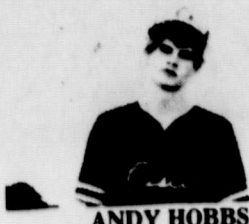

RESCISSON OF PSD PERMIT
Union Texas Products Corporation, 1300 Post Oak Boulevard, Houston, Texas 77252-2120 submitted a request for rescission of Prevention of Significant Deterioration (PSD) Permit PSD-TX-368M-1 issued by the Environmental Protection Agency on March 2, 1981, and modified on March 18, 1983. The permit was originally issued to El Paso Hydrocarbon Products for the modification of a gas processing plant located near FM Road 2526, approximately 7 miles southwest of Cisco, Eastland County, Texas. Union Texas Products Corporation acquired this facility on October 1, 1986. The request for rescission was submitted pursuant to Part 52.21(w) of the Regulations of Prevention of Significant Deterioration on Air Quality as amended August 7, 1980. The emission sources installed according to permit PSD-TX-368 and its modification PSD-TX-368M-1, have been permanently shut down and removed. Therefore, the Environmental Protection Agency has determined that a PSD permit is no longer required for the referenced facility as specified in PSD-TX-368M-1 and is giving notice that it has rescinded the permit.

CISCO
A new hospital-based skilled nursing facility has opened at the E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital in Cisco, announced Helen Orr, administrator. This location is one of only seven hospital-based facilities in Texas. Continuous nursing care will be provided for patients, who may include senior citizens, convalescents and the chronically ill. E.L. Graham's facility will have six beds, and the Medical Director for the unit is Dr. Ayres R. Cermin. Private pay as well as Medicare patients may use the unit. The cost will be around \$90 per day, excluding some services.

The Farmers Market, located at 3000 East 8th St., got off to a rousing start last Saturday. It is open again this Saturday, June 20, and will be open on Saturdays and Wednesday afternoons all through the summer. Local people are bringing in vegetables to sell, and they are fresh and delicious. There were six or eight stalls last Saturday, with more expected to be set up this weekend.

A Willie Nelson Concert - Feeding The Five Thousand

I have been asked if I enjoyed the Willie Nelson concert West of San Angelo on June 7. This question rates more than a simple answer.

Actually I didn't go to the outdoor benefit just to hear Willie sing, although I'll admit that idea crossed my mind. But I had learned that Dale Stewart, Cisco sculptor, was going to present his bronze bust of the singer to him at 7 p.m. that day.

Even a non-artist such as myself could tell that this was a magnificent piece. What a great bunch of pictures the presentation would make for the Eastland County Newspapers, I thought.

Several other Eastland County art and music lovers decided to attend the concert, with some planning to take pictures. Among them were Jim Davidson and Mark Snyder of Eastland, Johnny Hargrave of Cisco, my son Marvin Payne, and Tim and Sherri Webb of Nimrod.

Mr. H.V. O'Brien armed us with proper letters, badges, and other press identification. Without this we would have gotten nowhere near to the concert stage.

When Tim, Sherri, Marvin and I reached the San Angelo Merton highway that afternoon we knew we were on the right road to the concert. An unusual amount of DPS Troopers and law officers were patrolling this stretch of road. Big pickups full of men wearing ranch clothing sped by Sherri's pretty little yellow car. Several of them were soon pulled over by the patrols.

We were surprised when we found no billboards advertising Willie Nelson Day and this concert. Then, about 20 miles out, a small sign said simply "concert", with an arrow pointing left on a dirt road. This road was fairly decent for awhile, then it reached a beautiful creek with high water running swiftly across the spillway. Sherri's car almost hit high center on the rough concrete.

Just as we decided few people would ever find the place, we reached a valley which rose to the West. Cars of every description were stirring around the entrance or parked in a field. A bright tapestry of humans was in front of a huge stage some distance away.

We came to an entrance manned by people with badges and Willie Nelson T-shirts. All appeared less than impressed by anything resembling a Press Card. They sent us down an obscure road to a "security shack" to get "cleared".

