Gordon Spot

Agricultural producers here in Eastland County as well as those throughout the state are currently experiencing serious financial problems. Peanuts are our major crop and we hope it will continue to be an important part of our economy for many years. However, in an attempt to improve the financial condition many farmers are considering alternative crops as a means of diversifying their operations to increase profits.

Some of the alternative crops growers are considering are grapes, peaches, and other fruit crops, potatoes and other vegetables, Christmas trees, and shade trees. Those who want to evaluate the potential for increasing profits by growing and marketing these crops will have a good opportunity to do so on May 26.

The Texas Agricultural Extension Service will simultaneously conduct 10 regional conferences on that date entitled "Horticultural Alternatives for Texas Agriculture" across the state. The conference nearest Eastland County is in Stephenville at the Holiday Inn, Highway 377. Some portions of the educational program will be broadcast via satellite to each of the ten conferences. In addition, information concerning regional opportunities in horticulture will be presented by Extension specialists and local industry leaders from our area.

The topics will deal with making the right decisions about crops, opportunities for horticulture crops, marketing of home grown crops, pricing and merchandising, and developing a business plan.

Some of the local speakers and panel members will be Dale Barker, manager of Smith's Fruit Farm at DeLeon; Dan Childers, fruit and nut producer from Cottonwood; Larry Womack, owner of Womack's Nursery at DeLeon; Rogie Steen, marketing specialist with Texas Department of Agriculture at Brownwood; Jim Farley, manager of DeLeon area Farmers Market; Sid Miller, owner of Miller's Nursery between Stephenville and Dublin; and Mitchell Harris, Production Credit Association of Stephenville.

Some of the statewide speakers will be Ranson Blakely, marketing consultation of Dryden, New York; Dr. Edward Estes, associate professor, department of Ag Communication, North Carolina State University; David Johnson, sales representative of Lone Star Growers, San Antonio; and Dr. Alfred Wagner, Extension Food Technology Specialist, College Station.

The conference will begin at 8:45 a.m. with a discussion by Texas Extension Director Dr. Zerle L. Carpenter, who will discuss "Diversifying Texas Agriculture - Potentials for Future Growth." Extension specialist will discuss some of the topics.

Producers who are unable to attend one of the 10 regional conferences but who have access to a satellite dish, can view the televised program portions by tuning to the Westar 4 tele-communications satellite. However, these producers will not receive the localized, regionally-specific portions of the conference.

Cisco Writer's Club Members Go To Jail, Club Announces Contest Rules

Elsa Turner, Betty Townsend, Donna Barranger and Irene Wylie, Albany members of the Cisco Writers' Club, were hostesses at the Old Jail Museum for the May dinner meeting of club members and guests.

Elsa Turner introduced Joan Farmer, after-dinner speaker whose subject was the late Robert Nail, Albany playwright and educator.

Robert Nail, who grew up in Albany, graduated Princeton University, but he was a "hometown boy" who did not seek greener pastures elsewhere. He returned to Albany as a teacher, and in 1938 he wrote and guided into production "The Fort Griffin Fandangle," which is now an annual show involving all of Albany in some way.

Robert Nail, as presented by Ms. Farmer, who knew and worked with him, was an intensely empathetic person

who inspired people to do better than they thought they could.

For example, Elsa Turner, by her own admission, "didn't know much of anything about Indians" until Nail told her what he needed her to do for the Fandangle. Her research and recruiting activities resulted in eighty authentic Indian costumes Nail wanted for the Fandangle.

Such examples of his faith in humanity's ability lends credence to the feeling that Robert Nail was the catalyst that gives Albany its distinctive identity. His influence is incalculable as there is a Robert Nail Scholarship from the Albany Extension Students' Association and the royalty from his works published by French and Co. support the work of the Robert Nail Foundation.

The Old Jail Museum was bought by Robert Nail in 1940 for \$45.00 when it was just "the old jail." A wealth of material about local history as well as about Robert Nail has been cataloged—with much remaining to be done by archivist Joan Farmer and assistant Elsa Turner.

Mary Ann Ziehr, CWC president, thanked Ms. Farmer for her presentation and also expressed the club's appreciation for the occasion. After a business meeting, the club adjourned until September.

TEXAS HEALTH NEWS AND VIEWS

By Roy Cartee

QUESTION: Mr. Cartee, Alzheimer's Disease is a dreaded disease. Could you tell me how many patients are affected in Texas?

ANSWER: People often associate Alzheimer's disease with only the aged. The senate committee on health and human resources, in 1987, states in 1986 there were between 12,000 and 14,000 under age of 65 having the disease, while between 115,500 and 145,600 over age 65 having the disease. In 1987, 148,550 had the dreaded incurable disease.

QUESTION: Mr. Cartee, I read an article about teenage pregnancies nation wide. Does Texas have a great a problem as other states?

ANSWER: I feel you should say "Do other states have as serious problem as Texas." Texas ranks first in the nation in its rate of births

by girls 14 and younger. We rank second as the highest rate of pregnancies to girls 14 and younger. 74% of all pregnancies are unintended. 86% were out of wedlock. Texas spent \$19 million in 1986, to support teenage mother and children. 2% of all female school dropouts quit school because of pregnancy and marriage. These figures are overwhelming but the problems go on: pregnant teen agers are at greater risk of maternal deaths, birth complications and prolonged labor. Also, teenage mothers are twice as likely to have low weight babies. Texas has a serious problem and the prime cause is the lack of education.

