County Commissioners Hold New Budget Near 1986-87 Level

Eastland County Commissioners, who had pledged to meet each day until they could agree on a County Budget for 1987-88, gave informal approval to a new budget on Wednesday morning.

They turned down all requests by county officials for salary increases, and held the new budget year near last year's level. There will be some adjustments on Social Security and Workman's Comp. costs, and election costs next year are expected to be more than the previous figure. But basically it will be the same budget - around \$2,700,000.

When the Commissioners did not vote more for county libraries, Richard Robinson, Comm. of Pct. 1, stated that he would give Eastland Memorial Library an additional \$100 per month from Pct. 1 funds. He said he believed the Library was doing a good work.

Before Commissioners began cutting the proposed budget it had totaled more than \$300,000 above expected revenue. Although taxes have been raised, there will still probably be a deficit of \$77,000 on next year's spending.

Official approval of the new budget is expected at the next regular meeting of Commissioners Court on Sept. 28.

"The Art Of Chivalry" Exhibit To Be Held At CJC Library

Chivalry is not dead. Though nearly four centuries have passed since the last knight in shining armor rode forth to combat the legions of evil, the world of chivalry has not lost its power to captivate and enthrall. An authentic suit of armor commands the full attention of any viewer. Children are drawn to it like a magnet, and care-ridden adults will stop dead in their hurried tracks to take in the sight. Armor gives us all an image of the human capacity for magnificence.

Visual evidence of the magnificence - and myths - of chivalry will go on public display Monday, Sept. 21,

1987, when the Maner Memorial Library at Cisco Junior College inaugurates an exciting, public humanities exhibition, "The Art of Chivalry." Said library director Oleta Shirley, in announcing the program, "By virtue of a grant that the Texas Committee for the Humanities has awarded to CJC, we are able to provide the exhibit free of charge."

The central focus of the humanities program is a photographic exhibition scheduled to be unveiled to the public during the weeks of September 21 through October 5 containing 65 images of arms, armor, and major figures from the world of chivalry, the exhibit was

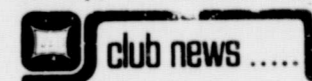
created under a grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities for use in community programs.

Highlighted in the photographs are shields, helmets, gauntlets, swords, rapiers, breastplates, cuirasses, three full plate armors and a complete armor knight and battle-charger. The pictures illustrate artifacts appearing in a major exhibition, "The Art of Chivalry: European Arms and Armor from the Metropolitan Museum of Art," which began its national tour in March 1982. David Sumners Is New Girls Basketball Coach And Teacher

This week I would like to invite everyone on the high school campus to view our renovated gym. New seats have been built with beautiful carpeting for the spectators comfort. The whole gym has a new paint job and the floor has been refinished with new stripping. The new concession stand has been provided so that the spectators will have food and drinks for their convenience. The Lobos will play most or all of their games in this facility and the athletic boosters will sponsor the concessions.

This week I am pleased to write about David Sumners, our new girls basketball coach and social studies teacher.

David Ray Sumners was born in Abilene, Texas, to Roy and Viola Sumners. David's father worked for El Paso Natural Gas Company and his mother was a nurse serving in several capacities in the health field. Mr. Sumners' father passed away in 1978, and his mother is now married to David Turnbough and they reside in Denver City. Mr. Turnbough is engaged in farming in that community. David attended public schools in Denver City and graduated

from there in 1966. While attending high school, David played basketball and tennis for the Denver City Mustangs.

Mr. Sumner then attended Lubbock Christian College for two years before going to Abilene Christian College. In 1971, David graduated with a Bachelor Science Degree in Education. He received his Masters of Education in Administration Education from Sul Ross University in 1979.

