Joe Flores made two scores in the first series. Mike Domingues, Davin Hohertz and Kody Wallace ran in scores during the second series of plays. Davin Hohertz caught a 32-yard pass from Curtis Stanley to make his score.

Brian Wagon made a 18-yard run in the third series of plays to make the

sixth score for the Lobos.

Wranglers Beat Panhandle State University 34-To-0 Thursday

The Cisco Junior College Wranglers opened this year's football season with a 34-0 victory over Panhandle State University in a game played in Cisco last Thursday night.

Head coach Rick Frazier said the Wranglers looked

better than they did last week when they played in a scrimmage against Howard Payne University. Coach Frazier said they made some changes in the offense and it paid off.

Joe Huffman caught a 15-yard pass from James

Darby to make the first touchdown for the Wranglers in the first quarter. Eric Edwards kicked the PAT.

The Wranglers received a fumble from Panhandle on the 1-yard line in the second quarter and freshman Robert Fraga ran in to make

the second touchdown. The PAT was kicked by Eric Edwards. Freshman Allen Griggs made a 1-yard run to make the third touchdown. Billy Lewis kicked the PAT. And the Wranglers finished at half time when Chris Coffey caught a 30-yard touchdown pass by James Darby, and Victor Ramirez kicked the PAT to make the score 28-0.

Coach Frazier said the first team did not play during the second half of the game. In the third quarter, James Darby threw a 30-yard pass to Gary Palmer. The PAT was no good, which brought the final score to 34-to-0.

Coach Frazier said 13 different guys ran with the ball during the game. Neither one of the two number 1

quarterbacks, Pike Martin and James Darby had interceptions. Pike had 1 completion out of 7 attempts for 76 yards in the game and James had 6 completions out of 12 attempts for 110 yards and three touchdowns. Coach Frazier said out of 28 tosses, in the game there was only 1 interception. The Wranglers had 418 yards total offense for the game.

The Wranglers will go to Blinn Jr. College next Thursday in their second game of the season. Coach Frazier said it will be a good game. There were no injuries for the Wranglers in this last game and the team has improved since last week's scrimmage and they will improve more for this next game he said.

Classes begin on Sept. 10th and run for 13 weeks. Students can choose from morning, afternoon, or evening courses offered at the tax office in Eastland. One low fee covers materials, supplies and textbooks, Bowden said.

Among the topics to be discussed are: new tax law highlights, proven tax-saving ideas, overlooked deductions, filing requirements, claiming dependents, interest and dividends, business and farm income, bad debts, sale of property, rental income and expenses, pensions and annuities, depreciation and cost recovery, medical and dental expenses, tax credit for child care, alimony, interest expenses, gifts for charity, losses from casualties and thefts, tax benefits for senior citizens, job-related expenses and others.

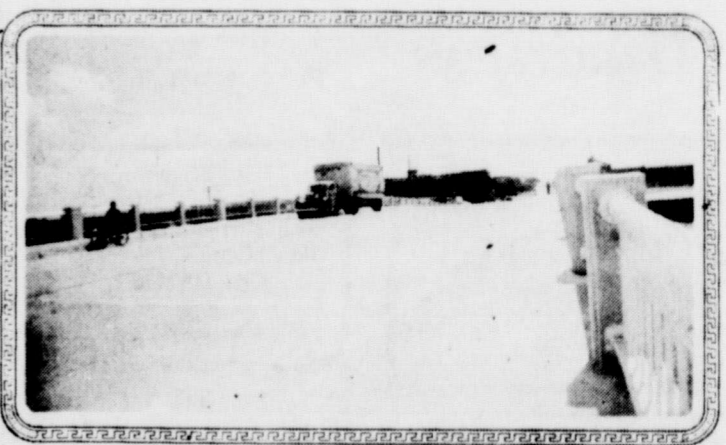

homemade bakery items and home canned goods will also be for sale.

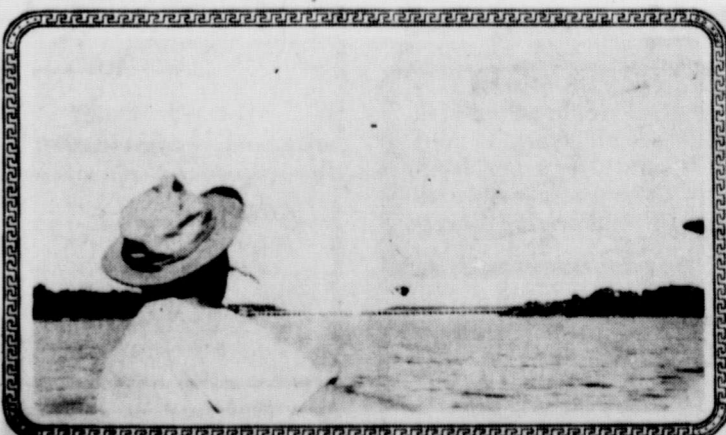
An auction will be held during the day at the church with many items to bid on.

