## Council Agrees To Find Solution For Battle Creek Pump Station

Cisco city council members discussed the status of Battle Creek pumping station at their regular meeting held Tuesday, April 14. Council members agreed that the pumping station is important to the city of Cisco water supply. They authorized city manager, Mike Moore, to contact engineers about renovation or redevelopment of the pumping station.

City manager Mike Moore said that he will meet with engineers on April 23 and together they will survey Battle Creek. He said, "We want to make Battle Creek a reliable asset to the community of Cisco."

In other matters council members agreed that since the 70th Legislature of the State of Texas has convened into regular session, copies of a resolution and copies of the Senate and House bills were sent to the following elected officials. Senator Glasgow, Lt. Gov. Hobby,

Representative Jim Parker and Speaker of the House, Gib Lewis each received a copy of the resolution listing the proposed senate and house bills specifically supported by the Cisco City Council and the senate and house bills opposed by the Cisco City Council.

City Manager Moore said that he was directed by the City of Cisco to send copies of the resolution to the legislative representatives and other appropriate elected officials, and to solicit their active support for passage or denial, as appropriate of the bills as listed in the resolution. He said a significant number of bills have been filed relating to the operations and functions of municipalities. He said the resolution will list the bills that the city opposes that could erode generating revenue abilities or any which give special consideration to any group or class of city employee.

Mike said that as the bills are filed and move through

the legislative process, he will continue to monitor their effect on the City of Cisco.

In other motions the council approved to extend the term of the Franchise of the

City of Cisco cablevision and to increase the Franchise Fee from three percent to five percent. It will become effective on May 1.

During the meeting the report. The report was for January, February and March.

Council also made a motion and approved the request to close East 5th Street from Conrad Hilton to the end from May 1st thru May 3, for the Cisco Folklife Festival. Council members also approved the reading of the City Municipal Court quarterly

City Hall will be maintaining a special "work order list" for this trash and brush pick-up effort, so any resident who has large items of trash, limbs or brush to be picked up during the clean-up campaign can call City Hall at 442-2111. **City To Sponsor Red Cross Learn To Swim Program**

The City of Cisco will be sponsoring a Red Cross learn to swim program June 22-26 and June 29-July 2 at the City Pool. The course will last nine days. Courses will be offered as follows: **BEGINNER SWIMMING:** Designed for individuals with little or no swimming experience. In this course you will get started in the water. You will learn how to keep afloat and how to control breathing. You will learn the basic water skills that will help you guard against accidents as you gain confidence in the water.

**ADVANCED BEGINNER SWIMMING:** In this course you will learn the crawl stroke, the elementary backstroke, and the breast stroke. You will learn to coordinate the elements of swimming - breath control, body position, arm and leg movements. You will also practice treading water for stamina and improved water safety.

**INTERMEDIATE SWIMMER:** Learn the techniques of underwater swimming. You'll learn the "survival strokes" and the "survival float." You will refine your surface strokes and increase stamina and endurance.

**SWIMMER:** In this course you will master five all-purpose swimming strokes, including the sidestroke, backstroke and breast stroke. You will learn several dives including the long shallow dive, the running entry, and the board dive. This program will be

taught by Marcia Adams and Glenda Denison, both Red Cross Certified Water Safety Instructors. The cost of the course will be \$25.00. In completing the program, students will receive a Red Cross card stating what course he or she has completed. Enrollment forms will be available at City Hall on May 1. The Cisco Press will print a schedule of class times at a later date. All classes will be taught in the morning.

# 10th Annual Breckenridge Fly-In, Air Show Set May 23, 24

If things sound like Pearl Harbor or the bombing of Berlin in Breckenridge on Sunday, May 24, it is intentional. Saturday, May 23, and Sunday, May 24 are the days for the 10th Annual Breckenridge Fly-In and Air Show.

Warbirds from World War II will come from all over the United States and Canada to participate in the event which has grown to be one of the outstanding Air Shows in the nation since the beginning 10 years ago.

