

Social Security Number

A worker's Social Security number is the key to his or her lifetime earnings record, and the worker keeps the same number throughout his or her working lifetime, Glyn Hammons, Social Security Manager in Abilene, said recently.

Anyone who finds that his or her Social Security number has been listed incorrectly, as, for example, on a W-2 form, should report this immediately to the employer, Hammons said. The Social Security office should also be notified so that the worker's Social Security records can be cor-

All workers, especially those who change jobs fairly often, would do well to check their Social Security earnings record periodically, every 3 or so years. A free form for this purpose can be obtained from any Social Security office.

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Camp Sweeney For Diabetic Children

The 38th year of Camp Sweeney for Diabetic Children opened Sunday, June 7, with a blast - of hot air. A huge hot air balloon greeted the campers as they arrived for the first threeweek session, and the campers, ages six through 18, were given a ride in the tethered balloon.

Transported from Dallas for the opening session, the balloon was an exciting beginning to an activitypacked three weeks, said Camp Director James V. Campbell, who has headed the camp every summer since its beginning in 1950.

During the camper's stay, they will be treated to exhibitions by skydivers, an airplane dropping packs of sugarless gun over the camp, a carnival, swimming, fishing, crafts, archery, riflery, horseback riding and numerous other activities. In between the fun, the campers learn how to take care of their diabetes, becoming self-sufficient and more self-assured. A camp doctor and his assistants conduct regular classes, emphasizing the importance of balancing the diabetic's diet, insulin and exercise.

Investigations Still Continuing At Possum Kingdom Dam

Structural investigations are continuing on the dam at Possum Kingdom Lake, owned and operated by Brazos River Authority. A general contractor, Central Plains Contracting Company of Shawnee Mission, Kansas, is on the site, and is working 24 hours a day. The lake level has been

drawn down 13 feet from the normal maximum operating level of 1,000 feet as a safety precaution while investigations leading to possible structural modifications are being made at the dam. The temporary maximum operating level of 987 feet was reached on April 24 and is expected to be in effect for at least six months and maybe as long as a year. Lowering of the lake level to 987 feet was ordered by the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission, which licenses the hydroelectric generating facilities at the project.

Two contractors are working around the clock to provide access to the interior of the dam between the massive concrete buttresses that support the spillway section of the dam. This access is necessary to allow they are completed.

drilling equipment to be brought in to the bays between the buttresses for the drilling of relief wells in the dam's foundation to relieve high water pressure which has been discovered under the dam. In addition, highly sensitive and sophisticated monitoring equipment is being installed to detect any movement of the dam or any changes in the water pressure occurring beneath the dam. Water pressures have already been reduced in areas available to access, and there has been no detectable movement in the structure since intense monitor-

ing began on March 9, 1987. The lower lake level has required modifications at several of the Brazos River Authority's public access areas around the lake to keep facilities useable by the public. At present the auxiliary boat ramp on the north side of FM 2951 on the peninsula, the ramp at South D & D public access area and the Scenic Point ramp are available for use by the public. Additional temporary boat ramps will be installed by the Authority as



We Texans who have seen any number of Senate Bills and House Bills over the years dealing with public school financing may think we've "seen it all" as far as what can be mandated to provide public school educa-

A recent Texas Research League statement indicates that Texans are in for "a lot more" and "things we've never imagined before."

The League report: SCHOOL FINANCE SYSTEM DECLARED UN-CONSTITUTIONAL

On June 1st, district judge Harley Clark issued his final judgement in the case of Edgewood Independent School District, et al vs. William N. Kirby, et al (No. 362,516, 250th Judicial District) finding "that the Texas School Financing System...implemented in conjunction with local school district boundaries that contain unequal taxable property wealth for the financing of public education is impermissible, unlawful, violative of, and prohibited by the Constitution and the laws of


Texas. In the court's judgement the school finance system is "UNCONSTITUTIONAL AND UNENFORCEABLE IN LAW because it fails to insure other district to obtain, by state legislative ap-

propriation or by local taxation, or both, funds for educational expenditures, including facilities and equipment, such that each student,...would have the same opportunity to education funds as every other student in the state, limited only by discretion given local districts to set local tax rates,...

