Ciscoans Invited To Hilton "Town Hall Meeting"

Ciscoans and those from the surrounding area have been invited to a "Town Hall Meeting" at the Hilton Community Center Monday evening, May 4, in which up-to-date details regarding the Center's development, financing, and plans for the future will be discussed. The meeting will be hosted by the

Hilton's Board of Trustees and will begin at 7 p.m. President Eris Ritchie of the board urged everyone to attend. "This meeting is not just for financial supporters of the Hilton," he said, "but for everyone in and around Cisco who is at all interested in what has been done, what the status of the project is at

the present time, and what is foreseen for the future."

He continued, "We would like ideas and input from anyone and everyone, and we want to answer any and every question that might be asked. The Hilton is, after all, the property of all the people of Cisco, and

everyone is entitled to his or her say in its overall planning and development."

Bobby Smith, CPA, Secretary-Treasurer of the board, will give a financial report and answer any questions regarding the major Hilton Foundation grant, the construction and operational budgets, the endowment pro-

gram, and any other items regarding budgeting and accounting for the project.

Dick Woolley, Vice President, will report on the current status of the construction project, part of which has yet to be formally accepted by the board.

JoAnn Cermin, board member, will report on cultural, historical, and entertainment possibilities for the present and future, as

well as describing some of the hopes and plans for the museum section of the property.

"This is the first public meeting that has been held since before construction began," Mr. Ritchie said, "and we hope very much to have a large crowd in attendance. The meeting will be held in the Hilton Theater, which should have ample seating for everyone."

Hilton Board Of Trustees Represents Community

The seven-member Board of Trustees of the Hilton Community Center are representative of a cross section of the leadership of the community of Cisco, and are appointed by three different local entities.

Two of the positions on the board are filled by appointments of the City of Cisco, the City Council. Currently holding these two places are former mayor Eris Ritchie, President of the Board, and former councilman Brad Kimbrough.

Two members are appointed by the Cisco Chamber of Commerce. The present board representatives for the Chamber are Dick Woolley, Vice Presi-

dent, and Bobby Smith, CPA, Secretary-Treasurer.

Two board positions are filled by appointees of the Cisco Historical Society. These places are presently held by JoAnn Cermin and Emma Watts. Prior to her moving from Cisco, Barbara Pope was a Historical Society representative on the board.

The seventh member of the board is chosen by the other six to represent the community at large. Michael Moore, Cisco City Manager, is the at-large member at this time.

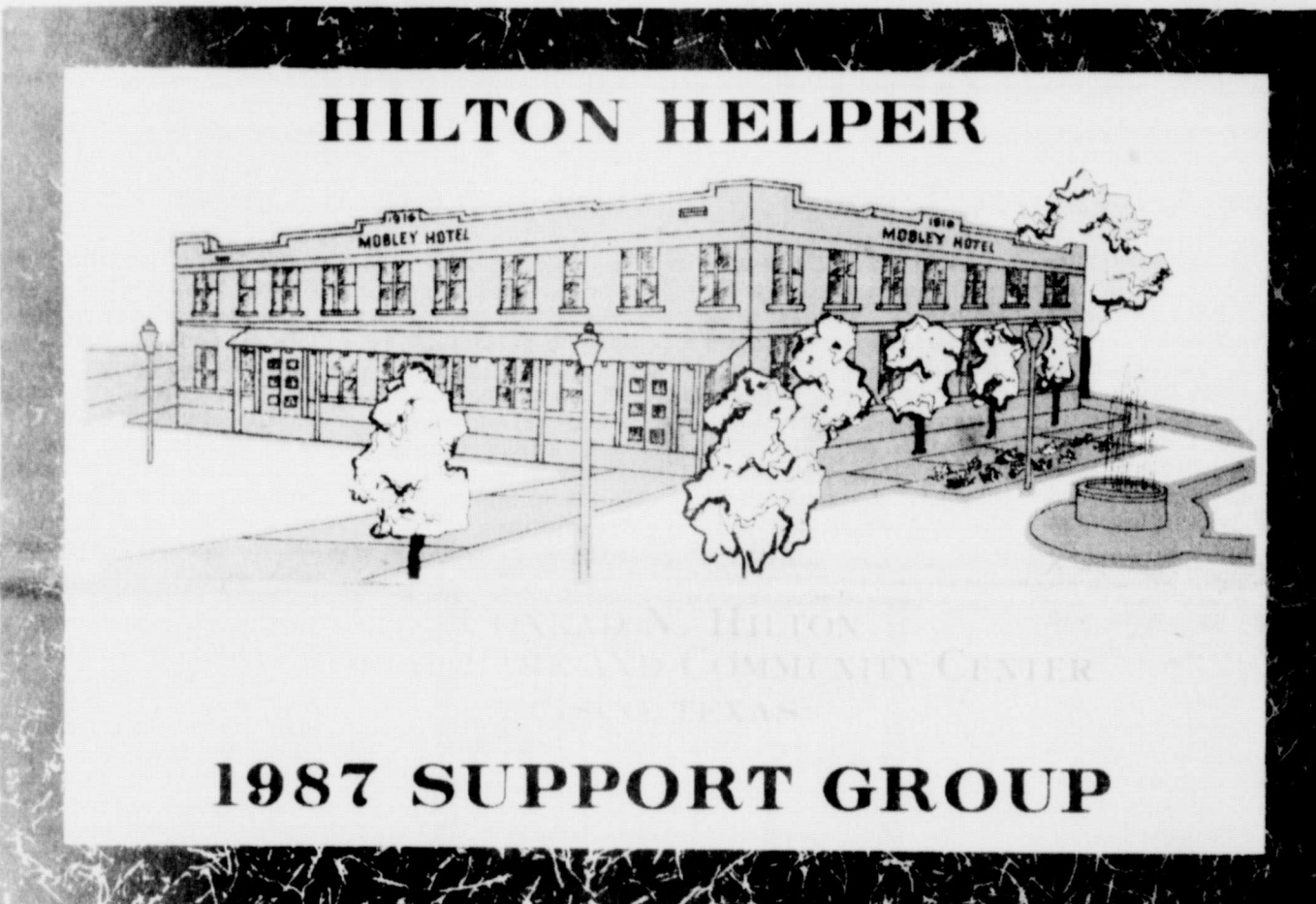
Mr. Ritchie, commenting on the service of those on the board, also stated, "I have personally appreciated more than can be expressed the dedication of those who have served with me on the Hilton Board. They have been and are often called for meetings on very short notice, many times during the busy schedule of their work day, and we have never once failed to have a quorum. An Editorial

Unique in all this world, a national treasure, and a source of local pride is the Conrad N. Hilton Memorial Park and Community Center.