In 1971, David began teaching and coaching at Iowa Park, Texas. In 1974 the Sumners moved to Merkel where David coached junior high and varsity football, boys and girls junior varsity basketball, varsity girls track and varsity tennis. David comments that he was "real busy" when I asked him how did he coach so many sports? In 1976 the family moved to McCamey before moving to Rocksprings in 1983. In Rocksprings, David led the Lady Amgoras to three district championships and three regional wins. His first year at Rocksprings, the girls were first runner-up for district.

Mr. Sumners teaches one class of government along with American history

classes. He reminds us that this year is the year that we celebrate the bicentennial of our constitution. The class has reenacted a play in which it was stressed the difficulties of forming the document that emerged from the historical meeting.

With his American history class he wants his students not only to be aware of the past history but wants students to be informed on current events as well.

In 1968, David got in line at ACU to register. The person that was in front of him was his future wife. She was Shirley Kay Huff of Abilene. The Sumners have three children, Steve, 13, who is in the eighth grade; Gary, 10, who is in the fifth grade; and James, 7, who is in the second grade. David said that he wants his students to be educated to think for themselves. He feels that they need to be allowed to make decisions and also to be able to accept the responsibilities that is also needed.

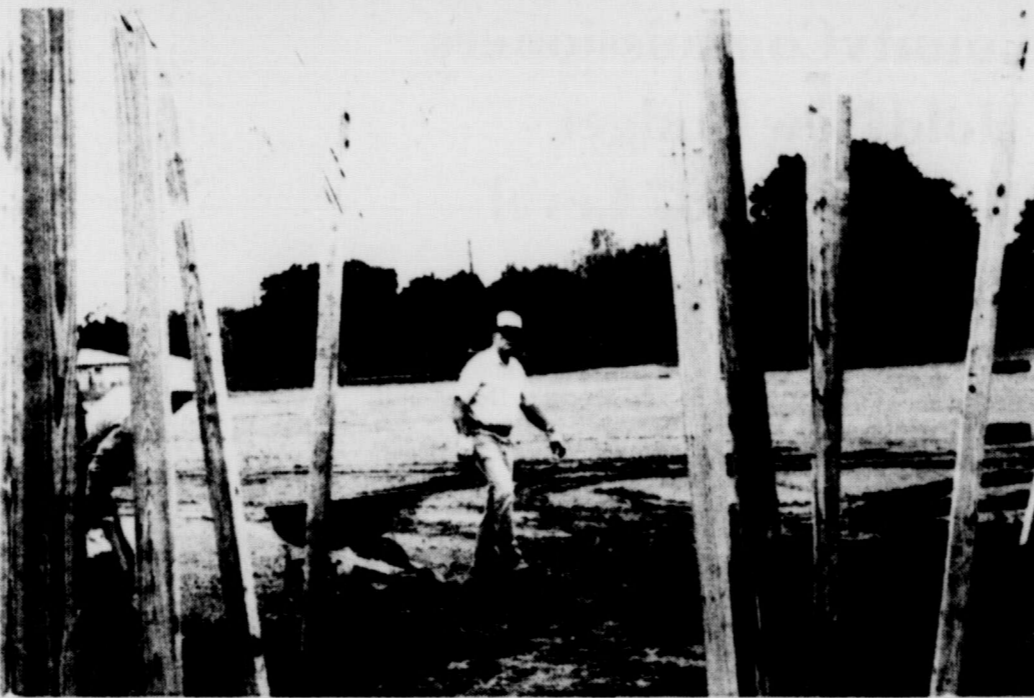
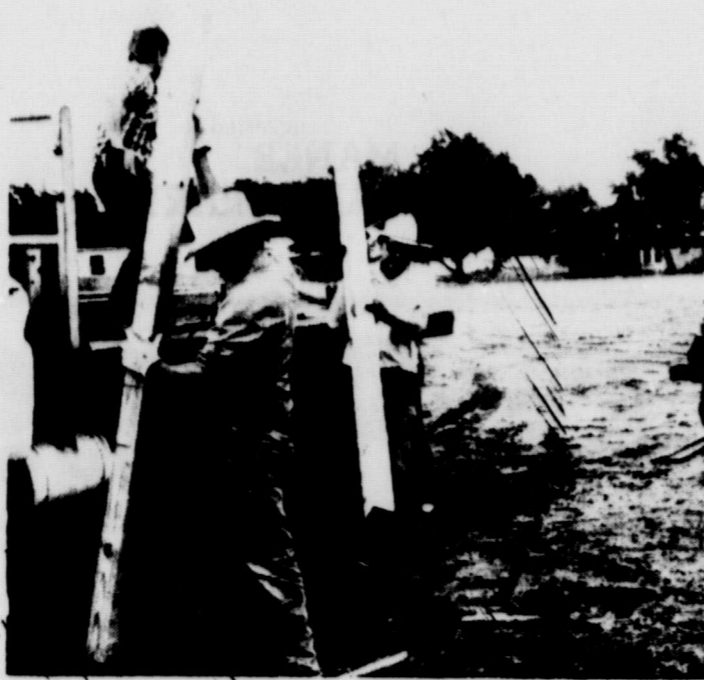

