

New Playground Equipment To Be **Built By Volunteer Workers**

The Cisco PTO will be working with volunteer workers to help build safe and educational playground equipment that is also fun for the students. They will begin the building project on September 12, and will complete the project on September 19. The project will allow the Cisco Elementary School to have approximately \$40,000.00 worth of equipment for about \$3,000.00. The Cisco PTO raised the \$3,000.00 in its fund raising drives during the last school year. Letters asking the citizens

of Cisco to donate some of

the items the PTO will need will be sent out in the near future. The materials do not necessarily have to be new, since many of the materials that will be donated, can be recycled. Members of the PTO

board reported that if anyone cannot donate any of the building items needed, they can use everyone's help with the work. They will be

setting posts on Saturday, September 12, between 8:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m. On Friday, September 18, they will work from 5:00 p.m. to dark and on Saturday, they will build from 8:30 until 6:00. If needed they will work on Sunday, from 1:30 until 5:30 p.m. Everyone is urged to sign up for a work time, even if they are unable to work for the full time.

The playground consultant is Shirley Coleman, of Bronte, Texas. She is the elementary school principal in Bronte. Shirley is the co-ordinator

of the whole thing and will be here in Cisco to help work with the citizens to show everyone how to put the equipment together. Shirley has worked with 10 elementary schools across Texas to help build playground equipment. Shirley said she likes to do these as fun. Some of the equipment that will be used to build the playground equipment are, back hoe, tractor with post hole digger (60 post holes will be dug on Saturday, September 12), ½ inch electric drill, 2 small hand drills, chain saw, circular saws, hand saws, levels, T squares, chalk line and measuring tapes, pipe threader and cutter, 1/2 inch bits- extra long, counter sink bit- 1 inch, hammers, screw drivers, wratchet and socket set, 5 to 6 heavy extention cords and 2 to 3 splitter boxes, wood chisel and planer, wrenches, cement mixer, shovels, wheel barrow, rakes, hoes, ladderfree standing, bolt and chain cutter. The PTO ask that everyone have their name on their equipment.

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
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Area News Briefs

Eastland County people have expressed surprise at the reassignment of the county's mental health services from Wichita Falls to Austin. The change was effective Sept. 1, according to information received by County Judge Scott Bailey from Gary E. Miller, M.D., Commissioner of the Texas Department of Mental

Health and Mental Retardation. According to Commissioner Miller, the 70th Legislature enacted several changes affecting state mental health services. This includes the closing of Vernon State Hospital as a general psychiatric hospital, and the relocation of the maximum security unit at Rusk State Hospital to Vernon State Hospital.

The Eastland County Water Supply District Board has accepted the bid of Jay Mills Contracting Inc. of Stephenville to do repair work on the dam at Lake Leon. Jay Mills, with a low base bid of \$135,491; is expected to start work within a month. The project is to be completed in 60 days. The Board followed the engineer's recommendation to use sheet piling to protect the damaged area from the lake water while the earthen dam is to be replaced with newly laid stabilized earth. The rock face on the dam will be extended six or seven ft. higher, than the present level of 1,382 ft.

Senator Glasgow Has Concerns On

This had to go through the legislative process, and landed in the 70th Session of the Texas Legislature as Senate Bill 257 and House Bill 1503. Both passed.

Glasgow's information indicates that the counties that were to be reassigned were not named in this Legislation. This rearrangement was apparently left up to the **Texas Department of Mental** Health and Retardation. Hence the letter to Eastland County Judge Scott Bailey from Gary E. Miller, M.D., Commissioner of the Texas Department of MHMR, telling him of the reassignment.

Miller's letter also said that the Agency was notifying Senator Jones and Representative Jim Parker of the reassignment. Brown, Coleman and Comanche counties are being transferred to Austin along with Eastland.

Information Glasgow's office was that other provisions of the reassignment, such as the closing the Vernon State Hospital for general psychiatric services, had probably put an extra load on the Wichita Falls State

Hospital. General patients are being transferred from Vernon to Wichita Falls, probably taking room occupied by counties such as Eastland. The maximum security unit at Rusk will be moved to the Vernon Hospital.

Senator Glasgow is supposed to have more word this week on the major reshuffling, and the full effects it will have on patient care from this area.
