Dear Betty Crocker

Q. What causes bar cookies to be doughy in the center of pan?

A. Underbaking is the problem. If you've used a pan that's smaller than recommended, the batter will be thick and will take longer to bake. Test bars by the doneness test suggested in the recipe before removing them from oven.

Q. If hollandaise sauce curdles as it cooks, can it be saved?

A. Yes! Add about one tablespoon boiling water per 3/4 cup hollandaise and beat vigorously with a hand beater until sauce is smooth.

Q. How can fresh herbs be substituted for dried?

A. Add three times more finely chopped fresh herbs than amount of dried herbs specified.

"ALWAYS ABOUNDING"

"Therefore, my beloved brethren, be ye steadfast, unmovable, *always abounding* in the work of the Lord, inasmuch as ye know that your labour is not in vain in the Lord" (1 Cor. 15:58).

We should note carefully that the Apostle Paul here addresses only his brethren in Christ, those who have truly been born again—born into the family of God.

Furthermore, he sent this appeal to Christians

everywhere: To "all that in every place call upon the name of Jesus Christ our Lord" (1 Cor. 1:2). He knew that there is a tendency among all believers to be tempted to abandon the work of the Lord through discouragement or carelessness, so he pleads with us to be "steadfast" and "unmovable," reminding us that our labour is "not in vain in the Lord."

PROCLAMATION

BY THE COUNTY JUDGE OF Eastland COUNTY
TO ALL TO WHOM THESE PRESENTS SHALL COME:
I, Scott Bailey, County Judge of Eastland County, do hereby declare the week of October 4-10, 1987 as FIRE PREVENTION WEEK in Eastland County, for the following reasons:
WHEREAS, on October 9, 1871, Mrs. O'Leary's cow kicked over a lamp and the city of Chicago burned. Fire Prevention Day was first sponsored by the Fire Marshals Association of North America on October 9, 1911. In 1925, President Warren G. Harding first proclaimed the week containing October 9th as National Fire Prevention Week. Ever since, the fire service of the United States has worked this week to highlight it's growing efforts of educating the public in the prevention of fire, and
WHEREAS, the National Fire Protection Association, the official sponsor of FIRE PREVENTION WEEK for more than 50 years, has selected this theme for 1987 emphasis to be "Play It Safe...Plan Your Escape" and
WHEREAS, according to NFPA, in 1986, 5,850 people died in fires, a 5.4% decrease from the year before when 6,185 people died. Home fires killed 4,655 people, which association officials called "a modest decrease" of 4.7% from 1985, and
WHEREAS, although three out of four homes in the United States have one or more smoke detectors in them, it is believed that one-third to one-half are not maintained properly, or are deliberately disabled to limit disturbance alarms. Consequently, the U.S. Fire Administration says that 80 percent of all fire deaths take place in residences not equipped with working smoke detectors; and
WHEREAS, NBC television, working with NFPA, is dedicating a prime time television show, "Valerie", to the importance of home fire drills. They will be encouraging a nationwide home fire drill in this program. Schools across the United States have received instructor's guides which NBC developed with the help of NFPA. These guides will help schools take advantage of this home exercise. The show provides a natural tie in for everyone and represents a major effort for this television network. By promoting this first time program in your community, you can be a genuine part of this National FIRE PREVENTION WEEK event. The drill is scheduled for Monday, October 5th. Check your local newspapers and TV guides for the scheduled broadcast of the show which will include a nationwide home fire drill sample for all viewers. Use the remaining days of FPW to focus on all the important aspects of home escape plans, particularly smoke detector maintenance and installation. FPW is an important event. Each of us can make an impact on our communities. Let's get everyone involved in exit drills.

Attention Deficit Disorder Haunts One In Ten Children

The following is a reprint from the *FOCUS on Abilene*, August 7, 1987: Hyperactivity or Attention Deficit Disorder?

Your child's constant fidgeting impatience, and impulsiveness may not be what has commonly been labeled hyperactivity.

Instead, doctors have discovered that many children with these and other symptoms suffer from Attention Deficit Disorder (ADD). And often children who don't mind their parents, who don't do well in school, and who play rough may have ADD.

