## Annual Folklife Festival Will Offer Weekend Entertainment

Cisco's 14th Annual Folklife Festival, May 2-3, 1987, at the historic Rockwell Lumberyard in downtown Cisco will offer something to interest everyone. Weekend activities will begin Saturday morning, May 2, at 7 a.m. at Lake Cisco Park with the outdoor chuck wagon breakfast before the "World's Shortest Trail Ride." The trail riders will be part of the colorful Fron-

tier Jubilee Parade which begins at 10 a.m. Leading the parade this year will be the famous Albany Fandangle Calliope.

Immediately following the Saturday morning parade, the Folklife Festival will open with a large supply of freshly baked bread, sold by the slice, hot cinnamon rolls; and newly baked strawberry shortcakes which are topped with fresh strawberries and

whipped cream ... all ready for the parade crowd.

Starting in 1973, the festival has three purposes: To educate, entertain and raise funds for community projects. As education, special demonstrations and exhibits are available to illustrate and teach visitors some of the skills and crafts used by pioneers in daily life. Demonstrations the visitor may frequently view and in which some participation may be permitted include noodle and jerky making, basket weaving, spinning, soap and candle making (have you ever seen a rush light?). There will be hoe

cake making, grinding of grain by hand mill and metate, shelling corn, hand made brooms, simple weaving and primitive pottery making.

A Raptor Education Program will feature Dennis Smith and his feathered friends and interest those of all ages. Special children's activities are held to make the festival particularly enjoyable and educational for the younger set.

There are varieties of arts and crafts displayed by local, state and national exhibitors. For those who come with an ever present appetite, there is a selection of

home cooked food to tempt almost any calorie counter. With the entertainment area being near the food area, a visitor may snack and rest while enjoying the variety of entertainers. Each of those activities is held in an oversized tent with plenty of seating. The festival-goer doesn't have to worry about inclement weather or getting over tired.

Entertainment for 1987 will include dancing and gymnastics groups, Jamie Dee Dancers, Becky Payne Dancers and the Eastland County Popovers, the crowd pleasing style show, Changing Trends in Fashion, will

be presented on Saturday at 3:30 p.m. and at 2 p.m. Sunday. Some of the vocal and instrumental groups which will be featured are: Kingdom Kids, Senior Citizens' Rhythm Band, Brenda Thomas and Pat Owens. Al Anderson's group will be performing from 6:30 until 8:30 p.m. Saturday night, and a contemporary music street dance will be held from 8 until 11 p.m.

## Cisco Lobo Band Is Awarded Sweepstakes Trophy At UIL

The Cisco Lobo Band scored the highest attainable rating at the UIL Concert and Sightreading Contest held at Cooper High School in Abilene Wednesday. For the second consecutive year the band has been awarded a First Division rating by all six judges. This rating, in conjunction with all First Division ratings from UIL marching contests last October, constitutes the coveted Sweepstakes. This is also the second consecutive Sweepstakes earned by the Lobo Band. As a matter of record, the band has been rated First Division by all 24 of the University Interscholastic League adjudicators for the past three years, according to Wayne White, band director.

The band opened the concert with the "Flickertail March." The march, by James Ployhar, has very technical upper woodwind melodies played against a marcato style trumpet line and supported by a terrific low brass/woodwind melody and a traditional percussion line. The march was composed in 1975 and was a commissioned work. It was adopted by the North Dakota State Legislature as the official state march on March 6, 1975.

The second piece presented for adjudication was a masterful transcript of the chorus of "A German Requiem." The Requiem was composed by Johannes Brahms in 1867. Brahms, one of the three Great B's (Bach, Beethoven, Brahms) was rated as one of the outstanding German composers of the 19th century. This opening chorus, "Blessed Are They That Mourn" reaches heights of sublimity.

The program was concluded with an exciting arrangement of a folk song, "The Battle of Jericho," by Charles Richard Spinney. In this selection the ominous introduction is followed by a steady, moderate march which grows in intensity. Then the mysterious motive of the opening is heard again featuring solo French horn against a background of woodwinds. The march grows stronger and more intense as it moves toward an exciting percussion statement. A "call to battle" sounds at measure 64 and builds into the frantic battle scene represented by a 5/4 section. The battle rages furiously until it reaches a screaming climax and "the walls come tumbling down."

