Supporters Of Hilton Center Meet

The Conrad Hilton Memorial Park & Community Center hopes to increase its endowment fund to assure perpetual maintenance funds, President Eris Ritchie of the board of directors told a meeting of supporters at a town hall type meeting Monday night at the Center.

The Center has an endowment fund totalling \$156,051 and is currently conducting a drive for new supporters and Hilton Helpers (people willing to donate \$5 per month). Mr. Ritchie reported.

A financial statement released by Mr. Ritchie showed that the sum of \$1,219,500 was provided by the Hilton Foundation. A total of \$43,476 has been earned in interest and there have been donations in the amount of \$43,476.

The Center spent \$1,069,846 on construction and rehabilitation work. Another \$36,686 went into furnishings. Currently, operating expenses for the building amount to about \$41,500 per year, including \$6,500 for insurance, \$15,000 for utilities, \$6,600 for maintenance of the building, \$4,800 for grounds maintenance, \$1,200 for supplies, \$1,800 for repairs, \$600 for miscellaneous costs, and \$5,000 for capital improvements.

Income at present amounts to about \$29,450 - some \$12,000 less than expenses. The present endowment earns about \$13,000 per year. The dinner theater will play the Center \$7,200 per year, and the Chamber of Commerce pays \$3,600 in rent.

Mr. Ritchie reported that a gift shop was being opened soon and that Mrs. Kitty McCracken was in charge of it. He paid tribute to Mrs. Me-

Cracken for her work in behalf of the Center, including directing the volunteer workers who keep the Center open on weekends for the benefit of visitors.

The museum will soon have utilities and other improvements, Mr. Ritchie said. Items are being added to the museum from time to time.

Vice President Dick Woolley of the board reported that the building is 99.9 per cent complete and the contractor needs only to finish work on sprinkler system for the grounds and some landscaping work to be finished. The water well, which is considered adequate for the property, will be hooked into the sprinkler

system, he added. The kitchen is near completion with only the stove remaining to be installed along with building shelves for dish storage, Mrs. Emma Watts of the board reported. The financial statement was made by Bobby Smith of the board, who is treasurer

Gordon Spot

There have been several questions recently about the \$1 per head assessment on cattle that are sold. Cattle coming off pasture and changing ownership are subject to the \$1 per head mandatory checkoff. Order buyers and dealers purchasing pasture cattle are required to collect the dollars as are feedyards and individuals. Any and all transactions of cattle are subject to the mandatory checkoff unless a non-producer form is given.

In private treaty sales the buyer collects from the seller. The simplest method of doing this is to deduct the check off dollars before you as a buyer write the check. The checkoff covers all cattle sold, even on baby calves. The law requires that the seller pay the dollar per head and the buyer is also responsible for collecting and mailing the checkoff dollars to the Texas Beef Industry Council. There is a penalty for non-compliance which is \$5,000 per transaction.

This checkoff money is used to maintain and build demand for beef products that satisfy consumer needs and wants through market development programs such as promotions, research, education, and communication.

HEART OF TEXAS COW/CALF CLINIC

Congressman Charles W. Stenholm will be the highlight speaker at this year's Heart of Texas Cow/Calf Clinic held May 15, in Brownwood at the Brownwood Coliseum.

The clinic provides state and area ranchers the opportunity to hear from experts in various fields of cow/calf operation and provide tools for making management decisions to increase returns for cow/calf operators.

Congressman Stenholm, who has gained national prominence in the area of agriculture, small business, veteran affairs and budgetary matters, is probably best known as the organizer of the Conservative Democratic Forum known as the "Boll Weevils". He is the current chairman of the Subcommittee on Livestock, Dairy and Poultry of the U.S. House Committee on Agriculture. He represents the 17th Congressional District of Texas.

He will discuss agriculture issues that face Congress, farm policy, trade issues, and the current political climate.

Other members participating in the clinic area: Dr. Roger Landers, Extension Range Specialist, San Angelo Research Center; Patricia Adrian, Chairman of the National Beef Industry Council, White Rivers, South Dakota; Connie Keith, feed yard operator, Comanche County; Owen Smith, stocker operator from Rosebud, Texas; Tony Price, Vice President, Texas Cotton Ginners Association; Mary (Betty) Bell, CPA; Coy Garrett, State Conservationist for the Soil Conservation Service and Dr. Roland Smith, Extension Economist, College Station, Texas.

