On Tuesday, Nov. 17, a group of 21 people from the Greater Mountain Top Church, located on Hwy. 183 10 miles south of Cisco, rode the church bus for a day's outing at Lake Buchanan near Llano.

At lakeside, the group browsed through the gift shop and lounged about the large pavilion which featured banana trees and magenta bougainvillea vines in full bloom.

At 10:30 a.m., the Moun-

tain Top Church group and several other parties boarded the Eagle II for the "Vanishing-Texas River Cruise," so called because of the efforts by ecologists to preserve the vanishing wildlife, such as the Bald Eagle. The Eagle II is a 200-person capacity river boat with three decks; a lower glass-enclosed observation deck, a mid-level pilot station surrounded by an open, canopied deck, and an upper "open" sun-deck. Passengers were encouraged to roam freely from level to level or to stay seated if they wished.

The two and one-half hour cruise which passes through four counties, took the group across the lake and down the Texas Colorado River. Via the intercom, the captain pointed out wildlife and areas of special interest such as the spot, where in 1986, a fisherman caught a 97 lb. 4

oz. yellow catfish!

The group was treated to the sight of blue herons, terns, double-crested cormorants, and several bald eagles. Constantly circling the boat were sea gulls, hoping for food scraps.

Wild mountain goats scurried about on the sheer rock cliffs which rise to 100 feet at the water's edge. Sparkling waterfalls cascade down these cliffs.

About mid-trip, the passengers enjoyed a delicious lunch from the boat's full service gallery. Seven days a week, year round, the river boats make their cruises, except on Christmas Day.

The pastor, Rev. Jones, states that there is another trip in the planning for the young couples age group. This is one of many trips the church plans to make during the coming year of 1988. Friends of the congregation are invited to become involved in these trips.

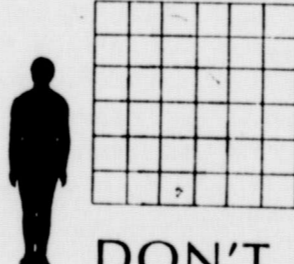
A great opportunity awaits those 4-H members with lamb and beef projects. The District 8 4-H Prospect Show and Leader Training is scheduled for December 12, 1987, at the showgrounds in Glen Rose. Steers and lambs will be weighed and heifers registration papers checked from 8:00 - 9:30 a.m. The training workshops will be held from 9:30 - 12:00 noon with the show to begin at 1:00 p.m. Lamb classes will include finewool, finewool-cross, medium-wool and southdown. Beef divisions are English, American and Exotic. Entries may be picked up at the County Extension Office and fees are \$10.00 for cattle and \$5.00 for lambs. These forms must be returned to the Extension Office before December 4th. Late entries will be accepted; however, fees will be doubled. Entry money will be returned to the exhibitors in premiums. Other awards will include Junior and Senior Beef and Lamb Champion Showman.

Everyone that plans on entering a livestock project through a 4-H club, in the Eastland County Livestock Show, must have a completed animal project form on file in the County Extension office no later than December 31, 1987. This is mandatory for anyone exhibiting livestock projects under 4-H. These forms can be obtained from your local 4-H manager or the County Extension Office. Orientations are scheduled for Dec. 21 & Jan. 4.

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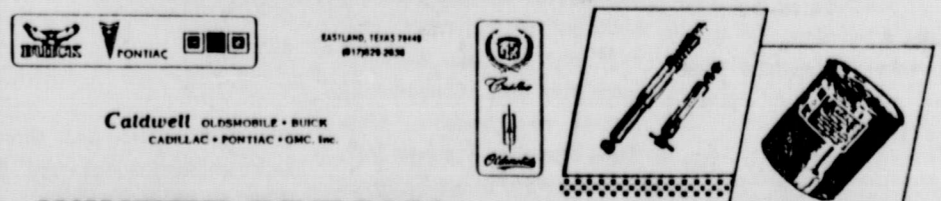
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Texas Farm Bureau To Select Miss Texas Farm Bureau In Lubbock

LUBBOCK—The Texas Farm Bureau will select state winners in the Miss TFB, talent and speech contests at the organization's 54th annual meeting here Nov. 29 - Dec. 2. They and other district winners in the three events will collect a total of \$28,750 in scholarships.

Also to be announced at the convention will be the 1987 Outstanding Young Farmer/Rancher and the winner of the Outstanding County YF&R Chairman Award.

Free enterprise speech contest contestants will compete Nov. 29. The winner will receive a \$2,000 scholarship and the runner-up a \$1,500 award. Each of the other four finalists will receive a \$1,000 scholarship. The other seven district winners each receive a \$750 scholarship.

The Miss TFB contest will be on the evening of Nov. 30 with the winner receiving a \$1,500 scholarship and a \$500 wardrobe of all natural fibers. She will represent the organization at the TFB Leadership Conference in January at San Antonio and also at the state FFA convention July 13-15, in San Antonio. The runner-up receives a \$1,000 scholarship and the 11 district winners each will receive a \$500 scholarship.

The Outstanding Young Farmer/Rancher Award winner will be announced during the Miss TFB contest. The three finalists are Charles W. Bowers and his wife Janyth of Pampa; Clyde W. Chandler and his wife Patricia of Rosebud; and Dan B. Smith and his wife Reeda Cay of Lockney.

Also to be announced at that time will be the winner of the Outstanding County YF&R Chairman Award. The three finalists are Mike Cannon of Rosharon; Julia Marietta of Crockett; and Donald Strader of Lyford. The winner of each award will receive one year's free use of a 1988 1/2-ton Ford pickup provided by Bird-Kultgen Ford Co. of Waco. The agricultural award winner and spouse will also receive and expense paid trip to the American Farm Bureau Federation annual meeting January 10-14 in New Orleans. All six finalists in the two awards will receive a trip to the TFB Young Farmer/Ran-

cher Legislative Development Seminar in Washington, D.C., in March.

In the fiscal year ended Oct. 31, the TFB showed a gain of 10,363 member families, marking the 35th consecutive year to gain. Texas continues to be the largest state FB in the nation.

In a letter expressing appreciation for Eastland County Farm Bureau's contribution to the state total, S.M. True, President of the TFB, said membership growth, along with other achievements, "have made

Dear Betty Crocker

Q. Why do many recipes for yeast bread no longer specify scalding the milk?

A. Milk that is pasteurized and not scalded produces quality bread. Unpasteurized milk or raw milk has an enzyme that makes bread dough sticky and results in coarser, lower volume bread. The enzyme is destroyed by scalding milk (heating it to just below boiling). For maximum food safety, avoid raw milk completely.

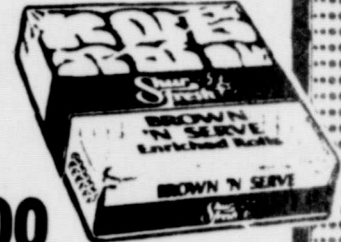