The doleful and moving "Go Down Moses" sets the mood for a gradual crescendo to the final powerful climax, a frantic plea to "Let my people go!" ## Concurrent Jurisdiction To Be Implemented Soon

Concurrent jurisdiction between the Eastland County Court and the 91st District Court has been established by law and will be implemented soon, local officials report.

Bills carried by State Sen. Bob Glasgow and State Rep. Jim Parker have passed both houses and have been signed into law by Gov. Bill Clements. It is reported here. Because the bills were carried as emergency measures, the law became effective immediately, meaning that jurisdiction was returned to the County Clerk concurrently with the district court on April 14. District Judge Jim Wright and County Judge Scott Bailey had testified in Austin in regard to the bills, stating that returning concurrent jurisdiction would enable the

## "A Time To Remember" Will Be Presented Monday Night

Street maps of Cisco in 1902; the first aerial photo of Cisco, made in 1906; various street scenes and events including a day in 1906 when the finest equestrians in the world performed.

Opera Houses in Cisco and opera performances; the Opera House fire in 1909 at which Cisco volunteer fireman Bert Strickland lost his life; circumstances of the fight and killing of Will Burkhead that may have resulted in the Opera House tragedy.

Other acts of violence in

Cisco, including gunfights involving Cisco City Marshalls.

The cotton trade and its importance to Cisco's economy.

The creation in 1909 of the Britton Training School, the forefather of Cisco Junior College.

## Judge Bailey Has Worked Out Schedule For County Court

County Judge Scott Bailey stated that he has worked out a tentative schedule for the County Court.

He has set the first court session for Monday, May 4, at 9 a.m. in the Commissioner's Courtroom on the second floor of the courthouse. This will be Call Day for any cases that have been filed under the new provision.

After that date the tentative schedule will be for County Court day to be the

First and Third Mondays of each month.

The Fifth Mondays of each quarter will be set for trial dates in the court. A six-man jury will decide these misdemeanor cases.

The Second and Fourth Mondays of each month are used for County Commissioner's meetings, but the County Court will also be open on those days for the filing of probate matters and some other business.

On this schedule, Judge Bailey says, the return date after most cases are filed

will run from a minimum of a week to a maximum of two weeks.

The concurrent jurisdiction measure will about double the administrative duties of his office, according to the Judge, but it should also speed the process of law.

Since Judge Bailey is also a licensed attorney, this clears the way for him to sit on the bench in all cases. Under present state provisions, any defendant has a right to be tried by a person licensed to practice law.

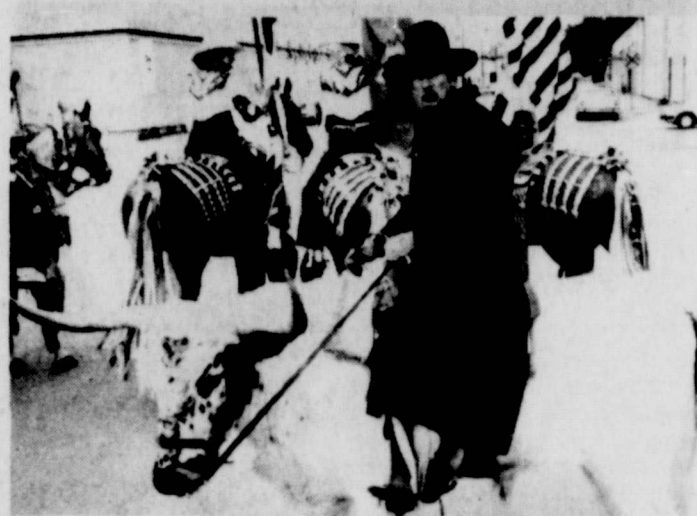

# Homemaking Hints Many Area Students Stand Out At District 8 4-H Contest

If you're one of those older folks who thinks teenagers eat too much fast foods and sweets, take a closer look at your own diet.