It is a magnet, already attracting visitors to our city and bringing attention to Cisco, and its potential in that capacity cannot even be imagined for year to come.

Times change; concepts dim. There was a time when Cisco was best known for the "world's largest swimming pool." Today, in a new era, there are new visions to be seen. Hilton Community Center Estimated Annual Income

Estimates of the difference between income and expenses for the Hilton Community Center, in order to be operated in first class fashion, is some \$7,000 per year, without any capital improvements. This is based on the current endowment rate of return and current level of "Hilton Helper" participation.

Obviously, new members of "Hilton Helpers" and additional support for the endowment program will decrease the difference.

*Without any capital improvements, total projected expenses would be 36,500.

The difference between projected income and expenses without capital improvements is 7050. The difference with capital improvements is 12,050.

Endowment Provides Long-Term Support

The endowment program of the Hilton Community Center was begun with an initial amount of \$100,000 of the grant from the Hilton Foundation's \$1.2 million gift to Cisco. It was subsidized by pledges of more than \$50,000 by interested Cisco individuals and companies, and now has assets of donations and pledges totalling approximately \$175,000.

A short-to medium-term goal of \$250,000 has been set for the fund, which will provide income for operation and maintenance of the Center into perpetuity. It is hoped that a long-term amount of \$500,000 can be in the endowment, which would assure continuous upkeep of the property "come what may," Hilton board members have asserted.

The endowment fund is a capital account which will never be spent. Only the income in the form of dividends and/or interest earned by the principal amount will be utilized for the Hilton's upkeep. President Eris Ritchie stated, "When you contribute \$100 to the endowment fund, you are in reality donating approximately \$10 per year for the next 100 or more years. When \$1000 is given, you're giving about \$100 per month into perpetuity, and so on and so on." He also said, "In today's economy, the return is probably slightly less than ten percent, but in times of higher interest rates, the dividends/interest from the capital fund would be as much as fifteen percent or more."

Persons, companies, or organizations giving as much as \$100 per year over a five-year period will have their names on a plaque prominently displayed in the entry lobby of the Hilton. Those who have already contributed or pledged a minimum of this amount already have their names on nameplates on one of the plaques.

Hilton Center Involved In Special Service Projects

Since its formal dedication and opening in October of 1986, the Hilton Community Center organization has been involved in several community service projects, and at times has combined service to the community with fund raising for its monetary needs.

The first project was making the facility available at no charge for the A.A.R.P. Tax Assistance School, in which people were trained to assist senior citizens with

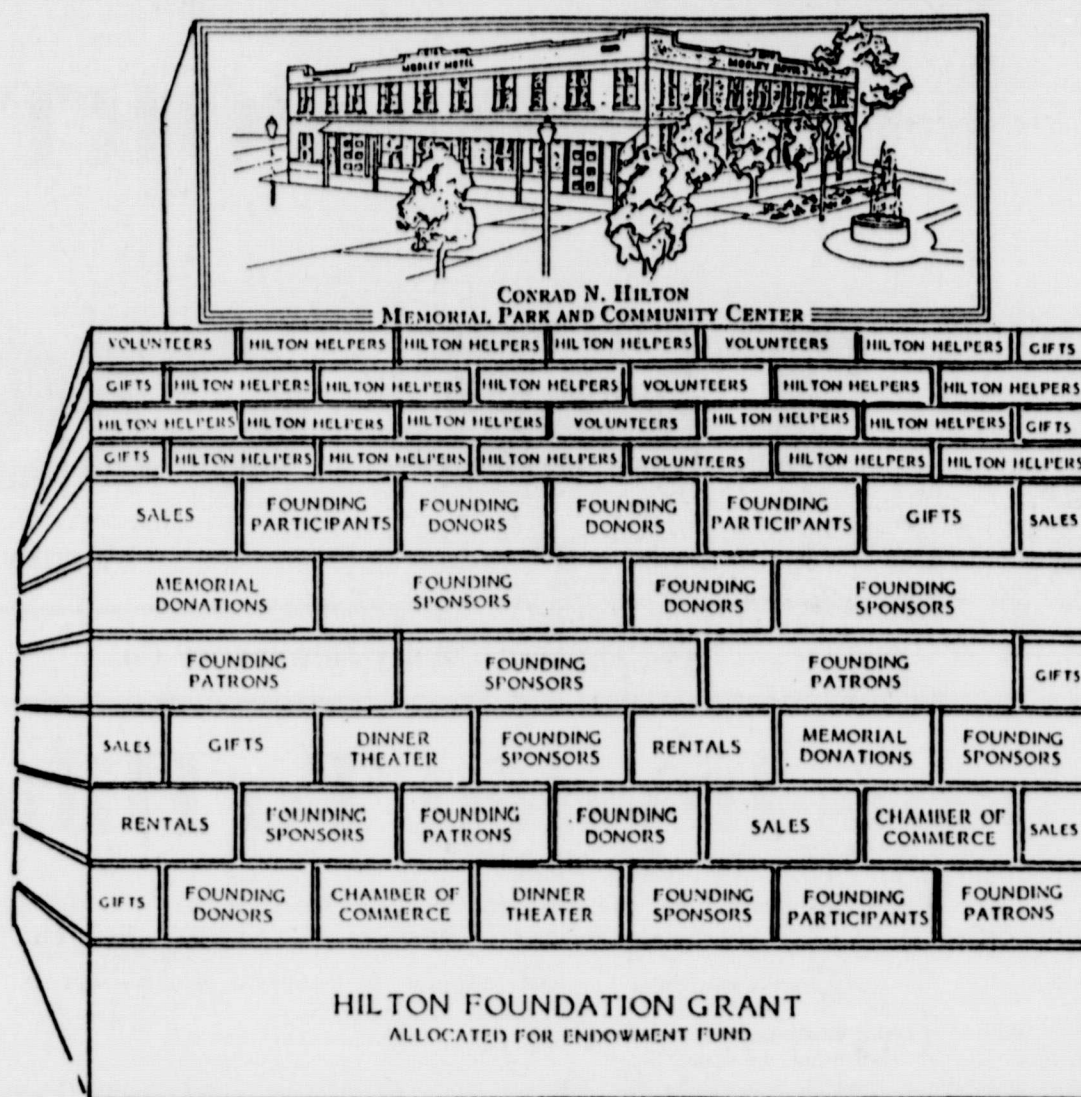
their federal income tax returns. This program was for one week, early in January.