Some very recognizable symptoms are: difficulty in remaining seated, being easily distracted, trouble waiting for turns at games; losing things; blurting out answers to questions constant talking and the appearance of not paying attention to what has been said.

Hyperactivity. Hunsucker believes, is a sub category of ADD. "A lot of kids can have attention disorder, but don't bounce off the wall," that he says, is motor hyperactivity. But there's also mental hyperactivity where the child cannot concentrate.

Attention Deficient Disorder: the illness is a relatively recent medical discovery, but the subject isn't without controversy. Hunsucker is concerned that many physicians are discounting ADD as too general of a diagnosis "I'm amazed at how many doctors believe ADD is too broad of a category and that it covers too much area."

"The insinuation is that it's not that important." While some medical professionals may not believe it's "important," Hunsucker points to research showing children with ADD are more likely to end up in illegal activities.

The correlation between ADD's and the tendency toward criminal behavior, he said, is due to impulsive behavior. He said, "Most of us have a gap between thought and action. They (ADD's children) with concentration deficiency don't necessarily lack normal intelligence. "They are usually of average or high intelligence," said Hunsucker.

"Treatment is easy, but it's difficult to diagnose," said Hunsucker. While some disorders can be detected through blood tests, detecting ADD "relies on experience to judge." The greatest fear of parents when it comes to treating ADD, Hunsucker said is that it requires medication.

"Most parents think we prescribe medication to dope them up so the parents can handle the child," Hunsucker added that parents are often worried their child will end up a drug addict. The fact is, he said, the child benefits from medication. "It allows them to concentrate better, it gives them better impulse control, and they do better in school."

One child Hunsucker treated was asked if he noticed any changes since he started taking medication. His answer was: "Yeah, my mother doesn't yell at me as much."

A bad situation that perpetuates between parent and child when the child goes undiagnosed and untreated is a breakdown in the relationship. "What happens," said Hunsucker, "is the parents scream and yell more than normal. That's the only way to get through to them."

The parents ends up feeling guilty, and the child's self-image is diminished because they are punished more than other kids. "Ironically," Hunsucker said, "research shows these kids have a high tolerance for pain. That's why spanking doesn't get through."

As for the potential of becoming a drug addict through the medication for ADD, Hunsucker says, "Research has shown that the opposite is true. (ADD's patients) are less likely than normal children to become addicted to drugs." Hunsucker suggests that ADD's children who don't get treatment gravitate toward drug abuse "in search of their medication."

Several teachers Hunsucker has conferred with agree that the medication has made a definite difference in classroom performance.

Hunsucker is quick to agree that not all children who have ADD can be treated successfully. Research has shown that 20 percent of children treated for ADD still do not respond to the medication. But, Hunsucker adds, the "odds are still with them."

The trick is to catch it early in a child's development. If a child is over 12 years old the success rate lowers. "You can start recognizing it at three years," said Hunsucker.

Medication alone doesn't improve a child's behavior. Behavior modification is also encouraged when treating an ADD's child. "This child needs more structure," said Hunsucker, "and that might mean putting charts all over the house. You have to be very specific."

He also suggests implementing a reward system for good behavior.

His interest in the subject developed as he was practicing child psychology. "I would see the same children over and over and noticed the kids never really got better." He figured, "either I wasn't good at what I did or there was some other reason..." So he started digging.

Eventually he discovered diagnoses may have been wrong. Through aggressive

work with children he started to get results. It was known that the disorder was genetic.

Some of Hunsucker's discoveries are: "Children with learning disabilities are a high risk group, between 60-80 percent of these children have ADD. "The long term behavior problems of children do not usually result solely because of circumstances.

"Adopted children, four times as often as children in a normal population, have ADD. Hunsucker's "adopted children" theory developed after observing the parent who gives the child up for adoption. "It's not because of the loss of bonding," he said. Rather, he suggests, it is because of the lack of responsibility the parent has for her own life.

For four years Hunsucker has been involved in research for a multi-volume book, the first of which will be published later in the month. The first volume, he said, will describe the disorder, how to diagnose it, and how families should deal with it.

"I'm writing the book so people can challenge their doctor if they don't believe they are getting a proper diagnosis," he said. "So often it's overlooked."