Many in the over 65 age group also have some bad eating habits which can affect their nutrition and health. Answer these questions and see if you fit in this group.

Are you salting your food more and more? We often get into the habit of heavily salting food to compensate for the loss of taste with age. This can worsen any pre-existing hypertension. It's better to learn how to use more herbs and spices for flavor.

Have you started eating mostly soft foods? When you restrict your diets to easy-to-chew foods, it becomes difficult to get adequate amounts of needed nutrients. Typically, poor teeth and gums makes the soft foods seem more attractive. But good dental care and well-fitting dentures may help the older you enjoy crisp foods again.

The softer, high-carbohydrate foods preferred by many elderly can also lead to an increased incidence of constipation since they contain little fiber. Adding cooked whole grain cereals to a "soft" diet will greatly increase its fiber content and help this problem.

Are you skipping meals because you're depressed, it seems like too much trouble to cook, or you're just not hungry? It doesn't have to be this way! Try trading off with a friend to cook and eat at each other's homes.

Maybe your church or a senior citizens' center has a noon meal where you can eat in pleasant company. Or you may qualify for a "Meals-On-Wheels" program, where a friendly visitor will bring you a meal each day.

Keeping up good eating habits is a part of keeping up your health.

**RECIPE FOR THE WEEK**  
This week I'm sharing a favorite recipe which is easy and great to serve for company dinners.

**CHEERY UPSIDE-DOWN CAKE**  
3 Tbsp. Butter  
1/2 cup Sugar  
1/4 tsp. salt  
1/2 tsp. Ground Cinnamon  
2 cups canned Sour Red Cherries, drained  
1 (18 oz.) package Yellow or White cake mix  
Whipped Cream (optional)  
Melt butter in a 2-quart casserole. Add sugar, salt, and cinnamon; mix well. Spread evenly in bottom of casserole. Arrange canned cherries over sugar mixture. Prepare cake mix according to package directions, and pour over the cherries. Bake at 350° for 1 hour or until cake tests done. Allow to cool a few minutes in dish; then invert on serving dish, and allow to stand 5 minutes. Garnish with whipped cream, if desired. Yield: 10 to 12 servings.

**HOMESTEAD EXEMPTIONS**  
CAN LOWER THE PROPERTY TAXES ON YOUR HOME  
A homestead exemption lowers the property taxes on your home by lowering its taxable value. For example, if your home is valued at \$50,000 and you receive a \$5,000 homestead exemption, your home will be taxed as if it were worth only \$45,000.  
You qualify for a homestead exemption if you owned your home on January 1 and used it as your primary residence on January 1. It doesn't matter whether your home is a house, a condominium or a mobile home.  
Exemptions are available to all homeowners to lower their school taxes. Additional exemptions are available to homeowners who are disabled or age 65 and over. Other exemptions may be offered to homeowners by school districts, counties, cities, and special districts. All taxing units offer exemptions to disabled veterans.

If you haven't received an exemption on your present home, or if you've moved to a new home, make a new application for 1987.  
The deadline for applications is April 30, 1987. Contact your appraisal district before then if you need more time.

## A TIME FOR TEXAS An Editorial

Decision-time for Texas is just around the corner! Voters will decide on Nov. 3 whether there will be legal parimutuel gambling again in this state. The State Senate and House of Representatives during this session passed it on to the voters to decide.

Right now both houses are grappling with the state's out-of-control deficit - and there's the likelihood that a state lottery could be in the offering. There's about six weeks of the current session left and there's expected to be a lot of last-minute wheeling and dealing in an effort to come up with more operating money. The chances for a special session are always good in Texas.

With these givens, it would appear that it's not too early for citizens to have their say.

The Methodist Bishops' Task Force Against Gambling and the Baptist Christian Life Commission, and other church-related groups, are organized to inform their memberships of the situations and to encourage oppositions to these measures.

The Methodists have adopted the following schedule: April and May: work to influence the Senate and House of Representatives against a state lottery; June, July and August: help senators and representatives during the pressures of a special session come up with alternate tax-raising measures, and to register voters for the fall election; and September, October and November: continue to register and prepare the public for the Nov. 3 election on parimutuel gambling.