There are several items of note in Judge Clark's judge-

(1) Clearly, there are large interdistrict differences in taxable wealth. Judge Clark's judgement implies that a substantial redrawing of district boundaries may be required as part of a constitutional solu-

(2) Consideration of total expenditures would be required in a constitutional school finance system. Facilities and equipment are paid for by local taxes since they are not considered in the Foundation School Program. It is that program that the state presently attempts to equalize by providing disproportionate amounts of state aid to property-poor districts, but state-aid formulas cannot compensate for the extreme variations in local taxable values in different districts and still remain within fiscal reality.



The state is encouraged to continue to take "into consideration the legitimate district and student needs and district and student cost differences associated with providing a public education." "Legitimate" needs and cost differences are not spelled out in the judgement, but it seems clear that the state could continue to provide, for example, extra funding to sparse-area districts where school costs obviously run higher, or to recognize the higher expenditures required to provide an educa-

tion to handicapped students.

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





One summer I visited Venice, a port city in Italy. Each time I passed in the vicinity of Saint Mark's Square, I'd stop and watch the pigeons in the square. Hundreds of them collected there enjoying the peanuts, grain and bread the visitors threw out to them. "Learning By Doing" Is 4-H Youth Program

A nationwide study has shown that 4-H, the learning-by-doing" program for youth between the ages of nine and 19, has made a positive influence on the life skills needed by adults to become selfdirecting, productive members of society.

The study was conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service on cooperation with the Department of Rural Sociology at Texas A&M University and was funded by a grant from the Extension Service, U.S. Department of Agriculture.

A total of 1,761 individuals were part of the randomly selected sample of individuals. Of these, 710 indicated they were former 4-H members, 743 were former members of other youth organizations and the remainder had not participated in any youth group, said Dr. Howard Ledewig, Extension program evaluation specialist and leader of the study.

"Essentially, former 4-H members rated their experiences higher overall than did alumni of other youth organizations," said Ladewig.

Study results also showed that former 4-H members were more involved in community activities and 4-H leadership positions as adults than were members of other youth groups, with a particularly sizeable difference when compared to non-participants of youth

4-H alumni were found to be more involved in Extension Service programs and activites and more often read or listened to Extension

"Companred to participants in other youth groups, 4-H alumni were more satisfied with the program's contribution to their personal development (development of self-worth, responsibility development and goal setting)," Ladewig said. "In addition, former 4-H members gave higher ratings to experiences in gaining knowledge and skills.'

"On the other hand," Ladewig said, "members of other youth organizations perceived more opportunities for practicing leadership skills and receiv-

ing responsibilities." The study also showed that the most useful experiences for both 4-H alumni and other youth group participants came from contact with other people in the organization. In addition, oppotunities to develop skills and make a contribution to the organization were most-

ly highly rated by both

groups. "Learning to work with others and developing a sense of responsibility were traits that contributed highly to the personal development of members of all youth groups," Ladewig said. 'However, 4-H members seemed more satisfied with their organization's contributions to personal development than did par-

ticipants of other groups.'

According to Ladewig, former 4-H members as well as past participants in other youth programs were more alike than nonparticipants in terms of race, years of age, level of family income and number of children taking part in youth programs. Nonparticipants also had lower levels of educational attainment, employment status and family income, he

The study also found that more than half of the former 4-H members belonged to other organizations as youths, mainly church groups and scouts. 4-H alumni also were more active in **Future Farmers of America** and Future Homemakers of America while other youth alumni groups were more active in all other organizations studied.