The 1986 Air Show had over 125 Warbirds participating, plus several hundred additional aircraft and thousands of spectators. Weather actually cut the number of participating aircraft from the previous year.

Breckenridge is a year-round home to Warbird Museum and boasts some 20 World War II, Korea and Vietnam era airplanes. All of these aircraft are owned by individuals in the Breckenridge area. The Breckenridge aircraft are only a small part of the many that will be on hand for the 10th Annual Breckenridge Air Show.

Sponsors of the Annual Air Show include the Big Iron Squadron of the West Texas Wing of the Confederate Air Force, the Breckenridge Aviation Museum and the

Breckenridge Chamber of Commerce.

Members of the Confederate Air Force are all volunteers who are dedicated to keeping as many as possible of these vintage airplanes flying. Every member of the of the Confederate Air Force holds the rank of Colonel. They are a rare breed of men and women who share a love of keeping the Warbirds flying.

The Annual Breckenridge Air Show has grown from an idea of several Breckenridge men to have a "fly-in" on Memorial Day weekend in Breckenridge just for the fun of getting a few of the old "fly-boys" together.

The 10th Annual Air Show Committee of the Breckenridge Chamber of Commerce which is assisting in the planning and sponsorship of the upcoming Air Show is confident that, depending on weather, as many as 150 warbirds, and possibly more, will be on hand for the 10th Annual Show.

Show Coordinator Eddie Holmes stated, "If this proves to be the case and we do get the 150 vintage Warbirds in our 1987 Show, it will be one of the largest displays of this type aircraft together in one place since soon after the end of World War II."

Stephens County Airport located about two miles south of Breckenridge on U.S. 183 is the site for the fly-in and show. Saturday, May 23, will feature the Fly-In, static displays of the Warbirds and other aircraft and tours of the Breckenridge Aviation Museum which is located at the airport. Admission gates will open at 10 a.m. Saturday and admission will be \$3.00 per person for all who are over 5 years of age. Admission gates will open at 9 a.m. on Sunday,

will begin at 2 p.m. with the opening of the reenactment of the air battle depicted in the movie, "Tora, Tora, Tora."

# Fishing Outdoors

**"Lake Proctor-Lake Leon"**  
You have heard us mention this corp of engineers impoundment many times over the years. And it just keeps getting better folks. Not only the fishing, but camping and just overall recreation. This is the lake for our area. Even with budget cuts the corps of engineers are furnishing clean camping areas, excellent boat ramps, fantastic fishing due to stocking programs and safe boating. So next time you visit Proctor or any corp of engineers park let them know you appreciate the excellent job they do in furnishing top of the line facilities.

Lake Leon, close to home, one state controlled ramp, and private ramps. We have a number of privately owned camping facilities on or near the lake. These are well kept clean facilities with quick access to the lake.

The fishing on Lake Leon is fair. Why only fair, when it could be as excellent as other impoundments? One possible reason for the less than desirable angling could be there is no stocking program for Leon. In the past the Texas Parks and Wildlife have stocked a variety of fish, for everyone's angling pleasure. But no more folks.

The Eastland County Water Board has turned over to Parks and Wildlife officials down cold. Why, we are not sure. It seems to me these gentlemen would be jumping at the chance to work together with T.P. and Wildlife staff to help improve Texas No. 1 recreational sport, fishing!

Lets all be sure to ask our water board members why on this matter. Our resources need help to withstand today's escape to the outdoors. Remember keep only what you can use and release the rest for the future.

Recently the Eastland County Bass Club held their

club tournament on Lake Proctor. We gave you the results of this tournament. But we neglected to mention one very important item. Of the 28 black bass weighed in, all these fish were returned to breed and fight again. This practice is exercised during all tournaments sponsored by these gentlemen, at all area lakes. Thanks to the members of the E.C.B.C. for their conservation efforts toward the future of fishing.

Texas waterfowl hunters will be required to use nontoxic steel shotshells in additional parts of the state during the upcoming 1987-88 hunting seasons. This year, the remaining portions of five counties will require nontoxic shot, according to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD).