Naturally we turned down the wrong road, and wandered along a shady stream of water to a private home. Luckily no one was around, and the big dog at the door didn't try to bite Marvin or Tim.

The "security shack" turned out to be two pickups parked in the brush along a set of ruts. But the people there were friendly, and

seemed to understand the word "press". They gave us each a badge saying "Willie Nelson Day Crew." It promised "all access" to the event. They also stamped something in red ink on our right hands.

This identification got us past the first check point, and into the parking area. There was still a long walk up the hill to the scene of action.

There were indications along the way that this wasn't exactly your typical church picnic. The gathering had more of a carnival atmosphere, with souvenirs for sale and beer cans gleaming in the sun.

A good band was playing, but the crowd didn't seem really excited. These backup musicians were apparently there just to pacify the people until Willie Nelson arrived.

We were let past a gate into the backstage area, where about a hundred people were sitting in lawn chairs or milling around. Tim and Marvin set out to find Dale Stewart, and Sherri and I stopped at a rope which circled around the back of the stage.

Jim Davidson walked through this area, reporting that he had made some good pictures from the stage. Dale Stewart materialized, saying that Willie's bus should be here any minute. Soon there was a commotion as a huge vehicle named "Honeysuckle Rose" circled two other buses behind the stage. I noted its tinted windows and psychedelic decorations, and also that a group of people were chasing it. A number of Security Officers converged on the spot.

I learned the Stewart's bronze bust of Willie would be presented to the singer inside this private bus. I realized it was going to be difficult to get inside "Honeysuckle Rose" for a picture, but decided to hang around hopefully. I followed closely behind Dale Stewart as he carried the heavy bronze.

Jim Davidson was near the bus door. I thought I saw Marvin and Tim trying to work through a group of people near the back side of the bus.

Right then two tall fellows who looked like frontier scouts ahead of a wagon train converged on me. I felt like a lone squaw in enemy territory.

"You get out of here!" They said in unison.

"But I'm from the Eastland County Newspapers," I pleaded. I fished out my identification. "Please, fellows, I'm covering a special story."

"You get behind that rope over there," they said, and proceeded to escort me to the spot.

There was a brief moment of respite when another guard ran hastily to me, calling: "Are you Willie Nelson's sister?"

"No," I answered weakly.

As I went under the rope, a tightly packed crowd gave me enough room to stand. This group, consisting mostly of women, was on the north side of the stage. Most

were young and attractive, but with a kind of gleam in their eyes.

I muttered a general apology, and they just nodded back sympathetically. A dark-haired girl said softly: "I just want to touch him. I just want to touch Willie once."

But I don't want to touch him," I stammered. "I just want one picture." I realized that no one heard what I said.

The music on the stage was slowing, and the crowd was beginning to chant for "Willie". Dale Stewart was still on the bus, and Marvin was lurking near the door. Jim Davidson was standing (hiding?) near a barrel beside pillars supporting the stage.

Marvin spotted me and hurried across the open space. "What are you doing over here?" he asked.

"I'd like to take that picture myself," I replied. "How do you rate staying over there?"

He grabbed my camera, saying he wanted to take some black-and-white pictures with his colored slides.

Dale Stewart came out of the bus, and I decided it was time to make a break for the sacred turf beyond the rope - before I got caught in a stampede toward Willie. Nobody stopped me, but about that time dear old Honeysuckle Rose moved forward. Obviously I moved over.

The bus stopped at a flight of stairs backstage. As the door came open, Willie Nelson was circled by guards, and it looked to me like one of their main interests in life was mob control. A crowd of people, most apparently news media personnel, surrounded the guards.

Willie made it up the stairway so fast that I only



caught a glimpse of his back. Marvin emerged from the scramble, announcing that he had a picture of Willie coming off the bus. Jim Davidson also emerged, and headed for some high spot near the stage.

I had a bright idea that I would slip up on the stage with some of the other people I saw going there. But a character built like a wrestler was standing near the stairway I went to.

"The Press gets outta here," he informed me.

