Andrews Receives 33 Years

Andrews Found Guilty--Starr And Hinton Found Not Guilty

The Jury in the Organized Crime Trial brought in a Verdict of GUILTY on Brenda Gail Andrews, NOT GUILTY on Pat Starr and NOT GUILTY on Richard Hinton at 12:05 p.m. Friday.

stayed through two weeks of the current trial sessions, and many previous hearings related to the abduction-rape-murder of her daughter.

After 6 hours and twenty minutes of deliberation Thursday night, the jury foreman sent down a note to Judge Fitts that stated "we have reached a verdict on one but are not even close on the other two." After

deliberations long enough. He then informed them that it would be necessary for them to be sequestered for the night.

Before the verdicts were read Judge Herman Fitts admonished that "I don't want any outbursts or show of emotion" as the decisions were read.

Thelma Sellers, the mother of the defendant Pat Starr, sat tensely until she learned that Starr was free. She remained silent.

After the verdict Brenda Andrews sobbed at the table she had shared with her Attorney, George Gray.

At this time the jury was removed and transported by law enforcement officials to the Friendship Inn where they remained until about 8:30 a.m. Friday morning.

The courtroom was almost empty of spectators when the Jury came in to announce the verdict in the lengthy and sometimes bitter trial. The Jury had been out since 6:50 p.m. on Thursday, and all Friday morning there had been no outward sign of any change in their deliberations.

After about two hours of deliberations the jury set the sentence of Brenda Gail Perry Andrews at 33 year in the Texas Department of Corrections.

reading this Judge Fitts had the jury brought back to the courtroom.

This climaxed a long two weeks which featured evidence, defense, and charges and countercharges by attorneys in the Debra Garcia case.

Montie Booth, mother of the Crime victim Debra Garcia, happened to be out of the courtroom when the verdict was read. She had

After dismissing the jury, Judge Fitts set the sentence according to the jury's charge. Ms. Andrews was taken into custody by the Eastland County Sheriff's Department who will transport her to the T.D.C.

When the jury was seated, Judge Fitts asked the foreman how close the ratio was in the other two. The foreman stated that one was 6 to 6 and the other was 7 to 5. The jury was then asked how many believed that they could not reach a verdict on the other two ever. Nine out of the twelve raised their hands.

Before Thursday's Court session, which was supposed to begin at 1 p.m., Defense Attorneys Keith Woodley, Saul Pullman and George Gray had a number of motions.

be given the same chance as younger persons to take any job for which they are qualified.

Right now, we have seventeen programs that cover just about every area of older America's day to day concern: Consumer Affairs; Crime Prevention; 55/Alive, our safe driving program; Health Advocacy; and Intergenerational programs that build bridges of Understanding between the young and older, Legal Aid and maintain these programs. Each year, some 775,000 Americans age 55 and over, lose a spouse, and, as some of you know, that

loss can be emotionally devastating. AARP should have volunteers who help these persons rebuild their lives, to reach out to these people in deep grief and walk them through the toughest times.

The reminiscence volunteer works on community reminiscence programs to provide fellowship More.

In 1985 some 25,000 Tax-Aide volunteers at 8,000 locations helped more than 1.2 million older Americans decipher the rules and prepare their returns. Last year President Reagan recognized the outstanding work of Tax-Aide volunteers by presenting the Tax-Aide Award for Private Sector Initiatives.

The health advocacy coordinator works on consumer health education projects. The criminal justice services works with local law enforcement agencies to help them understand and more effectively deal with older persons. This program's primary goal is to

help older people better protect themselves against being victimized.

Citizens representatives direct the program which recruits qualified older persons to serve as citizens representatives on regulator boards and commissions for both business and government.

The widowed persons services promotes and develops local persons service programs and works with locals WPS volunteers to implement for isolated elderly persons who are home bound or confined to nursing homes or retirement facilities. A lot of this work is done by the local ombudsman but that person needs volunteers to help carry on this work.

The next group of AARP volunteers are the state legislative committee members. These are the people who carry our messages to their state legislators so their work benefits each and every one of us. They know the issues that are of concern to people over 50 and they speak with authority for AARP on state legislative and regulatory matters in their states. They are well respected and well known in the corridors of their state legislatures. These volunteers have been very successful in helping pass legislation that benefits older persons - not just AARP members - but every person over 50.