One of the most discouraging things he has seen through his years in practice is the parents' suffering when the child isn't treated for ADD.

The parents may seek help for years, but they get blamed when nothing happens. "And people ask what are the parents doing wrong?"

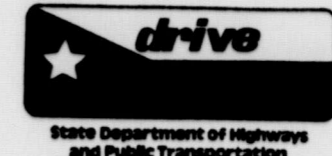

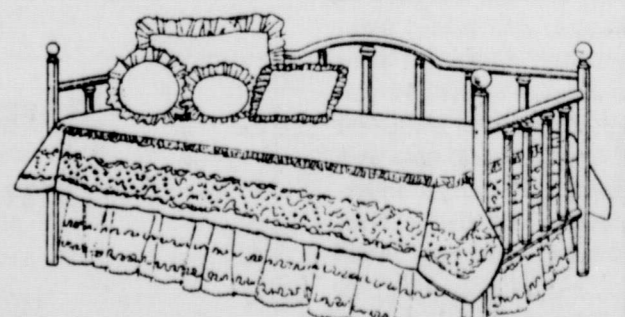
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Commissioners Hold Meeting - Jail Repair Underway

The Eastland County Commissioners held a regular meeting Monday, Sept. 28 with all Commissioners present. County Judge Scott Bailey presided.

A report on the jail standards and jail inspection report and compliance was the first item on the agenda. Billy Bacon, Comm. of Pet. 4, stated there were 19 inmates in the county jail, and none housed in jails outside

the county.

He also said that the new jail light fixtures were in, and that repairs are working on installation of the new inter-com system. This should bring the building into compliance with directives of the Texas State Jail Standards Commission.

Judge Bailey reported to the Commissioners that he had received a letter from Marcia Carr, Administrator

of Eastland Memorial Hospital, saying that Eastland Memorial offers to be a mandated provider for indigent patients not living in a hospital district.

This would be for both inpatient and outpatient services. Judge Bailey indicated that the letter did not address the cost of Doctors or medicines for these patients.

After some discussion the

Commissioners agreed that they would rather leave the Indigent Health Care arrangements on a case-by-case basis, with no one hospital specified.

The Commissioners also discussed the rising cost of health care insurance for county employees. Reports were that heavy claims on these policies had brought up the costs. A motion was approved to continue coverage with Prudential Insurance Co., with \$100 deductible policies.

Also approved was a motion to amend the budget to allow for jail repair and out-of-county prisoner care.

Money will be transferred from the Reserve to General Fund to pay for these items.

A Computer Contract for equipment and service from Apollo Data Services of Odessa was approved. This cost will be \$3,367 per month.

The Commissioners adjourned from their regular session in Memory of District Judge Earl Conner Jr., who died last week.

"Judge Conner served Eastland County for 35 years," Judge Bailey said to the Court. "Twenty-five of those years were as a Criminal District Attorney and County Attorney - an advisor of this Court. He will be missed."

Judge Bailey asked Viola Payne of the Eastland County Newspapers to read the poem "Crossing The Bar" in honor of this respected Judge.

After adjournment of the regular session the Commissioners met in an Executive Session with District Attorney Emory Walton.

Selective Service Registration Required For USPSEmployment

The federal government's largest employer - the Postal Service - recently announced Selective Service registration requirements for employment. Under the new guidelines, a young man must prove that he has registered with Selective Service before being eligible for appointment to a position in the Postal Service.

This requirement follows the Thurmond/Montgomery Amendment to the Fiscal Year 1986 Department of Defense Authorization Act. The Amendment prohibits a young man who is required to register from being appointed to a position in an executive agency of the federal government unless he has registered. The intent of the

legislation was to ensure that all men required by law to register do so.

Rep. Gerald Solomon (R-NY), a strong supporter of Selective Service, introduced legislation in July requiring registration as a prerequisite to employment with the Postal Service. Technically the Postal Service was not included in the original Thurmond/Montgomery Amendment because they are not an executive agency of the federal government. Commenting on the legislation, Mr. Solomon said, "If a young man is going to accept the benefits of this country then he should be ready and willing to accept the responsibilities as well. Registration is one of these responsibilities.

