A new Allen electronic organ has been installed at Cisco Junior College in the Harrell Fine Arts Building. The organ replaces another one installed 18 years ago.

The new organ was built by the Allen Organ Company and installed by Les White Music Co. of Abilene. Allen has been producing elec-

tronic organs for 50 years. The company is the only one to use digital computer technology to produce more authentic organ tone.

Steven Zell, organ instructor at the college, said, "We are pleased and fortunate to have this instrument. You may be surprised at the improvement in electronic

organ tone when you hear it."

The organ will be heard in a dedication concert Monday, Nov. 16, at 7:30 p.m. Mr. Zell will play the concert. He will be assisted by band director Tim Jones with several student brass players and by Wyley Peebles and his CJC Singers.

The public is invited, and there is no charge.

The new organ will be used for teaching and concerts, and it will be heard at numerous college events. Mr. Zell's organ students will be privileged to practice on it also.

## Surviving Twin Is In Stable Condition

Maria Yolanda Newton, daughter of David and Sylvia Newton, is still in critical condition at Cook's Children's Hospital in Fort Worth, but everything is stable, according to a report given to her mother last Thursday morning.

She opened her eyes and is moving around. Her weight is up to 1 pound and 7 ounces now. Sylvia said she is still on a respirator, but she is improving.

Yolanda has an older brother, Jeremy. He went Trick or Treating, last Saturday night in Ft. Worth while the family was staying in the Ronald McDonald House. Afterwards when he went to visit his new sister with his parents, he told her to hurry up and get up and go Trick or Treating with him.

Yolanda and her identical twin sister, Bethlanda were born on Sunday, October 25,

at Hendrick Hospital in Abilene. Yolanda was born at 3:28 p.m. and weighed 1 pound and 10 ounces. Bethlanda was born at 3:48 and weighed 1 pound 5 ounces.

The twins were air lifted by Lear Jet to Ft. Worth three hours after they were born, but Bethlanda, who only had a 20 percent chance of survival did not make it. She passed away the next day.

Yolanda had a 50-50 chance when she was born and the odds got better, day by day, according to Sylvia.

Dr. Stevener, the main doctor at the hospital told Sylvia and David they could probably bring Yolanda home in February. That was the month, when Sylvia was originally due to deliver the twins.

Sylvia asked everyone to remember her daughter in their prayers. She also

wanted to thank everyone for all that has been done to help them.

Sylvia said they came back home to Cisco last Sun-

day, but they will probably make the trip back and forth to Fort Worth several times a month, until Yolanda comes home.

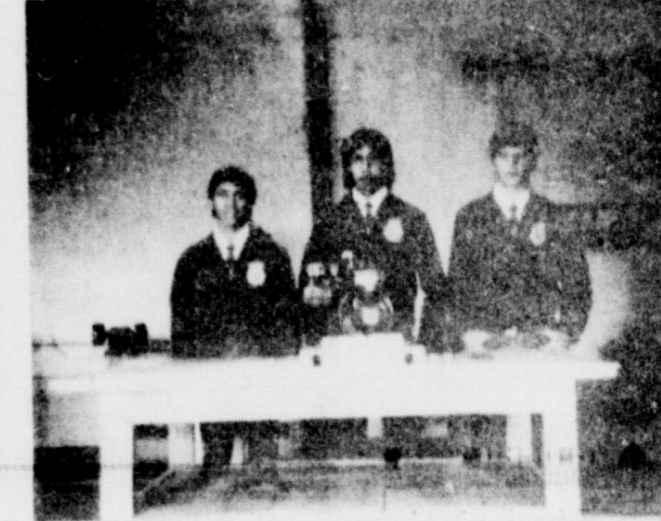

## Results Of Cisco Votes Are Given

A total of 995 Cisco voters were issued ballots in the general election Tuesday at the Laguna Hotel, Precinct Chairman and Election Judge Dorothy Thomas reported. The number was somewhat higher than officials had anticipated, Mrs. Thomas said.

Ciscoans opposed a majority of the 25 proposed constitutional amendments and cast identical votes of 473 on Amendment 23 - to issue \$400 in water bonds.

# Food Labels and Safety

COLLEGE STATION—Most products in food stores have dates and handling directions on them, even though manufacturers are not required to put this information on packaging.

