# **Emergency Crews Get Good Rating At Disaster Drill**

How would Cisco react to a disaster such as an airplane crashing at a playground where several children are playing? Several people who are with the Cisco emergency crews were put to the test Monday, when they were called out on a disaster drill at 9:00 a.m.

Twenty four Cisco High School students were placed in positions at City Park on Royal Lane where they could have been if an Air Force T-38 fighter jet crashed in the playground. The students were made up with "wounds" that looked very real.

First on the scene was the Cisco volunteer fire department. Fire chief Richard Connell along with fire fighters, Larry Weikel, Robert Rains, Truett Horton, Gerald Jackson, Kenneth Boyd, assistant fire chief W.T. Easton and David Gill participated in the disaster drill.

Cisco police officers Donald Wiley and Frank Thumsuden then arrived shortly after the Fire Department.

Willy Hunt and Charlie Tatum with Cisco's Patterson ambulance was the first ambulance on the scene. Next Patterson's from Eastland, with Carol and Tom Patteson, Martha Fillingam, Janie and Walter Watson and Bill Moore.

Coming in from Rising Star were Curtis Hill, Terry Horton, Ineil Robertson and Fred Rabe with the Rising Star Volunteer Ambulance. Pat Collins and Roy Rodgers were at the



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
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

disaster team. Mr. Chorn said the emergency crews were slow at first but once the commander in charge took over, the drill went very well. He said an accident of this nature could possibly happen since there are a lot of T-38s flying around in

this area. Darenda Vineyard, director of nursing at Graham, called Dyess AFB and asked them to set the drill up. Mrs. Vineyard said she is glad to know that Cisco will be prepared is any such emergency happened

Major Stothart said it would take Dyess 50-55 minutes to get here in the case of such an accident, and it's very important for the folks in this area to know what to do. They will be pretty much in charge of everything until the men from Dyess are able to get here. He advised the hospital to have 10-15 input cards ready to hand out to the ambulance people whenever there is another excerise of this scope.

Tech Sgt. Kronbach said the initial response was slow, but then it came back and everyone was doing good. He advised the police and fire chief to set up a blockade to keep people out until they get help from the Air Force. He said the only information to give out to the press would be minor details, nothing big, since it might be classified information. He said he was not criticizing the drill, but explaining what could be done to make it

Tech Sgt. Walsh said the command of control needed to get a head count at the scene and again at the hospital.

Mr. Chorn said Cisco is ahead of Sweetwater in the disaster drill. He said Sweetwater had their first airplane disaster drill four years ago and they didn't do too well. He said he is also glad to see the support of the other surrounding communities.

Other advice was to keep people out of the area there could have been explosives on the plane and there might have been more injuries if someone began tampering with the debris from the wreck.

In all the drill was term ed a success.

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## **Homemaking Hints**

#### From Janet Thomas, County Agent-

Texas deer season is here and many Eastland County families will be enjoying the use of venison in their meals

The Extension Service office has a booklet "Big Game Cooking Care' which is available upon request

The term venison use to mean the meat of any animal or bird. Today it refers only to the meat of Antlered animals such as deer, elk, moose, etc. The meat is lean and somewhat dry. For this reason you need to add fat and cook by moist heat methods.

Most seasoned hunters have their favorite ways of preparing venison, but thought you might enjoy trying our recipes. Good hunting and bon apetit!

#### VENISON JERKY

- 11/2 lbs. flank steak or venison backstrap
- 1/4 teasp, seasoned salt 1/3 teasp. pepper 1/4 cup soy sauce
- 2 tblsp. liquid smoke (optional)
- monosodium 1 teasp.
- glutamate 1/3 teasp. garlic powder
- 1 teasp. onion powder 1/4 cup worcestershire sauce Trim off fat from meat. Semi-freeze meat and slice with the grain, making strips approximately 2 inches long and 1/2 inch thick Place meat in shallow baking dish. Combine all other ingredients and pour over

meat. Marinate overnight. Preheat oven to 140 degrees F. Lay strips of marinated meat in single layer on oven rack with a baking sheet or foil underneath to catch drippings. Leave oven door open a crack and bake 8 to 12 hours; or until meat is chewy. Test by tasting occasionally. Serve as an appetizer or snack. Store in plastic bag or airtight container on pantry shelf

