Council Discusses Water Tank Replacement

Replacement of the concrete storage basin with a metal ground storage tank at College Hill was considered as the most economical way to solve problems at the city water reservation center at a meeting of the City Council last Tuesday night.

The Council directed City Manager Mike Moore to prepare plans and specifications for a metal ground storage tank after learning that such a reservoir could be obtained at a cost of from 40 to 60 percent less than building a new roof on the present 500,000-gallon reservoir.

Prices obtained from two tank building companies indicated that a 250,000-gallon tank would cost in the neighborhood of \$46,000 while one twice that size would be around \$80,000.

The roof on the present reservoir is in a bad state of repair and rebuilding it would cost more than \$100,000, Mr. Moore said. State Health Department regulations require such reservoirs to be covered.

The matter will be on the agenda for the May 13th meeting when the Council is expected to call for bids.

In other action the Council approved the purchase of

public officials and employees liability insurance from the Ledbetter Agency. The premium on a policy with a limit of \$1,000,000 amounted to \$6,456.

A facility management and maintenance plan for the new waste water treatment plant as required by the Farm Home Administration was approved. Construction work is scheduled to begin in about 30 days on the project.

The Council agreed to settle a delinquent tax judgment against Bobby McCoy and Stereo Central of more than \$1,000, for the sum of \$429.895, plus \$115.00 in court cost. Mr. McCoy, who was present, said he would take the matter under advisement.

Application by Larry Bryant of Maxwell Appliance Service, who moved from Eastland to the corner of Hilton and West 8th Street in the old Masonic Hall building recently, for a loading zone designation at the back of the building on 8th Street was approved.

There were no bids for three motor vehicles and a boat that the city advertised for sale, and no action was

Cisco Folklife Festival

A street parade in downtown Cisco at 10 a.m. Saturday, April 26, was scheduled as the kickoff event of the 13th annual Cisco Folklife Festival that will continue through Sunday, April 27. All plans and preparations had been completed and everything was in readiness for the festival, officials announced.

Immediately following the parade, Mayor Joe Wheatley was scheduled to extend an official welcome to guests at the Civic League's Festival Park (the old Rockwell Lumber Yard). Assorted concession booths and arts

and crafts demonstration centers were scheduled to begin operations.

New Trial Ordered For Lundstrom By Appeals Court

A new trial of his murder conviction was ordered for Loyal L. Lundstrom of Cisco by the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals at a hearing in Austin last Wednesday. The court ruled that Lundstrom's request for a change of venue should have been granted by the trial judge, Jim Wright, of the 91st District Court.

The court's decision, approved by a 5-4 vote, came as a surprise to District Attorney Emory Walton, who told this newspaper that he plans to re-try Lundstrom, who received a life sentence in the March 3, 1983, shotgun slaying of his 27-year old wife, Doris, at their motel

apartment in Cisco.

Mr. Walton said the 91st Court followed the same procedure as other courts in denying the motion for change of venue. "It appears that our efforts to save the county a lot of money were to no avail," he said.

Mr. Walton, who had not received a copy of the high court's ruling, noted that the Court of Criminal Appeals in Eastland affirmed the case and sentence before Defense Counsel Bill Hart took the case to the supreme court in Austin.

Lundstrom, 63, was tried in the 91st Court in September, 1983, and the jury found him guilty and

passed sentence of life in prison. After the 91st Court receives a copy of the ruling, Judge Wright is expected to order the sheriff to return Lundstrom to Eastland County.

It was understood that the date and place of a new trial would be determined by the presiding jurist of the region after checking dockets of other courts.