I think that individual effort still makes a difference - a big difference - and you AARP members can prove this every day of the year. After all, it is only in the giving of ourselves to others that we truly live, and that,

for lack of evidence. Woodley stated that "there was no evidence the crime had been committed in Eastland County."

Defense Attorneys also objected to some of the 12 requested instructions in the charge to the jury to be given by Judge Herman Fitts. George Gray, Attorney for Brenda Andrews, also brought up the subject of double jeopardy of his client.

There was objection to testimony of some of the witnesses, and objection to the jury verdict forms prepared by Special Prosecutor Bill Hart.

The Jury was seated at 2:21 p.m., and the Judge surprised no one when he said "You'll be here later than 5 p.m."

Squeaking ceiling fans and noisy window coolers made it difficult to hear in the courtroom, which was packed with 150 people. Spectators strained to hear the Judge read the charge of Organized Criminal Activity against the defendants. He named all individuals alleged to have participated in the 1981 murder, abduction and rape of Garcia, a convenience-store clerk in Cisco.

The above is the text of a speech given by Sybil Offield to the Cisco Chapter No. 2447 of the AARP on May 21, 1987.

Besides the current defendants, persons alleged to have participated in these activities are Joe Thomas Perry and Barbara Williams, who will be tried later. Those previously convicted are Charles Le Flore and his brother, Thomas Le Flore, who are serving long prison sentences.

After the Judge's Charge to the Jury Special Prosecutor Bill Hart reviewed the state's case against the defendants.

"My job and my oath is to see that justice is done, not only to these three defendants, but to the people of this state and Debra Jo Garcia," he said.

"You have a burden," Hart told the Jury. "From the evidence that has been submitted from this (witness) chair you can return the verdict of guilty beyond a reasonable doubt and go home and sleep tonight."

In their final arguments Defense Attorneys questioned the quality of Hart's witnesses, telling of their jail records. Saul Pullman, lawyer for Richard Hinton, said that Hart had not called up one law enforcement officer until rebuttal, then he called Texas Ranger Gene Kea. Former Sheriff Johnnie Morren and his Deputy Bill Pence both gave statements for the Defense, he said.

Attorney George Gray, speaking for Brenda Andrews, asked the Jury not to "take it out on her if I have done anything or said anything to irritate you or make you mad."

"You may not agree with Brenda's lifestyle," he added, "but that should not influence your verdict. She's not had an easy life - hasn't been given much in this world."

Keith Woodley, representing Pat Starr, told the Jury: "As much happened while you weren't here (in the courtroom) as while you were here."

"I hope you find the Defense witnesses for Pat Starr more credible than the witnesses Bill Hart has called. It's fortunate that Pat Starr's mother had assisted law enforcement officers in the past, so Johnnie Morren went immediately to her home."

"Bill Hart did not want one law enforcement officer to testify," he said. "He didn't want the Sheriff (then-Sheriff Morren). He hires an experienced man to investigate, David Cunningham, and Mr. Hart discharges him."

He went on to say that there was no evidence Debra Garcia was abused while alive, or her body abused. He called this "An attempt to inflame." He gave his own opinion of the actual facts surrounding the murder, naming as participants Charles Le Flore, Joe Perry, and an individual who has not yet been arraigned.

In his final statement, Bill Hart went over evidence which included a statement alleged to have been made by Pat Starr, and a letter Brenda Andrews wrote to her Uncle Richard Hinton.

Speaking of the law enforcement officers, Hart said: "I don't know why they chose only two to prosecute in this case. (Meaning the Le Flores). The county had to hire me to come in and do the work that the others would not do. If I'm on trial for that - I'm glad."

He reviewed evidence of the abuse of Garcia, then said: "Yes, the defendants have rights. So did Debra Garcia. You can tell the

community whether or not you will tolerate what has gone on. You can state that we're going to have law enforcement, and you can start it today."