CJC And RJC Scheduled To Meet Sat. In Breckenridge

The football teams of Cisco and Ranger Junior Colleges completed preparations Friday for their annual meeting Saturday night, Sept. 19, in the Lions Benefit Bowl at Buckaroo Stadium in Breckenridge. The contest was scheduled to begin at 7:30 p.m.

Both CJC and RJC are undefeated this season, Cisco having won both opening games and Ranger opened with an impressive win over Howard Payne's junior varsity last weekend. Both teams were expected to be in top condition for the Bowl encounter.

The Wranglers of Coach Rick Frazier will seek revenge for a loss they suffered to Ranger in last year's bowl, which was played late in the season. Cisco won in 1985.

Lions Clubs of Cisco, Ranger, Eastland, Breckenridge and elsewhere are cooperating in sponsoring the game, and the proceeds will be used by the clubs to support the Lions Camp for Crippled Children at Kerrville and other community activities.

Coach Frazier said both his offense and defense lineups would be the same as that used last weekend when Cisco defeated Blinn JC 17-10 at Brenham. The lineups follow:

Fishing Outdoors

WHEN THE PRESSURE'S ON

Many of us have ran into it. You study your lake map for days, watch weather conditions and evaluate lake conditions, along with a host of other bits of information. Come tournament day you have selected those areas you plan to concentrate on. And what happens, it seems as though you sent invitations to come fish those areas.

I know this situation has hit me harder this tournament season than ever before. And by my results I have handled it backwards. So we made a few phone calls and visited with some of our local tournament anglers. They too have had this problem, but their results have been better than

most. So we ask what their secret has been. The following are the suggestions we received and also is the suggestion of anglers on the B.A.S.S. and U.S. Circuits.

The number one suggestion we received was to adapt to the crowd stay with your game plan, at least until you can determine if it is going to be a productive pattern. The second choice was to fish your spots but if pressure has been heavy (if these areas have been hit hard and often that day) move to a different method of covering the same ground. Example: if you have seen three or four boats fish a stand of cattails before you get to them. All have been flippin. Try backing off and casting to the target and

work your bait out away from it. Pressure will always do one of two things move fish tighter to cover or further off it.

The only other suggestion we received with regularity was to look for areas that do not receive pressure. A single bush, an open clean bank, or just something different. Often we see crafts which seem to be fishing the middle of the lake where there's nothing. But these anglers have come across something they feel will hold fish, check it out.

Does your Bass Club need a project? The answer is bound to be yes! Every Club does, whether it is a civic club, PTA group or a bass club. Without a project of some kind to provide direction, a reason for existing and momentum a club is doomed to failure.

It must also be a project in which members share an interest and become actively involved. A local civic club put on a successful stage

show for many years with its members active in set construction, lighting and acting. The next year it was suggested to hire an outside production company. It was quickly found that a lack of interest and involvement in

the show results by a lack of interest in sales.