Mr. Hart, who represented Lundstrom throughout the trial and in seeking an appeal from the sentence, said that he requested the change of venue because of

ORDINANCE NO. 0-86-4
AN AMENDMENT REVISION SECTION 20-24, SUBSECTION (a) AND (b) OF THE UTILITY RATE ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF CISCO, TEXAS INCREASING MONTHLY SANITARY SEWER RATES; ENACTING PROVISIONS RELATING TO THE SUBJECT AND PURPOSES OF THIS ORDINANCE; PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

WHEREAS, the City of Cisco is in the process of providing and constructing a new wastewater treatment facility as mandated by the State of Texas; and

WHEREAS, it is now proper and necessary to increase certain sanitary sewer system charges and rates to fund the operating and debt expenses for said new wastewater treatment facility; now, therefore,

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CISCO, TEXAS THAT:

PART I: Section 20-24, Subsection (a) and (b) of the City's Utility Rate Ordinance be amended as follows;

(a) All sewer usage charges shall be based upon the total water usage registered on the customer's water meter. Along with the "base charge" established in this ordinance, there shall be a user charge to fund operation and maintenance cost of the treatment facilities.

(b) The monthly rates for sanitary sewer service shall be as follows:

- (1.) RESIDENTIAL
 - a. First 4,000 gallons metered.....\$8.75
 - b. First 4,000 gallons metered for persons over sixty-five years of age; totally disabled persons, city employees and volunteer firemen \$7.25
 - c. Next 8,000 gallons, per 1,000 gallons metered.....\$0.50
- (2.) COMMERCIAL
 - a. First 4,000 gallons metered.....\$8.75
 - b. Over 4,000 gallons, per 1,000 gallons metered.....\$0.50
- (3.) PUBLIC SCHOOLS
 - a. First 4,000 gallons metered.....\$8.75
 - b. Over 4,000 gallons, per 1,000 gallons metered.....\$0.50

Court Orders New Trial For Lundstrom

 "pervasive prejudice." Pre-trial publicity, he said, prevented Lundstrom from receiving a fair trial.

Mr. Hart said that he advised Lundstrom by letter Wednesday of the court decision. He added that he does not know now whether he will be representing Lundstrom as his obligation was to pursue the matter through the appeal process.

The court ruling as quoted by wire service said: "The murderer's flight from the state, his voluntary return and preparations for his trial were covered extensively in the press that served Eastland County.

"Also covered and widely disseminated was the news that the appellant had been convicted of manslaughter in the death of his first wife in Minnesota. That conviction had been reversed by the Minnesota Supreme Court and Lundstrom had not been retried."

The motion for change of venue was supported by five affidavits as required by law, it was pointed. Prosecutors countered, arguing that Lundstrom could receive a fair trial. The supreme court ruled that the trial should have been moved.

Judge Sam Houston Clinton was the author of the major opinion. "Because prosecutors didn't challenge the credibility of the people who said Lundstrom couldn't get a fair trial, they failed to offer an adequate reason for not moving it," Judge Clinton wrote.

The four judges who voted to uphold the trial conviction were Charles Cambell, John F. Onion, W. C. Davis and Tom G. Davis.

Judge Campbell wrote in his dissenting opinion that "prosecutors rightly challenged Lundstrom's conviction that he couldn't get a fair trial in Eastland County. Can it seriously be doubted that the controverting affidavits attack the very heart of the appellant's motion for a change of venue that there existed in Eastland County so great a prejudice against him that he cannot obtain a fair and impartial trial?"

Mr. Walton said that "I am shocked. The procedure I followed was consistent with prior procedures followed, which have been ruled correct by the judge here and the court of appeals. I plan to re-try the case as soon as possible."

The Lundstroms, who had been married 10 years,

operated a motel and a monument business at the time of the murder. Both were prominent in community affairs. He was a member of the City Council and was serving as mayor pro tem. She was president of the P-TO, and both were active in church affairs.

On the day of the murder, Lundstrom took their children to their pastor and left town to reappear 11 days later at DFW Airport where he was taken into custody. He was free under bond for several months before the trial.

Mr. Hart said he believed that Lundstrom would be eligible for release under bond after he is returned to Eastland County.

It is understood that the Criminal District Attorney here has 30 days to petition the State Criminal Appeals Court for a re-consideration.

The Texas Court of Criminal Appeals has also reversed the conviction of a Fisher County man sentenced to 99 years in prison in the electrocution of his wife.

In its decision, the court said Wednesday that testimony was improperly admitted during the trial about how the man as a child told of electrocuting animals.