VENISON SALAMI 4 tblsp. quick curing salt 21/2 teasp. mustard seed 21/2 teasp. garlic powder

21/2 teasp. coarsely ground pepper l teasp. hickory smoke salt 11/2 teasp. sausage and/or

poultry seasoning 44 lbs. well-trimmed venison ground with 34 lbs. beef suet

MIX SPICES together. An electric blender may be used to blind spices more finely. Sprinkle in small amounts over meat. Mix Thoroughly. Refrigerate for four days, kneading once a day, every day. On the fourth day, knead again and shape into 10 rolls, 11/2 inches in diameter. Place on rack of broiling pan and bake at 150° for 8 hours, turning once. Cool and refrigerate.

WEST RANCH CHILI 6 tblsp. bacon drippings 3 lbs. lean venison, coarse-

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ly chopped

6 tblsp. chili powder 1 tblsp. ground oregano 1 tblsp. crushed cumin seed 1 tblsp. salt

1/2 teasp. cayenne 1 tblsp. red hot sauce (optional)

1/2 tblsp. garlic powder 11/2 quarts water 3 tblsp. masa harina

6 tblsp. water

In a deep well or dutch oven, heat bacon drippings; add chopped venison and brown. Add seasonings and water; heat until boiling. Reduce heat; cover and simmer 2 hours. Skim off fat. Put masa harina and 6 tablespoons water in a jar with tight fitting lid and shake until smooth. Add to chili mixture and stir. Simmer, uncovered, for 30 minutes. Serve with pinto beans. Some variations for serving the chili are: add corn chips, grated cheese and chopped onions; add chopped onions and catsup; serve with cornbread, crackers, corn or flour tortillas. It is also excellent served over cheese en-

## Commissioners Study Jail-Road Improvements

meeting Monday, Nov. 23. The blueprints were brought to the Commissioners by James Wheeler, Abilene architect, who was hired some months ago to work on a possible jail ad-

This enlargement of the present facility would give the building a capacity of 48 inmates, including 42 men and six women, Wheeler said. Juveniles are no longer housed at the jail.

Commissioners discussed various parts of the proposal, and asked Sheriff Don Underwood about several items. They then asked Wheeler if the Texas Jail Standards Commission would approve this

Wheeler told the Court, 'because you don't have your land nailed down." Billy Bacon of Pct. 4 and other Commissioners told'

a total of 15 prisoners were in the county jail at present. He said the electrician lacked only about two days work on the jail lighting, and after that the building ought to be ready for inspection for the Jail Stan-



## "High Rsk" People Need

Flu Vaccine The coming of "flu season" is as inevitable as the longer nights and shorter days of winter. Influenza, or flu, is a broad name for an almost constantly changing group of viruses infecting hundreds of thousands of people worldwide each year,

usually during the colder months From late November through April in a normal year, as many as 20 percent of the Texas population may suffer from the disease, and some cases persist even in summer. Some 2,145 cases of flu or flu-like illnesses occurred in October alone, and Oc-

tober is considered a lowincidence month for flu. Flu causes upper respiratory problems, fever, headache, and body aches, and can be complicated by stomach upset, diarrhea, and general malaise. Severe cases can lead to pneumonia, and can be fatal to persons with weakened conditions. For that reason, "high risk" individuals should be immunized each year against the disease, according to the Texas Depart-

ment of Health (TDH).

There were 55 deaths from influenza in Texas last year. The federal Centers for Disease Control have predicted that this year three, distinct strains of influenza will most likely threaten the U.S. TDH urges Texans to seek immunizations against the A-Taiwan, A-Leningrad, and B-Ann Arbor strains. The triple immunization is available in a single vaccine from physicians and some public health

clinics. Robert D. Crider, director of the TDH Immunization Division, said, "The people we most strongly advise to have their yearly flu shots are those who are 65 or older, people with chronic respiratory or heart problems, and children who may have weakened health."

