New Lights On I-20 Should Be In Place By Next Summer According To Letter From State Of Texas

As soon as the stop signs comes in, they will be put up on the corner of Avenue G and West 17th Street in Cisco, according to city manager Mike Moore at the regular meeting of the city council. The meeting was held last Tuesday at the council chambers.

In the city manager report to the council Mike Moore reported that the state of Texas sent him the plans for the lighting on I-20. Mike said there will be a total of 23 lights in Cisco and it will be a \$300,000 job.

He said the work should be finished and the Interstate lights should be up and completed by next summer.

Mike also told the council that the city is seal coating the road on Ave. L up to 4th

Street. He said the whole town needs paving, but as of now the city is trying to tie in the new paving with the other pavements. He said the city will keep going until the weather gets too cold.

He also reported that West 14th needs to be built up. He said it is a flooding area, and it will have to be built up before paving can begin there. Mike said that 14th is one of the major roads in Cisco. It is one of the roads that goes from the west side to the east side of town.

Mike also said the tax statements are prepared and ready to be sent out.

Mike also reported to the council that the water treatment project is basically finished. He said the grass if being grown under warran-

ty. Mike suggested that the council members plan to meet early one evening, and ride out to the wastewater treatment plant to see the progress of the work that has been done there.

In the financial report, Mike Moore said the City of Cisco has expended 83 per-

cent of the budget for the 1986-87 year. He also said the City of Cisco has received 79 percent of the budget revenue as of August 31, 1987.

Mike told the council members that the city swimming pool will need painting and some repair work next year. Mike said the pool is

being run very well and he is pleased with it.

The city council members approved the second reading on the four way stop sign and on the assignment of TCI Growth Inc., to TCI Cablevision of Texas.

They also approved and passed the annual budget for the Eastland County

Cooperative Dispatch.

Those attending the meeting were councilmen John Muller, Vernetta Pierce, Roy Dennis, Arlie Whitley and Allen Masters, city manager Mike Moore and city secretary Ginger Johnson.

"Wheel For Life" Bike Ride Will Be Oct. 3

St. Jude Children's Research Hospital officials have announced that Manning Davis will chair the Hospital's "Wheel For Life" bike ride in Cisco. The Bike-A-Thon will be held Saturday, Oct. 3, weather permitting. It will begin at 9 a.m. and end at 3 p.m. All ages are encouraged to participate.

Entry forms may be picked up from Susan Watts or Mr. Davis. Prizes will be given to the top three money collectors. First prize is \$25, second prize, \$15, and third prize, \$10. A T-shirt will be given for riders collecting \$25 or more, and a T-shirt

and barrel tote bag will be given to those raising \$75 or more.

This "Wheels for Life" bike ride will raise funds to support the Hospital's battle against childhood cancer and other illnesses being studied there. Founded in 1962 by entertainer Danny Thomas, St. Jude Hospital has become the world's largest center for the study of childhood cancer and is the only institution dedicated solely to the treatment and study of catastrophic childhood diseases. The hospital is non-sectarian and interracial.

In addition to direct treat-

ment of patients throughout the United States and 29 foreign countries, St. Jude has provided the world's doctors with the best methods of treating their own young cancer patients. This life-saving knowledge is given freely and with no charge to any other hospital or private physician.

St. Jude Hospital's dramatic progress has been made possible primarily by voluntary contributions raised through events such as the "Wheels for Life" bike rides organized by concerned citizens all over America.

The trail for the bike ride will begin at the corner of East 21st and Beech Street. The riders will go south on Beech to the I-20 Access Road and then turn East till

they reach the paved crossover that goes from I-20 to old Hwy. 80. They will ride over to old 80 then back toward Cisco and up the old brick road. (East 16th Street) and then back to East 21st and Beech Street.

Mr. Davis said the ride will be about 14-15 miles long. There will be stations along the route to pick up the riders who don't want to ride the entire distance.

If weather does not permit the ride to be held on Oct. 3, it will be rescheduled for Oct. 10.

The Cisco Junior College Wrangler Men have begun pre-season workouts in preparation for the season opener against Western Texas in Snyder on November 2.

Coach Dan Montgomery, in his fifth year as Wrangler coach, welcomed back five lettermen from the 1986-87 squad which tied for fourth place in the Northern Texas JUCO Conference standings. Thomas Miller, a 6-6 forward from Killeen, is the only full-time starter returning, but the other four lettermen saw a lot of playing time and all started some games. Miller averaged 12.9 points and 5.9 rebounds last season.

The other four returnees are: Tony Gould, a 6-1 guard from Wichita Falls; Sherman Ray, a 6-4 guard from Amarillo; Darren Nelson, a 6-2 guard from Gonzales; and Todd Mannon, a 6-5 forward from Truth or Consequences, N.M.