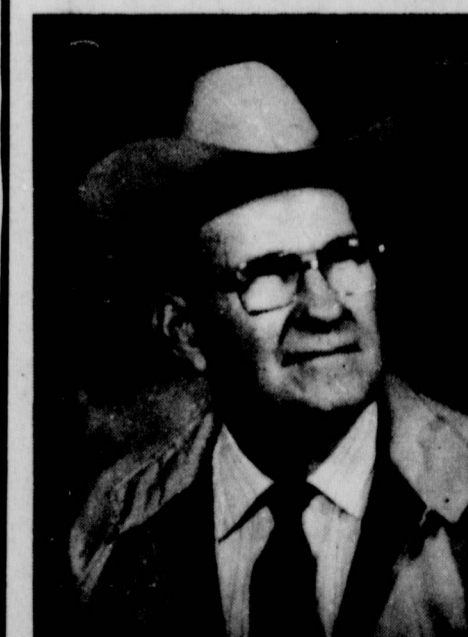

Police received a burglary report Wednesday of the Andrew Gosnell home at 1008 East 10th Street. A screen door was broken open to enter the house, authorities said. Missing were three knives and \$100 in cash, it was reported. Officers Kenneth Preston and Frank Thumsdon investigated the incident.

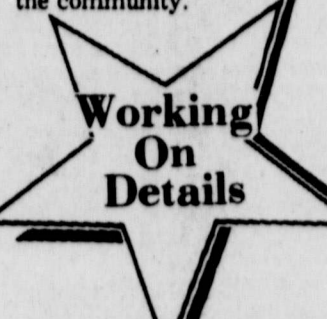
The Cisco Independent School District has plans to

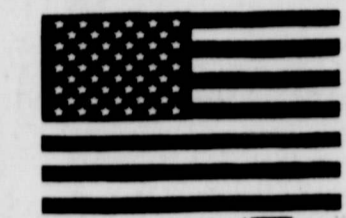

Please help! Blood is so necessary for life itself. Accidents and sickness can happen very quickly, when there's no time to ask for blood. Please help yourself, your family, friends and community by giving of your blood on Wednesday, April

Donors should be aware of the following when preparing to give blood:

1. All donors must be age 18 or older. There is no age limit, only that each donor is healthfully able to give blood.
2. Blood donors should eat normally, and are encouraged to do so before giving blood.
3. No medication should be taken 18 hours prior to donating blood.
4. No medications should be deleted without checking with the prospective donor's own doctor.
5. Any person who has been sick or had a cold within the last seven days prior to donating blood, should not donate blood.
6. Any person who has had their ears pierced within the last six months at any place other than a doctor's office should not donate blood.

7. Any person who has been in southeast Asia in the last three years should not donate blood, due to malaria possibilities.

8. Any woman who has menstruated in the last three to four days prior to donating blood should not donate.

9. A woman who is pregnant, or suspects pregnancy, should not give blood, and should not do so until six weeks after termination of pregnancy.

Who Was Eastland?

Part 2

William Eastland had barely settled in Texas when the call came to fight Indians on the Texas frontier. In 1835 he joined Colonel John M. Moore's forces and served as first lieutenant of a volunteer company campaigning against Waco and Tawakoni Indians.

In the fall of 1835 he served under Captain Thomas V. Alley. He lost his black horse during this campaign and billed the Republic of Texas for it later.

As the Texas Revolution neared, Eastland joined Thomas J. Rabb's company on March 1, 1836, in whose company he participated in the battle of San Jacinto.

Vengeance had built up in the Texas soldiers prior to the San Jacinto battle. Many of the soldiers had had friends

or relatives who had died at the Alamo or in the Goliad Massacre.

After the battle had been won by the Texans the soldiers continued to shoot and club the Mexican soldiers. Private Bob Hunter described the action:

"Gen'l Houston gives orders not to kill any more but to take prisoners. Capt. Easlen (1st Lt. William Mosby Eastland) said Boys take prisoners, you know how to take prisoners, take them with the but of your guns knock there . . . brains out."

The Social Security Number

The Social Security number, which is now being used as a means of identification by schools, banks, the Internal Revenue Service (IRS), and numerous other organizations, was originally intended for use only by the Social Security program. About 25 years ago, IRS began using the number as a means of identifying taxpayers. Later, the idea was picked up by the military services, the Treasury Department, and agencies responsible for administering public welfare and various social service programs that depended on Federal funding.