The expanded nontoxic shot zones are part of the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service's (USFWS) five-year, phase-in plan for a nationwide ban on the use of lead shot for waterfowl hunting by 1991.

Dale Witt, migratory waterfowl program director for the TPWD, said remaining portions of Colorado, Harris, Jefferson, Nueces and Waller Counties will be within the nontoxic shot zone during the 1987-88 seasons. During the past hunting season, only a portion of each of those counties was included in the nontoxic shot zone.

The portion of Liberty County not within the current nontoxic shot zone will be added for the 1988-89 hunting season. For the 1989-90 seasons, the zone will include Baylor, Brazos, Comanche, Grayson, Hopkins, Marion, Trinity and Willacy Counties.

Counties to be added for the 1990-91 seasons are Austin, Bosque, Burleson, Cameron, Castro, Collin, Deaf Smith, Denton, Eastland, Erath, Henderson,

Hood, Hunt, Kleberg, Moore, Red River, Refugio, Robertson, Rockwall, San Patricio, Shelby, Smith, Titus, Walker, Washington, Wise and Wood. Nontoxic shot requirements will be statewide and nationwide for the 1991-92 waterfowl seasons.

Conversion to nontoxic shotshells for waterfowl hunting is a conservation effort to reduce losses of waterfowl due to lead poisoning. Studies have shown that waterfowl will pick up and ingest spent lead shot while feeding. The lead is then absorbed into the blood stream where it is toxic to the birds. Certain areas in Texas and other states also have come under steel shot regulations because of a threat to endangered bald eagles which ingest lead pellets when preying on waterfowl, Witt said.

During the past waterfowl hunting season, Texas had a nontoxic shot zone covering all or portions of 26 counties, including all coastal areas and a significant portion of the rice prairie region west of Houston.

Witt said the phased-in approach to zone expansion will give hunters as well as wholesale and retail ammunition suppliers time to prepare for the eventual nationwide nontoxic shot requirement.

"Texas has moved forward in establishing nontoxic shot zones during the past several years, so the transition during the next five seasons should be smooth," Witt said. He pointed out that Texas will have a somewhat larger steel shot zone in 1987-88 because of federal guidelines. Some states such as Mississippi, Iowa, Wisconsin, Minnesota, South Dakota and Nebraska have declared their intention to go statewide ahead of the federal phase-in program.

# Camp Sweeney Offers

## Diabetics Summer Fun

**GAINESVILLE** - Every summer, over 300 young people between the ages of six and eighteen attend a very exclusive camp near Gainesville. The entrance requirements are strict: the child must have diabetes.

Too often, regular summer camps turn away a child with diabetes because of their special diet and medical needs. But Camp Sweeney, organized over 35 years ago, is a place for the diabetic to learn while having fun. All of the activities of a regular summer camp are offered: horseback riding, swimming, boating, fishing, arts and crafts, riflery and many more sports, plus movies, dances and carnivals in the evenings. Sandwiched between the fun things are interesting sessions on medical and dietary information to help the campers take care of themselves and learn to live productive lives with their affliction under control.

Diets are formulated according to each individual's needs, giving the diabetic valuable examples of how to exchange foods to include an occasional "treat" so he won't feel left out around his friends at home.

Located on rolling wooded acreage 10 miles northeast of Gainesville, the site is bordered on the south by a 34-acre lake. Three, three-week sessions are held every summer, with the opening session scheduled for June 7. Others begin on June 28 and July 19. A medical staff and

experienced counselors are always present and keep a close eye on the campers in a one-to-four ratio, many of them former campers themselves.

The camp is a United Way agency, and scholarships are available for any child whose family is unable to pay the full session's fee. No child is turned away because of race, religion, or national origin.

Established in 1950, Camp Sweeney was the first educational and recreational training center in the South for children with diabetes mellitus. Thousands of youngsters are living a self-sufficient, healthy life due to their training at Camp Sweeney.

# THE TAX PICTURE

REDUCING EVERYBODY'S BURDEN

Programs that help poor and low-income people gain a greater sense of self-respect and human dignity contribute to the improvement of the total community. We are all affected. "If any one person is hurting, we are all hurting."