"There are, of course, a few other electronic ministries with the singular purpose of presenting the Christian message to the listening/viewing audience. Unfortunately, however, they seem to be the exception."

Mr. Ritchie, who is a member of the board of directors of the sponsoring organization, said that he has received a number of telephone calls from over the country complimenting him on writing the letter. In addition, he added, many people have mentioned it to him in person.

USDA Asks Comments On '88 Program Provisions

WASHINGTON — The U.S. Department of Agriculture is accepting comments on provisions common to the 1988 wheat, feed grains, upland cotton, extra-long-staple cotton and rice programs.

"Many program provisions are common to all of the above commodity programs, and decisions made in regard to one commodity will likely apply to other program crops," said Milton Hertz, administrator of USDA's Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service. Hertz said USDA will consider the comments received before final decisions on these program provisions are made.

USDA will also consider comments on the following:

- whether to permit the production of alternative crops on reduced acreage (known as ACR, for Acreage Conservation Reserve). It is proposed that the production of alternative crops on ACR land not be allowed for the 1988 crops; such production was not allowed for the 1987 crops.
- Whether to require off-setting or cross compliance. USDA proposes that limited cross compliance requirements (except for ELS cotton) be in effect for the 1988 commodity programs but that offsetting compliance requirements not be in effect. Under limited cross compliance, to be eligible for benefits for a wheat, feed grain, upland cotton or rice crop, the acreage planted for harvest on a farm in other commodities, except for ELS cotton, may not exceed the crop acreage bases of such commodities. If offsetting compliance requirements are not in effect, eligibility for a program payment and loan for a commodity on a farm will not be affected by actions with respect to that commodity on another farm.
- Whether advance payments should be offered.
- Whether an advance recourse commodity loan program should be made available. USDA proposes not to implement such a program for the 1988 crops.
- Whether producers should be permitted to increase a crop acreage base by up to 10 percent of the farm acreage base if corresponding decreases in one or more crop acreage bases are made. It is proposed that this adjustment option not be authorized for the 1988 crops.
- Whether the secretary of agriculture should implement a program to allow producers who repay loans with interest to be issued certificates in an amount equal to the interest paid on such loans.

Welcome To The "Ritz"

Cisco Hilton Avenue's "Puttin' on the Ritz" Inc., a 150 seat restaurant, opened May 1, 1987, after two years of reconstruction-restoration. To accomplish the project the entire second floor of the Huey Motor Company & Hotel was gutted out to the bare walls and ceilings. The present design developed from a dream to create a pleasant upper class 1920 to 1940's nostalgic theme environment to compliment the neighboring Mobley Hotel, Conrad Hilton's first hotel.

The "Ritz" decor consists of yesteryear building materials gathered from various places in Central Texas. A large redwood cooling tower made in the 1920's by a company named Braun from the Cisco Ice Plant supplied the polished wood on the walls which was nailed on with brass boat nails. The 4' wide, 70' long main center support beam outside lattice trimmed awnings and dinner tables were also made from the redwood cooling tower.

The pink heart design pressed tin ceiling and much of the

unique trim came from a circa 1920's Munday, Texas high school.

The carved wood columns, oak fireplace mantle, several windows, doors and pieces of fancy trim came from the judge Forest Wright estate of Cisco, Texas.

The four arched foyer doors and choir loft waiting seats in the hall came from the old First Baptist Church of Eastland, Texas.

The stair handrail and structural performing stage material came from the Mobley Hotel. Various talents will perform on a scheduled basis reflecting on the yesteryear era. The doors at the bathroom entrances are original Mobley Hotel room doors.

The three dimensional full wall european art murals in the front dining rooms came from the famous Little Bit of Sweden Smorgasbord in Dallas, Texas. One of the murals is painted on glass with lights behind and carved figurines on front.

The blue velvet drapes in the front dining rooms, the chandelier in the foyer, and the carpet came from the elegant Ewald's in Dallas, Texas.

The main dining room bentwood chairs and booths came from Kirby's in Dallas, Texas which was the oldest upper class steak house in Dallas when it closed in 1987.

The Colorado style window view toward the Mobley Hotel and Cisco Junior College was accomplished by adding a single window from the Jude Wright Estate between the existing original Huey Hotel room double windows.

The main goal of the "Ritz" is to compliment the Mobley Hotel in good taste with food, service and entertainment in a 1920's version with class and remain affordable. Our aim is to "Put on the Ritz" for our customers. Our wait persons wear black bow ties, suspenders, white shirts and black slacks or skirts as a part of a performance for you. Please feel comfortable in casual or dress attire.

Red Cross Swimming Class To Be Offered In June

Swimmer: In this course you will master five all purpose swimming strokes, including the sidestroke, backstroke, and breast stroke. You will learn several dives including the long shallow dive, the running entry, and the board dive.

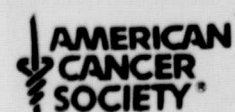

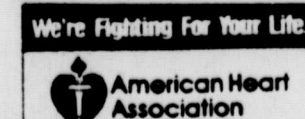