At present, any State, or any of its political subdivisions, is permitted to use the Social Security number for purposes of identification in relation to tax administration, general public assistance programs, the issuance of drivers' licenses, or motor vehicle administration. The use of the number for identification purposes, however, does not affect the confidentiality of Social Security records.

The misuse of the Social Security number for any purpose is a violation of the Social Security Act. The penalty for misuse or fraud is a fine of up to \$5,000 or im-

prisonment of up to 5 years or both. In an effort to avoid issuing more than one number to the same person, the Social Security Administration now requires applicants 18 or over and applying for an original number to apply in person. All applicants must furnish evidence of date of birth, identity, and United States citizenship or alien status. Those who claim to have lost their card or who request a new card because of a change in name must furnish evidence of their identity. If foreign born, they must also provide evidence of citizenship or current alien status. Parents who apply for a Social Security number for a child must provide proof of the child's date of birth, his or her identity, and citizenship, as well as their own identity.

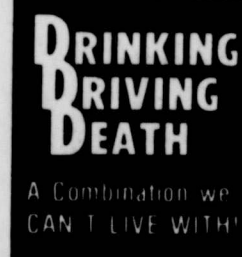
Also performing was a sextet composed of Claudia Waite, Wayne White, Doyle Walker, Manning Davis, Rusty McClesky, and Nathan Urban.

Cisco Rotary Club

Hears J.V. Heysler

The American Angus Association is having good success in efforts to promote the sale of their beef. Rancher J.V. Heysler told the Cisco Lions Club in a talk at their weekly luncheon last Wednesday noon at the Colony Restaurant.

In 1980, the association began a program to encourage restaurants to sell "certified Angus beef." The effort resulted in the sale of 1,600,000 pounds in 1983, 15,900,000 pounds in 1985 and an estimated 22,000,000 pounds in 1986, Mr. Heysler said.

A number of Texas restaurants advertised "certified Angus beef" and others are joining the movement, he said. The association has recruited a number of packing plants to handle their beef animals and to see that the meat meets their high standards, he added.

Mr. Heysler reported that 62 percent of the beef sold in the meat markets of this country is imported from foreign countries. This, he said, causing U.S. ranchers to lose money and, he added, "there doesn't seem to be anything we can do about it."

Mr. Heysler predicted that U.S. ranch herds, which now number some 105,000,000 animals, will drop to less than 90,000,000 by 1990 - the result of the importation problem.

The Angus association, he said, hopes to have their "certified Angus beef" in grocery stores within a few years.

Carroll Barnhill of Fort Worth was a guest at the luncheon. He contributed the sum of \$25 to the Lions Camp for Crippled Children as a memorial to the late O.L. Stamey. He noted that Mr. Stamey was one of his teachers while he was in the school system here in the 1930s.