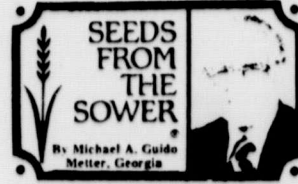

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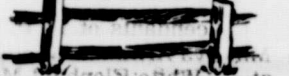

EASTLAND

We will be devoting more time also to the 'Texas Health Debate' which encompasses an 18 month study of the health conditions in Texas. The columns from this time on will be much broader. QUESTION: Mr. Cartee, I am 60 years old, and a widow. I am thinking about applying for social security when I am 62. If I apply against my late husband's social security will my benefits increase when I am 65?

ANSWER: No. If you apply for any social security

benefits between the ages of 60-65 the benefits will be reduced. However, if you can wait until you are 65 you collect the same your husband had been receiving. If a person who is eligible for benefits based on their own work record and becomes widowed between ages 62 and 65 they might find it advantageous to take the lower of two benefits (her own or her husband's) thus preserving the higher benefit which she can apply for at age 65. Remember: this is true whether for man or woman.

QUESTION: Mr. Cartee, is it true women outlive men because they are genetically superior?

ANSWER: Biology does play a minor role, but let us add together all the factors and you will find men are catching up. It is amazing to find that fewer women have found it pays to exercise, reduce stress, eat balanced meals and stop smoking.

Volunteers Are Needed For Community Soil Conservation

Would you like to help conserve the soil and water resources of your community?

Volunteers for conservation work not only will be doing good for their communities, they also will be getting something for themselves out of the effort.

Ron Bailey, district conservationist for the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Soil Conservation Service, said that young people and others without a lot of work experience often find that their volunteer work with SCS helps in their future careers.

"Both government and private employers consider volunteer work to be qualifying experience for comparable positions," said Bailey.

He said volunteers often make highly visible contributions to the landscape in their communities and they always learn more about the places where they live. When volunteers assist teachers in working with pupils on outdoor classroom conservation projects, for example, they help give youngsters a head start in learning about resource conservation that will be needed in future years.

Those who want to volunteer work with SCS or a cooperating group should call their nearest SCS field office. The office is listed in the telephone directory under U.S. Government, Department of Agriculture.

Applicants should tell the SCS district conservationist or other staff what work they already are prepared to do, or what type of work they would like to do.

Or they can call a special toll-free number, 1-800-THE-SOIL, to receive information from the Soil Conservation Society of America and be referred to the SCS or other office that may need their skills.

SCS offices will ask prospective volunteers to fill out application forms. Applicants are notified as soon as they are matched with and accepted for tasks and duties in the offices where they want to work, Bailey said.

Eligibility for participation in all programs administered by the Soil Conservation Service is established under law without regard to race, color, religion, handicap, age, sex, or national origin.

Fishing Outdoors

The members of the Eastland County Bass Club would like to thank everyone who stopped by their booth at Wal-Mart in Eastland this week. Hopefully some of your questions on tackle, methods, and other issues were answered. Also these gentlemen are grateful for everyone's support of the fund raising project for 1987's Junior Division in their September 13 Open Invitational. With your support each child fishing will be awarded some type of prize, even if they are unable to boat a 14" bass.

I personally would like to salute these gentlemen for their continued efforts to educate our youth in the enjoyment and preservation of the great outdoors. The future of our natural resources rest in the hands of future generations and it is each one of "OUR" responsibilities for proper education.

June 13th the Eastland County Bass Club will be holding its monthly club tournament. This tournament is open only to club members. But new memberships will be available at tournament headquarters. The lake will be chosen Thursday, June 4th and announced in our next article. All members are urged to attend this tournament. The race for angler of the year and the top 6 competition is still wide open.

How many times has it happened? You go to that special lake or pond, catch some good eating size fish. Carry them home and dress and store them. Later on, ready to enjoy the fruits of your labor and the first bite

turns your stomach. Most times our first thought is boy the fish from this body of water taste terrible.

Maybe not, it could be due to improper care of your catch. The folks at Mercury Marine offer these helpful hints.

Often, the real problem that causes a "strong" fishy taste comes from improper handling, according to the fishing experts at Mariner Outboards.

Hanging fish on a stringer during the heat of summer leads to spoiled meat. As they slowly die in the sun-baked surface water, fish deteriorate. The condition is aggravated if fish are transported on the deck of a boat while running across the lake.

If a catch undergoes this treatment, little can be done

to prevent the fish from tasting "fishy".

Live wells offer a solution only if adequate aeration is provided to keep the fish alive.