"Essentially, the study found that 4-H and other youth development programs can make a difference," Ladewig noted. "The 4-H program could enhance its status by a more effective public relations effort directed at nontraditional audiences, by designing programs for older teens and broadening leadership opportunities, and by more adequately challenging the personal development skills of all youths."

Weather Rules For Safe Boating

It's summer. For millions of Americans, and thousands of Texans, this means boating.

Many who go out on the water in small craft do so for the first time, and inexperienced skippers suddenly learn that responsibility for safe operations goes along with the fun of running a boat. So before setting out:

Obtain the latest available weather forecasts for the boating area. Where they can be received, the NOAA Weather Radio/NWR/conbroadcasts tinous (VHF-FM) are the best way to keep informed of expected weather and sea conditions. If you hear on the radio that warnings are in effect, or see flags or lights at warning display stations, don't venture out on the water unless you are confident your boat can be navigated safely under forecast conditions of wind and sea.

While afloat: 1. Keep a weather eye out for: the approach of dark, threatening clouds which may foretell a squall or thunderstorm; a steady increase in wind or sea; any increase in wind velocity opposite in direction to a strong tidal current. a dangerous rip tide condition may form steep waves capable of broaching or capsizing a boat.

2. Check radio weather broadcasts for latest forecasts and warnings. 3. Heavy static on you AM radio may be an indication of nearby thunderstorm activi-

4. If a thunderstorm catches you while afloat, you should remember that not only gusty winds but also lightening poses a threat to safety. -Keep below deck if possi-

-Keep away from metal objects that are not grounded to the boats protection system.

-Don't touch more than one grounded object at the same time (or you may become a shortcut for electrical surges passing throught the protection system).

-Put on a life jacket and prepare for rough sea conditions (by the way, you and your entire crew should be wearing floatation devices ANYTIME you are afloat, NOT just when weather threatens).

June 7 through 13, 1987 has been proclaimed National Safe Boating Week. In recongnition of Safe Boating Week, and to promote safe boating the year round, the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration /NOAA/ The National Weather Service, along with the Sea Grant College Program, The National Safety Council, The Texas Safety Association and the U.S. Coast Guard, offers boaters and marina operators several useful brochures to assist in preparing and protecting boats against severe

To obtain one or more of these safety brochures, along with a listing of NOAA Weather Radio Stations and frequencies in Texas and around the Gulf of Mexico, contact the National Weather Service office or Marine Advisory Service Extension Agenty nearest you. Additional information may be obtained from the Texas Safety Association and U. S. You sure can't rely on what people say. Like the time my wife asked me to clean the black off of an aluminum frying pan. I told her that was so tough I might not be able to get half of it off. So she said she would be satisfied if I just got half of it Well, I took it out back and

began scouring it with one of those little wire brushes on a hand drill. I started on one side and in a bit I was at the center line with the first half so bright you could see yourself in it. When I handed it to her that way she wasn't satisfied no how. Ain't that just like a woman? So before she let up I had to go out and shine the other half. I honest-

Foolishness aside, I hear that Taylor county commissioners voted a law requiring building permits to satisfy insurance companies about flood insurance. At least that is the reason they gave.

Let me explain how permits and inspections worked in San Diego, Calif. and decide whether Abilene is headed the same direction.

When Mother and Dad built their first house in San Diego, Co. the permits cost \$25. Within ten years permits and inspections had gone into hundreds. Last year our niece built a new house. Now the non-material-non-labor costs were into the thousands.

Now consider what you get for all those good things the bureaucracy provides. A lot near there I was digging a hole for a pool. The dirt was wheeled to a gully where we piled up rock to hold the dirt. But, I was instructed not to build over three feet high or the wall would require a permit, inspection etc. As we worked an inspector checking on the house a neigbor was building came by uninvited to check on the wall.

