State Witnesses Continue In Organized Crime Trial

The two-week old crime trial in connection with the murder of Debra Garcia in the 91st District Courtroom could go through another week or more.

Special Prosecutor Bill Hart called various witnesses to the stand, with Defense Attorneys Saul Pullman, George Gray and Keith Woodley objecting to some of the procedures and a number of the statements.

In most cases they were overruled by Judge Herman Fitts of Palo Pinto, who is designated to hear the case.

On trial are Pat Starr, Brenda Andrews and Richard Hinton, with Joe Perry and Barbara Williams expected to be tried later.

Charles Le Flore and his brother, Thomas, were previously sentenced to the 1981 abduction-murder, and are serving time in prison.

Charles Le Flore was on the stand again this week, and attempted to refute a confession he made to the murder in 1982. Also, Le Flore said he never told Sis Sellers of Cisco that he murdered Garcia.

Mrs. Sellers was among the witnesses called up on Tuesday, after the jury was seated. She said Le Flore

confessed to the murder in her home, and she gave information leading to his indictment to Sheriff Johnnie Morren.

Other witnesses called up on Tuesday were C.W. Guthrie, a Cisco Fire Chief who found Garcia's body, and Roy Dennis, who owned the Conviene store where Debra Garcia worked.

On Thursday morning Curtis Ingram of Cisco was jailed after refusing to answer Hart's questions about a statement given to the Special Prosecutor in 1986. Judge Fitts ordered Sheriff Underwood to keep Ingram in jail until he will answer questions.

Most of Thursday after-

noon was spent with testimony from a "Mystery Witness." May Lavon McCoy of Brazoria County, Mrs. McCoy told the jury that Elizabeth Ann Perry Peacock Shaw said her family was involved in the sexual abuse and murder of Debra Jo Garcia.

Lake Cisco Is Still Rising After Recent Rainfall

Rainfall measuring over an inch fell in the Lake Cisco area during a thunderstorm late Thursday and this plus continued runoff from Lake Bernie and the Battle Creek pump station was expected to result in at least a foot of new water for the city's municipal reservoir.

City Manager Mike Moore reported that Lake Cisco rain gauges measured "a good inch" during the Thursday downpour. Lake Bernie has been spilling into the creek connecting with Lake Cisco for the past 10 days. The pump station at Battle Creek began running Thursday and was still in operation Friday.

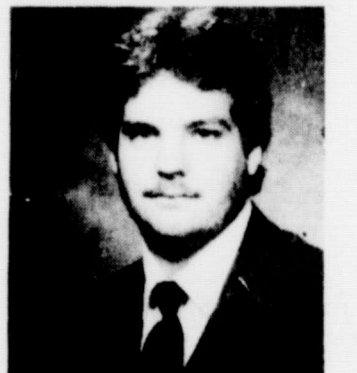
Rainfall was general over this region. Gauges in Cisco measured around 1.5 inches. The rain was a bit heavier at Scranton and Nimrod and Rising Star reported over two inches as did Eastland and Ranger.

The weather man called for continued thunderstorm conditions this weekend.

Cisco firemen had teams of weather watchers on duty from 3:20 p.m. Thursday for much of the afternoon and night. A twister that did not touch down was reported north of Rising Star. There were no reports of storm damage in Cisco.

...13 Years Perfect Attendance For CHS Student

Some people spend their school years trying to get out of all the attendance they can. But there are others, like eighteen-year-old Rodney Williams of Cisco, who try to go to school every day, no matter what the circumstances.

Rodney's efforts have really paid off for him. When he received his Cisco High School diploma on Friday, May 29, he completed 13 years of schooling without being absent even once. He also received a number of honors and had an A average on his record.

He plans to attend Cisco Junior College next fall on a scholarship. His major will be in his favorite subject, agri-business.

Rodney's attendance record stretches from kindergarten days in Gordon in 1974 to here in Cisco. When he started to school he and his parents, Charles and Melba Williams, and his older brothers and sisters lived in Strawn, and there was no kindergarten in the town. So he was carried back and forth to Gordon for a school term. Then he enrolled in the first grade at Strawn.

During kindergarten, Rodney says he set his goal to complete school with a perfect attendance. This was partly because his father had impressed him with the importance of each day of school.

Charles Sr. left school before he graduated and went into business for himself. At age 15 he was managing a grocery store north of Houston. Later he came back to his home town of Weatherford to go into business there.

He urged his children not to enter the business world so young, but to get as much education as they could.

Another factor in Rodney's decision was that brothers Charles Jr. and Mike and sisters Sherri and Melissa were trying for attendance records too.

In 1975 Sherri graduated from Strawn High School with a 10 year perfect attendance record. Then in 1977 Charles Jr. graduated with a

History Of Scranton's Last Schools Is Told

The people of Scranton were not caught unprepared when the closing of the Academy left them without a school. The district already

had legal status by virtue of a petition executed by W. T. Rutherford in 1902 which established Scranton School District No. 39 through an

act of the Commissioner's Court. Moreover the new school fell heir to the campus and main building left by the Academy. Professor and

Mrs. E. E. Phillips of Ranger were recruited to organize and head the school, and Mary Fleming and May Miller were elected to complete the faculty. The school offered ten grades of instruction and a seven-month term. In 1921 John H. Shrader, a former teacher in Scranton Academy, was named to head the school. His faculty members were Mary Fleming, Lois Cross, and Bessie Vaughn. From 1923 to 1925 J. W. Minor was superintendent with Clyde Kisinger, Anna Casey, and Eva Jobe Richardson as the other teachers.

A tragic blow came on Christmas Eve night of 1924 when the large frame school building burned to the ground, apparently set by candles on a Christmas tree used there on Christmas Eve. Fortunately this came during the Christmas holidays; by the time they were over, arrangements had been made to hold school in the town's two churches and in a large residence which was available. A bond election held to finance a new brick or stone building passed by a 98-33 vote margin, but an injunction filed thereafter delayed building; trustees chose to use temporary arrangements until such time as the legal matter could be settled.

