Eastland County Businesses Upset Over Cable Rate Hike

Council Discuss Battle Creek Pump Station At Tues. Meeting

Ken Martin, an engineer with Jacob and Martin, Inc., met with the Cisco City Council last Tuesday to give several project cost estimates for improvements at Battle Creek Pump Station. The council met at City Hall for their regular board meeting.

In the report to the Council, Mr. Martin commented that Battle Creek is very important to Cisco. He said that without Battle Creek, Lake Cisco's estimated safe allowable yield, 700 acre foot a year, is theoretically less than the City's existing demand which is 1200 acre foot a year. He said with dependable transfer facilities Battle Creek might yield more than Lake Cisco during a year with average rainfall.

He added that the reliability and serviceability of the Battle Creek pump station should be improved and maintained for Cisco's use since Battle Creek's watershed is two and a half times greater than Lake Cisco's watershed. He said that when it rains Battle Creek receives water when Lake Cisco doesn't because the Battle Creek watershed goes south all the way to Cottonwood

He also said the time to make improvements is now, when it is wet. Mike Moore, city

manager, said, "Water is an asset to Cisco. We need to have reliable pumps, because if you need them and they are broken down, they are worthless.'

Mr. Martin gave the council a written report on the cost of rebuilding the existing motors, installing new motors, and rebuilding the existing motors and add a new 4,00 GPM pump. The Council decided to

subscribers have become so upset over a recent announced rate increase that they have drawn up petitions concerning the rates and are planning to meet with Eastland City Commissioners in their upcoming Monday night meeting.

Two petitions have been written and signed by seven Eastland businesses, three Ranger, and one in Cisco.

One petition concerning the basic cable rate increase reads as follows: "This petition is made in

behalf of the commercial account customers of the Southern Cable TV, in the Eastland, Ranger, and Cisco area who have signed below. In regard to your letters, dated July 1, 1987 and July 3, 1987. Subject: New Rates on all Bulk Accounts.

"It is our feeling that the rate changes you are putting into effect August 1, 1987 are extreme and outrageous, at a time of such economic distress in our communities.

"The Basic Cable Rate increase, we find to be so excessive as to force us, as Bulk rate subscribers, to consider such alternatives as (1) limiting services to our customers; (2) increasing our rates at a time when we feel it will be a detriment to both our business and to

our communities in general;

According to Raymond Greenwood, Regional Manager for TCI, owners of Southern Cable TV, steps are being taken to solve the dispute as soon as possible. Mr. Greenwood stated that the rate changes were set to bring into equity the rates of the bulk customers.

"Many of these people have been paying rates that are atrocious," Greenwood stated. He went on to say that some customers were paying less than others. while some paid for more units or less than what they actually were supplied service to.

"We only want to bring the rates to an equal line to where each motel/hotel, apartment complex or other bulk customer is paying the same rate as his neighbor," Greenwood added.

The new rates set are: College - beginning September, 1987 \$3.50 per unit, September 1988 \$5.00; Apartments - \$4.25, Jan. '88 \$5.00; Motel/Hotel - \$3.00 per unit; Hospitals - \$3.00 per unit; Nursing Homes - \$3.00 per unit.

Greenwood also stated that the reason for the increase in the HBO charge was due to the fact that HBO had increased their ates to the company.

He also added that he did not feel it was right to pass on any rate increases to residential customers to make up for any losses from the bulk rates.

Fleet Cementers Inc. Dismiss Bankruptcy Case

Fleet Cementers, Inc., announced today that it has completed reorganization and dismissed its Chapter 11

proceedings in the United States Bankruptcy Code, as federal judge John Akard on June 29, 1987, entered an order dismissing the case. After ten (10) months of court supervision, the Cisco tent of bankruptcy laws. oilfield service company now is firmly positioned to

continue its operations in north central and west Texas, said company President Tom C. Gipson. In a move described by

Court officials as one-of-akind, Gipson, who has no legal training, was allowed to formulate a repayment schedule, which was approved unanimously by the unsecured creditors, as well as the court appointed

trustee and Bankruptcy Judge Akard.

Gipson said he bought out his co-shareholder and fired the company's original bankruptcy lawer early in the case because of philosophic differences between him and the other two men over the purpose and in-

"I just feel that this law should, as one federal judge put it, be used as a shield instead of a sword," Gipson said. "We used the law as an aid and now it is paying off for our suppliers and bankers. At the time we filed for protection our accounts receivable were staggering. Now some who were in arrears are out best customers."

"I believe the law is a tremendous tool when used

as it was intended by the congressman who wrote it. Most companies in Chapter 11 could come out if management were willing to make personal sacrifices.

'We will pay everyone every nickle we owe them, from cash flow, and we have a viable company," he said. "I refused to drain the company's resources, delay the proceedings over years and leave creditors with bones to pick over. I left home to live in the company yard and I never distinguished between my persons and company assets. My officers and directors have spent countless days and nights

City Manager Mike Moore Talks To Lions Club About Street Work In Cisco

The 1987 street seal coating program will concentrate on re-working present paved streets in need of repairs, City Manager Mike Moore told the Cisco Lions Club in a talk last Wednesday noon at the Ritz Restaurant. The seal coating work will begin about August 1, he added.

City Street Department crews have been seal coating from 70 to 90 blocks each year for several years, Mr. Moore said. A budget shortfall that appears to be about 15 per cent was given as the reason for the limited street improvement program this vear.

