Aldersgate Enrichment Center May Build In Eastland County If Cities Work Together

"The two cities of Cisco and Eastland must bury the hatchet and work together to help bring in the Aldersgate Enrichment Center to Eastland County," is what Cisco Chamber of Commerce manager, Don Shepard said at the quarterly Chamber of Commerce breakfast held last Wednesday at the White Elephant.

He added that the Industrial Development Committee has been working diligently on the Aldersgate project for the past few months. "Cisco gave a real effort and out of all the places visited, Cisco gave the best effort of all," according to Don.

He also said the reception held at the First United Methodist Church that Tracie Whatley was in charge of really made an impression on the Aldersgate Committee.

Don said he would like to see Cisco and Eastland work together. "Neither town will gain anything unless we work together. The Center will provide jobs for all of Eastland County," he said.

Don said he has written a letter back to Aldersgate giving the endorsement and support of Cisco for the location of Aldersgate in Eastland County, regardless of where in the county it will be located.

He said the Aldersgate panel wrote a letter to the Cisco Chamber of Commerce, and said that Cisco was not individually considered, but Eastland County, as a whole has been considered.

The panel has narrowed the choice down to seven cities, and on November 15, the choice will be dwindled down to three. The final choice will be made on December 1.

Chamber of Commerce manager Don Shepard said he would like to thank some of the people who worked so hard with the Aldersgate project.

He wanted to thank Rev. Ken Diehm of the First United Methodist Church in Cisco who informed him about the possibility of Cisco getting the Aldersgate Enrichment Center. He said the Industrial Development Committee, that includes Joe Wheatley, Roy Dennis, Billy Wright, Mike Moore, Dick Woolley, Ronnie Ledbetter and himself worked very hard to get a proposal ready for Aldersgate.

Don said Eastland is very receptive to working together for the Enrichment Center. He said it doesn't matter if it is placed in Gorman, Eastland, Cisco, Ranger or Rising Star, it will benefit all of Eastland County.

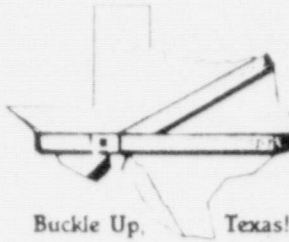

Mason Dixon To Play For Anson Dance

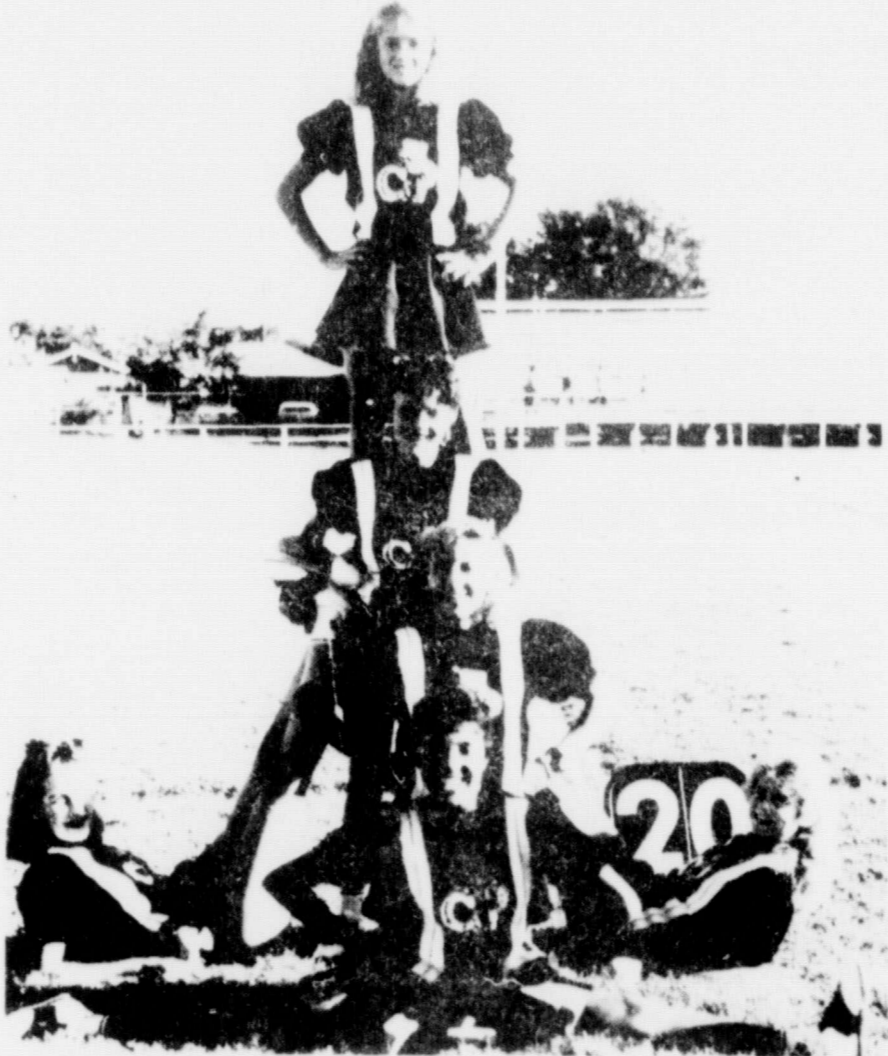
Mason Dixon, one of the top country recording acts in the nation, will play for the first legal public dance in Anson since 1933.