Representatives from the major agricultural companies will have booths to exhibit various farm and ranch

supplies and to answer questions. The exhibit is free to the public.

Proceeding the day long clinic there will be a tour of the Baugh Cattle Company backgrounding facilities.

The clinic is co-sponsored by Texas Power & Light, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Brownwood Chamber of Commerce and the Federal Land Bank Association.

This Clinic is coordinated by the Beef Cattle Subcommittees of Brown, Callahan, Coleman, Comanche, Eastland, McCulloch, Mills and San Saba Counties.

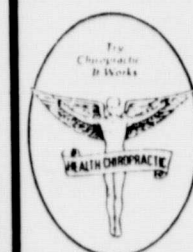

This year was the band's second consecutive year to march in the parade. Some members of the Lobo Band could not attend the event because of illness or other engagements. Those who went were the following:

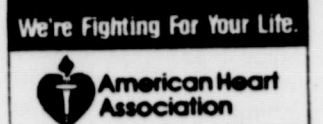

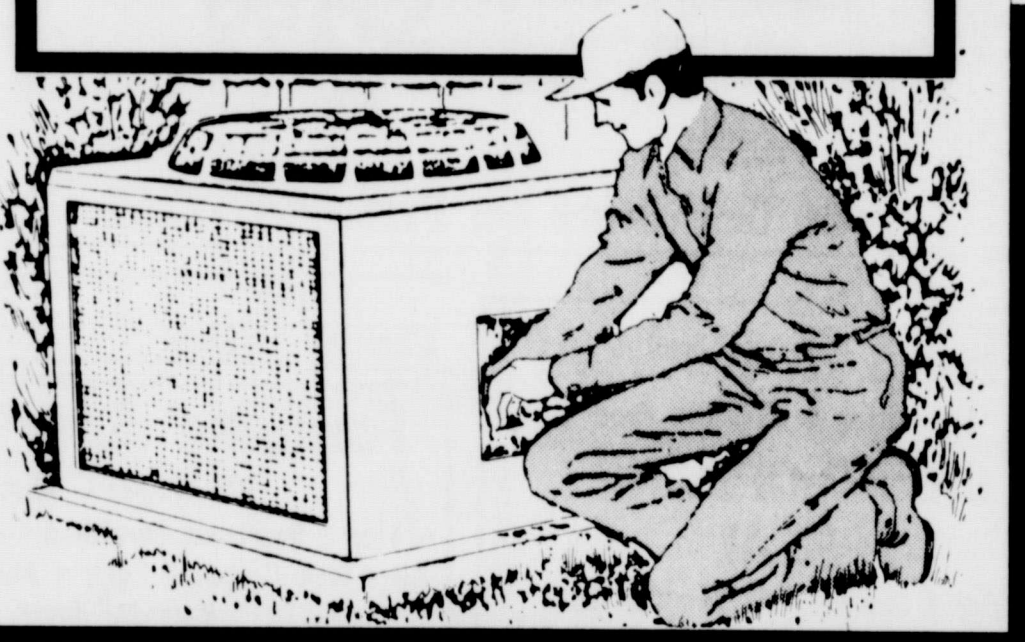

other things that I'm asked to do. I'm just a loser. I admit it.

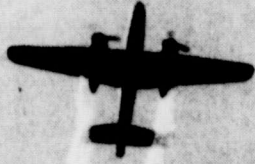
But I don't think I'd be happy being a winner in the world's definition of the word. I'd probably have to

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Fishing Outdoors

Local anglers who thus far qualify for the Lone Star Bass Classic are Bob and Joe Bob Moore and Tommy Maynard and Terry Wilson. Tommy and Terry are presently in 4th place over all.

There are 3 qualifying tournaments left and anyone who might want to join this

tour could easily qualify for the classic simply by placing well in these remaining tournaments.

1987 will probably be remembered as one of the most unusual years for figuring out wildlife patterns. Higher than normal winter rainfall, early warming spells and late cold snaps. Oh this Texas weather!