A phone call from a parent will not suffice to comply with the statute. A sample form will be sent out to parents which they may want to consider using.

The form may make a parent take more seriously the request for an excused absence. The signing of a request for excused absence does not automatically entitle the student to an excused absence. Anytime the attendance officer has suspicions, he can investigate.

912 Students Registered For 87-88 School Year

Enrollment of students for the 1987-88 school year is expected to be approximately the same as in the past year, Supt. Ray Saunders reported Wednesday. Total enrollment as of Wednesday was 912 as compared with 919 at the same time last year.

Mr. Saunders said a number of students are expected to enroll after the Labor Day holiday Monday, and he believed the total would be about the same as last year.

Cisco High School had enrolled 267 students, one

less than in 1986-87, Wednesday, Mr. Saunders reported.

Enrollment by grades was reported as follows:

Elementary grades — early childhood 1, kindergarten 77, 1st grade 81, 2nd grade 61, 3rd grade 62, 4th grade 74, 5th grade 60, and 6th grade 80. Total — 503, down from 510 last year.

Junior High — 7th grade 81 and 8th grade 60. Total — 141, down from 142 last year.

High School — 9th grade 68, 10th grade 67, 11th grade 81, and 12th grade 52. Total — 268, up from 267 last year.

Area Peanut Growers File Suit Against Buyers

A lawsuit has been filed by 113 Texas peanut producers against various area buyers and shellers. The suit, filed in 220th District Court in Comanche, is styled W.D. Allen, et al, as plaintiffs against Birdsong Corporation, Columbia Peanuts Company, Goldkist, Inc. and Thomas H. Birdsong III.

Plaintiffs include peanut farmers from Comanche, Gorman, Rising Star, Desdemona, De Leon, Dublin, Sidney, Gustine, May, Mason, Valley Spring, Floresville, Stockdale, Boca, Kametey, Adkins, Brady, Proctor, Art, LaVernia, Poteet, Pleasanton, and Fredonia.

Attorneys for the plaintiffs include Jim Parker and Keith Woodley of Comanche, Howard Berger of

Floresville, Gerald Geistweidt of Mason, and Dicky Grigg and Broadus A. Spivey of Austin.

The suit concerns contracts related to the sales of all or part of the 1986 peanut crops signed by plaintiffs to defendants, alleging that the defendants had the growers sign contracts which constituted fraud.

Plaintiffs are on record in the suit as seeking to recover from defendants their actual damages, treble damages, exemplary damages, pre-judgment interest, post-judgment interest on all sums, court costs and attorney fees. Other relief is also indicated, "as to which plaintiffs may show themselves entitled at law or in equity."

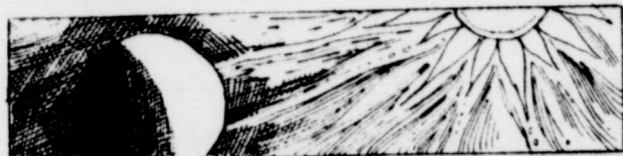
Cisco High School Junior Class To Sponsor Dance

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Dear Betty Crocker

Q. Which kinds of fish are lowest in fat?

A. The leanest fish is less than five percent fat. Varieties include cod, flounder, haddock and sole.

Q. How will cookies be affected by substituting whole wheat flour for all-purpose flour?

A. For most cookie recipes, you can substitute an equal amount of whole wheat flour. For best results through, use recipes tested with whole wheat flour.

Drop, molded, pressed or refrigerator cookie dough may spread more during baking and have a coarser texture than cookies made with all-purpose flour.

Q. Are red pepper and paprika interchangeable?

A. They are not the same, but are sometimes used together. Ground chili peppers are the basis of red pepper or cayenne pepper making this seasoning very pungent and hot. Paprika is ground from certain varieties of sweet red peppers. Its flavor is sweet and, depending on the variety, may be quite hot.

The Cisco High School Loboes will improve as the season progresses, according to Coach Buddy Sharp, who spoke to the Cisco Lions Club at their weekly luncheon last Wednesday noon at the Ritz Restaurant. The Loboes opened their new season at Anson Friday night.