One program, in existence since 1970, emphasizes human dignity and self-determination for the poor. It supports projects that strike at the root causes of poverty, striving to change attitudes and structures to break what has been called "the hellish cycle of poverty."

Called the Campaign for Human Development (CHD), the program is the U.S. Catholic Church's education-action program to combat domestic poverty. It helps get people working in Sacramento, for example, 78 jobless workers are now employed in their own companies. At a time when farmers are especially vulnerable to losing both their work and their way of life, a CHD grant can help. It won foreclosure relief for family farmers through a precedent-setting moratorium and the renegotiation of hundreds of farm loans. In Virginia, the housing

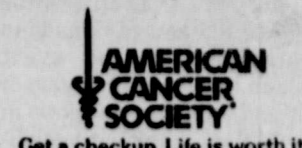
markets are priced beyond the reach of low- and moderate-income people. With support from CHD and \$2 million from other public and private sources, housing is being secured for 52 households in a cooperative complex.

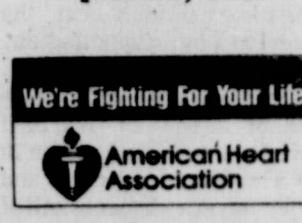

There was a train derailment about 3 p.m. Sunday two miles west of Strawn on the Union Pacific Fort Worth - Big Spring line. Seventeen empty cars were involved, including tankers, covered hoppers and box cars. All had been lifted upright except one car by Sunday night. This is the third serious derailment in less than two years on about a 50 mile stretch of this train line.

It is not in the nature of most men to find a retreat to practice self sufficiency like Henry David Thoreau nor are there enough Walden Ponds where they could go to meditate. So, unless government steps in to solve the problem before it gets much worse (they have never been known to) a serious dislocation could well be in store.

breaking labor of former years. We eat better and no longer start spring with a lot of sasafra tea to thin blood thickened by the winter diet of salt meat and dried produce. We travel more and no longer expect a boys Easter suit to last until the next year. Unfortunately some mass produced goods don't survive a year and the family doesn't go to Easter service together because one or both parents may have to be at work. We still see kinfolk now and then but it is at a funeral and even then some are conspicuously missing. Neither Mom or Dad read bedtime stories to children. They leave that to TV. And WOW, what stories they often get to hear and see.

Maybe somebody could invent a TV which would plant a simulated kiss on a small forehead and say, "Good night. I love you." Maybe they could but they won't because the gods of gold have no use for sentimentality.

We lay there a few minutes when she started so violently the bed shook. "Did you blow out an electric light?" Getting used to city conveniences after a life time on the farm did take some getting used to. It boils down to, "Shouldn't your life be so much better in quality as well as quantity?"

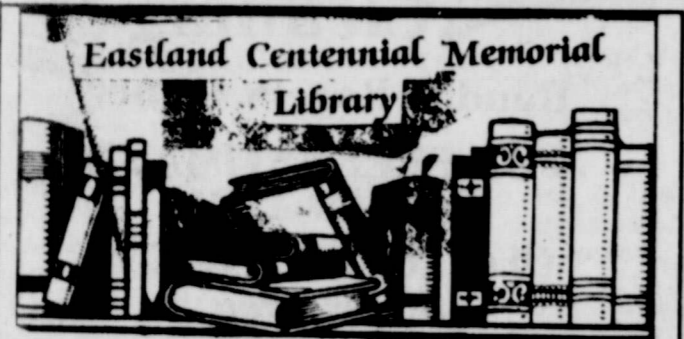

## Samuel Butler, Jr.

Samuel Butler Jr., a Denver oil executive who was a civic and business leader, died Tuesday in his home after a long illness. He was 69.

A memorial service was held in the Moore-Howard Mortuary, East 17th Avenue and Clarkson Street. Burial was held in Oaklands Cemetery, West Chester, Pa. Mr. Butler was president of Philip T. Sharples Oil Properties from 1964 until 1982, when the company was liquidated. In 1952, he was named president of Sharples Oil Corporation, making him one of the youngest oil executives in the region.