On April 24-25 the Center's board sponsored the one-man dramatic production, "Clarence Darrow," featuring Cavanaugh Garza. The board felt that a two-fold purpose was met by bringing quality drama to Cisco, as well as also benefiting financially from profits of the play. The tickets were "family priced" at \$2.50 and \$1.00 so that entire families could afford to attend for a reasonable cost.

Solely for the benefit of the community of Cisco and the surrounding Eastland County area, the Hilton Center is currently sponsoring the display, "Archeology in Texas." The exhibit is on loan from the Institute of Texas Cultures in San Antonio, and may be seen during weekdays from 9:00 until noon and 1:00 to 5:00. It may also be seen during building tours on Saturday and Sunday afternoons.

The Hilton is combining a unique community service project with fund raising in promoting the mini-tour to Dallas on June 19 for a concert of the Mormon Tabernacle Choir, performing with the international champion barbershop chorus, The Vocal Majority, and the Constitution Symphony Orchestra, conducted by Anshel Brusilov. Theme of the concert is "We the People," in commemoration of the Bicentennial of the U. S. Constitution. The mini-tour will be by charter Greyhound Bus leaving the Hilton at 2:30 p.m., and will include dinner at the Old Spaghetti Warehouse in Dallas prior to the 7:30 concert at Reunion Arena. The price per person for the entire package is \$49.00, \$10.00 of which is tax-deductible as a contribution to the Hilton. Those interested in participating may call Eris Ritchie at 442-2500 daytime or 442-1613 evenings to inquire as to availability of places. The tour reservations were virtually all taken as of this printing, but there is a chance others can be worked in, Mr. Ritchie said.

Memorial Donations To Hilton Are Lasting Tributes

Contributions to the Hilton Community Center's Memorial Fund go into the capital endowment account, and are a "lasting tribute" in memory of a friend or loved one who is deceased.

Memorial donations may be personally taken or mailed to the First National Bank, to the attention of Linda Walton. A letter to the family of the deceased, notifying them of your contribution, will be sent by Dick Woolley, Vice President of the Hilton board.

Also, "Living Tribute" contributions may be made, giving special honor to a person or persons who are living. These type gifts may be made in the same manner,

and letters from Mr. Woolley will likewise be sent to the person or persons being honored, advising of your donation.

Both types of gifts are recorded in a permanent journal of the Hilton Community Center, and will be a part of the records of the Center into perpetuity.

Museum Development Part Of Plans For Hilton Center

The floor may be unfinished, the electrical system not completed, the heating and cooling "a la natural," and the "curators" fledgling, but Cisco now has the beginning of a museum, on the second floor of the Hilton Community Center in space that architects designated for future expansion.

Due to a limitation of funds, the methods of display have been extremely limited, and only through hard work and ingenuity was the current exhibit organized. Largely through the interest and generosity of only a few donors, the exhibit was ready for viewing at the time of the Hilton's formal dedication in October of last year.

Future plans call for a rotation of exhibits when more items have been made available by community members.

By recent vote action, plans are being made to complete electrical wiring so that displays will be adequately lighted, which will greatly increase visitors' enjoyment of the exhibits currently in the museum.



City of Cisco Proclamation

WHEREAS, the Conrad N. Hilton Memorial Park and Community Center, commonly known as the Hilton Community Center, has substantially completed its rehabilitation of the old Hobble Hotel and is now operational; and has become a dynamic structure owned and dedicated for use by the citizens of Cisco; and,

Burgess-Manning In Cisco Builds Large Industrial Silencer

One of the world's largest (and probably the largest ever built in the world) industrial silencers was completed and turned over to a trucking firm for delivery Thursday by the Burgess-Manning plant in Cisco. The huge instrument is shown in the accompanying picture.

The industrial silencer (muffler) measures 14 feet in diameter, is 66 feet in

length and weighs in excess of 41 tons. Its value was estimated "in excess of \$100,000." It was mounted on a huge truck with four axles front and back for transport to Fairbanks-Morse Engine Division of Colt Industries in Wisconsin.

Two huge cranes were rented from an Abilene firm and brought here to load the silencer. It took about a

dozen men and machines several hours to put the instrument aboard the truck and make it ready for travel.

Larry Campbell, plant manager here for Burgess-Manning, said that the Cisco factory used more than 1,700 man hours in building the silencer.

After loading, the truck's rear four axles were backed onto the scales at Thornton Feed Mill and weighed to determine the load weight. The truck had been weighed prior to loading.

The Texas Highway Department declined to issue a permit for the truck load to use interstate highways due to its length. The two drivers for Belger Trucking Company of Kansas City, Mo., who were here to transport the load, had to use maps and telephones to plan a route on non-interstate roads. Some states won't allow loads of that length on any roads and these have to be avoided. The load left Cisco via Highway 183.

The big muffler was designed for a test engine — an 18-cylinder diesel — for a Navy ship. Fairbanks-Morris designs and builds large diesel and natural gas fueled reciprocating engines for industrial plants throughout the world. These engines are used to power naval ships as well as commercial power plants.

The silencer shown in the picture will be installed on a 29,000 horsepower test engine in Beloit, Wisconsin. It will allow Fairbanks-Morris to run their test engine there while adhering to OSHA noise standards and maintaining their image as a good neighbor. When the tests are complete on this 18 cylinder engine, the company expects to sell similar engines for marine service.

Burgess-Manning is a division of Nitram Energy, Inc., and is an engineering, manufacturing and marketing company which specializes in mechanical separation, pulsation snubbing, and silencing products for the energy, process and gas transmission markets. Burgess-Manning introduced the "straight through" muffler for early automobiles (such as the Model "T" Ford) and was the American pioneer in noise silencing products.

The Cisco plant is one of several manufacturing facilities owned and operated by Burgess-Manning, and it specializes in silencing products. The local plant has between 40 and 50 persons on its payroll.

Mr. Campbell reported that the Cisco plant's work force currently is busy on another large silencer — one somewhat smaller — for a Navy LSD.

Cisco Junior College Is Winding Down 1986-87 School Year

Final activities for the 1986-87 school year, including graduation ceremonies for the approx-

imately 130 members of the Sophomore Class, will begin during the coming week at Cisco Junior College.

reactivated County Court which now has concurrent jurisdiction with the 91st District Court for misdemeanor cases.