Speaking on invitation of J. V. Heyser, program chairman, Mr. Sharp told Lions that the Lobo squad is composed of a group of dedicated young men and that he has every confidence in them. He said they had enjoyed a good pre-season practice program that has been relatively free of injuries.

The new Lobo coach told Lions that he expects to develop a continuity program in which boys will want to participate in the football program from elementary school through high school. This, he added, will pay dividends as the

Gordon Spot

By DeMarquis Gordon, County Agent—

We have good soil moisture now, and it is just in time for planting of winter pastures.

Early planting is one of the secrets for productive winter pastures. So prepare seedbeds and have soil tested to determine the amount of nutrients needed for abundant growth.

Winter pastures should be planted by early to mid September here in Eastland County. Be sure to use an adapted variety and one with disease resistance.

Growers are often concerned about the fall armyworm and other insects that can damage winter pastures. However, these insects can be controlled easily, economically and safely with approved pesticides.

Result demonstrations to show adapted varieties and best practices for growing winter pasture are conducted each year. Information of these studies is available at the county Extension office.

September 30th, is the last day to apply for crop insurance for barley, oats and wheat in Eastland County, Texas according to Ardell Kalmbach, a representative of the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation (FCIC).

Crop insurance covers unavoidable loss of production resulting from adverse

weather conditions, wildlife, earthquake, or fire.

Three coverage levels (50, 65, or 75 percent) are available for insurance protection. Additionally, FCIC offers three optional price elections for valuing production lost or damaged.

A new crop insurance plan, called Actual Production History (APH), is available this year to producers of wheat, barley, and oats in addition to corn, grain sorghum, peanuts, cotton, rice and other crops. Producers of these crops may now qualify for higher yield guarantees by proving their yield history. Rates have been developed to offer reduced premium for producers with above-average yields. With the increased cost of producing a crop, it makes good sense to take a look at this new concept.

To find out more about the APH Plan, producers should contact a local authorized agent. To select an agent, producers may check the list of agents at their local ASCS office.

September 30, is the final deadline for application.

DPS Predicts Deaths To Decline

The Texas Department of Public Safety is estimating that as many as 42 persons will die in traffic accidents during the 78-hour Labor Day period. The period begins at 6 p.m. Friday, Sept. 4 and ends at midnight on Monday, Sept. 7.

"We are seeing a decline of approximately 13 percent in traffic fatalities reported in Texas so far this year compared to the same period last year," said DPS Director Leo Gossett. "I'm hopeful that we'll be able to add 1987 to the downward trend in Texas traffic deaths which began in 1982."

There were 48 deaths reports at the end of the 1986 Labor Day period in Texas. The addition of later deaths due to injuries received during the period raised the final count to 51. Thirty-eight of the 51 deaths resulted from accidents where speed or DWI was a contributing factor.

"The new state law which prohibits consumption of alcoholic beverages while

driving went into effect today," Colonel Gossett reminded motorists. "Violators of this statute are now subject to receiving citations from our troopers and may face a maximum fine of \$200."

George Gustafson, spokesman for the Texas Coalition for Safety Belts and president of the Texas Safety Association, joined the DPS in cautioning drivers.

"Texas motorists can do a lot to make the Labor Day weekend safer simply by buckling up and, in addition, securing their young passengers in child restraints," said Gustafson.

Additional troopers will be placed on duty during the Labor Day driving period to enforce traffic laws and assist motorists.

The DPS Public Information Office will be providing updated traffic fatality counts three times each day during the Labor Day period.

Medicare Dispute

By Roy V. Cartee
Question: Mr. Cartee, I have received a letter from Medicare saying I owe them \$498.00 for treatment back in 1985. Do I have to pay for something I had no control over, like their mistake? I simply do not have the money.
Answer: We have copies of the letters sent to the beneficiaries explaining that refunding that is necessary. I will use the balance of the column to explain what hap-

pened. Prior to July, 1985, Blue Cross/Blue Shield, the contractor for the health care financing administration (HCFA), in administering the Medicare program, in Texas, reworked the computer and in July began to pay on the basis of the medical fee rather than on the basis of the reasonable or customary charge.
This incorrect payment starting July, 1985 was made to April 1, 1986. 5100 doctors in Texas only were involved which involved 14,900 Texas being overpaid. 203,000 Texas will be notified if their doctor was overpaid and the beneficiaries have no liability of payment.