"The date stamped on product packages can indicate product freshness and serve as a guide to safe storage time, if you know

how to use it," says Marilyn Haggard, a Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service nutrition specialist.

She explains that the "sell-by" date is the last day the product should be sold, the "use-by" date indicates how long the product will retain top eating quality after purchase, and

the "expiration date" tells the last day the food should be eaten or used.

"Reading handling directions can also help you make sure food remains safe to eat," says the specialist.

All perishable products must give handling instructions, such as "keep frozen" or "keep refrigerated," notes Haggard. Some meat and poultry products may be labeled "ready-to-eat" or "fully cooked," which means no further cooking is necessary.

The specialist advises checking the labels of aseptically packaged products, since many will require refrigeration after opening.

"Although some product labels carry directions on how long and at what temperature to cook a product, the directions are not required or verified by the U.S. Department of Agriculture," she remarks.

"When cooking instructions are not included on the label or you have some doubts about them, the safety course is to cook the product thoroughly," Haggard adds.

## Conserve Dryer Heat

COLLEGE STATION—Grain drying can use a lot of energy, but there's a scheme that can make the process more efficient.

One way to increase the efficiency of high capacity dryers is to partially dry high moisture grain and then transfer it to a separate bin for tempering and cooling, points out Richard E. Withers Jr., agricultural engineer with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

"This technique, sometimes called dverat-

tion, has been used in corn drying for many years," notes Withers. "It's also been used in commercial rice drying by making multiple passes of the rice through a high heat dryer followed by tempering and cooling."

According to the agricultural engineer, the process uses less heat and thereby reduces the amount of energy used.

In the grain drying process, individual grain kernels lose moisture to the surrounding air if its vapor pressure is less than that of the kernel. Kernels will continue to lose moisture until the vapor pressures are equal, explains Withers.

During this tempering stage, moisture moves from inside the kernel to its surface. Then cooling removes the surface moisture and does this more efficiently than if fans had been running continuously. As the surface of the kernel dries, the internal moisture movement continues.

"Any method that will dry grain to a safe storage moisture content fast enough and take advantage of tempering and cooling will use less energy and therefore should be efficient and economical," contends Withers.

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## Commercial Motor Vehicle Safety Seminar Given

The Big Country Safety Association, in conjunction with the Abilene Chamber of Commerce, will sponsor a training seminar on Thursday, November 19th to explain the Commercial Motor Vehicle Safety Act that will take effect, in part, in Texas January 1, 1988.

The Commercial Motor Vehicle Safety Act which covers federal regulations governing interstate trucking has been adopted by the Texas Legislature to cover intrastate truck traffic in Texas.

The new regulations will apply to owners and operators of all motor

vehicles and/or combinations of vehicles with a registered or actual gross weight of 10,000 pounds or more. These rules will apply to private carriers as well as Commercial Carriers. Also, the new regulations apply to owners and operators of all motor vehicles, regardless of size,

if the vehicle is transporting hazardous material which would require placards.

The seminar will begin at 8:30 a.m. on the 19th and will be held at the West Texas Utilities Lytle Shores Auditorium. The seminar will be aimed at the general truck industry.

Registration for the seminar may be made by calling the Abilene Chamber of Commerce at 677-7241. A registration fee of \$15.00 will be charged to

cover the cost of materials and equipment for the seminar. The registration fee may be mailed to the Abilene Chamber of Commerce at P.O. Box 2281, Abilene, 79604.

Instructors for the seminar will be from the Texas Department of Public Safety and the Department of Transportation.

Registration for the seminar will be limited to the first 100 persons to register.

## New Farm Planning System

COLLEGE STATION--Economists with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service have developed a new computer program to help farmers and ranchers with financial planning.

Called TAMWFARM (Texas A&M Whole Farm Analysis and Record Management), the program builds financial statements from individual crop and livestock enterprise budgets. TAMWFARM adds a financial perspective to a physical production plan.

It is a spreadsheet program that calculates cash flow, net worth and income statements along with a financial ratio analysis on a 12-month projected basis, explains Delton Gerloff, Extension economist based

in Vernon, who was the primary developer of TAMWFARM. TAMWFARM is constructed from crop and livestock budgets which can be changed to reflect each farm's individual situation.

TAMWFARM is in the final stages of administrative approval and will soon be released to the public. Field tests have been highly successful, Gerloff points out.

