27-yard pass from Meaker to Atkens to score. The extra point was good. At the half, the scoreboard read 21-14, Kilgore's favor.







By Richard Kurklin In the fall of 1985 a group of Eastland County people recognized a need and took action to fill that need.

There was a need for recreational activity for children and youth who did not participate in school sports, after the Little League season comes to an end. And it needed to be a 'safe' sport that both boys and girls could participate together in. Answering this need, the

Eastland County Soccer Association was formed. A spirit of competition has existed between the

towns of Eastland County about as long as most people can remember, and the Association founders realized that a spirit of friendship and cooperation between neighbors needed to be added.

Forming a Soccer League, 105 youth or children from Cisco, Eastland, Ranger and Carbon were placed on eight teams which played a fall schedule. In the Spring of '86, over

two hundred potential young soccer players showed up and the League was increased to eighteen teams. The League kept growing with about three hundred on twenty-four teams during the fall of '86. A record sized crowed of about three hundred and sixty boys and girls participated on twenty-seven teams in the spring of '87.

The addition of Rising Star to the League helped to swell the numbers, but football is so popular in this area that the League has dropped to twenty-five teams and about two hundred and sixty players during this fall's football season

A double season is now being played where players are required to sign up in the fall and teams are then formed that play a fall schedule and later a spring


People continue to work on the soccer field complex that now includes six fields. There are two 30 by 50 yd. fields for children under six years of age, two 40 by 70 yd. fields for those six years to under eight, a 50 by 100 yd. field for eight years to under twelve, and a 70 by 130 yd. field for twelve years to under nineteen.

"The complex can now handle a big tourney of any age group," says Darrell Adams



Repairs To Continue At

The Board of Directors of Brazos River Authority, at its regular quarterly meeting in Waco on October 19, authorized expenditure of \$6 million in Authority funds for continuation of the investigation and repairs to the dam at Possum Kingdom Lake. This authorization is in addition to the \$2.1 million approved in April of this year. The additional expenditures are expected to be sufficient to fund the ongoing investigation and repairs until the Board's January 1988 meeting. At that time it is anticipated that a final

the dam proceeds on schedule. Installation of monitoring instruments used to detect any movement in the dam continues, along with drilling of relief wells to relieve water pressures found to be occuring beneath the dam. To date 55 piezometers, 8 extensometers, 5 inclinometers and 22 relief wells have been installed. Additionally, a highly sophisticated and sensitive surveying system has been installed at the dam, which allows very precise monitoring to detect any further movement of the structure that might occur Representatives of FERC from Washington and from the FERC regional office in Atlanta, Ga., met on October 8 at the project with representatives of the Brazos River Authority and its consultants to review progress of the investigation and repair work to date.

The lake level was drawn down 13 feet from the normal maximum operating level of 1,000 feet as a safety precaution while investigations of indicated foundation problems and immediate corrective modifications are being made at the dam. The temporary maximum operating level of 987 feet was reached on April 24 and is expected to be in effect for at least six months and maybe as long as a year. Lowering of the lake level to 987 feet was ordered by the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission, which licenses the hydroelectric generating facilities at the project.

time for more than that, for the bullets and arrows sung and Mr. Highsaw and Lyman McCain came back with them and buried Gols, and we all moved up to their fort ranch the next day. By April I was able to get around on crutches. From about the middle of January I was at my father's house in Parker County, and was disabled for six months.

"One day in 1886 something pricked me on the under side of my knee. On examination, I found a sharp black point sticking through the skin, and knew at once that twenty-five years ago I had been shot with a doubleheaded arrow, and had only pulled one head out. Three weeks later, on February 21. 1886, after having carried it in my knee for twenty-five years, two months and five days, the arrow head came out







The 'Meals On Wheels' **A Community Effort**

I couldn't have picked a better day to visit the 'Meals On Wheels'' Center in Baird. It was Thursday, that weekday when local volunteers bring in covered dishes for a buffet dinner-

This time there were fourteen of those wonderful cooks, along with Ferne Lee. Director of the Center. There were also two visitors from Abilene - Richard Thompson from the Department of Human Services, and David Merrill, Contract Manager of the Department

Ferne Lee's smile and welcome radiated good heer. And the building on Market street, with its blue and white curtains and homespun touches, had its own charm.

I wanted to talk to Ferne Lee about her work, for Baird's "Meals On Wheels" is known as a model pro-

Mrs. Lee went on to explain that "Meals On Wheels" is funded by the state and federal government, also by the county, city, private donations, and fund-raising. Other than a minimum of paid help, the organization is run by volunteers. There are

Volunteers furnish most of the transportation for these meals. They also visit with the home-bound and check on their needs.

"I never realized how important this work is - how needed - until I got into it," Mrs. Lee said.

As we tinished our meal she explained how the program began in Baird. Nine years ago a worker from the Department of Human Services in Abilene persuaded her to take the Directors job and set up the "Meals" effort.

The banquet was a cooperative effort of the Extension Service and Erath and Comanche County Electric Cooperatives.






