Cow Is Thrown On Top Of Luggage Rack And Killed In Freak Accident On I-20 Sunday Night

Richard Bartlett of Dallas picked up an unexpected passenger last Sunday night, when a cow ran in front of his vehicle on I-20, was hit, and ended up on the top of his vehicle on his luggage rack.

Mr. Bartlett, who owns the Shiloh Inn in Coleman was traveling east on the Interstate on the way back to his home in Dallas, when the

accident occurred at 6:45 p.m., about 3 miles east of Cisco.

Mr. Bartlett, who was not injured in the accident said the bump was not real bad, but the impact caused the hood on his 1985 Chevy Suburban to fly up and block his view. He looked out the side window and saw where

grass was on the left side of the road and he just pulled onto the median out of the way of traffic.

Investigating the accident were Department of Public Safety Trooper Robert Ralls and Cisco Policeman Kenneth Preston. Rex Fields of Ted's & Rex's One Stop towed the vehicle into town.

Fields said he threw a lariat rope over the top of the animal and tied it down and brought it into town. The animal was killed instantly in the accident and the body was disposed of at the City landfill on Monday.

Mr. Bartlett's grandson drove in from Dallas Sunday night and took him home.

First National Bank Gives High School Educational Program

Typically, people have had to go to banks to learn about banking. The transition is being made however, the banking representative assisting the teacher with the technical aspects of banking.

This is evidenced in a new filmstrip program "BANKING IS..." which the First National Bank in Cisco presented as a public service to the students at Cisco High School. Jerry Morgan, executive vice president, made the presentation on Friday, December 4. Receiving the multimedia filmstrip unit at a presentation meeting at Cisco High School was Jack Martin, principal.

In making the presentation Jerry Morgan said, "The program 'BANKING IS...' gives the students firsthand experience with the basic banking activities they will use throughout their lives.

"Writing a check, applying for a loan, computing interest and using a bank's services are things most adults take for granted. We have done them all our lives. But these activities must be learned, and for many of today's students they can be foreign as any new endeavor," Morgan said.

Many adults learned banking by trial and error; but, in today's world of advancing technology, this is no longer a satisfactory solution. For instance, today checkwriting is as much a part of life as driving is. Ninety percent of

all financial transactions are made by check and the American public will write more than 37 billion checks this year. Yet, in spite of this, statistics show that less than 85 per cent of the graduating seniors know how to write a check properly. So, it is easy to see that check writing is an activity that students should understand if they are to take their places in the financial community.

Mr. Morgan said, "We hope our sponsorship of this

program will help give students a more thorough and systematic understanding of these basic banking activities the new services that are available, and help them in the management of their personal financial affairs.

"We strongly believe that the more financially secure students become through knowledge and practice of good banking, the better citizens they become; and the better our young citizens, the better our tomorrow."

Cisco Volunteer Firemen responded to a house fire at 900 East 9th. The call came in at 5:00 p.m. Monday. The house owned by Weldon Kimbrough received heavy damage from the fire.

Mr. Kimbrough had been taken to the hospital by Willy Hunt and Charlie Tatum with Patterson Ambulance about 2 hours before the fire started. Mr. Kimbrough was smoking at the time he was

taken to the hospital and fireman David Gill said he believes the cause of the fire is from Mr. Kimbrough smoking in bed.

Firemen had to return to the house again at 7:00 p.m. to extinguish a second fire.

Two neighborhood children who did not know Mr. Kimbrough had been taken to the hospital ran into the house to find him. Michelle Moore and Scooter

Hutt said they ran from room to room, but the smoke drove them out of the house.

Cisco Firemen have responded to seven grass fires since the first of December. There has not been any measurable rain in this area for a couple of months and it is so dry. David Gill said everyone needs to take caution since the area is so dry and help prevent fires.

Inspect lights before decorating.

Be sure to discard strands of lights with frayed wiring and replace burned out bulbs BEFORE you decorate.

Also, never leave your Christmas tree lights or outdoor decorative lights unattended. Be sure to unplug them when you go to bed or leave the house.

Hang ornaments away from lights.

Make sure paper ornaments and tinsel do not touch light bulbs. Also, never adjust outdoor or tree lights while they are turned on or connected to a power circuit.