According to Mason Dixon manager Marc W. Oswald, the group is offering their services "in the interest of putting a little pep into the step" of the youth of Anson.

There has not been public dancing allowed in Anson since a 1933 ordinance prohibited dancing with the exception of three days in December during Anson's annual Cowboy's Christmas Ball. A group called Footloose formed in January of this year to change the outdated ordinance. A compromise was reached in August between Footloose and the Anson city council.

Manager Oswald stated in a May 7 letter to Anson Mayor Gene Rodgers that "alcohol, drugs and promiscuity are not at all a part of Mason Dixon's show or lifestyle. This group is dedicated to our Lone Star State, and just recently spearheaded the 'Tyler says NO to Drugs' campaign in Tyler, Texas." Dances free of alcohol and drugs have been the goal of the Footloose organization since its beginning.

Mason Dixon will perform in the Pioneer Hall at the Jones County Fairgrounds on Thursday, Oct. 8. The door will open at 8 p.m. Bitter Creek, a sweetwater based band, will open the road. Tickets will be available at a cost of \$5 each. Proceeds from the dance will be used by Footloose for the youth of Anson.

W.K. Boyce Speaks At Rotary Club

W. K. Boyce, minister of the 1-20 Church of Christ in Cisco, spoke to the Cisco Rotary Club last Thursday at their regular weekly meeting, held at Traditions Restaurant. Mr. Boyce recently completed a course at Abilene Christian University on family counseling. He said he is a therapist with Christian values.

He said that six characteristics that are the same in strong families around the world are: (1) firm religious values; (2) the family spends time together, and not just quantity time, but quality time; (3) the family develops healthy communication patterns; (4) family members express appreciation for each other; (5) they have cultivating commitment; and (6) they deal positively with crisis and don't make every crisis a catastrophe.

Mr. Boyce has an office located at the Biblical Study Center at Cisco Junior College and an office in Abilene. He said he counsels with students, teachers and couples. He said he finds it a plus to get to talk to young adults.

Allen Masters, who was in charge of this week's program, introduced Mr. Boyce. Stanley McCracken will be in charge of next

week's program. Otto Urban was chosen as the chairman for the Rotarian Polio Plus program and James Cotton was chosen as the treasurer. Henry McCullough will be in charge of a training program for the Polio Plus to be held Monday, October 19, at the Texas Room of the CJC Library.

The attendance for the meeting was 76.19 percent. Guests at the meeting were Brad Stevenson and Bill Culpepper of the Eastland Rotary Club. Other guests were Russell Pogue, pastor of the First Baptist Church and Dick McPharson of Virginia Beach, Virginia.

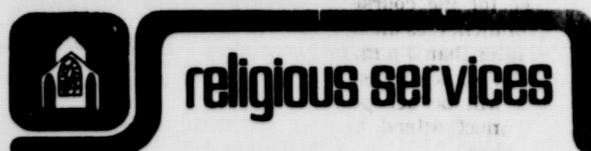
The morning sessions will be from 9:30 to 11:45. The afternoon session will be from 2:30 to 4 p.m.