One of the central ideas in TAMWFARM is to enter a number once and not have to enter it again, says the economist. In working with records, financial statements, budgets and plans, many numbers are used in more than one place, either by themselves

or as part of a calculation. In TAMWFARM a number is entered only once, then passed by the computer to all other locations where it is needed. Also, many numbers appearing on financial statements are calculated from other numbers. In TAMWFARM, the computer does these calculations and supplies the numbers automatically.

To begin the TAMWFARM process, the farmer or rancher describes his operation by enterprise. There are two blank generic cash budget forms--one for crops and forages and one for livestock. The user identifies the timing and value of income and the timing and cost of expenses based on the user's production practices. Each

cash budget is identified with a name. Each budget may be printed along with the cash flow for that individual budget.

After all cash enterprise budgets have been built, they are called into the main TAMWFARM program by a prescribed procedure. If necessary, sub-units of the farm or ranch can be created as if they were unrelated, explains Gerloff. Then these sub-units can be pulled together for overall farm or ranch analysis. If an agricultural operation has geographically diverse operating units, this option may be very useful, notes the economist.

The main TAMWFARM program has two schedules which help supply information for financial statements. One is the family living budget which provides for a detailed monthly planning of personal expenditures, in-

cluding personal loan repayment. The other schedule is a debt worksheet to list intermediate and long-term farm or ranch debts. Simple information from a loan repayment schedule (normally provided by the lender) is entered in this worksheet. The program then calculates many of the entries on the liabilities side of the balance sheet and the cash obligations for debt repayment on the whole farm cash flow.

According to Gerloff, the user may need to add a few pieces of information to the whole farm cash flow because there is no other place in the program where these numbers occur. Likewise, information will need to be added to the balance sheet. While most of the liabilities are automatically calculated, all but one of the asset valuations must be entered by the user. By contrast, the income statement is almost totally calculated with only three possible places to enter numbers. These financial statements are interrelated and information is passed back and forth between them.

One additional input requirement is for four pieces of information to allow the calculation of financial ratios. Fifteen ratios are calculated on liquidity, solvency, profitability and efficiency. The ratios allow for better analysis and comparison of these financial statements.

With a computer and TAMWFARM to do the calculations and shuffle the numbers, financial management and planning will be much easier to accomplish, says Gerloff. As financial pressures increase and agricultural loans become harder to get, this type of financial planning ability will be increasingly important.

The Extension Service will be conducting three computer financial management shortcourses on TAMWFARM. Two will be held at the Stiles Farm Computer Center near Thrall on Dec. 7-9, 1987, and May 17-19, 1988. The other shortcourse will be held at Sweetwater on Aug. 23-25, 1988.

## Couples Need Financial Plan

COLLEGE STATION--A budget and spending plan can benefit any family, but for remarrieds it may be critical, says a consumer economics specialist.

"Finances, children and child rearing have been identified by researchers as the major problems in many remarriages," says Bonnie Piernot, "with finances often ranking the highest."

People entering a remarriage often have assets -- and debts -- to bring to the new marriage. When

couples share this information prior to the wedding, it will make it easier to develop a financial plan, says the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service home economist.

"Fluctuating income from child support can be a major strain on the new family's budget," Piernot says.

One recent study of remarried couples in Kentucky found that when child support was needed, 36% either never received

it, received it irregularly or regularly received it but not in the full amount, she reports.

According to the specialist, a financial plan for remarrieds can involve saving ahead for large annual or semi-annual bills and unexpected expenses, so they won't be caught short by fluctuating income.

Like any family, remarried couples can also benefit from planned spending that enables them to meet bills, reduce debt and save for future goals, adds Piernot.

## Have Heat Systems Checked

Government safety experts are cautioning homeowners to have home central heating systems inspected this fall, even though the heat has already been turned on.

According to the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission, consumers should rely on a qualified heating contractor to check the system. Regardless of the age of your system, elec-

trical and mechanical components, including valves, thermostat controls and automatic safety switches, should be inspected. Special attention should be paid to heavy soot buildup in the furnace or its venting system.

While venting systems are not always examined during routine servicing, consumers should ask the contractor to inspect the flue and chimney. Blockages can

be caused by mortar and other materials loosening from chimney walls, bird nests or other debris. Chimneys and flues should be clear at all times so exhaust gases, including carbon monoxide (CO), are properly vented outside the home. Flue and flue connections should be checked for a tight, secure fitting, and for signs of rust or corrosion which could allow exhaust

gases to spill into the house.