During the extremely hot summer months, it's next to impossible to keep more than a few fish alive even in a livewell.

The best solution is to release all but a few for dinner. Those eating size fish should be knocked out when a sharp blow to the top of the head and placed on ice. The fish should be kept on ice until they're ready to be cleaned. If photos are to be taken, do it as quickly as possible.

Fillet fish on a clean surface with a clean knife. When filleting, always cut away the lateral line, that strip of dark meat down the middle of each fillet.

I've Been Wrong Before

The proposed law permitting citizens to carry concealed weapons has a lot of vocal opposition. Therefore I don't expect to make a lot of people happy with this column.

An Abilene Editor opposed it by dumping on us the Teddy Kennedy gun grabbers propaganda about domestic violence and questioned the provision about mental competence. As guns in the home are already permitted and restrictions on sales to mental cases is likewise restricted his arguments scarcely apply. Only in so far as the new law would encourage more people to buy guns and thus increase those readily available in the home might domestic violence increase. Then again, violent people will still be violent and I would discount some of the increase which might be attributed to a gun being no more than an alternative to the knife. In a simple substitution of gun, gludgeon or strangulation I see no protection in tighter gun laws.

Many lawmen will honestly admit that the chances of their responding to a call quickly enough to prevent mischief are slim indeed. Yet, the present law can result in severe penalties for one having a gun in public. Let me reinforce that statement by pointing out that ANY penalty assessed because one does to provide protection the authorities are incapable of providing is too darned severe and one experience with a hard nosed judge unwilling to consider anything but the letter of the law would convince most people.

I once inherited a very small .38. It would well classify as a "Saturday Night Special" but I gave it away to a policeman who wanted it for an off-duty gun. I couldn't hit the broad side of a barn with it probably, but at close range it might at least scare someone to death.

The military has a regulation against service men having a personal weapons but many who serve in Korea and VietNam credit possession of their own hand gun with being the reason they are alive today. You will never know how many more might have lived if they too had disregarded regulations. Nor will there be a way of knowing how many civilians die without personal protection.

Bloody killings like Texas Tower and the McDonalds massacre were not done with hand guns.

If you want maximum security, then don't look for it in a maximum security prison even because there are entirely too high percentages of murders recorded even there. Your best bet is

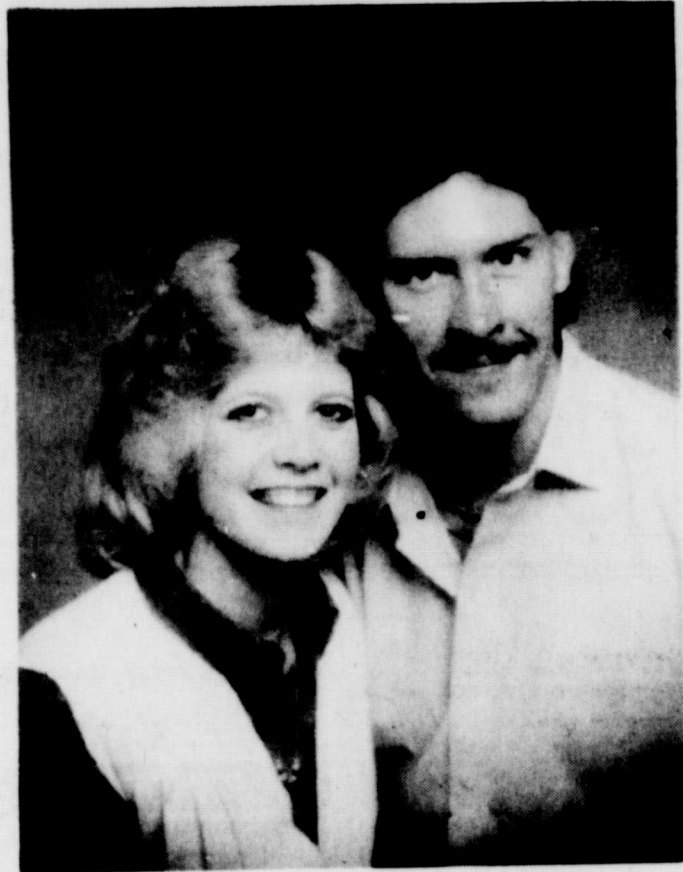
probably to go to live in a loony bin. The funny farm has a better safety record than most city streets.