From 1925 to 1935 superintendents J. O. Noah, Jean Andrews, and B. B. Brummett headed the school in succession. During their tenures enrollment grew steadily and numerous improvements were made to the school plant. Moreover, a consolidation program was initiated with the Haskell district coming into Scranton and the Haskell school building being moved to the Scranton school ground. In 1926 the Dan Horn community comprised of twenty-five square miles of territory contiguous to the Scranton district was annexed to Scranton and the Dan Horn high schools students transferred to Scranton; elementary students attended school at Dan Horn. Later Nimrod came into the Scranton district under a similar arrangement. Zion Hill first transferred into Scranton and eventually consolidated.

With the increase in enrollment came additional state funds and tax income which enabled the school to expand its curriculum and enlarge

the faculty. A modern red brick school house was eventually completed, and the district was renamed Scranton Independent School District when the bonds for building the school house were issued. New furnishings including desks and 300 folding chair were purchased, along with sewing machines for the homemaking department, articles for the shop, and numerous other teaching aids.

In 1928 the first bus, a Chevrolet, was purchased for use in transporting Dan Horn pupils. It was paid for partly by school funds and partly by public subscription. Shortly afterwards, a 41-passenger Model A bus was acquired to serve other routes, and in 1931 the school was able to buy two new International buses. To satisfy accreditation requisites, an additional six acres of land was purchased to enlarge the school ground.

Since this period embraced the Depression years, improvements at the school were accomplished by sacrifices of school personnel, trustees, and patrons. The economic situation was so dire throughout the nation that the Texas State Board of Education made across-the-board reductions of salaries on the State Schedule. Vouchers most often had to be discounted, and many Scranton teachers taught without pay the last weeks of school in order that the school term could extend through 8½ or 9 months. Trustees made many personal sacrifices, often adding their signatures to notes when borrowing money to keep the school operating. One instance was cited in which a trustee mortgaged the team upon which he was dependent for a living in order to obtain funds needed to open the fall semester. Patrons unselfishly donated labor and material to needed school improvements.

Despite these hardships, the ambitions held for Scranton Independent school came to full fruition during the administration of W. T. Hughes (1936-1941). The district now stretched across fifty square miles and served the Haskell, Dan Horn, Zion Hill, Nimrod and Scranton communities. Enrollment during these years remained close to 300. Nineteen faculty and staff members served the fully-accredited twelve-grade school. All elementary

pupils now attending school at the central unit at Scranton. Scranton students proved to be formidable opponents in Interscholastic League events, and school spirit was high.

In 1937 a WPA project provided a commodious native stone gymnasium-auditorium which serve not only the Scranton school children but also those from across the county and district, it being a favorite and convenient site for athletic events. When funds assigned to its construction were exhausted before it was completed, patrons again donated labor and material to see it completed. Scranton school was experiencing good times such as it had not known since the days of Scranton Academy.

Then came Pearl Harbor and World War II and the problems brought about by war. New responsibilities fell upon the employees of the school. Teachers were given the task of registering young men for the draft and of issuing food stamps to the public. The U. S. Army Air Force chose Scranton as the site of an Aircraft Warning Service aimed at protecting military installations at Fort Worth, Abilene, Brownwood, Mineral Wells and Coleman. A. L. Gattis, a veteran of World War I, was conscripted to superintend the station which was located in the school house. Evelyn Bailey, the principal of the high school, was assigned the duty of manning the station. High school juniors and seniors were used for this purpose during the school hours, and volunteer adults were used for the evening and night shifts. Every aircraft, seen or heard, was identified if visible, time of overflight and direction recorded and immediately reported by direct line to Warning Headquarters.

School buses posed another problem during war time. The school was operating three well-used International buses. They covered a large territory over unpaved roads and thus needed frequent repairs. Truett Holder, the town's only mechanic, held the contract for their supervision and maintenance. When he moved away to accept other employment, the school and the community were left without a mechanic. Mean-

time, Melvin Bailey, a Scranton native, had twice been called up for military service and twice rejected because of a visual defect. The Draft Board, knowing that he held a Civil Service rating as a mechanic, froze him to the school for the duration of the war. Keeping the buses running was a daily challenge. Parts were not available because the military had priority. Somehow he managed to rebuild, repair, or piece together needed parts, and at the end of the war, surprisingly, the buses were still making their daily runs.

Harvest time proved another difficult problem. With so many men gone from the community to serve the military, labor to harvest crops was scarce. To free older pupils to assist on the farms school convened in July and August, dismissed in September and October, and reconvened in November. To fill two vacancies in the summer session, Miss Louise Snoddy, a Carrollton teacher home for summer vacation, agreed to teach until her school started, and the Methodist minister filled the other vacancy. The following summer Lillian Battle, a former Scranton teacher, returned home and rejoined the regular faculty.

Gas rationing curtailed school trips, thus limiting interscholastic athletic activities. In order to provide wholesome recreation for the school children, "play nights" were held regularly at the gym with student teams matched against one another or against adult teams in the community. On Saturday nights the gym was converted into a skating rink with teachers and parents supervising.

Maintaining teachers during the war was difficult. Superintendent Hughes resigned early in the war, and Charles B. Harris, principal, was moved to that office. John H. Shrader, who had started teaching at Scranton Academy in 1911 and had remained the ensuing years as elementary principal, became the high school principal. C. S. Eldridge, former Eastland County School Superintendent, agreed to head the school temporarily. At his resignation Mr. Shrader took the superintendency until the end of the war at which

time he returned to his preferred position as an elementary principal, moving to the Baird school system.