I've Been Wrong Before

When most people hear "head hunters" they get a mental picture of the Jivaro Indians of the Amazon jungle who skin the heads of an enemy and shrink it to about the size of an orange by several pourings of hot sand. Then again some WW II service men were close to the head hunters of the Dutch East Indies.

Before the dislocation of the '73 oil embargo certain skilled workers were hard to find. As I worked in placement interviewing at Texas Employment Commission, I discussed difficulty of finding certain badly-needed people with the personal man of one Brownwood manufacturer. I ventured the opinion that the best place to find a working man at that time was on a job. I suggested that since he offered superior wages, a "head hunter" at the gate of a plant where those skills were used might by asking discreet questions get some good ones. He seemed shocked and almost insulted at the suggestion that they would do such a thing.

I must admit that some of my views are a bit unorthodox and maybe that is

why I heard of people asking at that office long after I quit. "What happened to Mr. Clark?" Maybe I was just a bit ahead of my time. On TV I saw people called, of all things, Head Hunters offering nurses in England some fancy pay and extras to come and work in American hospitals.

It was English tax payers who had subsidised their training who thought the practice was almost immoral and that they were being ripped off. I, on the other hand, never did see anything wrong with the practice. Maybe as the saying goes, "It depends on whose ox is being gored." Naturally when two men oxen used to fight, the loser's owner took a dim view of bull fighting. But I contended to the personal man that since the Civil War nobody held title to anyone's mind or body and all were free to move to greener pastures. Like I told one man, I appreciate loyalty and it has merit up to a point. However, a man's first loyalty should be to his family and if he can get a better living for Maw and the kids then he had better go for it. Certainly the sad scenes we view of plant closings where people are dumped into the streets after years with the company and given little or no notice and even without pension benefits they had been led to expect

are hardly recommendations for company loyalty. Those vanishing retirement benefits are the only reason many people hang on with the same outfit so long. The feeling that they have been betrayed in genuine.

I realize that my attitude is hardly agreeable with some business men. They feel they have an investment in teaching a skill. Some may secretly desire a system such as they had in old Germany wherein a person had a hard time finding a job unless he could get his last employer to sign his work book. Then there is the Russian system where the government refuses to permit a citizen to leave the country until they or someone pays that government considers the cost of schooling and training in that skill or profession. All else failing, employers could stop the brain-drain by building a Berlin Wall.

A very nice book might be written on business ethics and covering the full range of skills, benefits, unions, professional organization etc. It should stress what should be expected of both employer and employee. What good it would do in an age of corporate raiders, bankruptcies to get around responsibilities, union racketeers etc. I have doubts but at least a game should have rules. It goes without saying that some consider rules as being made to be

AUSTIN--The November election ballot will contain a record number of proposed constitutional amendments, Secretary of State Jack Rains announced, after drawing numbers to determine the order in which the 25 amendments will appear on the Nov. 3 ballot.

For the first time in Texas history, Rains said, two statewide referenda will be presented to voters. By law, those will follow the constitutional amendments, he said.

Local issues, if any, will follow the statewide questions. At least four counties have already decided to place local-option horse racing before their voters.

Gov. Bill Clements issued a proclamation designating the order for the two referendum propositions sent to voters by the Legislature.

The propositions, in the order of ballot appearance, are:

- SB 86: Provides for retain the State Board of Education as an appointed - rather than elected - body. Unless voters approve this proposition, the board is scheduled to return to an elected group with equal representation throughout the state of Texas in 1989.

- SB 15: Legalization of pari-mutuel wagering under the Texas Racing Act on a county-by-county local option basis.

Rains' drawing of paper slips out of a cowboy hat, set the proposed constitutional amendment ballot order as follows:

- HJR 104: Provides for the surety of a grain warehouse fund to be established by the grain industry for the protection of farmers and depositors in public warehouse facilities.

- HJR 60: To permit raising the maximum property tax rate that may be adopted by certain rural fire prevention districts, but only if approved by the districts' residents.

- HJR 48: Permits limiting school tax increases on the residences of the surviving spouse of an elderly person if the surviving spouse is at least 55 years old.

- HJR 5: Authorizes the Legislature to provide assistance for encouraging economic development.

- HJR 65: Authorizes agreements between the State Department of Highways and Transportation, and the Texas Turnpike Authority and the governing bodies of counties with a population of more than 400,000, adjoining counties and cities and districts located in those counties to aid turnpikes, toll roads and toll bridges, by guaranteeing bonds.