Our point here is all organizations need more than just meetings, get your club involved in more and we're sure you will see it grow larger in time. Till next

time good fishing and safe boating.

A person who applies for Social Security disability benefits should be certain to list all sources that could provide information about his or her medical condition, Glyn Hammons, Social Security manager in Abilene, said recently.

Very often a decision as to

whether a person is disabled can be based solely on medical reports obtained from the sources listed. If more information is needed, however, the person may be referred for a special examination or test. The Government will pay for this additional evidence and certain travel costs that may be related to it.

In any event, Hammons said, an applicant for

disability benefits can help assure that the decision on his or her claim is made as quickly as possible and is based on the most complete information available.

The Abilene Social Security office is located at 142 S. Pioneer and the telephone number is 698-1360. A free booklet, "If you become disabled," is available which gives more information about Social Security disability benefits.

Judge Scott Bailey Proclaims Farm And Ranch Safety Week

County Judge Scott Bailey has proclaimed September 20-26, 1987, as FARM AND RANCH SAFETY WEEK in Eastland County, at the request of Bob Shults, Eastland County Farm Bureau president. This year marks the 44th annual observance of National Farm Safety Week; with the theme: "FARM SAFETY MAKES GOOD SENSE."

This year, the American Farm Bureau and all state Farm Bureaus are being recognized as co-sponsors with the National Safety Council and the United States Department of Agriculture. According to Jim Mersberger, AFBF Director of Safety and Health, Farm Bureau Women's Committees and Young Farmers and Ranchers Committees across the nation have agreed to assume a leadership role in

the effort during National Farm Safety Week.

In the proclamation, Judge Bailey said, "Most accidents and work illnesses can be prevented, often by simple and inexpensive or no-cost measures." He added, "Protective equipment, used in many industries to help assure worker safety and health, equally useful on farms and ranches if always used when jobs or working conditions call for it."

The Farm and Industrial Equipment Institute has provided the FSF poster which emphasizes safe tractor starting procedures as follows: Start engine only from the operator's seat! Some tractor operators have disregarded recommended starting procedures by using a metal object (screwdriver) to short across electrical contact points on the starting motor.

This is a dangerous practice. If the operator attempts a by-pass when the transmission in gear, the tractor wheel drive could roll over him, causing serious injury or death. Avoid possible injury or death from a machine runaway by practicing these two no-cost safety rules: (1) Do not start engine by shorting across starting terminals. Machine will start in gear and move if normal starting circuitry is bypassed. (2) Start engine only from operator's seat with transmission in neutral or park. NEVER start engine while standing on ground.

It's no secret that these are difficult times for many in agriculture. And it's no secret that accidents and work-related illnesses impose steep human and economic losses that farmers and ranchers surely can't afford. Considering how little it costs to prevent accidents compared to how much it costs to have them, farm safety does indeed make good sense!

Buy safe products and take good care of them. Inspect all equipment and the facilities periodically, correcting any hazards and

making needed repairs to help avoid subpar performance, breakdowns and accidents.

Take needed precautions before starting the job. Check machinery shielding and put on the personal protective equipment appropriate for the job or working conditions. PPE is a worthy investment that could help you avoid injury or illness, also chronic health problems later on.

Be ready for medical, accident, fire and weather emergencies.