CPSC said carbon monoxide exposure in the home is of special concern. Consumers exposed to harmful levels of CO often show symptoms similar to having flu-like illnesses, including dizziness, fatigue, headaches, irregular breathing and nausea. Exposure to continued high levels of carbon monoxide could be fatal. CPSC estimates that some 200 deaths occur each year from carbon monoxide associated with gas heating equipment.

Homeowners who have recently converted their heating system from oil to gas also were cautioned by CPSC to have the chimney inspected. After converting to gas, soot and debris which may have accumulated over the years on chimney walls may loosen and fall; if enough falls, it could block the exhaust and cause a buildup of dangerous levels of exhaust fumes in the house. If the heating contractor finds soot in the flue, a chimney sweep should be called to clean the chimney and flue each fall until no more soot is detected.

If you plan on converting from oil to gas heat, have the chimney inspected when the new furnace is installed, and annually thereafter.

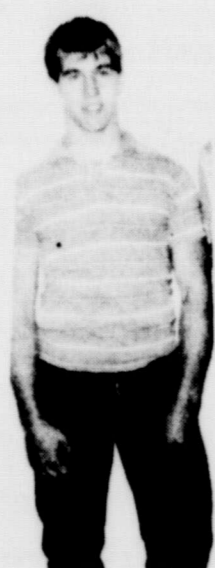

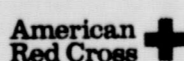

## Film Presentation Of B-1 Bomber Shown To Rotary

Lieutenant Colonel David R. Hall, Chief of the 96 Bombardment Wing's Standardization Evaluation Division at Dyess Air Force Base in Abilene was the guest speaker at the Cisco Rotary Club held last Thursday at Tradition's Restaurant.

He was assigned to Dyess AFB, in January, 1986 as a member of the initial B-1 instructor pilot cadre with the 338th Combat Crew Training Squadron. A New Hampshire native, Lt. Col. Hall was commissioned in 1970 and attended pilot training at Craig AFB, Alabama.

Following pilot training, he was stationed at Fairchild AFB, Washington as a B-52G copilot, aircraft commander, and then instructor pilot. While assigned to Fairchild's 325 Bombardment Squadron, Lt. Col. Hall completed four South East Asia combat tours, and flew 80 missions including the 1972 Linebacker II operations over Hanoi, North Vietnam.

Lt. Col. Hall is a firm believer that today's professional officers must also make commitments to their communities. He is an active Rotarian in the Abilene, Texas Downtown Club and was twice a Rotary President and Governor's Representative in Main and Canada.

Lt. Col. Hall has a Bachelor of Science degree from the State University of New York College of Environmental Sciences in Wildlife Management and another in Biology from Syracuse University. He has a Master's in Human Relations and Counseling from Louisiana Tech University. He is an Air Force graduate of Squadron Officer School in 1975, Air Command and Staff College in 1979, and the Air War College in 1985.

Lt. Col. Hall gave a film presentation on the B-1 Bomber, at Dyess AFB to the Cisco Rotary Club. He said Dyess is the first home of the B-1. Rockwell Industries built the plane and General Electric built the engine. He said the plane is 145.7 ft. long and 79.2 ft. wide and 67.5 ft. high. It carries a crew of four.

The B-1 has 30,000 pounds of thrust per engine and is designed with smooth lines that will deflect radar. Hall described it as the best Bomber in the world.

Lt. Col. Hall told the Rotarians he is a member of the investigation team on the crash of the B-1 Bomber last September in Colorado, and would not be able to answer any questions about the crash. He said he lost three good friends in the crash.

Clois Purvis, who was in charge of the program introduced Lt. Col. Hall. Rotary president Jerry Morgan, presided over the meeting.

Guests at the Rotary meeting were Lisa Cisler, Physics teacher at Cisco High School and three of her students, Christy Purvis, Ingrid Valek and Martin Powledge.

Bill Reynolds will be in charge of next week's program. Ken Diehm gave the invocation. Attendance for the meeting was 76.19.

# November 11 Veterans Day

President Reagan has proclaimed November 11 as Veterans Day and has called upon all Americans to recognize "the hardships and sacrifices demanded from and faithfully accepted by the millions of men and women who have defended our land in war and in peace."