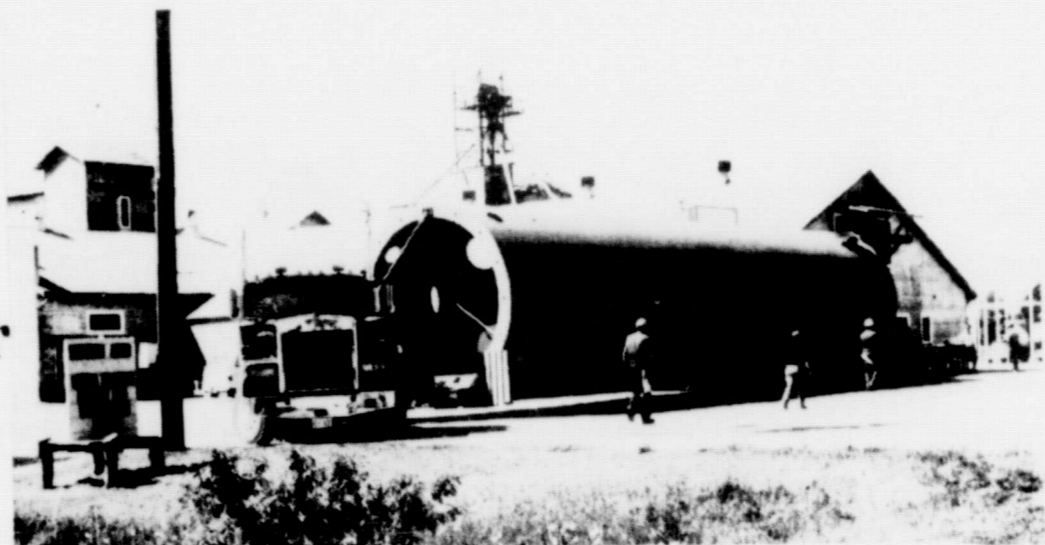
Judge Bailey had originally set first and third Mondays as preliminary hearing dates, but after a planning session with the District

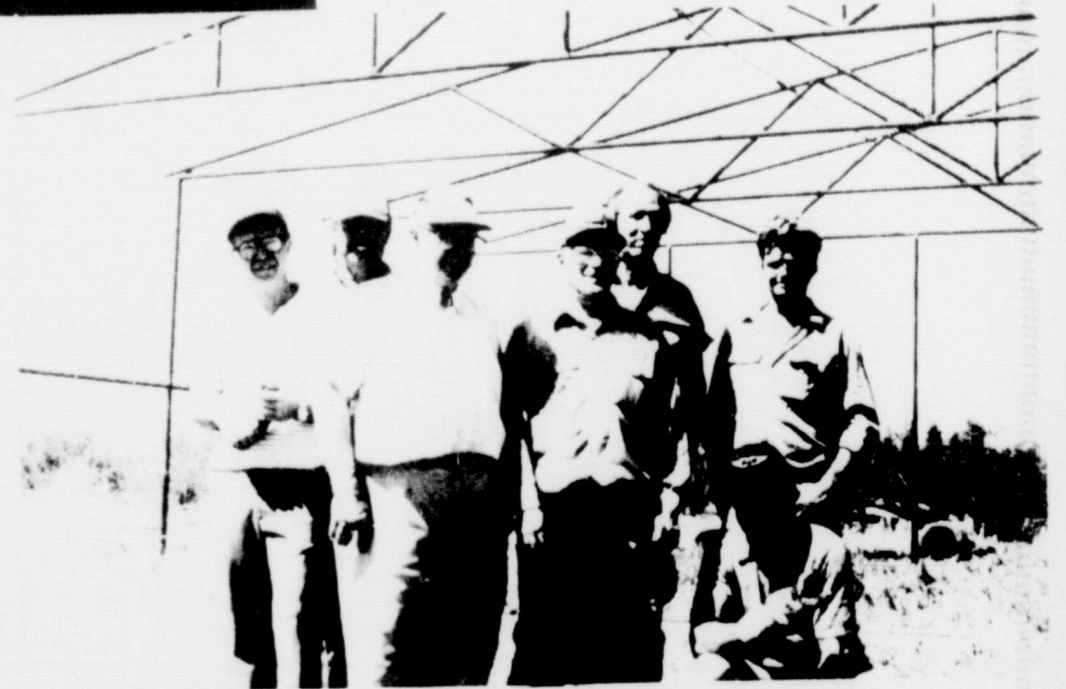
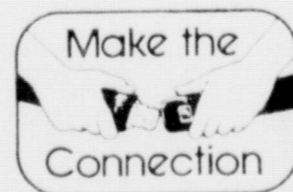

"Your Uncle John fell in the whiskey vat. Some men tried to pull him out but he fought them off playfully so he drowned. We cremated him. He burned for three days.

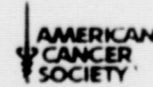

Legal Notices

ORDINANCE NO. 0-87-3
BE IT ORDAINED BY
THE CITY COUNCIL OF
THE CITY OF CISCO,
TEXAS:

PART 1: That the Code of Ordinances is hereby amended by the addition of Article III, Section 19-25 to Chapter 19 thereto which shall read in its entirety as follows:

ARTICLE III, Section 19-25. TAXATION OF TELECOMMUNICATION SERVICES

(a) A tax is hereby authorized on all telecommunications services sold within the City of Cisco, Texas. For purposes of this section, the sale of telecommunications services is consummated at the location of the telephone or other telecommunications device from which the call or other communication originates. If the point of origin cannot be determined, the sale is consummated at the address to which the call or other communication is billed.

(b) The application of the exemption provided for in Article 1066C, Section 4B(a), V.A.T.S. is hereby repealed by the City of Cisco, Texas as authorized by Section 4B(a) thereof.

(c) The rate of tax imposed by this section shall be the same as the rate imposed by the City of Cisco, Texas, for all other local Sales and Use Taxes as authorized by the legislature of the State of Texas.

(d) The City Secretary shall forward to the Comptroller of the State of Texas by United States Registered or Certified Mail a copy of this ordinance along with a

copy of the minutes of the City Council's vote and discussion on this ordinance.

(e) This section shall become effective as of October 1, 1987.