I, Scott Bailey, County Judge of Eastland County do hereby declare the week of September 20-26, 1987 as FARM AND RANCH SAFETY WEEK in Eastland County, for the following reasons:

WHEREAS, the President has proclaimed the 44th annual National Farm Safety Week (sponsored by the National Safety Council, the U. S. Department of Agriculture and the American Farm Bureau Federation); The Governor has also proclaimed the year period as Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Week; and

WHEREAS, during this week, a statewide farm and ranch accident/illness prevention education campaign is being undertaken by the Texas Farm Bureau, the Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council, the Texas Safety Association, the Texas Agriculture Extension Service and 4-H Club; the Texas Education Agency through the Texas Future Farmers and Future Homemakers of America, the Young Farmers and Young Homemakers of Texas and the Eastland County Farm Bureau with the theme, "FARM SAFETY MAKES GOOD SENSE"; and

WHEREAS, according to National Safety Council estimates, farm work accidents resulted in approximately 1,700 deaths and 120,000 disabling injuries. Many farm and ranch residents also were seriously injured or killed in home, recreation and roadway accidents. In addition, an undetermined number of farmers and farm workers were victims of agricultural work related illnesses known to cause disability and sometimes premature death. And the bill for it all approached \$5 billion, a loss the agricultural community can ill afford these days.

WHEREAS, most accidents and work illnesses can be prevented, often by simple and inexpensive or no-cost measures. Protective equipment, used in many industries to help assure worker safety and health, proves equally useful on farms and ranches if always used when jobs or working conditions call for it.

THEREFORE, I urge all those who live and work on farms or ranches to take necessary precautions to protect their safety and health on the job and off. I also urge leaders in the agricultural community to bolster safety and health efforts in your area by example and by educational programs.

Answer: Yes. The drain upon the Medicare fund is slowly exhausting the funds. The Reagan administration plans to increase the premium 48 percent. The amount deducted from Social Security, or a direct payment by some beneficiaries, is \$17.90. The premium may go to \$26.50, January, 1988. However, there is in the future, about July 1, 1988, a possible premium raise which would pay for the catastrophic portion of Medicare that Congress is proposing. The premium would be close to \$50.

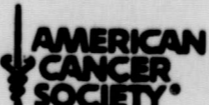

Property Tax Time Again

AUSTIN--Many local governments are in the process of adopting property tax rates--important to property owners because these taxes are the basis for revenue to fund county, city and school budgets each year.

The Texas Property Tax Code contains "truth-in-taxation" laws which ensure that taxpayers will be informed of tax increases. For example, advertisements in local newspapers notify taxpayers of public meetings they can attend to become involved in the tax rate adoption process.

The first step in the truth-in-taxation process is calculating an effective tax rate. The tax assessor for a taxing unit usually calculates this rate and publicizes it.

The effective tax rate is a key element of the truth-in-taxation process because it is a benchmark by which tax increases are measured. Generally, the effective tax rate will produce sufficient funds to retire the tax unit's debts and approximately the same revenue as last year for maintenance and operation purposes.

"The effective tax rate prevents tax bills from rising automatically after a reappraisal or due to increasing property values," said Ron Patterson, executive director of the State Property Tax Board. "In this situation, the effective rate will decrease to offset property value increases."

"Conversely, the effective rate increases when the property values in a taxing unit decrease," Patterson explained. "In 1987, many taxing units have less taxable property value than they had in 1986. Taxpayers in those units could easily see a higher effective tax rate than in the past."

The effective rate calculation uses current-year taxable property values to generate approximately the same revenue as last year.

Around August 7, or soon after, the unit's tax assessor calculates the effective tax rate using property values which the appraisal review board has approved and the chief appraiser has certified.

The assessor will publicize this rate, the calculations used to figure it and an estimate of the unit's unused funds (called its "unencumbered fund balance") from the most recent fiscal year.

After publicizing the effective tax rate, governing bodies of taxing units must decide the type and level of services on which to base their budgets and what tax rate will be needed to provide these services.

Members of the taxing unit's governing body (school board, commissioner's court, city council, board of directors) have two choices: 1) adopt the effective tax rate, plus an optional increase of up to three percent or 2) adopt a tax rate more than three percent greater than the effective tax rate.