The Baptist Christian Life Commission has unanimously endorsed a statement promising support for state lawmakers in their efforts to create new tax revenue and urging Texas Baptists to observe May 3 as "Good Government Day." The Commission speaks to, but not for, Texas Baptists on public policy issues.

Its statement urges opposition to the lottery as bad public policy and support for responsible taxation as good public policy. The Commission issued the statement based on a recognition that legislators must choose between cuts and taxes and based on a conviction that further cuts in human services will result in genuine human suffering.

Interested citizens may find out the status of particular pieces of legislation by calling the Texas Impact Number: 1-800-262-9693.

The last day to register to vote in the Nov. 3, 1987 election will be Oct. 2. Voter registration cards are available at county and municipal buildings but voters must return the cards to their County Tax Collector's Office.

The United Methodist Church stated its position at General Conference in 1983:

"The United Methodist Church stated its position at the 1984 General Conference in Portland, Oregon. That statement is contained in the Social Principles of the United Methodist Church, paragraph 73, section G of the Discipline. It reads:

"Gambling is a menace to society, deadly to the best interest of moral, social, economic, and spiritual life and destructive of good government. As an act of faith and hope, Christians should abstain from gambling, and should strive to minister to those victimized by the practice. Where gambling has become addictive, the Church will encourage such individuals to receive therapeutic assistance so that the individual's energies may be redirected into positive and constructive ends. Community standards and personal life styles should be such as would make unnecessary and undesirable the resort to commercial gambling, including public lotteries, as a recreation, as an escape, or as a means of producing public revenue of funds for support of charities or government."

Locally ministers associations, through their active and participating members, are opposing the lottery and parimutuel gambling issues.

simply because he had never been taught the word "NO." We also see a Louisiana prison where they are trying to rehabilitate young men by giving them military training like a marine boot camp. Teaching discipline to the obviously undisciplined.

Listening to some Merkel parents say that a child's discipline was strictly the parents' right I wondered, as so often before, if some people understand that there can not be "rights" without responsibilities. For if a parent never inhibits a child's behavior then society suffers. Ultimately, if the child's inclination to run rough-shod over the rights of others continues someone determined to defend his own rights may deliver a bloody nose or worse. Thus, a parent determined to defend his right regarding discipline of his child should be equally certain that he is ready to do the job properly.

I thought as a child that the one lie Dad told was, "Thus hurts me worse than it does you." One simply has to have children of their own before they understand it. Childish minds still cling to the feeling that if it honestly hurt that much he wouldn't do it. They hold back the mental pain until, like a dam overloaded it bursts forth in overwhelming volume. By then the missed instances are beyond recall and beyond recovery.

Such scriptures as, A wise father who loveth his son will chasten him sometimes or Proverbs 19:18 "Chasten thy son while yet there is hope," are out of style. In fact religion in general seems to be.

If being thrashed in school

were news in my school days I might have been a headliner. Rulers, razor straps, boards, man, I had them all. Strange enough, the teachers I recall with the most distaste were not the ones who thrashed me though some of them don't rate very highly either. Two who never laid a hand (or board) on me used certain less fortunate lads as "whipping boys" it seemed to me and one teachers memory, even near 60 yrs. later, prompts an evil desire to spit on her grave. A spanking then may not be the worst you can do.

Physical punishment does run the risk of a touch of sadism creeping in. Too, some people bruise much easier than others as most of us well know. So how hard is too hard? One teacher used to lay it on until the student cried but my red headed brother would have died before he cried. Dad found that an arm around the shoulder and a few words of disappointment and reproach shattered that shell and tears flowed like from a faucet. Maybe my point here is that different methods fit different young folks. Sadly, teachers have neither time nor talent for a tailor-made punishment of each individual.

Most of us lose the desire to thrash a certain teacher "when I grow big enough" but that doesn't mean some didn't deserve a sample of their own medicine. One man, at long last met his old teacher but saw a man so decrepit that he could only tell him what he taught of him. Maybe that mean old man at an age when

## TEXAS HEALTH NEWS AND VIEWS

**QUESTION:** I read an article the other day and it said "When you get old, you get senile. Is this true?"

**ANSWER:** No. For over 95% of the older people this is not true. It is actually a myth, a fictitious story passed on from generation to generation, that old age is automatically equal to mental decline. There are 6 types of behavior that we often interpret as senility. I do not have room in this column to define each one, but we will list them.