Let me give you some examples of the oddities in fishing. Lake Leon's bass normally spawn from the river first to the dam first. 1987, most of the main lake bass seem to be finished. (There are still some seat-

tered spawners.) Bass in the river section appear to be in full swing. Leon's crappie, normally stacked solid in the early winter months up the river are only now beginning to show up, but they didn't make it up the river far.

Hubbard Creek, anglers are reporting some pale colored bass that are very spooky. They are acting like they just came out of deep water. Hubbard's crappie have been almost nonexistent until now. They're running late also.

Palo Pinto, known for its excellent cold weather crappie fishing around the power plant outlet. Would you believe anglers are reporting crappie and bass laden with eggs in the discharge area.

As we've said many times in the past, just when you think you have things

figured out, "bam", they'll change. And 1987 thus far has really proven this.

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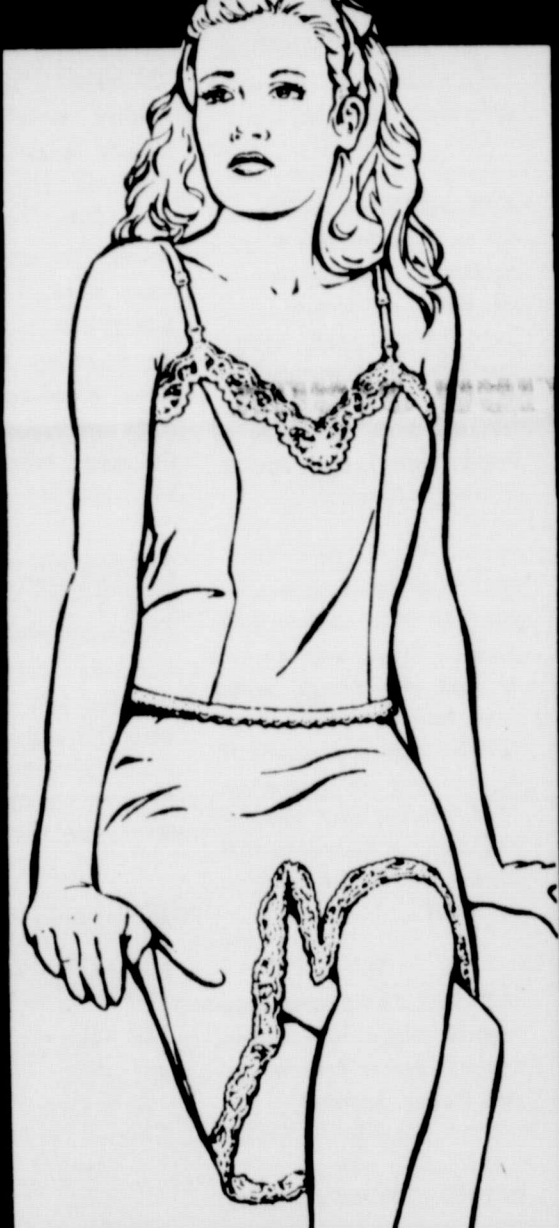

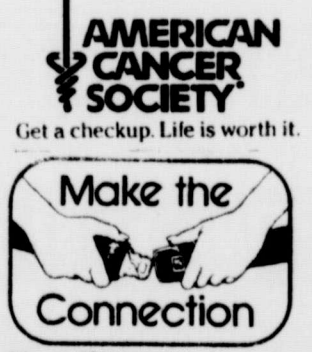

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Area News Briefs

EASTLAND
Eastland City Commissioners have agreed to grant a request by the Eastland Memorial Hospital for the city to place a \$3 voluntary contribution on water bills of Eastland residents. Hospital board members Milton Fullen and Bill Hoffman, along with Administrator Marcia Carr, said that this would offer assistance in the purchasing of new and upgraded equipment. The hospital also requested that the city allow the facility water and sewer services at no charge. This request was tabled for discussion by the Commissioners.

Eastland's annual Clean-Up Campaign was launched May 1, and will run through May 15, with everybody being urged to participate. The city is cleaning up and improving the planter boxes around the Square and the giant planter on the south side of the Exchange building. The Rotary Club is in charge of the cleaning up at the West Y Park, and the City Parks Board is busy with improvements at Park Hill.