WTU Customers Are Paying Less

Customers of West Texas Utilities Co. are paying less than the state average price for electricity during July, according to the monthly survey of the Public Utility Commission of Texas. WTU's standard residen-

tial rate for 1,000 kilowatthour is \$67.92, compared to an average of \$73.11 for all investor-owned utilities in the state and an average of \$68.88 for all 17 companies in the survey. The list includes a number of rural electric cooperatives, two municipally owned systems and the Lower Colorado River Authority.

The survey shows that since July 1986, WTU's rate for 1,000 KWh has decreased by 15.1 per cent as result of lower costs for power plant fuel. El Paso Electric Co. still has the highest rates in the state, charging its customers \$87.42 for 1,000 KWh. TU Electric Co., the reorganized utility which combined Texas Electric Service Co., Texas Power and Light and Dallas Power and Light, is charging \$70.82 per 1,000 KWh.

Several of the companies, including WTU and El Paso, are in the process of seeking rate increases. WTU has fil-ed for a 23.9 per cent increase, and a hearing before the PUC in Austin has been scheduled to begin August

This is the first increase in base rates sought by WTU in three years, while several decreases in fuel cost charges have occurred. The change would place

WTU's portion of the new Oklaunion Power Plant in the company's rate base and add about \$50 million in annual revenue. The company cannot recover expenses of building and operating the plant until the rate base is changed to reflect the \$275 million investment. The plant, which burns coal, has been in commercial operation since last December.

White grubs do most of their damage to lawns in the winter and spring, but now is the time to control them. The adult form of the white grub is the May or June beetle. These beetles emerge from the soil in May and June. They start swarming in late evenings, especially around lights. By late June and early July the females are laying eggs and the white grub worms hatch and begin feeding on the roots of bermudagrass and St. Augustine grass in home lawns. Once the grubs begin feeding, control measures should be taken.

Homeowners here in Eastland County will need to treat between now and mid-August. Timing of application is critical for adequate control.

White grubs in excessive numbers can heavily damage lawns. Check for white grubs by cutting in square foot section of sod with a shovel and examine all of the roots and soil to a depth of four inches. Examine at least one square foot of sod for each 1,000 square feet of lawn area. Chemical treatment is needed if there are more than four grubs per square foot of sod

Diazinon provides adequate control and should be used at the recommended rates given on the chemical container label. The granular form is easier to apply and easier to wash into the soil than the liquid or spray formulations. After using granules, drag the grass with a tow sack or water hose to knock the granules down to the soil. Then apply enough water to soak the granules into the soil

Apply diazinon sprays at the rate of 25 gallons of water, including the insecticide, per 1,000 square feet to wash the insecticide into the soil. Wetting the lawn before spray application also helps. Always keep children and pets off the treated lawn until the grass is dry.

Law enforcement officers investigating the June 6 murder and rape of Era Witt were still waiting at midweek for evidence to be processed at the Crime Lab in Dallas, said Constable Gene Hicks. Lie detector tests have been given to four suspects and they all passed the test, he also said. Hicks remains hopeful that the evidence sent to the Crime Lab will assist the investigation. The lab serves a wide area, including metropolitan Fort Worth-Dallas.

Since the time of the Witt murder it seems that vandalism in private homes has been on the increase in a large area around Rising Star. A home south of town in Brown County was broken into and vandalized, and there have been similar reports in other directions. Constable Hicks has received numerous complaints about prowlers and persons knocking on doors and then disappearing. Women who live alone are particularly fearful about their safety.





I was overrated by them because I started to write when they were half way through seven year terms and even the best friends and family drop out after a couple years. I was thus a bit more than average pleased by one which began To Brother Gordon, the rattle of whose typewriter driveth away many evil spirits". He went on to explain that it seemed that just when despa was about to overwhelm him, a letter from me arrived to lift him up. He was country folk and my chatter about how the garden grew or some new variety of mellon cheered him as he began again to plan what to do on his little place when the happy day came. Now we only exchange Christmas cards with chit chat about family. Today I am thinking of

other prisoners of a different sort. They are the ones who are in prisons without bars nor walls. They live among us. They are people who are not satisfied with their lot in life but have no way of escape. Indeed, some sit in solitary misery without even considering that there might even be a way of escape. They are the addict, the woman who married an abusive man but had children before they had a way to support themselves or the kids without the brutalizer. They are people as bright as the rest who for many reasons never learned to read or figure and how are seemingly at a dead end. It

matters not in the least whether the teachers failed to motivate, parents failed to encourage or the student was not listening at times. the result is still an almost escape-proof prison.

It might take as long as it took the Count of Monte Cristo to tunnel out or it may take a bit of outside help but the only escape-proof prison is the one where nobody tries.

carcerated and those in prisons of circumstances the old saying holds true: Stone walls do not a prison make nor iron bars a cage.

One may consider himself an aviator with the ability of astral projection. His thoughts may range afar while in a cell. Women seldom consider it a temporary escape while watching soap operas but it may be excatly that.

For some women the steel door does not slam shut until the husband upon whom they have depended for years is taken away. Then they may not even know how to drive to the grocery or earn a decent living.

Conversely, a person confined by disability may be free more than most. So much depends on their perspective. There are wealth of mind and spirit which are unmeasured and unmeasurable.