Always use a wooden ladder or a metal one with rubber-tipped legs when installing outdoor lights. Be sure to stand on a dry surface.

Watch for the U.L. seal of approval.

Only buy lights that have been checked for safety. The Underwriters' Laboratories seal of approval is your guarantee that lights and wiring have been properly safety checked.

Make sure you don't overload circuits.

Avoid overloading electrical wiring by using more than one circuit for your tree lights. Use heavy-duty extension cords to run to other circuits.

WHO'S WHO, published by Educational Communications, Inc., Lake Forest, Illinois, is the largest high school recognition publication in the country. Annual Earnings Base To Increase For 1988

The annual earnings base - the maximum amount of earnings that count for Social Security - will increase to \$45,000 for 1988, up from \$43,000 for 1987. In addition, the 1988 tax rate for employees and their employers will increase to 7.51 percent, up from the 1987 rate of 7.15 percent. Glyn Hammons, Social Security manager in Abilene, said recently.

The increase in the wage base is based on the change in average earnings levels from 1986 to 1987. The tax rate increase was already a part of the Social Security law. The effective tax rate for self-employed people will rise from 12.3 percent to 13.02 percent for 1988.

To increase in the tax rate will amount to \$7.20 a month for a person earning \$2,000 a month.

Other Social Security figures are scheduled to increase in 1988 as well. Hammons said. The annual exempt amount used in the annual earnings test will increase. The annual earnings test is the measure used to determine whether a person who works will receive benefits during the year.

The 1988 annual exempt amount for people 65 through 69 will be \$8,400 up from the 1987 amount of \$8,160. The 1988 exempt amount for people under 65 all of 1988 will be \$6,120 up from the 1987 amount of \$6,000.

A person whose earnings

do not exceed the annual exempt amount will receive all benefits for the year. A person's benefit is reduced by \$1 for each \$2 of earnings above the exempt amount. The annual earnings test does not apply once a person reaches 70.

The amount of earnings needed to earn a quarter of coverage - the measure of Social Security work credit - will be \$470 in 1988, up from \$460 for 1987. In 1988, a worker will earn four quarters of coverage if his or her annual earnings are \$1,880 or more.

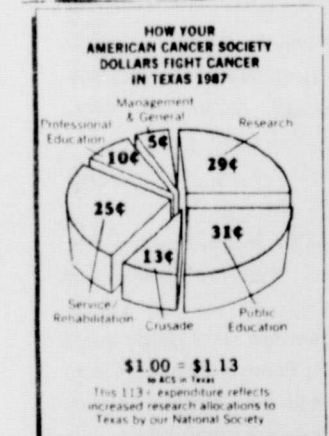

County Commissioners Finalize Purchase Of Lasater Property

Eastland County Commissioners met Monday to finalize the purchase of the Lasater property at a cost of \$75,000 for possible jail expansion.

This land is about half of a city block north of the jail, a property bounded by White, Lamar, Patterson and Mulberry Sts.

During the called meeting County Judge Scott Bailey informed the court of a letter from C.J. Eden, an attorney for the Lasater family, in which the terms of sale were set forth.

Besides the \$75,000 price, the owners requested possession of the property for 90 days from current date. This will give time to post proper notice to tenants on the land, and also give time to auction off personal property on the

land. The Lasater property, with one of the homes occupied by Mrs. B.W. Lasater.

Billy Bacon, Comm. of Pet. 1, made the motion in favor of accepting the offer. Norman Christian, Comm. of Pet. 2 gave a second to the motion. The other Commissioners, Robinson and Owen, joined in the vote of approval.

The purchase of the Lasater property will give the County ownership of the whole block where the old and present jails are located. Although jail expansion plans are under consideration, none have been finalized at this time.

TSTI School Bus Drivers Launch Safety Campaign

School bus drivers in the Texas State Teachers Association, alarmed at the increasing number of attempted child abductions, are launching a statewide campaign to help parents teach safety precautions to their children, especially while walking to and from bus stops.

TSTA President Charles N. Beard, Jr. said his organization is providing its bus drivers with thousands of pamphlets to distribute to children disembarking school buses in the afternoons. Children will be asked to give the information to parents.

In addition to safety rules on the bus, the information

deals frankly with other dangers which children might encounter at bus stops or during the walk home.