This year's Veterans Day theme is "Veterans, You are America," and the President urged Americans to let veterans know that their service is not forgotten, that their sacrifices are appreciated, and that America salutes its defenders.

Veterans Administration chief Thomas K. Turnage, who serves as Chairman of the Veterans Day National Committee, said, "The foundations of American independence, liberty, and freedom were built and preserved by those who served." Turnage will preside at the 34th annual Veterans Day observance at Arlington National Cemetery, which begins with the tradition of honoring the Unknown Soldier on the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month with a Presidential Wreath Laying Ceremony.

It was at that hour on November 11, 1918, that the world celebrated the end of World War I hostilities, and which later became known as "Armistice Day." In 1954, Congress renamed it Veterans Day to honor all those who served in America's armed forces.

In his proclamation, the President said, "Our observance of Veterans Day this year, the Bicentennial of the Constitution, reminds us in a special way of the service men and women who have made liberty's cause their own. Our fun-

damental charter lives on because through the years countless brave Americans have gladly willed to 'provide for the common defense.' No one is more responsible for securing 'the Blessings of Liberty to ourselves and our Posterity' than our veterans."

The proclamation calls on Federal, State, and local government officials to display the U.S. Flag and to encourage and participate in patriotic activities nationwide and to support the observance of Veterans Day with suitable commemorative expressions and programs.

Various Veterans Day observances will be held throughout the nation at many of the VA's 111 national cemeteries.

"The Veterans Administration wants all veterans to 'light up America on Veteran's Day' by driving through the day on November 11 with their headlights on," said Stephen L. Lemons, Director, Waco VA Regional Office.

The Veterans Administration wholeheartedly endorsed this national gesture and asks all veterans to "light up America" on Veterans Day.

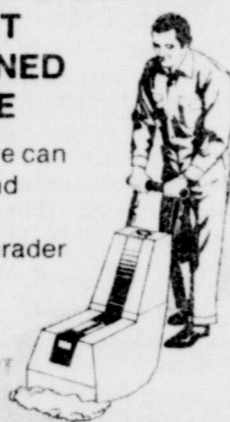

**CAPITOL UPDATE**

By this time, for those of you who cared to begin with, I am sure your heads are reeling from trying to decipher the constitutional amendments you voted on November 3rd. I am sure I have been asked no less than 1000 times, "Why do we have to do that?"

The truth is, our Texas Constitution is probably just about as outdated as a constitution can get and has likely had some serious flaws for all of its 111-year history.

An example of what I am saying is the fact that in 1987 we have had 25 amendments offered to our state Constitution. In the entire history of the United States Constitution, which is slightly over 200 years old, that document has been amended only 26 times. It's expensive to have to put all the relatively inconsequential issues, examples of which you saw on your November 3rd ballot, before the 16 million voters of the State of Texas on an annual

basis. I don't suppose I am ready to say that it's constitutional convention time in this state; but, it sure must be close. You'll recall the last attempt at a constitutional revision resulted in a constitutional convention where 181 of our fellow citizens in 1974 labored mightily for seven months and brought forth not one single thing. Our constitutional dilemma is, frankly, that we find it difficult to live with but can't seem to change it.

I know a lot of things are like that in life but it doesn't make me any more comfortable when I contemplate these, at least, biennial rounds of constitutional craziness.

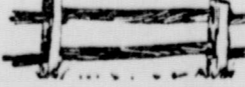

Each short course, Tomaszewski adds, will begin with registration at 9 a.m. and the program following from 10 a.m. until 3 p.m.

Extension dairy specialists will join with a number of key dairy industry leaders from other states in presenting the program.

A stress management overview will be presented at each opening discussion by Dr. Max Sudweeks, Extension dairy specialist based at Overton. Manag-

ing heat and humidity will be discussed by Dr. David Beede of the University of Florida, and will be followed by a talk on reproduction management under heat stress by a Texas A&M University professor of large animal medicine and surgery, Dr. R.G. Elmore.

Nutritional adjustments under stress will be discussed by Dr. Al Lane, Extension dairy specialist at Stephenville. Following lunch, a discussion on dairy housing under Texas conditions will be presented by

QUESTION: Mr. Cartee, I have tried to read about the Medicare catastrophic health plan being discussed by Congress. But the more I read the more confused I get.

