New Landfill Will Open Mon.

The Cisco City Council held their regular meeting Tuesday, Nov. 24, at City

City Manager Mike Moore told the council the new landfill is ready for operation. Moore said the old landfill will close on Sat., Dec., 5, and the new landfill will become operational the following Mon., Dec. 7. The new landfill is adjacent to

the old one. In the financial report City Manager Moore said the City of Cisco has collected 46% of the city taxes that were budgeted for 1987-88. He said the city collected a total of 17% of the 87-88 budget during the month of October. During the month of October the City of Cisco's expenditures was 11% of the

alloted budget. Moore told the council members in the city manager's report he checked with Abilene on the '911' emergency phone number for Cisco and the surrounding area. Moore said he is only collecting information now, but he understood the '911' number will be a statewide service in the future.

The city manager told the council members of the equipment problems the city has had recently and they authorized Moore to Continued On Next



gram leader, said he anticipates stocking 137,000 rainbows beginning in early December. "Although we will have about the same number of trout as last year, we are adding nine sites to determine how well the public utilizes them," said Hutson.

SK 2000

The trout program is operated on a pay-as-yougo basis, funded entirely by proceeds from sales of \$5 State Trout Stamps, required of anglers to fish for trout in Texas waters. Last year the department sold 18,760 stamps which produced more than \$85,500 in revenue.

Fishermen also are required to possess a valid fishing license in addition to the trout stamp. The bag limit is five trout per day. ten in possession statewide. No additional fee is charged to fish for trout in state parks, only standard entrance and facility use fees.





A group of men of his day, deeply influenced by Greek philosophy, was attempting to transform Christianity into a system of knowledge and ideas (a heresy call gnosticism) which would be valid apart from the fact that Jesus was the Son of God; He was born of a virgin: He was

crucified; and He was resurrected from the dead.

John began his letter by assuring his readers that what he was going to say was true. He was an eyewitness. If they could trust the apostle, they could trust what He

John does not leave it here. He tells them, (I John 5:9) -"If we receive the witness of men, the witness of God is greater; for this is the witness of God which He hath testified of his Son" (I John 5:6-8)

The Christmas Seals Campaign, sponsored by the American Lung Association, is celebrating its 80th anniversary this year. State Treasurer Ann Richards is serving as the 1987 Christmas Seals chairperson for Texas. More than 40 million Seals have been distributed nationwide. Contributions to the campaign will be used to promote lung health and research projects on lung diseases.

Marking their 80th year, the 1987 Christmas Seals have been mailed this year to 40 million homes nationwide including one and a half households throughout Texas, according to J. C. Ewing Jr., president of the board of directors of the American Lung Association of Texas.

To kick-off the campaign in Texas, State Teasurer Ann Richards, 1987 chairwoman, last week unveiled at the Capitol the 80th anniversary seal which features a doll named Candy Claus with Santa.

Over the years, the

stamps bearing the doublebarred cross of the American Lung Association have become an American tradition and a symbol of the battle against all lung diseases and some of their

related causes such as smoking, air pollution and occupational lung hazards," Ewing

"Christmas Seals are the primary support of the American Lung Association and its 139 affiliates nationwide," he said. He added that 90 percent of the funds raised in Texas will stay in the state to support research and to provide community services, public health education, patient education and professional training.

Ewing pointed out that 78.7 million - almost 33 percent of the American population have had some chronic respiratory disease ranging in severity from chronic sinusitis to emphysema. Lung disease, including lung cancer, rank third among the leading causes of death in Texas.

News On The News-Social Security

Social Security has been a part of the American system for over 50 years. The Social Security Act of 1935 set up two lines of defense against want. The first defense was a contributory social insurance; the second was public assistance. This year payments made to the 38 million people under Social Security requires \$217 billion. This is the largest expenditure in the federal budget. For several years our leaders have been troubled over meeting the payments of retirees' benefits as well as of meeting all our government

outlays. Yet, when Congressional leaders and White House officials met recently to consider how to economize and cut our nations debt, President Reagan went before our nation and said, "We must find ways to balance our budget but do not cut Social Security."

Why do our leaders feel this way? This program is one of our Federal Government most popular programs. Retirees believe strongly that they are due a return on their Social Security withholding payroll tax.

They do not think of it as being a welfare program but rather as an insurance. Over the years Congress has passed many amendments to the Social Security Act. Many benefits have been added. Social Security has improved retirees' lifestyles. A 65 year-old worker who retires this year could receive the top payment of \$789 a month which is 53 percent of the average wage in the United

Problems have arisen since Social Security's inception. Most retirees receive a bigger check each month than they have contributed. Some one must pay for this. Some argue that retirees who have worked and saved for their future could get along without these payments. But these retirees feel they should get a return on their investment

Monthly withholding tax has increased over the years to pay for the increasing number of retirees' benefits. There are 125 million workers who help pay for these benefits. The selfemployed pay approximate-ly 12 percent of their earn-

Congress finally partially tried to change SS inequities and now those whose yearly salaries are more, pay more. Couples who have incomes over \$32,000 and single individuals with incomes over \$25,000 a year must pay tax up to half their Social Security benefits. This tax will bring in about \$4 billion next

Some economists go so far as to propose that a tax be imposed on all of the well-todo retirees' Social Security benefits.

Some budget-cutters have suggested that \$24 billion could be saved in the next three years if the cost-ofliving adjustment were frozen. This is not likely even though the Price Index failed to rise by 3 percent Congress voted on an \$8.6 billion hike anyway.

Congress recently passed a bill providing for catastrophic health insurance, a worthwhile law -The elderly are faced with remendous health costs. This bill, however, will nonetheless dramatically expand Medicare payments for serious illness. Although financed by Medicare premiums at the offset, the

program will cost \$1.4 billion this year, \$4.5 in 1990 and untold amounts in the future.

Interest groups are concerned that they get their share of tax monies. Congress has been liberal in passing laws to provide money for these interest groups. Just how long our nation can continue going in this direction remains to be

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

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

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
Wranglers Beat Howard College, Even Season Record