A new six-field Soccer Complex is nearing completion alongside Highway 69 North of Eastland, due to combined efforts between independent contractors, the Chamber of Commerce and the Industrial Foundation. The two-year-old county program looks toward developing the new complex with restrooms, concession stands, and other features. The Eastland County Soccer Association is a certified member of the North Texas Soccer Association, which has international affiliation.

County Judge Scott Bailey has announced a slightly altered schedule for arraignments in the reactivated County Court, which now has concurrent jurisdiction with the 91st District Court for misdemeanor cases. The first court day was held as planned on Monday, May 4, but the Judge will hear pleas later on Fridays, and set cases for trial accordingly. This was agreed after a planning session with the District Judge, District Attorney, the Sheriff's office and various clerk's offices. Final exams will begin Thursday, May 7, and graduation for the upper class is scheduled for Friday night, May 8 at the Herrell Fine Arts auditorium. Final examinations will continue May 11 and 12 for freshmen, with grades being posted on May 15. Registration for summer school will begin May 27 at the Abilene campus and May 28 at the Clyde

campus. Students will register June 1 at the Cisco campus.
Arlin Bint of Cisco was elected President of the West Texas Hereford Association at their annual meeting last week in Abilene. A breeder of registered herefords for 15 years, Bint will represent the largest regional organization in Texas with a number of prominent ranchers in its membership rolls. The association will continue to sponsor an annual sale of registered herefords in Abilene, Bint said. Prominent Cisco area civic and church activities for many years, Mr. Bint is a retired teacher and superintendent of the Cisco Public Schools.

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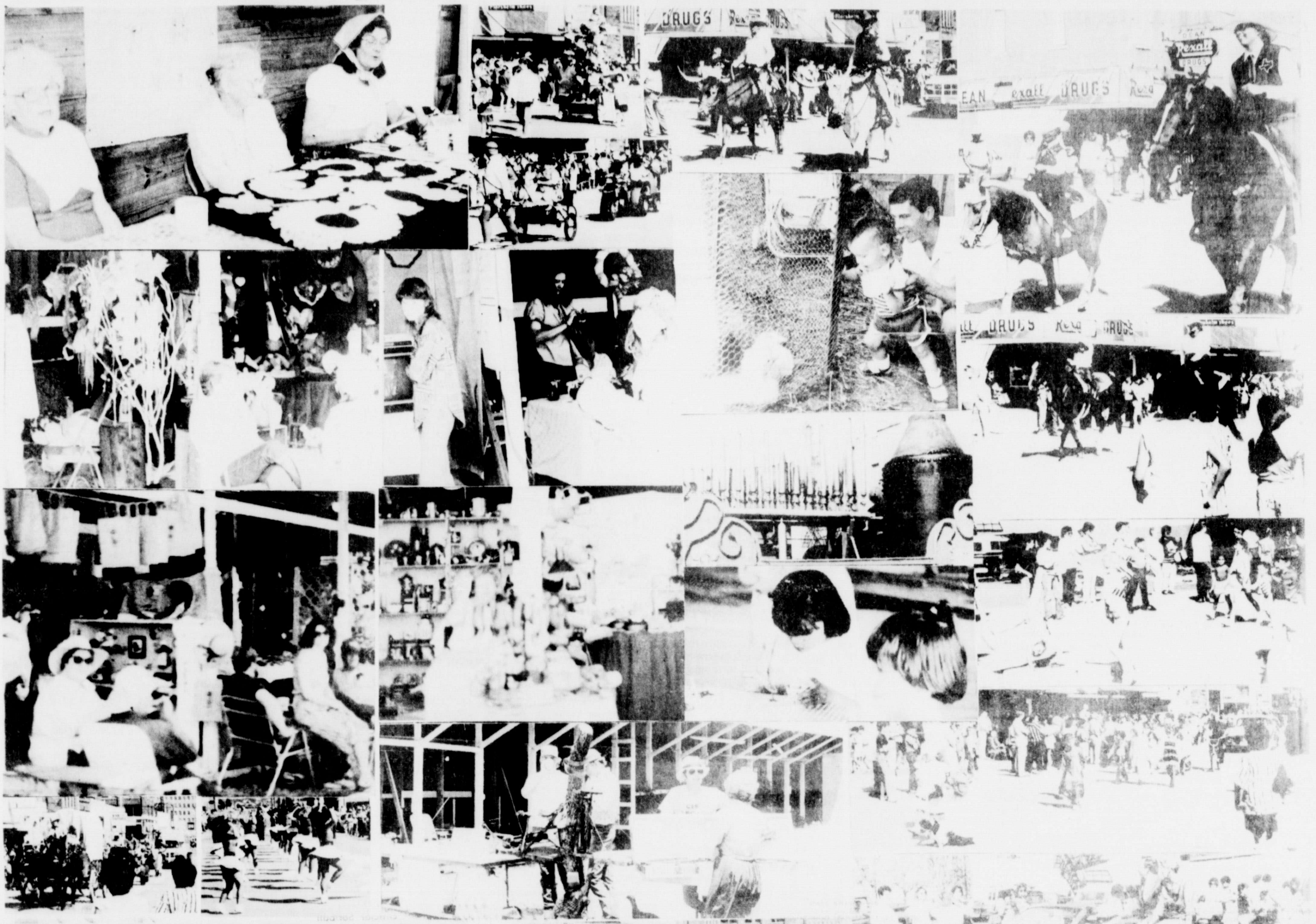