The neighbor had a kitchen where the ceiling joists measure ten ft. two in. They had to be torn out and replaced by two by six. No two by four over ten ft, they said YET on a tract of houses where I was a laborer they used two by four on fourteen ft. spans. How come? I was informed that the big contractors engineer had specified that they would not sag and suposedly staked his reputation on it. Never mind if the corporation might be dissolved and their loot spent before the joists had time to sag and the sucker who owned the house would be advised to hire a lawyer he could ill afford for an exercise in futility. Certainly you could do your own plumbing and wiring if it could pass a nitpicking inspection. But if you want no hassle, then hire the right union plumber or electrician and the inspector simply looks at the name and signs it as passed. Naturally those contractors are incapable of error so why look. Yes, that "inspection" would cost you exactly the same as going over it with the fine tooth comb you or your brother's work would have

Ah, yes, flood insurance. As police and firemen worked with boats and ropes rescuing people from flooded homes a policeman asked, "Why the devil they let contractors build houses in the

canyons which are prone to flash flooding?" No mystery at all. The bureaucrats held cushy jobs protecting the public and as long as the permit and inspection money came in that seemed to be the whole point.

A word of warning however to any considering Californianizing their community. I read a book titled YOU CAN FIGHT CITY HALL AND WIN". Therein the author, a former City Attorney for NYC, told of a dozen ways to hook a city or other governmental unit into responsibility if you suffered injury or loss and the primary individual responsible had nothing to be sued for. Inspection was one of those strongest hooks. Let me elaborate. In

Abilene a year or so ago the city fire marshal put out the order that all dry cleaners would cease to use naptha in cleaning and use a substance he designated. Unfortunately, the equipment used with the designated fluid was different and expensive. Only one company could supply and install it. Regardless of potential for bribery in such situations the cleaners would be forced to go out of business if they couldn't afford to be "taken to the cleaners" for new equip-

Some thought they should hire a lawyer to plead their case, others thought they should hire a consulting engineer to testify for them. With only \$2 400 in their treasury either idea was a joke. I suggested they inform the city fathers that as the designated material was a chlorinated hydrocarbon

(cancer causing) that if an employee or client should charge that they had contracted cancer from long exposure to furnes or residues of it then the city would be targeted by any smart shyster. The tax payers would have their tax burden increased to pay off. Should a fire cause a poisonous cloud from a ruptured container to injure people in the neighborhood, as it certainly could, then the injured could look to the city, not the cleaner. Local Artist - Sculptor Presents Willie Nelson With Bronze Bust





from Eastland County. Dale Stewart was among the Guests of Honor listed on the program. Stewart first knew Willie

Nelson about 25 years ago, The presentation was when he sang in the San Angelo-Coleman area before he became famous.

Nelson's reaction to the bust of himself was 'fantastic'', Stewart says. "He really brightened up when he saw me with the bronze.'

Stewart presented the piece to Willie with "love and appreciation for what you have done for the nation and Farm Aid."

He visited with Willie before the singer went on stage. After the hour-long concert, Willie called him back on the bus, and discussed old times and the bronze piece again.

Nelson approved the casting of three more of these bronze sculptures: one for his friend Jalapeno (Sam) Lewis, one to be raffled in a Farm Aid Concert in Nebraska in September, and one for Dale Stewart to keep.

Stewart began his work on the bust of Willie Nelson in Feb., 1986, and completed it in March, 1987. The bronze was cast at Hoka Hey Art Foundry, near Dublin. Stewart says he considered it a "challenge to capture Willie Nelson's personality.' Those who see the striking piece know that he succeed-

Zachariah Houston Been, born August 30, 1857 in Sebastian county, Arkansas and died March 12, 1941. He married January 9, 1881 to Julia Ann Ownby, born December 2, 1862 in Walker county, Georgia, and died December, 17, 1950. They are both buried in the Long Branch cemetery in Eastland, County, Texas. They had four children, Julia Etta, Elzo Francis, Jesse Virgil, and Rufus Oscar.

