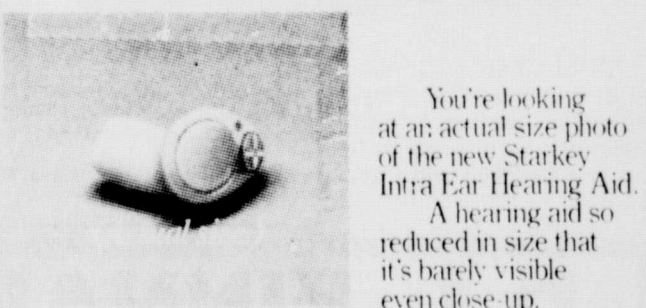

Gordon Spot

White grubs do most of their damage to lawns in the winter and spring, but now is the time to control them. The adult form of the white grub is the May or June beetle. These beetles emerge from the soil in May and June. They start swarming in late evenings, especially around lights. By late June and early July the females are laying eggs and the white grub worms hatch and begin feeding on the roots of bermudagrass and St. Augustine grass in home lawns. Once the grubs begin feeding, control measures should be taken.

Homeowners here in Eastland County will need to treat between now and mid-August. Timing of application is critical for adequate control.

White grubs in excessive numbers can heavily damage lawns. Check for white grubs by cutting in square foot section of sod with a shovel and examine all of the roots and soil to a depth of four inches. Examine at least one square foot of sod for each 1,000 square feet of lawn area. Chemical treatment is needed if there are more than four grubs per square foot of sod.

Diazinon provides adequate control and should be used at the recommended rates given on the chemical container label. The granular form is easier to apply and easier to wash into the soil than the liquid or spray formulations. After using granules, drag the grass with a tow sack or water hose to knock the granules down to the soil. Then apply enough water to soak the granules into the soil.

Apply diazinon sprays at the rate of 25 gallons of water, including the insecticide, per 1,000 square feet to wash the insecticide into the soil. Wetting the lawn before spray application also helps. Always keep children and pets off the treated lawn until the grass is dry.

The key to white grub control in home lawns is proper

timing of chemical applications and getting the insecticide through the grass to the root zone where the grubs are feeding.

Bagworms continue to be a problem in Eastland County, especially on evergreen. However, they have been found on liveoaks and pecan trees.

Bagworms are best controlled when insecticide is applied in April, May or June. Control is difficult and not as effective as the larvae mature and close their bags. Seven, Dursban, Diazinon, Dylox, Orthene, and Malathion are all effective if applied while the bagworms are small and still feeding.

Handpicking the pest is the best control after the worms have matured and closed the bags. You have to be persistent and be sure to pick all of the bags and then smash or burn them. If thrown on the ground, the eggs in the bags will still hatch next spring and larvae may crawl back into the trees.

We have been searching for fire ants in the county. Fortunately, there are not as many infestations this summer as last summer. All the control methods used last year must have been effective.

If anyone finds fire ant mounds I would like to know about it. If we continue fighting the small infestations we will delay their invasion in Eastland County.

WEIGHT CYCLING

After trimming off some excess weight, it's important to maintain good eating habits and exercise. Dieting, then gaining it back and dieting again (weight cycling or yo-yo diets) makes it harder to lose weight every time you go back on a diet.

Research by the Calorie Control Council has shown that the body's natural reaction to a reduction in food intake is to conserve energy, which leads to a reduction in the rate at which calories are burned at rest, making it harder to lose weight. Repeated dieting attempts may teach the body to be more efficient in its use of food so that with each diet the weight comes off more slowly and is regained more rapidly.

A sensible weight loss program that combines exercise with a cutback in calories has been found to counteract this diet-related decrease in metabolism. In addition to burning calories directly, regular aerobic exercise can bring the metabolic rate back to normal, and in some cases, can speed up metabolism for up to several hours after activity. Try 15 minutes of exercise before breakfast to speed up metabolism. This is

a great way to begin your day.

Most health professionals now agree that the most sensible approach to weight loss in a combination of moderate caloric reduction and increased physical activity to achieve a slow weight loss without weight cycling. Recent studies on dieting and metabolism reinforce the importance of this integrated approach to dieting.

RECIPE FOR THE WEEK:

SOUTHERN OVEN-FRIED CATFISH

2 egg whites
1/4 cup vinegar
1 cup crushed, crispy wheat cereal squares
1/4 tsp. dried whole dillweed
1/4 tsp. seasoned salt
2 pounds fresh catfish fillets
Vegetable cooking spray
Lemon Wedges (optional)
Combine egg whites and vinegar; stir well and set aside. Combine and toss the next three ingredients. Dip fillets into egg white mixture; lightly coat with cereal mixture. Place fillets on a broiler pan lightly coated with cooking spray. Bake 400 degrees for 15 minutes or until fish flakes easily when tested with a fork. Garnish with lemon wedges.

Area News Briefs

RISING STAR

Concerned citizens of Rising Star and neighboring communities are invited to attend a meeting on Thursday, July 23, 6 p.m. at the First Baptist Church Activity building. The Eastland County Sheriff's Department and regional crime prevention investigators will discuss how citizens can protect themselves and their property, and how to set up neighborhood crime watches.

Law enforcement officers investigating the June 6 murder and rape of Era Witt were still waiting at mid-week for evidence to be processed at the Crime Lab in Dallas, said Constable Gene Hicks. Lie detector tests have been given to four suspects and they all passed the test, he also said. Hicks remains hopeful that the evidence sent to the Crime Lab will assist the investigation. The lab serves a wide area, including metropolitan Fort Worth-Dallas.

Since the time of the Witt murder it seems that vandalism in private homes has been on the increase in a large area around Rising Star. A home south of town in Brown County was broken into and vandalized, and there have been similar reports in other directions. Constable Hicks has received numerous complaints about prowlers and persons knocking on doors and then disappearing. Women who live alone are particularly fearful about their safety.

The Rising Star Roping Club Playday will be July 21, the third Tuesday of the month. Registration will begin at 6 p.m., and the show will start at 7 p.m.

A trail ride from Rising Star to Cross Plains will be

held Aug. 7, beginning at the rodeo grounds at 8 a.m. The riders will join other entries to take part in the Cross Plains Roping Club Parade at 5:30 p.m. If you want to take part in the trail ride, call 643-4261 before 5 p.m., or 643-3252 after 5 p.m. Please notify your intentions by August 1.

The annual barbeque dinner to raise funds for the Rising Star Emergency Medical Service will be held at the Nursing Center this Saturday, July 18. Serving will start at 5 p.m. out on the patio.