Coach Montgomery feels that he signed 12 quality recruits who will contribute greatly to the program. They are: Ronald Ateman, a 6-4 forward from Garland;

Mark Benson, a 6-1 guard from Fort Worth; Stan Burns, a 6-3 guard from Paducah; Roman Blake, a 6-2 guard from Shreveport, La.; Mark Chambers, a 6-4 forward from Fort Worth; Tony Craig, a 6-3 guard from Dallas; Phillip King, a 6-8 center from Fort Worth; Russell Miller, a 6-6 forward from Clute; Patrick Smith, a 6-6 center from Houston; Eddie Venzant, a 6-2 guard from Saline, La.; Adrian Williams, a 6-5 forward from Houma, La.; and Tyrone Williams, a 6-5 forward from Shreveport, La.

State District Judge Earl Conner Dies Tuesday

EASTLAND-Retired State District Judge Earl Conner, Jr., of Eastland passed away Tuesday, September 22, 1987 at Humana Hospital in Abilene at the age of 82. Services were held at 2:00 p.m. Friday in the First United Methodist Church in Eastland, with Rev. Wesley Howard, Jr., officiating. Burial was held in the Eastland Cemetery under the direction of Bakker Funeral Home.

He was born the son of Earl, Sr. and Ave Conner, November 29, 1904, in Eastland and graduated from Eastland High School, the University of Texas and the University of Texas School of Law. While at University of Texas he was captain of the Longhorn track team and a member of Clyde Littlefield's outstan-

ding distance relay teams. In 1930 he began to practice law with his father. In 1934 he married Edna Day. He served numerous terms as County/District Attorney of Eastland County beginning in the 1930's through 1965. In May of 1968 he was appointed Judge of the 91st District Court and served until his retirement in November of 1979.

He was a member of the First United Methodist Church and the Men's Fellowship Bible Class of Eastland and a member of the Eastland County Bar Association, the Texas Bar Association and the Mosiah Shrine Temple. He was recipient of the Eastland Chamber of Commerce

library and receive help from the teacher of that class. This is mandatory for all failing students. Students who are not failing may go either to UIL enrichment, class meetings or take a break.

More credits are required of high school students. A student may either be on a regular graduation plan or on an advanced plan. More English courses are required, and an advanced student must take more courses than one on a regular graduation plan. The plans are as follows:

Fine Arts: Regular High School Program-0; Advanced High School Program-1.

Band Boosters To Meet Mon. At School


Cisco Band Boosters will meet Monday, Sept. 28, at 7 p.m. at the high school band hall, according to an announcement by Ron Rhodes, president.

Cooperation Keeps Down Expenses, Says Callahan County Judge

A good place to get a general picture of Callahan County events is right in the office of County Judge Mack Kniffen, in the Courthouse in Baird.

I hadn't had the opportunity to talk to Judge Kniffen for several years, so stopped by to learn of current developments.

On the way up to his office I couldn't help but notice how beautifully kept the Callahan County Courthouse is. Everything is gleaming - the marble, tile, even the oak paneling and wainscoting.

Judge Kniffen's office, like other rooms around him, was an impressive place. I found the Judge was looking over the County Budget, which was expected to run around \$1.2 million for the next year. A rather modest figure for a county these days, I thought.

Also under consideration was a Road and Bridge Tax for the County. Most counties in the state have long ago latched onto this means of raising more revenue - Callahan was one of the few to withstand it.

"The main reason we've been able to keep the expenditures down in this county is by the cooperation of all County officials and personnel," Judge Kniffen said.

"I have a great group of people here - they have made my work much easier."

The Law Enforcement and jail situation is one example, the Judge continued.

"Sheriff Bill Skinner and his Deputies and Jailers have saved us much expense by the quality of their work. The work at the Jail has kept

a 90-yr.-old building in compliance with the State Jail Standards Commission. As long as we don't have to build a new Jail we won't have any big raise in taxes."

The Judge said that in December he will have completed nine years in this office in Callahan County. Before that he served with the Texas Department of Public Safety for 30 years. He began his career with the DPS in Littlefield, but was stationed most of the rest of the time in Snyder and Abilene.

When he talked about his work as County Judge, Kniffen remarked that some people thought all a County Judge was supposed to do was try cases in County Court. That was only part of his job.

Callahan County was one of the few that had kept their County Court and Attorney, the Judge said. This was a system that had worked well for the county, and he hoped it would always be retained.

Some other duties listed for the County Judge were responsibility for County finances, presiding at the Commissioners Court meeting, probating wills, serving on the County Historical Commission, speaking at public affairs, etc. The Judge also makes decisions in certain areas of mental health and indigent health care. His Secretary, Alene Whitt, is Coordinator for indigent health care in Callahan County.

"In the past few years our County has come through drouth and high water, an oil and farm recession," the

Judge said. "Both have leveled out, I think. The County is experiencing some growth, especially in the Eula Community, southwest of here. People have moved out of Abilene to live on acreages there."

