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10th Annual Breckenridge Fly-In, Air Show Set May 23, 24

If things sound like Pearl Harbor or the bombing of Berlin in Breckenridge on Sunday, May 24, it is intentional. Saturday, May 23, and Sunday, May 24 are the days for the 10th Annual Breckenridge Fly-In and Air Show.

Warbirds from World War II will come from all over the United States and Canada to participate in the event which has gown to be one of the outstanding Air Shows in the nation since the beginning 10 years ago.

The 1986 Air Show had over 125 Warbirds participating, plus several hundred additional aircraft and thousands of spectators. Weather actually cut the number of participating aircraft from the previous year.

Breckenridge is a yearround home to Warbird Museum and boasts some 20 World War II, Korea and Vietnam era airplanes. All of these aircraft are owned by individuals in the Breckenridge area. The Breckenridge aircraft are only a small part of the many that will be on hand for 10th Breckenridge Air Show.

Sponsors of the Annual Air Show include the Big Iron Squadron of the West Texas Wing of the Confederate Air Force, the Breckenridge Aviation Museum and the

Breckenridge Chamber of Commerce.

Members of the Confederate Air Force are all volunteers who are dedicated to keeping as many as possible of these vintage airplanes flying. Every member of the of the Confederate Air Force holds the rank of Colonel. They are a rare breed of men and women who share a leve of keeping the Warbirds flying.

The Annual Breggenridge Air Show has grown from an idea of several Breckenridge men to have a "fly-in" on Memorial Day Weekend in Breckenridge just for the fun of getting a few of the old "fly-boys" togetner.

The 10th Annual Air Show Committee of the Breckenridge Chamber of Commerce which is assisting in the planning and sponsorship of the upcoming Air Show is confident that, depending on weather, as many as 150 warbirds, and possibly more, will be on hand for the 10th Annual Show.

Show Coordinator Eddie Holmes stated. "If this proves to be the case and we do get the 150 vintage Warbirds in our 1987 Show, it will be one of the largest displays of this type aircraft together in one place since soon after the end of World War II."

Stephens County Airport located about two miles south of Breckenridge on U.S. 183 is the site for the flyin and show. Saturday, May 23, will feature the Fly-In, static displays of the Warbirds and other aircraft and tours of the Breckenridge Aviation Museum which is located at the airport. Admission gates will open at 10 a.m. Saturday and admission will be \$3.00 per person for all who are over 5 years of age. Admission gates will

So next time you visit Proctor or any corp of engineers park let them know you appreciate the excellent job they do in furnishing top of the line facilities.

Lake Leon, close to home, one state controlled ramp, and private ramps. We have a number of privately owned camping facilities on or near the lake. These are well kept clean facilities with quick access to the lake.

The fishing on Lake Leon is fair. Why only fair, when it could be as excellent as other impoundments? One posible reason for the less than desirable angling could be there is no stocking program for Leon. In the past the Texas Parks and Wildlife have stocked a variety of fish, for everyones angling pleasure. But no more folks.

The Eastland County Water Board has turned offers by Parks and Wildlife officials down cold. Why, we are not sure. It seems to me these gentlemen would be jumping at the chance to work together with T.P. and Wildlife staff to help improve Texas No. 1 recreational sport, fishing!

Lets all be sure to ask our water board members why on this matter. Our resources need help to withstand todays escape to the outdoors. Remember keep only what you can use and release the rest for the future.

Recently the Eastland County Bass Club held their

club tournament on Lake Proctor. We gave you the results of this tournament. But we neglected to mention one very important item. Of the 28 black bass weighed in, all these fish were returned to breed and fight again. This practice is exercised during all tournaments sponsored by these gentlemen, at all area lakes. Thanks to the members of the E.C.B.C. for their conservational efforts toward the future of fishing.

Texas waterfowl hunters will be required to use nontoxic steel shotshells in additional parts of the state during the upcoming 1987-88 hunting seasons. This year, the remaining portions of five counties will require nontoxic shot, according to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD).

The expanded nontoxic shot zones are part of the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service's (USFWS) five-year, phase-in plan for a nationwide ban on the use of lead shot for waterfowl hunting by 1991.