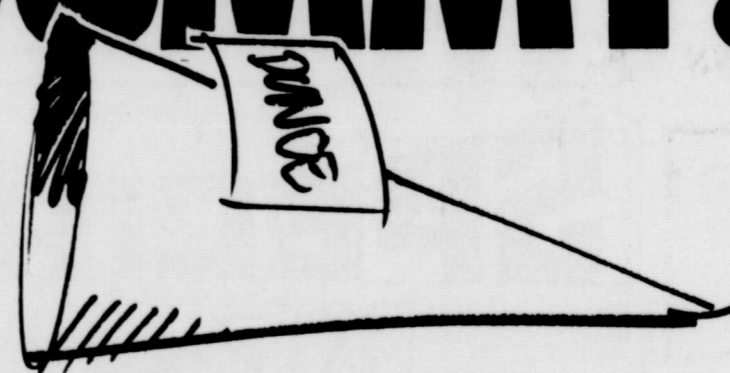

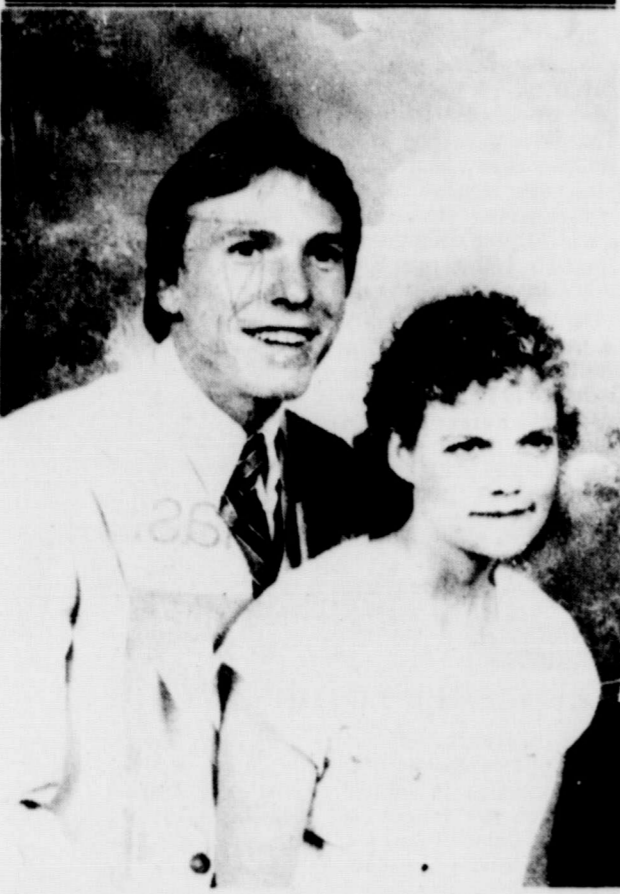

Gordon said the project integrates water, wildlife, livestock and rangeland management to improve economic efficiency and profitability in ranching operations. He also noted that a

five-step planning process has been developed for landowners and ranchers to use in decision-making about their own resource management.

Registration for the field day opens at 8 a.m. A brief program follows at 9 a.m. before the ranch tour

departs. The morning trip features chemical and mechanical brush control areas, prescribed burning sites, beef cattle and wildlife operations and sunflower production plots.

A barbecue lunch will be provided, and followed with an optional tour that concludes at 3:30 p.m. The afternoon stops include a tasajillo control plot and more of the commercial cattle operation.

Discussion topics for the day include rangeland

seeding, wildlife as an economic enterprise, control of resistant hornflies on cattle, heifer replacement and breeding, range forage evaluation and plant identification.

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FARM BUREAU CONVENTION

New Directors Voted, Policies Set



The annual Eastland County Farm Bureau Convention was held the evening of Sept. 21 in Siebert Elementary School cafeteria in Eastland. Around 250 people attended, and they heard various issues addressed.

Bob Schults of Rising Star, County Farm Bureau President, welcomed the crowd to the meeting. A barbecue dinner preceded remarks by Guest Speaker Bob Turner of Voss, TFB District 7 State Director.

Also on the program was an annual report by President Schults, and Secretary-Treasurer Grant Lewis of Desdemona. Agency Manager Jim Kennedy reported on the insurance services of Farm Bureau, and an update was given on committee activities this past year.

The two Resolutions, a recommendation, and the voting on by-laws, membership dues and new directors attracted quite a bit of attention. A membership dues increase from \$25 to \$30 annual was brought to the floor. This was later amended to \$27.50, and this amendment passed.

New directors elected were John Kidd of Eastland, Grant Lewis of Desdemona, Cecil Self of Carbon, Charles Walker of Eastland, Bill Walton of Ranger, D.B. Warren of Gorman, and Leo Williams of Ranger.

Bob Schults set the tone of the meeting with his opening remarks. He said that the Bureau not only provided economic services for its members, but helped formulate legislative action at county, state and national levels.

