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## Cooking Corner Tips To Help You

Glorious Menus For Casual Entertaining **Sweet Potato Biscuits** 

With Smithfield Ham

Makes sixteen 3-inch biscuits

2 medium-size sweet potatoes, baked

peeled, and mashed 1/4 cup packed dark brown sugar

3 cups all-purpose flour 1 1/2 tablespoons baking

powder 1/2 teaspoon salt

1 teaspoon ground cinnamon 1/2 teaspoon ground

nutmeg 1/2 teaspoon ground mace 1 teaspoon grated

1 cup (2 sticks) unsalted butter, softened

1/4 cup milk

1 1/4 to 1/1/2 pounds Smithfield ham sliced razor thin

Preheat the oven to 450°F. In a blender or food processor, puree the sweet potato pulp with the brown sugar until smooth. In a bowl, sift together

the flour, baking powder, salt, cinnamon, nutmeg, and mace. Mix in the lemon rind. Cut in the butter with a pastry blender until it resembles coarse meal. Add the sweet potato purée

and milk and mix until just blended. Gather into a ball, turn out onto a lightly floured surface, and knead two or three times. Flatten to a thickness of 3/4 inch.

Cut out the biscuits using a 3-inch-round cookie cutter lightly dipped in flour. Prick the top of the biscuits evenly in three places with a fork. Arrange 1/2 inch apart on an ungreased baking sheet. Bake for 12 to 15 minutes

or until golden brown. Split the biscuits and put slices of the ham inside the biscuits and serve

warm. Biscuits and ham can be put together ahead of time, wrapped in aluminum foil, and reheated in a warm oven for 10 minutes.

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## **Gordon Spot**

#### By DeMarquis Gordon, County Agent-

THE GORDON SPOT The first frost and hard freeze of the winter occured in Eastland this past week. This could lead to prussic acid poisoning in livestock grazing certain pasture grasses and forages.

Although many plants contain the toxic material that causes poisoning, those causing the highest mortality in livestock when grazing after they have been frozen and wilted are Johnson and Sudan grasses and sorghum or hybrids of these.

The most dangerous time as far as the grazing of these plants is concerned is following frost or freeze when the plant material begins to wilt. Livestock should not be allowed access to the wilted material until it has dried completely. This usually takes three or four days of good sunlight.

As far as prussic acid poisoning is concerned the poison acts rapidly and can kill animals within minutes. In most acute cases, animals become affected within 10-15 minutes after eating toxic materials and can die in two to three minutes. Symptoms may include a brief period of stimulation followed by depression and paralysis. Signs of colic may be pre-sent. Stuper (loss of sensibility), difficult breathing and frequent convulsions may result. Death is caused by suffocation since oxygen remains in the blood and is not exchanged to the tissues. This also causes the blood to appear bright red.

To prevent prussic acid poisoning in livestock, follow these steps:

1. Allow plant material affected by frost to dry thoroughly before grazing.

This may require a week or more of good sunlight.

However, a lot of old mossy backs said, "Young Feller, you goin' to buy a piece of land at these war time prices and it will go down like it did after the First World War an' then where will you be?" I insisted that the only place I would be then was on a place of my own and if I had no intention of selling, it didn't make a hang what anybody thought it was worth. (That was before I considered tax evaluation which sure seems to over-

rate this place.) By the time I scraped together enough to buy the only place I could affort cost \$35 per acre. Now, by coincidence, gold was bringing \$35 an ounce. Thus I paid equal to an ounce of gold for each acre. Now those acres would bring hundreds but gold has gone up to hundreds also. Still, disregarding the house and buildings we put on it the land is about equal to an ounce of gold per acre. Have things become worth more or is our paper money just worth so much less?

Now of inflation I BELIEVE that in most cases it takes about as many hours of hard work to pay for a new car or home now at high wages as it did when I worked in an aircraft factory for a starting wage of 50 cents an hour and after a year and a half raised to 75 cents but the new Ford available at first for \$500 was no longer available at my 75 cent wages because the war had started. Thus money is no true measure of value over any period of time.

Gasoline was once 20 cents a gal. But a quarter used to be all silver. Now the real silver coins will sell for more than even this

"high priced" gasoline. Thus, I do not view price fluctuations in the same light as many do.

In the dusty pages of history the Greek politicians manipulated the public treasury and spending money they did not have began to silver coat copper and pass it at face value of silver until traders both foreign and domestic refused to accept it. Likewise as Rome declined similar actions took place. Then in France the monarchy lived beyond its means as did the nobility in general and then came revolution, blood in the streets.