"I haven't heard that since the Eastland County Courthouse," I murmured.

Back in the restricted area I saw Marvin, Tim and Sherri, who were talking over their various adventures. Then they fanned out to hear Willie's concert and get some more pictures.

Willie had his hair in braids this time, with a red bandanna across his forehead. He was dressed in

black clothing, with a red, white and blue guitar strap. He played his old Martin guitar.

I know I have read too many history books - and looked at too many old paintings. But as I looked at Nelson I could not shake off the impression of a tribal chieftan from ancient times in the British Isles. His voice, too, seemed to belong to the ages - resonant, strident, strangely compelling.

The people backstage were in a relaxed mood, with some drinking beer from coolers. I heard rumors of free beer somewhere, but did not try to verify that.

One of my reasons for not drinking beer was very practical. I understood that any alcohol a person consumes kills a certain quota of brain cells. I did not feel that I had any of those cells to spare.

As I visited with the people, I found them very accommodating. When I wondered how many people

were attending the concert, one young man hopped up on a high table so he could peer over into the General Admission area. He reported that about 5,000 were scattered down the hill, at the admission price of \$10 each.

Some of the spectators, I found, were from the Austin area. They had followed Willie up here, and would follow him anywhere else he wanted to go.

"About that time Marvin walked up with a puzzled expression and asked me: 'Mother, why are you wandering around interviewing drunks?'"

I assured him these people were not drunk!

The songs from Willie and his fine band covered the hillside - bringing a big response from the crowd. Some were the old tunes, like "Blue Eyes Crying In the Rain", or "Don't Let Your Babies Grow Up To Be Cowboys". Others, like "Spanish Angels", were the newer type. All had Nelson's special dynamics and expression.

When Willie's concert was almost over Tim, Sherri, Marvin and I started walking toward the car, wanting to get down the road before the traffic picked up. The DPS had their work cut out for them - no doubt about it.

As we walked past the main crowd a young man threw a can full of beer on the stage. It missed Willie's head, but burst with a loud noise as it hit something else.

Security guards nabbed two youths and took them to one side. Willie called from the stage and let them go, "let it be."

About that time he began to sing sacred songs. To me there was something unreal about the strains of "Amazing Grace" and

"Unclouded Day" in this atmosphere.

Then I saw that the people were listening raptly - caught in the spirit of those great old songs.

I suddenly understood that they were wanting something - why else would they sit in the dust of this hot hillside?

Some probably just wanted to enjoy the ballads, but maybe others wanted to learn how to be human - how to feel. Or maybe to fill a big empty spot in their lives.

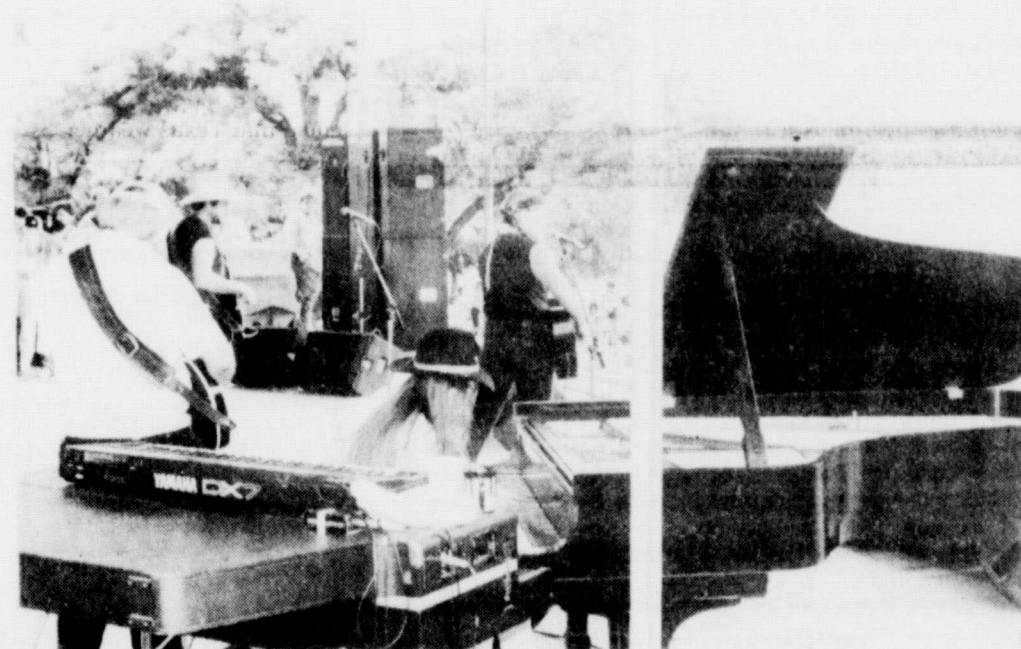
On the way back to Eastland County Tim, Sherri, Marvin and I talked about life in general, music,