During these years the entire country had witnessed an unprecedented movement of population. A large percentage of those transplanted in war time never returned to their home territory. Rural areas were especially affected. School personnel were a part of the movement, and each year brought sizeable turnovers in faculties and staff. In the years from 1945-1964, Scranton had eight superintendents: E. T. Elms, Arthur Adams, Addie Brown, W. D. Donahoo, P. O. Hatley, Coy I. Keahy, Irvin Ewing, and Carl Elliott. Enrollment began a steadily declining trend during the war years and continued in the post-war years. The drop in Average Daily Attendance diminished school income and forced a reduction in the number of teachers and curtailment of the curriculum, all at a time when accreditation standards set by the state were becoming more rigid. Consolidation of smaller schools into urban schools was being urged and made almost mandatory by the state board.

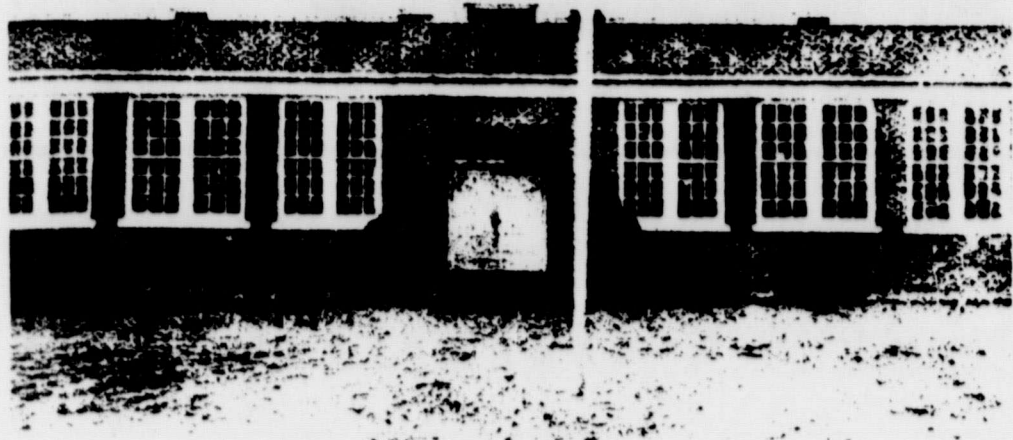
By 1956 enrollment in Scranton had dropped to 122 and by 1957 to 113. A new ruling in 1957 which raised the requirements for graduation in Texas schools posed a threat to Scranton's accreditation as did some needed improvements in the school plant. A bond election provided \$28,000 to add three classrooms, a cafeteria, and better restroom facilities. Three barracks buildings were purchased and remodeled for homemaking and vocational departments. These changes sufficed for a time to satisfy the State Board.

By 1964 the problems had become so acute that it was decided that the welfare of Scranton students could best be served by transferring them into Cisco. Consolidations followed shortly thereafter.

On the evening of June 6 and all day Sunday, June 7, 1967, people of all ages who attended Scranton schools will gather at Scranton Community Center to renew acquaintances, recall happy years spent there, and celebrate the one-hundredth anniversary of the founding of the first public school in Scranton. The Homecoming will take place in the one building left on the school grounds, actually the new wing added to the building in 1955. The older part of the building was sold and dismantled in the sixties as were the frame structures. Nearby stand the ghostly walls of the stone gymnasium-auditorium, gutted by fire in 1985. At the entry way to the grounds stand two historical markers, testifying to the glory of past years and the dedication of the entire community to its institutions of learning.

Undaunted by two major fires, two World Wars and the Great Depression, Scranton people were finally forced to yield to a shrinking population and ever more stringent regulations posed by the state governing boards. But the school spirit and the dedication to the Green and Gold live on in the minds and hearts of Scranton ex-students.

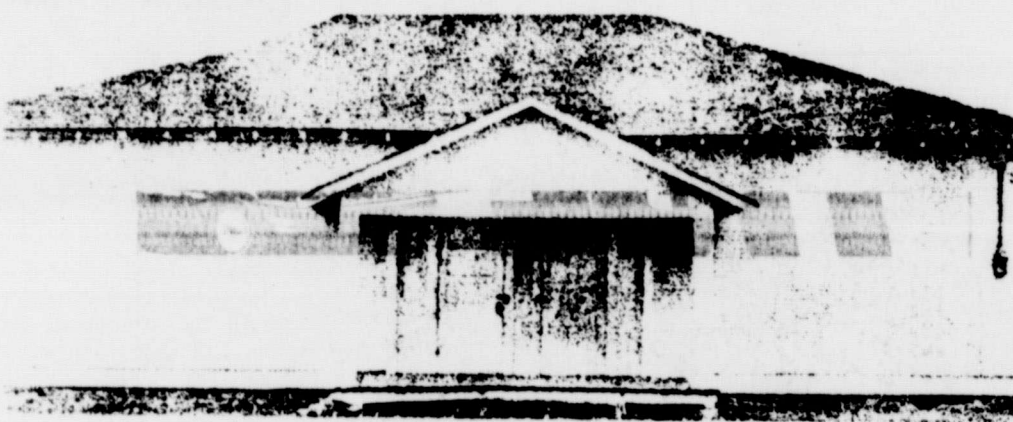

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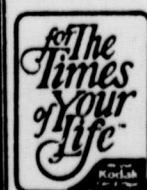

The Texas Chapters of The Society of CPCU say you can lessen the chances of a burglary by creating the impression that somebody is home while you are on vacation.

Here are some tips that may help you to prevent a burglary:

—Leave blinds open in their usual position.

—Lower the sound of your telephone bell so its ring cannot be heard outside.

—Suspend deliveries of mail and newspapers.

—Arrange to have your lawn mowed and ask a friend to pick up "throwaway" newspapers and circulars.