ANSWER: Join the crowd! The trouble is we only get bits and pieces of the plans being considered. We are sure to get at least the following out of Congress: There will be a maximum "out of pocket" per year for expenses. Somewhere in the neighborhood of \$1500 per year. Now the out of pocket expenses are unlimited. It appears there will be unlimited number days in the hospital. Now it is 90 days per "spell of illness" plus up to 60 lifetime reserve days. Definitely there will be a skilled nursing care program under the new plan. Now we are limited up to 100 in a skilled nursing home. This portion of the plan is so involved that no one is willing to predict what Congress will provide. In regard to home health care there will be an extension of days, however, this also is being "tossed about" by Congress and we do not know what will be passed as law. Definitely there will be assistance with prescription drugs. At the time we were in Annapolis, Maryland, this provision had not been settled. It appears

medicare will be making payments toward the drugs after you have spent \$500 out of pocket.

QUESTION: Mr. Cartee, will our medicare premiums go up in 1988?

ANSWER: Yes, Medicare Part B will probably go from

\$17.90 to \$24.80 per month. The hospital deductible will go from \$520 to \$940. This is a 38.5 per cent increase in premiums; however, if the catastrophic medicare program goes into effect the premiums could go to \$50 depending upon your income.

# Laws on Abandoned Wells and Refrigerators

Emory Walton, District Attorney, reports that the recent account of little Jessica McClure's rescue from the abandoned well in Midland has created local interest in the current laws governing wells.

There are state laws on wells and cisterns, the District Attorney says. There are also laws governing such things as abandoned refrigerators and other airtight containers.

Every year abandoned refrigerators are reported around some of the towns, Walton says. He once had a report of a child in an abandoned refrigerator, but older children got the little one out in time.

He gets reports less frequently on abandoned wells or cisterns, and most are around old farmsites in rural areas.

"They are dangerous and it would pay to watch out for them," Walton says.

He suggests that citizens become familiar with safety laws concerning such things as wells and refrigerators, and if violating the laws, take measures to comply.

"It could mean the difference between life and death for someone," he says.

The laws are reprinted here:

Art. 9202. Covering and plugging well or cistern

Section 1. It shall be unlawful for the owner or

operator of any well or cistern, as much as ten (10) feet deep, and not less than ten (10) inches nor more than six (6) feet in diameter to fail to keep it entirely covered at all times with a covering capable of sustaining weight of not less than two hundred (200) pounds, except when said well or cistern is in actual use by the owner or operator thereof.

Sec. 1a. It shall be unlawful for any person who shall drill, dig or otherwise create, or cause to be drilled, dug or otherwise created, any well or hole of as much as ten (10) feet in depth and less than ten (10) inches in diameter to abandon said well or hole without first completely filling said well or hole from its total depth to the surface or plugging the same with a permanent type plug at a depth of not less than ten (10) feet from the surface and completely filling the same from said plug to the surface.

This Act does not modify or repeal any existing laws.

Sec. 2. Any person violating the provisions of this Act shall upon conviction be guilty of a misdemeanor and be fined not less than One Hundred Dollars (\$100) nor more than Five Hundred Dollars (\$500).

Acts 1949, 51st Leg., p. 509, ch. 281.

Art. 9203. Refrigerators or air-tight containers

Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any person to place or permit to remain outside of any dwelling, or building, or other structure, or within any warehouse or storage room or any unoccupied or abandoned dwelling, building, or other structure, under such circumstances as to be accessible to children, any ice box, refrigerator, or other airtight or semi-airtight container which has a capacity of one and one-half (1 1/2) cubic feet or more and an opening of fifty (50) square inches or more and which has a door or lid equipped with a latch or other fastening device capable of securing such door or lid shut.

Sec. 2. Any person violating this Act shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction shall be fined not less than Five Dollars (\$5) nor more than Two Hundred Dollars (\$200), and each act done in violation hereof and each day that such violation continues shall constitute a

separate offense and be punishable as such. Acts 1954, 53rd Leg., 1st C.S., p. 69, ch. 30, eff. April 22, 1954.

This article was transferred from Vernon's Ann.P.C. art. 1721A by authority of 5 Acts 1973, 63rd Leg., p. 995, ch. 399, enacting the new Texas Penal Code.