PART 2. This ordinance shall be and is hereby declared to be cumulative of all other ordinances of the City of Cisco, Texas, and this ordinance shall not operate to repeal or affect any of such other ordinances. The tax provided for hereunder shall not serve as an offset to, be in lieu of or in any way reduce any amount payable to the City pursuant to any franchise, street use ordinance, charter provision, statute or, without limitation by the foregoing enumeration, otherwise payable by any provider of telecommunications service; it being the express intent thereof that all such obligations, impositions and agreements of every kind and nature shall remain in full force and effect without reduction or limitation hereby.

PART 3. If any section, subsection, sentence, clause or phrase of this ordinance is for any reason held unconstitutional, such holding shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this ordinance.

PART 4. This ordinance is to be liberally construed to achieve its remedial purposes.

PART 5. This ordinance shall become effective from and after its passage as provided by law.

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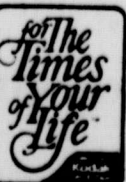

Battle Of The Alamo

THE BATTLE OF THE ALAMO by Ben H. Proctor. Texas State Historical Association, 2/306 Richardson Hall, University Station, Austin, Tx. 78712. \$2.95.

This new slim (36-page booklet) should be required reading for every Texan. We shouldn't be eligible to vote until we've read it. It's a complete chronicle of that historic event from beginning to end, told in a brisk style of just the bare facts, without the little gems of sidenotes that so often clouds the overall picture.

Beginning Dec. 4, 1835 with Milam in San Antonio, and the telling of his drawing the line with his sword and asking, "Who will follow Old Ben Milam?" Author Proctor later states "...the story of Travis asking those who would die with him to step across a line which he drew in the ground...has proven to be legendary."

The brief profiles of the men Travis, Crockett, Bowie and others are excellently drawn, frank and without fanfare.

And as you re-read this important story, you can't help but wonder: "What if?" In January of 1836 Houston order Col. Bowie with approximately 30 men to go to

San Antonio, their specific purpose being to demolish the Alamo, abandon the city, and withdraw the Texas military forces to a more protected area around Gonzales."

Bowie and others later were unwilling to abandon the city and demolish the Alamo. Their reasons? They said there was no transportation for the artillery. But their feelings ran much deeper. They believe the future of Texas depended upon keeping San Antonio out of enemy hands. Besides, the author says, "...the Alamo had an almost mystical effect upon the men, a definite transformation taking place once they were inside its walls."

It came to an end on March 6—at a little past 5 a.m. Santa Anna ordered a frontal assault—and the rest is history. Could the final be so sudden? The author says "for 15 minutes the struggle continued."

Later Santa Anna said of it "it was but a small affair." While 183 Texas rebels died that day, the attackers probably lost 600 men. True! Men of the Alamo had perished but, as one historian put it, "their spirits had only begun to live and inspire."

TEXAS HEALTH NEWS AND VIEWS

QUESTION: Mr. Cartee, you discussed the Home Health Agencies the other day, but I am not sure just what they do and how one contacts them. Can you tell us more about them?

ANSWER: Home Health Agencies and organizations formed to provide certain types of health care in the patient's home instead of in the hospital. Many of the services they provide, such as intravenous, antibiotics, respiratory treatments, catheter changes, etc. have formerly required hospital facilities. Also, the Home Health Care Services may include general nursing care, home makers, and meal preparation. Not only are people likely to be more comfortable with care in their own home, these services are now available without incurring the costs of hospitalization. Your doctor or the social worker in your hospital can arrange for Home Health Care, where it is needed. This is not a standard discharge

planning activity done for patients when they are about to leave the hospital if you need care without going to a nursing home.

QUESTION: Mr. Cartee, how many elderly people are there in Eastland and Callahan Counties?

ANSWER: The Department on aging projected the population for Callahan County, for 1987, would be 13609. Of this population 2867 is 60 years old with 1040 older than 75. 33% of the population is classified as elderly. In Eastland County the population projection is 22,135 for 1987. 30.9 of the population will be classified as elderly. 6124 over the 60 with 2436 over 75. We will discuss at a later time the projections for the year 2000.

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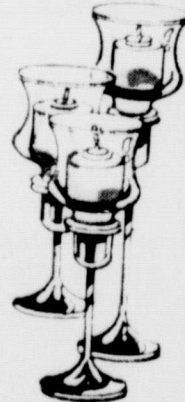
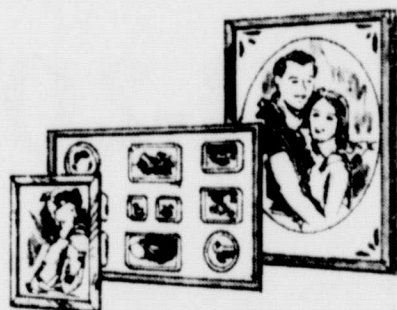
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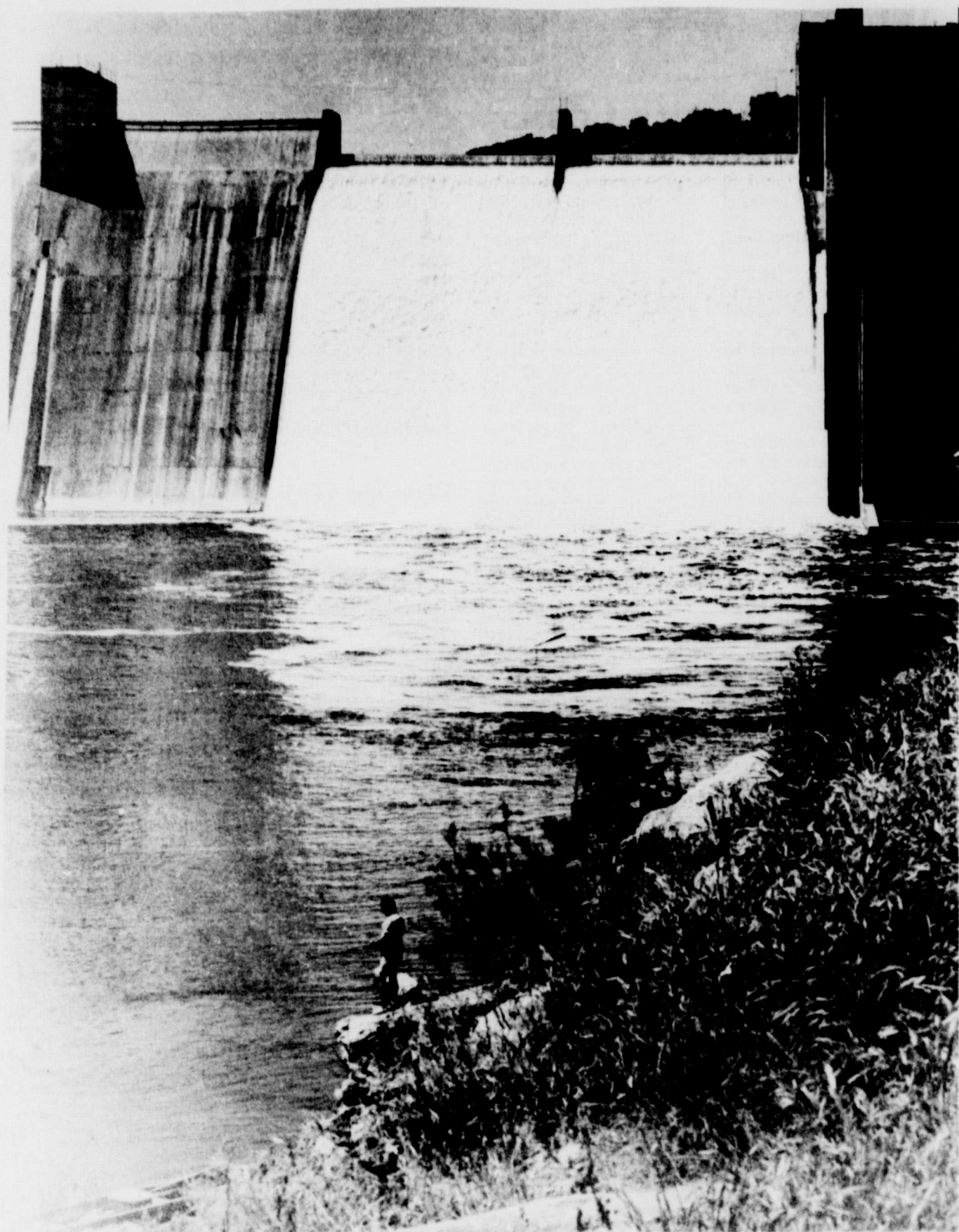
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Spillway is open at Possum Kingdom Lake Photo By Herrel Hallmark