—Use automatic timers to turn lights on and off in your living room and bedrooms at appropriate times. Consider connecting a radio to a timer.

—Notify the police that you will be away and ask dependable neighbors to keep an eye on your house or apartment.

—Equip doors with dead-bolt or double cylinder locks, put a slide bolt or other lock on sliding glass doors and be sure locks on windows are adequate. Also, install a burglar alarm. Many insurance companies offer discount for approved burglar and fire alarm systems.

—Remove extra keys from around the mailbox, doormat or flower pots. Change your lock if your keys are lost or stolen.

—Put large amounts of cash, jewelry and other valuables in a safe deposit box at the bank.

—Don't advertise your vacation in the newspaper. Burglars could be among the readers.

Before leaving on vacation, The Society of CPCU says it pays to make an inventory of your personal belongings and to make sure your insurance coverage is adequate.

If you return home and find signs of burglary, it is best to go to a neighbor's

residence to call the police and wait for their arrival.

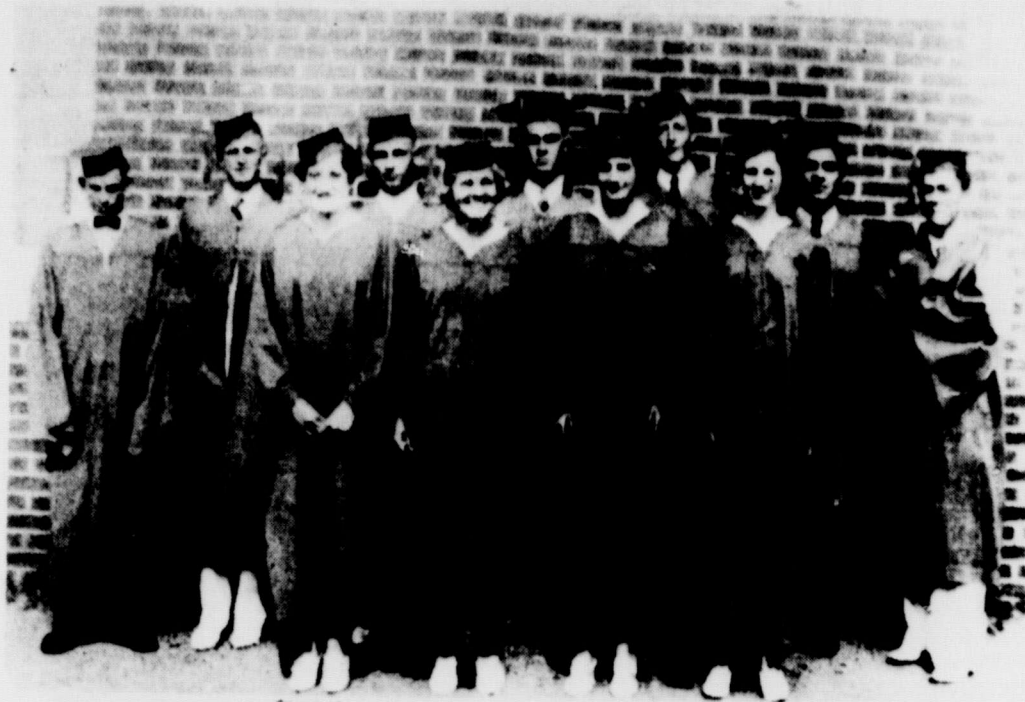
WTU Applies To City Council For Rate Increase

Application of West Texas Utilities Company for an electricity rate increase of 23.9 per cent was delayed for 90 days by the City Council in action at their regular semi-monthly meeting last Tuesday night.

The utility company asked that the new rate become effective June 23, 1987, citing the recent completion of a new power generating station as reason that additional revenues are needed.

The Council approved a resolution suspending the operation of the proposed new rate schedule filed by West Texas Utilities for a period of 90 days beyond the date on which such schedules would otherwise go into effect.

City Manager Mike Moore told the Council that the city will join the City of Abilene and other cities served by the company in a study of the rate increase request. The Public Utilities Commission of Texas also has the rate request under consideration and, hopefully, will rule on it before the end of the 90-day delay period, Mr. Moore said.

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Gordon Spot

The rainfall since May 14 has been almost unbelievable - about twelve inches in one half month. This is almost one half our average annual rainfall. Too bad we can't save some of this for July and August.

We had a similar situation last year, except the heavy rain came mostly in June. We had over eight inches in June. If we get eight inches this June we may all be under water.

The rain last week prevented pecan growers from spraying trees to control the pecan nut casebearer. If you did not get to spray, plan to do so as soon as the weather will permit. Even though you may lose a few pecans to the early worms you will be able to protect the majority of the crop. Some have called to ask if the rain will wash insecticides off the trees. Normally, if the insecticides have been on the trees for four to six hours and have dried they will not be washed off by rainfall. However, repeated rain, such as we had last week, may reduce the effectiveness of the spray.

There has been some confusion over the liquid zinc, NZN, for pecan trees. The N is the symbol for nitrogen and the Zn stand for Zinc. Some of the chemical manufacturers have added other elements such as phosphorus (P) and Sulfur (S). Therefore, you may find some liquid zinc sources with some or all of these letters such as NPZS or NZNS. These products are at least equal to NZN. Be sure to follow directions on the amount to mix with a given volume of water.

Now is a good time to control mesquite. Bountiful rainfall last fall and winter and again this month makes conditions excellent for foliar application of herbicides.

Present soil moisture conditions has resulted in good canopy development on mesquite. Data collected by the

Texas Agricultural Experiment Station several years ago indicate that higher plant kills occur when rainfall exceeds the average six months before spraying. Mesquite plants have a large quantity of leaves, and excellent control can be expected if factors other than soil moisture also are favorable.