Cisco Cemetery Assoc. Has Annual Meeting

The Cisco Cemetery Association held its annual meeting Thursday, April 30, in the Community Room of First National Bank.

Anton White was re-elected president of the organization with Steve Clary as vice president. Other officers were elected as follows: secretary-treasurer, Operating Fund, Trixie Whalley; treasurer, Trust Fund, Louise Cooper; and trustees, DeAlva Chambers, Velma Joyner, Brad Kimbrough, J. H. Penn, Burnice Gorr, James W. Johnston, and J. T. Richardson.

Mrs. Whalley reported a balance of \$31,709.38 in the interest account, and a balance of \$625.28 in the checking account for a total of \$22,334.66 in the operating fund as the year ending March 31, 1987.

In the Trust Fund, Mrs. Cooper reported a beginning balance of \$119,584.65 on April 1, 1986. Donations received during the year totaled \$4,360.50 for a closing balance of \$124,074.23 on March 31, 1987.

During the progress report, Mr. White reported that Hurschell Penn had made a temporary ramp to be used in the work shop building. The ramp will be used when working on and repairing heavy riding mowers. The ramp can be removed and stored when not in use.

Throughout the year, the organization repaired and reset several old monuments that had fallen. Some of the monuments were over 100 years old, and some were pushed over by vandals.

Additional street signs were made and installed in three different areas in the cemetery. Street signs are now an all major traveled streets.

Mr. Penn and Edgar Pence measured and marked off two new sections in the new part, adding ten more blocks to the cemetery, enough space for 1,048 burials. Round concrete corner markers were made and

installed. Twenty-four fruitless mulberry trees were purchased and planted just inside the chain link fence on Front Street.

A new waterline was installed along the east fence in the new section, enabling the association to water the newly planted trees when necessary. This line will connect with the water lines they intent to install in the new sections recently marked off.

The two large Arizona Cypress trees located at the archway entrance and two other diseased Arizona Cypress trees in the cemetery were cut down.

In his closing remarks Mr. White said the long range plans for the Cemetery Association include continuing to fill curbed lots when surplus dirt is available; continue to raise and level monuments where needed; and continue the grass mowing program during spring, summer and fall seasons. He added that this is the most important project of the cemetery association.

Storage Buildings Are Broken Into

Three storage buildings back of Taylor Center on 3rd Street were broken into and valuable contents stolen between April 29 and May 1, Police Chief Billy Rains reported Tuesday. Police were investigating the incident.

Locks were cut from the doors of all three storage buildings. Johnny Bostock of Cisco reported the loss of \$900 worth of items from the building he rented. Thurman and Fay Maddox of Cisco, who also rented one of the buildings, lost items valued at \$500, and Earl Scott of Cisco had assorted items worth several hundred dollars taken from his building there.

I have a mind which refuses to run in expected channels. I might be so much happier if I simply reacted like an advertiser expected but at times I am either repelled by what is supposed to attract or I simply question to the extent that the ad failed to sell.