Crider said that any age person, in any state of health, can be susceptible to the disease. "Last year, Texas was lucky not to have had a serious epidemic of A-Taiwan flu among college age students," he said. 'A-Taiwan returned last year for the first time in about 35 years, and most young people had never been exposed to it before. We expected that unimmunized students, in the close quarters of the classrooms during cold weather, would be especially hard hit by the flu. But as I said, we were lucky, the weather was mild, and no large outbreaks developed. This year, we might not be so fortunate-

## **Texas Home Sales Rise 3rd Quarter**

During the third quarter of 1987, the rate of existing home sales in Texas increased 8% over the same period in 1986. This marks the fifth consecutive quarter sales have increased since the slowdown in the first half of 1986, according to Bill Stinson, president of the Texas Association of REALTORS (TAR).

"In view of the higher interest rates experienced during these 3 months, this is an excellent performance for Texas real estate," said Stinson. "It is much better than many analysts predicted when rates rose. It appears that the slightly higher interest rates have not hampered residential real

estate. "This increase also shows that the pent up demand from the summer selling season was not completely fulfilled. There may still be many potential buyers getting into the market, so the rest of the year may follow

suit," Stinson said. Sales have steadily rebounded since the third quarter of 1986 and sales volume is reaching levels

achieved in 1985. On a seasonally adjusted, annual basis the sales rate of previously owned homes in Texas rose to 232,100 units in the third quarter of 1987, compared to 214,900 units in the same three-month period in 1986. Sales include singlefamily houses, town homes

and condominiums. Texas ranked third among states in overall resale activity. The sales rate nation-

wide was down 3.3%. TAR, the largest trade association in Texas, has more than 50,000 members. TAR is dedicated to increased professionalism in the real estate industry and belongs to the National

Association of REALTORS. The annual rate of a particular quarter represents what total sales would be if the relative sales pace were

maintained for four consecutive quarters. Seasonally adjusted annual rates are used in reporting monthly and quarterly data to factor out seasonal variations in resale activity. For example, home sales volume is higher in the summer and relatively light in

winter months, primarily

due to weather differences.

A-Taiwan is still with us." Personal physicians are the best source of details on the types of vaccines recommended, as well as on individual treatment of flu's symptoms. In general, flu lasts for five to seven days, and doctors usually recommend bed rest, fluids, and sometimes prescribe drugs. Antiviral agents which are now available help protect against influenze-A, but must be administered on an ongoing basis. Immunization is still the best protection

against influenza. 'Parents should always use caution in giving aspirin to children under 16," Crider added. The ingredients in aspirin have been linked to the development of Reye symdrome, a serious neurologic disorder which can strike young people during recovery from influenza

or chicken pox.

#### **Preparing Tender Venison**

COLLEGE STATION-If the venison's tough, don't blame the cook. It could be due to what the hunter did -- or didn't do -- in the field. says a wildlife specialist with the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service.

"In addition to the age and sex of the animal, hunting and field dressing practices are extremely important in determining the quality of venison," says Don Steinbach.

"An undisturbed animal which is cleanly shot will yield more tender meat than a stressed animal. Field dressing the carcass as soon as possible and letting it hang for a full 48-hours will also increase tenderness by allowing muscles to stretch."

He adds that aging the carcass in cold storage just above freezing for about a week will add to the tenderness and possibly the flavor of the venison. After that, the

#### Holiday Planning

COLLEGE STATION --As the number of shopping days until Christmas decreases, it's easy to run out of money, as well as

"Christmas is the biggest spending season of the year, yet few families plan ahead for the added burden of their income," says Bonnie Piernot, a family economics specialist.

"A common strategy is to resort to credit spending for holiday expenses, although that may just postpone the financial problem until after the first of the year.'

But it's not too late to evaluate your financial situation and gain some control over holiday spending, according to the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service home economist.

"Figure out the amount of money you have available for holiday expenses, including money from paychecks you will receive between now and Christmas," she advises. "Then estimate your remaining expenses, including holiday food and entertaining, cards, decorations, party clothes, gifts

and other costs." If your estimated cost exceed available funds, Piernot suggests enlisting the entire family's help in curbing costs. Some options include establishing dollar limits for entertainment, clothing and holiday foods.