The family moved from Sebastian county, Arkansas in 1891 to the Simpson community, later known as Kokomo, in Eastland county. They traveled by covered wagon. They farmed in this location, raising cotton, corn and longhorn cattle. Houston sold out in 1893, and returned to Arkansas where they still owned a farm. They spend the next seven years there, during which time Julia Etta died and was buried in the Liberty cemetery at Greenwood, Arkansas.

In 1900 Houston and Julia sold their Arkansas farm and returned to Eastland county, buying 160 acres in the Long Branch community. There was a one room log cabin and a small box house, using the log cabin for a kitchen, and they lived in the small house.

When the family completed a spacious farm home, the cabin and small house were incorporated in the building of a large barn. The house was ranch style and was kept painted and good condition at all times. They had a lawn and Julia had lots of flowers in the yard.

Houston bought 320 acres more land in a short time, and he raised cotton, corn, maize, and Hereford cattle. He never sold his grain or cotton seed at the end of a crop year, and sold them for seed at the beginning of the next year at a higher price.

Houston and Julia became known as Uncle Hous and Aunt Julie. Aunt Julie was a marvelous cook. As was the custom of the early days the long dining table was covered with a cloth at the end of the meal, leaving much food for the next meal. When the grandchildren visited they knew where the fried chicken, fried pies, and other goodies were located, and many times when the cloth was removed there were several empty dishes. Aunt Julie was happy to be living in Eastland county because she had two sisters living here, Mrs. Matt McAllister of the Long Branch community, and Mrs. Mary Hearn of Carbon.

Uncle Hous bought a Buick automobile about 1915. He had it delivered and took it to a small clearing in front of his house. He started the car and was driving it in circles. Aunt Julie heard him hollering "Whoa-damn-it". He finally drove the car into a large oak tree and never tried to drive again. He always had two or three men working for him, and one of them always had to drive for him.

During the oil boom of the 20s Uncle Hous sold 40 acres across from the Long Branch church and school. There was a refinery built on this land and for a time furnished heat and light for the church and school. The Beens were active members of the church until Uncle Hous's hearing got so bad that he could not hear the preacher. They were still supportive of the church and the community in a monetary way as long as they lived.

The Beens were good citizens, and all who knew and remember them loved them.

County Commissioners:

Money Requirements Expected To Be Higher Next Year

Eastland County Commissioners held a regular meeting on Monday, June 8, with all four Commissioners present. County Judge Scott Bailey presided.

The Judge opened a prebudget discussion, with some of the 1987-88 requests from various officials in for consideration. It appears that the new budget will be higher than that of the last fiscal year, which ran over 2.8 million.

There was a discussion of the tax valuation it would take to meet the increased demands on the county. An added value to sales taxes is also a possibility.

Emma Morris, county auditor, showed the Commissioners a bill for ambulance and other medical services for a prospective juror who became ill in the

Courtroom during jury selection for the organized crime case.

It was reported that the man "said he didn't want an ambulance," but one was called anyway. The ambulance bill for

carrying him to Easltand Memorial Hospital was \$159, with the hospital bill \$80 and doctors services from a clinic \$40. Commissioners voted to

pay to hospital and clinic bill, but to question the full price for the ambulance service - since the county is carrying two memberships in this service.

Another item under discussion was a request from Sheriff Don Underwood for funds to pay for keeping prisoners in other counties. The Sheriff was unable to be present, due to his investigation of a murder in Rising

Billy Bacon, commissioner of Pct. 1, reported that there were 21 inmates presently in the County Jail, and he thought there were five still being housed in Stephens County.

Dale Hawkins of Sun Production Co. requested permission to cross County Road 497 in Pct. 2 with an oil and water pipeline. The request was granted.

This subject led to a discussion of trouble with some other companies on pipelines. L.T. Owen, commissioner of Pct. 3, said he was having trouble right now with an unauthorized line laid across a road.

