vice. "The more appealing you make your home appear, the better impression it will have on prospective buyers.

Selling Your Own Home

First impressions are important," the specialist says. People may decide not to buy your house before they even look inside of the outside isn't attractive. Concentrate on improving the front of your house by mowing and trimming the grass, trimming trees and shrubbery, planting flowers, and repainting if necessary to make your house look more inviting."

"Inside the house, try to make it look clean, and uncluttered. You may want to put away some knickknacks and small appliances to emphasize counter space. Clean and organize closets and cupboards to make the most of your storage areas. Polish the furniture and the woodwork, wash the windows, and maybe invest in a new shower curtain if it's needed."

"It's important to make any necessary repairs and complete those unfinished remodeling jobs before showing your house. Prospective buyers may lose confidence in you and your home if they encounter any strange noises such as leaky faucets or whining toilets, says Quiring.

The specialist maintains that adequate lighting will make rooms seem more spacious, and neutral col-

ored walls and carpeting will match most furnishings. This may make it easier for a potential buyer to visualize

Quiring adds, "Big investments in home improvement aren't necessary before trying to sell your house. A gallon of paint and some cleaning bring back better returns.

Remember that good marketing sells," she says, "but be honest and don't try to hid any problems or defects. Presenting your home in the best way possible will help it sell itself."

In "Adopt A Building"

Jr. Historians Involved

AUSTIN, Texas (Spl.)--While most Texas high school students have sports and dating on their minds, many have turned their interest towards historic buildings-- their breezeways, portio porches, dormer windows and wrought iron hand rails.

They are Junior Historians, students who have become involved in a new preservation education program called Adopt a Building. It is sponsored by the Texas State Historical Association which is based at the University of Texas at

Participating Junior Historians chapters "academically" adopt a building or other man-made landmark in their community which has not been previously researched, says David DeBoe of the TSHA. Through media presentations, displays and outreach programs, the junior and high school historians spent one year uncovering information about their building

"In the process, Junior Historians develop a new interest in the role buildings have played in the history of their communities and they increase preservation awareness in their own neighborhoods," according to Dr. DeBoe.

"If we are going to have these buildings around in the future, we're going to have to get the young people concerned about them," out Dr. DeBoe, who believes that Texas is the only state currently operating an adopt a building project.

Most of the chapters participating in the project last year adopted historis homes. Among the home selected were the oldest house in Jasper County(adopted by the chapter at Jasper Middle School); the Jack Murchison home which formed the backdrop for the film"The Best Little Whorehouse in Texas" (Pflugerville Middle School), and the home of the former mayor of Bellaire (Johnston Middle School,

Houston).

Five chapters selected to study schools in their towns. Among the more interesting adoptions were the oldest black school in Houston, the Administration Building, which for forty years was the home for single teachers in the Van schools, and the site of Stephen F. Austin High School in Austin which formerly housed an old brick

"A portio porch with seven tall, white columns and seven engaged columns display the warmth of a southern mansion which is enhanced with eight dormer windows and delightfully crowned with a cupola, write Van Junior Historians about the Van Administration Building which opened in 1930 as a boarding house for single male and female

teachers. "The outward appearance of 'Mount Vernon' causes the passer by to stop for a geographic bearing, and to ask, is this Van Zandt County. Texas or Fairfax County. Virginia?" the students

Dr. DeBoe, who is a member of the Travis County Historical Commission, nctes that when people think of preservation work, they usually think of residents over 60-or even over 30. He

hopes the TSHA Adopt a Building program will change that perception. Each chapter par-

ticipating in the project is required to complete four phases of work, including a declaration of adoption and complettion of a detailed survey, requiring students to visit their building or site. The third phase of the work requires the Junior Historians chapter to produce an audiovisual presentation of the project. The final phase is an outreach program, where students take their presentation into the community as a means of making citizens aware of their efforts, as well as the preservation needs of the

site or building.

Dr. DeBoe has been impressed with the quality of work submitted by all of the chapters. In Kilgore, students adopted their own high school. a 1933 structure built to accomodate Kilgore's boom town growth after the oil discovery. Their media presentation covered not only the building but a brief history of education in Kilgore, an overview of the area before the 1930's and construction of the high


Other Junior Historian chapters adopt landmarks rather than buildings. These adoptions include an abandoned railroad depot (Crockett Junior High); a hotel (Thomas J. Rusk Middle School, Nacogdoches), and an old major-league-size baseball stadium (Alpine

Junior High).

"Most kids don't tend to think about these things," Dr. DeBoe says. "They don't think there's anything in their town that is worth much and so many have found out different."

"Who would have ever thought that there was a major-league-size baseball stadium in Alpine, Texas?"

Water Board

Releases Report

AUSTIN--The Texas Water Development Board has recently released a new publication entitled Ground-Water Resources of the Antlers and Travis Peak Formations in the Outcrop Area of North-Central Texas (Report 298).

The area studied covers 3,900 square miles and includes all of Brown, Callahan, Comanche, Eastland, Erath, and Hamilton Counties.