Since gifts are a major expense, she also advises setting dollar limits for each gift, making gifts and giving services, limiting gifts to certain members of the family or exchanging names to reduce the number of gifts.

"Once you know what gifts you plan to buy, go shopping with a list," says the specialist. "That will

allow you to comparison shop for items at a specific amount and will reduce impulse buying.'

"If you decide to use your credit cards, set limits on how much you'll charge and keep track of credit purchases so you won't run up large bills that are difficult to pay off in a reasonable amount of time," cautions Piernot.

"Remember too, that the finance charges on any unpaid charge card balances will actually add to the cost of your gifts.'

The home economist suggests keeping accurate records of all holiday expenses this year, so you'll have a good estimate of expenses for planning ahead

#### Alcohol Use In America

#### Spice Nice, But Pepper Harms

So you are a heavy user of pepper on your food. You may want to reconsider this practice in view of a research report from the Veterans Administration Center and Baylor College of Medicine, Houston.

According to Dr. David Graham and colleagues, the infestion of either red or black pepper can cause minor bleeding in the stomach, as well as significant increase in the secretion of acid and the digestive enzyme pepsin and loss of potassium.

is similar to that of aspirin, says Dr. Graham. Observed bleeding ranged from tiny amounts in the lining of the stomach to "grossly visible gastric bleeding" in one case.

#### Smoking Alters Medication

Smoking has long been reported as a risk factor for both lung disease and cancer. Now studies show that it can also reduce effectiveness of some medications as well as worsen existing health problems, thus complicating drug therapy, says the National Cancer Institute.

Compounds known as polycyclic aromatic hydrocarb as found in cigarette smoke can cause the liver to produce enzymes which chemically alter some medications. As a result, smokers may require larger or more frequent doses of such medications than do non-smokers, and tolerance for the drugs may increase after prolonged use.

Medications which can be affected by chemical compounds inhaled with cigarette smoke according to NCI, include:

\*Oral contraceptives \*Theophylline and anti-

asthmatic drugs \*Anti-anginal drugs such as propranolol and nifedipine

\*Painkillers \*Tranquilizers

\*Anti-depressants

\*Anti-anxiety drugs \*Heparin-anti

coagulants

\*Furosemide, diuretics

\*Vitamins B12 and C In addition to drug interactions, smoking can adversely affect conditions in such diseases as allergies, angina, lung disease, diabetes, high blood pressure, peripheral vascular disease and ulcers, making drug therapy more difficult, says the National Cancer Institute.

"Pungent Salt Substitute"- three teaspoons each of savory - summer savory is best - celery seed, ground cumin seed, sage and marjoram and one

teaspoon of lemon thyme. Mix all of this well, then grind it to a powder with a mortar and pestle.

Schimizue says these savory blends of herbs can be placed in shakers and used intead of salt. She cautions against the purchase of herbal salt blends on the market. Many are merely herbs added to salt. Read the list of ingredients carefully or just blend your own combinations, she

#### **Adventures In Babysitting To Show**

"Adventures in Babysitting" is a raucous and amiable romp that takes chaos out of the hands of grownups and gives it back to teenagers, where it belongs. ## **Gordon Spot**

The Eastland County Pecan Show is scheduled for December 3 and 4, in the Eastland County Courthouse Lobby. This will be the 35th consecutive pecan show in Eastland County reports, Charles Walker, President of the Eastland County Pecan Grower's Association. The show is sponsored by the grower's association and the Eastland Chamber of Com-

Any pecan grower in the area may submit entries to the show. Sometimes the best entries are submitted by a homeowner with one or two trees. There is no limit to the number of entries that an exhibitor may submit, put participants are limited to one entry of each named variety they grow. A grower may enter as many seedlings, known hybrids or natives as he wishes. The exhibitor must be the grower of the pecans. A minimum of 43 pecans are necessary for

each entry. This sample of

43 should represent the variety or individual seedling tree and be uniform in size and shell color. Mixed samples -- more than one variety in an entry - are disqualified.