Title of Act:

An Act making it unlawful to place or permit to remain in certain stated places, under such circumstances as to be accessible to children, any ice box, refrigerator or other airtight or semi-airtight container having a capacity of one and one-half (1 1/2) cubic feet or more and an opening of fifty (50) square inches or more and which has a door or lid equipped with a latch or other fastening device capable of securing such door or lid shut; making a violation of this Act a misdemeanor and providing a penalty therefor, providing that each day that such violation continues shall be a separate offense; and declaring an emergency. Acts 1954, 53rd Leg., 1st C.S., p. 69, ch. 30.

# Fishing Outdoors

Do Bass Have Security Blankets?

Fall fishing is certainly here folks. And the patterns are all starting to shape up. Many of the areas you were catching fish during late spring are hot again.

At these times the wyle black bass start congregating back towards the shallows. A few favorite areas are backs of coves, shallow points, and of course the always popular creek areas. During fall the two main associate factors to these locations seem to be; bait fish and some nearby deep water. The deep water has in past been believed to be a must to Mr. Bass to escape to during cold fronts and other severe condition changes. But some new studies being done on bass behavior is leaning more towards deep water as a security blank. Its there, but not really needed or used that much.

Fall is perhaps the best time of year the security blanket theory can be proven. Its a slow, pain taking process, but the rewards will surprise you I think.

As our cool fronts are coming through locate some fish on your lake of choice. Don't over fish them but put together a confidence pattern. After the front passes return to these areas remembering the following: water depth at which you caught fish; wind directions; direction of retrieve of lure to wind; and speed of retrieve. Continue fishing in the same water depth; adjust lure retrieve to duplicate past retrieve according to wind. (If you had caught fish earlier with a north wind and you have an east wind etc), slow your retrieve down to a crawl and make repeated cast to one area. Irritation and easy prey are the keys at this time. And with this in mind don't forget the flipping

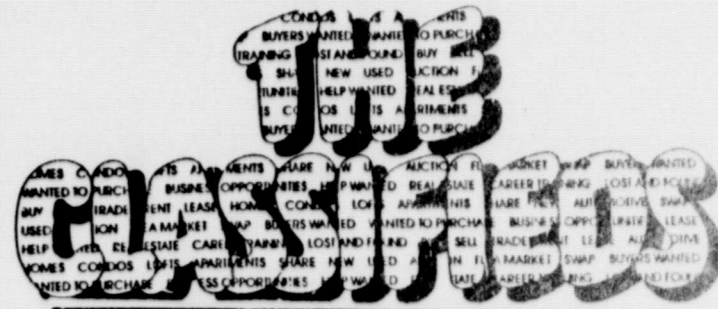
method. Which is probably the most effective at this time due to covering an area inch by inch, rather than foot by foot.

As always in our search for the elusive black bass versatility is the key, if your not catching fish it's time for a change. To quote Ray Scott of B.A.S.S. "Somebody will always catch some fish."

**RECIPE OF THE WEEK**  
Pumpkin Pineapple Cake Topping  
Preheat oven to 350 degrees F. Melt 1/2 cup of butter or margarine in 13x9 inch pan in oven. Remove from oven; stir in 2 cups firmly packed brown sugar, mixing until well-blended. Arrange 1 can (20 oz.) drained pineapple rings and maraschino cherries over brown sugar mixture. Bake:

1/2 cup butter or margarine, softened  
1 1/4 cups firmly packed brown sugar  
6 eggs, slightly beaten  
1 cup wheat germ  
1/2 cup plain yogurt  
3/4 cups flour  
2 teaspoons baking soda  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
2 teaspoons ground ginger  
1 teaspoon ground cinnamon  
1 teaspoon ground nutmeg  
1/2 teaspoon ground cloves  
1 can (16 oz.) solid pack pumpkin  
Cream butter and sugar until light and fluffy. Blend in eggs, wheat germ and yogurt. Mix together flour, baking soda, salt and spices, mix well. Alternate additions of dry ingredients and pumpkin, mixing well after each addition. Pour over prepared pineapple mixture. Bake 60 to 65 minutes or until wooden pick inserted in center comes out clean. Cool 5 minutes; invert on wire rack. Cool. Yields 12 servings.

# Adopt A Highway Rules Finalized By Commission

The new guidelines for the Adopt-a-Highway program are now final. In July, the highway department announced new guidelines for the highly successful program. The temporary guidelines were published in the Texas Register, with a 60-day period for the public review and recommendations.

In its October meeting, the highway commission gave its final approval to the guidelines.