As of mid-August, all young men who are 18 through 25 years of age must show proof of registration before being considered for a position with the Postal Service. Those young men who do not reach 18 until after appointment will be asked to submit proof within 30 days

of their 18th birthday. Men who fail to provide proof of registration will be considered "not available" and will receive no further consideration for employment.

Along with federal employment, Selective Service registration has been linked to federal student aid and job training benefits. Many states also require registration as a prerequisite for state student aid, entrance to a state supported college or university and state employment.

All young men must register with Selective Service at any local post office within 30 days of their 18th birthday. Failure to register is a felony punishable by up to 5 years in prison and/or up to a \$250,000 fine.

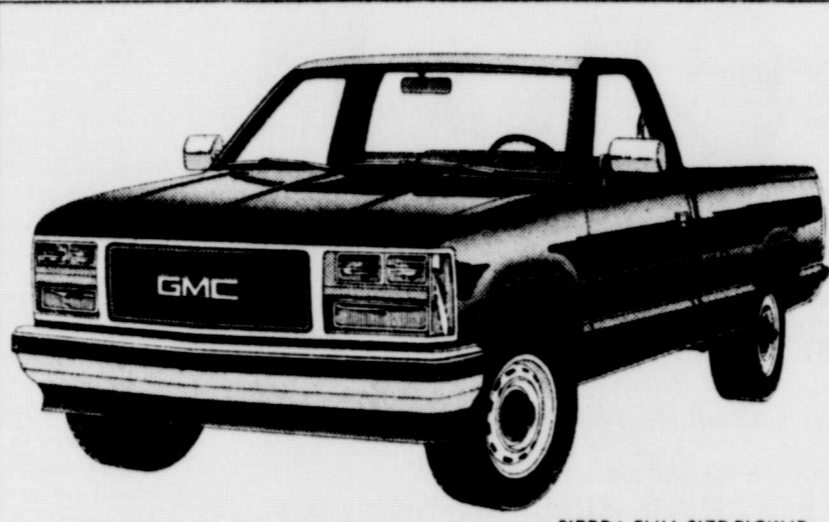

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Majestic Opening Huge Success- Band Concert Stunning

The Opening Night of the Majestic Theatre was an event Eastland had worked for all year long - and no one was disappointed.

For last Saturday evening was one of those star-crossed times when everything turns out as planned.

Woody Herman's world-class band gave a rousing concert to a large, enthusiastic crowd. Also admired was the authentic restoration of the building.

The vintage theatre seemed to glow with renewed life, displaying interior colors of spice, cinnamon and teal. The neon sign outside glowed too - throwing light all across the Square. And the paintings of Jan Herring displayed in the messanine, were quite at home in this setting of elegance and beauty.

John Berry, President of the Eastland Fine Arts Association, spoke briefly at the beginning of the program.

"Eastland, You've done good," he began. He went on to say what a privilege it had been to work on such a project. "We've proved that when we want something we can do it," he continued.

Mr. Berry said that so many people had worked on the restoration giving time, energy and talents, that he

would not try to name them all at this time. Most are listed in a souvenir program booklet arranged by Virginia Russell, Nettie Wilson and Gary Ford, he said.

But he did mention several people and groups who assisted: Earl and Billy Bradley of EBAA Iron, who "made things easier right from the start," the City Commission, who "Accepted the package (of purchasing the building) when we put it together," and Dr. John Whittington of Ft. Worth, who made a "very generous contribution and the Hobzelle Foundation for a gift of \$25,000.

Special recognition was also given to young people from the Key Club and Beta Club of the High School. Virginia Russell was cited for her help with the restoration, particularly the arranging of the stage. Berry also expressed appreciation for the large flower arrangements on each side of the stage.

Frank Tiberi, filling in as

leader of Woody Herman's Band, "The Thundering Herd," stepped forward to introduce the fifteen band members at the beginning of the concert. He said that the Theatre was beautiful, and hoped the band could launch it in a fitting way. He told how much the Band members admired Woody Herman, and how illness had kept him away from this Concert. He mentioned Herman's special friendship with Mr. and Mrs. Phil Hewett, Eastland High School Band leaders.

Then the Band sailed into an old Duke Ellington number: "It don't Mean A Thing If It Ain't Got That Swing." This was a nostalgic piece, but played in a fresh manner, with new improvisations. This freshness and energy carried through to all the pieces.