"Our bus drivers' concern for the children does not stop at the end of the bus ride," Beard said. "Parents and school personnel must all work together to protect the students at all times."

The TSTA brochure discusses rules for avoiding abductions or possible molestations; suggestions for forming block parent groups, especially near bus stops; and even lighting safety precautions while walking outside.

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Window On The West Coast

While in Santa Barbara, California, I learned that all tourists are directed to the old Santa Barbara Mission, situated on a hill between the Santa Ynez mountains and the town.

This is one of a chain of Catholic missions on the west coast, and each has a special charm. Santa Barbara, founded in 1876, did a lot of work among the Chumash Indians. The extensive raising of grapes, grain and cattle was also directed from the Mission.

As I looked at the imposing stone Sanctuary, secluded gardens and out-buildings they seemed oddly familiar to me. Then I realized that the design and floor plan of the complex was exactly like what I had seen at churches in New Mexico.

The fountains, lush grounds and palm trees were quite different from New Mexico, however.

A museum in the old mission roused my interest in another museum nearby - the Museum of Natural History. The buildings which housed the fine collection were constructed of adobe and stone. The Spanish knew how to build houses for the southwest, no doubt about it.

I was particularly interested in the display on the Chumash Indians, the first inhabitants of the area.

Their ability to build boats was amazing. Even with crude tools they constructed wooden ships large enough to ride the bay out to the Channel Islands in the west.

A traditional Chumash saying was inscribed near the Museum entrance: "The first man once said that all the world is a canoe, and whether paddlers or passengers we are all people together in that vessel."

I was told that around 1500 Chumash Indians still live in the Santa Barbara area. Later I saw a tall young man at the Farmer's Market who looked like a picture at the Museum. He was selling some green chilis he had raised.

Other special trips and treats came every day for me. One day Elizabeth took her mother Ann Gilchrist, and me out to lunch at El Encanto Restaurant, a lovely spot in a hillside garden.

When we drove by the family home I also met Elizabeth's father, John Gilchrist, a psychologist.

Although El Encanto had a Spanish name, I soon learned that it had a French flavor. I decided to settle in and enjoy it. Waiters with manners you wouldn't believe escorted us to wrought-iron tables on a terrace among banana trees. Bouganvillea draped scarlet cloaks over sides of the building.

And what does one eat in a place like that? We all ordered chicken salad with apples, curry, and dill sauce. When the food came it was so beautifully arranged and garnished that it seemed sacrilegious to disturb such an artistic display. One bite, however, convinced us that this food was meant to be eaten!

As John drove me downtown one day I saw no decay in this section. There

were glittering shops sitting in remodeled 1920's-era buildings. Flowers and trees were growing everywhere, with inviting malls and outdoor restaurants. I noticed that California girls were wearing understated but expensive-looking casual clothing such as denim skirts and oversized blouses.

The only shadow in this picture was the homeless people who drifted silently about, clinging to life.

"They come through all the time, going from Oregon to L.A.," John said. "This is an old hobo route, where it isn't too cold to sleep out at night. If people get too thick in the parks here, the police move them out. Then they drift down to L.A. and live on the streets."

He said he had heard that around 70,000 homeless people are in Los Angeles right now.

From the time I arrived in Santa Barbara John and I discussed music. We not only discussed it - we sat down and played the violin and guitar each night he had free.

John usually plays his guitar in small groups with another guitar, a bass, and perhaps a drum and flute. Santa Barbara is oriented toward music and all the arts, he said, but is hardly into country/western styles.

He reported that several C/W groups he had heard locally were "plenty bad - didn't know a thing about it." Bakersfield or Los Angeles was the mecca for country music lovers in the area, with Dwight Yoakum the most popular C/W singer in L.A.

Folk music was well received in Santa Barbara, he remarked. Each year there was a big Fiddlers Contest in town, and it brought in top players from all around the west.

While discussing music I had no idea that attending the Seventh-day Adventist church for Sabbath services would give me a chance to meet a top violin player and world-class violin maker, Henry Meissner.

As I walked into the beautiful sanctuary I heard four violins, two horns and a piano playing "Near The Cross". The group soon began another familiar hymn, with a simple yet eloquent manner. The sweet tone of their instruments and reverence of

I could see that this was a warm and welcoming church. I supposed there were people around from many backgrounds and economic groups, but I felt very much at home.

