
The post office will furnish the lights for the tree and members of the Youth Group at Calvary Baptist Church will decorate the tree.

A pleasing, joyous blend of Cisco musical talent will greet listeners at the second annual "Christmas at the Hilton" cantata entitled "An Old-Fashioned Christmas."

Texans Health Outlook

QUESTION: Mr. Cartee, do you feel the excessive rates being charged by the physicians Medicare raising the premiums so high?

ANSWER: Not the only reason. There are other factors involved. Part B is paid out of the supplementary medical insurance (SMI) trust fund. The SMI trust fund, like most trust funds has a reserve amount. In 1986 the Part B premium did not increase because program managers decided to draw on the program reserve fund. However, the reserve was allowed to fall too low. Now the Reagan administration wants to build the reserve quickly. There is another reason. Congress enacted standards to ensure that Part B claims were paid promptly. "Prompt pay" standards are meant to ensure confidence in the system by both physicians and beneficiaries; but, as a result, interest income from the SMI reserve is reduced because medicare is paying the bills faster.

QUESTION: Mr. Cartee, if the present bill passes Congress would the drugs be in-

ANSWER: I guess, in all

fairness, we would have to ask which bill you are talking about. The house bill would pay 80 per cent of prescription drug costs after a beneficiary meets a deductible of \$500 beginning in 1989 and increasing thereafter according to the consumer price index. The senate bill does not provide drug care however, there is no doubt it certainly is being addressed. Senate Finance Committee Chairman Lloyd Bentsen has predicted, "The senate will provide such a bill" but he feels there is a great possibility the Reagan administration will veto it. The present bill which we have been working with for the past few years has no provision for drugs. It is difficult to determine whether the doctor bill or the drug bill for beneficiary is the greatest. But combined it "sinks" the best of budgets and pocketbooks.

Brazos Electric Power Cooperative Files Petition To Lower Rates

Brazos Electric Power Cooperative filed a petition with the Public Utility Commission today to lower the cooperative's rates by \$10

million. "We continually monitor our revenue requirements. When there is an opportunity to pass on savings to our customers, we do it," stated Richard E. McCaskill, executive vice president and general manager of Brazos. In 1977, the cooperative returned more than \$1 million to its consumers through a temporary rate reduction.

If approved, the temporary rate reduction will be in effect for the months of Dec. 1987 through March 1988. Consumers will see a reduction of about \$7.50 for each 1000 kilowatt hours used during the four-month period.

The cooperative filed a petition with the Public Utility Commission Oct. 12 to lower its fixed fuel factor. Approval of that request will give consumers an additional reduction of about \$2.80 for every 1000 kilowatt hours used.

"Attention Past and Present Members'

Many new changes are being proposed for the Eastland County Bass Club in 1988. You the members can pass or fail these changes by attending the December and January meetings. All changes will be voted on during the January meeting. Your presence and views are greatly needed.

The following is a review of some of the proposed changes and some pros and cons, gathered from conversations with various members.

I. Big Bass of the month: a monthly contest consisting of catching a 4 pound or larger black bass from public water. This fish must be weighed on state certified scales, by a witness, the slip dated, and lake listed. In past years a member was allowed to have another member carry this slip to the next meeting, and if it was the largest for the month, he or she would receive a

trophy. The proposed change would not allow another member to present your weight slip if you were unable to attend the meeting for reasons of illness, work, out of town, etc. Also the person who does win would receive 1 pound towards the T.A.B.C. top six competition.

Discussion for, is that by not accepting weight slips unless the person is present.

would improve attendance at the meetings, as would a 1 pound bonus. Against: members feel that an individual should not be disqualified on his weight slip if he or she cannot attend said

meeting for various reasons. II. A proposal to award a 1 pound bonus towards Top 6 to any member attending a meeting. This has not been a past activity.

For: members feel this could be a drawing card to boost attendance at the meetings

Against: Many members feel this would again discriminate against someone who for various reasons cannot attend the meeting. Also mentioned by some, was that giving away so many pounds, by this a member could easily qualify for the T.A.B.C. top six team without ever catching a fish.

III. A proposal to have a 100% payback of all entries paid during a club tournament. Split 50%, 30%, 20% respectively. Past payback has been 1st \$40.00; 2nd \$24.00; and 3rd \$16.00 for a total guaranteed of \$80.00.

For: By paying 100% back a person would have a better chance to pay for his expenses and make some money. This could increase participation some said.

Against: A 100% payback would hurt the finances of the club. Money raised over the \$80.00 payback, (\$550.00 during 1987) helps pay for the monthly trophies and the

more self supportive. IV. A proposal to award a 1 pound to any member fishing in a club tournament. This has been done in past year, but not during 1987.

For: Members felt this would increase attendance for the monthly tour-

Against: Members said this was tried in the past and did not help attendance. Also it was mentioned that by giving so many pounds you would not be getting your true Top Six anglers who caught fish during the year.

V. A proposal to count only a person's eight best tournaments towards T.A.B.C. top six out of twelve tournaments. And you must fish eight to be allowed to qualify for Top Six.

For: This would increase participation in club tournaments by having a minimum of eight. And also give an angler an option of skipping a tournament if problems arose. Members stated this would not allow a person to fish a few tournaments and make the top

Against: This proposal would promote anglers to bypass tournaments during months known as poor fishing and poor weather conditions. By having a minimum of 8 tournaments members felt it to be discrimination towards anglers who work either Saturdays or Sundays. And against new members who could catch enough pounds

in fewer tournaments. VI. Proposal to set all tournaments up during the

Q. Why do many recipes for yeast bread no longer specify scalding the milk?

A. Milk that is pasteurized and not scalded produces quality bread. Unpasteurized milk or raw milk has an enzyme that makes bread dough sticky and results in coarser, lower volume bread. The enzyme is destroyed by scaling milk (heating it to just below boiling). For maximum food safety, avoid raw milk com-