The worst offenders, he said, were companies who sell out to others. The new owners of the oil properties sometimes don't want to be responsible for promises previously made to the coun-

The Commissioners said that representatives of companies who sign contracts with the county should be held individually responsi-

Judge Bailey suggested that he try to draft all future contracts in a way so that oblications shall be assumed by all future purchasers of companies.

On a happier note, the Commissioners reported that the auction of county equipment in Cisco on May 30 was very successful. More than \$24,000 was brought in from the sale of used items.



From time to time our lake reports may seem somewhat like, Proctor, Hubbard Creek, P.K., Brownwood etc. What happens is I am unable to gather reports sometimes on these impoundments and will use reports compiled by the Texas Parks and Wildlife. These reports are accurate, but unfortunately they normally run about one week behind. To avoid possible problems for you, I will begin dating reports I use from the Parks and Wildlife. All other reports will be as current as 1 day and not older than 3. I do apologize for any problems this may have caused.

The swift water below dams supports many large fish. However, fishermen often consider heavy current too difficult to fish, even if they realize large fish call this area home. Huge catfish thrive in this fast water...and they can be caught, according to the Mariner Outboards fishing experts.

Hydroelectric dams span many rivers, and when power is being generated, the increased flow creates even swifter conditions.

Bait fish drawn through the turbines are injured and flushed down to waiting catfish. Below most dams, rocks and boulders provide ideal resting and ambush points for catfish to attack the hapless victims that drift or swim by.

Bait fish also inhabit these areas because water temperatures remains cooler and the oxygen content is higher. This concentrates bait fish and all species of fish.

Fishing methods must be modified from other river techniques. Boat control is the most critical skill required; without it, you'll drift over the prime fishholding spots beofre your bait even reaches the bot-

To take good numbers of catfish, utilize the boat control method called 'slipping." When "slipping," fishermen control their drifts by holding their boats against the current. Face the boat into the current, and keep the outboard in great, idling fast enough to maintain a slow downstream drift, so the lure and bait can be fished vertically (under the boat). A slow bait presentation allow catfish a chance to see and take your offering.

The most successful bait and tackle are also different than normal catfish gear. The rocks that harbor these fish will eat your tackle unless you perfect boat "slipping" and rig like the experts.

A single or double hook rig can be easily created using a three-way swivel and a sinker about 12 inches from the other end. To keep from re-tying after every drift, use a rubber band (31/2 by 1/16 inches) to attach your weight to the line on the rig.

The rubber band allows the weight to bump the bottom, keeping bait in the fish zone. If it doesn't become hung, pull hard on the line and then snap it back. The weight should pop out of the toughest snag. The worst case is the los of an inexpensive weight and not the entire rig. This method saves you money, and also saves fishing time.

Bait used on these catfish rigs varies from area to area, but live minnows, shad strips, chicken and turkey livers are the favored bait. Many fishermen use scents,

This simple but effective method will take good numbers of catfish which live in the swift water below dams.

New Program **Will Boost** Rural Income

The Texas Department of Agriculture is beginning a new program to boost income in rural areas. This program is designed to link up rural artisans with urban markets through Country Crafted Texas.

This new program is open to rural artisans from areas outside the city limits of town of 25,000 or more. They must be Texas residents working in their own homes or studios. Their handcrafted material must be original (no kits or commercial patterns). They need to be able to reproduce their crafted items for sale retail, wholesale or commission). Due to state health regulations, food items cannot be accepted.

The Department, in conjunction with the Texas Farm Crisis Hotline, will print an attractive promotional directory listing the rural artisans and the type of things they make. The Country Crafted directory will be widely distributed to press outlets, marketers, and likely consumers.

In addition, TDA will offer Texas rural artisans various opportunities to exhibit their crafts in high-traffic shows. For example, TDA will feature Country Crafted participants at the State Fair in Dallas in October. Also, in November, Austin's Sami Show has agreed to "adopt" selected country artisans