Brazos River Authority Making Efforts To Minimize Water Release

Brazos River Authority has announced that it is making additional efforts to minimize the further drawdown of the level of Possum Kingdom Lake due to water releases for power generation.

The lake level has been drawn down 13 feet from the normal maximum operating level of 1,000 feet while structural modifications are being made to the dam. The temporary maximum operating level of 987 feet is expected to be in effect for at least six months and perhaps as long as a year. Lowering of the lake level to 987 feet was ordered by the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission which licenses the hydroelectric generating facilities.

The lake level is being

drawn down as a safety measure because of problems discovered during the regular five-year inspection currently in progress at the project. On the basis of recommendations made by the engineers hired by the authority to conduct the five-year inspection of the dam, the Authority originally proposed to lower the lake level by eight feet, to elevation 992, while engineering investigations continued and corrective measures were implemented. Once the drawdown began, however, the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission, which licenses Possum Kingdom as a hydroelectric power project, ordered that the lake be drawn down an additional five feet, to elevation 987.

The Brazos River Authority

has contractual requirements to provide water to downstream users. It also has a contract that requires it to sell hydroelectric power to Brazos Electric Power Cooperative. The Cooperative, in turn, has obligations to 20 member cooperatives and seven city electric systems. These systems provide electric service to over 573,000 people, including residents and businesses at Possum Kingdom. A spokesman said there will be times when it is necessary for the Authority to operate the hydroelectric plant to provide this power to the Cooperative. He added that, working with Brazos Electric Power Cooperative, the Authority will do its best to minimize the effect of circumstances on residents. He said the Cooperative's power

needs are dictated by its consumers, but it has volunteered to do its best to minimize them.

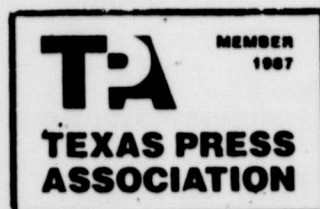
"If weather conditions during this summer are hot and dry as usual, we can expect the lake level to go lower than 987 as the result of evaporation and normal water supply and hydroelectric operations," said Carson Hoge, General Manager of the Authority. "We have been working with Brazos Electric Power Cooperative to ensure that we can coordinate our essential operations of water supply and hydroelectric power to minimize further lowering of the lake's level. Brazos Elec-

tric Power Cooperative has been extremely cooperative. We will do our best to minimize the effect of the lower level required by the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission."

The Brazos River Authority Board of Directors has authorized the expenditure of more than \$2,000,000 to continue investigations and to identify and begin work on any needed modifications of the dam. A general contractor is now on site and has already begun some of the structural modifications recommended by the Authority's consulting engineers. Also under way is the installation of highly sensitive monitoring equipment on the dam to provide data as to its present condition and to detect any changes which may be occurring. Hoge said repairs are expected to take at least six months and perhaps as long as a year.

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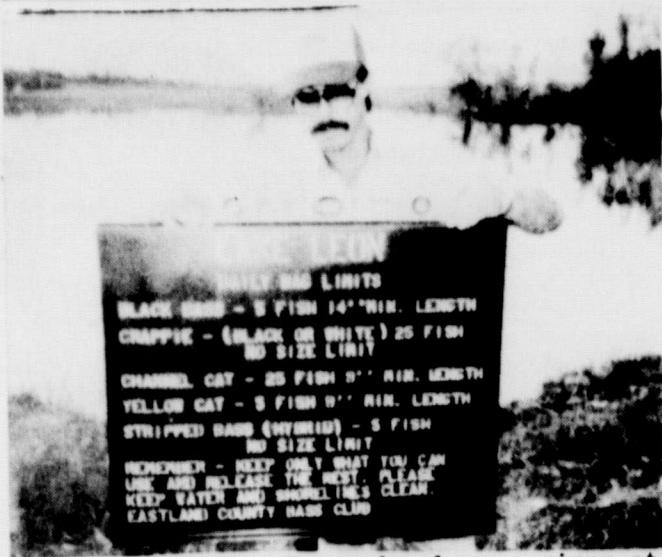

The three p.m. weigh-in went as follows. 11 fish 14" or longer were weighed. Only one fish dead, which is excellent for the hot calm day we had Sunday. First place was Tommy Maynard 2 fish 7.20. Tommy also won big bass honors with one fish weighing 4.15. Second place Terry Wilson 3 fish 5.24. Both winners were using worms and applying the flipping method in heavy cover.

