



TIM RAINS takes the ball in for a touchdown in last Friday night's game in Hico.



Many rural hospitals

simply can't measure up to Medicare/Medicaid requirements and if they could, they couldn't compete

with larger hospitals. The other factor that appears to be of increasing importance in the demise of rural hospitals is that local ad valorem taxpayers are consistently demonstrating adamant opposition to a tax structure necessary to fund the operation of rural hospitals. Two possible solutions

are: (1) on the federal level, we need to bring some semblance of reason and reasonableness to the Medicare/Medicaid criteria; and (2) on the local level, perhaps, we need to

study new alternatives to finance hospitals. It has been said that one must be careful not to "ride a good horse to death." Truly, we may have ridden the ad valorem tax horse to death and that may well be the reason for such strident opposition to recent hospital bond issues in my district and in the area. Perhaps, it's time to look at some innovative financing. Innovative methods are available and are being used but it's very difficult to break out of the decades-old method of thinking that ad

valorem taxation is the only means of financing available. By way of prediction, assuming something fairly significant isn't done, rural health care is going to consist of something roughly equivalent to the "minor emergency clinics" that we see so many of in metropolitan areas. They will, of course, take you in, do a quick diagnosis and ship you somewhere else. Unfortunately, for all too many

people I fear that 'somewhere else" may be the funeral parlor.

Something, hopefully. They were the Methodistassociated group that looked at Eastland County for the possible location of a \$12 million facility which would have housed some 100 residents and employed about 100 people.

They asked for and got a united Eastland County effort - but unfortunately, this county wasn't picked for the final three. We obviously were up into the really big numbers, and towns (areas) like Brownwood, Weatherford and Corsicana apparently offered more inducements, and they, being good business people, narrowed their choices down to where the big bucks were to be found.

In vetoing Eastland County, they left at least \$200,000.00 on the table: \$100,000.00 from the Eastland Industrial Foun-

would use about a quart of water each for a bath." An older gentleman who lived near the hospital had water, and some kind person made arrangements for Vera and me to have a shower in his vacant rent house. The water was cold, but that was the best shower and sham-

poo we'd ever had. Can you imagine not having a bath for a week?" But in this place, also, they left behind several new Christians. So it was worth the inconvenience, she says.

Back home in Eastland Mrs. Rowch received a call in March 1986 to go to a totally different part of the world. She joined Christians from eight states on a Campaign in Auckland, New Zealand. Here the country was beautiful, and most of the people were living comfortably. But sprinkled among the generally decent reception were bits of cold treatment, with remarks such as

"Yankee, go home!" or

"The United States is trying to start a war." It seemed unfair -- hearing such remarks about your country. The group persisted, and knocked on over 11,000 doors. They were up at 6 a.m. and to bed at 11 p.m. in order to carry out this work. Several new Christians resulted.

In June 1986, Mrs. Rowch made another trip to Jamacia. As she went she realized that she really cared for the place. And things were more comfortable this time she stayed in a motel with plenty of hot water

Visiting the Churches was fun. "Those people can real-ly sing," she reports. "They never sing just the first and last stanza of the song, as we often do here in Church. And sometimes the sermon will be an hour long, with everyone sitting on hard, uncomfortable chairs, or ben-

"There's no air conditioning, either. Yet the people listen as if they'll never hear God's word again. And when they become Christians, they really get busy for the Lord.'

After Jamacia came a brief trip to Wyoming, then a call to Aberdeen, Scotland. Eighteen people from six states left on the trip in June of this year.

The weather was rainy and cold, and most of the group wore a winter coat every day. This was the most beautiful country they had seen, and the culture and music was distinctive. The group knocked on many doors, but some of the response was not favorable. "I have the Church of Scotland, I listen to my preacher, and that's all I need," one man said. "I have the Church of Scotland and I don't need

anyone coming in and preaching a foreign gospel to me!" One elderly man stated

Then there was the woman who said she was "perfect" and "didn't sin"! But everyone didn't classify themselves with her, and 10 new Christians took their stand after the Campaign. Mrs. Rowch has not gone on another missionary trip

since this one, but she plans to. "I feel like I've left a little bit of myself every place I've been. Yet home looks so good, once you've been so far away.

"You know what I'd like to do?" She asks. "I'd like to live on a Navajo Indian Reservation and work with them at least a year." And the expression on her

face shows that she isn't asking about a meaningful life any more. She found what she was looking for.





The Adult Department, Housson said, is partially funded by the county, receives \$27,000 annually from the state and also brings in \$30 monthly in fees from each case handled. Right now 250 persons are being supervised by the Department, with \$70,000 anticipated from this source for next year.

This money is all paid into the county, and the county turns back checks for salaries and expenses for

cy, and who had jurisdiction over it. Judge Bailey said the County was obligated to furnish an office, equipment, travel ex-