Toward the end of the service plans were made for a fund drive for community services and help for overseas work as well. I had noticed that a large community services building stood near the Church. I felt sure there was help available here for homeless people.

In a day or so John called the Meissner residence, south of Santa Barbara, and Mr. Meissner's wife Olga answered. She graciously invited us down to visit the violin maker in

his shop.

We drove the Freeway south to the farming town of Carpinteria, which consisted of an older downtown section and new suburbs. Olive and citrus groves surrounded the subdivision where the Meissners lived.

I was especially intrigued by the violin shop, which was a mystical place with the smell of rare woods, stains and varnishes. Violins and a viola hung on a rack across one wall.

Mr. Meissner explained that his son Frederick helped him in the shop. Both he and Frederick had a number of First-Place trophies which had been awarded in violin-making competitions.

Meissner said that he liv-

ed in Germany when young, and studied violin making with W. Raab in Mittenwald, Germany. Later he became a missionary for the Seventh-day Adventist Church, and served a number of years in China. During most of his life he had led out in church orchestras and played in symphonies.

Each year now he travels to Germany to pick out the best wood he can find for his instruments. He showed us some wood that was 200 years old.

Most of his best violins were made on order, he said. He brought out two which were waiting to be picked up. The workmanship was superb - the finish glowed from endless rubbing, so I did not dare ask the price of these in-

struments.

Meissner demonstrated the violins, and each had an exquisite tone. Then I played some numbers with him, which was really a privilege for me. He was kind enough to say that I should be playing in his church orchestra.

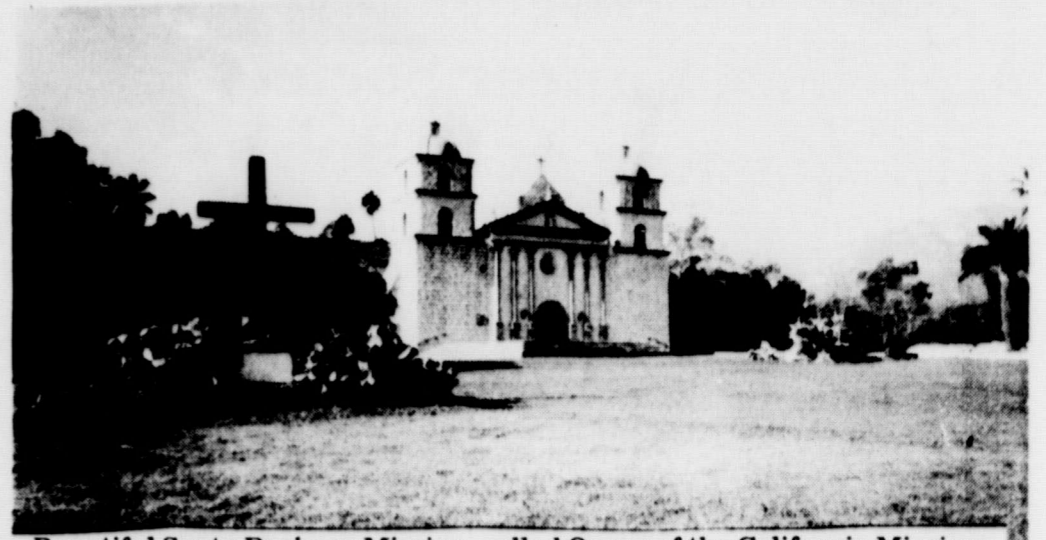
As we drove away from the Meissner home I told John that this was the ultimate in musical experiences - that nothing on the trip could possibly equal it!