Herbicide application requires proper timing if good control is expected. Leaves of the mesquite should be fully extended and should have turned from light to dark green before the herbicide is applied. This usually happens about 40 days following bud break. Bud break on mesquite was about April 20, here in Eastland County.

There is a new foliar mesquite control herbicide on the market this year that will give a 60% to 70% root kill of mesquite. For more information on mesquite control contact the County Extension Office.

If you did not plant a vegetable garden or if yours got washed out you still have hope. Fresh, home grown vegetables will soon be available at the Cisco Farmers Market. The market will open at 9 a.m. Saturday, June 13, at the corner of 13th Street, and Conrad Hilton Avenue in Cisco. It will also be open on Wednesday afternoon from 2:00 p.m. until sold out or dark, which ever comes first.

Maybe, because of all the rain, your garden produced more than you can eat, can or freeze. You can sell the excess at the farmers market. First, buy a membership fee for \$10 per year. That will also give you a free stall at the market the first time. After that you must pay \$3 per sale day if your garden is less than one half acre. If more than one half acre, you pay \$6 per sale day for the stall. These fees pay for market expenses and insurance. You will set your own prices.

Homemaking Hints

From Janet Thomas, County Agent

Rain and more rain can cause dampness problems in your home. I encourage you to beware of mildew. Mildew is a think, usually black, sometimes white, growth that appears on many different kinds of surfaces in the home. Mildew can appear on clothing, walls, books, draperies, rugs, etc.

As the mold grows, they can cause considerable damage. They often leave a musty odor, and can discolor fabrics or sometimes eat into them.

Prevention is easier than removing the problem. First, keep places where mildew is likely to grow clean. Clean clothing is less likely to mildew. Second, get rid of dampness. Air-conditioning and humidifiers can remove dampness. Leave closet doors open. Also, rooms that are shut off in a home should be opened up and let air circulate.

And finally, remember that air movements are very important in removing moisture. When the air outside is drier than inside, ventilation allows the dry air to enter, take up excess moisture, and then be carried outside. When natural breezes are not sufficient, you can use electric fans placed in a window.

Poorly ventilated closets get damp and musty during continued wet weather, and articles stored in them are apt to mildew.

In addition, hang the clothes loosely so that air can circulate around them.

Cooking, laundering and bathing can add 2 gallons of water a day to the house, unless circulation is adequate. It is often necessary to use some type of exhaust fan.

Certain chemicals can give off vapors which inhibit mold growth in clothes closets. One such product is ordinary moth balls.

To remove mildew from clothing use the following methods:

1.) Wash mildew-stained articles at once and dry in the sun. If any stain remains, use lemon juice and salt or another bleach.

2.) If you use peroxygen bleach, mix 1 to 2 tablespoons to 1 pint of water.

3.) For a chlorine bleach, mix 2 tablespoons of liquid chlorine bleach to 1 quart of water.

On Upholstery, rugs, and mattresses, you should first vacuum, sun and air articles if possible. You may sponge the area with a cloth moistened with 1 cup denatured or rubbing alcohol to 1 cup water. Dry thoroughly. (You can use this same remedy on leather goods).

READY-TO-DRINK ICED TEA

3 quarts medium strength

tea (steep 2 family-size tea bags in 3 qts of water)
 1/2 cup sugar
 1 12 oz. can frozen lemonade concentrate
 1 quart gingerale

Combine tea, sugar and concentrate. Just before serving, stir in ginger ale and pour over crushed ice in glasses. Yield 10 servings.

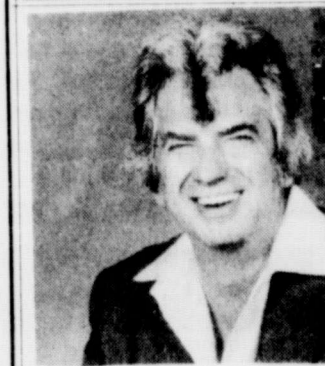
Market Situation", "Chemical Up-Date", "Chemigation-Injection Systems", and field demonstrations of pecan equipment.

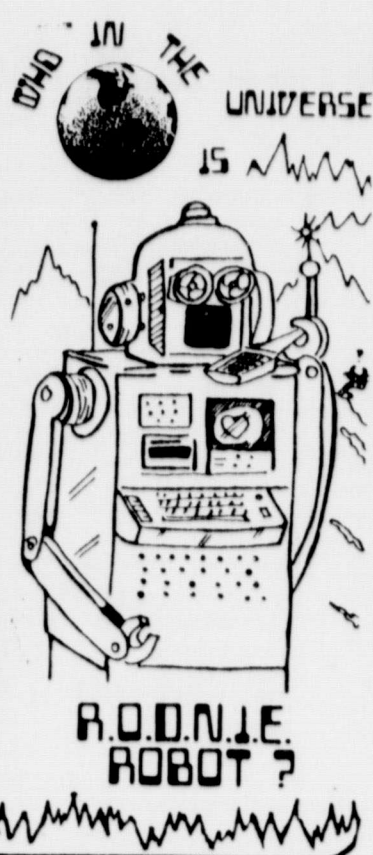

County Commissioners Discuss Jail; Set Date For Budget Hearing

Eastland County Commissioners met Tuesday morning in the Courtroom to consider a number of agenda items. County Judge Scott Bailey presided.

County Treasurer Ruth Puglese Hart brought a request for the purchase of a terminal and printer for her office. Mrs. Hart said this item was in the 1987 budget, and the software was already in the office. The Commissioners approved this purchase which is expected to total around \$3,000. Mrs. Hart also asked for consideration on the refurbishing of her office, which has not had any of the recent painting or remodeling going on in the Courthouse.

The Commissioners noted that Sheriff Don Underwood had placed a request on the agenda for pay for keeping prisoners in other counties.

Comm. Billy Bacon reported that five Eastland County prisoners were still in the Stephens County jail, and only 16 were presently in the Eastland County Jail. He wondered why the five couldn't be brought back.