He was born in Atlantic City, N.J., and grew up in West Chester, Pa., and Eastland, Texas. He graduated from the University of Texas in 1939 with a degree in chemical engineering and served as a lieutenant commander with the U.S. Naval Reserve during World War II.

In addition to his association with Sharples, Mr. Butler was an independent oil producer in Colorado, Wyoming, Texas and Louisiana and was chairman of the board of Seguro Oil and Gas, a company he formed in 1980.

He served on the board of Graland Country Day School, Colorado Regional Cancer Center, Mile High Duck Club, First National Bank of Denver, Continental Airlines, American Red Cross, Denver Symphony Society, Mount Airy Foundation, Denver Country Day School, Boy's Club of Denver, Rocky Mountain Oil and Gas Association and Cherry Hills Country Club.

Mr. Butler was a member of the Hundred Club of Denver, West Chester Friends Meeting, the Lincoln Club, Colorado Republicans, Natural Gas Supply Committee, American Petroleum Institute, Independent Petroleum Association of America, the Balboa Club of Mazatlan, the Tower Club, and the USGA.

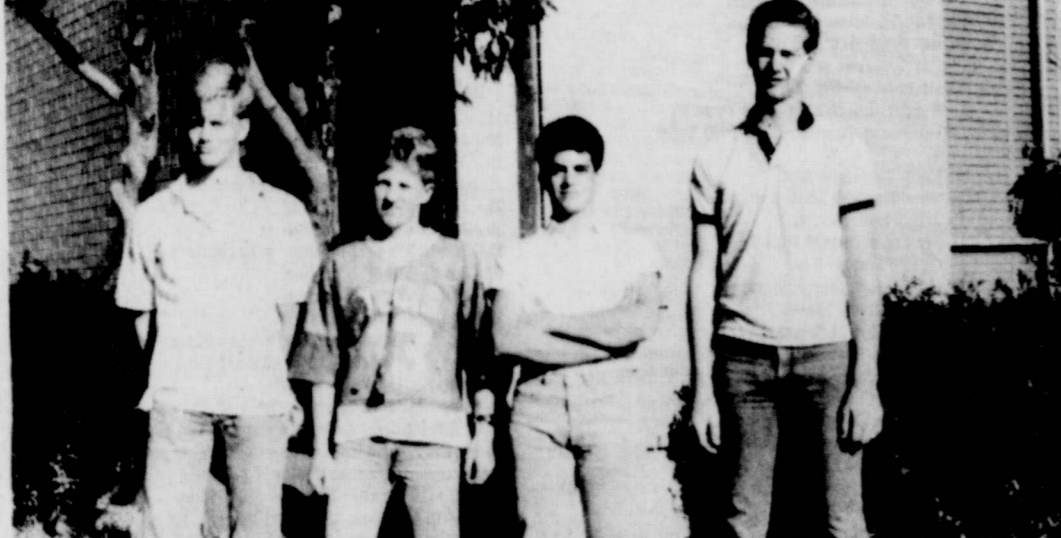

## Please God I'm Only 17

Since Springtime is just around the corner, many high school students will be involving themselves in more and more activities, both school-related and non-school-related. Because many of them will be so involved, they will be driving more often. During the fun times that they will be active, they may tend to get a little reckless and pay absolutely no attention to what they're doing.

A while back, my grandmother gave me a particular article about a certain incident which was told about in the ever popular "Dear Abby" column. Naturally, I read the article and, when I finished, I did not have a dry eye. Because she gave it to me at a time when all I could think about was driving, it came to mean a lot to me. It was as if she knew that the time to give me the article had come.  
Well, I hope that I am giving this article to you at the right time. I feel that it may help someone, somehow to keep from having an accident due to recklessness. I hope that you will encourage everyone else you know to read it and take it to heart like I did. The article which I am sharing with you is entitled "Please God, I'm Only 17" and it goes like this.  
"The day I died was an ordinary day. How I wish I had taken the bus! But I was too