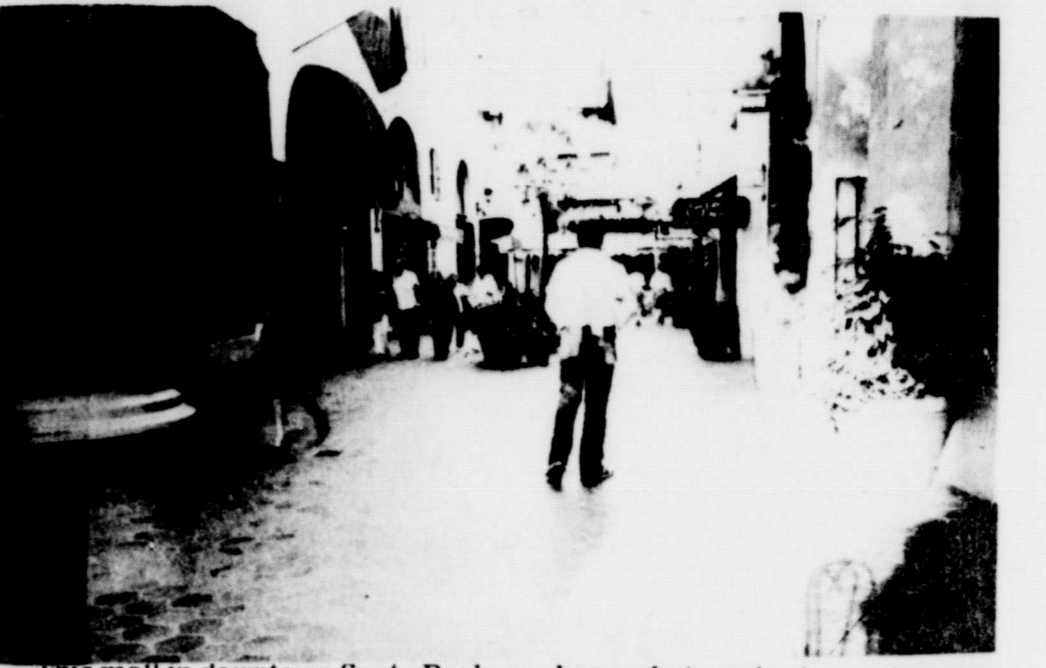

This mall in downtown Santa Barbara shows what can be done to beautify older buildings.

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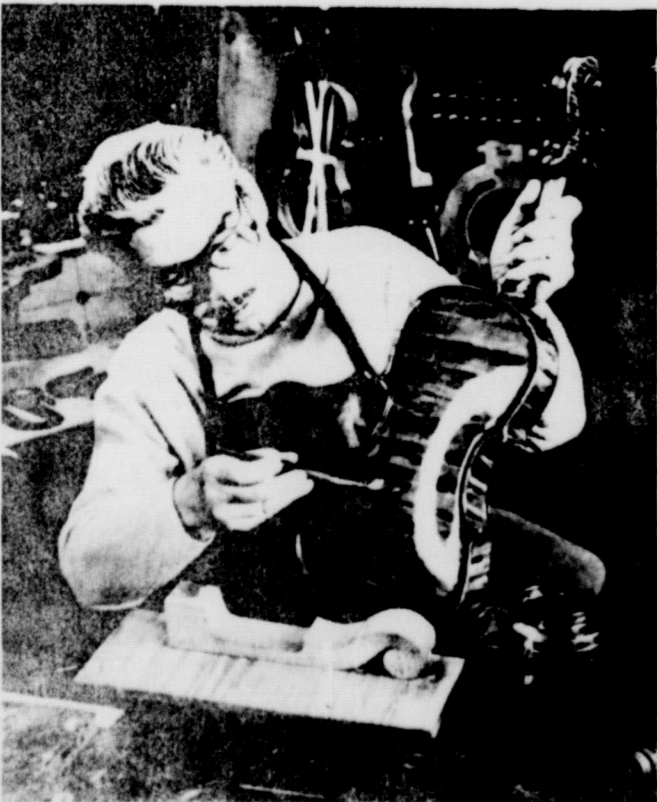

Private Commercial Carriers Must Be Registered With RRCommission

During the Regular Session of the 70th Texas Legislature, SB 595 and HB 908 were enacted concerning private commercial carriers. SB 595 requires all private commercial carriers (motor vehicles) as defined by the Railroad Commission of Texas to be registered with the Railroad Commission. HB 908 requires all private commercial carriers to file proof of insurance with the Commission.

There has been a great deal of confusion as to the implementation of these bills, and I would like to take this opportunity to discuss them with the people of my Senatorial District 22.