If they decide to keep the tax rate within three percent of the effective tax rate, the governing body is not required to notify the public. If the governing body intends to raise taxes by more than three percent above the effective rate, they must publicize their intent and hold a public hearing for taxpayers to air their views on the proposed tax increase. They will do so by publishing a quarter-page newspaper ad before the public hearing and before the meeting to adopt the tax rate.

Cities and counties who are increasing taxes to provide additional indigent health care services to their citizens will use a special quarter-page newspaper advertisement specifying the percentage of increase needed for these services.

(FOR TAXING UNITS PUBLISHING ADS AFTER AUGUST 30, 1987: These quarter-page newspaper advertisements will include additional information for taxpayers. New legislation passed in the 1987 regular session of the legislature requires the governing body to disclose how the proposed tax increase will affect an average home in the taxing unit.

In the advertisement, the taxing unit will compare for 1986 and 1987: appraised and

taxable value of an average home in the taxing units, general homestead exemptions available, proposed tax rate and the percentage of increase and proposed taxes.)

If the governing body adopts a tax rate which exceeds the effective rate by more than eight percent, voters in the taxing unit can petition for an election to roll back the tax increase.

After a successful election, any taxing unit other than a school district would have its tax rate reduced immediately to eight percent above the effective tax rate. A school district would have its tax rate limited to the eight percent level in the following tax year.

New legislation has extended the rollback protection for increased indigent health care costs. Taxing units who are budgeting for additional costs will have the amount above the eight percent threshold protected from a rollback election. In addition, those funds will be dedicated to only indigent health care.

The property tax system in Texas gives all property owners several opportunities throughout the year to influence the amount of property tax they pay.

"Open meetings and budget hearings allow taxpayers to express opinions about how their tax dollars are spent," Patterson said. "Appraisal review board hearings give them the opportunity to make sure that their property appraisals are fair compared to other property in the taxing unit. And, truth in taxation and the rollback election provision allow taxpayers a say about tax rate proposals that may increase tax bills."

More details information is available for taxpayers through a pamphlet called "Taxpayers, Rights, Remedies, Responsibilities." Copies are available at local appraisal district offices or from the State Property Tax Board in Austin.

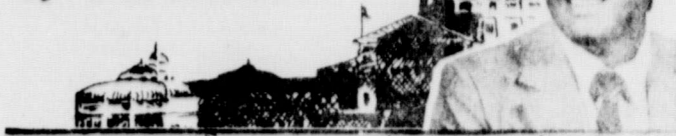

CAPITOL UPDATE

Let's shift gears this week and talk about an issue that has gained some notoriety in the state as a result of the appeals court's releasing David Port, the young man accused of murdering a female postal worker in Houston, Texas. You will likely remember the case if for no other reason than because young Mr. Port's mother and father were held in jail for a significant period of time because they refused to testify against him. At any rate, Port was convicted on the basis of an oral confession made to a police officer, with only himself and the officer present and that Port later refused to repeat or confirm. Texas is the only state in the union that does not now accept oral confessions.

Now, before you react on an abdominal level, I want you to think about it. We are talking about a situation where the only evidence that convicts you comes from a law enforcement officer with no additional corroboration or support, such as a confession leading to the finding of a murder weapon, as an example.

I am advised that Texas is "old-fashioned," "living in the dark ages," and several

other things that I can't repeat in public print.

At the same time, let me point out to you that in several other areas of the world the uncorroborated word of a state police agent can convict you. Examples of such places are the Soviet Union and, closer to home, El Salvador.

Now, before the law enforcement community rises up in mass against me, let me emphatically state that I am not saying police officers in general are lacking in integrity or trustworthiness. I think that is not really the point.

The trust is that Texas has long been a bastion of personal freedom (the law we are talking about has been on the books since 1904) even among our sister states and what I need to know if my actions are to be truly representative of you, the people, is do you want to do away with the idea that an uncorroborated oral confession made to a law enforcement officer is insufficient to support a conviction for a criminal act?