Given the high cost, inconvenience, restrictions on where one can be carried and the high cost of replacement in case of theft, I doubt that everyone would rush out to buy a gun. In short, I doubt that we would all be headed for a shoot out at the OK Corral like some calamity

howlers seem to think the proposed law would precipitate.

It seems as sure as the laws of physics and chemistry that state "For every action there is an equal and opposite reaction" that for each protection or benefit government provides there is a price paid (often unequally) in cash and/or freedom surrendered by the general population.

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Gordon Spot

All the rain during the last three to four weeks has caused the coastal bermudagrass to grow very rapidly. It is going to be hard to cut and bale the hay at the best time because of wet fields. By delaying the cutting considerable feed value could be lost.

Research has show that delaying harvest results in both protein and digestibility losses in the hay.

Coastal bermudagrass has been shown to lose 25 percent of its crude protein by delaying cutting from the fourth week to the sixth week of growth. A further delay to

the eighth week reduces crude protein an additional 8 percent.

While producers can increase their total volume or number of bales of hay by delaying harvest until the sixth week of growth, hay quality will suffer.

With bermudagrasses, there is little value in delaying harvest past six weeks of growth because dry matter yields do not increase after six weeks. Considering the loss of protein and digestibility, a maximum amount of quality hay can be produced by harvesting every four to five weeks.

While many factors affect maximum yield of digestible nutrients per acre, the most important factor is the stage of plant maturity at harvest. All forage plants, grasses and legumes, become lower in protein, digestibility and acceptability to livestock as they progress from the vegetative state to the reproductive state of

growth.

Cutting and baling hay while grass is in the vegetative stage preserves the hay's feed value while harvest delays result in feed value losses.

Texas Sorghum producers will elect five directors to the Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board (TGSPB) this summer. The board was organized in 1969 to conduct research and develop new markets for grain sorghum.

This summer's election is the beginning of a statewide districting plan developed earlier this year. The plan created by TGSPB for better representation in sorghum producing regions-will divide Texas into five regional districts by 1989. There will be three directors from each district on the board.

In 1985, Texas producers turned out to vote on a referendum that would make the assessment program statewide instead of the 29 counties participating at that time. At the same time, TGSPB held at-large elections to replace four directors whose terms had

expired and fill three additional positions created by the board, bringing the total number of directors on the board to fifteen.

This year, with five positions open, voters will elect three directors in the Panhandle-West Texas region and two in East Texas, creating three districts in Texas--the Panhandle--West Texas, East Texas and South Texas--Upper Coast. The South Texas-Upper Coast district will not participate in the election this summer.

By 1989, the fifteen TGSPB directors will represent five districts--the Panhandle, West Texas, East Texas, the Upper Coast and South Texas. Each district will be represented by three directors and, in future elections, we will elect one director from each region every two years. Directors serve six year terms.

Anyone involved in grain sorghum production within the regions represented by TGSPB and subject to the

grain sorghum assessment (including farm owners, tenants and sharecroppers), may be nominated for a TGSPB position and/or vote in this year's elections.

Nominations must be filed with the Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board, P.O. Box 530, Abilene, Texas 79311, no later than July 15, 1987. Forms must be signed by the nominee and ten eligible voters and must include their current mailing addresses. Nomination forms, although not required, are available from the TGSPB office at the address shown above.

TGSPB will provide ballots to eligible voters prior to the election. These ballots must be postmarked before midnight August 15, 1987. Persons qualified to vote who do not receive a ballot 15 days prior to the election may obtain one at their local County Agricultural Extension Office or grain elevator.

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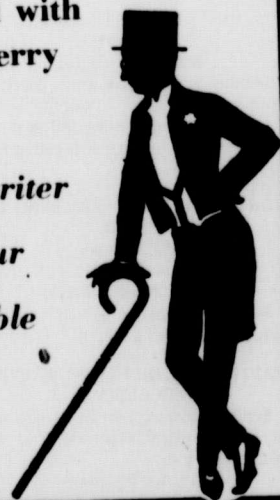

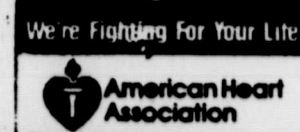