- HJR 4: Allows the Legislature to provide for state financing of the development of Texas products and businesses.

- SJR 55: Authorizes the issuance of general obligation bonds to finance local public facilities.

- SJR 56: Authorizes issuance of general obligation bonds for projects relating to corrections institutions and mental health and mental retardation facilities.

- SJR 9: Provides that a member of the legislature is eligible to be elected or appointed to serve in a different state office but may not receive an increase in compensation granted to that office during the legislative term to which he was elected.

- SJR 12: Allows the Legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation certain personal property.

- SJR 12, Part 2: To allow the Legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation certain property located in the state temporarily.

- SJR 35: Permits spouses to hold community property with right of survivorship.

- SJR 27: Allows for the creation

and establishment, by law, of special districts to provide emergency services.

- SJR 34: Would give the state of Texas a limited right to appeal in criminal cases.

- HJR 35: Permits the abolishment of the office of county treasurer in Gregg, Fayette and Nueces counties.

- SJR 6: Providing that certain justice precincts may contain more than one justice of the peace court.

- SJR 26: Allows the legislature to define for all purposes the governmental and proprietary functions of a municipality.

- HJR 18: Relates to the creation, operation, and financing of jail districts.

- HJR 88: Authorizes the issuance of general obligation bonds to fund undertakings related to a superconducting super collider research facility sponsored or authorized by the U.S. government, and to make appropriate grants.

- HJR 96: Allows the Legislature to provide ad valorem tax relief for certain offshore drilling equipment that is not in use.

- SJR 17: Permits the Legislature to include the speaker of the House or speaker's appointee in the membership of an executive agency or committee.

- SJR 53: Permits the Legislature to limit the authority of a governor to fill vacancies in state and district offices during the end of the governor's term if not re-elected.

- SJR 54: Authorizes the issuance of an additional \$400 million in Texas Water Development bonds.

- HJR 83: Allows a county to perform work, without compensation, for other governmental bodies.

- SJR 5: Authorizes the Legislature to permit the Amarillo Hospital District to serve certain residents of Randall County.

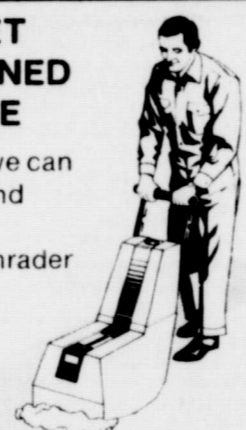

ORDINANCE

NO. 0-87-7

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF CISCO AMENDING SECTION 10-19 "RATES" OF THE CITY'S CODE OF ORDINANCES INCREASING THE SANITATION COLLECTION RATES BY TWO DOLLARS (\$2.00); AND ESTABLISHING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, in order to address the problem of decreasing revenues for the 1987-88 Budget Year and to properly develop the City's new solid waste landfill; now, therefore

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CISCO, TEXAS THAT:

PART I: That Section 10-19 "Rates" of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Cisco be amended so that such section shall read as follows:

"Section 10-19. Rates"
The monthly charges for solid waste removal shall be as follows:

(1) Residential
One family residence, \$7.00.

Two family residence, \$10.50.
One family residence/mobile home, \$10.50.

Mobile home in or out of park, \$7.00.
One family residence/apartments, \$10.50.

Each additional apartment, \$7.00.
Private apartment buildings, per unit, \$6.00.

City employees or volunteer firemen, \$6.00.
Persons over age 65 or totally disabled persons unable to work, \$5.50.

Class VII: Motels, hotels and rooming houses:
Per unit, \$1.00

Class VIII: Schools and Colleges:
Cisco public schools, per student, \$0.15.

Cisco Junior College, per student, \$0.15.

Class IX:
Housing Authority, per unit, \$4.00.

(2) Commercial.

Class I: Jewelry, banks, savings and loans, confectioneries, candy stores, bakeries, fruit stands, cigar newsstands, dentists, physician's offices, chiropractic offices, shoe repair, antique shops, attorneys, accountants, churches, upholstery shops, ice houses:

0-5,000 square feet of building floor area, \$11.50
Over 5,000 square feet of building floor area, \$12.25.

Over 10,000 square feet of building floor area, \$40.00.

Class V: Cafes, cafeterias, sandwich shops, drugstores, pharmacies, service stations, parking lots, restaurants:

1-2,000 square feet of building floor area, \$12.50.
2,000-5,000 square feet of building floor area, \$30.50.

Over 5,000 square feet of building floor area, \$45.50.