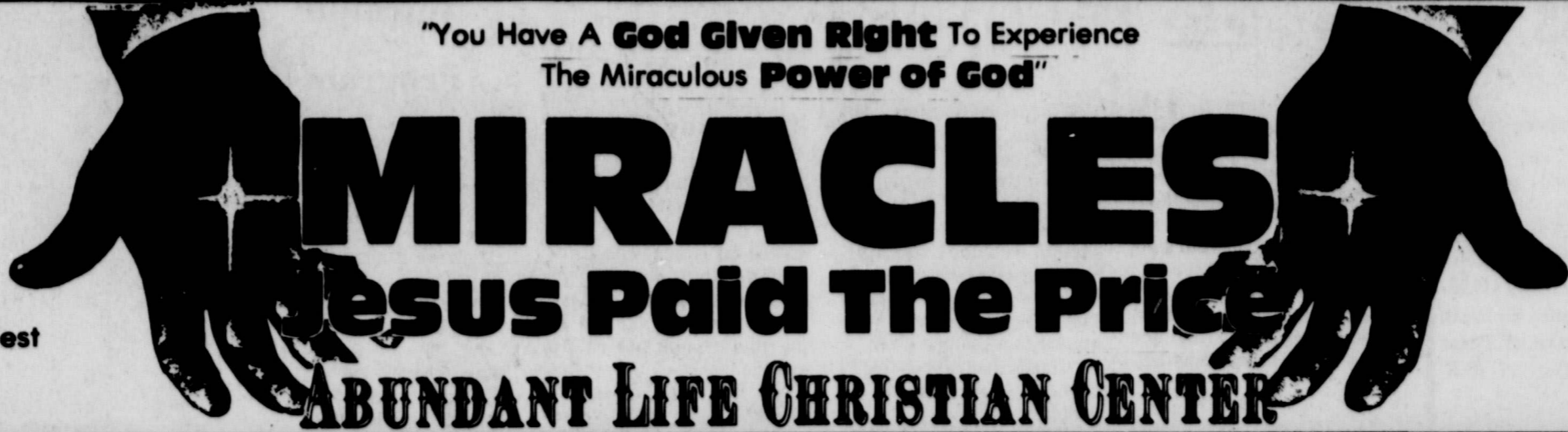

taken on the matter. It was expected that the items would be advertised again and bids opened at the May 13th meeting.

The Council decided to advertise the 1956 model Seagraves Fire Truck for sale in appropriate publications. The vehicle is surplus after the recent purchase of a new fire truck.

It was decided to submit application for a grant from the Texas Department of Community Affairs for street improvements and other work. This has been done each year for three years without approval, the city manager reported.

The regular meeting of July 22 was cancelled in order for the city officials to be able to take time off for vacations. Special meetings will be ordered if necessary, it was decided.

Lone Star Gas Company submitted a calculation of the cost of service adjustments for Cisco. The figures showed a net of 57 cents reduction in the average gas bill for the 12 months ending Dec. 31, 1985. The Council decided to ask the regional manager to explain the matter at an early meeting.

The Council approved an ordinance making water rates charged to residential and commercial customers identical as required by laws under financing revenue bonds were enacted. A correction was also approved in the utility ordinance that will govern the amount and type of chemical substances that will be allowed to be discharged through the sewer system.

City Corporation Court Judge Douglas Fry submitted a report for the first quarter of 1986, showing that he handled 187 traffic tickets and 34 other complaints. Fines were paid in 178 cases with a total of \$6,342.50 being paid. Of the money received, \$4,336 went to the city and \$2,006 to the state, the report showed.

Maryann Perry, city bookkeeper, submitted a report for March that showed \$40,564 in collections for the month to bring the fiscal year's total to \$621,635 or 66 percent of the budget. Receipts included \$6,935 in delinquent taxes and \$12,677 in sales tax money.

Expenditures of March included \$16,731 by the administrative department, \$18,585 for police and municipal court, \$7,674 for the fire department, \$19,925 for the police department, \$2,831 for parks and recreation, and \$5,945 for sanitation.

The water department had income of \$50,010, including \$35,356 for water sales and \$10,752 for sewer fees. Expenses for the water department totalled \$53,188.

Mayor Joe Wheatley presided at the meeting which was attended by Councilmen Roy Dennis, Bill Roberts, Joe Besselaar, Bobby Ingram, Arlie Whitley, and Allen Masters, City Manager Moore and City Secretary Ginger Johnson.

Anyone wishing to attend may contact the church office, at 442-1450 in the mornings, or call 442-1137 after noon each day.



Do you have ringing in the ears? Is it severe enough to keep you awake? Then individuals who have this ailment may have tinnitus and should be evaluated by their physician and an otolaryngologist if necessary.

At the minimum, a diagnostic evaluation should include a careful history, exam and audiogram.

There are various methods of treatment. Masking of the noise with a more pleasant sound is one. In individuals with a hearing loss, a hearing aid can accomplish this. If there is no hearing loss, a device that inserts into the ear like a hearing aid and produces a more pleasant masking can be used.

Therapies aimed at reducing tension an depression also are helping. Relaxation therapy and bio-feedback training are examples.