The first are habits. Those that are peculiar to each of us that have been with us all the period of our lives.

The second kind of behavior is that which is disruptive in regard to our relationships with one another.

The third type of behavior

is that which the younger generation may have been taught. For instance, the young person may hear the older person state you should not take baths during certain times of the year.

The next or sixth type of behavior concerns our senses. Just because hearing, seeing etc. are failing does not mean senility has set in.

Another behavior is that of the speed which the older person may function. We may expect an older person to respond quickly to a complex problem.

The final behavior which people classify as senility is that of memory. This is probably the "super" myth. We are too quick to give a name to an impairment instead of investigating the cause.

When you point out certain characteristics of an individual as not acceptable due to "senility" be sure you know the cause of the behavior, and the definition of the word "senility."

## RANGER

Ranger City Commissioners have passed an ordinance restructuring the police department, effective April 20, 1987. tion will be given to all "Who's Who" members and honor graduates. A reception will be held in the foyer of the Library following graduation.

# Gordon Spot

By DeMarquis Gordon, County Agent—

The mesquite trees budded out last weekend in Eastland County. Some say this means the last freeze is now history. I do remember one year when the mesquite leaves were frozen in April, but that is unusual. They were budded out south of Waco and were frozen the last week of March and early April. That is when all the fruit was killed. Several have told me they were going to graft peaches on mesquite so that they won't bloom until late April. That would be a good idea if someone can make it work, because there are an abundance of mesquites in our county.

The good rainfall last fall and throughout the winter has set up conditions that should be excellent for foliar application of herbicides for mesquite control this year. Good growth conditions exist since last weekend's rain.

The excellent soil moisture conditions should result in good canopy development on mesquite. Data collected by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, a number of years ago, show that higher plant kills occur when rainfall exceeds the average six months prior to spraying. High available soil moisture during the fall and winter months usually results in mesquite plants that develop a large quantity of leaves. Thus, excellent control may be expected if factors other than soil moisture are also favorable.

Proper timing of herbicide applications is critical if good control is expected. Mesquite leaves should be fully extended and should have turned from light green to dark green in color before herbicide is applied. Usually, this occurs about forty days after budbreak. That would be about May 29th, here in Eastland County. When the leaves have matured, the plants begin to restore carbohydrate reserves. Research reported

by Texas Tech University shows that food reserves are utilized during the period of pod elongation. An application of herbicide during this period usually results in poor control. After the pods have elongated, storage of food reserves is resumed and excellent control is obtained during this period. About 90 days after budbreak, control with foliar applied herbicides decreases because of build up of wax on the leaves and a general decrease in growth activity of the plants.

Another important factor affecting degree of control is soil temperature. Research has shown that soil temperature at 12-18 inches of depth at time of spraying should be 75°F or above to obtain best control.

Frequent rains during the spray season may result in the development of new leaves. For best control, the new leaves should be allowed to mature before spraying. Damage to mesquite foliage caused by insects, disease, or hail will result in poor control if new foliage is not allowed sufficient time to mature.

With the recent labeling of Reclaim (clopyralid) four herbicides are currently registered and effective for control of mesquite by foliar application. The other herbicides are: Grazon ET (triclopyr), Banvel (dicamba), and Grazon PC (picloram). Grazon ET, Banvel, and Reclaim may be used alone. Research information indicates the highest degree of control may be obtained by using Reclaim, Grazon ET and Banvel may be mixed with Grazon PC in a 1:1 mixture to obtain a higher degree of control than when these herbicides are used alone.

## Tornado season time for following funnels

WASHINGTON — America's annual tornado chase is getting under way as meteorologists try to track, measure and eventually find ways to predict the devastating whirlwinds that wreak havoc on parts of the nation.

