Gun Club To Hold Shooting Match Sat.

The "Fun Shoot" that the Cisco Gun Club had scheduled for this coming Saturday has been cancelled, and in its stead the club will be conducting a "Trophy Tournament" for its Junior Division. The contestants in the matches will be divided into two separate competing age groups -- 10 years and younger and 11 years and older -- with 16 years of age being the maximum age allowed to enter. Both age groups will participate in four shooting events, with a first, second and third place trophy being awarded in both divisions for the highest overall points scored for all the events. The events that are to be shot by both age groups include the following:

1. .22 caliber rifle at 50-yard paper targets.
2. .22 caliber rifle at 25-meter silhouettes.
3. Large bore rifle (any center fire) at 50-yard paper targets.
4. Shotgun at 5 clay targets. (The older group can use any shotgun; however, a .410 shotgun will be furnished for the younger competitors to use.)

Contestants will be required to furnish their own large bore ammunition, but the club will furnish the ammunition for all the .22 caliber matches. The .22 ammunition that will be used will be Federal Lightnings. This Junior Division trophy tournament will be held on this coming Saturday, August 8th, with the matches starting promptly at 12 Noon. However, in order to participate in the tournament, all contestants must be at the gun range by 11:30 a.m. to sign in and to attend a pre-tournament session on

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Water Board Releases Report

AUSTIN--The Texas Water Development Board has recently released a new publication entitled **Ground-Water Resources of the Antlers and Travis Peak Formations in the Outcrop Area of North-Central Texas (Report 298)**.

The area studied covers 3,900 square miles and includes all of Brown, Callahan, Comanche, Eastland, Erath, and Hamilton Counties. Board statistics kept from 1967 through 1984 show that ground-water pumpage in the outcrop area has increased from 16,000 to 45,000 acre-feet per year. The report discusses area considered favorable for additional new well development, and water level, water quality, and pumpage data are presented in both tabular and graphic form for several thousand existing wells.

According to the Report, water quality in the outcrop area is generally acceptable for most purposes except industrial applications. High iron and silica contents, along with the high calcium and carbonate levels, prevent the water from being used in most industries. For domestic use, the water is very hard and contains border-line amounts of iron, but is still acceptable. The ground water does pose a medium-to-high salinity hazard to crops, although a high annual rainfall negates this problem to some degree. In other respects, the water is suitable for irrigation. Seven-Month Sales Of Savings Bonds

In Texas Up Almost 19 Percent

United States Savings Bonds sales in Texas for the first seven months of fiscal year 1987 amounted to \$259,442,734, an increase of \$41 million or 18.9 percent over the same period of 1986.