"People from cities just don't understand what we're up against," he said. He mentioned his impression of the legislative process in Austin. "If you start talking to one of the representatives they always ask: 'Can I help you?'"

"But if I say 'I'm just by myself', its 'Adios, Big Boy,'" he said. He added that the Farm Bureau has more than 1860 members in the County, and needed to increase this to be heard more strongly.

Schults also reported on several projects the County Bureau had engaged in this year. One was the sponsorship of two young people, Phyllis Gevara of Eastland and Danetta Bible of Rising Star, to a Citizenship Seminar in San Angelo last summer.

Both girls spoke to the crowd, and they did an excellent job of reporting on the inspiration and information they had received at this meeting.

Shults introduced the winners of this year's Young Farmer Award in Eastland County - Mr. and Mrs. Chris Brown of Gorman. The Browns have also won First in District 7, and will now go to state competition.

He mentioned the Fireman's School at Texas A&M University last July, and how the local Bureau had sponsored Jim Hughes of Eastland in this training.

The Guest Speaker, Bob Turner, described himself as a "Shepherd". But his wit and wisdom indicated that he had also thought about a lot of other things - although shepherding is probably very good training for any vocation.

Turner laughed and said that "Anyone from 50 miles away is almost always an expert on something." But he indicated he had better be careful here, for his old friend and schoolmate Dale Stewart, a well-known sculptor who lives in Cisco - was in the audience.

Turner praised the Eastland County Farm Bureau for the work it was doing, and said that he "would like to be your Director for another 2-yr. term". He said that "Youth in America is our future," and that the main business of the Farm Bureau was to promote Americanism and the rural American way of life.

He noted that less than 2 percent of the population in

America is now engaged in Agriculture, and said that "many of us have to depend on something else too in order to make it right now."

He had a remark on political action: "If we don't tend to our government someone else will."

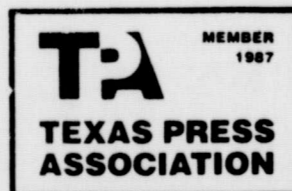
He concluded on a note of optimism, saying that he believed that rural Americans had what it takes to survive and progress in this world.

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Nine-Month Sales Of Savings Bonds In Texas Up

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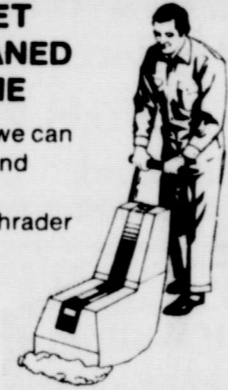

CAPITOL UPDATE

by Jim Parker

A potentially disastrous issue receiving little press coverage of late is the ruling by Judge Harley Clark, state district judge of Travis County, that effectively declared our current state public education funding formula unconstitutional. Just because that issue is not receiving wide notice does not mean it is not there and certainly does not mean it has gone away. The ramifications and potential fiscal impact are as great as ever.

To refresh your memory, generally speaking, that ruling says that the current funding formula whereby school districts receive state aid is unconstitutional because it unfairly discriminates against property poor school

districts. It is based on the theory that a Texas child is entitled to the same dollar quality education if that child lives in the Hutto school district which is one of the poorest districts in the state or in the Highland Park district which is one of the richest in the state. A fairly close analogy is the constitutional holding of several years ago of "one man, one vote." Perhaps stated more simply, if I fully understand the ruling, it would mean that the entire tax property value of the state, divided by the number of school children in the state would be at or near the amount of money that would have to be spent on each child regardless of the child's geographic location.

The concept is fairly difficult in its theory but it is simple in its application and if carried to its logical conclusion would create a system whereby the same number of dollars would be available to education every child everywhere in the state. While it is fairly simply stated, it can and will create a chaotic situation in school finance and will eventually lead to the ultimate elimination of independent school districts as we know them today.

Of course, Judge Clark's ruling is being appealed and one would have to be clairvoyant to predict the outcome with any accuracy. I would say, based on the current social attitudes of our Supreme Court, there is a better than even chance that the court's decision will be sustained and upheld. That means that the Legislature will effectively have to revamp completely public school finance.

QUESTION: Mr. Cartee, when a woman is 65 and her husband is 57 and neither are eligible for social security, how can she prevent her from incurring a medicare premium penalty when her husband is finally eligible for social security?

ANSWER: Unfortunately there is not a whole lot one can do to prevent medicare premium penalties. The woman can sometimes be made eligible for SS, perhaps on an old work record, or by a former spouse (divorced or widowed). She might get a job which gives her health insurance. If she is covered by an employer group plan notify SS and her penalty will be waived for the period she works under the plan.