The growers may wish to select the heaviest pecans by weighing individual nuts. This will eliminate poorly filled pecans, but certainly isn't an entry requirement

A varietal entry may be composed of nuts from more than one tree. For example, if the grower has 10 Choctaw trees, each tree could contribute nuts to the grower's one Choctaw en-

Nuts should be free of dust, dirt, and shuck remnants. They should not be buffed to the extent that shape or color is altered.

Discolored shells and kernels may result from peeling pecans from the shucks too early. Pecans must be from the 1987 crop and are judged on the basis

of size (number per pound). appearance, and shell color. Kernel quality is also, important and is based on the percent kernel, color, general appearance, texture, and taste.

All entries of pecans must be entered by 4:00 p.m. Wednesday, December 2. They may be sent or left at the County Agent's office in Eastland on, or prior to December 2

The first place entries will be sent to the Regional Pecan Show. Entries not winning first place will be sold to pay expenses of the

Walker said there will be a class for every variety provided there are at least two entries in that class. There will be a class for the smallest pecans, native pecans, seedlings, as well as all varieties. Plaques will be given to exhibitors of champion in-shell, shelling and native entries. Rosettes will be awarded for reserve champions and the first three place ribbons will be given in each

class.

Eastland Chamber of Commerce members will assist pecan growers with the shelling of ten pecans from each entry on Thursday morning. The entries will be judged at 1:00 p.m. on Thursday and exhibits will be on display until 3:30 p.m. Friday in the first floor lobby of the cour thouse



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## Veterans Day '87- The Momentum Builds, The Countdown Begins

Veterans Day 1987 held a special meaning for the Vietnam Women's Memorial Project (VWMP). From that day on, project volunteers will have only 12 months to capture the attention and support of the American peo-

At the end of that 12 months the members of the project plan to dedicate a new addition to the Vietnam Veterans Memorial in Washington, D.C. - a statue of a woman, and more importantly, a new awareness that women did indeed serve their country during the Vietnam War. To achieve their goals the project will need to raise \$1.2 million in private donations.

"So often when people learn that I served in Vietnam their first response is, 'Gee, women served in Vietnam?'," explains Donna Marie Boulay, a co-founder of the Vietnam Women's Memorial Project and a Vietnam veteran. "People simply don't picture women as veterans- it's not the complete picture, and it's not historically accurate.

"About 250,000 thousand American women served during the Vietnam War. Between 8,000 and 10,000 of us were stationed in Vietnam - some of us were wounded, some were captured and some died," states Boulay. "The losses the United States suffered in Vietnam were tragic, but without women serving in the Vietnam War many more Americans would not have come home."

Ninety percent of the women who served in Vietnam were nurses in the Armed Forces and U.A.I.D. It was the first time women had been stationed in a foreign war amid guerrilla warfare. According to Boulay, women came back with much of the same postwar trauma as the men.

'Women lived and worked amidst battle conditions," adds Boulay. "We often put in 12 to 16 hours a day. We rarely had down time, no chance to be bored. Working and caring and listening was the rule of every day for us.

We were there. We experienced war. We were patriots. We just want people to know and remember.' emphasizes Boulay.

One of the ways Boulay and the VWMP hope this will be accomplished is by adding a monument to the ex-

isting Vietnam Veterans Memorial. As a part of the existing memorial, the bronze statue of a female veteran would be dedicated to the "Men and women of the Armed Forces of the United States who served in the Vietnam War." The statue would join "the wall," the American flag and the statue of the three infantry men which currently make up the memorial

While erecting the statue is the most tangible goal of the VWMP, it is only one

aspect of a threefold program to bring recognition to some 250,000 women who served their country during the Vietnam era, either as members of the Armed Forces or civilians. While thousands served in the Armed Forces, others served in the United Service Organizations (USO), CIA and Red Cross.

The VWMP wants to educated the nation about the role women had during the war. And since no accurate records exist they

plan to research the number of women who served during the war.