The Adopt-a-Highway program, begun in late 1985, allows groups of private citizens to adopt two-mile sections of highway for litter pickup. The highway department provides the groups with safety vests, litterbags, and safety instructions, and installs signs at each end of the adopted section giving credit to the group.

By early summer of 1987, the number of groups in the program had mushroomed to over 2,300, including church organizations, garden clubs, motorcycle clubs, and civic groups.

But in June, the department administration directed district offices to accept no new groups, pending a review of the program. Questions regarding adoption by political organizations and the program's cost-effectiveness prompted the action. The new guidelines re-

quire four pickups a year by adopting groups, and a two-year adoption period, among other things.

After feedback from the public, the department has made some modifications in the guidelines. For example, several groups in West Texas felt that their sections of highway did not

## Dear Betty Crocker

Q. What's the best way to thaw a turkey?

A. Leave turkey in its original wrap and place on a tray in refrigerator for about 24 hours for each five pounds of turkey. A faster method (it takes 30 minutes per pound) is to thaw the bird immersed in cold water, changing water frequently. It's unsafe to thaw either on countertop or in a paper bag at room temperature.

Q. How can I prevent mergues from weeping?

A. No need for tears. Meringue is less likely to "weep," or leak moisture, if it is baked on a hot filling. Seal meringue to edge of pie crust. Bake pie at 400 degrees for 10 minutes and cool gradually.

Q. What are the benefits of the oils or fats found in fish?

A. Omega-3 oil, a polyunsaturated oil that's unique to fish, has been associated with lowering the risk of death from heart disease for some people. Seafood varies

in levels of omega-3, but fattier fish such as mackerel and salmon are the richest sources.

Pour into greased 9 x 5 x 3-inch baking dish. Bake in slow oven (325 F.) about 1 hour or until toothpick inserted in center comes out clean. Cool 5 minutes. Remove from dish. Decorate with

glaze, if desired. **GLAZE:** Blend together until smooth 2 cups powdered sugar, 1 teaspoon vanilla, 1 tablespoon melted butter, and 3 tablespoons milk. Dispense with plastic squeeze-type condiment bottle or drizzle from a spoon or ladle.

### HARVEST HOME COFFEECAKE (Makes 1 coffecake)

- 1 cup butter
- 2 cups sugar
- 4 eggs
- 1 cup sour cream
- 1 cup LIBBY'S Solid Pack Pumpkin
- 2 teaspoons vanilla
- 3 cups flour
- 2 teaspoons baking soda
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1/4 teaspoon salt

Streusel: Cream butter and sugar in large mixer bowl until light and fluffy. Beat in eggs one at a time. Beat in sour cream, pumpkin, and vanilla. Beat in remaining ingredients, except Streusel. Cool 10 minutes; remove from pan. **STREUSEL:** Cut 3 tablespoons butter into 1 cup finely packed brown sugar and 2 teaspoons cinnamon. Stir in 1 cup chopped nuts.

NOTE: May be baked in a 13 x 9 x 2-inch pan 45-50 minutes.

### PUMPKIN BRAN MUFFINS (Makes 9 muffins)

- 1 1/4 cups flour
- 2/3 cup sugar
- 1 tablespoon baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
- 1/4 teaspoon ground cloves
- 1 cup bran cereal (not flaked)
- 1/2 cup undiluted Carnation evaporated milk
- 1 cup LIBBY'S Solid Pack Pumpkin
- 1/2 cup salad oil
- 1 slightly beaten egg
- 1/2 cup raisins

Combine flour, sugar, baking powder, salt, cinnamon, nutmeg, and cloves in large bowl. Combine cereal and milk in small bowl. Allow to set 10 minutes or until milk is absorbed. Combine cereal, pumpkin, oil, egg, and raisins. Add to flour mixture. Stir just until flour is moistened. Do not over mix. Spoon into paper-lined muffin tins, filling to top. Sprinkle top of muffins with 1 teaspoon cinnamon sugar. Bake in hot oven (400 F.) 25 to 30 minutes or until toothpick inserted in center comes out clean.

## Seminar For Commercial Motor Vehicle Safety Act To Be Held

transporting hazardous material which would require placards.

The seminar will begin at 8:30 a.m. on the 19th and will be held at the West Texas Utilities Lytle Shores Auditorium in Abilene. The seminar will be aimed at the general truck industry.