QUESTION: Mr. Cartee, I understand there is pending legislation in regard to nursing home reform. Can you discuss it and how it will concern us?

ANSWER: AARP is hopeful that nursing home improvements will be a priority for house and senate subcommittees this year. Several bills would put into law some of the key recommendations made in 1986 by the Institute of Medicine about access to care and quality of patient care. We suggest you let your congressman or senator know how you feel about the improvements.

QUESTION: I need help in filling out the medicare claim forms. Some of the providers charge me as much as \$25 to complete these forms. Is there anyone who could help and do it free?

ANSWER: Yes. Contact your AARP Chapter president. He will inform you of the medicare/medicaid assistance counselor. They will also assist you in filing the supplementary insurance expense claim.

Aki Kleiner Visits In Japan During Summer

This summer, June 13th, I left Fort Worth-Dallas Airport to head for my long journey west. I arrived exhausted and excited in an airport full of people. As my mother went on to stay with her parents in Kashiwazaki, Niigata, which is found on the other side of the island, I stayed with my pen-pal in Nagoya, Japan. Nagoya is a big city about two hours south of Tokyo by Bullet Train.

While I was in Nagoya, I attended an all-girls Christian school, Kenjo High School, with my pen-pal, Kaori Hayase. Kaori was sixteen and in her second year of high school at the time. I really enjoyed going to school.

Every morning, Monday through Friday, I woke up at 5:45 a.m. and began to get ready for my one hour bus ride to school. Kenjo High School began at 8:30 a.m. with a morning worship. My day consisted of six 50-minute classes, and everyday my subjects in my classes were different. I did not study the subjects that the other students studied; nevertheless, sitting quietly in the back of the room, I would write letters to all my American friends. Every so often, the English teacher would call my name and ask me to demonstrate something.

I met many students and everytime I was seen in the hallway, library or classroom, everyone of the friendly, little, Japanese girls waved or said, "Hello, Hello!!!" I will never forget how much I was admired by them. My brown hair, hazel eyes, and lighter complexion really was noticeable, even though I wore the Kenjo High uniform. I have to admit I loved the attention I was given.

The school I was attending was for the more higher intelligent girls of the Nagoya, Aichi district, and like the majority of all Japanese students, they studied really hard. But one thing that I was surprised to see was how the girls would sleep during class. The teachers let them, but if the students were to get behind in a subject, the teachers would not repeat anything already covered. Therefore, if a student did get behind in a subject, she would attend "JUKU," a private school which had evening sessions after school. The favorite subject with the "ZZZZ...s" was Old Japanese History. I remember sometimes waiting up until 9 p.m. for my friend, Kaori, to arrive back home. The students in Japan also work hard on extra-curricular activities, sports, etc., which makes them late to arrive at home.

I made many friends in my four week stay in Nagoya Kenjo High. I will always remember the great feeling of joy and sadness as thirty of my classmates came running down the train station's platform after taking six taxis from school, all yelling and calling, "Aki, Aki, Bye, bye, Aki!!!" As I got on the train, my eyes began to feel the heaviness of teardrops; I looked out to a window full of bright smiling faces who were once strangers but now ... my friends!

Since 1976 over 70,000 women have taken this course. It's been taught in groups as large as 400, but also proves to be very rewarding to individuals as a personal study.

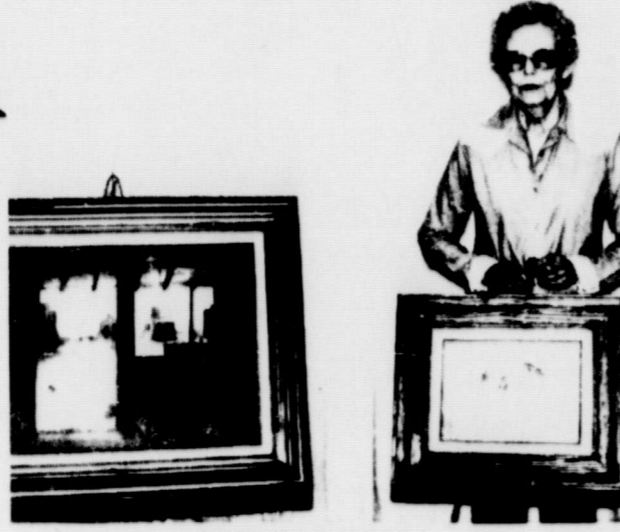