"It must be a classification problem," Commissioner Richard Robinson replied. "That's the only explanation I know."

Judge Bailey reminded the Commissioners of a \$1,000 appropriation some time back to take care of Eastland county prisoners, kept out of the county.

The Commissioners discussed their trip to Austin the next day (May 27) to meet with the Texas Jail Standards Commission and report on efforts to bring the county jail into compliance with Commission standards. Judge Bailey and three of the four Commissioners will attend - Robinson, Christian and Bacon.

Billy Bacon told of work on the building, and how all the new plumbing was in and working up to standard. He

said that the reason the old jail leaked on May 15 was that a drain stopped up and water ran over it.

He expressed concern because the candlepower on the present jail lights had not been brought up to requirements. He said that the Abilene architect hired by the Commissioners was supposed to be taking care of that.

Judge Bailey informed the Court that he was drafting a proposal concerning a strip of land just north of the jail, in case the county has to expand the present facility. The owner would be asked to consider selling the property at fair market value, or to let the county take a 1 yr. option on the property.

In other business, the Commissioners set June 22 as a date for a Budget Hearing. They also mentioned the Auction in Cisco of surplus county equipment. This will be held at the Pet. 4 barn on Saturday, May 30, beginning at 10 a.m. Some antique lights from the courthouse will be among the various items offered.

Several bills related to the Garcia trial were included in the current bills for approval. The trial was underway in the 91st District Court on the Third Floor while the Commissioners were meeting.

County Clerk JoAnn Johnson said that James Jay of Gorman had filed an application for a petition to legalize the sale of alcoholic beverages in a certain area on the Interstate near Ranger.

A citizen had requested forms for a Bingo election at Cisco. These had been ordered. Mrs. Johnson said.

The meeting concluded with more thoughts on the trip to Austin. A report on this will be forthcoming.

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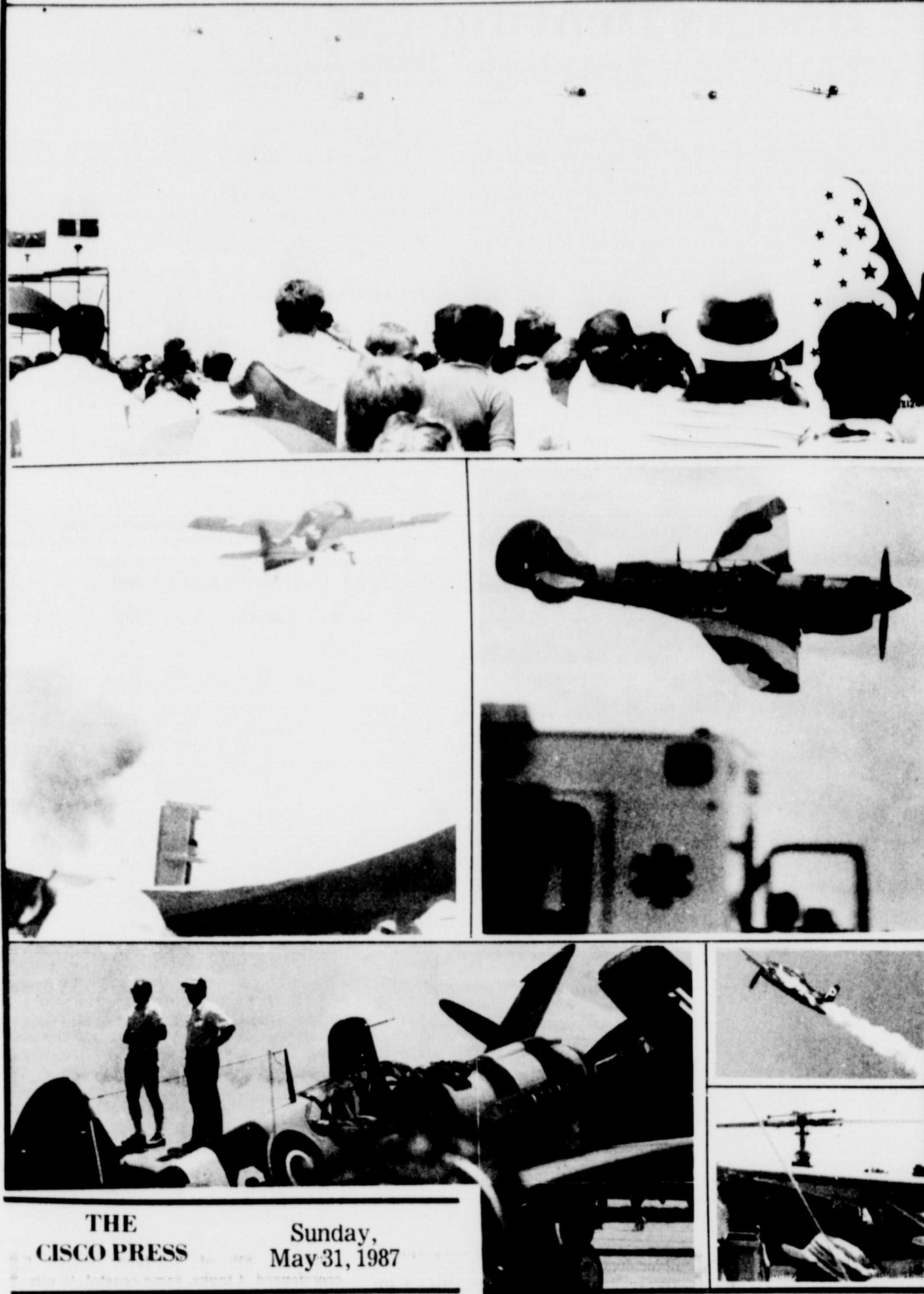

Probable Tornado Hits North Of Eastland

Wild Weather hit Eastland County again this week with more rain, high winds and a possible tornado Wednesday night.