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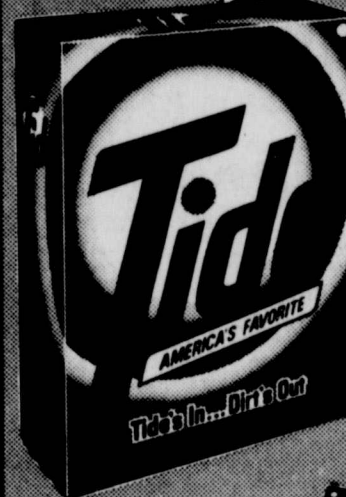

A Report From Honduras

By Richard Kurklin

Tegucigalpa, Honduras,
Central America
There are towns and

villages in Honduras where
the people have never heard
of the gospel of Jesus Christ,
and I have seen people by the
hundreds walk to a service

and stand for more than an
hour to hear an American
preach to them. Some also
accepted Christ.
You probably heard

reports of an invasion here.
A military officer told us
that a communist force of
one thousand men with some
big guns was pinned down
and wiped out about seven
miles into Honduras near a
sizeable city about seventy
miles from us. They were no
match for the Honduran and
Contra (Freedom Fighter)
armies backed by U.S. air-
craft. The officer said that
the killed included Russian
officers. We feel safer here
than in larger Texas cities.
Roads are usually very
rough here and much time is
spent repairing vehicles
here and lately is no excep-
tion. A missionary narrowly
escaped injury in a tractor
accident and it has taken
time to find parts to repair
the tractor and the diesel
truck also needed repairs.
Autos and parts are twice
as high and American type

foods are four times as high
here as Texas prices, and
harder to find.
The schoolteacher here
has returned to the U.S. as
her dad has cancer.
I have spent some time
with Dr. Carlos Rocha, who
seems to be the ideal mis-
sionary. He pastors one of
the largest and fastest grow-
ing churches in the area, he
treated 85 patient as a
medical doctor one day, then
worked with a tree growing
and planting project. The
people are very poor so he is
teaching them to make fur-
niture and many items.
"Doc" seems to be friends
with everyone and he has
changed the city where he
ministers from a drinking,
fighting and shooting "old
west type" town to a safe
and peaceful one. Many men
are lumberjacks or cowboys
who ride horses and wear
guns or knives.

The Christians are also be-
ing taught better livestock
raising practices.
As a result of the Chris-
tian's changed lives and im-
proving standard of living,
other people take notice and
show interest.
The Christian brother here
at "Doc's" church were
quick to become my friends
and I was surprised at their
being so much like friends in
Texas. Some even look like
Texans. They also spread
the gospel and give up much
to do so as Dr. Rocha is do-
ing.
Many people have nothing,
there is a shortage of food
and water now as it hasn't
rained in some time, and
they live in small, dark, nasty
huts made of sticks, mud,
and grass. They are very dirty
and often sick, but they
are accepting Jesus. Often
they walk or are carried for

days over mountain trails to
see "Doc" who gives them the
"life saving" medicine
they have no money to buy.
"Doc" prays for more
medicine, it is running out,
and says, "How can I turn
them away after they have
come so far?"
"Doc" also needs
transportation and more

food for his family, and the
church doesn't have win-
dows.
Members who gave ce-
ment to build the church live
in houses with dirt floors, the
church came first.
I may return to Texas
around May 1.

Mrs. Stella Blackwell and Mr. Walter Duncan, both of whom are now deceased, were present in the 1950's when a tombstone was placed on the first grave in the Alameda Cemetery.

The Alameda Cemetery is one of the oldest cemeteries in Eastland County. The oldest grave is that of Mrs. Martha Coffee who was killed and scalped by the Indians in 1860. Later, many other pioneers were buried there, some with only rocks marking their graves. There are also many unusual tombstones in this old cemetery. It is a peaceful spot with cedar and oak trees, bluebonnets, and an old tabernacle building where funerals are sometimes held.

Relatives and friends of

those buried in Alameda Cemetery have met on the first Saturday in May for more than 100 years. At first, people came in their wagons and brought their hoes to work. Later, a cemetery association was formed to oversee maintenance of the grounds. People still come each year to visit, eat lunch, and attend the business meeting. Everyone enjoys singing hymns after the meeting.