Judge Kniffen said that he was especially proud of the long-time business of the area, which have added much to county stability. He mentioned the Bank in Baird, which celebrated its 100th Anniversary in 1985. He also spoke of the Callahan County Star, a newspaper which has served Baird and the county for almost 100 years.

"I appreciate the Editor and staff members and the job they do with this paper," he said. "Towns are compared by the type of newspapers they put out."

Before I left his office I asked Judge Kniffen more about the cooperation between local people and their government, and why he thought it had worked well here.

"County government," he answered, "is often a public reflection of the type of people in a county. Our people are generally stable, hard-working, informed citizens."

"That's one thing that helps me keep going - I know that they deserve good County government."

Postscript:
On Monday, Aug. 24 the Callahan County Commissioners Court finalized their budget for the year. It was set at \$1,222,000, with a tax rate of .2543 cents per \$100 valuation. Callahan County has a population estimated at 11,000.

Letters To The Editor

Editor,

I make this appeal to you as a fellow member of the press. Our business is communication - bringing to the public information on issues, both national and local, that affect their well-being.

The community of Comanche, Texas, is being held hostage by the Medicare system. The Comanche Hospital is reportedly one of the last wooden-structure hospitals in the United States. As such, Medicare is threatening to refuse renewal of its standards waiver allowing Medicare-reimbursed treatment to continue. The withdrawal of Medicare certification would make closure of the community's hospital a virtual certainty.

A refusal such as this would come at an especially bad time due to the fact that several small hospitals in the area have already closed, making the Comanche hospital that much more important to local and nearby residents. An estimated 70% of the patients using the Comanche facility rely on Medicare assistance.

But our problems with Medicare did not begin with building standards. They began with Medicare's unrealistic reimbursement policies. Unable to make up the shortfall in funds, the hospital slowly lost money until it was financially impossible to adequately maintain or rebuild the facility to Medicare's specifications.

That is where Comanche Hospital joins hundreds of other rural hospitals in trouble. And apparently the United States government does not care. Requests for help to congressmen bring no positive response. It would seem that rural areas, containing fewer potential votes, are not worthy of attention.

In order to bring this problem to the attention of the American people, and in order to buy time for the Comanche hospital and

others in similar circumstances, I have sent out urgent appeals for aid to three foreign governments - the governments of the Soviet Union, the People's Republic of China, and Japan. I have also requested the assistance of six foreign manufacturing firms.

Making the public realize what is happening to the health care facilities in rural America and bringing about change in the government's policies is significant undertaking. However, if it takes a sensational act such as requesting aid from foreign governments to publicize the situation, I am willing to do so. I ask for your assistance in bringing this news to your readers and listeners. Regardless of where they live, the government's health care policies are important to them.

Thank you for your consideration of this request. I look forward to your reply.

The leaflet contains regulations on the taking of furbearers and the purchase, sale, importation and exportation of their pelts. In Texas, animals classified as furbearers are badgers, beavers, fox, weasel, mink, muskrat, nutria, opossum, otter, raccoon, ring-tailed cat, skunk, and civet cat.

No teal spotted so far.

Granbury: Water clear, 78 degrees, normal level; black bass good to 4 1/2 pounds on black and chartreuse worms in the creek channels; striper slow; crappie good to 20 fish per string on minnows and Flea Fly jigs; white bass school late afternoon off the points; catfish slow. No teal so far; doves moved out after second weekend of season.

Hubbard Creek: Water murky from rains, 82 degrees, 18 inches slow; black bass excellent to 4 1/2 pounds on motoroil worms, buzzy baits; hybrid striper good to 8 pounds on shiny top waters; crappie good with

limits fairly easy on minnows; white bass good on crappie jigs to slabs to 30 fish per string; catfish slow.

Possum Kingdom: Water clear, 82 degrees; 13 1/2 feet low for repairs to dam; black bass good schooling with most too small to keep, some to 6 pounds on topwaters; striper good to 10 pounds with a good number around 10 inches on slabs; crappie good in crappie houses as well as in the brush to 25 fish per string to 2 pounds on minnows; white bass hard to find, but once located fish are plentiful on slabs; catfish good to 20 fish per string on rod and reel in baited holes. No teal ducks spotted; dove fairly plentiful.

Proctor: Water clear; 82 degrees; normal level; black bass fairly good to 6 pounds on purple worms with white tail; striper fair to 6 pounds also on crawfish; crappie really good but small with many limits on minnows; catfish fair to 4 pounds on shad baited trotlines.

Spence: Water clear; 78 degrees; 18 feet low; black bass fair to 2 1/2 pounds Lunker Lures; striper slow; crappie good to 1 1/2 pounds with some limits on minnows; white bass fair to 15 fish per string on slabs; catfish fair. Mourning dove plentiful in the area.

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
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Area News Briefs

It will be a busy day - that's also County Fair-Parade Day - but Soccer has already registered some 250 players from every town in the county, so it's going to be a busy season.


A major workday is set for Saturday, Sept. 26, when construction on the new concession stand-restroom facility will get underway.