A possible tornado was spotted in the Morton Valley area by Police Chief Lyndell Underwood from his home in south Eastland, near Park Hill.

Bill Gregg, who lives in the Morton Valley area, confirmed that high winds and what he thought was a twister hit his home about 9:30 p.m., causing tree tops to be twisted and breaking small limbs. His family was in the house, but as they watched, a cellar door in the yard blew open, and he reported fairly heavy

quarter-sized hail for a short time which further stripped foliage. Extensive damage was done at the Carroll Electric Co. headquarters on the hill north of Eastland, along Highway 69.

Through 7 a.m. Thursday, Weather Observer Ron Bailey reported 1.09 inches of additional rain, bringing the total at his gauge to 11.05 inches for the past some 13 days.

Volunteer Firemen and Weather Watchers were out as this storm moved through this area. Eastland County

for the most part was listed as being on the edge of tornado-watch warnings for most of the evening hours, with the heaviest activities being reported in Hamilton, to the southeast, and at Aspermont, to the northwest. At one time the entire area was under alerts for severe thunderstorms most of the evening, and south Stephens County was singled out once for severe activity.

Ron Carrol, of Carrol Electric reported severe damage to a mobile home, a sign and a generator along with damage to a storage building at his company yard on Hwy. 69 north of Eastland.

A mobile home that was the former location of the office for Carrol Electric was rolled about 40 feet away from its original location. The home was stopped by a generator and a tree. Both the home and the generator were a total loss.

A sign at the entrance to the yard was blown apart by the high winds and pieces could be found scattered throughout the yard. A storage building located near the gas pump lost the front door and the side walls were buckled.

Mr. Carrol stated that he believed the damage to run between \$20,000 and \$25,000.



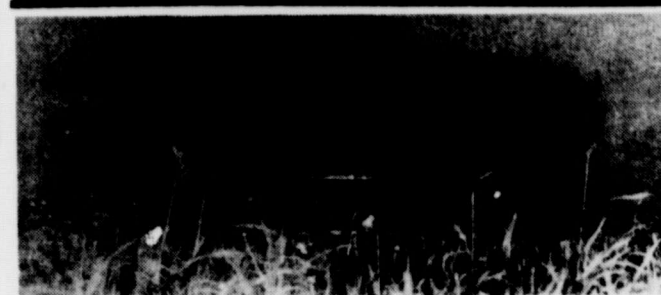

Water Board Seeking Quick Repair

An engineering firm has been ordered to prepare specifications and data on the repair of slippage on the dam at Lake Leon, and present them as soon as possible to the Eastland County Water Supply District Board of Directors.

The Board wants the information as soon as possible so that bids may be sought and contracts signed quickly so that as soon as weather permits, work can begin immediately on making necessary repairs.

There isn't believed to be any serious internal problems, but early heavy rains caused a great deal of slippage of the surfaces of the dam, and the Board wants to have work done quickly to repair the rip-rap to maintain the structure and prevent further slippage.

The Board has also recently heard very preliminary reports from the engineering firm regarding the renovation of Lake Olden (the old Power Plant system) for possible use as an additional first-catch storage area for water in the system.

Also the firm presented early estimates on enlarging the present plant so that it would be able to treat and

deliver more water. Among the considerations are additional storage tanks, and other improvements which would expand the system's capabilities to deliver water in the future.

Recent work in Ranger where lines were looped has improved the system considerably, officials report.

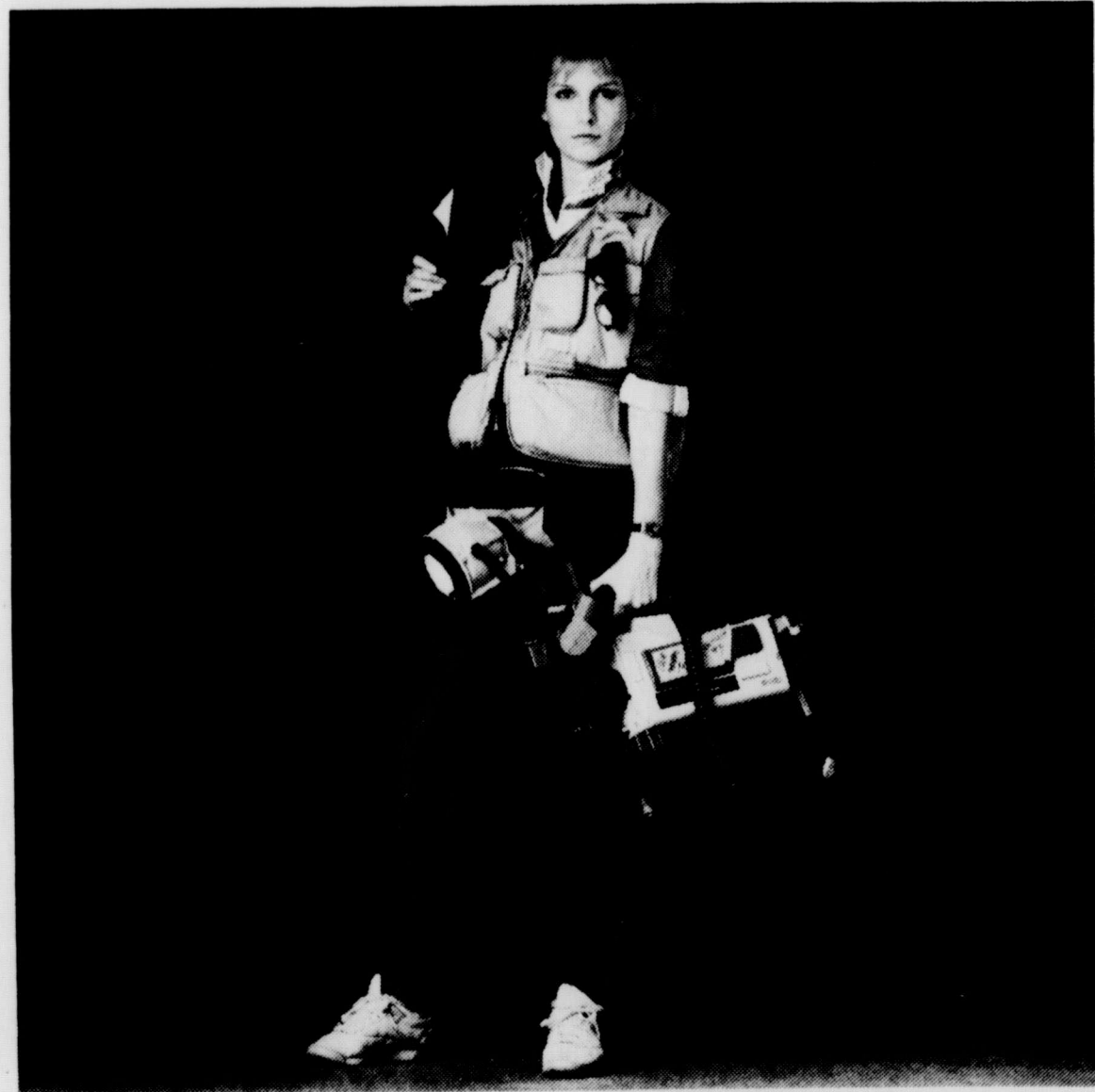
Extensive long-range expansions probably would require revenue bonds to underwrite the costs, and