This year's intense research effort lasts from April 1 to June 1, with scientists using equipment as sophisticated as new style radars and computers and as common as balloons and chase vans.

In a typical year, tornadoes kill about 100 people and do millions of dollars in damage. They can strike in any state, although the storms are most common in the Midwest, especially in so-called Tornado Alley, ranging through Nebraska, Kansas, Oklahoma and Texas.

Perhaps the most daring research effort involves placing a package of weather instruments directly in the path of a tornado to measure its strength.

The power of these storms is obvious to anyone who has seen the twisted wreckage and toll of dead and injured in their wake. But until last year no exact measurements had been available, because no weather instruments that happened to encounter a twister ever had survived to tell the tale.

Finally, after several years of trying, the first success in that program was scored near Ardmore, Okla., last April 29, when a specially designed package of instruments was dropped into the path of a tornado by scientists, who then sped to safety.

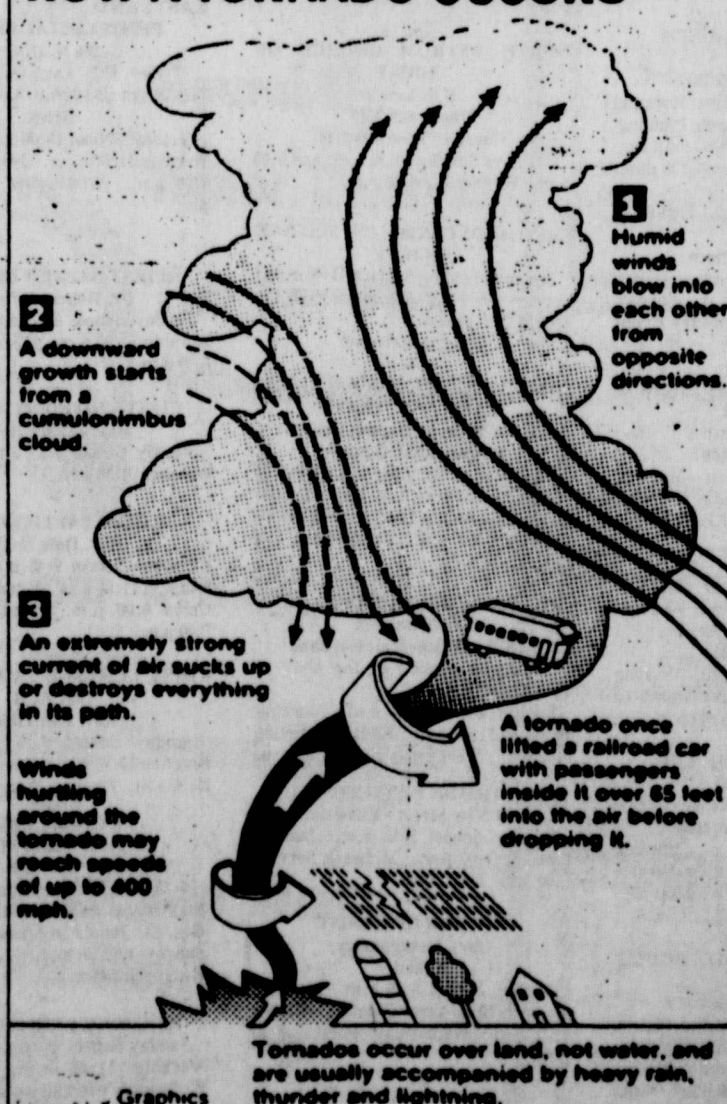
It turned out to be a relatively weak storm, with wind speeds of 69 miles per hour, but it at least furnished the first experience of exact measurements.

This year the effort continues, with scientists from the National Severe Storms Laboratory in Norman, Okla., hoping to find a more powerful tornado to measure.

The instrument package also measured a drop in air pressure in the Ardmore storm and took photographs. The device is known as TOTO, an acronym for Tornado Observatory, a name that also recalls Dorothy's dog, Toto, which was swept up with her in a whirlwind in the Wizard of Oz.

In addition to the renewed observatory studies, a second van-riding group will get under way, launching balloons carrying instruments to obtain meteorological readings in the upper air in the area of twisters.