People n Things

THANKS TO Mrs. Louise Anderson, we've just been reading a copy of the Cisco American for Thursday, April 13, 1933 - nearly 55 years ago. She found the old American, a forerunner of The Cisco Press, among a box of clippings, letters and the like that she was discarded.

The headline of the paper told about a cold wave being forecast for the entire state with temperatures near freezing in Cisco. Franklin Roosevelt was the nation's president and another headline told about him asking the congress for mortgage relief for small home owners.

A group of CHS students entertained at the Cisco Rotary Club's meeting, Supt. R. N. Cluck was program chairman, and the late J. J. Collins was club president. The program included a violin solo by Jack Country, a banjo and harp duet by David and Elbert Sherrard and others.

The Cisco Country Club adopted new regulations governing membership... R. H. Boon Grocery advertised 48 pounds of flour for 65 cents, and Altman's Style Shop was selling Easter evening dresses for \$2.98 and \$4.98. Clark Gable was playing in "No Man of Her Own" at the Palace Theater, and the First Baptist Church was having an Easter Egg Hunt.

Eastland County had a notice in the paper that effective April 15 the county would pay a bounty of three cents per scalp on jackrabbits. Norvell & Miller Grocery's specials: sugar, 44 cents for 10 pounds; oranges, 10 cents per dozen; coffee, 72 cents for 3 pounds; peanut butter, 16 cents for a quart; and No. 1 potatoes, 10 pounds for 14 cents.

SEVEN DOVE hunters from Louisiana had good shooting west of Cisco on Sept. 1 - opening day of the new season. In fact, they had what you might call "too good shooting." Game Warden Kenneth Payne stopped in late Tuesday and counted their doves - 170 over the 12 limit per man.

In Justice of the Peace J. V. Heyser's Court early Wednesday, the men entered a guilty plea. They were fined \$500 plus costs (\$13) each - a total of \$3,500. Judge Heyser said that if he had literally thrown the law book at them, they could have been fined a total of \$23,000.

BILL WRIGHT, local lawyer, got home from Alaska in time for the hunting season to open. He usually has 10 or 12 friends out from Big D and Houston here to open dove season. Half of the group came Tuesday and the other half will be here this week, reports Bill. And they all got the limit of 12 birds.

Bill and Bill Hoffmann, Eastland lawyer, went to Alaska and spent two weeks of hunting. Bill's trophies include a Dahl Sheep's head, which is a real prize as they're real scarce. They were in northeastern Alaska before you get to the oil fields and found the weather good and the scenery scenic. They hunted for ten days or so.

COACH BUDDY SHARP, whose Lobos opened the new season in a game at Anson Friday night, Sept. 4, told the Cisco Lions Club in a talk last Wednesday that he has made a deal with Insurance Man Eddie McMillan.

"I'm not going to sell any insurance in Cisco, and Eddie won't be coaching football," Coach Sharp said. And Eddie's fellow Lions applauded long and loud.

When Coach Sharp or his assistant coaches can't handle the scouting duties this fall, they'll depend on two good fans - Craig Kent and Ray Shackelford - to help out. They helped some with scouting last year.

SUPT. RAY SAUNDERS and Business Manager Martha Davis are real pleased with their new offices in the west wing of the new Elementary School. They use the south door. Their telephone got moved Tuesday and business was a lot better... Workers were paving the parking areas at the Elementary School this

week... Everybody's happy with the new building which barely got completed by the time classes began Tuesday.

MR. KEVIN CAPPS, youth director at First Baptist Church, submitted his resignation last Sunday night to the congregation. He and wife Terry will move after Sept. 15th to Brownwood where they'll both be students at Howard Payne University. Kevin had been with the local church since May, 1986... Doug Bromley, music director at the Baptist church, and wife Kris have enrolled as student at H-SU in Abilene and will commute from their home here... Baptists are planning a special event - Double Day Rally! It will be Sept. 13th and plans call for doubling the lowest Sunday School attendance recorded this year, to double the lowest offering for a Sunday this year, and to double the lowest number of contacts and visits during the year.

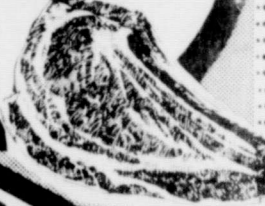

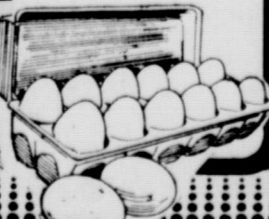