In August, the Railroad Commission adopted a rule defining a commercial vehicle under SB 595 as a vehicle weighing over 10,000 pounds used in furtherance of a commercial enterprise. This definition considers the trailer or towed vehicle in calculating the weight of the vehicle. At the same time, the Commission adopted a rule pursuant to HB 908 which set minimum liability insurance levels for these vehicles at that same level required of for-hire motor carriers, i.e. \$500,000 combined single limit coverage.

Subsequently, the Railroad Commission published a rule change in the Texas Register that would exempt from the definition of a commercial vehicle, vehicles operated by or on behalf of farmers and ranchers in the conduct of their farm or ranch operations. Additionally, the Commission also published a rule that would lower the

minimum insurance levels to that required by the Safety-Responsibility Act for vehicles having three axles or less weighing under 26,000 pounds. Only vehicles larger than that or having more than three axles would be subject to the \$500,000 insurance.

The Railroad Commission, however, has neither proposed nor adopted regulations regarding safety to be applied to any group other than for-hire motor carriers.

The Texas Department of Public Safety has proposed regulations pursuant to HB 908 that are similar to those of the United States Department of Transportation to be applied to for-hire and private motor carriers alike. These regulations require that commercial vehicle operators observe hours of service, maintain drivers logs, and take physical examinations, among other requirements. These are the requirements that would apply to private carriers such as delivery trucks, beer trucks and other private vehicles not for-hire.

I hope this information will explain more fully the effect of these two bills, however, if you have additional questions, please do not hesitate to contact my office.

To provide for both governmental regulations and the element of normalcy, Northview develops specific schedules that are custom designed for each holiday or day that routine classes are not to be held. Structure is provided by the various scheduled activities which eliminates clients drifting aimlessly through the day - a situation the government would not view favorably. The scope and variety of activities enhanced by employee enthusiasm create a festive atmosphere that serves to heighten the holiday spirit. Our clients look forward to all holidays anticipating special food and special activities.

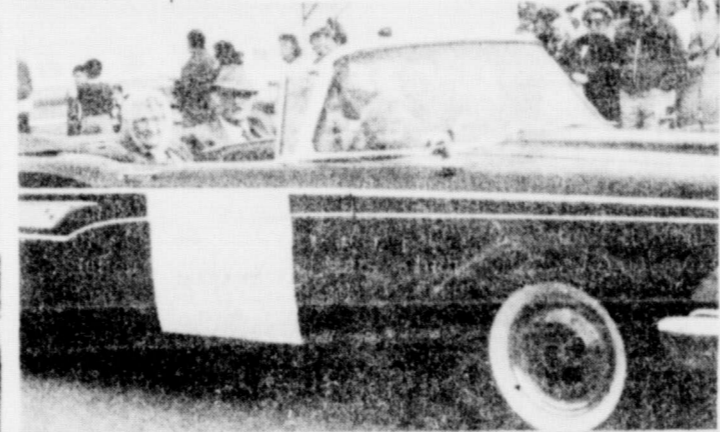

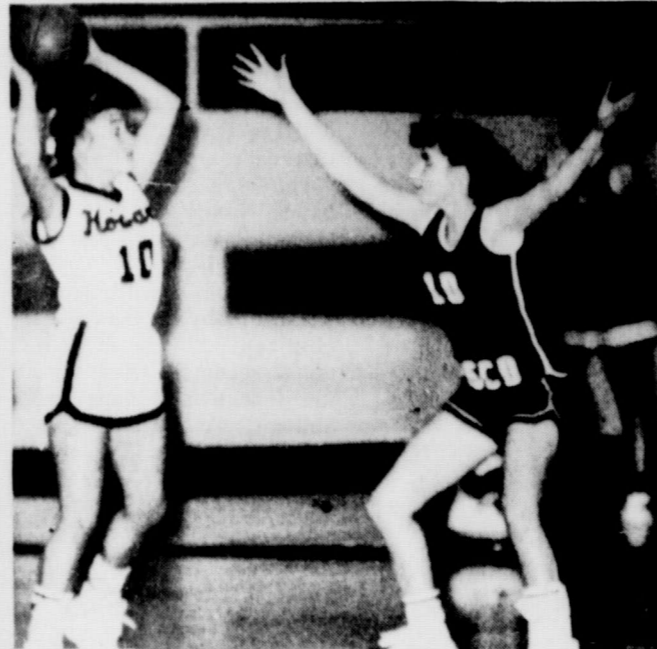