It's a tough decision and once you get past your initial emotional reaction, it certainly provides you with some weighty material to think about.

Record Of All Government Meetings Important

One of the major foundations of our democratic system of government is the people's right to know what their government is doing. Since there is no perfect government, an open government allows defects to be pointed out and corrected.

Government is the servant of the people. Although the people have delegated certain authority to the government, the people have not given public officials the right to decide what is good for the people to know and what is not good for them to know.

The Texas Open Meetings Act protects the people's right to know by requiring public bodies to meet in public. However, there are exceptions to the Act which allow closed sessions for discussion of lawsuits against a governmental body, personnel matters, and potential sales or purchases of real estate by a governmental body.

The Act was improved significantly recently by an amendment passed by the regular session of the Texas Legislature.

The amendment requires a governing body to tape-record its closed meetings, or to keep an agenda of the proceedings certified by its presiding officer.

The recordings are sealed and kept from public disclosure unless the governmental body decides there no longer is a reason to keep the tapes sealed or a district judge determines that the discussions in closed session were illegal and the tapes should be made public.

The amendment allows a \$1,000 fine and 180 days in jail for a person who illegally exposes to the public a sealed recording of a closed meeting.

There are legitimate reasons for a closed meeting: the privacy of personnel matters; the importance of keeping legal strategy secret; and the protection taxpayers dollars from the negative effects of private real estate specu-

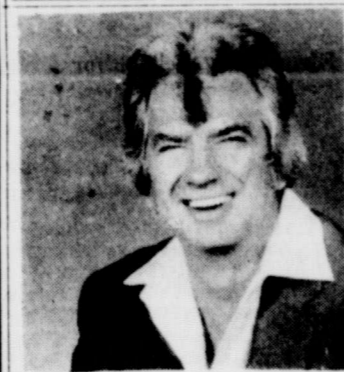
tion when news of a government purchase of sale spreads. Such closed meetings benefit the citizenry.

However, without some record of the discussion in closed meetings, the public is completely unprotected from possible illegal, secret, self-dealing by public officials who would illegitimately claim an exception to the open meetings law.

The fact that a record exists and someone can be held accountable for illegal discussions is a good incentive for public officials to keep public matters public unless they fall within the specific exceptions.

I encourage public officials to conduct all public business in open meetings unless it is perfectly clear that an exception is applicable and it is in the public's best interest to close the meeting.

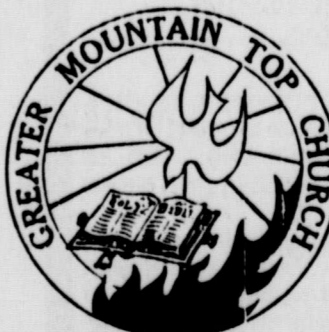

Cisco Firemen Extinguish Two Grass Fires

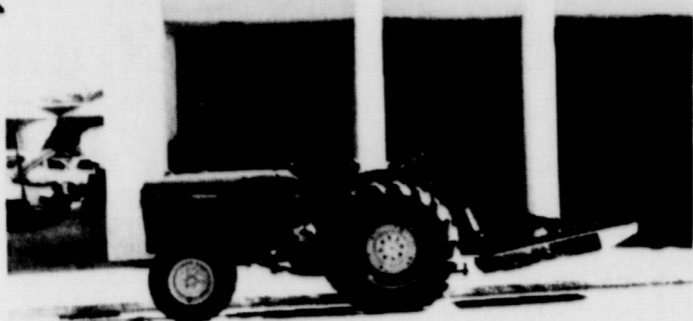

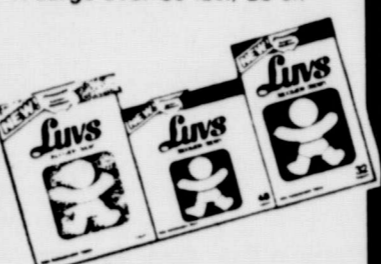