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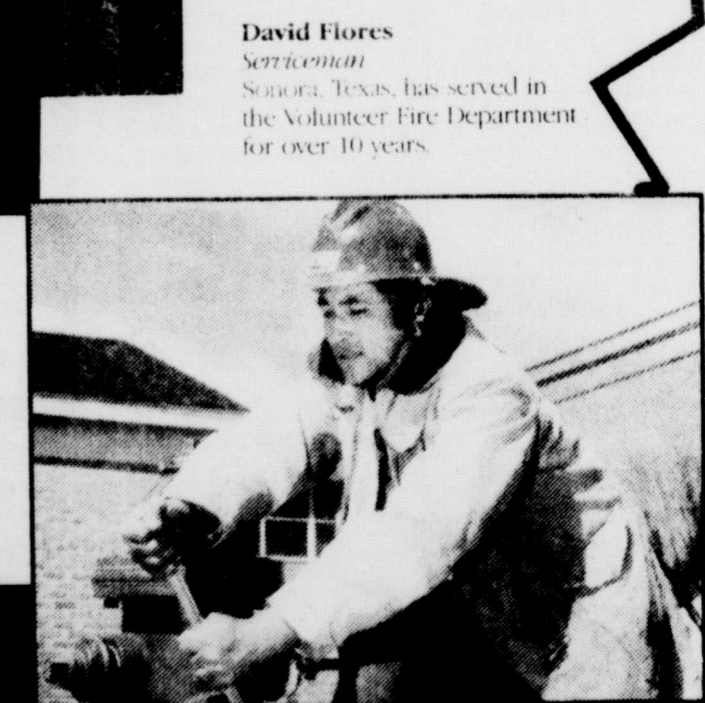
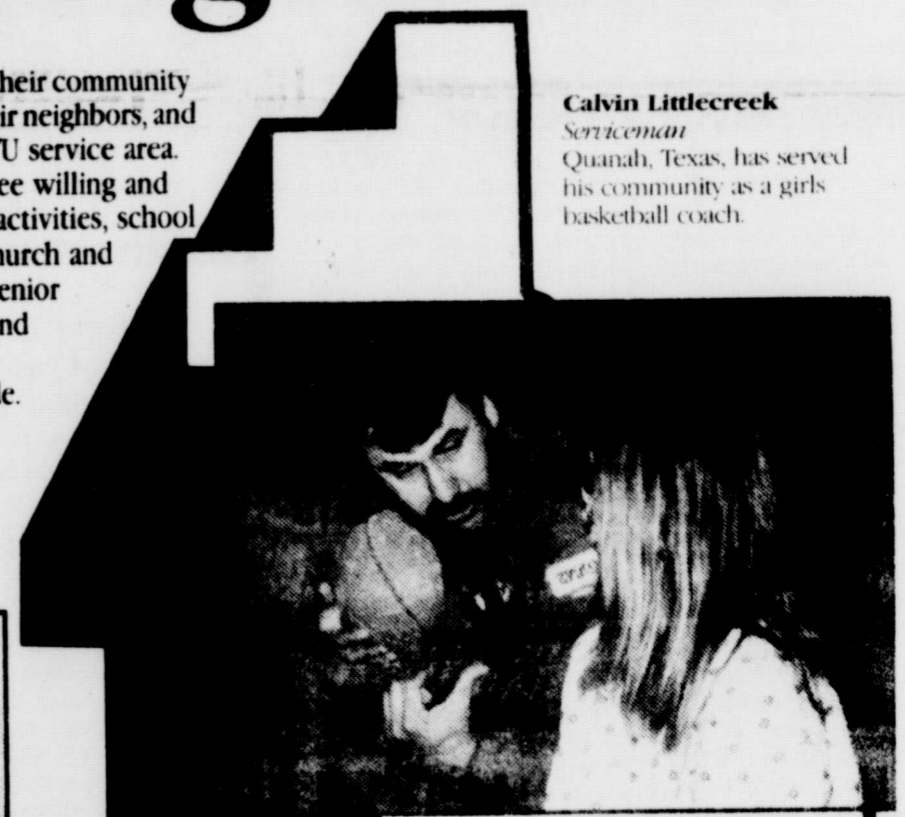

You will run through a German tunnel into a boxcar. The boxcar will transport you to the Ravensbruck concentration camp and when you arrive there you will be shocked beyond your wildest imagination as the most unbelievable things begin to happen. Suddenly you will be transported and you will dash out to escape through the ten Boom clock shop, hiding behind the walls of the secret passage behind Corrie ten Boom's wall as the Nazis

come looking for you. Mrs. Cleveland said, "It is a very moving experience. One which will make a lasting impression. If the American people could all make this journey they would no doubt have a different concept of the world and America's possible future." "The Hiding Place" will be open to visitors each day from 10 a.m. until 4 p.m.

Sunday morning a special worship service was held with guest speaker Ben Kinchlow. "The Church on the Move" was officially opened. This church is located within the World Outreach Center. The church will function with a new concept. It will train and support the lay ministries of 100 different ministries, such as prison, youth, aged, singles, teaching, witnessing, and many more.

Mrs. Cleveland noted that several books which have become best sellers of Mike Evans are, "Let My People Go," "Holy War," "Jerusalem, D.C.," "America's Key to Survival" and "The Return."

Young Leukemia Victims Have Long Term Survival

Leukemia is one of the most common cancers to strike children. It occurs when blood cells become malignant. Not long ago it was considered an unstoppable killer, but new anti-cancer drugs have resulted in long-term survival for the majority of leukemia's young victims.

Research still continues, however, in the hope of finding an even better cure. Current treatment sets out to destroy cancer cells. Unfortunately, it also destroys normal cells, producing unpleasant side effects.

Two scientists from the National Foundation for Cancer Research (NFCR) are working on opposite sides of the globe to discover a way to change malignant cells back into normal cells, instead of destroying them.

Dr. Hector DeLuca, a pro-

fessor at the University of Wisconsin, became interested in vitamin D when it was found, in Japan, that adding a vitamin D compound to cultures of leukemic cells caused the cells to change from malignant to benign.

Dr. DeLuca is screening a large number of vitamin D compounds to find the one that is safest for humans.

In Rehovot, Israel, Dr. Leo Sachs has proven that cancer cells are not irreversible malignant. Cancerous cells can be coaxed back to normal, he says, by providing them with the right chemical environment.

Professor Sachs has already "cured" leukemia in the test tube without using poisonous chemicals. By adding colonies of various blood factors to leukemic cells, he transformed those cells back into normal blood cells.

The National Foundation for Cancer Research is a private, non-profit organization based in Bethesda, Md. With the help of donors nationwide, it has allocated more than \$50 million to basic cancer research over the last decade.