The present officers and directors: Claude Tucker, President; Morris Underwood, Vice President; Pat Moseley, Secretary-Treasurer; Sam Yancey, Director; and Kenneth Brown, Director.

This year's meeting will be on Saturday, May 3rd. Lunch will be spread at noon. A business meeting will be held after lunch with two directors scheduled to be elected. The cemetery is located about 10 miles south of Ranger on FM 571. A sign on the west side of the highway marks the turn-off to the cemetery which is about two miles dirt road.

All members are invited to attend and join us for a day in the country. We hope to see you on Saturday, May 3rd.

The Annual Breckenridge Air Show has grown from an idea of Howard Pardue to have a "fly-in" on Memorial Day in Breckenridge just for the fun of getting a few of the "old fly-boys" together.

Planners of the 1986 Breckenridge Air Show are

confident that as many as 150 Warbirds will be on hand for the 9th Annual Show.

Show Coordinator Eddie Holmes stated, "If this is the case and we do get the 150 vintage aircraft in our 1986 show it will be one of the largest displays of this type aircraft together in one

place since the end of World War II.

Come and enjoy the 9th Annual Breckenridge Air Show on Sunday, May 25, 1986, from 2:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m. at the Stephens County Airport, 2 miles south of Breckenridge on U. S. Highway 183.

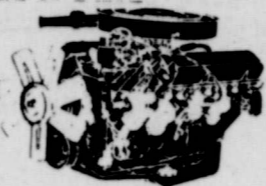

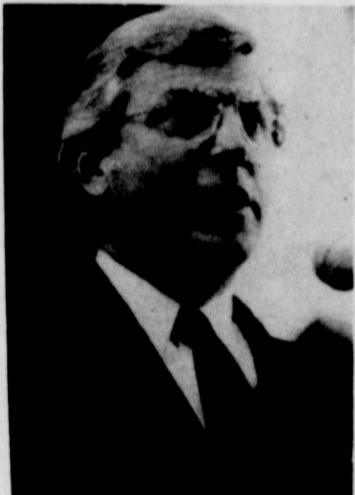

Absentee balloting began April 14 for this Primary vote and the request for ballots has been great, indicating that turnout will be heavy Saturday, May 3.

The Democratic Party has nine voting sites in the county, and Republicans will vote at four sites.

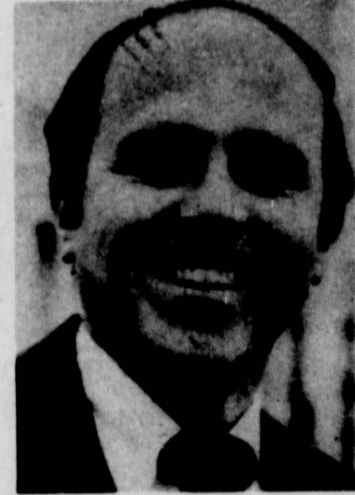

STATE & DISTRICT DEMOCRATIC

The Democratic ballot offers a number of choices for state and district offices.

Perhaps at the top would be the Governor's race which pits incumbent Mark White and six hopefuls. Probably considered the strongest contenders would be Andrew C. Briscoe III and Don Crowder. Others seeking to unseat White as Democrats are Shella Bilyeu, Bobby Locke and Ron Slover.

Place Four: Jay Gibson, David M. Ivy, John E. Humphreys and Raul A. Gonzalez.

Justice Jim Wallace, Place 3, is unopposed.

Also of interest is Court of Criminal Appeals, Place One Judgeship which lists Paul R. Reagon, Rusty Duncan, Preston Dial and George Martinez.

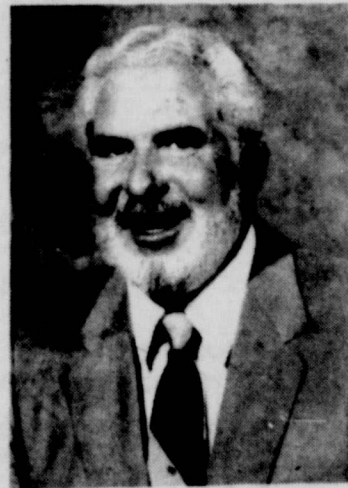