Don't forget Thursday, May 7th, Eastland County Bass Club meeting. And the public is invited to attend. Also May 10th will be the in-club tournament for members only. The location for this tournament will be drawn at Thursday's meeting.

The Eastland County Bass Club has placed signs listing the state daily size and bag limits around Lake Leon. These were furnished whole by the gentlemen and we thank them for their continued efforts in helping preserve our fishing resources not only on Leon but impoundments around the state. We understand plans are underway to also place signs at Lake Cisco and Eastland Lake.

A nationwide survey conducted by the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service (FWS) underscores the importance of fishing and hunting recreation to the nation's economy, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials said.

Preliminary results of the \$9 million survey show that 46.6 million, or more than one in four adult Americans, engaged in sport fishing in 1985. The survey estimated that fishermen spent more than \$28 billion pursuing their sport.

The survey also showed that 16.7 million Americans, or about one in ten hunted. They spent more than \$10 billion. Nonconsumptive wildlife related activities, which include a variety of outdoor activities such as birding and photography, were done by an estimated 109.7 million Americans, or about half the population. They spent over \$14 billion during the year.

More than 100,000 households were contacted by telephone for the initial phase of the survey, which was done by the U.S. Bureau of the Census for the F.W.S.

Hunters and anglers were paid for their survey through excise taxes on sporting equipment which go into the Federal aid in Sport Fish Restoration and Federal Aid in Wildlife Restoration accounts.

Hilton Helpers Sought For Community Center

Would you like to be a "Hilton Helper" by assisting with the maintenance and upkeep of the Hilton Community Center?

Eighty more "Hilton Helpers" are being sought to join with the twenty current members who are contributing \$5 per month in the form of automatic bank drafts, or other payment methods, to the Center's operational budget.

Even though we received a tremendous grant for the construction project, the day-to-day expenses of operation and maintenance of the Hilton Community Center are expenses that must be borne by us, the users," President Eris Ritchie of the Board of Trustees pointed out. "We can keep the property maintained in first class fashion if we can get more widespread participation by the citizens of Cisco and the surrounding area," he said.

When the project was first conceived, after the \$1.2 million Hilton grant was announced, the steering committee, working on the project hoped to preserve \$300,000 of the grant for an endowment for operation and maintenance. It soon became evident that most of the grant would be required to do a creditable construction rehabilitation, so \$1.1 million was budgeted for ar-

chitectural, engineering, and construction costs, with \$100,000 earmarked for beginning an endowment fund for upkeep purposes. The \$100,000 has been preserved, and is now in a capital endowment fund, along with some \$50,000 additional contributed in donations from Ciscoans and others interested in the Hilton, with some \$25,000 more pledged to be paid over the next five years.

Since current endowment income is not sufficient to cover needed upkeep expenses, the "Hilton Helper" concept was adopted by the board to encourage widespread participation by those not presently in position to contribute substantial sums to the endowment program. However, some endowment founders are also taking part in the "Hilton Helper" program.

"The 'Hilton Helper' members can help tremendously," Mr. Ritchie stated. "Every 20 members means an additional \$100 per month for operations - to help pay for janitorial work, upkeep of the grounds, utility bills, and other routine expenses connected with the ongoing operation of the building and grounds," he said. "With 80 additional members, \$400 per month would be provided which would take up the slack between our projected expenses and income," he

continued. "No one should think that their \$5 per month wouldn't be all that helpful. On the contrary, it would be most useful and appreciated, and beneficial to all members of the community who will use and enjoy the Hilton Community Center," he concluded.

"Hilton Helpers" receive a colorful membership wall placard and a window decal showing them to be among the 1987 support group. They are also automatically members of the Advisory Board of the Hilton Community Center, and will from time to time be provided opportunity to offer their input to the Board of Trustees.

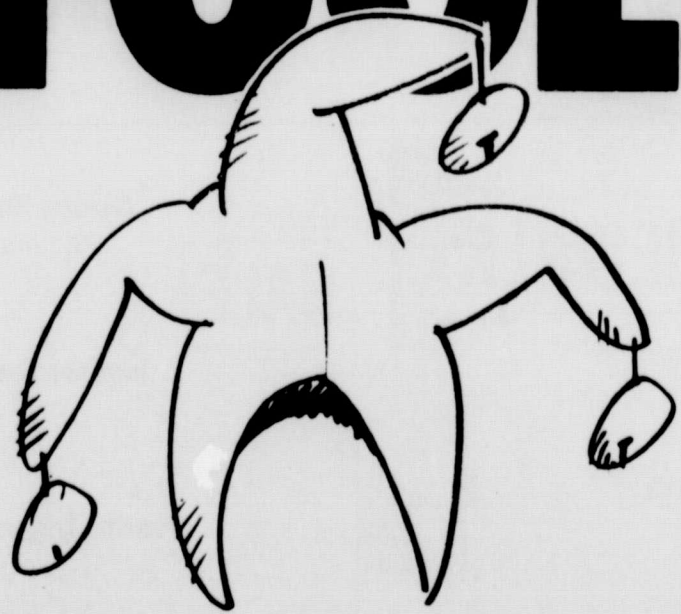

WE GOT HOME late Wednesday from San Antonio after spending a couple of weeks or so there. Last weekend, we wrote a column that was mailed in time for it to arrive in time for the mid-week edition of The Press. But the mail man didn't bring it until Wednesday, the day the paper is in the post office.

So... here's the column that we mailed:

SAN ANTONIO-- Communities considering celebration might want to take a lesson from the folks in San Antonio. Their annual Fiesta is a super duper lasting eight days!

Vacationing here, we learned about the Fiesta after arriving. It is an annual affair that observes the anniversary of that day when Texans defeated the Mexican general Santa Anna and took command once and for all time in our fine state. Issuance of Sewer System General Obligation Refunding Bonds in the amount of \$150,000 to lower interest rate on money borrowed to finance the recent wastewater treatment plant project was approved by the City Council at their semi-monthly meeting last Tuesday night.

The \$150,000 bond issue that financed Cisco's share of the treatment plant cost were sold to the Farm Home Administration to bear interest at the rate of 6.125 per cent. By refunding the bonds, the interest rate will drop to 5.875 per cent.

The refunding plan was offered to the city by FHA. City Manager Mike Moore reported, and this will save the city more than \$15,000 over the life of the bonds. The ordinance authorizing the refunding issue was passed as an emergency and will not require a second reading.