and the concert. We began to congratulate ourselves on not being famous.

Tim said he thought his next Willie Nelson Concert would be an indoor one. Then someone asked me when I was going to another one.

"I tell you what -" I said - "If I had my wish - I would like to see Willie Nelson sit down in a living room without one mike around - he doesn't need them. Then I would like to hear him sing just for enjoyment like I play the violin. Tim sings and Marvin plays the guitar."

"I wonder if he ever gets to do that?"



Willie and the band he calls "my family" are caught in the middle of a number. (Photo by Jim Davidson)



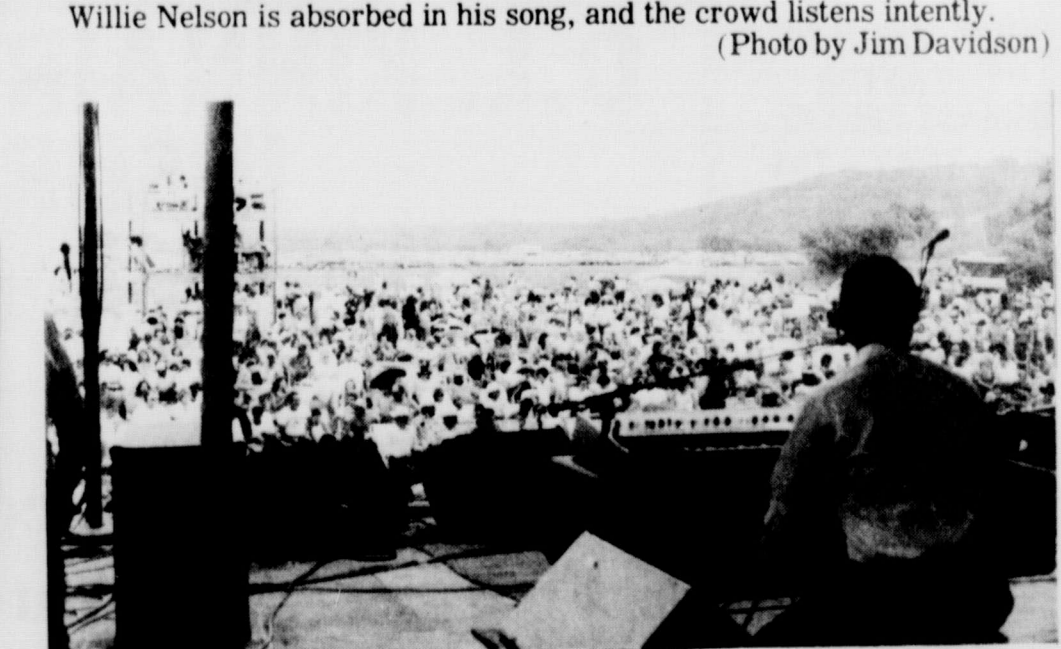

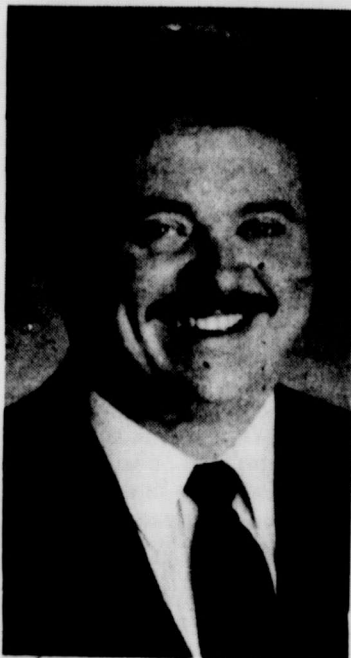

It wasn't really predicted - but the thunderstorm arrived here Wednesday night anyway.

At 10 p.m. there was a line of dark clouds sitting across Jones, Haskell, and part of Taylor County.

Then, in a classic S.E. flow, the clouds rolled into Eastland County at midnight. They were accompanied by wind, thunder, and brilliant displays of lightning.

The rainfall varied from one quick shower in Ranger to .19 inch at Ron Bailey's gauge in Eastland, on to 1 inch at Cisco, 1.8 at Union Center, heavy rains in the Rising Star area and 1 inch in Kokomo.

High winds blew down several trees in Cisco, telephone lines at several places, hay grazer in some fields, and knocked down two Comanche County Co-Op Utility poles near Rising Star.

It was the lightning, however, that kept most people awake about two hours, and caused the most damage.

A bolt of lightning made a direct hit on a pole of the Texas Electric transmission line 5 miles north of Eastland. This happened at 12:09 a.m., according to Mike Kiser, division engineer for the company. It knocked out the power to Eastland until the fault could be isolated and power redirected. Electricity was restored to Eastland at 12:30 a.m. Crewmen finished repairing the transmission line at 5 a.m. Thursday morning, and put it back in service.

Comanche County Co-Op crewmen repaired the poles that were blown down near Rising Star, finishing their work early Thursday morning.

At Cisco the fire department was called out during the when lightning hit a 210 barrel fiberglass oil storage tank at a well south of the old tile plant on Highway 80. It made a spectacular blaze, and the tank was completely burned up.