Consider the ad for a certain antacid with its extra ingredient to dissolve gas. I don't say it won't work but I do know the different chemicals react differently and I have enough experience with beer, soda pop etc. to know that when they drop their antacid tablet in a glass of beer to illustrate how it dissolves gas bubbles it is dissolving carbon dioxide. On the other hand I know that intestinal gas is methane. The reaction therefore might be vastly different. Stomach gas? I'm not quite sure but expect it also to be methane instead of carbon dioxide unless you have just taken on a load of carbonated drinks.

Then again, the gas bubbles in bread are carbon dioxide and maybe the yeast therein would produce CO2 MAYBE. Could some Dr. or other person knowledgeable in such things enlighten me.

The point in all that is not the question but rather too illustrate the unpredictable way ones mind can work. Maybe that is why I didn't bring home the straight A report card Mother wanted. A parent still doesn't need to fear a child will grow up like me just because they don't always react as expected so relax. Some simply need more facts upon which to base judgement.

An older brother once raised a calf obtained from a dairy. When he took it to an abattoir (that's perfectly a legitimate English word of French derivation meaning slaughterhouse) he thought the man had cheated him badly on the meat he received. So I got out the old college text THE MEAT WE EAT and reviewed dressing percentages, freezer shrinkage, and cut outs with him to the conclusion that not only had the man given him all his meat but that the calf had done a bit better than average for the type he was. Before we figured it I was not sure either but knew

that the inexperienced expect more from beef than they yield. Chicken or hogs yield a far better percentage of dressed meat.

It is quite hard to argue with people who THINK a thing is fact. Or, like a psychology instructor once said, "There are two truths which may not agree at all. One is what you consider absolute truth. The other is what the person you deal with considers to be truth. If he so firmly believes it to be true you can in no wise deal with him on any other basis. You may begin as if you accept his truth and gradually lead him into another belief but you waste your time and energy by attacking his "truth". In other words, it is as if you both argue in a language the other does not understand.

You may have heard, "A man convinced against his will is of the same opinion still." The admonition against arguing about religion is valid simply because in most cases there is no agreement on authority. The most common yet easily understood example is Catholic-Protestant debate. The Catholic authority in any religious discussion is the Pope and Church Tradition neither of which are accepted by Protestants nor are they familiar with the vast body of Tradition. The protestant relies totally on the Bible supposedly. That is to say he relies on it as best and if he understands it. Frequently he only repeats some preachers "interpretation" of what it contains.

I was once amused and distressed at the same time when a lady told me, "The Bible says that cleanliness is next to Godliness." While some of the Levitical scriptures relate to ritualistic purification and others were strictly common sense health guards the lady's quotation might be inferred but simply was never there in those familiar words. Thus, I do not wear my Sunday suit to feed my livestock nor do I feel like washing and changing to get parts when I crawl from under the old pick-up.

But to point of belief as op-

posed to truth, any debate wherein there is no prestructuring of authority for determination of fact will convince few and in most cases persuades members of an audience but not those engaged in argument.

For the very reason that I accept very little at face value I utterly reject the concept in courts of "Taking Judicial Notice" therein a judge can say that a thing is sufficiently well known as to be beyond argument. A Calif. law suit involving the "Holocaust" is an example of deciding a case without permitting the defense or argument.

It reminds me of the historical "fact" that the Earth is flat. "Judicial notice" in those days could have resulted in one being bar-B-Qued in a public square for insisting or teaching that it was round. In similar fashion an "infallible" judge of US courts can deprive one of property or liberty with no recourse except it be by costly appeal in a system where some judge may be equally dedicated to their brotherhood as to be quite reluctant to overturn another's decision.

Like the "demonstration" of how a pill can dissolve gas bubbles, I reserve the right to question both "facts" and motivation. I do accept as fact that you are determined, steadfast, and not wishy-washy but you should also be ready to accept me as stubborn, bull-headed, and obstinate. While I may admit that I'VE BEEN WRONG BEFORE, some may wait in vain for that admission in their specific case.

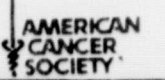
CHS Cheerleaders Are Elected