cool to ride the bus. I remember how I wheeled the car out of Mom. "Special favor," I pleaded, "all the kids drive." When the 2:50 bell rang, I threw all my books in the locker. I was free until 8:40 tomorrow morning. I ran out to the parking lot, excited at the thought of driving a car and being my own boss. Free!  
"It doesn't matter how the accident happened. I was goofing off - going too fast and taking crazy chances. But I was enjoying my freedom and having fun. The last thing that I remember was passing an old lady who seemed to be going awfully slow. I heard the deafening crash and felt a terrible jolt. Glass and steel flew everywhere. My whole body seemed to be turning inside out as I heard myself scream.  
"Suddenly, I awakened: it was very quiet. A police officer was standing over me. Then I saw a doctor. My body was mangled and saturated with blood. Pieces of jagged glass were sticking out everywhere. Strange that I couldn't feel anything.  
"Hey, don't pull that sheet over my head. I'm only 17. I'm supposed to go out with the gang tonight. Besides that, I'm supposed to grow up and have a wonderful life. I haven't even lived yet! I can't be dead.  
"Later, I was placed in a drawer. My parents had to come in and identify me. Why did they have to see me like this? Why did I have to look at Mom's eyes when she faced the most terrible ordeal of her life? Dad suddenly looked like an old man. He told the man in charge, "Yes, he is my son."  
"The funeral was a weird experience. I saw all my relatives and friends walk toward the casket. They passed by, one by one, and looked at me with the saddest eyes I've ever seen. Some of my buddies were even crying. A few of the girls touched my hand and sobbed as they walked away.  
"Please ... somebody ... wake me up. Get me out of here. I can't bear to see my parents so broken up. My grandparents are so racked with grief they can barely walk. My brother and sisters are like zombies. They move like robots. In a daze, everybody! No one, including myself, can believe this.  
"Please don't bury me! I'm not dead! I still have a lot of living to do! I want to laugh and run again. Please don't put me in the ground. I promise if you give me just one more chance, God, I'll be the most careful driver in the whole world. All I want is one more chance. Please, God, I'm only 17."

CHISE ORDINANCE (0-1983-10-13-A) REVISING SECTION 1, EXTENDING THE TERM OF THE FRANCHISE; REVISING SECTION 15, INCREASING THE FRANCHISE FEE TO FIVE PERCENT (5%); AND ESTABLISHING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CISCO, TEXAS, THAT:

PART I. Section 1 and Section 15 of the City of Cisco's cablevision ordinance (0-1983-10-13-A) be amended to read as follows:

Section 1. The terms of this grant shall be for twenty-five (25) years from the effective date of this amendment thereof, at the end of which time the rights herein granted shall be forfeited.

Section 15. During the operation of business under this franchise, the owners of such business shall file a sworn report with the City Secretary, and shall pay to the City of Cisco annually, during the month of January, five percent (5%) of the gross subscriber receipts, including, but not limited to, subscriber fees and net premium channel fees, for the past year, which sum is declared to be reasonable, just and adequate compensation for this franchise. It is further stipulated that the books of the company be open to the City Manager, City Auditor or other designated representative of the City of Cisco for periodic checking of income.

PART II. These amendments to the City of Cisco's cablevision franchise shall become effective on the 1st day of May, 1987.

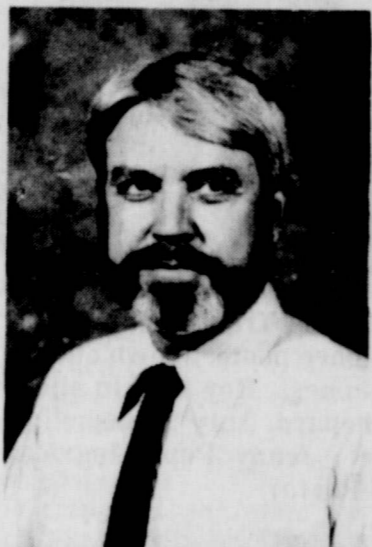