The Council passed on second and final reading an ordinance amending the "taxation" chapter of the code of ordinances of the City of Cisco. This, in effect, will allow the city to start

collecting a sales tax on receipts of Southwestern Bell Telephone Co. on Oct. 1.

City Manager Moore told the Council that the tax ordinance would bring about \$2,800 per year to the city treasury.

The monthly financial statement as prepared by City Bookkeeper Maryann Perry showed that the city's money situation is anything but good, Mr. Moore reported. Collection of taxes and other income for the fiscal year totalled 53 per cent during the first six months. Running short were such items as sales taxes, 40 per cent; franchise taxes, 42 per cent; and oil and gas royalties, 13 per cent.

The 1986-87 budget anticipated \$115,000 in oil royalties, and collections for the first six months were only \$15,000.

"We're facing a probable shortfall," Mr. Moore said. "We are holding expenses to the bare minimum."

Collections during March totalled \$35,889 and this included \$6,358 in delinquent taxes, \$7,841 in sales taxes, \$4,429 in franchise taxes, \$8,370 in sanitation charges and \$2,254 in oil and gas royalties.

Mr. Moore reported to the Council that he has started preliminary work on the 1987-88 budget as the fiscal year will begin Oct. 1. He expects to have a preliminary budget ready for the Council to begin work sessions by mid-June.

Mayor Joe Wheatley presided at the meeting. Present were Councilmen Allen Masters, Arlie K. Whitley, Roy Dennis, Bural Chambers and John Muller, City Manager Moore, City Secretary Ginger Johnson and City Attorney Bill Wright.

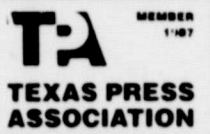

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Unemployed Oilfield Workers May Be Eligible For Retraining

Unemployed oil and gas workers from the West Central Texas region may be eligible for retraining under a \$100,000 contract recently negotiated between the Texas Department of Community Affairs and the West Central Texas Private Industry Council and its administrative agency, the West Central Texas Council of Governments.

This contract, funded through Title III of the Job Training Partnership Act (PL 97-300) is designed to aid individuals who have been displaced since January 1, 1986, from jobs in the oil and gas industry.

In order to be eligible for this program, an individual must meet State and Federal requirements as follows:

1. be a displaced oil and gas industry worker from the 19 county West Central Texas area which includes the following counties: Brown, Callahan, Coleman, Comanche, Eastland, Fisher, Haskell, Jones, Kent, Knox, Mitchell, Nolan, Runnels, Scurry, Shackelford, Stephens, Stonewall, Taylor and

Throckmorton.
2. have been terminated or laid-off or have received a notice of lay-off and is eligible for or has exhausted unemployment compensation; and is unlikely that the individual will return to previous oil and gas occupation.

Eligible individuals can participate in classroom training in one of eleven fields. This training will only be offered at Texas State Technical Institute's campus at Abilene and Sweetwater. In addition, eligible individuals may receive training in self-directed job search activities.

Homemaking Hints

From Janet Thomas, County Agent
May is senior citizen month, and I would like to share information with you about nutrition for the elderly. Most of us think of anemia as a nutritional problem of young women and children. But if you're over 65, it could be a problem for you too and one cause for feeling a lack of energy. Anemia isn't a normal part of aging, yet it's very common among older people. Sometimes it's the result of physical conditions or certain drugs that cause internal bleeding. But usually it's due to not eating enough iron-rich foods. Meat, fish and poultry are especially good sources of iron. Slice these foods very thin, if you don't like chewing meats. Also, eating a food high in vitamin C, such as a cup of orange juice, with your meat will help your body absorb the iron. If you're one of those people who snacks on tea or coffee and toast, rather than fixing yourself meals, anemia could be a special risk. There are only small amounts of iron in bread, and substances in tea and coffee may reduce iron absorption. It's better to have your tea or coffee at mid-morning or mid-afternoon and drinking something else with your meals. Breakfast cereals can be a good way to get some extra iron in your diet. But you need to check the label on the box to make sure it is iron fortified. Some other vegetable and grain foods have iron too. Try stewed prunes or prune juice, lima beans, tofu, spinach or split pea soup. These foods also have fiber which will be a plus for your diet. Watch what you eat and anemia is one dietary problem you may avoid. **RECIPE FOR THE WEEK** Strawberries are plentiful in the grocery stores and markets. The price as well as the delicious taste is "just right". This week I am featuring a delicious dessert made with fresh strawberries.

FROZEN STRAWBERRY PIE
1 1/2 cup coconut
1/4 cup melted margarine
1 cup cream cheese, softened
1 (13 oz.) can sweetened condensed milk
2 1/2 cups fresh strawberries, puréed
3 tablespoon lemon juice
1 cup whipping cream, whipped
Mix coconut and margarine in bowl. Press over bottom and side of 9 inch pie plate. Chill in refrigerator. Beat cream cheese in bowl until fluffy. Add condensed milk, mixing well. Stir in strawberries and lemon juice. Fold in whipped cream. Put into prepared pie plate. Freeze for 4 hours or until firm. Yields 6 servings.

So I Have Been Told

When the streets of Eastland were being paved with brick, there was a layer of concrete put down. Then capped with paving brick. The brick was made at Thurber. I have been told there was a tall Indian Bricklayer that could lay more brick than anyone.

This brick street is not put together with mortar. The bricks are laid on a cushion of sand between the concrete and the brick. The brick are laid tight together without mortar.

During our plumbing work we laid sewer and water lines into these brick streets. To get a ditch opened is a very big job. The brick is laid so tight together it requires breaking out some of the brick, which are very hard, before you can pry out the brick off the concrete under them. Then to cut through the concrete required an air or "jack" hammer before the dirt can be dug out.

There are hidden things under our streets, once while digging on South Daugherty Street I dug up a large round stone ball. I am sure it is a mill stone used by the Indians.

This possibly was a grave where all the belongings of an Indian was buried with him although no other artifacts were found.

Another time I dug into a large wooden water line. It

was wrapped with a steel band outside and covered with tar. Don McClendon "former City employee" said it had been dug into several times. It was an old water main from the power plant lake were Eastland got its water at one time.

I sure wish I would have cut a piece out and preserved it. Maybe someday someone will.

The pump station to put water into this line was at the power plant lake its exact location I don't know, do you?

The things found under the streets sometime are a mystery.