As a result, one of the primary functions of the VWMP is to provide informaintains and provides a bibliography of books and articles written about the in-

mation to film producers, writers, educators, students, libraries and others interested in learning more about how women were involved during the war. The project also responds to requests for information;

Boulay says on her return, she went straight to work in a hospital in Tacoma, Wash. and did not see her family for six months. "I didn't want them to see me; by the time I did I could talk to them and not cry," she adds. 'My sister never understood why I went."

The VWMP wants to complete its work by Veterans Day in November 1988. The more the word gets out, the more women step forward to help, many of them by doing what they had little opportunity for before-talking about what they did.

There were 627 Red Cross women in Vietnam, three of whom died there. Barb Lilly, of Battle Creek, Mich. was an American Red Cross worker there. Though she was not in the military, Lilly says she had many of the same experiences they did, for which no amount of training could have prepared her. She saw men shot, and she saw men die. When enemy fire came in she had to run for cover or dive under her bed. One night she returned to her bunk after an attack and found shrapnel on it.

During a visit to Houston, she saw another veteran, a man, sobbing. "Five years ago I wouldn't have known what to do," she says. "I just went over and hugged him. On the one hand he was a total stranger to me and on the other hand I felt I knew him very well."

Betty Doebbeling, of St. Paul, first went to Vietnam as a civilian hired by the U.S.A.I.D. program in July 1967. She stayed for 18 months, then returned to the U.S. and joined the Army. She returned to the war zone for another year.

Doebbling made friends with Army Lt. Sharon Lane, shortly after Lane arrived in Vietnam. Doebbeling gave Lane a tour of the hospital, and they went out together on a day off. Lane siad her boyfriend back home was dying of cancer. Then she added, "I know I'll never go home either."

A week later the Viet Cong attacked the hospital at Chu Lai where Lane and Doebbeling worked. Doebbeling said she jumped under her cot and covered herself with a flak jacket when the rockets began to land. In another room nearby, Sharon Lane was struck in the throat by flying fragments and was killed instantly. She was one of the eight American military women to die in Vietnam.

For Crowley, her first night in the emergency room a group of about 15 Vietnamese were brought in, victims of a Viet Cong attack on their village. "There was a stretcher with a little girl on it," Crowley says. "I took off her field dressing and her intestines fell out. She was still awake." The child later

People weren't there (in the hospitals) long enough to get close to," Crowley says. 'You never really knew what happened to them. In some respects it was bad but in some respects it was

The memories return now when the women talk about what had been left unsaid for years. They were young and strong then, most of them in their early 20s. Many like Crowley came to the war straight out of school, believing in America and what it could do for other nations. She says she never lost faith in her country, but she grew up fast.

"I don't think I'll ever live that intensely again,' Crowley says. "Maybe you learn some respect for life that people that age don't usually have. You sort of hang on to every day. It was the best year of my life and the worst, all in one.

To cover the cost of achieving their goals to educate, research and honor the female Vietnam era veteran, this national grassroots effort requires \$1.2 million in private funding. Individuals interested in supporting the VWMP's efforts, or learning more

## **Invisible Veterans**

MINNEAPOLIS. Minn .-- It was November 1971, when Mary Beth Crowley stepped off an airplane in Seattle, her tour of duty as an Army nurse in Vietnam at an end. The contrast provided a shock.

"In the space of 12 hours you went from being in a war zone to being in the United States, where life was normal," she says. "You couldn't really believe you

Her grandmother met her at the airport. There were other military personnel there who saw the Vietnam campaign ribbon Crowley wore proudly on her uniform. She saw them talking and pointing at her. There was no fanfare. From Seattle she went quietly home to St. Paul, Minn. She had some time off, and the first night she sat down with her mother and told her what it was like-the long hours of nursing, the good friends she made and the suffering.

Crowley continued working as a nurse. The war faded from her life, except for times when she ran into other women who had been there. Then they shared memories. For the most part, she says, other didn't seem to want to know about

'No one was negative about it," she adds. "It was like they didn't know what to say. Perhaps they weren'to

Neither did many of the 10,000 other women who served in Vietnam, at least not for several years. Americans did not want to think about Vietnam, its divisive impact on the U.S. or even its victims, much less those who worked with. nursed and comforted them.