Winds were high in Cisco, but there were no warnings of tornadoes and the

"spotters" were not called out. All residents were glad, however, when this fast-moving storm pulled on out of the county.

Gordon Spot

By DeMarquis Gordon, County Agent—

The large number of calls we received last week indicate that the bag worms and webworms are very active.

Bagworms are destructive pests of many evergreens and deciduous shrubs and trees. The young worms or caterpillars construct a small tapered bag of silk-like material and attach to it pieces of bark and foliage.

The bagworm protrudes its head and front feet from the bag as it moves about the plant feeding but will withdraw into the bag when disturbed. In late summer the bag is attached to a branch and the mature caterpillar pupates within the bag. The feeding worms, when infestation is heavy, will remove the foliage and bark from all parts of a tree or shrub, resulting in the death of the plant or heavily damaged parts.

The worms are easier to control when they are young and control measures should be applied as soon as possi-

ble. Bagworm control is difficult and not as effective as the larvae matures and close their bags. Use insecticides containing either carbaryl (Seven) chlorpyrifos (Dursban), trichlorfon (Dylox), Diazinon, acephate (Orthene), Bacillus thuringiensis, or Malathion. Be sure to use spray equipment that gives complete coverage of all foliage.

A number of other caterpillars are feeding on green leaves now. These include webworms, tent caterpillars and walnut caterpillars.

Control is about the same for all the leaf eaters and is much more effective when worms are small. Any of the insecticides listed for bagworms are also effective for the control of these leaf eating caterpillars. Thoroughly spray the leaves, twigs, limbs, and tree trunks. Large infested trees may require treatment with big commercial applicators with high-pressure sprayers. Always read and follow carefully the instruc-

tions on the container label. Pecan trees look better than they have in many years, especially the native trees. The rainfall that they received last fall and continuing into the spring in most areas has really stimulated heavy growth on many of these trees. At this time, the freeze damage to both native and planted orchards appears to be minimal. Some trees have a good set of pecans while others have no pecans at all.