Dale Witt, migratory waterfowl program director for the TPWD, said remaining portions of Colorado, Harris, Jefferson, Nueces and Waller Counties will be within the nontoxic shot zone during the 1987-88 seasons. During the past hunting season, only a portion of each of those counties was included in the nontoxic shot

The portion of Liberty County not within the current nontoxic shot zone will be added for the 1988-89 hunting season. For the 1989-90 seasons, the zone will include Baylor, Brazos, Comanche, Grayson, Hopkins, Marion, Trinity and Willacy

Counties to be added for the 1990-91 seasons are Austin, Bosque, Burleson, Cameron, Castro, Collin, Deaf Smith, Denton, Eastland, Erath, Henderson,

Hood, Hunt, Kleberg, Moore, Red River, Refugio, Robert-son, Rockwall, San Patricio, Shelby, Smith, Titus, Walker, Washington, Wise and Wood. Nontoxic shot requirements will be statewide and nationwide for the 1991-92 waterfowl seasons.

Conversion to nontoxic shotshells for waterfowl hunting is a conservation effort to reduce losses of waterfowl due to lead poisoning. Studies have shown that waterfowl will pick up and ingest spent lead shot while feeding. The lead is then absorbed into the blood stream where it is toxic to the birds. Certain areas in Texas and other states also have come under steel shot regulations because of a threat to endangered bald eagles which ingest lead pellets when preying on waterfowl, Witt

During the past waterfowl hunting season, Texas had a nontoxic shot zone covering all or portions of 26 counties, including all coastal areas and a significant portion of the rice prairie region west of Houston.

Witt said the phased-in approach to zone expansion will give hunters as well as wholesale and retail ammunition suppliers time to prepare for the eventual nationwide nontoxic shot requirement.

"Texas has moved forward in establishing nontoxic shot zones during the past several years, so the transition during the next five seasons should be smooth," Witt said. He pointed out that Texas will have a somewhat larger steel shot zone in 1987-88 because of federal guidelines. Some states such as Mississippi, Iowa, Wisconsin, Minnesota, South Dakota and Nebraska have declared their intention to go statewide ahead of the

REDUCING EVERYBODY'S BURDEN

Programs that help poor and low-income people gain a greater sense of self-respect and human dignity contribute to the improvement of the total community. We are all af-fected. "If any one person is hurting, we are all hurting."

One program, in existence since 1970, emphasizes human dignity and self determination for the poor. It supports projects that strike at the root causes of poverty, striving to change attitudes and structures to break what has been called "the hellish cycle of poverty."

Called the Campaign for Human Development (CHD), the program is the U.S. Cath-olic Church's education-action program to combat domestic poverty. It helps get people working. In Sacra-mento, for example, 78 jobless workers are now employed in their own companies. At a time when farmers are espe-cially vulnerable to losing both their work and their way of life, a CHD grant can help. It won foreclosure relief for family farmers through a precedent-setting moratorium and the renegotiation of hundreds of farm loans.

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
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
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Area News Briefs

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




But Jesus told His disciples, "No, given them something to eat."

ORDINANCE (0-1983-10-13-A) REVISING SECTION 1, EXTENDING THE TERM OF THE FRAN-CHISE; REVISING SEC-TION 15, INCREASING THE FRANCHISE FEE TO FIVE PERCENT (5%): AND ESTABLISHING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CISCO, TEXAS, THAT:

PART I. Section 1 and Section 15 of the City of Cisco's cablevision ordinance (0-1983-10-13-A) be amended to read as follows:

Section 1. The terms of this grant shall be for twenty-five (25) years from the effective date of this amendement thereof, at the end of which time the rights herein granted shall be forfeited. Section 15. During the

operation of business under this franchise, the owners of such business shall file a sworn report with the City Secretary, and shall pay to the City of Cisco annually, during the month of January, five percent (5%) of the gross subscriber receipts, including, but not limited to, subscriber fees and net premium channel fees, for the past year, which sum is declared to be reasonable, just and adequate compensation for this franchise. It is further stipulated that the books of the company be open to the City Manager, City Auditor or other designated representative of the City of Cisco for periodic checking of income

PART II. These amendments to the City of Cisco's cablevision franchise shall become effective on the 1st