The revolution in Russia had both political and economic reasons while in Germany the revolutions started with crippling strikes in war production, defeat, and economic collapse. The vicious Treat of Versailles decreed, by fantastic war reperations, virtual slavery for the German nation. While the Russian people march into Communist slavery the Germans were being forced into slavery by French and British blockades to enforce payment and French troops sent in to sieze all that German workers produced. Question: Mr. Cartee, why does the Part B premium have to increase? I feel the doctors are making enough money.

Answer: By law, the amount paid by beneficiaries through premiums must equal 25 per cent of the Part B program costs. The Reagan Administration estimates that in order to comply with the law the premium will have to increase to \$24.80 per month from the current \$17.90 per month.

Question: Mr. Cartee, why is the increase to be so large this year?

Answer: The increase is unprecedented in its size. Program costs increased far faster than expected due to changes in physician billing practices. For example, physicians have been able to increase the NUMBER OF SERVICES they bill Medicare per office visit. Instead of charging one fee for a service, physicians have begun to charge separately for different steps involved in the service. Also, more surgical procedures are being done on an outpatient basis and these are billed

Queston: How will the premium increase interact with my Cost of Living Allowance for my Social Security benefit? Answer: Current law pro-

tects those beneficiaries whose COLA is less than the premium increase. If a beneficiary's check would drop because of the premium increase, the full premium amount is not taken. However, the amount taken from the check will be will be whatever the amount is up to the amount of the current check. For example, if an individual's COLA were

\$5.00 per month and the premium increase is \$6.80 only the \$5.00 would go toward the premium increase. Approximately 742,000 beneficiaries will be in the category.





# Squirrel Hunter Bags Lion

Hupp Morris, who lives one and one half mile south of Gorman on the Duster Farm to Market highway, was squirrel hunting Wednesday, November 11, with his Border collie cross dog and his .22 cal. rifle, as he sometimes does to get some healthful exercise.

The dog picked up a trail and treed a cat. The cat turned out to be a 128 lb. male mountain lion which measured between 8 and 9 feet from nose tot he tip of his tail. Thought to be two to three years of age, the lion was in good condition but thin.

Since the cat was a mountain lion rather than a Gorman Panther, Mr. Morris from a distance of about thirty feet fired a single shot that went through the lion's small brain. The lion fell from the tree and Mr. Morris fired two more shots in the dead animal just to be sure that he was dead.

If Mr. Morris' shot had missed the animal's brain, the lion might have attacked him and his dog. Lions are usually afraid of people, but if they are threatened or they are very hungry, they may attack people.

The mountain lion was killed about two hundred yards from Mr. Morris' house about 7:30 in the morning.

Lions in this area usually feed on deer, rodents and small animals, but they sometimes kill calves, colts, sheep and goats.

Game Warden Kenneth Payne was called and Paul Brashear took pictures of the lion.

Mr. Payne said that he usually receives several reports of lion sightings at

this time of the year. They seem to migrate through this area and the food supply is good this year, reports Mr. Payne. He also said that the lion will probably be stuffed and mounted.





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

She graduated from Texas Woman's University and continued with postgraduate studies at the Julliard School of Music in New York. She has held executive posts with Church World Service and Church Women United.



E.L. Jackson, veteran of World War II, spoke to the Cisco Rotary Club at their regular meeting held last Thursday at Tradition's Restaurant.

Mr. Jackson said he can still remember Armistice Day, November 11, 1918, when World War I ended. He was just a small boy then, but he can remember the horns and whistles blowing, the singing and gun shooting and the men of the town where he lived, "shooting an anvil" on the courthouse

Armistice Day was celebrated on November 11, until a few years ago, when Congress decided to place the holiday on the closest Monday to November 11. Mr. Jackson said the veterans of this land let it be known that this was not acceptable. The veterans let Congress know that Armistice Day should be held on the day November 11, came on, the same way as July 4th.

Mr. Jackson said when he was in the U.S. Navy during WWII that he was on an island in the Pacific. He had heard there was to be a big 'drive' against the enemy. Mr. Jackson said it was quite an experience to see a total of 643 ships come to the island to begin this drive.

Later on he was sent to Australia. Mr. Jackson said the WACS who were also stationed there also would give him the "wolf whistle". Mr. Jackson said he kind of liked

Before he finished his talk, Mr. Jackson told of the time when he was in the Philipines when he read about a bomb that was as powerful as 2,000 B-52s loaded with bombs that would be used soon. He said he thought it was a misprint, but it was the atomic bomb.

Mr. Jackson finished his talk reading a story he had taken from a magazine many years ago. The story was entitled, "The Biggest Flag Of All.

Other guest at the meeting were Elsie Jackson, wife of Mr. E.L. Jackson.

Billy Reynolds, who was in charge of the program introduced Mr. Jackson. Mr. Reynolds said Mr. Jackson is a longtime friend of Cisco and a longtime servant of everyone.