Board statistics kept from 1967 through 1984 show that ground-water pumpage in ed from 16,000 to 45,000 acrefeet per year. The report discusses area considered favorable for additional new well development, and water level, water quality, and pumpage data are presented in both tabular and graphic form for several thousand existing wells.

According to the Report, water quality in the outcrop area is generally acceptable for most purposes except in-dustrial applications. High iron and silica contents, along with the high calcium and carbonate levels, prevent the water from being used in most industries. For domestic use, the water is very hard and contains border-line amounts of iron, but is still acceptable. The ground water does pose a medium-to-high salinity hazard to crops, although a high annual rainfall negates this problem to some degree. In other respects, the water is suituable for irrigation.



Conservation Reserve Program Brochure Available

A new color brochure designed to assist landowners is managing wildlife under the Conservation Reserve Program is now available.

The free publication is entitled "Managing For Wildlife With the Conservation Reserve Program." It was published by Texas Tech University in cooperation with the U.S. Soil Conservation Service and the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

The CRP is a federal farm program designed to reduce soil erosion by converting highly erodible cropland to permanent vegetation. Participating landowners receive annual payments for land taken out of agricultural production and additional payments to cover part of the cost of establishing vegetation.

The brochure suggests specific plantings and other habitat manipulations that can benefit the various species of wildlife, says Ron George, CRP coordinator for the TPWD.

Repairs On Schedule

Repairs to the dam at Possum Kingdom Lake are continuing on schedule, according to Brazos River Authority, owner of the dam and reservoir project. The work at this times involves primarily the installation of monitoring instruments to detect pressures and movement, and the cutting of eight-foot diameter access holes through the spillway

buttresses. The lake level was drawn down 13 feet from the normal maximum operating level of 1,000 feet as a safety precaution while investigations leading to possible structural modifications are being made at the dam. The temporary maximum operating level of 987 feet was reached on April 24 and is expected to be in effect for at least six months and maybe as long as a year. Lowering of the lake level to 987 feet was ordered by the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission, which licenses the hydroelectric generating facilities at the project.

Penetration of the buttresses began at the southernmost spillway buttress and is progressing through 18 buttresses toward the northwest spillway buttress. To date 15 buttresses

have been penetrated. The present instrumentation plan calls for installation of a total of 58 piezometers, of which 31 are in place, 14 extensometers, of which 6 are in place, and 9 inclinometers, of which 5 are in place.

The work is progressing in accordance with the schedule prepared by the Authority and its consultants in April of this year. There has been nothing thus far encountered in the work that has been done to cause a change in the nature or schedule for completing the investigations and corrective work at the dam.


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

Sales of Series EE Bonds amounted to \$9,375.00 during April, 1987 in Eastland County, Jim Wright, Volunteer County Chairman, said. The October 1986-April 1987 total for the County was \$341,122.00, which represents 170.5% of the County's 1987 assigned dollar goal.

Nationally, April 1987 sales of Series EE Bonds totaled \$706 million, slightly higher than those for March 1987. Sales of U.S. Savings Bonds of \$7.72 billion for the first seven months of fiscal year 1987 increased 107 percent and redemptions declined 14% compared to the same period for 1986. The increase in amount outstanding during April 1987 was \$755 million, for a total of \$95.42 billion, up 16% over April 1986.

The market-based interest rate for the six-months period beginning May 1, 1987 is 5.84 percent. The average yield for Bonds held since the beginning of the marketbased interest rate on November 1, 1982 is 8.68 percent. Outstanding Series EE Bonds, Series E Bonds and Savings Notes held and earning interest for at least five years after November 1, 1982 are also eligible for this market-based yield. All Series EE Bonds purchased on and after November 1, 1982 - and held at least five years - will earn 85 percent of the average market yield on Treasury marketable securities. Bonds held less than five years earn interest on a fixed, graduated scale.

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

Young Leukemia Victims **Have Long Term Survival**

Leukemia is one of the most common cancers to strike children. It occurs when blood cells become malignant. Not long ago it was considered an unstoppable killer, but new anticancer drugs have resulted in long-term survival for the majority of leukemia's young victims.

Research still continues, however, in the hope of finding an even better cure. Current treatment sets out to destroy cancer cells. Unfortunately, it also destroys normal cells, producing unpleasant side effects.

Two scientists from the National Foundation for Cancer Research (NFCR) are working on opposite sides of the glove to discover a way to change malignant cells back into normal cells, instead of destroying them. Dr. Hector DeLuca, a pro-

fessor at the University of Wisconsin, became interested in vitamin D when it was found, in Japan, that adding a vitamin D compound to cultures of leukemic cells caused the cells to change from malignant to benign.

Dr. DeLuca is screening a large number of vitamin D compounds to find the one that is safest for humans.

In Rehovot, Israel, Dr. Leo Sachs has proven that cancer cells are not irreversible malignant. Cancerous cells can be coaxed back to normal, he says, by providing them with the right chemical environment.

Professor Sachs has already "cured" leukemia in the test tube without using poisonous chemicals. By adding colonies of various blood factors to leukemic cells, he transformed those cells back into normal blood