Many types of music followed this swing piece, displaying the varied talents of the Band. These are young musicians and creatives. They used trumpets, trombones, sax-

aphones, flugelhorn, a flute, bells, and a rhythm section of piano, drums, and acoustic and electric bass.

Sometimes the music blended - sometimes it sizzled, and often there were pleasing arrangements of solo work by various band members. Sometimes there was a Big Band Sound - sophisticated "big time stuff" urban music. Then there was Afro-Cuban, and progressive jazz. The intricate counterpoint of "The Four Brothers" and the tenor sax solo of "Early Autumn" were particularly

effective.

Perhaps the arrangement of Copeland's "Fanfare for The Common Man" called for the most improvisation of any of the arrangements. It includes a flute solo and bells and electric bass.

There was a lot of applause during the Concert and a standing ovation at the end. The audience noticed how very well the sound carried in this old Theatre, which was originally built as a music hall and stage for live performances. Several people remarked that modern builders could take

some lessons from the acoustics in this place.

After the concert Frank Tiberi also remarked about how well the building carried sound. "The acoustics sounded good to the Band members upstage while we were playing," he said. "This is one beautiful place - I know the town is proud of it. I hope we'll be invited back to play here again sometime."

After leaving Eastland the Band was going on to play a concert in Austin, then El Paso and Ventura, California.

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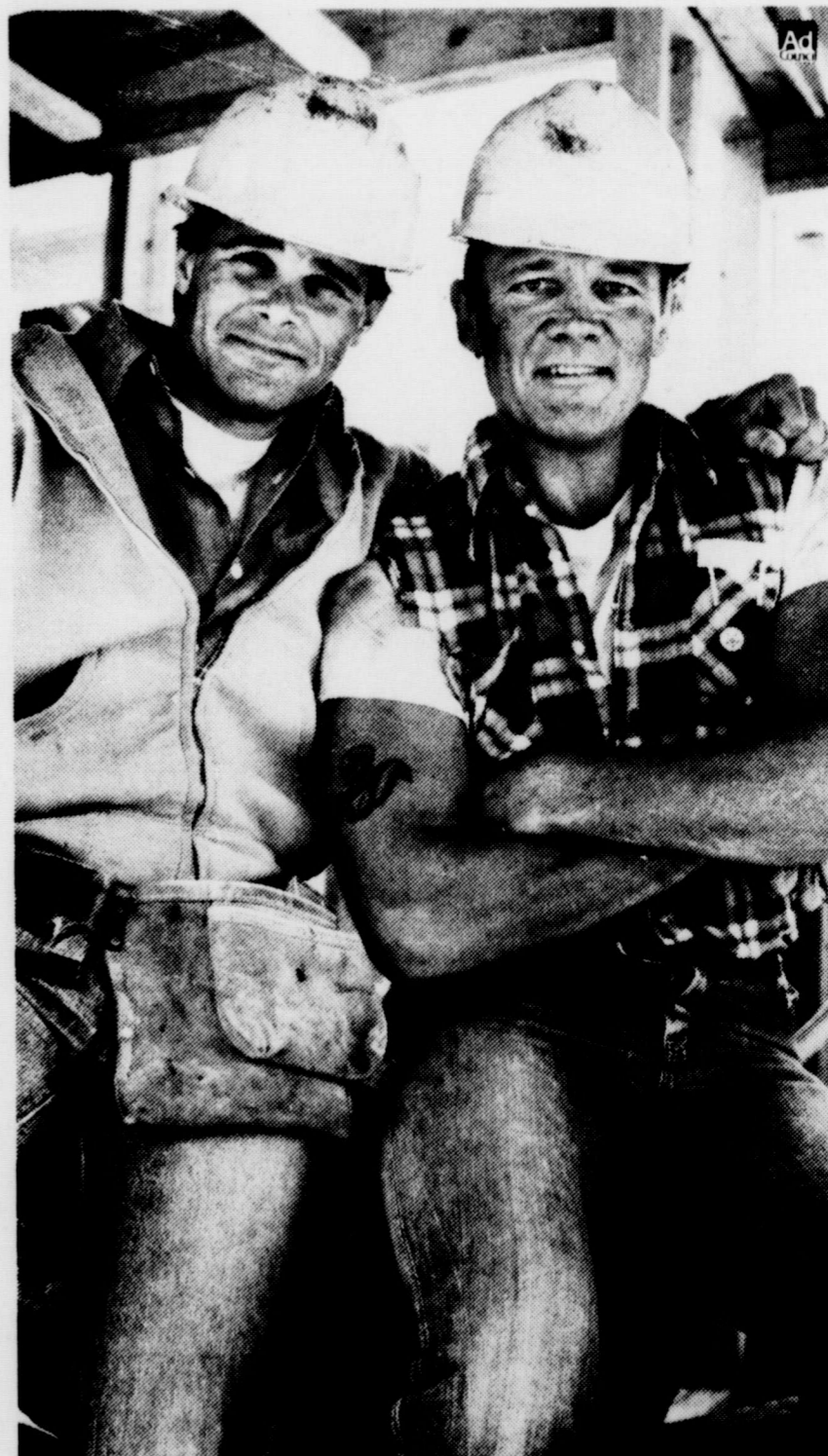
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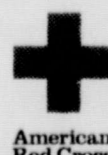

