin may have stolen the cows, Counts said.

Mrs. H.M. (Jack) Stephenson, of Cisco accepted the China War Memorial Medal in behalf of her late husband. The medal was given to her husband, posthumously by the Government of the Republic of China. Mr. Stephenson died in April of 1984.

Known as the "lost" decoration of World War II, this Medal commemorates service in China with our Chinese allies in the defeat of the Empire of Japan. The decoration was authorized

by the Chinese Government at the end of WWII, and Circular No. 166, U.S. Forces, China Theater, dated September 29, 1945, was prepared for distribution to provide for issuance of the award. The hasty demobilization of our armed forces and the general confusion then existing in China resulted in the documentation being misplaced. It was noted on some discharge documents and service records, but no one ever saw the decoration or received it. It was generally considered to be a myth by those who had heard the rumors about it.

But one persistent individual, Graham K. Kidd of Florida, who had served in the 14th Air Force Headquarters in Kunming, China, kept on investigating. After 29-years he succeeded in locating a copy of Circular No. 166.

Decorations on the medal include the Lu Ku Bridge near Peiping, China, in the center of the medal. This is where the war broke out. Behind the bridge, and Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek, there are factories with smoke stacks indicating the victory and the prosperous future of China.

The Hump Pilot Association is composed of over 5,000 air crew members and support personnel who were engaged in the China-Burma-India Theater of operation during WWII. A major portion of the flying provided the entire supplies for the American and Chinese Armies and Air Forces in China—the first time such a massive airlift was ever attempted. The November 19, 1945, issue of Time magazine reported on page 26: "Unofficial estimates were that 3,000 Allied transport and tactical

aircraft had been lost among those jagged peaks (Himalaya Mountains). But for this price, the U.S. had backed China, and the U.S. units in China, with invaluable aid: 78,000 tons went over the Hump in the peak month of July." These downed aircraft made an "aluminum trail" over the "Hump," as the Himalayas were called. The terrible weather and rugged terrain posed as constant a danger as the Japanese fighters and bombers.

Stephenson piloted a C-54 four engine aircraft, and flew the Hump in 1945-46.

A two-volume set of books, China Airlift—The Hump, records a first hand history of the CBI Theater during WWII and is available through the association. HPA has erected a memorial those who flew the "Hump" which is located at the Air

Force Museum, Wright-Patterson Air Force Base, Dayton, Ohio.

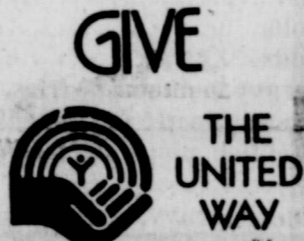

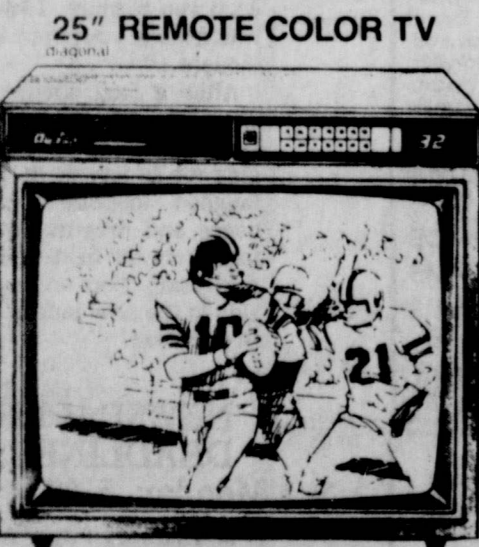

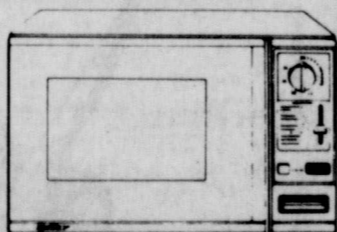