these would be retired through increased basic rates paid by the participating cities of Eastland and Ranger and water-using customers. Such revenue

bonds would require approval by voters in both cities. Presently citizens pay no taxes on the system since original indebtedness has been retired.

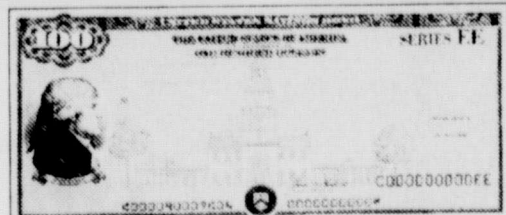

In fact, I decided that next time I would let someone else have that honor and pleasure.

I realize that is not a charitable attitude but I have been wrong before and since I make no claim of saintliness I will confess that when his fortunes again declined, he was again sick, broke and unemployed. I was in Abilene but neglected

QUESTION: Mr. Cartee, my brother is receiving \$23 per month too much to be eligible for medicaid. Is there anything anyone can help?

ANSWER: For the year 1986, there were 967,000 aged and disabled people who were financially eligible for medicaid (you must have resources at or below \$1800 with monthly income at or below \$687). 152,000 aged and disabled people are financially eligible and have need for nursing home care, while 54,145 aged and disabled people are being served. The current Texas State budget allows 35.5% of the person eligible and needing nursing home care to be served and 25.3% of those eligible and needing assistance living in the community to be served. It is apparent the present session of the Texas Legislature does not pretend to resolve the challenging question. If I had a friend of relative in need of medicaid assistance I would be very persistent and get the job accomplished. Contact your human resources office and/or legislature.

QUESTION: Mr. Cartee does it appear the Medicare Insurance trust fund is about to "run out"?

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County Jail Work Meets Commission Approval

Members of the State Jail Standards Commission indicated in Austin Wednesday that they were pleased with the efforts of Eastland county officials to bring the jail up to state standards.

Attending the May 21 meeting were County Judge Scott Bailey, County Commissioners Robinson, Christian and Bacon, and Sheriff Don Underwood.

Robert Viterna, executive director of the Jail Standards Commission, viewed material presented by Judge Bailey and James Wheeler, an Abilene architect hired by the County Commissioners. Wheeler spoke on behalf of plans made for jail improvement.

A letter from the Jail Standards Commission in April repeated earlier reports that the county jail had inadequate lighting, a faulty

drain, and needed work done in the Inter-Com system.

The jail was brought into compliance on the number of inmates and proper segregation as to offenses early this year.

Along with information submitted to the Jail Standards Commission were plans for the possible expansion of the present jail building.

"We are pleased that the Commission has looked favorably on our efforts here," stated Judge Bailey, upon his return to Eastland. "We will continue to work for compliance of the facility."

R.R.C. Approves Line Near Rising Star

Texas Railroad Commission Chairman Mack Wallace has announced that fifteen permits to operate new pipelines in Texas were granted by the RRC in April. In March the commission approved eight permits.

Among the permits approved was one from Muddy Creek Energy Corp., Rising Star, for a gas gathering line.

Eleven of the new permits were for gathering pipelines, one was for a trunk transmission line, and two were for distribution and other lines.

Johnie Jeffcoat, health chairperson showed a film entitled "The Eyes Have It" which is designed to answer questions about your eyes and how to care for them. The film detailed the four most common vision threatening conditions to the older people, such as:

Cataracts—Hazy, fuzzy vision, needing frequent changes of prescription lenses, a film over the eyes that doesn't disappear when you blink, and changes in the normally black pupil.

Macular Degeneration—"Dry"—Tiny yellow deposits form beneath the macula


resulting in blurred or distorted vision when reading. "Wet"—abnormal growth of blood vessels under the macula that may leak blood or fluid. Distorts vision so straight lines look wavy or it produces blank spots in one's vision.

Glaucoma—Build up of fluid pressure, which damages the optic nerve, causing trouble in reading or seeing outside the line of vision.

Diabetic Retinopathy—Affecting the retina. If damages vision is badly impaired.

With proper care and with regular visits to an optometrist or ophthalmologist these symptoms can be corrected and treated so that our vision sustains us as we grow older.