Roy Cartee Presided At AARP 3-Day Workshop

Roy Cartee of Cisco presided at sessions of intensive three-day workshop conducted by the American Association of Retired Persons Health Advocacy Services and Texas Retired Teachers Association Health Committee in Austin Sept. 23-25.

Long-term health care, responsibilities of providers, emergency health care for rural citizens are included in AARP priorities. The group discussed the interrelation between AARP health care concerns and the state legislative health bills.

Dr. Edward Zunker of the Governor's Board for Long-Term Care spoke of task

forces now at work on tax equity, care of indigent, and the future of long-term health care. He called attention to proposed amendments to the Texas Constitution which can affect older citizens particularly.

Cartee, an AARP-HAS Associate Coordinator, has been active in AARP programs, including Medicare/Medicaid Assistance Programs, study of emerging care issues, and others.

He and workshop participants addressed health care plans for communities around the state, designing projects through which AARP and TRTA may effectively serve older citizens.

Dr. Dorothy McConnell, Texas HAS Coordinator, said, "Grassroots endeavors really make the difference in the AARP health care program."

Singing Group To Quit Smoking Nov. 19

The Fabulous Thunderbirds, an Austin-based blues-rock quartet, will act as the honorary "spokesband" for the Great American Smokeout in Texas, American Cancer Society officials have announced in Austin.

Guitarist Jimmy Vaughan, bassist Preston Hubbard and drummer Frank Christina -- all smokers -- will try to do without cigarettes on November 19, the day of the 11th annual Great American Smokeout. Vocalist Kim Wilson is a former smoker. "We think it's entirely appropriate that a Texas band which rose to national fame on the strength of a song called 'Tuff E'Nuff' is proving just how tough it is by accepting our challenge to abstain from smoking on November 19," said John Frankhouser of Lubbock, state volunteer chairman of the Great American Smokeout in Texas.

The Great American Smokeout is sponsored by the American Cancer Society each year on the third Thursday in November. It is a light-hearted event to encourage smokers to try quitting for 24 hours.

According to a Gallup

survey, 23.7 million American smokers quit or cut down during last year's Great American Smokeout.

"The band's example will help us reach young Texas smokers who may not have considered quitting for health reasons," Frankhouser said. "We know smokers who relate to other smokers who are trying to quit -- the whole purpose of the Smokeout is to give smokers an opportunity to try quitting in an atmosphere of support and good will," he said.

The Fabulous Thunderbirds will be featured in a 30-second television public service announcement for the Smokeout to be distributed statewide. In the spot, the T-Birds encourage others to join them in the Great American Smokeout by saying "...we think you're tough enough to quit, too."

The Fabulous Thunderbirds are on tour to support their sixth album, *Hot Numbers*. The band has scheduled performances in San Antonio, Austin, Houston, Dallas, Corpus Christi, and Midland through the end of September.

American Cancer Society units around the state are currently planning local

celebrations to mark the observance of the Great American Smokeout.