The pecan nut casebearer has been generally light in most cases. Some who do not spray had very little damage from insects. It appears that the leaf eating caterpillars may be more damaging than the casebearers.

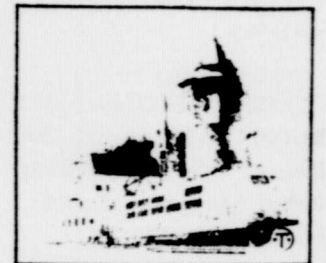
TIPS ON TRIPS



Travelling abroad can be an exciting experience as you enjoy a new culture and explore new sites. However, if you break the law in a foreign country, it can ruin more than your vacation—it can ruin your life. The U.S. Dept. of State warns you that carrying an American passport won't prevent you from being arrested overseas if you break a local law. An American consular officer can't simply come and get you out of jail or pay your legal fees. All he or she can do is visit you, give you a list of local attorneys, and notify your family.

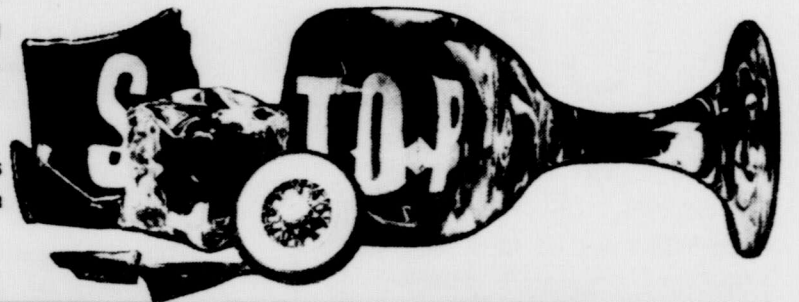
In 1986, 2,827 Americans were arrested in 101 foreign countries. At the end of the year, 1,388 were still in custody in 79 countries. Thirty-four percent of those arrests were for drug offenses.

Drug laws in most countries are stiffer than those in the United States. Even a small amount of a so-called "soft drug," such as marijuana, carries a stiff penalty in many countries. If



you're caught, you may be faced with: interrogation; long pre-trial delays; mistreatment; solitary confinement; a lengthy trial in a foreign language; two years to life in prison; even the death penalty in a growing number of countries.

The most important thing to remember is: American citizens are subject to the laws of foreign countries they visit. It's your responsibility to know what the laws are and to respect them. Remember, you have your life, family, friends waiting for you when you come home from that exciting trip overseas. Don't jeopardize it all with drugs or other illegal activity.



SUMMER ACTIVITIES CAN BE HAZARDOUS: CHECK INSURANCE

During the summer months children engage in a number of activities such as tree climbing, playing tag or swinging on outdoor gym sets, all of which are fun but could be hazardous.

Who is responsible if little Tommy falls out of a tree and breaks his leg, or if little Mary trips and fractures her arm?

Whoever owns the property where the child is hurt may be liable to pay for medical costs and could be liable in a lawsuit. All homeowner's package policies provide liability protection against accidents on the premises. But homeowners should check the liability limits of their policies to be sure they are fully covered. They should discuss uncertainties with their agents, brokers or company representatives.

It is also a good idea to supervise children as much as possible to help prevent an accident before it can happen.

SUMMER JOBS COULD MEAN MORE THAN MONEY

Parents who allow their children to hold summer jobs on a regular basis could unknowingly be exposing themselves to potential claims and lawsuits without the proper insurance coverage.

Jobs such as babysitting, lawn cutting and newspaper delivery are common ways for young people to earn extra spending money.

However, if the minor performing the job were to injure someone or damage property, the results could be disastrous. An expensive lawsuit or medical claim could result.

Any job held on a regular basis, like a newspaper route, will be considered by an insurance company to be a business venture and may not be covered on homeowner's policies.

A homeowner would have to purchase additional coverage for the business activity unless the policy has a provision which includes the activity. Contact in-
